Does Cisco Want Healthcare In Cisco?

Those of you who have lived in Cisco for more than 5 years can probably remember a different E.L. Graham Hospital. Babies were delivered, surgery performed, and generally a much busier facility. Today we do not have babies being delivered, and very little surgery, and on our better days we are really busy. Why the big difference? I think there are many reasons.

Malpractice insurance premiums went through the roof, one of our doctors retired, the economy went south and stayed there, diagnostic related groupings came into being, and probably a dozen other things clobbered us all at once, all resulting in a decreased use of the hospital and in general a tougher situation came in to play.

We are not alone in this dilemma, Texas leads the nation in hospital closures, some are just rolling over and letting it happen to them, others are fighting with all they've got.

This week the hospital board of directors requested that I put a survey together and mail it to the taxpayers of the Cisco Hospital district and call a town meeting on December 6, 1988. They want to know if you want us to just roll over and let the hospital go the way of the other 54 who have closed or fight like Memphis and Hamilton have done to keep their hospitals open.

Let there be no mistake, those 54 hospitals closed their doors because they were not used by the communities they served. It was more expedient to see the specialist in the nearest big city. Maybe in some instances the services were not available, but more often than not those services were discontinued because of insufficient volume.

I don't mean to propose that each of these facilities was perfectly managed, but I do know that when times get tough you begin to cut out those services that cost more than they are bringing in, and in doing so the rural hospitals in Texas have slowly dug their own graves. What other choice did they have? Either way they lose. What I am simply saying is that any community which fails to support its hospital, and its local physicians will lose them. That danger is real in Cisco Texas, today.

How do we change that? Find a way to change the communities attitude regarding the providers of care? Recreate needed services.

Recruit additional physicians, if necessary. Look for answers, and don't be resigned to defeat. If we believe we can succeed, then we can. Let me give you some things to consider:

The DeLeon Hospital— It's a 40-bed facility that generally has 25 inpatients at any given time. They have 5 physicians in the community. Their success? Whatever it is, it's working.

And the Quannah Hospital— Last month they had a \$30,000 positive cash flow. They have 3 physicians in their community. Their success? Again whatever it is, it's working.

These two places are not much different from Cisco, they are succeeding, and we can too.

How? First, complete the survey you received in the mail this week and get it back to the hospital or any of the boxes set up at the Bank, Senior Citizens Center, Cisco Press, or Thrift Mart, and second come to the meeting Tuesday, December 6, 1988, at 7:00 p.m. at the high school auditorium.

That's when we'll answer the question: Does Cisco want health care in Cisco? Your attendance and participation in the survey will go a long way in answering that question in a positive way.

Let's work together to solve this problem, for some it may be a matter of life or death.

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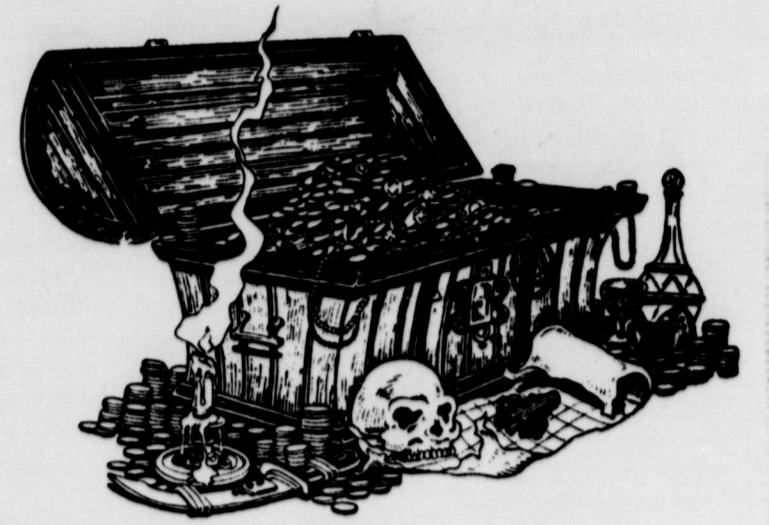

EASTLAND

Locals and visitors are urged to secure free tickets at the Chamber of Commerce office on the east side of the Square for Eastland's First Treasure Hunt, which will be held Thursday, Dec. 8, immediately following the Annual Tree Lighting Program in downtown Eastland. Over 50 merchants are giving valuable prizes, which may be claimed free with lucky matching numbers. These will be posted at each location at 8 p.m. that evening. Tickets are available, one for each family member, from now until time to hunt. The Treasure Hunt is sponsored by the Retail Trades Commission of the Chamber of Commerce. Over 500 qualifying tickets have been distributed so far.

The Eastland High Mavericks, after earning an Area and Regional trophy, will play Quannah this Friday night at 7:30 p.m. for the Quarter-Final Championship. The game will be at Abilene's Shotwell Stadium and Eastland will be the home team. Eastland is the only area team besides 6-man May and Zephyr which is still in the state playoffs. Both Eastland and Quannah have already played two playoff games in Shotwell Stadium this year. Both are strong teams, but Maverick fans are planning for another big win.

The Eastland Kiwanis Club, Key Club and six insurance agencies of Eastland are staging the Kiwanis Fun Run Saturday. There will be both a 10K run for the track people, which covers 6.2 miles, and a two mile Fun Run and Walk which covers most people. These events will begin in front of the Eastland Telegram Bldg., 215 S. Seaman, at 9 a.m. These runs are being sponsored for extra exercise and good health. All are encouraged to join in.

The Eastland Goodfellows will meet at 5:30 on Dec. 6 in the High School Library. Texas Agricultural Loan Mediation Program At Texas Tech Designated As State Agency

LUBBOCK-The U.S. Secretary of Agriculture has designated the Texas Agricultural Loan Mediation Program at Texas Tech University as the state agency to mediate between delinquent farm borrowers and their lenders. The program has received a \$500,000 federal grant to partially fund operations in the 1989 fiscal year. Borrowers and lenders are settling debts as required by the Agricultural Credit Act of 1987. This legislation requires the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA), the Federal Land Bank Associations (FLBAs) and the Production Credit Association (PCA) to restructure distressed loans if restructuring is a less costly alternative than foreclosure.

FmHA has sent notices to borrowers who are more than 180 days late on their payments. These notices inform the borrowers that they have 45 days to decide whether they wish to try to restructure their debt and to prepare all necessary paperwork or to prepare for foreclosure.

Officials of the Texas Agricultural Loan Mediation Program will act as mediators between the borrowers and lenders upon request by either party.

"We're only here to serve as facilitators," said Gary Condra, director of the program and faculty member in the agricultural economics department at Texas Tech. "We're not judges, juries or advocates. We're just a neutral third party trying to make a deal possible."

Condra said the priority of the program is to negotiate a compromise that will bring the lender as much money as possible and keep the farmer on the farm.

After borrowers receive their letters from the FmHA they should call as soon as possible the Texas Agricultural Loan Mediation Program office at (806) 742-1949 or (806) 742-1969. They will then be advised of the paperwork and financial statements necessary for mediation. Once borrowers have the pertinent information, they

can call again to make an appointment with a mediation assistant who will help prepare the borrower's farm and home plan and application for servicing options from FmHA. A \$250 user fee is required for the service.

Pharmacy Topics

Stopping smoking cuts the risk of stroke by 50 percent, according to research at Boston University. Within two years, risk was cut significantly, even for long-term smokers. Five years after quitting, risk was as low as for non-smokers.

Studies at the University of Texas System Cancer Center indicate that calcium supplements -- as much as 1,250 mg. a day -- may reverse the progress toward cancer in colon cells of high-risk people.

Research at the University of Minnesota indicates that intereron may be able to control multiple myeloma, a form of bone cancer, when used together with standard chemotherapy drugs.

Do-it-yourself -- The "Heimlich maneuver" can be self-administered in cases of choking on food, according to Dr. Heimlich himself. Either press hard with your fist, he says, or press the upper abdomen against the back of a chair, a porch railing, or a table.

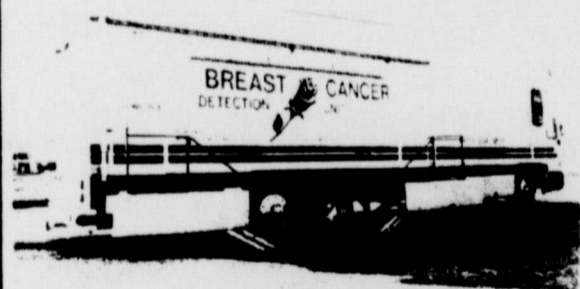

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, even before it can be felt.

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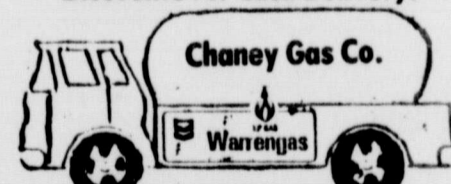

A PENITENTIARY HERE? An Editorial

The usual first response by most of us is "Thanks, but no thanks" when asked if we'd like for a Texas Department of Correction facility to be built in our area.

When we first hear the idea broached, most of us naturally suggest maybe we'd need to think about that a bit.

And that's what a good number of area citizens are doing right now: thinking about the pros and cons.

As most know, a good number visited such a facility recently to see first-hand exactly what might be involved. Most went with an open mind. A lot of questions were asked. Pictures made. Data gathered. And ideas exchanged. At some point soon, these and others will undoubtedly gather to re-discuss and consider the factors involved—and it does get involved.

The immediate "minus" that comes to mind is the fact that we don't want any of our citizens to be in danger.

The big plus is that it could mean a payroll of something like \$1.5 million a MONTH.

The group visited the prison facilities and the downtown authorities, policemen and citizens, and learned quickly that Palestine, which already has four units, will attempt to secure additional units as they are formulated. That fact indicates strongly that the pluses offset the minuses.

It's a hard fact that the state of Texas is going to have to do certain things with its prison system, and the obvious answer is that more will be built. It is currently understood that two more maximum security units and as many as four minimum security units will be built. With the confirmation of units at Amarillo and Snyder, T.D.C. has for the first time in history adopted a policy of spreading them throughout the state.

It should be assumed that once funded and site selection begins, that there will be many locations in the state seeking one or more facility.

It would appear that this area would be ideal for its central location along a major interstate highway, and in proximity to existing and new units.

What about the disadvantages? Is having a T.D.C.

unit in your back yard a bad image? Is there the danger of walk-aways and escapees endangering locals? Does the location of such a facility lead to more or less local crime? These and many others are important questions.

It is generally understood that prisoners would be processed at Huntsville, then brought to outlying facilities to serve their time, and then returned to Huntsville for release. The citizens in Palestine did not feel that the units there was detrimental to their image and were certainly valuable to their local economy. Locals were told that the walk-aways (by trustees, because maximum-security prisoners just don't get away) there quickly leave the area because there are so many official vehicles and uniformed personnel around.

One Palestine policeman guessed that their general crime was lower than normal locally, and that they had not had any noticeable increase in the number of prison-related families coming to town.

What about the local costs for such a facility? Well, it could be expensive but probably not prohibitive. Chances are that upwards of some 300 acres of land might be asked, and of course certain utility facilities would be needed.

There's a lot to think about and if the decision is to pursue, a lot of work to be done.

But now's the time to be looking toward the future.

ROUNDABOUT BANANA NUT CAKE

LeAnn Rabb

1 1/2 cups all-purpose flour
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon baking soda
2 beaten eggs
2 medium bananas, mashed (1/2 cups)

1/2 cup cooking oil
1/4 cup milk
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
1/2 cup miniature semisweet chocolate pieces.
1/2 cup chopped pecans

In a mixing bowl stir together flour, sugar, baking powder, salt, and baking soda. Make a well in the center.

In another bowl combine beaten eggs, mashed bananas, cooking oil, milk, and vanilla. Add at once to the flour mixture, stirring till well mixed.

Stir in chocolate pieces and chopped pecans. Spoon the batter in to a greased and floured 5 1/2 or 6 cup ring mold.

Bake in a 350 degree oven about 35 minutes or till a wooden toothpick inserted between center and edge comes out clean. Cool in ring on a wire rack 10 minutes. Remove; cool completely. Makes 8 to 10 servings.

HOLIDAY WREATH BREAD
Youth Reserve

Grand Champion Natalie Stevens

2 packages or cakes yeast, active dry or compressed
1 1/4 cups warm water
1 1/4 teaspoons salt
1/2 cup sugar
6 1/4 cups unsifted flour
3 tablespoons dry milk solids
3 eggs, beaten
1/2 cup margarine melted and cooled

Sprinkle or crumble Yeast into warm water. Stir until dissolved. Add salt, sugar, 2 cups flour and dry milk. Stir to blend, then beat well. Stir in eggs, the cooled, melted margarine. Beat well, and stir in 4 more cups flour. Reserve the last fourth of a cup of flour for kneading. Sprinkle about 2 tablespoons flour on pastry cloth or board. Turn dough out on flour and knead until smooth and elastic (5 to 7 minutes) adding remaining flour if needed. Put into lightly greased bowl, turning to grease top. Cover and let rise until doubled, about 1 1/2 hours. Punch down. Divide into portions for rolls. Cover and let rise 5 minutes. Shape into wreaths.

CINNAMON MIXTURE:
1 1/2 cup brown sugar, 1/4 cup granulated sugar, 2 teaspoons cinnamon.

Mix these ingredients well. Cover dough that has been generously buttered and press into surface. Sprinkle surface with chopped pecans.

Bake at 375 degrees for 25 minutes or until golden brown. Yield: 4 wreaths.

ITALIAN PECAN CREAM CAKE

Adult Grand Champion Mrs. Hazle Barron

2 cups flour
1/2 cup shortening
5 eggs (separated)
1/2 teaspoon coconut extract

1 can coconut (leave enough for top of cake)

1 cup pecans
2 cups sugar
1/2 stick oleo

1 teaspoon vanilla
1 cup buttermilk
1 teaspoon baking soda

Cream oleo and shortening; add yolks, add flour, soda, pecans alternately with buttermilk. Add vanilla, coconut. Gently fold in the egg whites which has been beaten until stiff.

Bake in layers 350 degrees for 30 minutes or Bundt pan about 1 hour.

CREAM CHEESE ICING:
1 box powdered sugar, 1/2

stick oleo, 1 8 oz. cream cheese, 1 teaspoon vanilla

Mix and spread between layers. You may have to add some milk in order for it to spread well. Add pecans and rest of Coconut to top.

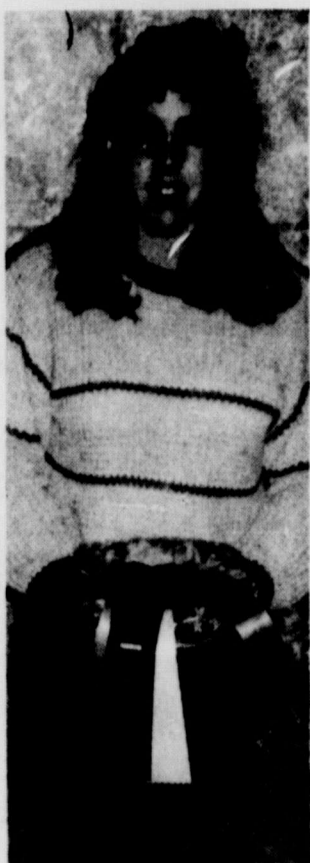

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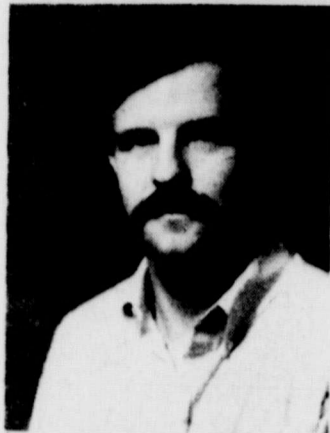
