
A total number of 16 persons will be permitted to go on the trip. Anyone who is interested in seeing what a prison is like, are invited to go on the trip.

Foster Homes Can Ease **Juvenile Court Trouble**

The social and financial issues surrounding prison overcrowding continue to make headlines in Texas. While the experts propose differing solutions to the problem, most would agree that early intervention at the juvenile court level provides the best hope for future change.

A lack of resources. however, often makes early intervention ineffective, according to Dr. William Reese, assistant professor of sociology at Texas Christian University.

Many young offenders are sent to private reformatories. But there is no evidence that a private institution is any less stigmatizing than a public institution," explained Reese. "The fact remains that if offenders don't know how to hot wire a car when first sent to the reformatory, they'll know by the time they get out."

Despite this knowledge. most judges are left with few alternatives. If given a choice, most judges would prefer to send the child to a foster home, Reese believes

"Foster homes are better ecause the juveniles are individualized, not institutionalized," Reese said. 'Once they're removed

from their community, enrolled in a different school and are away from their old gang, there is a better chance of behavioral

change." Because unavailability of foster homes, only about two of every 100 youngsters the courts process move in with a foster family, Reese noted.

"The kids who are most likely to succeed are the ones placed in foster homes. This means that the ones who need the most help are either thrown back for lack of resources or they're institutionalized," said the TCU professor. "While some learn from their experience. many others just become bitter and continue in a life



Tourism linked to historic preservation

When you travel, are you likely to visit historic sites or museums? In a survey recently completed by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation, it was found that most people answer "yes." In fact, next to shopping, visitors to Texas enjoy visiting historical attractions more than any other activity.

It's no accident that sites such as the Alamo in San Antonio, the barque Elissa in Galveston, and the Capitol Building in Austin draw millions of visitors each year. Texans and their visitors are interested in the state's history, and want to learn

more about it This fascination with history is being noticed by state lawmakers, too. With the slump in oil prices and a growing concern about the state's economic stability, government leaders are looking for other ways to increase revenues. One answer is tourism, a \$17.3 billion dollar industry in Texas, and growing. Tourism, particularly in the coming decade, will be inexorably linked to historic preservation a partner-

ship that will benefit us all. Already, communities are capitalizing on this interest in history by maintaining local and county history museums, opening bed and breakfast inns, offering historical walking and homes tours, and rehabilitating historic buildings for retail or cultural uses. All along the state's highways and byways, one can now view a variety of billboards advertising a community's museum or historic shopping area. According to Arthur Frommer,

author and operator of one of the

largest tour companies in the nation,

there are three major reasons why

people travel: rest/recreation; a

desire to view great natural sites;

"Among cities with no particular recreational appeal, those that have substantially preserved their past continue to enjoy tourism," Frommer wrote in a recent preservation magazine. "Those that haven't receive no tourism at all. It is as simple He cites the cities of Atlanta and

Charleston, both leading tourism destinations. Atlanta, which has obliterated most of its historic fabric, relies on conventions and business meetings to attract out-of-town visitors. Charleston, on the other hand, offers a rich historical background that draws visitors every year. Tourism and historic preservation, he argues, work together for the entire economy, and other commercial interests, including real estate development, do not suffer as a result of this partnership.

"Little towns, too, have learned that preservation can create a thriving tourist industry," Frommer adds. In Texas, communities in every corner of the state have organized successful tourism programs. For example, the city of Georgetown in Central Texas has recently hired a tourism director to oversee that community's tourism efforts: Goliad, a small community in South Texas, has launched an aggressive tourism plan; and Waxahachie near Dallas, already wellknown as a popular on-the-spot location for various Hollywood films, has also hired a tourism director.

The key is to support the entire breadth of our Main Streets and historic districts. A sole historic home in a town will not turn the



Fishing Outdoors

By Terry L. Wilson

Area anglers who braved our tough Texas weather were probably met with some tough Texas winter fishing. Lake Leon's crappie fishing overall is still at rock bottom. Their out there somewhere though folks and someone is bound to find them. The normal river crappie run is no more than a day of catching dinks, not even wonder fish are in the river in numbers. And the bass fishing which has been good in the river area has really slowed down. Main lake rocky shorelines seem to be holding some of the better bass fishing right now.

At Lake Brownwood the river crappie fishing has been very good in both size and numbers. Minnows and jogs are both producing well. The black bass fishing has only been fair with some action in the Jim Ned Creek. Overall main lake drops on he north share have produced the most action.

Of all area crappie fishing the hot lake still is Hubbard Creek. This born again impoundment "is" on the comeback both for crappie and bass, as well as hybrid stripped bass and catfish. The crappie hot spots have been reported in both the Sandy and Hubbard Creek areas and well baited boat house in the main lake area. Black bass wise, numerous 6 to 8 pound fish are being taken on a regular basis. It has been reported the Sandy Creek side of the lake is the prime area. Exact locations are being very well guarded.

And speaking of Hubbard Creek, the Eastland County Bass Club held its first tournament of 1989 at this impoundment. We were told 5 anglers were present Saturday the 14th, but the official results were not available for this run. Anyone who showed up to fish was a winner in the endurance category by my

A couple of early tournament dates are April 2, 1989 Brownwood, Brownwood Bass Club. And proposed for April 15 and 16 the Brownwood Chamber of Commerce, Miller Lite Open at Lake Brownwood. These dates for the chamber event are not certain yet, but chamber spokesman Wesly Fletcher unofficially announced these days. Why is this normally October event being moved to April? It was stated by Mr. Fletcher that due to a decrease in contestants over the years it is hoped to help draw more anglers. If an increase is not seem sponsors of this event have expressed a desire to withdraw their support. But not to worry Wesly has stated the tournament will continue with or without present sponsors.

Many of you may recall some of the items concerning the chamber tournament last year. This event was one of those who's entry fee had steadily increased over the years, without an increase in guaranteed monies. If memory serves me correctly, this event was \$55.00 for two days including big bass both days. And the guarantee was \$1,500.00 for first place, with the other places being solely based on the number of entrants. Last years event drew 144 contestants. Prior to the entry increase this event was drawing 200 plus contestants. This was an excellent example of how anglers were comparing tournaments and choosing the best best buy for their money. And this trend is expected to continue in 1989.

February 2, 1989 the Eastland County Bass Club will be meeting at the E.N.B. building at 7:00 p.m. With new leadership comes changes the E.C.B.C. would like to invite all area anglers to attend this meeting and perhaps join in the move forward for 1989.

E.C.B.C. members don't forget January 21, 1989 at the always delicious Crossin' Restaurant in Eastland, the 1988 awards Banquet will take place. All awards for 1988 will be presented at this time as well as the announcement of the 1988 Angler of the Year, 1988 Top Six, and the Top Sixteen qualifiers for the Classic. If you have not

Both commissioners were elected to the state regulatory agency in the general election of 1988. Nugent, the Commission's senior member, was elected to a full sixyear term. Since Hance was appointed to the Commission upon the resignation of Commissioner Mack Wallace in 1987, state law required that he run for the remaining unexpired portion of the term. Therefore, the term to which he was elected expires in

Nugent was appointed to the Commission by Governor Dolph Briscoe and took office January 4, 1979. He has since been re-elected three times and has been elected by fellow commissioners to serve as chairman three times. Before his Commission appointment, Nugent served 18 years in the Texas House of

"Many accidents are caused by careless or inexperienced drivers in poor road conditions they cannot handle," said Eugene Meyung, president of the Government Employees Insurance Companies (GEICO). "And some 34 percent of drivers involved in fatal accidents are legally drunk." Meyung suggests the following guidelines for avoiding accidents and injury on the road.

· To protect yourself from potentially dangerous situations, extend your field of vision to include everything down the road for 100 yards.

· Always look for avenues of escape that could be taken should an accident appear likely.

each. Qualifying events to include:

- Showmanship at Halter
- * Western Pleasure * Western Riding
- * Western Horsemanship
- * Barrel Race Cloverleaf * Pole Bending
- * Stakes Race

Each participant has the option to enter all classes; however, he may choose only 4 classes to qualify for High Point Individual. Either the Judged Events (Showmanship-at-Halter, Western Pleasure, Western Riding, Western Horsemanship) or The 3 Speed Events (Barrel Race, Pole Bending, Stakes Race, plus Showmanship-at-

4. Awards will include: Jr. and Sr. High Point Individual in Judged Events and in Speed Events; therefore, 4 high point individual awards will be given.

5. Each exhibitor is allowed to use only one (1) horse in the qualifying events he has entered. Other horses may be used in the non-qualifying events entered, points from these classes will not count towards Overall High Point Individual.

6. Ribbons will be given 1st through 10th place.

7. Entries due March 3. 1989. Entries may be picked up at the County Extension Office, the 4-H Club Managers or from high school Agriculture Science Teachers.

8. Class patterns and rules will follow the 1988 Texas 4-H Horse Rules. A copy of these rules may be obtained from the County Extension Agent.

Low-Income Households May Be Eligible For Energy Assistance

Some low-income Texans may be eligible for help in paying heating bills this winter through the Home Energy Assistance Program, according to Texas Department of Human Services Acting Commissioner Charles Stevenson.

Stevenson said the onetime payment is available to low-income households. Applications for energy assistance were mailed to households that received food stamps, Aid to Families with Dependent Children, or Supplemental Security Income in December. Other lowincome individuals may request an application from local DHS offices during the enrollment period of Jan. 16 through Feb. 16.

Eligibility is limited by gross income and resources. Aid is available for a oneperson household having less than \$589.49 gross income per month. The gross income limits are \$781.49 for households of two persons, \$973.49 for three, \$1,165.49 for four, \$1,357.49 for five, and \$1.549.49 for six.

Households are eligible if the cost for heating is included in the rent payment or if the household pays a portion of its home energy costs.

Energy assistance checks are sent directly to the people who are eligible for assistance. However, the checks are made payable to the energy provider.

People receiving one of these energy assistance checks should mail it or take it in person to the energy provider business office with their regular energy bill. The check can be cashed only by the energy provider. If the HEAP check is more than the energy bill, the additional amount will be credited to the person's account for the next month's bill. If the energy bill is

higher than the check, the

person is responsible for

paying the difference.

Subscription rates for the twice-weekly delivery of the Cisco Press, Eastland Telegram and Ranger Times are \$17.00 each per year for incounty delivery; \$22.00 annual for adjoining counties; \$24.00 in state; \$30.00 out of states.




