The Cisco City Council met for their regular meeting on Tuesday, at the city hall and approved a resolution for a general election to be held for the election of Mayor, a three year term, which is presently being held by Joe Wheatley, and council seats, I and II, three year terms, which are held by Allen Masters and Arlie Whitley. The city election will be held on Saturday, May 6, 1989.

M.L. Bailey will be the election judge and Margaret Torres will be the alternate election judge. Ginger Johnson was approved as the absentee voting clerk and Maryann Perry as the deputy absentee voting clerk for the election.

It was brought out in the meeting that Mr. Bailey told Mayor Wheatley that Ginger Johnson made the job very easy, by having all the paper work ready and that's why he would agree to be the election judge again this

Candidates for the three offices may file applications to be placed on the ballot on Monday, February 20. March 22, will be the last day for the candidates to file.

During a public hearing held during the meeting, council members approved a motion to condemn all properties that were listed in a recent resolution, except for one that belongs to Jim Webb of Cisco. That structure is located at 1211 West 10th.

Mayor Joe Wheatley said Mr. Webb had been in touch with him and with city hall, indicating that he will work on the property until it meets city's ordinances.

Mr. Knight said he agrees with the city passing the resolution declaring certain homes as being dangerous, but he suggested that the council work just as heavily on commercial properties.

Mayor Wheatley said the city is aware of this problem

and will soon have litigations against some of these businesses. Wheatley suggested that Mr. Knight keep watching for future lists and he will see some of these businesses on them.

Mike Moore, city manager said the main reason for these lists is to make Cisco more beautiful. He said these homes that are on the lists make an eyesore for the rest of the community who are trying to keep their property clean.

Ken Martin, city engineer with Jacob and Martin, Inc., spoke to the city council Tuesday. He said the city had received a letter in August from the Texas Water Commission asking the city of Cisco to reevaluate the structure of Williamson Dam. But Martin said the cost of the study would be from \$69,000 to \$200,000.

Martin suggested that the city meet with the water commission and see if there could be other alternatives. He said Cisco would probably want to spend that money on their search for more water.

He suggested setting up a monitoring program on the dam and bridge to see if there is any movement in a 6 month, one year or two year period.

Martin said the water commission wants the city to realize there might be trouble with the lam, if there is a large amount of water coming in. He the dam could be lifting up, as in the case with the Possum Kingdom dam. He said Possum Kingdom has had to spend \$13 million and they are not through with the repairs yet.

City Manager Moore told council members that the city has put up barricades on the dam to prevent any traffic going across the dam bridge.

Council members approved an easement for Rex Fields for a water line to be located along the eastern boundary of Lake Cisco Park. Mr. Fields is building a new home in that location. Council members atten-

ding the meeting were John Muller, Bural Chambers, Vernetta Pierce, Olin Odom, III, Arlie Whitely and Allen Masters. City Secretary Ginger Johnson, City manager Mike Moore, and Mayor Joe Wheatley were also in attendance.

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF CISCO, TEXAS DECLARING CERTAIN IM-PROVEMENTS DESCRIB-HEREIN DANGEROUS AND AS PUBLIC NUISANCES, AND REQUIRING THEIR DEMOLITION REMOVAL

WHEREAS, the City Building Inspector has determined that the improvements described below are unsafe and dangerous structures and should be abated through demolition and clearance from the premises; and,

WHEREAS, the owners of the property whose names appear below in regards to the description of the various improvements have failed. neglected or refused to remove the improvements by demolition or to bring them into compliance with approved Building Codes:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CI-TY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CISCO, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. That the improvements and structures described below are hereby declared a public nuisance, dangerous, and a definite bazard to the health and safety of the general public: and they are hereby condenned for removal by demolition in compliance with local code requirements and under the direction of the City Building Inspector.

SECTION 2. That the property owners indicated below shall have sixty (60) days from the date of notification to remove such condemned improvements. After such period of time, if the improvements are not cleared, the City shall have the right to enter onto such property and remove said condemned improvements either by City labor or by private contract. The owner shall be responsible for all actual demo'ition and administrative costs and shall be billed appropriately upon completion of climatitions Failure to remit for such costs shall result in a hen be-

ing placed on the property. SECTION 3. That a copy of this condemnation resolution shall be mailed to all property owners indicated below no later than ten (10) days after approval; and the resolution shall be published at least one (1) time in a newspaper of general circulation in the City of Cisco, Texas.

The hostess for the meeting carried out the Valentine theme in decorations and refreshments, making a very festive at-



Wesley I. Lane Jr., retired aeronautics teacher, aircraft mechanic and history buff, died Sunday, Feb. 5th, at a Fort Worth hospital after a short illness. He was 70.

Funeral was Tuesday, Feb. 7th in Greenwood Memorial Park.

Mr. Lane was a Cherokee Indian by birth and later was adopted by the Comanche and Apache tribes. Both groups will be represented at the service. "It will be a Cowboy and Indian funeral," a son, Jim Lane said.

One will be a world famous Comanche flute player, Doc Tate, who will play, as will a group of Comanche drummers. Don Edwards, the western singer, and a friend of Mr. Lane, will sing two of his favorite songs.

Mr. Lane and his entire family were adopted by the two tribes and he had two adopted sons, one an Apache and one a Comanche who is the great-great-grandson of Chief Quanah Parker. They, too, will be present.

Mr. Lane was born in Rogers, Ark., and grew up in Eastland. He was a student at Texas A&M University until 1943, when he entered the Army Air Corps. He was a warrant officer pilot and also possessed several aviation mechanic's ratings.

When the war ended, he came to Fort Worth, where he taught aeronautics at Technical High School, now Trimble Technical, and attended Christian University at night.

He graduated in 1955 and went to work at General Dynamics. In 1956, he opened a business at Russell Field on the southern edge of Fort Worth near the present site of Miller's Brewery. His firm was a fixed-base operation doing major and minor work on aircraft.

Mr. Lane was the dean of aviation mechanics in the area. He was an inspector for the Federal Aviation Administration, and, until he entered the hospital recently, was working athis Meacham Field operation, Lane Aerotex Inc.

He was a member of Ridglea United Methodist Church, where he was a lay preacher. He was a former Boy Scouts leader and could do anything and be anything,

his son said.

"We like to remember him as a great husband, a great father and a great grandfather," he said.

Beer After Car Accident

Man Said He Drank

A 38-year-old seventhgrade teacher from Artesia, N.M., was found guilty of involuntary manslaughter Wednesday in the May 27 traffic accident on nearby Ranger Hill that left two persons dead.

The seven-woman, fiveman jury sentenced Robert Truett to 10 years of probation and fined \$5,000.

Occurring shortly before midnight, the accident resulted in the death of Shirley Hensley, 47, and her husband Charles, 52, both of Alamogordo, N.M. Truett,

however, was tried only for Mrs. Hensley's death.

Department of Public Safety troopers, who said Truett appeared to have been drinking, testified Truett's eastbound Pontiac rear-ended the Hensleys' small pickup on Interstate 20 while both vehicles were heading down Ranger Hill.

In the trial, Truett testified he had consumed two beers from two six-packs he purchased shortly before leaving Artesia at 2 p.m. He said he drank two more beers in Hobbs, N.M., after stopping to work on his car.

He said the speedometer had stopped working.

Truett said he was given two more beers during a stop at the American Legion Hall in Roscoe.

Following the accident, Truett said, he was in shock upon seeing Mrs. Hensley's body. He said he did not remember drinking the other beers, and that he could not remember what he did with the aluminum cans.

DPS Trooper Steve Foster said that when he administered a test to Truett, it measured .19.

DPS Trooper Richard Treece, who investigated the accident, said Truett's car,

moving at a high rate of speed, was straddling the highway's dividing line when it crashed into the Ford pickup.

Mrs. Hensley, who was thrown from the pickup as it overturned, was pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace Alford Bush. Her husband, trapped beneath the pickup, died later at Ranger General Hospital.


