exceeds what we can afford in our public schools. Dangerous prisoners are mechanically and electronically controlled so that there is less danger and about one-third of the guards and employees are usually young ladies. And prisoners are said to watch their language and show more respect in the presence of these often attractive ladies. If you have questions about one of these prison units, learn the facts. Groups are being taken monthly to visit one. It is 203 miles one way and lunch is furnished. Where might a prison be located in the county? Twenty-two possible sites are being studied with purchase price and the cost of getting

water to the location of prime importance. Some of the land must be flat, and a central location in the county would be preferable. The organization should be able to select a site in a couple of weeks, says Dr. Barnes. Eastland County has much to offer that others in the area can't match. It has 1-20 running through it, which is important if supplies must be trucked from and to Huntsville, and adequate water is available from local lakes and ground sources, though additional treatment facilities must be constructed whether a prison locates here or not. Peanuts, pecans, and fruit trees do well here and might be produced and processed by a unit for state prison use.

It was found in other prison cities that some who opposed locating a prison there come to support it after about three years.

A prison located in central Eastland County could help Brownwood, Clyde, Breckenridge, Stephenville, Comanche, and all points in between. The two local junior colleges are assets to help draw the prison, and the prison could be a big help to them. Colleges in Stephenville, Brownwood, and Abilene could also benefit. We are told that Callahan County is already strongly supporting Eastland County's effort to acquire a prison unit.

For a prison to locate here, the Legislature must fund it, county citizens must purchase about 300 acres of land, and supporters must get water to the land. Other inducements might also be offered.

Engineers will verify what the county has to offer, and local volunteers will keep the Legislature reminded that a unit is wanted here.

An answer might then be expected in mid-September. A 1000 bed unit might be substituted for a 2250 bed

Twenty-Six Year Old Men Do Not Have To Register With Draft

Joseph Frank, a resident and city employee of Lafayette, La., celebrated his birthday Jan. 6. By turning 26, Frank unknowingly established a milestone

for an agency of the U.S. Government and earned himself a minor place in history.

Eight years ago, Frank was the first 18-year-old man to sign up and be processed by the Selective Service System under the continuous draft registration program. From now on, however, if Congress and the president order a return to military conscription under present law, Frank is too old to be drafted. He has become the first man since Vietnam to pass through the full, eight-year-long period of draft eligibility without being drafted.

men ages 18 through 25 are kept on file by Selective Service for use in a national emergency. If Congress reinstates the draft, men most likely to be called into military service would be those who turn 20 during that calendar year. Selective Service would first conduct a birthdate lottery to determine the order of call within that age group and then, depending upon the manpower requirements of the crisis, those men whose birthdays draw low lottery numbers would be more likely to be called.

There has not been a draft since 1973 when the U.S. switched to an all-volunteer military force. In 1975, the Selective Service System was placed in "deep standby" status and the requirement for men to register was suspended. But it wasn't long before several studies and commission reports noted that a draft would be needed again if the country ever became involved in a major conflict. They predicted it would take too long to get men registered, classified, inducted, and trained. In 1980, after the Soviet invasion of Afghanistan, President Carter revitalized the Selective Service System and reinstated the registration requirement for men. On Jan. 5, 1981, registration of 18-year-old men began again and has continued. Today, using computer technology, the System can begin issuing thousands of induction orders via Western Union "Mailgrams" in three days or less, once Congress and the president give the go-ahead.

With few exceptions, federal law requires every man to register with Selective Service within 30 days of his 18th birthday.

Sheriff's Dept. News

The Eastland County Sheriff's Dept. is receiving the greatest of cooperation from city and local law enforcement officers in the county, said a deputy, who praised the work of the Cisco Police Dept. in recovering some items taken in a burglary.

In another case the Cisco police and a deputy worked together to apprehend two young men, ages 17 and 18, who reportedly confessed to removing and taking electrical lines in a rural area, and to entering a house. The stolen wire was recovered and victims were to decide if restitution is to be made or charges are to be filed.

The Sheriff's Dept. also expected to arrest two young men by press time for the theft of steel fence posts from rural property near Ranger. Posts were stolen from two ranches or farms.

Scrap metal which was taken from Missouri Pacific property between Putnam and Cisco was recovered. Rail-

road official Arla M. Roquet decided against filing charges, and pledged the railroad's support for the Eastland County Sheriff's Dept. and the job they are doing.

A Parker County deputy caught a person breaking into a car and recovered some items which had been taken in an earlier car burglary in Eastland County. When contacted, the local individual checked and found that their car had indeed been burglarized and the items were reported missing.

And Monday during the noon hour a home northeast of Carbon was burglarized and some guns and other items were taken. By Tuesday morning two young men had been arrested as suspects.

A woman being held for Comanche County was released to them, and another being held on revocation of probation was picked up by Tarrant County. Collin County was to pick up a man being held on revocation of probation.

Jim Hightower's "Special Beef" Proposal

WACO-Texas Commissioner of Agriculture Jim Hightower's proposal to sell "specialty beef" to Europe is nothing but a publicity stunt, the president of the Texas Farm Bureau charged Friday.

"It's his way of trying to soothe the wrath of cattlemen," S.M. True, cotton, grain and cattle raiser, said in response to Hightower's announcement at a news conference Thursday in Austin.

"Hightower's support for the European Community's ban on imports of U.S. beef is based on fraud," True said. "As Commissioner of Agriculture, Hightower should be the first to know that there is absolutely no evidence of a health hazard in hormone use."

True called the ban by the European Community

merely a smokescreen." "They have a surplus of beef and are using this as a trade barrier," he said. "They, too, know there is no health hazard."

The Texas farm leader said the U.S. position opposing the RC's ban on U.S. beef is correct.

"It's correct on the basis of domestic law, it's correct on the basis of international trade, and it is correct on the basis of scientific evidence," he said.

True described Hightower's plan for his agency to sell hormone-free beef to Europe as a "pipe dream."

"Only the federal government can issue meat export certificates," he said. "Beyond technicalities, for beef to be so certified, a government inspector would literally have to stay with a herd full-time."

True said inspections of animals cannot determine whether any hormones detected were administered by man, or manufactured by the animal itself.

"There is simply no way to distinguish meat from animals that were administered U.S.-approved hormones, from meat from animals that were not," he said.

"The tragedy of the present controversy — which was engineered by Hightower — is that the Texas Commissioner of Agriculture, by law, is supposed to be an advocate of agriculture, not an enemy. While pretending to be a friend, he is, in fact, causing terrible damage to the beef cattle industry."

A half-day Economic Workshop is being proposed for Eastland County. The City of Cisco, in cooperation with the Cisco Chamber of Commerce and the West Central Texas Council of Governments (WCTCOG) will be the sponsors of the program. A letter was sent out last week to all businesses in Eastland County to see if they would be interested in attending the Workshop, which would probably be held in early March. Representatives from WCTCOG will give presentations regarding their employment assistance and obtaining government contract

Towns Can Be Recognized For Trees

COLLEGE STATION—By caring for its trees, a city can be recognized by the National Arbor Day Foundation as a "Tree City USA."

To be recognized, a community must have a legally constituted municipal tree body, adopt a city tree ordinance, have a comprehensive community forestry program, and hold an annual Arbor Day observance. This year, National Arbor Day is Jan. 20.

"Most communities can meet these criteria by existing activities," said Dr. Mike Walterscheid, forestry specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"The municipal tree body can be a department, board, commission or other authority which has legal status and is responsible for tree care. This can be a parks board or other similar group," Walterscheid said.

The tree ordinance should designate the department or board responsible for managing the city's trees. It should include the duties of the tree board or other legal group and provide details on operations of the tree program, said Walterscheid, who is based at Texas A&M University.

The comprehensive community forestry program may include a tree inventory and other plans for planting, maintenance and removal of trees. The program must be financed at a minimum of \$2 per capita. Many programs the community already finances, such as utility line clearance, may qualify for this required \$2 per resident. Funds from organizations within the community qualify for this requirement.

"Each year the city's mayor should proclaim an Arbor Day, to include the planting of a commemorative tree," said Walterscheid.

Cities designated as a Tree City USA will receive a special flag, a walnut mounted plaque, and signs for city entrances.

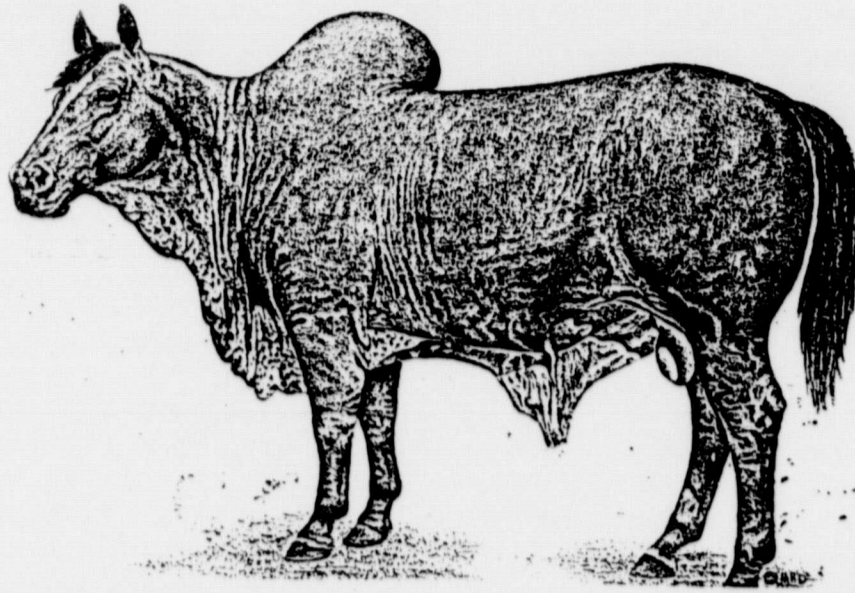

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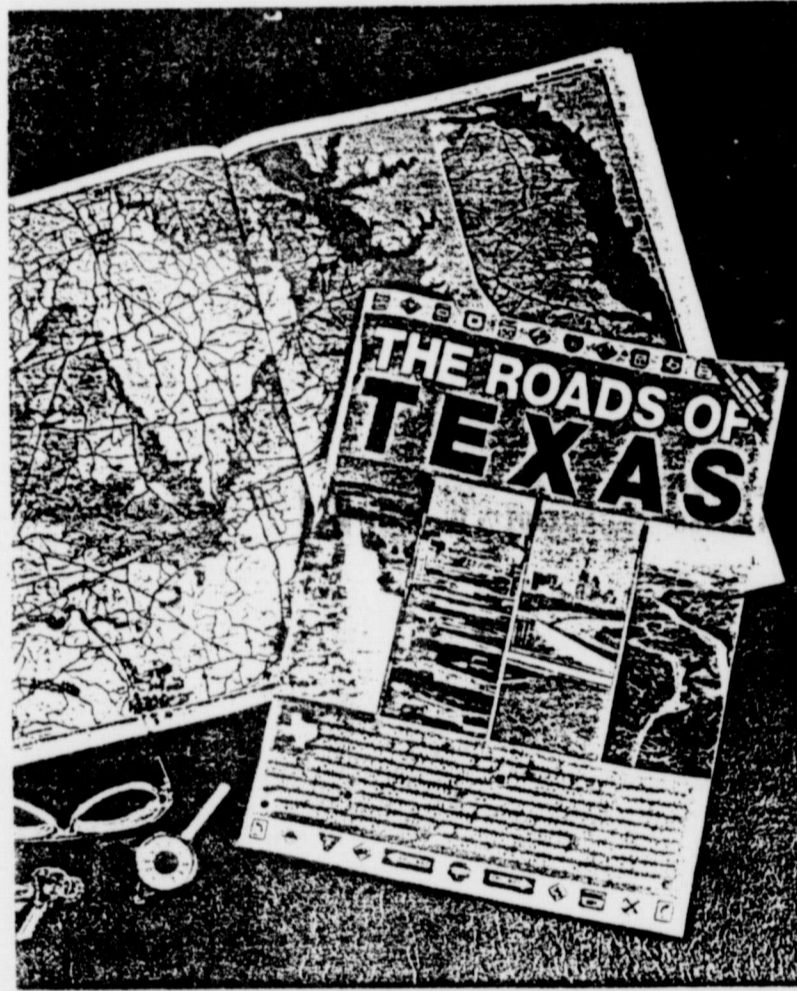

During my short time of bass fishing this one item has been a regular indicator. And as of Monday, January 30, 1989, I have seen 3 separate pairs in flight. So lets all sharpen those hooks and hit the water after those Lone Star Lunkers.

And to really get into the spirit of the hunt, why not make plans now to attend the February 2 meeting of the Eastland County Bass Club. Thursday at 7:30 p.m. anglers from around the area will be meeting at the Eastland National Bank Bldg. Anyone who is interested in learning more about this organization are invited to attend. The E.C.B.C. Board of Directors are asked to arrive at 7:00 p.m. to discuss some very important matters which have been brought before the board for review. And members remember to suggest what lakes and date you would like to fish in the February tournament prior to Thursday night.

Anticipation of the South Bend Reservoir project had built up an down over the years, and now as the project has been indefinitely postponed we can only imagine what benefits another mid-sized lake could have done for the big country. Spokesman for the project stated a recount of proposed water usage made the lake impoundment impractical. The lake would have been near the size of Hubbard Creek and was to be located near South Bend, Hot Wells, and points north of Breckenridge.

Largemouth bass populations at Lake Whitney apparently are holding up well in the face of increased fishing pressure, according to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. The popular central Texas reservoir is one of the state's most varied fisheries, producing largemouth, smallmouth and spotted bass as well as striped bass.

Sipe Springs

Musical Feb. 4

A musical will be held Saturday, February 4 at 6:30 p.m. in the Sipe Springs Community Center. Everyone is invited to attend and all musicians have a special invitation.

Biologist Ken Sellers said fall cove retonone surveys collected 21 pounds of large-mouths per acre, or about the same as the 1987 survey. Electrofishing samples showed a decline in bass numbers from 1987 to 1988 but the population was favorable in both years.

"Even though habitat and cover were reduced in 1988 by lower than normal water levels, reproduction and recruitment to legal sizes was found to be good in both types of sampling. The most common size bass collected was 10 to 13 inches long, indicating anglers should have good success in the coming year."

Sellers reminds fishermen that the daily limit of five black bass per day and minimum length limits of 14 inches applies to largemouth, smallmouth and spotted bass. This is an aggregate limit, which means that only five bass may be retained in any combination of the species.

Lake Whitney is located about 15 miles west of Hillsboro off State Highway 22. Lake Whitney State Recreation area is located on the lake's eastern shoreline, offering full camping facilities and boat ramps. For campsite reservations or other information call the park superintendent at (817) 694-3793.

The bass fishing this past weekend was running right with our weather. If you fished Saturday you probably had a pretty good day. Anglers on Oak Creek had some good catches to 7 pounds on jigs

and spinners. While Sunday a tournament was held and only 3 fish were weighed. Lake Brownwood saw a 7, 5, and a number of 2 to 3 pound fish caught Saturday, but Sunday held nothing for the same pair of anglers. Lake Leon let loose of some nice strings Saturday up to 17 pounds for 5 fish. Sunday if anyone caught a fish at Leon I didn't hear about it.

What's hot on a regular basis? Brady Reservoir, Stamford, Graham, and even though Oak Creek has really fell off steadily, it can bound right back with some warm weather.

Don't forget spring time bass hold the future to this great sport. Live release is a must more so at this time of year than any other.

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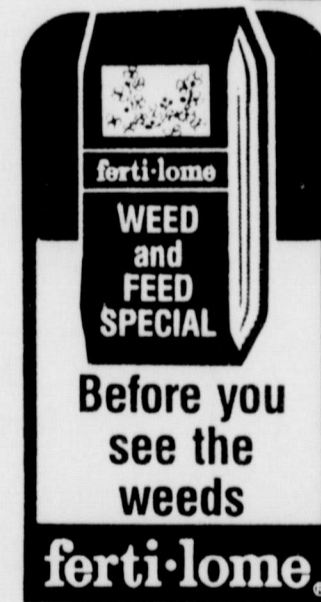
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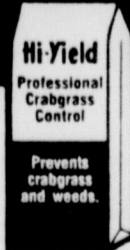
