Taxes, Jail Reports, Roads On County Commissioner's Agenda

Eastland County Commissioners voted Monday to waive penalties of around \$715 on County taxes for 1987 owed by Classic Inn of Eastland.

The vote was three in favor and one abstaining on the request, which was brought by Nancy Taylor, manager of the Inn, and Bill Stuart, the owner.

Stuart said that after he had foreclosed on the property he and Mrs. Taylor had inquired of the county tax people about any and all taxes owed for 1987.

They said they paid all taxed they were billed for. Stuart added that he was willing to pay the taxes now billed, but did not think he owed the penalty.

When the Commissioners questioned whether they had the authority to "forgive" tax penalties, County Judge Bailey brought in a copy of a ruling indicating there can be waivers of penalties or interest where an "act or omission caused the taxpayer's delinquencies."

Billy Bacon then made the motion to waive penalties, and the motion had majority approval.

A representative from the Tax Office stated that the County Taxes for Classic Inn in 1987 were carried in the name of the foreclosed owner, making it difficult to determine whom to bill.

In other matters, the Commissioners approved the lease/purchase from Hood King Motor Co. of a replacement car for the Sheriff's Department. This is a 1989 Ford, and will cost \$486.32 monthly, with all maintenance and a 3 yr. 100,000 mi. warranty.

Billy Bacon said that 30 prisoners were in the jail, with nine of them "belonging to lent job painting inside the jail, and might do other painting for the county. The Commissioners appeared to look favorably on this suggestion. during the morning an

architect from Houston appeared in the courtroom, stating that he was from the building firm of Christopher De Stefano & Associates Inc.

He said the firm specialized in jail architecture, and 'We are aware the county is going to be doing something soon.'

The architect went on to list numerous counties where his firm was building or had built jails.

When the Commissioners asked for an approx. cost per bed, they were told that the firm charged around \$26,000 for each additional bed, not counting extras for offices, kitchen space, etc. "We're experienced in this type of thing, as the leading firm in the state," the representative said. He left each Commissioner a good-sized folder to study

Other business included the approval of two bids to furnish crushed rock and other road materials to all the Precincts. The Commissioners accepted the bids from B.C. Construction Co. and J.J. Finley Co., saying that the cost would be basically the same - depending on job sites. The Court stated that these will not be exclusive suppliers, however, in the event of

some short-term basis. Also approved was the closing of FM Rds. 2563 and 2526 south of Eastland Wel-

don Tankersley asked for the road closing, and presented a petition signed by landowners in the vicinity. Proper signs have been posted on the road.


Season With Win

Popcorn, loaded with saturated fats, salts, flavorings and preservatives for microwave case, is far from the nutritional, low-calorie snack many Americans think they are eating.

Unlike the traditional Indian health food with about 25 calories and loads of fiber per cup, microwave popcorn can be a nutritionally questionable snack

More than 70 brands of microwave popcorn lined grocery shelves to meet the 11.9 billion quart-demand for popeorn that Americans ate last year

Taste-teasing flavors contain between 4.5 and 7.9 teaspoons of fat in a typical twoto-three serving pouch. Fat is used for cooking case, not flavor.

A few companies are offering microwave popcorn for the health conscious, providing salt-free and artificial butter varieties.

A revolution to reduce saturated fat in the diet has Americans shying from fats, coconut oil, and palm kernel oil to less saturated vegetable oils.

Health-conscious popcorn caters should read the fine print on packages, noting that avoiding butter-flavored popcorn does not necessary climinate fat intake.

Eastland Countians Visit State Prison Near Palestine

For all of you who always wanted to go to prison but were afraid to go, let me take you on a recent trip to the Michael Unit, one of our 29 State prisons at Tennessee Colony, Texas near Palestine, Texas.

We left Eastland at 6:30 a.m. on a cold morning with nine persons on board. We picked up four more at Ranger as we headed east on I-20.

Bruce Stovall of Cisco was our driver. The comfortable bus was his that he uses for Mission Trips

Dr. Charles Barnes of Rising Star led this sleepy, brave group from Cisco, Gorman, and Ranger. The group were of one mind: the future of Eastland Countyeconomic and social. It is understood that Gov. Clements must build more State prisons in Texas enough to house 11,000 inmates.

Not many people can chat gaily on trivia at 6:30 a.m., but we made a feeble effort with "cat-naps" in between. As the trip progressed we became acquainted and at 8:30 stopped for coffee at the Twin Arches.

Thus refreshed we went on our way and finally hit Fort Worth traffic. We knew we were close to our objective when we saw a sign to Palestine and the trees were tall and thick. I paid close attention to the houses near the prison, but saw no bars on their windows as one would find in some parts of Fort Worth

Quite suddenly, we were there. The buildings were

On entering the prison we were escorted to a conference room with a long table and comfortable chairs surrounding it. The Warden gave a short talk on what we would see and answered our questions. Then he took us to lunch in the Cafeteria used by the employees, but assured us that the prisoners got the same food. The inmates (always dressed in white-not stripes served the food and waited on the tables. They were very

Our first tour was to the maximum security building. was startled to see a woman guard at the door. No guns are used in the prisononly on the perimeter walls. The guards do carry nightsticks. We were shown the room containing the Riot-control equipment including face shields, etc.

professional help I should pause here to say how clean every area of the prison was. Even when we examined a private cell (for 2), the cots were made. They have few articles, however, to clutter a cell! Clean clothes are issued each day. Each group of cells opens

List For Unclaimed Money In Area Banks Given

, THE STATE Treasurer said Monday that more than 110,000 Texans have \$60 million in lost or forgotten money coming to them this year.

The 110,000 are named in the 1989 version of the Texas Treasury Unclaimed Money Fund List which will be published statewide on Sunday, March 5 in 19 newspapers.

All listed accounts, other than those from safe deposit boxes, are worth at least \$50 with the largest account worth more than \$177,000. All safe deposit boxes are listed regardless of the value of the contents.

Generally, accounts on the list are from checking and savings accounts, utility deposits, oil royalties, and corporate stocks.

Most accounts must be dormant from three to five years before they are turned over to the state.

"There is no set time to make a claim on these accounts," the Treasurer said. "Money turned over to the State Treasury can be claimed at any time in the future by the original owner or his or her heirs.'

Persons who find their names on the list can call he Texas State Treasury on its toll-free telephone line at 1-800-654-3463 or they can write the State Treasury at PO Box 17728, Austin, Texas 78745. The toll free line opens






