The Rural Healthcare Transition Grants and the current hospital finances were discussed.

Application for a grant under the Rural Healthcare Transition Grant Program was approved by the Board of Directors. Grants will be awarded to approximately 80 hospitals in the United

grants in September 1989. The purpose of the program is to help rural hospitals determine methods that will be beneficial in coping with the current financial situation faced by all rural hospitals.

Wranglers Lose To Hill; **End Season Here Saturday**

Kevin Madden hit a free throw with 15 seconds left to give the Hill College Rebels a 91-90 win over the CJC Wranglers in Hillsboro Wednesday night. Cisco's Lewis Hicks took the last shot for the Wranglers but it fell short, insuring the Rebels' hard earned victory. With the loss, the Wranglers lost all chances for an NJCAA Region V playoff spot, as their conference record fell to 5-8.

Hill jumped out to an early lead largely due to an abundance of offensive rebounds. They led by as much as 18 points in the first half, but the Wranglers were able to cut the margin to eleven, 60-49, at the intermission. Cisco came back strong in the second half and quickly cut into the lead. The lead changed hands several times in the final four minutes before Madden's winning free throw. Hicks led the Wrangler scoring with 31,

Severe weather warnings are ineffective if the public does not receive the warning or is not knowledgeable on the safety procedures to follow. The purpose of Texas Severe Weather Awareness Week is to provide people with the knowledge necessary to protect their lives when severe weather threatens.

A tornado drill is scheduled for North Texas on Wednesday, March 1, at 10 a.m. At that time there will be a special test of the North Texas NOAA Weather Radio alarm system. The drill will give those in homes, schools, hospitals, and businesses the opportunity to see if they can receive a warning in a timey manner and then take the same precautionary actions which would be taken during an actual tornado event. In some areas, emergency management officials will test local sirens when the practice tornado warning is issued. Should the weather be threatening at that time, the drill will be postponed until the following day Thursday, March 2) at 10

The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration NOAA) sent the following tornado safety rules. A tornado watch means that tornado development is possible. Keep a watchful eye on the sky for threatening weather, and stay tuned to reach a safe building or radio, television, or NOAA Weather Radio for the latest weather information. Radio station KEAS in Eastland has the weather radar at

their station. A tornado warning means that a tornado has been sighted or indicated by weather radar. Persons in the path of the storm should

Governor Proclaims February 27-March 3 As Texas Severe Weather Awarness Week The week of February 27, seek shelter immediately

through March 3, will be preferably on the lowest floor of a substantial building. A basement offers the greatest safety in a home. In homes without basement, take cover in the center part of the house, on the lowest floor, and in a small room information to the public such as a closet or bathroom. about the threat of severe or under sturdy furniture. weather and life-saving Stay away from windows. Do measures to be taken when not attempt to open winsevere weather occurs. dows.

If in schools, hospitals or shopping center, move to predesignated shelter areas. Interior hallways on the lowest floor are best. If the building is not of reinforced construction, go to a nearby one that is. Stay out of auditoriums, gyms, and other structures with long, wide free-span roofs.

If you are in your car, do not try to outrun a tornado. If available, leave your car and get into the nearest ditch or depression until the tornado passes. Cover your head with your hands.

Mobile homes and trailers are particularly vulnerable to overturning during strong winds and should be evacuated when strong winds or tornadoes are possible. Mobile home communities and trailer parks should have a community storm shelter. If there is no shelter nearby, leave the trailer and take cover in a ditch or depression.

When a thunderstorm threatens, move inside a substantial building or a vehicle to protect yourself from lightening. If inside a building avoid using the telephone or electrical appliances, lightening can strike near a building and travel through telephone or electrical lines into the building. Get out of and

away from open water. If outside with no time to vechicle, follow these rules-





Work Reports Due April 17

People who received Social Security benefits and also worked in 1988 may have to file an earnings report by April 17, Glyn Hammons, Social Security manager in Abilene, said recently.

Any beneficiary whose earnings went over the exempt amount is required to file an annual report showing exact earnings for 1988 and estimated earnings for 1989.

Exempt earnings vary for different age groups, Hammons said. For beneficiaries under 65, the 1988 amount was \$6,120; for those 65-69, it was \$8,400. Earnings limits do not apply when workers reach 70.


The exempt figure is the

amount a person can earn in a year and still receive full Social Security benefits. When earnings are over the exempt amount, \$1 in benefits is withheld for each \$2 of earnings over the limit.

The estimate of 1989 earnings in reports filed now will determine what checks will be sent this year. The 1989 exempt figure is \$6,480 for persons under 65 and \$8,880 for those 65-69.

The annual report is very important in avoiding overpayments, and penalties can be imposed for failure to file, Hammons stated. Anyone

who received checks in 1988 and estimated earnings over the exempt amount should have received an annual report form in the mail. Reports can also be obtained from the Abilene Social Security office at 142 S. Pioneer. Questions can be handled by calling 698-1360. Research at Memorial Sloan-Kettering Cancer Center in New York indicates that a synthetic blood-cell growth hormone helps cancer patients maintain a normal blood count in chemotherapy. Without it, a dangerously low blood count could force suspension of treatment.

Vitamin and mineral supplements seems to boost the IQ in youngsters, a British study found. Similar reports come from California State University.

Because diuretics may in some cases increase blood cholesterol and set off abnormal heart rhythms, some doctors order salt restriction for hypertensives, says the Journal of American Medical Association.

To avoid travelers' diarrhea, tourists of the future may take an "immunizing" tonic. Researchers at the University of Maryland School of Medicine are using pregnant cows to produce protective antibodies.

First-time mothers in their early 30s have babies as healthy as the firstborn of women in their 20s, according to the National Infant Mortality Survey. Risks are higher when new mothers are over 40.



Rural Health Texas' Small Towns Face Life-and-Death Crisis

The ready access to medical attention that many urban residents take for granted is becoming less and less of a certainty for most of Texas' 3.2 million rural residents.

Hospitals are closing. Physicians are leaving. Basic medical services no longer are available in many area. Unless federal, state and local policy-makers begin paying more attention to the deteriorating state of rural health care, the residents of the state's small towns may end up paying dearly for the neglect-perhaps with their lives.

Thirty-eight hospitals in rural Texas have gone out of business since 1983 - more than in any other state. Usually, it was the only hospital in the county, and the closing sometimes has led to the departure of that area's physicians and pharmacies as well. Forty-nine of Texas' 254 counties are without a hospital, and 14 do not even have a

Many rural physicians are approaching retirement but cannot find younger men and women willing to assume their practices. Even in those small towns fortunate to have doctors, skyrocketing malfrequently have forced the physicians to curtail certain services. Ninety counties have no means to deliver a

The lack of a hospital or physician would be a serious concern for any community, but it is especially worrisome in rural areas, where the residents tend to be older and more likely to require medical attention. Solving the worsening crisis in rural health care will demand a federal, state and local offi-

Additional financial incentives should be offered to prospective doctors and nurses. On the federal level, Sen. Bentsen's bill would give more hospitals Medicare funds to place their residents in rural areas. At the state level. Rep. McKinney proposes to offer low-interest loans to medical students in return for the promise of a rural practice.

· Washington and Austin do not hold all the answers to the crisis in rural health care. however. Small towns can do much for themselves. The time when each rural county could support its own hospital is long past. Rural communities should be encouraged to form health care consortiums where they can share one another's resources to the advantage of all.

Any new effort to improve rural health care need not

conflict with existing campaigns to promote Dallas and other Texas cities as medical referral centers. Rural hospitals generally are capable of providing only primary care and often must transfer their more seriously ill patients to metropolitan hospitals for more specialized care.

The lifeline that connects rural Texans to hospitals and doctors is severely frayed. It must not break. Accessibility to health care affects not only the well-being of today's rural residents but that of future generations as well. Without a hospital or physician nearby, a rural region easily can lose its economic viability, wither away and die itself.





Traffic rules governing funeral processions differ ometimes from those governing other traffic. These tips may help if you are in a funeral procession (or to be emembered if you encounter one):


