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## Taxes, Jail Reports, Roads On County Commissioner's Agenda

Eastland County Commissioners voted Monday to waive penalties of around \$715 on County taxes for 1987 owed by Classic Inn of Eastland.

The vote was three in favor and one abstaining on the request, which was brought by Nancy Taylor, manager of the Inn, and Bill Stuart, the owner.

Stuart said that after he had foreclosed on the property he and Mrs. Taylor had inquired of the county tax people about any and all taxes owed for 1987.

They said they paid all taxed they were billed for. Stuart added that he was willing to pay the taxes now billed, but did not think he owed the penalty.

When the Commissioners questioned whether they had the authority to "forgive" tax penalties, County Judge Bailey brought in a copy of a ruling indicating there can be waivers of penalties or interest where an "act or omission caused the taxpayer's delinquencies."

Billy Bacon then made the motion to waive penalties, and the motion had majority approval.

A representative from the Tax Office stated that the County Taxes for Classic Inn in 1987 were carried in the name of the foreclosed owner, making it difficult to determine whom to bill.

In other matters, the Commissioners approved the lease/purchase from Hood King Motor Co. of a replacement car for the Sheriff's Department. This is a 1989 Ford, and will cost \$486.32 monthly, with all maintenance and a 3 yr. 100,000 mi. warranty.

Billy Bacon said that 30 prisoners were in the jail, with nine of them "belonging to T.D.C.," and waiting for room in the State Prisons.

He mentioned the State Jail Standards inspection of the local jail on March 7. "It looks like we're ready for it," he said. "I've seen quite a few jails, but never one as clean as this one is now."

A proposal for some of the jail trustees was on the agenda, involving painting in the courthouse interior. It was reported that several of these trustees had done an excel-

lent job painting inside the jail, and might do other painting for the county. The Commissioners appeared to look favorably on this suggestion.

during the morning an architect from Houston appeared in the courtroom, stating that he was from the building firm of Christopher De Stefano & Associates Inc.

He said the firm specialized in jail architecture, and "We are aware the county is going to be doing something soon."

The architect went on to list numerous counties where his firm was building or had built jails.

When the Commissioners asked for an approx. cost per bed, they were told that the firm charged around \$26,000 for each additional bed, not counting extras for offices, kitchen space, etc. "We're experienced in this type of thing, as the leading firm in the state," the representative said. He left each Commissioner a good-sized folder to study.

Other business included the approval of two bids to furnish crushed rock and other road materials to all the Precincts. The Commissioners accepted the bids from B.C. Construction Co. and J.J. Finley Co., saying that the cost would be basically the same - depending on job sites. The Court stated that these will not be exclusive suppliers, however, in the event of some short-term basis.

Also approved was the closing of FM Rds. 2563 and 2526 south of Eastland Wel-

don Tankersley asked for the road closing, and presented a petition signed by landowners in the vicinity. Proper signs have been posted on the road.

The Commissioners decided on a Quitclaim to the County's interest, if any, in Lots 2 and 3, Block 1 of the Newman addition in the city of Cisco. The present owner of this property is Gerald Jackson.

Depository pledge contracts were each approved with First National Bank of Cisco and with Olney Savings of Eastland. The contract with Eastland National Bank will be on the agenda for the next meeting, which will be March 13.

## Bank Receives Bronze Statue

## Is Opportunity Knocking?

A suggestion being heard at this time in the Dallas/Ft. Worth Metroplex is that a "Wave" airport be built to take part of the heavy traffic load off the D/FW Airport. Such an airport would be a stop for cross-country fliers to change planes rather than for large numbers of people to board or disembark from aircraft.

Those making the suggestion propose that it should be built in a less densely populated area between sixty and ninety miles from the Metroplex.

It just happens that Ranger and Desdemona are eighty miles or less from the Metro-

plex and Eastland is about ninety miles. Could there be a potential location for such a facility in the eastern edge of Eastland County?

In addition to airport operations people, including air traffic controllers, maintenance people and safety personnel, which a Wave airport would employ, there could be aircraft maintenance and repair facilities with their crews and the planes could also change air crews, making Eastland County, and probably the Lake Leon Area, an attractive place for some of these airline employees to reside also.

The Eastland County Eco-

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nomic Development Council is presently trying to bring a state prison to the county, how about a major airport too? Could this be something that Eastland County could work with adjoining counties, such as Erath, Palo Pinto, and Stephens, to secure?

## Allen Masters Files For Council Re-Election

Allen Masters, member of the Cisco City Council re-filed for council place No. 1, last Friday, according to a report from City Hall.

## Cisco Police Investigate Terroristic Reports

## CJC Wranglers End Season With Win

Mark Chambers scored 26 points and pulled down 14 rebounds to lead the CJC Wranglers to a 110-101 season ending victory over the Grayson College Vikings at Wrangler Gym Saturday. The loss for Grayson prevented them from winning a clear cut NTJCCAC conference championship. Cisco finished the season with a 14-15 season record. They finished fifth in conference play with a 6-8 record.

Cisco gained the lead midway through the first half, and gradually built it to a 55-45 lead at the intermission. Grayson made several runs at the Wranglers during the second period, cutting the margin to two at 74-72, at one point. However, the Wranglers came back strong late in the game to preserve the win. In addition to Chambers' 26 points, Eric Brown, Lewis Hicks, Adrian Hill, and Linwood Lambert scored in double figures with 22, 21, 14 and 11 points respectively. Hill was the assist leader with four.

For the season, the

Wranglers were one of the top scoring teams in the nation, averaging 94.7 points per game. They were successful on 51.4% of their field goal attempts, and were 74.3% from the free throw line. Hicks, a 5-10 freshman guard from Garland, led the team in scoring with a 22 point per game average. Chambers, a 6-4 sophomore forward from Fort Worth, led the team in rebounding with 10.5 per game, and was the second leading scorer at 17.3. Hicks led the team in assists with four per game.

The Wranglers will return seven of the nine players that finished the season. Only Chambers and Ronald Ateman, a 6-5 forward from Garland, are sophomores. Chambers was picked by his teammates as the team's Most Valuable Player, while Hicks received the Newcomer Award, and Hill received the Hustle Award. In addition, Hicks was picked on the All-Conference First Team, while Chambers and Ateman were named to the second team.

## Parents Should Monitor Television Viewing, Says TCU Professor

Recent research on young adult males who watch graphically violent videos indicates that continued exposure resulted in more acceptance of violence in the real world. Although there is little conclusive data on how violent films or programming impact younger children, a Texas Christian University psychologist says there's little doubt in his mind that they can be adversely affected.

"It's very difficult to conduct this type of research on minors, so the evidence concerning the effect of violent programming on young children is not conclusive," stated Dr. David Cross. "However, the Society for Research and Child Development has taken an official

position against allowing children to watch violent television."

The highly impressionable nature of young children is one reason many experts have adopted this stand on violent programming for children, noted Cross.

"Through my testing with infants, I have found that they pick up on everything we do, even the things we don't want them to learn," he said. "Knowing this it is inconceivable to me they aren't affected by what they see on television."

It's important for parents to get involved and to monitor what their children are watching, added Cross. Getting involved often makes it possible to turn even negative viewing material into a positive learning experience for the child.

## Cities Can Receive Rebates Faster With Direct Deposit

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Friday that Texas cities, counties and transit authorities that impose local sales taxes can get their tax rebates even faster through a new direct deposit program.

"The pilot program has been so successful that I believe all the local governments can benefit from it. We've proven that it works, and we're ready to handle every city and county in Texas if they want it," Bullock said.

Taxing units will get their money faster by taking part in the direct deposit program since the money will electronically transferred, while the state will save money in paper, envelopes and postage, according to Bullock.

Bullock said 56 cities that participated in the test program now receive their monthly allocation checks by direct deposit, and he urged the 995 other cities that impose local sales tax to add their names to the list.

All but one of the state's seven transit taxing units already get their tax rebates electronically, Bullock said, and he hopes most of the 91 Texas counties that impose

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## Vernie R. Glasson, III Elected To TFB Board Of Directors

WACO—Vernie R. Glasson, III, director of public affairs for the Texas Farm Bureau since 1984, has been elected by the TFB Board of Directors as executive director of the 326,000-member farm organization, effective April 1.

He will succeed Warren Newberry, who has served as administrator of the TFB since 1972, and who will retire on April 1. In Newberry's 17 years as top staff person, the organization increased membership from 136,943 to 326,167, a gain of 189,222 member families.

As chief administrator, Glasson will direct the activities of 675 employees of the TFB and its service affiliates. Of those, 460 are located in the Waco headquarters. He will work closely with TFB President S.M. True of Plainview in carrying out the directions of the 13-member Board of Directors.

A search committee appointed by True recommended the 42-year-old Glasson for the position. The Board, opening its three-day meeting Wednesday, made the selection of Glasson the first order of business.

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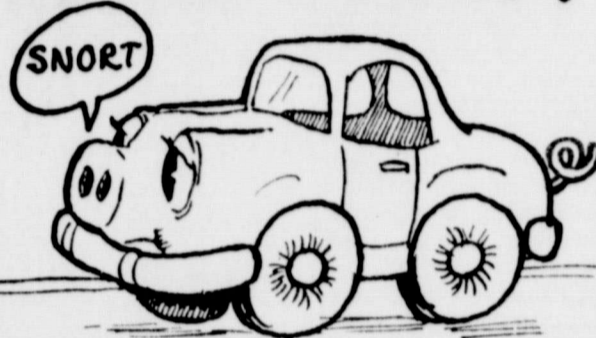
research, education and policy development.

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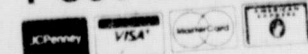
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# Homemaking Hints

## From Janet Thomas, County Agent

### MICROWAVE POP-CORN LACKS NUTRITIONAL VALUE

Popcorn, loaded with saturated fats, salts, flavorings and preservatives for microwave ease, is far from the nutritional, low-calorie snack many Americans think they are eating.

Unlike the traditional Indian health food with about 25 calories and loads of fiber per cup, microwave popcorn can be a nutritionally questionable snack.

More than 70 brands of microwave popcorn lined grocery shelves to meet the 11.9 billion quart demand for popcorn that Americans ate last year.

Taste-teasing flavors contain between 4.5 and 7.9 teaspoons of fat in a typical two-to-three serving pouch. Fat is used for cooking ease, not flavor.

A few companies are offering microwave popcorn for the health conscious, providing salt-free and artificial butter varieties.

A revolution to reduce saturated fat in the diet has Americans shying from fats, coconut oil, and palm kernel oil to less saturated vegetable oils.

Health-conscious popcorn eaters should read the fine print on packages, noting that avoiding butter-flavored popcorn does not necessarily eliminate fat intake.

The best advice for the health-conscious popcorn

consumer is to stick with air-popped with butter flavored salt or chili powder to add flavor.

If you must have microwave popcorn, read the label and buy the brand with the lowest fat content per serving.

### RECIPE OF THE WEEK

**STRAWBERRY CHIFFON SQUARES**  
1 1/2 cups vanilla wafer crumbs (about 45 wafers)  
1/3 cup margarine or butter, melted  
1 3 oz. package strawberry flavor gelatin  
3/4 cup boiling water  
1 14 oz. can sweetened condensed milk (Not evaporated milk)  
1 10 oz. package frozen sliced strawberries in syrup, thawed  
4 cups miniature marshmallows

1 cup (1/2 pint) whipping cream, whipped  
Combine crumbs and margarine; press firmly on bottom of 12 x 7 inch baking dish. In large mixing bowl, dissolve gelatin in water; stir in sweetened condensed milk and undrained strawberries. Fold in marshmallows and whipped cream. Pour into prepared dish. Chill 2 hours or until set. Garnish as desired. Refrigerate leftovers.

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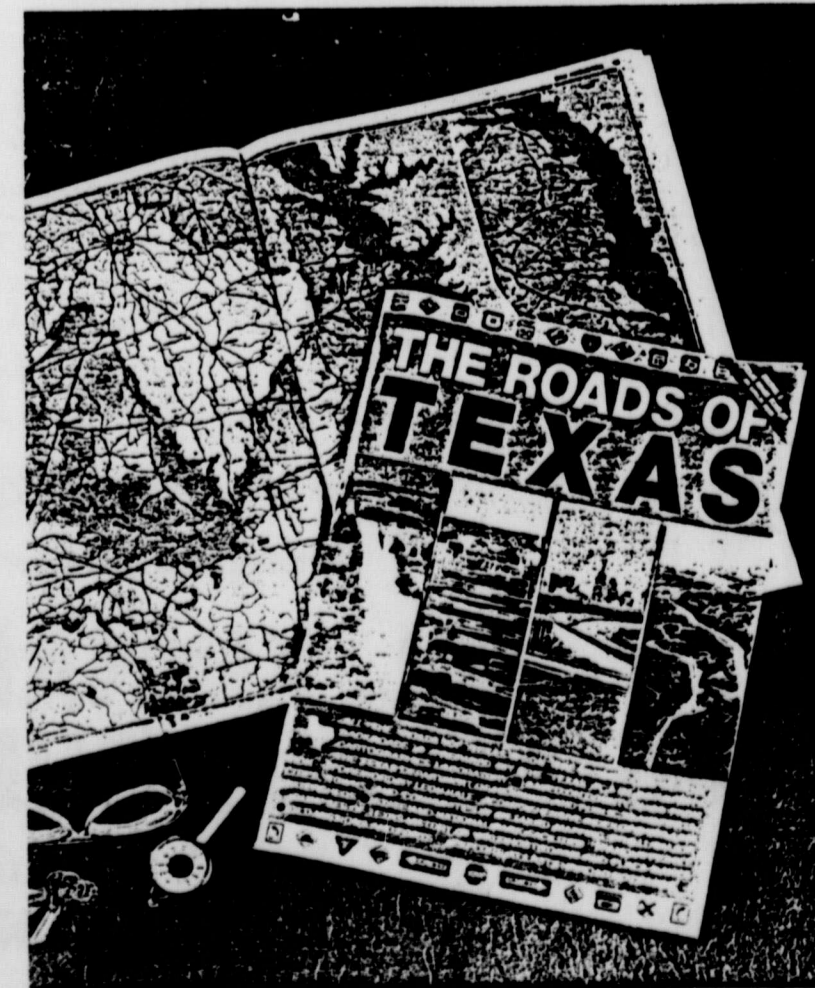

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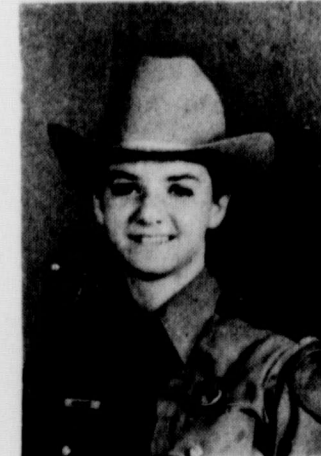
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## Eastland Countians Visit State Prison Near Palestine

For all of you who always wanted to go to prison but were afraid to go, let me take you on a recent trip to the Michael Unit, one of our 29 State prisons at Tennessee Colony, Texas near Palestine, Texas.

We left Eastland at 6:30 a.m. on a cold morning with nine persons on board. We picked up four more at Ranger as we headed east on I-20.

Bruce Stovall of Cisco was our driver. The comfortable bus was his that he uses for Mission Trips.

Dr. Charles Barnes of Rising Star led this sleepy, brave group from Cisco, Gorman, and Ranger. The group were of one mind: the future of Eastland County—economic and social. It is understood that Gov. Clements must build more State prisons in Texas enough to house 11,000 inmates.

Not many people can chat gaily on trivia at 6:30 a.m., but we made a feeble effort with "cat-naps" in between. As the trip progressed we became acquainted and at 8:30 stopped for coffee at the Twin Arches.

Thus refreshed we went on our way and finally hit Fort Worth traffic. We knew we were close to our objective when we saw a sign to Palestine and the trees were tall and thick. I paid close attention to the houses near the prison, but saw no bars on their windows as one would find in some parts of Fort Worth.

Quite suddenly, we were there. The buildings were large and enclosed with two tall fences of strong steel netting topped by large rolls of razor-wire. How anyone would ever escape is a mystery to me.

We waited, huddled against the cold, for a Warden to clear us for entrance. I remember seeing a heavy steel door roll to one side for us to enter and then close behind us with a bang. All the doors were opened by remote control. After clearing another door, we waited in an area surrounded by 10 foot steel netting topped with the roll of razor-wire. Finally our Warden came and greeted us. We dutifully followed him—not wanting to get left or lost!

On entering the prison we were escorted to a conference room with a long table and comfortable chairs surrounding it. The Warden gave a short talk on what we would see and answered our questions. Then he took us to lunch in the Cafeteria used by the employees, but assured us that the prisoners got the same food. The inmates (always dressed in white—not stripes served the food and waited on the tables. They were very courteous and gave good service.

Our first tour was to the maximum security building. I was startled to see a woman guard at the door. No guns are used in the prison—only on the perimeter walls. The guards do carry nightsticks. We were shown the room containing the Riot-control equipment including face shields, etc.

## County Extension Work - Highlight For 1988

The recent County Extension Program Council Meeting and Appreciation Dinner included a review of the 1988 planning and accomplishments of this group and County Agents DeMarquis Gordon, Janet Thomas and Crystal Wilbanks.

As Council Chairman Charles Walker went down the list of he mentioned that he was only giving highlights - there was simply not time to go over details of these events. Those attending the dinner were given a booklet, however, listing all the activities and programs during the year.

This remarkable collection makes one understand why agriculture continues to be the leading enterprise for Eastland County - bringing approx. \$28 million annually into the local economy. The list covers a wide scope of activities - something to interest almost everyone.

1988 AGRICULTURAL SUMMARY OF ACCOMPLISHMENTS

The cells were along the walls with the exercise yards, covered inside and outside with 10 foot steel netting and netting across the sky as well. These prisoners get one hour of TV a day and one hour of exercise; the rest of the time is spent in the cell. Library books are brought to them.

I was glad to move on to the regular prison where the inmates have more freedom. Some were in the exercise yard while others were in the Legal library, or waiting to see the doctor. We toured the medical and dental facility next. Both are up to date and fully staffed with professional help.

I should pause here to say how clean every area of the prison was. Even when we examined a private cell (for 2), the cots were made. They have few articles, however, to clutter a cell! Clean clothes are issued each day. Each group of cells opens

into a recreation area with tables and attached stools. All furniture is steel. The craft room may be used also, after the prisoner is searched.

The education system—yes, school as usual—goes on each day. We got to see some of the classes with women teachers. They have no discipline problems in the classrooms! The inmates can get their G.E.D., BS or BA degrees, or learn a trade. The inmates also work at this prison to provide the meat for all the Texas prison system. (We didn't tour their meat packing plant.)

Time was growing late and we had to hurry along to the visitation area for our final talk and goodbyes.

We had a long trip back and time to reflect on all we had seen and heard. Some bits of information deeply impressed me: like the Warden saying his father was a minister, but the Warden felt his job was the same as his father's—caring and helping people.

Most of these inmates are from broken homes, low income groups, or poor family

life with alcohol and drug abuse.

I would not be afraid to have a prison in Eastland County now. You would agree with me, if you could see for yourself what the T.D.C. is trying to do for these people.

It's dark now and Bruce has turned the lights on in the bus. Time soon to say goodbye and gather our things as we go our separate ways. We are one mind still—dreaming of a better future for all our Eastland County folks.

Research at Memorial Sloan-Kettering Cancer Center in New York indicates that a synthetic blood-cell growth hormone helps cancer patients maintain a normal blood count in chemotherapy. Without it, a dangerously low blood count could force suspension of treatment.

Vitamin and mineral supplements seems to boost the IQ in youngsters, a British study found. Similar reports come from California State University.

Because diuretics may in some cases increase blood cholesterol and set off abnormal heart rhythms, some doctors order salt restriction for hypertensives, says the Journal of American Medical Association.

To avoid travelers' diarrhea, tourists of the future may take an "immunizing" tonic. Researchers at the University of Maryland School of Medicine are using pregnant cows to produce protective antibodies.

First-time mothers in their early 30s have babies as healthy as the firstborn of women in their 20s, according to the National Infant Mortality Survey. Risks are higher when new mothers are over 40.

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
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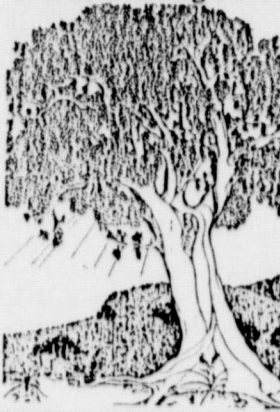
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**News Briefs**

**CISCO**

Application for a grant under the Rural Healthcare Transition Program has been approved by the Board of Directors of Graham Memorial Hospital of Cisco. The grants will be awarded in September, 1989, with the purpose to help rural hospitals determine methods to cope with the current financial situation. During the past 12 1/2 months the Cisco Hospital District has used \$342,000 to keep the hospital open. There is approx. \$100,000 in reserve. Marvin Cole, administrator, says the possibility of losing the hospital has increased, but no time table for such an action has been discussed. Various measures are being taken to keep the hospital open until the state and national legislatures can enact programs to give fair pay for hospital services in Cisco and other rural towns.

The Cisco Chamber of Commerce is now accepting applications for the Christmas in May program, according to Rex Fields, Vice-President in charge of community affairs. Application blanks may be picked up at the Chamber office, 309 Conrad Hilton, and returned on or before March 17. This year's workday is May 6, and volunteers are needed for the Program. ## List For Unclaimed Money In Area Banks Given

THE STATE Treasurer said Monday that more than 110,000 Texans have \$60 million in lost or forgotten money coming to them this year.

The 110,000 are named in the 1989 version of the Texas Treasury Unclaimed Money Fund List which will be published statewide on Sunday, March 5 in 19 newspapers.

All listed accounts, other than those from safe deposit boxes, are worth at least \$50 with the largest account worth more than \$177,000. All safe deposit boxes are listed regardless of the value of the contents.

Generally, accounts on the list are from checking and savings accounts, utility deposits, oil royalties, and corporate stocks.

Most accounts must be dormant from three to five years before they are turned over to the state.

"There is no set time to make a claim on these accounts," the Treasurer said. "Money turned over to the State Treasury can be claimed at any time in the future by the original owner or his or her heirs."

Persons who find their names on the list can call the Texas State Treasury on its toll-free telephone line at 1-800-654-3463 or they can write the State Treasury at PO Box 17728, Austin, Texas 78745. The toll free line opens

at noon on March 5.
