Commissioners Court To Decide Thursday

During a called meeting of the County Commissioners Monday Sheriff Don Underwood offered to resign his office, effective Friday, Dec. 23 at 5 p.m.

He had two stipulations to the Commissioners: that his employees draw Holiday pay for that day, and that he have vacation pay for one week after his resignation.

Underwood's terms as Sheriff ends Jan. 1, 1989, so this resignation would mean that he left the office only one week early.

The Sheriff said he was going to take it anyway (a vacation for the last week), and may not be here for the inventory of his office.

He indicated that the transition between his term and that of in-coming Sheriff Dec. Hogan might go more smoothly if Hogan had a chance to finish the inventory before the Jan. 1 Holiday. This generally is a time of increased lawbreaking, he reminded the Court.

Sheriff-elect Hogan, who sat near Underwood at the courtroom table, nodded agreement to the plan.

Hicks, a 5-10 point guard, scored 17 of his 31 points in the second half while Ateman contributed 27 points, and 14 rebounds. Brown scored 24 points for the Wranglers, hitting on five of ten 3-point attempts.

Jones staged a dunking exhibition and led all scorers with 45 points. But his supporting cast was not enough to prevent the Wranglers from picking up their sixth consecutive win and improving their record to 8 wins against 7 losses.

The deadlines for the Thursday, December 29, issue of the paper have been changed so the employees may take off Monday to have an extra day with their families.

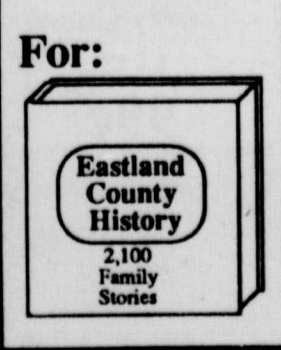
Deadlines will be Tuesday, at 10 a.m., for stories and display ads that will be placed in the Thursday issue. The deadline for classified

Teenage Suicide Rates Have Doubled In Past Ten Years

Teenage suicide rates have more than doubled in Texas over the past decade, making it the third leading cause of death among young people after accidents and homicide, according to the Texas State Teachers Association.

A recent spate of teen suicides in the Dallas, Austin and San Antonio areas has prompted TSTA to publish thousands of informational brochures for Texas parents as well as its 95,000 members. The brochures alert teachers and parents to warning signs exhibited by students who may be contemplating suicide.

TSTA President Charles Beard said three groups of young people pre-disposed to suicide are those with conduct disorders, those with psychopathology, and those undergoing stress.

Beard said youth exhibiting conduct disorders, such as us-

ing drugs or alcohol or running away from home to escape pressures, may be self-destructive.

Youth undergoing stress may appear to be well-adjusted on the surface, but are often in inner turmoil over a perceived crisis in their lives. Many have experienced a deep, personal loss such as that of a parent through death

or divorce and many feel overwhelmed by the pressure in their lives, such as coping with parental conflict, a family breakup, or more. Some feel ineffective in the face of an increasingly complex social environment.

"We have to remember that a teen's relative immaturity and lack of emotional experiences in dealing with harsh realities or failures make him especially vulnerable," Beard said. "It is important that he be taught early in life to cope with both failures and successes."

- 1 package (8 oz.) cream cheese, softened

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News Briefs

CISCO
City Manager Mike Moore says that an initial study of Williamson Dam at Lake Cisco needs to be made soon. Although there is no sign of leaking on the dam, Moore says the City Council needs to address a problem. He says there is concern about the access of going across the top of the dam and going inside the structure. He suggested they close the dam by putting up steel doors on each side of it. He recommends the Council contact Jacob and Martin Construction Co. to present a proposal to the city to make a study to find out the cost. Hopefully this could be done by the second Council meeting in January.

A spokesperson for the Eastland County Economic Development Commission says they will soon offer the Texas Department of Corrections a list of the county's credentials. This will be part of the effort to have Eastland County chosen as the site for a new prison. Dr. Charles Barnes, project manager, says they will officially notify the Texas Department of Corrections of their interest in obtaining a prison. Barnes says they will show the good things about Eastland County, such as the hunting, fishing, lakes and trees. He will tell the TDC about being able to live in an area where you can go out and pick your own pecans and peanuts. Community Support will be the most important factor for an area to be picked for a prison, he says. The facility would hold over 2,000 inmates and employ around 700 people.

The Multipurpose Center at 204 N. Lamar could use some more winter clothing, according to Peggy Roberts, Director. BAIRD
The Baird Chamber of Commerce reports that last year the group spent over \$12,000 on 125 street signs, bought paint for the downtown painting project, paint for the city-owned Depot, and taxes and rent for the Chamber Bingo games. They also donated to the Baird Volunteer Fire Department, gave to the City Park, and contributed to Meals on Wheels. Study Casts New Light On Spike Buck Question

AUSTIN - An ongoing study of mule deer bucks in the Trans-Pecos region of Texas suggests that a high incidence of spike bucks in the yearling age class is normal, and that spikes should not necessarily be considered inferior deer.

Bill Russ of Sanderson, a Texas Parks and Wildlife Department biologist, is in charge of the investigation aimed at determining if mule deer spike bucks are inferior to bucks that have forked antlers during their first year of life. Spike bucks have single antlers with no prongs or forks.

Russ wrote in a report that a majority of buck mule deer yearlings are spikes during their first year. This percentage tends to increase during dry years when range conditions are poor.

The same is true for white-tailed deer spikes, said Horace Gore, white-tailed deer program leader. "Studies on the Kerr Wildlife Management Area have shown that the percentage of spikes taken by hunters may triple or quadruple following lengthy drought."

A total of 324 mule deer were trapped for the West Texas study during the three years from 1986 through 1988, including 102 fawns and yearlings. The animals were marked with ear tags and freeze brands for subsequent identification, and then released at the trap site.

"Of the 39 known-age yearling bucks we marked, 34 have been sighted or re-trapped," said Russ. "A total of 28, or 82 percent, of these bucks were spikes."

On the other hand, 12 of the 18 known-age 2.5-year-old bucks were documented, and only one was a spike. A 3.5-year-old eight-pointer was a spike when trapped as a yearling, Russ said.

"There has been a great deal of misinformation and misinterpretation of information concerning spike bucks," said Bob West, wildlife regional director in San Angelo. "The 'kill all spikes' attitude is now being applied to desert mule deer. The department has never recommended culling spike mule deer."

West believe deer management is a complex situation with virtually no easy answers. "Poor range conditions almost always produce low quality animals with smaller antlers," he said. "Spike bucks have become scapegoats, animals to be blamed for mismanagement of Texas' deer herds. The taking of spikes has never been shown to improve deer quality unless the total herd is managed."

West said the mule deer study is not yet complete, but so far the data indicate that the incidence of spike bucks in mule deer populations reflects weather conditions, and that spike fawns and yearlings have a chance to develop into good-quality, fork-antlered bucks later if range conditions allow.

"Shooting spike bucks is no cure-all for lack of quality," said Gore. "Trophy bucks, whether mile or whitetail, require two things: age and nutrition. If these two requirements are met, everything else naturally falls into place."

AARP Director Alerts Older Consumers

DALLAS - "Older consumers should beware of telephone solicitors and door-to-door salesmen claiming to represent the American Association of Retired Persons (AARP)," reports AARP Texas State Director and chief volunteer, Jim Bergen.

"Project HOOS-GOW" Opens

Even as shepherd and angels sang Christmas carols at church lawn displays, housewives were busy with last minute shopping, and children were eagerly awaiting dismissal for the holidays, "Project HOOS-GOW was born with a bang."

At a recent meeting of the Executive Board, Eastland County Economic Development Council, it was announced by project manager, Dr. C.M. Barnes that the effort by the council to obtain a state prison for the area in 1989 would henceforth be called Project HOOS-GOW. Barnes stated that in order to meet the proposed project deadlines it would be necessary to begin

the work now rather than wait for the first of next year. "It will sort of be like a 4th of July bang in December and a reversal of the sometimes used theme of 'Christmas in July,'" Barnes said.

The words, HOOS-GOW is not Chinese. It is a slang expression used by many Texans and Eastland Countians as a substitute for jail or prison. The term originated as a spurious substitute for the Spanish word "juzgado" meaning a justice process usually ending with a term in jail.

At the same meeting, Dr. Barnes, reported considerable progress in the project since he was appointed manager about 2

weeks ago. The office is now located at 700 Ave. C., P.O. Box 568, and a telephone, 817-442-3413, has been secured.

The First State Bank of Rising Star and Eastland have graciously provided the building for the office and much of the furniture therein. Previously the office was located at Cisco Junior College.

The location of a site for the proposed prison will be of high priority for project HOOS-GOW. A sitting committee will be established at the next meeting of the Council Executive Board, as well as nominations for 1989 officers of the council.

Parents Beware Of Unsafe Toys

Toys are part of the thrill of Christmas for children around the world, and nowhere but in the U.S. is there such variety. This time of year, stores display thousands of toys made for every age group.

But the Texas Department of Health (TDH), in conjunction with the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC), works hard to see that children will not get some toys - the ones found to be dangerous or even life-threatening.

Throughout the year, CPSC and TDH must inspect and test thousands of kinds of toys made in this country as well as overseas. And each year, they find some toys that contain hazardous materials such as lead paint.

Other toys are poorly designed, with small parts that can be detached or broken from the larger toy and swallowed by young children. Brittle plastic and sharp metal in other toys,

and inappropriate labeling for the intended age group, add to the possibility that a child may be hurt or killed.

In 1987, some 647,000 children less than 15 years old were injured by hazardous or defective toys in the U.S. And 30 of them died. This year, with some reports not yet complete, another seven fatalities occurred between January and September.

So far in 1988, nearly 150 different toys have been found to be unsafe, and their manufacturers were ordered to recall them.

Forrest Burnham, chief of the TDH Hazardous Substances Branch, said, "The majority of toys recalled as safety hazards each year are important."

American manufacturers adhere more closely to safety regulations than some overseas toy makers. Some foreign manufacturers are known for making toys that have had to be recalled, and

the U.S. Customs Service has begun alerting CPSC to the arrival of those products.

Burnham said, "CPSC used to release a yearly list of all toys that had been recalled, but that led parents to believe that all toys on the list were safe. The truth is that there is only so much the regulatory agencies can do to ensure that toys are safe for the kids who get them. The bulk of the responsibility will always lie with the adults who buy the toys."

Burnham stressed that adults should check any toy for defective material, detachable parts, and age appropriateness. "Plain common sense on the part of a parent often can prevent tragedy," he said.

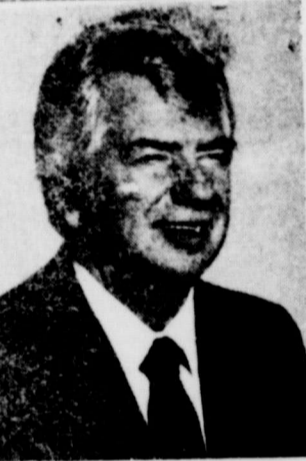

buying more land from Texas farms and ranches, says Dr. Wayne Hayenga, economist and attorney with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. Even if there is not a "best way," maybe we can

keep people from making mistakes that were common in the past.

Discussions will center on economies of scale, projecting cash flows, financing alternatives and tax planning.

Farm purchase agreements include many clauses, notes Hayenga, and many of these will be discussed at the seminar. Benefits and restrictions to both sellers and buyers will be addressed.

One major consideration is projecting income from both the existing operation and the additional land. Dr. Ken Stokes, Extension Economist from Dallas will discuss this topic.

Financing alternatives will be covered. Price and interest trade-offs will be calculated with a look at the tax situation of both the buyer and seller.

Ways to take title to the new farm to save both income and estate taxes will be the highlight of the afternoon program.

This is the first time Extension is hosting this program.

As many of Texas farmers and ranchers are thinking about selling land because of the current financial situation, others will want to buy the land. We hope to help buyers buy the land "right."

Should I remove the leaves from my lawn? I've heard that question several times lately. I think most people hope the answer is "no." They reason that the thick coat of tree leaves will protect the grass from freezing temperatures and that is right. However, the lawn specialists say the tree leaves keeps moisture on the grass and promotes all the fungus diseases which will do more damage than the freeze.

It is much better to rake the leaves, decompose them and

use them later as a source of organic material for gardens and flower beds. The leaves can be decomposed in a compost pile or an easier approach is to compost them by simply putting wet leaves in sealed plastic leaf bags for eight to nine months, at which time they will have decomposed adequately to be worked into the soil. It is important that the leaves be wet, otherwise they will not decompose.

Placing the bags in a shaded location is also important, otherwise the direct sunlight can decompose the bags, thus allowing the leaves to dry out.

Organic matter should be added to the garden soil every year in Texas since organic matter decomposes more rapidly in our warm climate than in the cooler northern areas of the country.

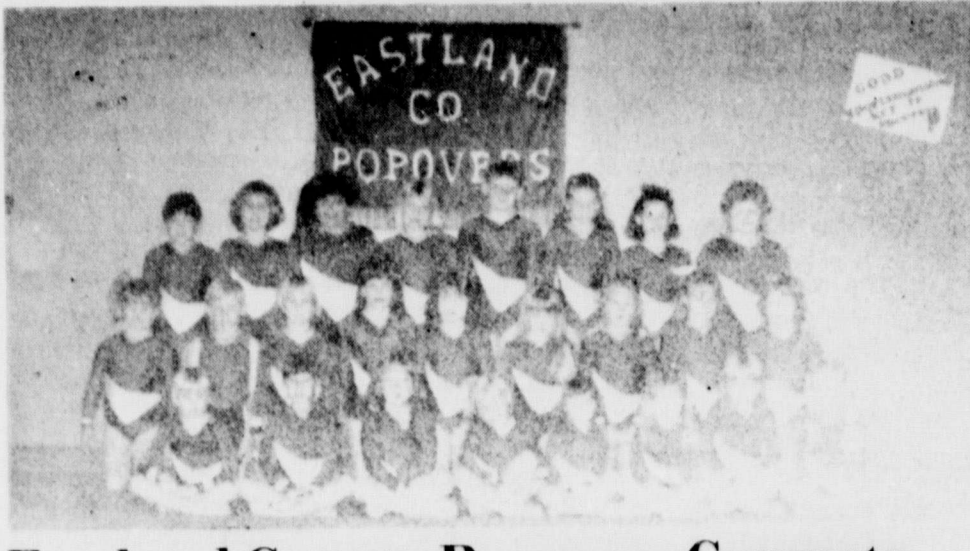

ASCS News

1989 WHEAT FEED GRAIN AND COTTON
 The sign-up period for the 1989 wheat, feed grain, and cotton programs will begin December 19, 1988 and end April 14, 1989. Also producers may declare their intentions to plant 10% to 25% of each program crop permitted acreage to soybeans or sunflowers during the sign-up period of December 19 through February 3.

Another change for 1989 allows producers to exchange any of the farm's acreage base (FAB) for oats. This exchange will not result in any increase in the acreage base and any program benefits will be those

normally applicable to oats. Advance payments may be requested on 40% of the estimated wheat and feed grain deficiency payments. 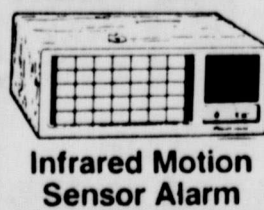

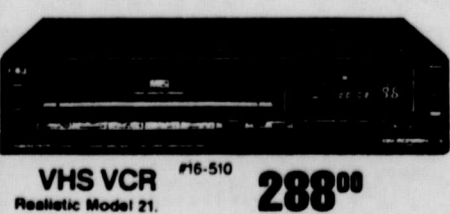

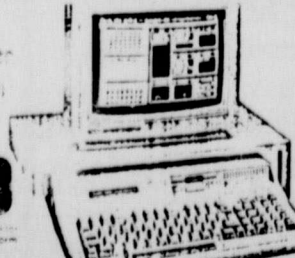

Delinquent Taxes Discussed

By County Commissioners

Delinquent taxes was an agenda item at the County Commissioners called meeting Monday. The Commissioners questioned why so many delinquent tax notices are going out now, some of them for taxes allegedly owed for as long as 15 years.

Commissioners Billy Bacon, L.T. Owen and Norman Christian told of people in their Precincts receiving this type of billing. Some of them also thought they were being double-billed, or were getting incorrect notices.

Sheriff Underwood reported personnel from his office was "being blamed" for part of this, since they were serving some of the notices.

One Commissioner asked why the County Tax Assessor's office hadn't been mailing out delinquent notices a long time ago. County Judge Scott Bailey mentioned that the firm of Pritchard and Abbott had been requested to bring delinquent notices up to date, but they had not done so.

The Judge also said that the Austin firm of McCreary, Valeska, Beck and Allen had been employed to collect delinquent taxes, "because a law firm letter has more impact."

Cindy Guerra, an employee of this firm, was in the Courtroom. She has been doing tax research in the county, and discussed some aspects of this with the Court.

Several of the Commissioners said citizens had told them that certain banks and real estate firms had not informed them during property transactions of delinquent taxes on the property. The commissioners had also heard of incidents where money was turned over to a bank or bank's attorney to pay taxes on property, yet no receipts for this can be found in the tax office. So now the land-owner is being billed for taxes he assumed were paid.

County Clerk Joann Johnson said: "Few people know, when buying or selling property that it is their responsibility to see if taxes are rendered in or out of their name."

Cindy Guerra said that delinquent taxes follow property no matter whom they are assessed against. When asked, she agreed there was a 20 yr. limitation on how far back delinquent taxes could be collected.

Willie Maude Hughes of Pct. 1 was in the Courtroom on a tax matter. She stated that she had overpaid on taxes for two years, due to her exemption being listed wrong. Now she was being billed for 1980-81 delinquent taxes on other property since inherited from her mother. She was not certain whether a receipt existed on this.

It was suggested that she see Steve Thomas, head of the Tax Appraisal office to find out more about her tax notices.

At the end of the discussion the Commissioners passed a resolution requesting that delinquent tax notices be mailed with all current tax statements.

In other matters, Billy Bacon reported that 22 prisoners were currently in the county jail, but some were expected to make bond soon.

L.T. Owen was sworn in by Judge Bailey for another term as County Commissioner of Pct. 3.

Another meeting was set for 9 a.m. on Thursday, Dec. 22.

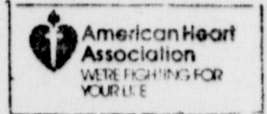

The paper was full of local, national and world wide news, including the war in Europe.

Some of the local news was about John B. Ledbetter enlisting in the Army, and about the home of Edwin Posey catching fire.

The Man's Store was owned by Nick Miller and had a sale on women's slips.

C.P. Mitcham was running for mayor and H.C. Henderson, W.R. Winston, Neil Lane, and George Boyd were running for city commissioner.

B.A. Butler was the editor and publisher.

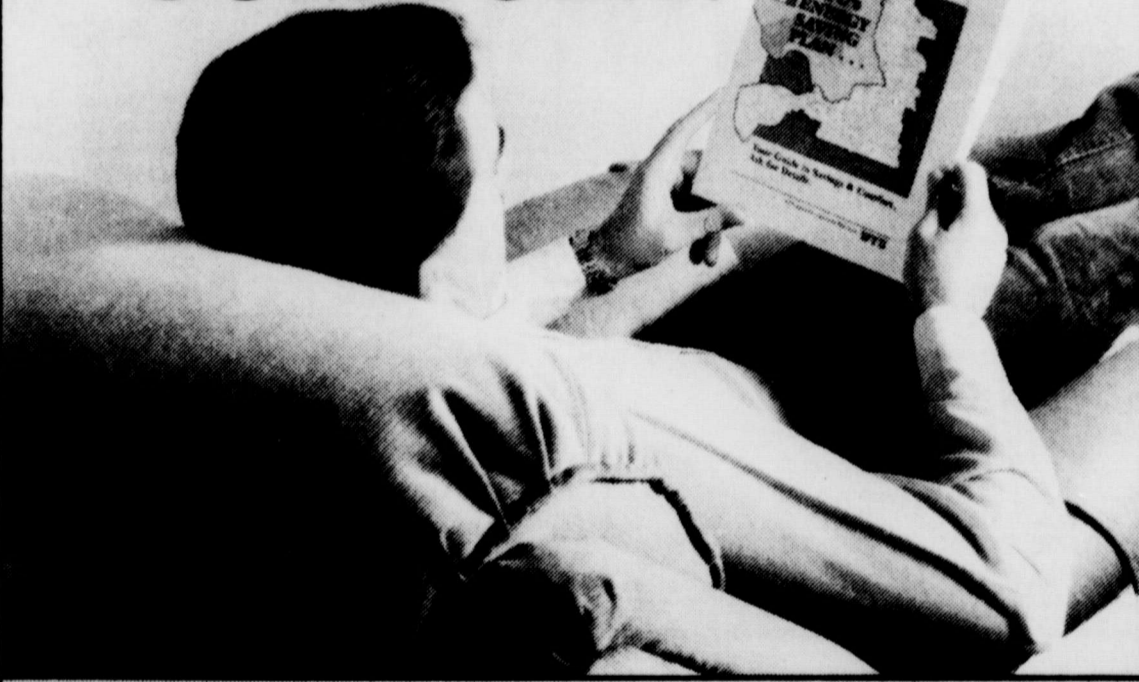
