Head Injury Specialists Of Texas To Urge the State Legislature To Adopt A Mandatory Helmet Law In 1989

Texas head injury specialists are urging the 1989 Legislature to review its stand on a mandatory helmet law for the state's 700,000 motorcyclists.

The recent motorcycle crash involving Texas-born actor Gary Busey has focused widespread attention on the issue of requiring motorcyclists to wear helmets.

Like many states, Texas repealed its mandatory helmet law after the federal government lifted its sanctions on requiring such a law. Currently, several Texas organizations are lobbying for a change back to mandatory helmet requirements.

Driving a motorcycle means a certain amount of risk. Dr. Rich Capriotti reported, clinical director at New Mexico Rehab Center. Obviously a head unprotected by a safety helmet is increasing that risk. In fact, unhelmeted riders are three times likely to sustain a serious head injury as those who wear helmets.

Unfortunately, broken bones and bruises heal, but a head injury can bring about drastic changes from which it takes years to recover. If the injury is severe, total recovery may be impossible.

Nationally more than 4,000 riders are killed each year, a large percentage of those

riders are not wearing helmets.

So many health hazards just can't be prevented, so when you consider that wearing a helmet when you drive or ride on a motorcycle, greatly reduces your chances of suffering a serious head injury, it's just common sense to do so.

Avoid High Interest Rate By Paying City Taxes On Time

Did you know that you may pay as much as 84 percent annual percentage rate interest on your delinquent taxes?

The City of Cisco would like to remind all its citizens that have not yet paid their 1988 taxes that they have until January 31, 1989 to pay them before they become delinquent.

On February 1, all unpaid taxes become delinquent and

a penalty and interest rate of 7 percent is automatically added to those taxes. (That 7 percent rate when carried out as an annual percentage rate actually amounts to 84 percent.) Then an additional 1 percent interest per month is added to delinquent taxes each and every month thereafter until the taxes are paid. Also, if your city taxes are not paid by July 1, an additional 15 percent for at-

torney's fee is automatically added on.

To avoid this extra cost, everyone who has not yet paid their 1988 City taxes are reminded and encouraged to do so before January 31.

The City of Cisco has many obligations and service requirements that must be met over the course of the fiscal year, and they can only be met by the timely collection of city property taxes. Please help your city serve you by paying your taxes on time.

James Wood Is Honored For 25-years Service To Post Office

James W. Wood, rural mail carrier for the United States Postal Service, was given his 25-year pin last Thursday in a meeting at the Cisco Post Office. Mr. Wood is the carrier for Route 4 in Cisco.

He began his postal career at Carbon Post Office in 1965 as a rural carrier. In 1973 he transferred to the Cisco Post Office when Carbon and Eastland combined their postal services.

Mr. Woods has completed 23 years with the Postal Service, but was also in the United States Army, stationed in Korea. Service time counts with time of employment with the United States Postal Service.

Wood said he taught science class in Carbon before going to work for the United States Postal Service. He attended Texas

A&M University and majored in agriculture education.

He said he travels about 122 miles a day delivering mail. He goes south to Scranton and Savannah and back up north and west to Dotham, Bluff and Putnam. When asked about bad weather and his job, he replied that they learn to deal with the weather.

Wood lost his left arm in a car accident in 1965, and has a prosthesis with a hook, but has no trouble with delivering the mail. He said, "I am only 56-years old and I really enjoy my job." He added with a smile, "I have no plans for retirement."

James and his wife, Martha, live on a 40 acre farm just out of Carbon. They have two children, Terry Duncan and James Craig Wood.

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF CISCO, TEXAS CALLING A PUBLIC HEARING TO DETERMINE WHETHER CERTAIN IMPROVEMENTS DESCRIBED HEREIN ARE EACH DANGEROUS AND CONSTITUTE A PUBLIC NUISANCE.







His "ministry of faith" was introduced to a group of 25 or more interior jungle ministers, natives of Brazil, and it was there in that jungle village that the ministers learned the "principles of faith" to take back to their congregations deep in the jungles.

The village the seminar was held in was on a lake that is river fed, and like all Amazon Jungle villages interior, there are no roads leading into the town. Transportation in the Amazon is mostly by the vast network of rivers that inter-teeed and finally form the great Amazon.

The pastor and jungle pilot/missionary, Bennie DeMerchant (Amazon missionary for 24 years), flew the float plane through a very bad storm during the night to arrive at the village (Mauca) where the seminar was held. Rev. Jones carried into the country from America airplane pistons, cylinders, beef jerky, a microwave rotating plate, marshmallows, children's toys, etc (this has been six years of transportation these airplane parts to keep the missions planes going as we have two float planes there... a 4 passenger and a 6 passenger).

The pastor finalized the agreement with a jungle lodge on the Juna River to serve as "master guide" for

Olden Couple In Jail On Variety Of Drug Charges

An Olden couple is being held without bond in Eastland County Jail after being charged with a variety of drug offenses Wednesday.

False teeth of the future are likely to be "implanted" into the jaw bone, says a federal panel convened by the National Institutes of Health. New techniques fool the natural bone to receive the implant like a bone fragment.

Eating fish containing omega-3 fish oils may help fight the symptoms of psoriasis, say doctors in Sheffield, England. In a double-blind study, those who got fish oil showed marked improvement.

The same sort of high-energy sound waves that are being used to crush kidney stones are being tested now on gallstones. Researchers in Munich, Germany, report favorable results.

The cholesterol level of youngsters should be checked at age 5, and again at 12, says a report in the journal, Postgraduate Medicine. At puberty, the level may rise toward that of adults.

New treatment for warts is a skin patch containing a strong salicylic acid solution. It's supposed to make warts disappear within two to four weeks.

Gordon Spot

By DeMarquis Gordon, County Agent

Until the last few days the winter has been unseasonably warm and dry. Some people are worried that their fruit and trees are going to begin blooming too soon. This is not likely to happen until we have more cold weather first. Fruit trees require a certain number of hours below 45 degrees before they will set a crop of fruit. This is known as chilling requirements. Peach trees need 750 to 950 hours of temperature below 45 degrees in the winter before they will set a crop. The number of chilling hours required depends on the variety. At this time we have not had enough chilling hours for most varieties of fruit.

Since we can not do anything about the weather, we should concentrate our efforts on those management jobs we can do. One of those important jobs to perform on our fruit trees is the annual "lube" job. This refers, of course, to an application of dormant oil to control scale insects.

Why control scale insects? The answer is simply to save the trees. If a scale insect such as the San Jose scale or white peach gets started, it would kill your trees.

Dormant oil can be purchased at many different stores where garden supplies

are sold. Be sure to follow all label directions and apply the mixture when the temperature is between 40-70 degrees F. Do not apply if a freeze is likely with 48 hours after application, and do not apply after the tree has budded out. Dormant oil is applied when the tree is dormant. Spraying blooms and leaves could cause leaf burn and flower drop.

Scale insects are difficult for most people to detect, so dormant oil should be applied once each year. Sooner or later your trees will probably be attacked by scale insects, so be ready by guarding against them with an application of dormant oil. Dormant oil should be applied to all kinds of fruit trees and it won't hurt your pecan trees. Scale is not a major problem of pecans, but they do sometimes attack pecans as well as shade trees.

In fact, another kind of scale insect often damages or kills a popular shrub in Eastland County. The plant is the Euonymus and the scale is known as euonymus scale. These scale insects are found on the shrubs leaves, stems, and trunk.

There are two or three generations each year. A dormant oil spray now will be a big help in controlling the

insect. However, other applications may be needed

throughout the year. They spread to new foliage during the crawler stage which first appears during May. As crawlers begin to feed, a wax covering forms over the insect.

Summer oil will control adult euonymus scale. Malathion or diazinon added to the summer oil and water mixture will control crawlers.

Be sure to follow directions on the insecticide labels when spraying for all types of insects.

Another job that needs to be done to your fruit trees is pruning. Pruning a young tree controls its shape by developing a strong, well-balanced framework of scaffold branches. The open center pruning system is being suited for stone fruit trees. Since most fruit trees bear fruit on wood that grew the previous year, this wood is regrowth from year to year. New growth needs full light or it will shade out and die with all the production occurring on the outer perimeter of the tree. The open center system maximizes light penetration to all parts of the tree, resulting in fruit production over the entire tree.

Light pruning can be done any time of the year. However, perform major pruning only during the dormant season or late winter just before budbreak.

SIBLING FIGHTS
Cold winter days and weekends when children are confined inside the house often gives way to fights and arguments between siblings.

Fights and arguments between brothers and sisters are a normal part of growing up. Yet most mothers ultimately step in to stop the battling and, may actually set the stage for the next battle.

Although mom's intentions

are good, a research study of children in fourth through seventh grades and their parents revealed that as mediators mothers tend to encourage rather than discourage fighting between siblings. The difficulty is that parents tend to punish the older, more powerful sibling and support the younger, weaker child. The younger sibling thus gets the unintended pleasure of watching his older sibling being punished. This reinforces the behavior and makes the young child even more willing to fight in the future.

It appears that if mothers will resist the impulse to serve as umpire or judge, fewer fights will occur between siblings. When fighting calls for a parent to intervene, it's best to dish out punishment in private.

Researchers have also noted that most physical violence takes place between children of the same sex, that fights between sisters are just as frequent and rough as fights between brothers, and that parents punish boys for fighting with their sisters most severely.

Fishing Outdoors

The final standings in the Brownwood Bass Club are in for 1988. With a whopping 94 individuals having entered one or more event in 1988 anglers had a lot of tough competition. For 1988 the top ten finishers and their weights were:

Just to show how tough this organizations anglers are, it took over 20 pounds to place in the top 25 in this organization. Congratulations to all the winners in 1988 and good luck in 1989.

The January tournament for Brownwood has been set January 22 on Lake Brownwood. Fishing hours will be from 7:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. Headquarters for this event will be at the dam.

Lake Hubbard Creek will be the first tournament for the Eastland County Bass Club. Fishing will take place January 14, 1989, beginning at 7:00 a.m. until 4:00 p.m.

Bass fishing at Lake Corpus Christi may be one of the sport's best kept secrets in Texas.

The 19,000-acre reservoir is the major water supply for the city of Corpus Christi, and it is located about half-way between the city and Choke Canyon Reservoir which shares its Nueces River watershed.

Excellent fishing at nearby Choke Canyon may have overshadowed the recent improvements at Lake Corpus Christi, but Texas Parks and Wildlife Department biologist John Wray said fishery surveys show the downstream lake has a good population of largemouth bass.

"There are three main reasons for the improved fishing at Lake Corpus Christi (formerly Lake Mathis)," Wray said. "First, the lake level came up in 1986 after a long drought. This inundated large areas of vegetative growth that provided cover for bass.

"The second reason could be the 248,000 Florida largemouth bass fingerlings the department stocked in 1980," Wray continued. The Florida strain is noted for boosting growth rates in bass populations. "Finally, the 14-inch minimum length limits that went into effect Sept. 1, 1985, probably increased survival of more bass and increased their average size," he said.

Wray said November electrofishing surveys collected bass at the outstanding rate of 95 per hour. Of these fish, about 60 percent were over 12 inches long or longer, and 38 percent were 14 inches or longer. "The overall quality of the population was seen by an excellent size distribution from three to 23 inches," Wray said, adding that the catch included individual fish weighing six, seven and 10 pounds.




