Area To Observe Fire Prevention Week Through Saturday

The City of Cisco, along with Eastland County and the rest of the state and nation will continue the observance of Fire Prevention Week, through Saturday, October 15.

This week's Fire Prevention theme is "A Sound You Can Live With... Test Your Detector." The theme emphasizes the importance of smoke detectors, their installations and testing. The observance of Fire Prevention weeks reminds homeowners that battery operated smoke detectors should be tested weekly to make sure they are in good working order, while AC powered detectors should be tested monthly.

This week families are also urged to practice a fire escape plan in their home. Smoke detectors give a family a warning, but it's up to the family to get themselves out of danger, it was stated in a report on Fire Prevention Week.

Every family should have and practice a fire escape plan. The plan should give everyone at least two ways to escape in case of fire. In addition, there should be one location outside where everyone will meet after the drill so that

everyone can be accountable for. When a family practices their escape plan, they need to practice crawling low as they must do in the presence of smoke.

Students at Cisco Elementary school have been working on special projects concerning Fire Prevention Week and will do so through this week, according to reports. Posters will be made and stories will be read about Smokey the Bear and others, related to fire prevention. Steve Buchanan, fireman from Killeen, will speak to the students.

This year marks the 66th anniversary of National Fire Prevention Week. The actual observance of Fire Prevention Week originated in 1911 when the Fire Marshals Association established Fire Prevention Day. Upon recommendation, the National Fire Protection Association members urged U.S. President Warren G. Harding in 1922 to proclaim the week long observance in memory of the so-called "Great Chicago Fire" of Oct. 9, 1871.

Fires throughout the state of Texas in 1987 killed 322 people, injured more than 2,000 and destroyed in excess of \$300 million in property.

William P. Clements, Jr., governor of Texas said, "Much of this tragic loss could have been prevented. We have the knowledge and technology today to prevent much of the needless loss of lives and property in this state and we urge every Texas citizen to practice fire prevention every day in an effort to conserve our valuable Texas resources."

Some recommendations to minimize loss if fire starts are:

Test smoke detectors regularly. Change batteries within the recommended interval or when you see or hear a "low battery" signal from the detector. If you have yet to equip your home with these proven lifesavers, do so soon.

Post phone numbers of the fire department, emergency medical services and others who could help during an emergency. Teach youngsters how to call for help in case of fire or other emergency.

Prepare then practice a home fire escape plan.

If you live out of the city limits, and have no nearby water source such as a river, lake or farm tank, you can install water holding tanks for fire fighting.

Equip your house, out-buildings and motorized equipment with fire extinguishers of the proper size, type and rating. Type A fires (paper, wood, straw, etc.) are best fought with a pressurized water extinguisher. Type B fires (petroleum products such as solvents, kitchen grease, etc.) require the smothering effect of a dry chemical or carbon dioxide extinguisher. Type C fires (electrical) also require use of dry chemical or CO2 extinguishers.

A dry chemical extinguisher charged with tri-class chemicals can be used on Type A fires, but not as effectively as water. Never use a water extinguisher on Type B or C fire - with a B fire you could spread the flames and with a C fire you could suffer an electric shock. A tri-class 2A-10B:C extinguisher is ideal for a shop, tractor, combine and/or truck where a fire might involve both deep burning and flammable materials. Halon 1301/1211 fire extinguishers may also be used.

Locate extinguishers near building entrances and in areas with a higher fire risk such as a kitchen or shop. Those on vehicles and equipment should be accessible from both the operator's station and the ground.

Teach family members and employees how to use extinguishers. Check ex-

Rural Health Care Dinner-Meeting Oct. 19

Citizens of Eastland County are urged to attend a dinner and an important Rural Health Care Provider's meeting to be held at 6:00 p.m., Wednesday, October 19, at the Corral Room, 400 Conrad Hilton Ave., Cisco. The meeting will be held to discuss ways to keep the hospitals in Cisco, Eastland and Ranger open.

Roy V. Cartee, AARP Associate State Health Coordinator, of Cisco, said Jerry Sconce, regional ad-

ministrator, of the U.S. Health Financing Administrator (Medicare) will be the speaker. Mr. Sconce will begin speaking at 6:45 p.m., after the dinner.

According to Cartee, Medicare said the plan that he and Mr. Sconce will present at the meeting is unique and perhaps the first of its type in Texas. Cartee said the theme, "Survivability: Through Cooperation" is a way that all of the hospitals in Eastland County can

study the proposal of unifying their services, yet keeping their identity.

Cartee said four of the basic goals of the undertaking will be to recognize the level of care for our Eastland County people; retain patients in the facility of their desires; keep and utilize the facilities to the maximum and; to provide a financial base that is stable.

Cartee said meetings have been held by area health care providers and it has

been founded that everyone wants to keep the three Eastland County hospitals functioning on a level that is medically acceptable, and medical complex so that they will be recognized by the state and federal authorities.

The main purpose of this meeting, according to Mr. Cartee, is to assure Eastland County residents, that when someone needs a hospital it will be available. He added, "We feel it is simple to roll over and die in this time and day." But he added, that even if every hospital in the county was closed today, citizens must still pay the debts on the hospitals. Closing will hurt this area more.

Cartee said he is urging everyone to attend this important meeting to assure their doctors, hospital administrators and hospital boards, that they will support the co-ordinated action and keep the theme before the people of Eastland County at all times, "Survivability: Through Cooperation."

The cost of the dinner will be \$6.00 for each person. The deadline for the registration for the dinner and meeting will be Monday, October 17. Send names and number of guests, and a check for each dinner to Roy V. Cartee, AARP, Associate State Health Coordinator, 900 Avenue H, Cisco, Texas 76437.

Judge Bailey Volunteer Chairman For Proposition 1

Eastland County Judge Scott Bailey has been named as a Volunteer Campaign Chairman for Proposition 1 (The Good Roads Amendment) which will appear on the Nov. 8 General Election Ballot. He will serve in District 23/Brownwood, which covers Eastland and a number of other counties.

The November election is a vital one in many ways. Not only will citizens elect people to the highest national offices, but important state issues will also be decided.

Proposition 1 will be the first of three Constitutional amendments at the end of the ballot. In past elections, hun-

dreds of thousands of voters have failed to mark their ballots on Constitutional Amendments.

Most did so because they didn't understand the importance of the proposed amendments, says the Texas Good Roads/Transportation Association. This is the challenge faced by a public education campaign on behalf of Proposition 1.

The amendment will read: "The constitutional amendment and/or clarification providing that federal reimbursement of state highway dedicated funds are themselves dedicated for the purpose of acquiring rights-of-

way and constructing, maintaining and policing public roadways."

"This Proposition would clarify how the Texas money collected in excise taxes and other ways can be used when it comes back from Washing-

ton," Judge Bailey says. "A vote FOR will mean that the \$800 million a year which Texas receives back from the Federal Highway Trust Fund will continue to be used ex-

Two man teams from across the state who qualified in regional team events in Anglers Choice Team Circuit meet at Lake Brownwood for the state classic. 121 of 122 teams were present for two days of head to head competition.

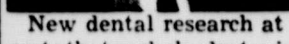

New dental research at the University of Iowa suggests that carbohydrates in ordinary meals -- especially in cooked food -- are as bad for the teeth as sugary snacks. Chewing gum for about 10 minutes after eating seems to increase saliva flow which, in turn, helps slow down plaque buildup.

Diet center in Salt Lake City makes it harder for customers to "cheat" because they wear a mouth guard -- a metal device that fits over the teeth and makes it difficult to open the mouth wide.

Danish study indicates that a strong nicotine chewing gum was effective in helping smokers quit. The FDA is awaiting the results of clinical trials before giving its okay on the gum.

The FDA has given approval for the use of a Gore-tex ligament for knee surgery where transplanting the patient's own ligament has failed. New material is said to be stronger than the original and promise faster recovery.

A surge in sales tax rebates to several large metropolitan areas in Texas reflects increasing statewide economic growth and stability, according to a news release The Press received this week from State Comptroller Bob Bullock.

Bullock said the state's metropolitan areas are doing better even better than originally forecast. He said he is glad to see Texas is sitting on solid economic ground again.

According to the report Cisco is doing a little better with their city sales tax than what they did last year, at this same time.

Cisco received a sales tax allocation check for \$9,857.80 this period compared to \$9,609.68 for the same period last year. That is an increase of 7.97%. Eastland's percentage was only up 2.21%. Gorman's increase was up 9.96%, Ranger's up 5.79% and Rising Star's percentage was down -2.90%.

Maybe the bad economic tide is going to change for the better in this area. It's about time isn't it?

But, some try to win the money in an dishonest way. Two men, one from Cross Plains and one from Abilene were arrested last week on indictments handed down by a 91st District Court Grand Jury in Stephens County for "fishing tournament fraud." This charge is a felony under the laws of the state of Texas.

Don Billings McDougal of Abilene, who turned in a 7.04 pound bass, twenty minutes after the tournament started, but who was unable to pass a polygraph test about catching the fish, was arrested and Lee Roy Higginbottom of Cross Plains was arrested Oct. 3. Both men were arraigned and bonds were set at \$2,500 each. Their trial will be held in Stephens County.
