CJC Wranglers Defeat McLennan 80-75

Lewis Hicks scored 32 points and Mark Chambers pulled down 21 rebounds to pace the CJC Wranglers to an 80-75 NTJAC conference victory over the McLennan Community College Highlanders at Wrangler Gym Saturday night. With the win, the Wranglers evened their conference record at 1-1, and improved to 9-8 overall.

MCC jumped out to an early six point lead on the Wranglers, and went to the locker room at halftime with a 44-41 lead. However CJC came out hot after the intermission and took the lead with just over 18 minutes to play. From that point on, largely due to the three point shooting of Hicks and Eric Brown, the Wranglers maintained leads from four to nine points, and managed to salvage the win against a much taller and deeper MCC team. Cisco hit 11 for 26 from

Cisco Girl Scouts To Host Annual Meeting

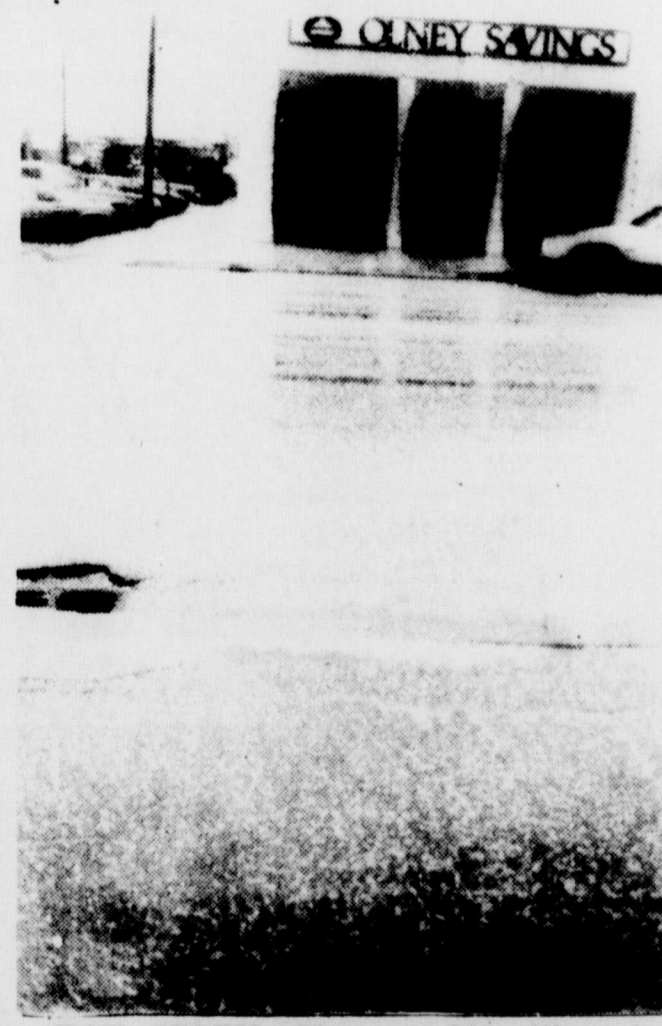

Foster Homes Can Ease Juvenile Court Trouble

The social and financial issues surrounding prison overcrowding continue to make headlines in Texas. While the experts propose differing solutions to the problem, most would agree that early intervention at the juvenile court level provides the best hope for future change.

A lack of resources, however, often makes early intervention ineffective, according to Dr. William Reese, assistant professor of sociology at Texas Christian University.

Many young offenders are sent to private reformatories. But there is no evidence that a private institution is any less stigmatizing than a public institution," explained Reese. "The fact remains that if offenders don't know how to hot wire a car when first sent to the reformatory, they'll know by the time they get out."

Despite this knowledge, most judges are left with few alternatives. If given a choice, most judges would prefer to send the child to a foster home, Reese believes.

"Foster homes are better because the juveniles are individualized," Reese said. "Once they're removed

from their community, enrolled in a different school and are away from their old gang, there is a better chance of behavioral change."

Because of the unavailability of foster homes, only about two of every 100 youngsters the courts process move in with a foster family, Reese noted.

"The kids who are most likely to succeed are the ones placed in foster homes. This means that the ones who need the most help are either thrown back for lack of resources or they're institutionalized," said the TCU professor. "While some learn from their experience, many others just become bitter and continue in a life of crime."

Stretching Is Important To Exercise Program

Being physically fit is a New Year resolution found on many lists. But no matter what activity is chosen to obtain fitness, stretching is one component that should always be included.

"The most ignored part in people's exercise programs is their flexibility. They don't want to take the time to stretch," said Bruce Van Duser, physical education instructor and coordinator of the employee fitness program at Texas Christian University.

Decreasing the chance of injury is the main reason to make stretching part of the physical fitness regime, Van Duser noted. Stretching also will help eliminate some of the soreness associated with exercise.

"When working on flexibility you stretch your muscles to a point just beyond what you normally do in everyday activity, but not to the point of pain. By holding that stretch you train the elasticity part of your muscles to stretch and come back," explained Van Duser. "If you lack flexibility, it's much easier to tear the muscle and injure yourself."

Maintaining flexibility becomes even more important with age, according to Van Duser.

"As you get older, you begin to lose your range of motion so if you're not in the habit of stretching you become even more prone to injury and pain," he said. "I can't emphasize flexibility enough, and yet it's the one component in exer-

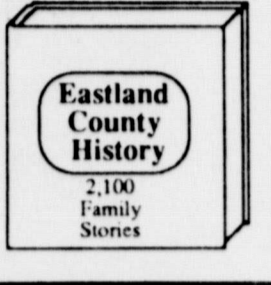

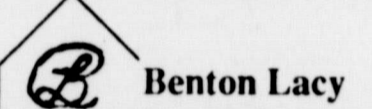

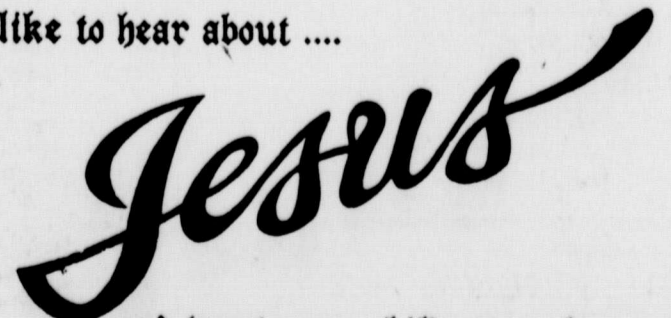

Those present learned the "do's and don'ts" of drug use in animals destined for market or breeding purposes. Following is a list of tips to follow when administering drugs to livestock projects.

- * Read the label
- * Use drugs only in animal species listed on the label
- * Use the proper dose
- * Calculate pre-slaughter drug withdrawal and milk discard times
- * Use the correct route
- * Do not "double dose"
- * Select needle size and injection sites carefully
- * Allow proper withdrawal times for feed containing drugs
- * Keep accurate records
- * Seek the advice of your veterinarian

"Still lifes are more than fruit and flowers," said Myrtle Wilks at a recent meeting of the Myrtle Wilks Art Club. "They are portraits of inanimate objects. So be creative."

She spoke to an attentive and eager audience. Each dangled a small frame from his hand as Myrtle introduced the topic: setting up a still life to paint or draw.

Of the frames she said, "I'll show you what those are for in a minute."

Myrtle discussed how to choose objects, whether by theme, color, or other

criteria; how to vary shapes, colors, and textures; and how to arrange the pieces in a pleasing design.

Darkening the room, she turned on a strong lamp. "Use a single light source for drama and simplicity," she said. "And try every angle. You'll find the best by experimenting."

She demonstrated with a simple blue earthenware pot. A silken-skinned white onion, red tomato, orange, and paring knife lay alongside on a navy cotton cloth.

"Now let me show you a trick with those frames," Myrtle said. She took the small rectangular piece of mat board. "Hold this at arm's length. Look at your arrangement. Is it appealing? Does it make a pleasing

picture? A little frame such as this can help you see it as a picture."

She gestured to a side table. "Okay - your turn. Pick any of these items. Arrange them. Move the light. Experiment! We'll observe and compare - see what works and what doesn't."

One by one the members chose from the wealth of objects. They arranged - often going back for a second choice; drew back to observe; returned to adjust, to subtract, to add; to twitch, to fiddle, to perfect. Then each turned away with a secret shining in his eye, awaiting comment.

Out came the frames. Out stretched the arms, like spokes reaching to the strongly lit display. Out spilled the answers:

"I like the little horse there."

"This view is best."

"I didn't think I'd like the orange tea pot there - but I do!"

"A feather pen stuffed in a bear's gun, a sword lying to one side ... is this a political statement?"

Most popular with male participants were the stuffed bear, toy miniature rifle, and sword-shaped letter opener. Women and girls clearly preferred the china doll in hoop skirts, the brass

candle holders, and ornamental containers in their arrangements.

The only disappointment of the evening seemed to be the lack of drawing time.

"We'll sketch a still life

next time," Myrtle promised.

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Fishing Outdoors

Area anglers who braved our tough Texas weather were probably met with some tough Texas winter fishing. Lake Leon's crappie fishing overall is still at rock bottom. Their out there somewhere though folks and someone is bound to find them. The normal river crappie run is no more than a day of catching dinks, not even wonder fish are in the river in numbers. And the bass fishing which has been good in the river area has really slowed down. Main lake rocky shorelines seem to be holding some of the better bass fishing right now.

At Lake Brownwood the river crappie fishing has been very good in both size and numbers. Minnows and jogs are both producing well. The black bass fishing has only been fair with some action in the Jim Ned Creek. Overall main lake drops on the north shore have produced the most action.

Of all area crappie fishing the hot lake still is Hubbard Creek. This born again impoundment "is" on the comeback both for crappie and bass, as well as hybrid striped bass and catfish. The crappie hot spots have been reported in both the Sandy and Hubbard Creek areas and well baited boat house in the main lake area. Black bass wise, numerous 6 to 8 pound fish are being taken on a regular basis. It has been reported the Sandy Creek side of the lake is the prime area. Exact locations are being very well guarded.

And speaking of Hubbard Creek, the Eastland County Bass Club held its first tournament of 1989 at this impoundment. We were told 5 anglers were present Saturday the 14th, but the official results were not available for this run. Anyone who showed up to fish was a winner in the endurance category by my book.

A couple of early tournament dates are April 2, 1989 Lake Brownwood, Brownwood Bass Club. And proposed for April 15 and 16 the Brownwood Chamber of Commerce, Miller Lite Open at Lake Brownwood. These dates for the chamber event are not certain yet, but chamber spokesman Wesly Fletcher unofficially announced these days. Why is this normally October event being moved to April? It was stated by Mr. Fletcher that due to a decrease in contestants over the years it is hoped to help draw more anglers. If an increase is not seen sponsors of this event have expressed a desire to withdraw their support. But not to worry Wesly has stated the tourna-

ment will continue with or without present sponsors.

Many of you may recall some of the items concerning the chamber tournament last year. This event was one of those who's entry fee had steadily increased over the years, without an increase in guaranteed monies. If memory serves me correctly, this event was \$55.00 for two days including big bass both days. And the guarantee was \$1,500.00 for first place, with the other places being solely based on the number of entrants. Last years event drew 144 contestants. Prior to the entry increase this event was drawing 200 plus contestants. This was an excellent example of how anglers were comparing tournaments and choosing the best best buy for their money. And this trend is expected to continue in 1989.

February 2, 1989 the Eastland County Bass Club will be meeting at the E.N.B. building at 7:00 p.m. With new leadership comes changes the E.C.B.C. would like to invite all area anglers to attend this meeting and perhaps join in the move forward for 1989.

E.C.B.C. members don't forget January 21, 1989 at the always delicious Crossin' Restaurant in Eastland, the 1988 awards Banquet will take place. All awards for 1988 will be presented at this time as well as the announcement of the 1988 Angler of the Year, 1988 Top Six, and the Top Sixteen qualifiers for the Classic. If you have not

Nugent was appointed to the Commission by Governor Dolph Briscoe and took office January 4, 1979. He has since been re-elected three times and has been elected by fellow commissioners to serve as chairman three times. Before his Commission appointment, Nugent served 18 years in the Texas House of

No one ever plans on being involved in a crash. Yet thousands of motor vehicle accidents take place each year, causing some 48,000 deaths and 1.8 million disabling injuries.

"Many accidents are caused by careless or inexperienced drivers in poor road conditions they cannot handle," said Eugene Meyung, president of the Government Employees Insurance Companies (GEICO). "And some 34 percent of drivers involved in fatal accidents are legally drunk." Meyung suggests the following guidelines for avoiding accidents and injury on the road.

- To protect yourself from potentially dangerous situations, extend your field of vision to include everything down the road for 100 yards.

- Always look for avenues of escape that could be taken should an accident appear likely.

- Adjust your speed to accommodate the road conditions at hand and leave sufficient space between vehicles to bring your car safely to a stop.

- Most importantly, wear your seat belt every time you get in the car," Meyung said. "Seat belts give you a better than 50 percent chance of avoiding death and serious injury if you are involved in a crash."

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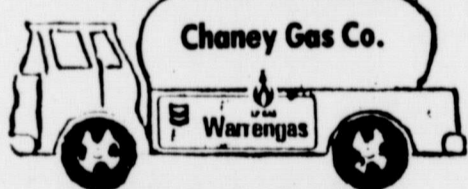
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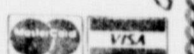

- * Showmanship at Halter
- * Western Pleasure
- * Western Riding
- * Western Horsemanship
- * Barrel Race - Cloverleaf
- * Pole Bending
- * Stakes Race

Each participant has the option to enter all classes; however, he may choose only 4 classes to qualify for High Point Individual. Either the Judged Events (Showmanship-at-Halter, Western Pleasure, Western Horsemanship) or The 3 Speed Events (Barrel Race, Pole Bending, Stakes Race, plus Showmanship-at-Halter).

4. Awards will include: Jr. and Sr. High Point Individual in Judged Events and in Speed Events; therefore, 4 high point individual awards will be given.

5. Each exhibitor is allowed to use only one (1) horse in the qualifying events he has entered. Other horses may be used in the non-qualifying events entered, points from these classes will not count towards Overall High Point Individual.


6. Ribbons will be given 1st through 10th place.

Low-Income Households May Be Eligible For Energy Assistance

Some low-income Texans may be eligible for help in paying heating bills this winter through the Home Energy Assistance Program, according to Texas Department of Human Services Acting Commissioner Charles Stevenson.

Stevenson said the one-time payment is available to many low-income households. Applications for energy assistance were mailed to households that received food stamps, Aid to Families with Dependent Children, or Supplemental Security Income in December. Other low-income individuals may request an application from local DHS offices during the enrollment period of Jan. 16 through Feb. 16.

Eligibility is limited by gross income and resources. Aid is available for a one-person household having less than \$589.49 gross income per month. The gross income limits are \$781.49 for households of two persons, \$973.49 for three, \$1,165.49 for four, \$1,357.49 for five, and \$1,549.49 for six.

Households are eligible if the cost for heating is included in the rent payment or if the household pays a portion of its home energy costs.

Energy assistance checks are sent directly to the people who are eligible for assistance. However, the checks are made payable to the energy provider.

People receiving one of these energy assistance checks should mail it or take it in person to the energy provider business office with their regular energy bill. The check can be cashed only by the energy provider. If

the HEAP check is more than the energy bill, the additional amount will be credited to the person's account for the next month's bill. If the energy bill is higher than the check, the person is responsible for paying the difference.

Subscription costs for the local newspaper is a genuine bargain when one subtracts the cost of postal delivery.

The average annual postal delivery charges for delivery of your local newspaper for one year comes to \$5.32 per subscription.

The delivery cost on out-of-county subscriptions shows the average postal bill is \$15.10 a year.

Subscription rates for the twice-weekly delivery of the Cisco Press, Eastland Telegram and Ranger Times are \$17.00 each per year for in-county delivery; \$22.00 annual for adjoining counties; \$24.00 in state; \$30.00 out of states.

The National Newspaper Association made a study of thousands of weekly newspapers and found that the average (once-a-week) subscription costs were \$13.00 in county; \$16.19 outside county; and \$18.18 a year out of state. Single copy average was 33¢. The highest annual subscription prices were \$60, regardless of where the newspaper was sent. Lowest was \$1. The average circulation of weeklies in the national study was 4,191.

Most subscriptions to the local newspapers expire in January, so subscribers should consider renewing now before an anticipated rate increase expected Feb. 1.

Postal delivery rates have soared over the past few years, while basic subscription rates have remained fairly stable.

In answer to Mr. Rick Wende's letter, the site to which trucks have absolutely nothing to do with the hazardous material being shipped down I-20.

The Department of Transportation estimates that sixty percent of trucks on the road are overweight. They are doing millions of dollars of damage to our highways, farm-to-market roads, and our County bridges. All of the above were built and are maintained by tax dollars. The County also receives twenty percent of the License and Weight Department's fines. Trooper Steele estimates we will recover the County's investment in sixty days.

We did not buy Trooper Steele a portable radio. We bought one for the County, and it will be on loan to him until the D.P.S. makes one available to him. He is the only person that we are aware of, in Eastland County, that has been trained in hazardous equipment handling. He is unable to communicate when he is out of his vehicle weighing trucks. The noise of several diesel engines running keeps him from hearing his car radio no matter how near it is parked.

The Fire Department
There are nine fire departments, not one, that we try to help. We have always tried to support them all and are contributing \$20,600.00 per year to them, all equal, share and share alike. Some of them use this money to buy equipment, once even used it to make truck payments.

We have a contract with the cities throughout the county, when the trucks cross

the city limits, they are then covered by County liability insurance. In addition to this, we agreed to pay each one \$200.00 per month whether they had rural fires or not. We don't have the exact figures on the insurance cost, but it isn't free. It may not seem like much to you, but these funds are from Road and Bridge taxes, and it sounds like a lot of money to County officials who have worn out equipment that needs replacing and County employees who haven't had a raise in three years. More, Mr. Wende? We think not. How about less?

Approval was given to set up a fund for the 50th anniversary celebration of CJC to be held in the Fall of 1990. Emma Watts, CJC Executive Assistant, has been selected to chair a committee to plan the celebration.

The resignation of Ruthyle Julien as Vocational Nursing instructor at the Abilene Center was accepted effective March 31, 1989. Gary Foster was employed as a maintenance worker, Rhonda Franci as a part time clerk in Clyde, and Wilma Ramirez and Karen Ray as nursing instructors in Abilene.

The Board also heard a report on the Band and Belle trip to Washington, D.C., in May; a pre-registration report; a report on student insurance; saw a draft of a needs assessment survey that will be conducted in Abilene; and other routine business.

The next meeting of the board will be February 13.

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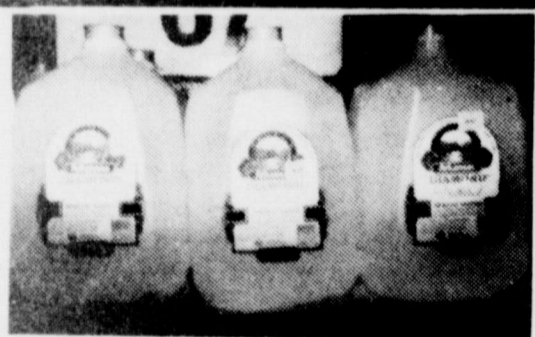

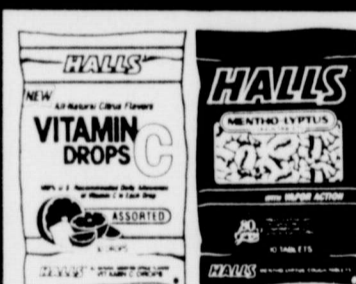
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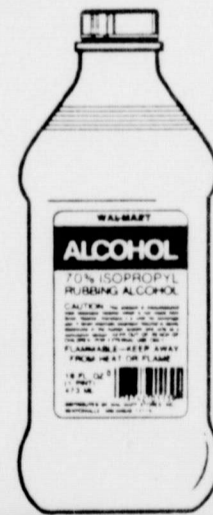
