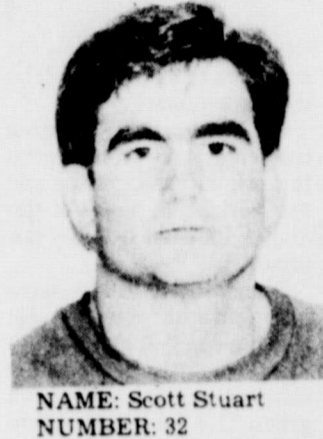

TRAITS OF A HEALTHY FAMILY:

- As 1989 begins...now is a good time to make resolutions for the New Year. One of the most important is to better your family life and be a more understanding, supportive parent.
- The healthy family —
 - communicates and listens
 - affirms and supports one another
 - teaches respect for others
 - develops a sense of trust
 - has a sense of play and humor
 - exhibits a sense of shared responsibility
 - teaches a sense of right and wrong
 - has a strong sense of family in which rituals and traditions abound
 - has a balance of interaction among members
 - has a shared religious core
 - respects the privacy of one another
 - values services to others
 - fosters table time and conversation at family meals
 - shares leisure time
 - admits to and seeks help with problems
- Each one of these traits certainly lends itself to some serious thinking of how we can be a stronger family unit.
- Strengthening Texas families is a major focus issue of the Texas Agricultural Ex-

tension Service. The Eastland County Extension Service will be providing programs on parenting and "managing home and work responsibilities" for families during 1989. OATS AND CHOLESTEROL:

Research continues to indicate that oats can help some people on a low fat diet to reduce elevated cholesterol levels. Studies by Dr. J.R. Lupton, Dept. of Animal Science of Texas A&M University and others show that consumption of 2 ounces of oats (about 2/3 cup of dry oats) per day can be effective. Beta glucan is a gum and is the chemical fraction of the soluble oat fiber that reduces blood cholesterol. More of the glucan is found in the pericarp or outer covering of the oat and endosperm cell walls.

Oat products are made by first removing the oat hull to reach the edible kernel called a "groat". The groats are then processed by being steam

rolled, flash dried, ground or cut and flaked.

Oat bran is the finely ground outer covering or layer of the groat plus pieces of the endosperm obtained during rolling.

Oat flour contains more fiber and beta glucan. Rolled oats or old fashioned oats are made by steam rolling whole groats. Quick cooking oats are obtained by cutting the steamed and flaked groats into pieces. Instant oats are cut into much finer pieces and flaked. Oat flour may be the finest piece or finely ground groats. No more than 15-20 percent of oat flour should be substituted for wheat flour in recipes since, like cornmeal, it does not contain any gluten.

Oat contain high levels of complex carbohydrates and protein but are lysine deficient. Therefore they can become a "complete" protein when consumed with milk or meat group foods or complementary protein such as legumes. The small amount of fat in oats is polyunsaturated.

Remember! Grandmas knew what she was talking about when she said, "eat all of your oatmeal".

RECIPE FOR THE WEEK:

If you put on a few pounds over the Christmas holidays you might like to clip this

recipe and prepare it for a delicious pizza meal which is low in fat and calories. Also this is a pat-in - in - pan dough which has built-in convenience — no yeast and no rising.

GARDEN PIZZA

- 1 1/4 cups all-purpose flour
 - 1/4 cup Ground Oat Flour
 - 1 teaspoon baking powder
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - 2/3 cup skim milk
 - 1/4 cup vegetable oil
 - 2 cups sliced mushrooms
 - 1/2 cups shredded carrots
 - 1 cup thinly sliced zucchini
 - 1/2 cup chopped onion
 - 2 tablespoons soft vegetable oil margarine
 - 1 (8 oz.) can pizza sauce
 - 2 cups (8 oz.) shredded part-skim mozzarella cheese
 - 1/2 teaspoons Italian seasoning
- Heat oven to 425 degrees. Spray 14 inch round pizza pan with vegetable oil cooking spray or oil lightly. Combine the flour, oat flour, baking powder and salt. Add milk and oil; stir with spoon until mixture forms a ball. Knead dough on lightly floured surface about 10 times. With greased fingers, press dough into prepared pan; shape edge to form rim. Bake about 15 minutes.

Saute mushroom, carrots, zucchini and onion in margarine over medium heat about 3 minutes. Spoon pizza sauce over partially baked crust, spreading evenly to edge; top with sauted vegetables. Sprinkle with cheese and Ital-

ian seasoning. Continue baking about 15 minutes until cheese is melted.

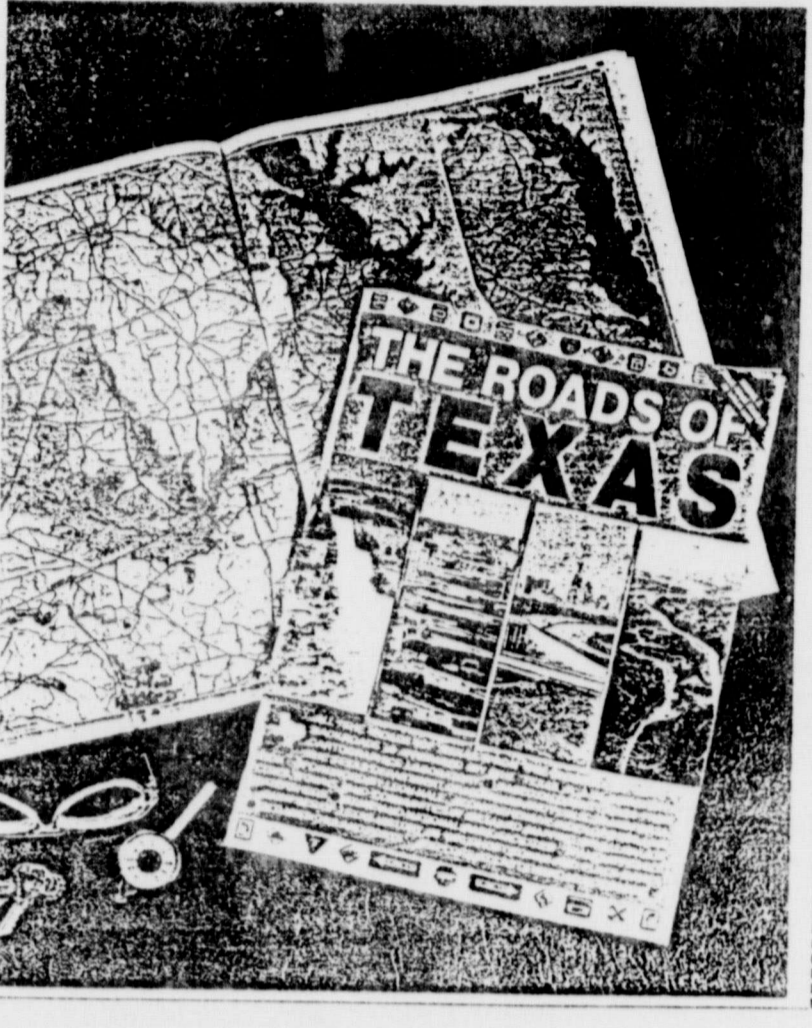

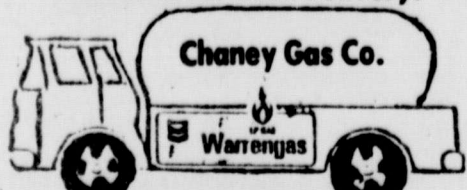

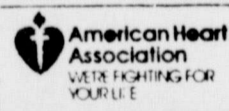

FINANCIAL FOCUS

By Robert Steed

Regardless of what security we select, it should meet our goals.

One of the basic tenets of investing is that it should not be done on impulse. Know what you want before you buy. The, determine if your selection will do for you what you want—in short, if it will meet your needs.

If, for example, you want your investment to give you income, then you must expect your choice to provide suitable dividends (stocks or equity investments provide dividends) or interest (bonds or debt securities produce interest) to meet your needs. In addition, you must be reasonable convinced that this income will be paid to you regularly and on time.

Whether or not you get your income will depend on the ability of that particular corporation to meet its obligations. It is also generally true that the higher your yield or return, the more risk you assume.

A U.S. government-guaranteed bond probably will not provide as much income as an unsecured note of some small corporation. On the other hand, the government bond will afford you more safety and peace of mind. So, if you're aiming for maximum income on your investment, chances are you're going to have to sacrifice a bit of safety. To put it another way, "There's no such thing as a free lunch."

If, on the other hand, income is secondary and you're after capital appreciation, then you probably should invest in securities you think you may sell for more than you paid for them.

One thing you can be cer-

tain of, however, is that no stock or bond can simultaneously offer you minimum risk, attractive income and tremendous growth potential. If a security features one of these attributes, the others will be secondary or practically non-

existent. At certain times, however, it may be possible to obtain securities which potentially offer some modest combination of these features over a period of time.

INVESTMENT TERM OF THE WEEK

Bond - Basically an IOU or promissory note of a corporation, usually issued in multiples of \$1,000 or \$5,000. In every case, a bond represents debt — a bondholder is a creditor of the corporation. In most cases, bonds are secured by a mortgage.

Fishing Outdoors

By Terry L. Wilson

"Hawg Hunting"

January marks new beginning for a lot of things. The one anglers recognize most readily is the "Great American Hawg Hunt." And we're not talking pork here folks. January marks the beginning of about 4 months of intense fishing for that wall hanging trophy largemouth. Many of you may be saying January is too early. Not so even as you read this those sows are putting on the feed bag, gaining weight in anticipation of the spawning ritual.

Weather of course dictates just when these hawks can be caught and for how long. Mild winters such as we are experiencing allows for conditions to ripen earlier. Water temperatures warm soon, set the biological clocks in motion.

Last years fishing can give you some ideas to start on for locating these early catches. Remember that bank last year where you caught 2 or 3 egg laden fish? This area was holding spawners last year and by all rights should again this year. For January and February trips try these spots, only fish a little deeper and of course very slow. Perhaps you heard other anglers commenting about areas that each year holds spawners. Frequent these areas, again start deep, the first break and work your way in to the shallows. The larger fish don't always spawn deeper, but wouldn't it be sad to pass them over if they were out.

Another excellent area to start looking for these early fish are north banks and north east banks. These areas receive the most sunlight at this time thus warming the water the fastest. To refine this more look for areas with rocks. These rocks could be deep or shallow depending on water clarity. Stained water will not allow for easy light penetration where as clear water will. However stained water will

retain heat longer than clear water due to its heat absorption capability. Thus in clear water after only a few days of sunlight moderate depths around rocks may produce. Where in stained water heated for the same time, hallow rocks are preferred. A good example of this was last weekend on Leon. Anglers found bass in the Chock-O-Block region which was stained to be holding 3 foot or less. While the fish located in the make lake area of cleaner water the fish were found in 4-8 feet of water. To help refine your hunt even further look for the calmest water you can find. Calm flat water whether clear or stained will absorb heat more readily than choppy water. Allowing a more direct penetration. Also bass seek the calmer water at this time to build their nest where less wave action won't be causing silt and sand to fill their nest or cover eggs which have been laid. Thus dooming them before they have a chance.

So what we're looking for is a calm rocky bank on the north or northeast side of the lake. But wait a minute, all the experts say black bass prefer not to spawn in a rock environment so lets add one

other little requirement if your looking for those spawning rows. A firm preferably smooth bottom close at hand. Sounds simple doesn't it. Well we all know that everyone has read the books, heard the speeches and watched the shows on the how to's of bass fishing. Everyone that is except the bass.

Till next time stay dry.

Troy Willis - A Loss To County And Court

People in the Eastland County Courthouse are among those feeling the loss of Lawman Troy Willis, who died at his Lake Leon home on Monday, Jan. 2.

Willis worked as a Bailiff in the 91st District Court since

the fall of 1987. Born in Lawn, Texas in 1922, he had noteworthy service in the army and a career in Taylor County Law Enforcement before coming to Eastland County.

Moving to Abilene in 1936, Willis graduated from Abilene High School and attended Tarleton State University. He served in the U.S. Army in World War II, and receive E.A.M.E. Ribbon with two Bronze Service Stars and a Good Conduct ribbon.

He served as a Mounted Calvary Machine Gunner with the 10th Mountain Division in Italy. He took part in the reconnaissance patrol both mounted and on foot to gather and report information concerning enemy strength, position and movement.

After the war he began

work for the Abilene Police Department. After 16 years there he worked for the Taylor County Sheriff's Department for 14 years, retiring in 1985. He then moved to his home at Lake Leon.

Troy Willis was the past President of the Texas Police Association. He was also active in Rodeos and a member of the World Rodeo Association of Professionals. He was a member of the Church of Christ.

Willis married Barbara McKinney on Nov. 19, 1949 in Abilene, Texas. His survivors include his wife, Barbara McKinney Willis of the home, three sons, Roy Wade Willis of Canyon, Ray Vaughn "Rip" Willis and Kelly Willis, both of Abilene, two daughters, Carla Gohlke of

One of these is District Attorney Emory Walton, who says: "I have known Troy Willis for about 25 years, beginning when I moved to Abilene in 1965.

False teeth of the future are likely to be "implanted" into the jaw bone, says a federal panel convened by the National Institutes of Health. New techniques fool the natural bone to receive the implant like a bone fragment.

Eating fish containing omega-3 fish oils may help fight the symptoms of psoriasis, say doctors in Sheffield, England. In a double-blind study, those who got fish oil showed marked improvement.

The same sort of high-energy sound waves that are being used to crush kidney stones are being tested now on gallstones. Researchers in Munich, Germany, report favorable results.

The cholesterol level of youngsters should be checked at age 5, and again at 12, says a report in the journal, Postgraduate Medicine. At puberty, the level may rise toward that of adults.

New treatment for warts is a skin patch containing a strong salicylic acid solution. It's supposed to make warts disappear within two to four weeks.

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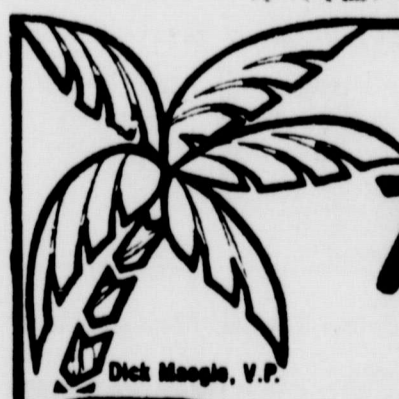
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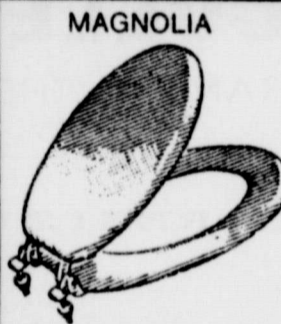


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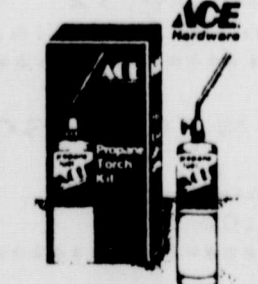
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Wanda's Corner

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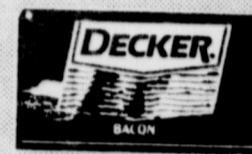
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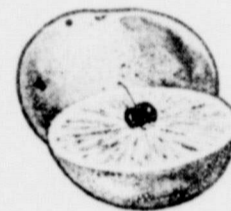

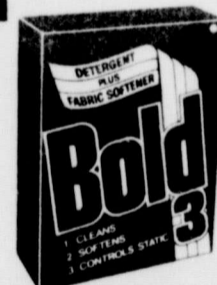
