## Injunction On Discharge Of **Wastewater Near Ranger**

injunction General Electric Railcar had applied to the Texas Water Commission for a temporary order to authorize the discharge of this treated wastewater from four surface ponds and 43 railcars located 2.5 mi. northeast of the inter-Fork Palo Pinto Creek. section of Highway 80 and

> FM 101 in the City of Ranger. The water was to be discharged into North Fork Palo Pinto Creek, then to Palo Pinto Creek and on to Lake Palo Pinto. The discharge of the treated wastewater was not to exceed 60,000 gallons of

water per day. Eastland County Judge Scott Bailey announced his plans to the County Commissioners at their meeting Monday, and told of the Public Hearing in Austin that day, Oct. 24. News of the injunction did not arrive until after the commissioner's meeting however.

More information will probably be forthcoming on the resolution of the request by General Electric Railcar Repair Service.

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## Wrangler Men Open

The Cisco Junior College Wranglers open the 1988-89 basketball season Thursday, Nov. 3, when they travel to Midland to participate in the Chaparral Classic at Midland College's Chaparral Center. The Wranglers open play in the tournament at 2 p.m. against Barton County Community College from Great Bend, Kansas. Barton County is ranked in the top five teams in the nation in pre-season JUCO polls. Play in the tournament continues on Friday and Saturday, and Wranglers are guaranteed three games.

Cisco returns three players from their 1987-88 team which posted an 18-11 won-loss record. Tyrone Williams, a 6-5 guard from Shreveport, La., was a fulltime starter last season, averaging 13.2 points and 7.6 rebounds per game. Ronald Ateman, a 6-5 forward from Garland, and Mark Chambers, a 6-4 forward from Fort Worth, split playing time last year. Ateman averaged 11.8 points and 4.9 rebounds, while Chambers averaged 10.7 points and 5.6 rebounds. He also led the team in field goal percentage at 57.5 percent.

Lewis Hicks, a 5-10 guard from Garland, and Bryant Bond, a 6-2 guard from Houston, are expected to start at the guard positions. Both enrolled at CJC in January and sat out the spring semester. Hicks, a transfer from Paris Junior College, is considered to be the team's top outside

After the opening tourna-ment in Midland, the Wranglers will travel to Big Spring on Monday, Nov. 7, to take on the Howard College Hawks. The first home game is Thursday, November 10, against Western Texas College at Wrangler Gym.



## Milk Supplies Safe

Consumers can feel confident that milk supplies in the food chain are totally safe from any problems of aflatoxin as a result of tests conducted to assure food

Dr. Al Wagner, a food technologist with the Texas Agricultrual Extension Service, said that monitoring and testing programs for milk supplies are designed to produce quality food products.

"Milk-or other foods-that do not meet tough standards automatically withdrawn from the market," Wagner said.

Another expert in the area of dairy food safety, Kirmon Smith of Austin, director of the division of dairy products with the Texas Department of Health, said consumers can have great confidence in the safety of the milk supply.

'We have strict screening programs under way that sample and test tankerloads of milk coming into Texas, as well as testing programs for individual dairy farms in the state. Any milk that does not meet our strict standards is immediately withdrawn and does not get into the food chain," Smith said.

## Quail, Other Gamebirds At Risk If Fed Untested Feeds

Wildlife managers and owners who are planning extensive feeding programs for their quail or other gamebirds may want to feed milo instead of corn, according to a wildlife specialist.

Dr. Jack Payne, who is with the Texas Agricultural **Extension Service at Corpus** Christi, said wildlife interests should be aware of potential problems caused by aflotoxin in corn.

'For this reason, a wildlife manager may want to feed his gamebirds--especially quail--milo rather than corn," Payne said.

Aflatoxin is a chemical product of the fungus, Aspergillus flavus. The fungus does not attack the mile plant as readily as it does corn in times of drought stress. Payne said.

He said that while all gamebirds are at risk from eating contaminated grain, most experts believe that quail have the highest risks. White-tailed deer and turkeys are much more diverse in their eating habits, with supplemental grain making up only a portion of their diet, yet they are

still as some risk 'Quail, on the other hand, depend much more heavily on the grain that is supplied to them in feeders and broadcast along senderos," Payne said.

Doves that are shot over corn fields- that are known to contain aflatoxin-are safe for eating if one discards the liver, Payne said.

He said historical records indicate that aflatoxin has been around for thousands of

Smith said that through the stesing program, milk containing aflatoxin levels above the maximum allowed (.5 parts per billion) has been traced to 1.3 percent of the dairy farms in Texas, or about 30 Texas dairies this month.

"These milk supplies were discarded immediately, so consumers should have no concerns about these dairy products.

Furthermore, our testing program is continuing to assure that future supplies also are safe," Smith said.

Wagner said that the widespread drought in Texas, the Mid-West and other grain-producing areas of the nation has created possble toxic problems with feed. Aflatoxin, a type of mycotoxin produced by fungi, can be toxic to livestock fed the contaminated grain.

Whether grain is contaminated with mycotoxins can be determined by a blacklight test, but a more sophisticated test is needed to determine the actual aflatoxin levels. Feed samples can be sent to the Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory at Texas A&M University, or to commercial companies, for testing.

## **Church Leader Uses Quilting Example To Help Communities**

Like putting together the pieces of a quilt, it's time to take what's good from the old and the new in rural America and blend it into something beautiful and useful, a church leader said here today.

"This is the time to mend what is wrong in rural America," said Gary Farley with the Southern Baptist Convention, Atlanta, Ga. Farley spoke at the 43rd Annual Town and Country Church Conference at Texas A&M University conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Speaking on "Similarieites Between Quilts and Our Lives," Farley described numerous quilt patterns and then said that rural America cannot adhere to any one pattern in its mending process. Instead, a mixture, or sampler, is the type of quilt pattern that is needed, he

"Many quilt patterns are appropriate for our mending of rural America, but I think we need a sampler, one fashioned for a king-sized waterbed," Farley said. "In that way it will be large and cover something vital to our well-being."

Farley described a number of quilt patterns and how they relate to rural America.

"A crazy quilt is one that takes its own shape; I think such an approach to helping rural America is harmful. The flying geese pattern is one that might work

because it shows flexibility. But we must use it with care. "Jacob's ladder advocates care and caution and trust in God. Certainly we can use

some of that pattern. "The Lone Star pattern shows individual initiative and leadership, which are important. But this pattern might serve us better if it

## 0/92 Provisions Are Available For The 1989 Wheat & Feed Programs

The "0/92" provisions are available for the 1989 wheat and feed grain programs. Some producers are debating whether or not to plant winter wheat because of the dry soil conditions. This reminder may assist them in making this management decision **ASCS official David Martin** 

The "0/92" provisions gives wheat and feed grain producers the option to de-

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

Medical research studies of adults have clearly shown that eating a diet high in saturated fats and high in cholesterol directly increases the risk of heart disease. Other factors, especially smoking, high blood pressure, diabetes and a family history of heart disease add to that risk.

Heart-healthy eating, a term coined by the American Heart Association, means reducing total fat intake in the diet to 30 percent of calories, reducing saturated fats to about 10 percent of calories and reducing total dietary cholesterol intake to 300 milligrams a day or less.

Since most people don't count every calorie, let alone know the percentage of calories devoted to each type of fat, this gets translated into a generally low-fat, low-cholesterol diet - and a diet which may not be the best for young children in the family.

Dr. Mary Kinney Sweeten, a Registered Dietitian and nutrition specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at Texas A&M University, said this diet advice has left many parents confused.

"Our county extension home economists are getting many questions from parents who are concerned about fat in their children's diets," she said. "We try to reassure them that a balanced diet is still most appropriate for all ages."

"There is some disagreement among medical authorities as to the exact age when children should start eating a low-saturated fat diet. But they all agree that it shouldn't be before the age of two," said Sweeten.

Medical studies of babies under age two whose parents put them on low-fat diets by giving them skim milk, for example, have been found to suffer from slow growth and failure to thrive.

## Farmers Urged To Check Insurance Needs

Farmers who plan to put in winter crops with the Farmers Home Administration emergency loans based on this year's drought should take steps immediately to see if they need crop insurance for 1989 crops, according to J. Lynn Futch, FmHA State Director for Texas.

The Disaster Assistance Act of 1988 requires any farmer with a production loss exceeding 65 percent of normal to agree to purchase insurance for 1989 crops, with some exceptions, as a condition for obtaining an FmHA emergency loan to help cover 1988 losses, Futch said.

The open season for obtaining multi-peril crop insurance for winter crops expires October 31, except in certain northwestern States

where it is November 30, leaving farmers little time to obtain insurance. Although some extensions to the deadline may be granted on an individual basis, Futch said farmers should get in touch with their local insurance representative without delay.

Proof of insurance will be

required before disaster loan applications can be processed.

## **News Briefs**

CISCO

City Manger Mike Moore iold City Council members at their regular meeting that the fiscal year for the City ended in the black on Sept. 30. He said 99 percent of the budgeted revenues, \$879,171, came in to the City and the City spent 96 percent of the budget, or \$855,173. Moore added that the City did not have to dip into their meager savings this year. Moore told the Mayor and Council members that the city also had enough money this past year o seal coat and pave more than 71 blocks. A total and blocks have been paved over the past five years, using only city revenues. He added, We are going to concentrate on new paying in Cisco. In the next two years I believe that a total of 80-85 percent of the City of Cisco will be paved. This will be 90 percent of the streets."

Moore said the city swimming poolended the year with a deficit. The admissions and concessions were down \$1,000 from last year, and the maintenance up. He said the pool is a substantial expense to the city. Among purchases for the pool were a new pump and equipment. With chemicals, supplies, maintenance and other expenditures the pool showed a financial loss of \$7,110.

The Cisco Child Care Center has issued an appeal to the public for donations to offset recent expenses which have depleted the funds of this non-profit organization. Established in 1968 as a community service, the Child Care Center serves parents who must have care for their children in order to work. The Center does not receive any state or federal aid, but is licensed and regulated by the

State of Texas. Fees are kept low to provide services for working families. But recently maintenance requirements and lower than usual fee receipts have caused a money crunch. Donations may be brought to the Center, or mailed to the Center at 804 Ave. H in Cisco.







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## **Fishing Outdoors**

"Jack York Sweeps Oak

Sixteen members of the Brownwood Bass Club met at Lake Oak Creek, Sunday, October 30, 1988. This was a very small number which was due in part to the previous weeks classic on this lake, when weather and fishing were both less than desirable.

But as always someone did find the fish. And what were found were some excellent catches. Jack York landed an excellent string of three fish which weighed in at 12 pounds 112 ounces. Jack also won both places in the big bass pot with a 5 pound 1112 ounces and a 4 pound 15 ounce black bass. Both of these fish were in excellent shape. Jack reported catching his two larger fish on jigs in six feet of water. And the third fish came on topwater in one foot of water. Second place was won by Tully Hair with 3 fish which weighed 4 pound 13 ounces. And third place went to James Mann with 2 fish 4 pounds 4 ounces.

A total of 16 fish were brought in which weighed a total of 37 pounds and 1212 ounces. Not to bad fishing for October and frontal condifish fell prey to jigs, with only two fishs being taken on spinners baits and one on a Poses New Dange rat-1-trap.

Recently we were asked a very disturbing question concerning the future of bass fishing in Texas. A gentleman from Abilene asked if I had heard of a move being made by certain members of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department to have a one fish 21 inch statewide minimum placed into effect? Well I had not heard of this and after doing some asking around I discovered that, even though it is being treated as a rumor, that in fact there is some serious talk in Austin to attest to this.

This move would be economically devastating in lost tackle and equipment sales alone. But if we all set down and write a letter concerning our dislike for this proposed measure "now" hopefully we the people can put a stop to a move to further use from our natural resources.

other anglers. This simple looking, easy to fish lure is more popularly called a Gitzit. Many similar and just as, or more effective lures such as "Bass Its" 'So Somethin" and "Jig 'zts" are also being conceal-

ed under the jig title. Fall jigs normally mean large tull meal baits. Perhaps this is one reason the smaller "Gitzit" is producing so many fine stringers. Its application is especially productive when dabbled during or after these northerns we are now hav-

So the next time an angler reports jigs to be the lure working on your favorite lake, ask him to be a little more specific. After all "a jig by any other name is still a jig" or is it?

If you want to see the illegal drug trafficing in Eastland County stopped, the best thing you can do is to cooperate with law enforcement efforts, according to Drug and Crime Task Force Captain Frank Cleveland.

Officers can't be everywhere and know everything all of the time, they need the help of your eyes and ears. If you see or hear of something illegal or suspicious, call or contact a local officer of the West Central Texas Interlocal Crime Task Force Office in Abilene.

As drug producers and pushers sometimes move about, the Task Force coordinates efforts and infor-

mation between the many local officers and enforcement agencies. And the Task Force, which also supplies undercover agents and a prosecuting attorney, depends on the counties for part of its support.

Eastland County was the first county of 13 to come through with its part of the financial support. And according to Cleveland, the Task Force has received the most co-operation from Eastland County officers.

Due to Task Force efforts, 196 felony cases are pending and 29 of them are in Eastland County. Among the items seized are 7 drug labs, 5 vehicles, 30 pieces of jewelry, 15 guns and \$12,000

The 30 people at the meeting in Eastland also heard Captain Cleveland tell about a school to be conducted in Abilene for law enforcement officers

Much greater safety precautions must now be taken by officers raiding drug labs due to the in troduction of the Red Phospherous process for producing drugs into this area from the West Coast.

The new process doesn't have the odor that the old process gave off, but it gives off poisonous gases instead.

Those attempting to use the new process to produce illegal drugs may be killed by the gases even through a mask, along with any family members or neighbors who might be nearby.

Officers will be trained in how to safely deal with the gases from the drug process.



· Choose lean cuts of red meat, usually labeled "select," and trim visible fat. Also prepare children without the

· Try low-fat cheeses. Children typically like American cheese and there are lowerfat versions of these available in the supermarkets.

· Keep ice cream for a special treat. Instead, offer children fruit juice bars, sorbet, sherbet, ice cream or frozen yogurt for regular snacks.

· Choose lower fat cookies, such as frui or raisin bars, ginger snaps or oatmeal cookies. Check the labels on cookie packages and avoid those that use the highly saturated coconut and palm kernel oils or animal fats.

· Also read labels on other prepared foods to avoid saturated coconut and palm kernel oils or animal fats.

· Use a tub variety of margarine that lists a liquid vegetable oil first on the list of ingredients.

Upon successful competion of the course, a student is eligible to apply to the DPS for an instructional permit. The driver education course consists to two phases, classroom and in-car instuction. In the classroom phase, students receive 56 hours of instruction in courses for

state credit and 32 hours of instruction in noncredit courses. The car phase consists of seven hours of actual behind-the-wheel instruction and seven hours of observa-Students who successfully complete an approved driver education program may apply for a regular driver's





#### A SWITCH ON PROP. THREE

What's the old saw about wise men changing their minds and fools never ...?

That might be our position as we reconsider the advisability of voting for Amendment Proposition Three in the upcoming General Election. We'd earlier recommended the passage on all three amendments, but learn later that there may be more to No. Three than what we first guessed.

Truth of the matter is, probably no one knows for sure. It's for sure that we've had a lot of in-put from those who are concerned that passage could affect their retirement funds. The proposition, if passed, would make it possible to invest funds from certain retirement funds into investment programs to stimulate growth in the state. It is understood, but not carved in stone apparently, that each fund manager and its members would have the option as to investing or not, but that's not too clear. These funds are invested now, but generally in rock-solid, guaranteed projects, which means growth for the funds.

But since it's not too clear just how much leeway each fund would have as to investing, it might be a good thing to reconsider voting "for" proposition Three.

We sincerely appreciate the input we've had from those who are might be affected.

And perhaps our commenting on the matter has served the purpose of at least getting people concerned, and who knows, it might even turn out more people to vote next

For now, we'll say, we're voting "for" One and Two, and we're not sure of Three yet.
