Stories In 1988 Highlighted

During the year of 1988, the cities in Eastland County decided to work together and try to get new industries into this area, downtown Cisco had a major clean-up campaign and death and arson plagued this area. What else happened during the first six months of 1988?

In January, 1988, the headlines in The Cisco Press were:

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department stocks Lake Cisco with Brood Fish; pictures of Emma Lee Donovan's retirement party at First National Bank, were in the paper; Dee Hogan announces his candidacy for Eastland County Sheriff; Loyal Lundstrom is denied a rehearing which involved the slaying of his wife Doris, in 1983; CJC Bible Chair offers free Bible course; the contract for Ray Saunders, CISD superintendent, is extended 2 years;

Cisco Girl Scouts began their annual cookie sales; Cisco Pump was burglarized; Cisco Baptist Association is given a house to be used for as a new office; Cisco Firemen had put out 11 fires since the beginning of January; Chanda Pittman, 9-year old Cisco girl, was killed in an car accident; First Baptist Church invests \$350,000 in Texas Baptist Church Loan Corporation Bonds to help start 2,000 new churches by 1990; more than 200 people attend the Chamber of Commerce banquet and several awards were given out.

Cisco Cemetery Association donates Ditch Witch Digger to City of Cisco; More than 100 animals are shown at Cisco Livestock Show; Country Classic Hair Salon is new business in Cisco; Jim Hatcher gives talk to Chamber of Commerce quarterly breakfast; Cisco firemen help with Olden grass fire; Cisco Ministerial Alliance sponsors five holy week services; Jason Phillips and Jill Reynolds were named Cisco Rotary Club Citizenship Award winners, Bob Glasgow speaks at meeting; annual clean-up campaign set for March 28-April 1; Cisco Lions Club Pancake Supper held; Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Sitton celebrate 50th wedding anniversary; E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital offers new program for patients called CARE; and Cisco firemen had to fight more grass fires.

Bobby Smith is hired as CJC business manager; many students receive awards at Cisco Junior High banquet; man returns to Cisco to find location of accident that happened to him in 1939; City of Cisco passes ordinance saying that Oakwood Cemetery is closed down during night hours; Redeemer Lutheran Church donates \$1,233.12 to Cisco Volunteer Fire Department; Cisco Service Club awards Tina Carr the Sue Witzsche scholarship; Baccalaureate service is held for Cisco High School seniors; Cisco High School offers summer school program; Krista Shepard is named Valedictorian for CHS in 1988; Christy Smith is named Salutatorian for CHS class in 1988; graduation exercises for Cisco High School were held May 27; funeral services for Jerry Sitton, past editor and publisher for The Cisco Press, were held; and 76 students graduate from Cisco Elementary School 6th grade.

Bill Harris Sworn In As Constable

In Pct. 1 At Commissioner Meeting

Eastland County Commissioners held their last meeting of 1988 on Tuesday, Dec. 27.

All Commissioners were present, with Judge Scott Bailey presiding. Also present for some proceedings were County Sheriff Dee Hogan, District Attorney Emory Walton, and Mr. and Mrs. Bill Harris.

One of the first items of business was to swear in Bill Harris as Constable of Pct. 1, filling the position held by Bill Hunter. The oath of office was administered by County Clerk Joann Johnson.

Judge Bailey gave an account of several Pct. 1 Constables he had known. He told that Bill Hunter was appointed in June, 1970, and served until this year. The Judge displayed a Certificate of Appreciation he had signed for Hunter, listing his "valuable service."

The Commissioners gave a unanimous vote of appreciation to Hunter, and also signed the certificate.

Bill Harris said he wanted to thank all the citizens who supported him for the Constable position, and he would devote full time to the job.

The changeover in Administration of the Sheriff's Department and Jail also occupied the Commissioners.

Billy Bacon, Commissioner of Pct. 4, reported that 21 prisoners were currently being held in the Jail. He told of conditions at the facility when Dee Hogan was sworn in as Sheriff on Dec. 23.

"Things have been cleaned up in the Jail and it is looking good," Bacon said. "One thing I really appreciate when I was over there, Hogan invited me: 'Come on back and look at the Jail.'"

"This is the first time I've ever been invited to do that!"

County Judge Scott Bailey said he also wanted to express appreciation to Sheriff Hogan and to District Attorney Emory Walton for their efforts in getting cases moved to trial.

He pledged his full cooperation in this, and said he would be available day or night to assist.

Sheriff Hogan invited members of the Court to tour the Jail. He said that he and the employees were working through any problems. He mentioned his concern because there was no inventory in the Jail of any of the physical evidence being held.

He also said there was a lot of unclaimed merchandise on the premises. He requested that the Commissioners dep-

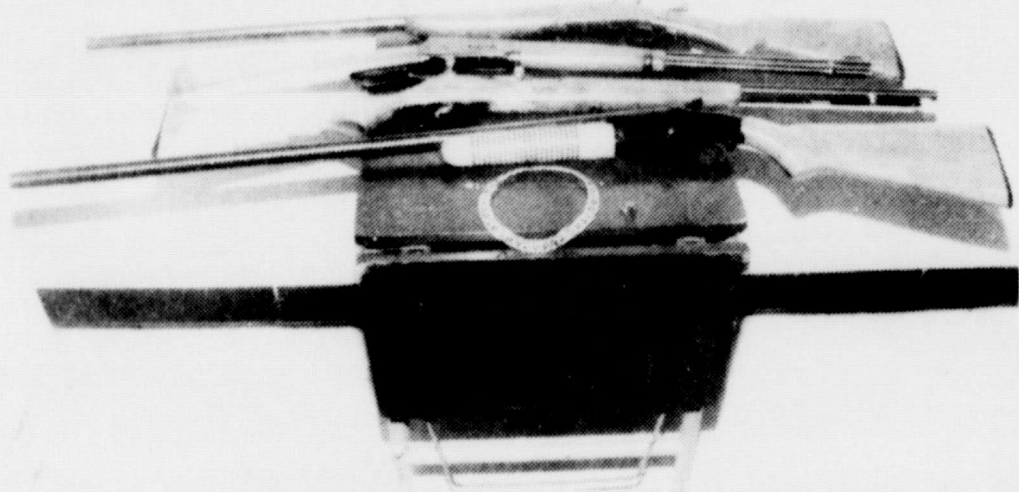

Deputy Gets Quick Results

Four long guns and some jewelry were reported stolen by Opal King after her Ranger home was entered through a window.

By Thursday night, only 24 hours later, Deputy Sheriff Ben Sancillo had recovered the guns and part of the jewelry.

The investigation is continuing.

In other cases, two men have been placed in the county jail.

Huree Marsh was arrested by the Cisco Police Dept. and brought before Judge Guy Lyerika where bond was set at \$50,000 and he waived extradition to California. He

was to be transported Friday to the King County Sheriff in Hanford, California, where he was wanted for rape of a minor and other offenses.

An Eastland County deputy sheriff picked up Ricky Eugene Roland from authorities in Memphis, Texas who were holding him. His probation had been revoked by order of the 91st District Court.

Also reported to the Sheriff's Dept. was the forced entry of a mobile home on Hwy. 3101.

Another forced entry of a mobile home was reported at Lake Leon. The home was ransacked and a TV, a VCR,

a battery charger, a tackle box of fishing tackle, some fishing reels, a paint sprayer, and other items were taken.

The Sheriff's Dept. and Sheriff Dee Hogan are investigating these break-ins and burglaries.

Body Composition Analysis January 11

A Body Composition Analysis will be offered to the public at Eastland Memorial Hospital on Wednesday, Jan. 11 from 11 a.m. to 6 p.m.

The simple three-to-five minute test will be made by a computerized body composition analyzer. It will give eight quantifications of human composition with scientific accuracy. The system will be operated by a technician from TransAmerican

Diagnostic Services of Odessa, Tex.

Sponsored by the Eastland Civic League, the health improvement program will be held on a walk-in basis. The cost will be \$25 per person for the analysis, with a percentage of the fee to be contributed to the Civic League.

Each person who takes the test will be given a personalized analysis for their percentage of body fat/lean

muscle tissue, basal metabolic rate, total body water, weight loss recommendation and a weight loss program, daily nutrition plan, weight loss chart, a weekly exercise plan to fit their lifestyle, and a caloric burn exercise chart.

This print-out may be taken home for review, and can be utilized as notes for the individual's physician and/or

dietician to discuss nutrition and exercise plans for each patient.

This health-improvement program has been used a lot in the past for serious athletes, because of excessive demands put on the body. But the program is also important to the general public, says Mrs. Frank (Millie) Sayre, Eastland Civic League President.

"Each person's body composition varies, so I feel this personalized analysis is of benefit to each of us," she says.

Marcia Carr, Administrator of Eastland Memorial Hospital, notes that the analysis can be of special benefit to persons with past heart attacks or surgery who are going through a cardiac rehabilitation.

It also gives much information on kidneys or thyroid problems, and of course special data for those attempting a weight loss program.

As Mrs. Carr says, the Body Composition Analysis offers a tool for helping to stay well. So the Civic League hopes all will avail themselves of this valuable service.

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Cong. Stenholm Receives \$34,500 In Honoraria

U.S. Rep. Charles Stenholm (D-Stamford) ranked only behind House Speaker Jim Wright (D-Fort Worth) and Rep. Marvin Leath (D-Marlin) in the amount of honoraria received during 1987, financial disclosure forms reveal.

Stenholm, who represents the 17th Congressional District, which includes Eastland County, reported receiving \$34,500 during the year for speaking engagements and other activities. That is \$7,650 above the amount House members are allowed to supplement their \$89,500 annual salary in honoraria, but Rep. Stenholm met House rules by giving away \$11,970 to charity.

On an average, Texas congressmen and senators received \$15,653 during 1987 from businesses, trade associations and other interest groups. House Speaker Wright received \$45,850 in honoraria to lead the Texas delegation, while Rep. Leath was second with \$36,000. In comparison Sen. Phil Gramm reported \$28,865 and Sen. Lloyd Bentsen nothing. Sen. Bentsen, Rep. Steve Bartlett (R-Dallas) and Rep. Ralph Hall (D-Rockwall) do not accept honoraria. Two other representatives, Lamar Smith (R-San Antonio) and Ron Coleman (D-El Paso) have refused such gifts in 1988. Smith did not report any honoraria in 1987 and Coleman only \$7,000.

Such donations go directly to the lawmakers, not their political races. In 1987 a total of \$9.8 million was reported by members of Congress.

House members can supplement their \$89,500 annual salary with up to \$26,850 in honoraria, while senators, who earn the same amount up to \$35,800. Anything more than that is usually given to charity.

Most of the lawmakers also picked up expense money. Rep. Jack Brooks (D-Beaumont), for instance, took an all-expense paid trip to the People's Republic of China, Association for International Understanding.

Rep. Brooks took his son, Jeff Brooks with him on the trip.

Such gifts have come to the forefront after the presidential advisory commission called for increasing congressional pay by \$45,500 per year, to \$135,000. Recommendations from the Commission on Executive, Legislative and Judicial Salaries were sent to President Reagan and he is expected to pass the recommendations along to Congress on Jan. 9. The increase will take effect automatically unless lawmakers reject them within 30 days.

Speaker Wright, discussing a proposal honoraria ban, has already said the honorariums will be abolished if the pay raises are granted. He also said the honoraria ban would not be considered by the House until Congress gets its pay raise.

Rep. Dick Armye (R-Copper Canyon), who himself collected \$14,740 in 1987, recently said, "There's no doubt in my mind that something has to be done about honoraria. The abuses are getting to be scandalous."

Fred Wertheimer, president of Common Cause, put it more bluntly. He said, "The term 'honoraria' has become one of Washington's most striking misnomers—there is no 'honor' involved on either end of the bargain when money is used by special interests to obtain political access and influence."

Most Texas who serve in Congress privately say that congressmen need pay increases. The cost of living in Washington, D.C. not only is high, but many congressmen have to pay twice so that they can maintain a home in their own districts. No one disputes the fact that congressional pay has fallen below the inflation rate, but many criticize the big increase in pay in one year, especially those in oil producing states which have seen the rest of the nation prosper while oil producing states have been in a sharp recession.

decided on whether to sell or otherwise dispose of the things.

In other matters, Walter B. Neaves, Area Resident Manager of the State Highway

Department, brought a final summary on County Road mileage. The survey showed that Pct. 1 had 112.1 miles, Pct. 2, 144.0 miles, Pct. 3, 3,293.7 miles, and Pct. 4, 4,144.2 miles.

Neaves said this showed about 40 miles less than the last survey, made about 10 years ago. There are two new stretches of Farm-to-Market roads in the County, and these are maintained by the State. There have also been some short County roads eliminated.

The Commissioners voted to endorse and support the survey made by Neaves. They also voted to adjust the percentage of Road and Bridge Revenue and Expenditures according to mileage shown by him. (This was with the provision that none of the Pct. funds would fall below that set out in the Oct. 1 budget.)

On other business, the Commissioners voted to appoint Attorney Saul Pullman as a Replacement Member to the Central Texas Mental Health/Mental Retardation Board. Pullman will fill the position occupied by Colonel D.A. Jones of Ranger.

Also approved during the meeting was a request by Giant Energy Corp. to cross County Road 130 in Pct. 4 with a pipeline.

The business session ended about noon, and the Commissioners toured the Jail during the afternoon.

The next regular meeting will be on Monday, Jan. 9.

TDA Predator Management Training Program To Be Held Jan. 5

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Sheep and Goat Committees from Brown, Mills and San Saba counties are sponsoring a Predator Management Training Program to be held at 9:00 a.m. on Thursday, January 5, at the Texas Utility Electric Co. meeting room, 802 Fisk Ave., in Brownwood.

The session will include instruction on proper identification of causes of predation, alternate methods of predator control, M-44 sodium cyanide applicator certification and Livestock Protection Collar applicator training.

To continue use of M-44 sodium cyanide after November 1, 1988, all applicators certified before April 18, 1988, just take this course and be recertified. The training leading to M-44 sodium cyanide certification is free and will be concluded at noon. However, to receive M-44 certification, applicators must also acquire a private applicator license, a non-commercial applicator license or commercial applicator license as required to purchase state limited use pesticides.

Those individuals wanting Livestock Protection Collar certification must attend the

entire session which will take approximately six hours. The Compound 1080 Livestock Protection Collar which may be used on sheep and goats to kill coyotes is also a state limited use pesticide. In order to obtain a non-commercial applicator license to use the collar, a person must complete the training, score 70 or above on the prescribed test and obtain a license.

A \$20 testing fee must be collected before a person may take a test. Two opportunities to pass the test are allowed without retraining. The annual license fee is \$50 for a non-commercial applicator license. For a commercial applicator license, a person must complete the training, pass

the test, provide proof of financial responsibility and pay an annual license fee of \$150.

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service is assisting TDA in training sessions. The Extension Service also has for sale at \$5.00 per copy of publication entitled Procedure for Evaluating Predation on Livestock and Wildlife. 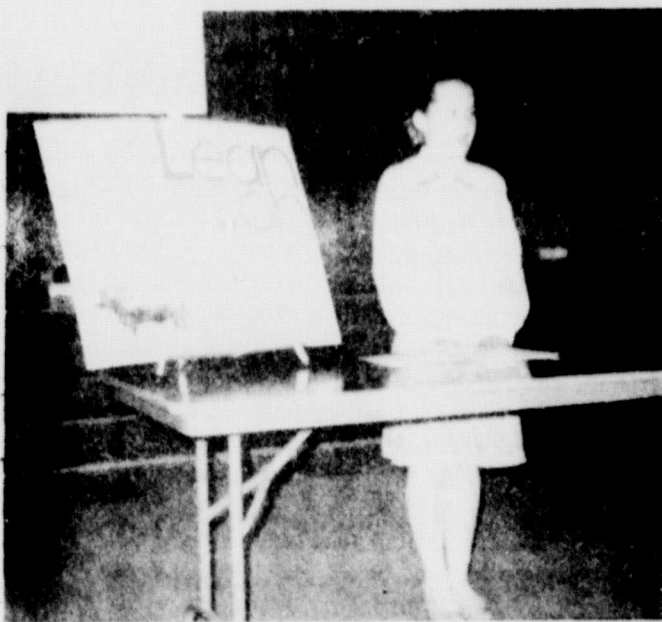

False teeth of the future are likely to be "implanted" into the jaw bone, says a federal panel convened by the National Institutes of Health. New techniques fool the natural bone to receive the implant like a bone fragment.

Eating fish containing omega-3 fish oils may help fight the symptoms of psoriasis, say doctors in Sheffield, England. In a double-blind study, those who got fish oil showed marked improvement.

The same sort of high-energy sound waves that are being used to crush kidney stones are being tested now on gallstones. Researchers in Munich, Germany, report favorable results.

The cholesterol level of youngsters should be checked at age 5, and again at 12, says a report in the journal, Postgraduate Medicine. At puberty, the level may rise toward that of adults.

New treatment for warts is a skin patch containing a strong salicylic acid solution. It's supposed to make warts disappear within two to four weeks.

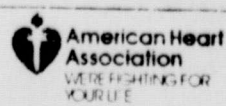

Shredded Christmas Trees Benefit Texas Cities

Christmas tree recycling projects in at least three Texas cities this season allowed citizens to dispose of trees after the holidays and provide environmental improvement. Although this information is too late to do any good this year, it might be of interest to citizens of Cisco and Eastland County in Christmas seasons yet to come.

Dr. Michael J. Walterscheid, forester with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, said the trees are chipped and used in landscaping projects at local parks throughout the year. "The project saves a tremendous amount of landfill space," Walterscheid said.

He said the first Texas project originated in Austin, and successful efforts there en-

couraged San Antonio and Bryan/College Station to launch programs also.

Eric Ploeger, forester with the College Station Parks and Recreation Department said the Bryan/College Station project is sponsored by a group of local organizations. "The 4-H Equestrian Club will do most of the volunteer work at the two collection sites," he said. "4-H members will collect trees and make sure that no ornaments are left that might damage shredder equipment."

Ploeger said Blume Tree Service is donating work crews and equipment to shred trees.

There is an eight-to-one ratio on the amount of space saved by recycling Christmas trees," Ploeger said. "One regular tree occupies the same amount of landfill space that eight of the shredded trees used for landscaping would occupy."

About 10,000 trees were collected in San Antonio last year, said Mark Peterson, forester with the Texas Forest Service. "The response to the project was tremendous and we received many more trees than expected," he said.

"The project was a family oriented activity," Peterson continued. "Kids brought trees in on little red wagons, and some went around neighborhoods and gathered trees to bring in."

San Antonio expanded the number of collection sites to accommodate the expected increase in trees this year, Peterson added.

He said that civic organizations selling Christmas trees are planning to get involved in the project by donating remaining trees and also by sponsoring neighborhood pickup crews to collect trees around town. "A primary goal of the San Antonio recycling project was to encourage people to participate in an environmental awareness program," Peterson said.

The shredded trees went to city parks for use in soil stabilization and as mulch for flowerbeds, according to Peterson.

Walterscheid said the cities of Bryan and College Station donated oak tree seedlings for everyone bringing in trees. The seedlings will serve as a beautification project for the area, he said.

"We're hoping that this project will catch on nationwide because it would save considerable landfill space, as well as giving people a place to dispose of trees," Walterscheid concluded.

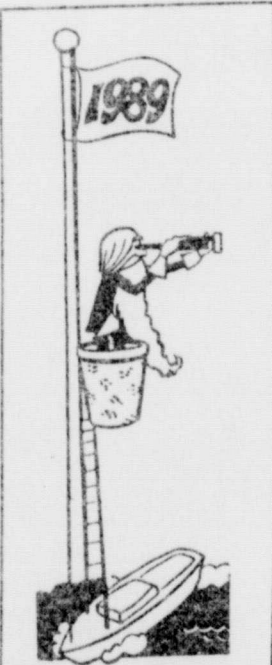

About 900 Deer Dressed Locally

The three area deer processors, Rust Deer Plant, Grandpaw's Smokehouse and Ranger Meat, report that the deer being brought in by hunters this year are in very good shape. And since hunters are allowed to kill both does and bucks this year, both are being brought in.

Rust Deer Plant, on Hwy. 80 between Cisco and Eastland, reports an outstanding year with real good hunting for their customers. They have processed more than 400 deer, all in real good shape, about 30 wild hogs, and 10 or 12 wild turkeys. The turkey kill is down this year.

Grandpaw's Smokehouse, on the county road south of the spur 490 overpass, has processed well over 300 deer, and they continue to come in at a steady rate. About one

third of the deer are does and all are in good condition, they report. Just a few wild turkeys and hogs have been brought in.

Ranger Meat Co., on Hwy. 80 West in Ranger, has processed about 150 deer, and they were in good shape. Hunting was good the first week for their customers, but they are having more trouble finding the deer lately.

Deer are reportedly plentiful in some spots and hard to find in others, so hunters are having to locate the herds.

Hunters from all over the state have been hunting, and spending money, in Eastland County, and helping the local economy. And the hunters are appreciate and welcomed by Countians in general and the deer processors in particular.

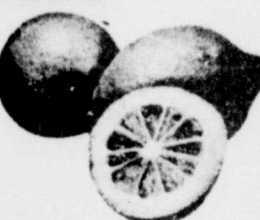
