When asked what she would do with the money garnered from the sale, April replied, first should pay expenses from her steer and then set the rest aside for her college education, adding that she wants to attend Texas

teen University and study law. April is a 7 year member of the Eastland 4-H Club. Morgan has been involved with 4-H and steer showing activities for 1 year and Jordan is just waiting her turn to be in the spotlight. Hard work and winning is a tradition with the Moylan family. April and her sister, Morgan, work continuously

each summer and through the school year preparing their animals for show. They attend approximately 35 shows during the summer months, plus the major stock shows during the winter. Big brother, Jim, has been a great influence on the Moylan ladies. He began showing steers in the early 1970's and was very successful in his endeavors. His enthusiasm and intensity for the steer showing business has rubbed off on the rest of the family. The Moylan's devote a tremendous amount of their time and energy to "making the best better". They are an inspiration to others involved with 4-H and FFA projects.

## Fishing Outdoors

### "Giants of Gibbons Creek"

The 2,500 surface acre Gibbons Creek Reservoir is created by a one and one quarter mile long earthen dam. This body of water serves as a cooling pond for the lignite fired Gibbons Creek Steam Electric Station, which supplies electric power for the cities of Bryan, Denton, Garland and Greenville, Texas. Texas Municipal Power Agency has developed the following regulations for Gibbons Creek Reservoir Land and Water Areas to insure public safety and enjoyment without interfering with the safe and efficient operation of the power plant. These rules may be amended from time to time as conditions dictate.

Access to the GCR Land and Water Area is permitted only from County Road 164 off FM 244 one quarter miles north of the intersection of FM 244 and Hwy. 30 in Carlos, Grimes County, Texas.

The Gibbons Creek Reservoir Land and Water Areas will be open daily except for Wednesdays, Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Day, New Years Day and Easter, according to the following schedule: 5:30 a.m. - 9:30 p.m. Entrance to the GCR facilities is available by permit only. A permit can be obtained only at the access point entrance station.

Land and Water use permits are valid from the time of entry until the closing time

on the date shown on the permit face. Vehicle Entry Permit \$2.00; Personal Admission fee, 13 years and older \$1.50; 12 years and younger FREE; Boat Launch Fee \$2.00.

Gibbons Creek also has a special slot limit length restriction for largemouth black bass. All largemouths between 14 and 21 inches in length must be released. The daily bag limit for largemouth black bass is the three per person per day.

Last week I had the opportunity to visit Gibbons for a few days. The lake level had risen to around 6 inches above normal, and a cold front had passed thru the prior day. Fishing was tough, to say the least for myself and the other anglers hoping to land a lunker. The largest fish reported at the check station was a 20", 6 1/2 pound fish. However Tuesday prior to the frontal passage a 11 pound 6 ounce beauty was caught.

The bass at Gibbons Creek were staging towards spawning and with a couple of sunny days the action will be hot and heavy. So if you do plan a trip you might want to call and make reservations at (409) 873-2424.

# John C. Jones Meets With Famous Author And Hunter Peter Capstick

Famous author and White Hunter, Peter Hathaway Capstick, who has authored "Maneaters, Safari, Death in Silent Place, Death in Dark Continent," and numerous other books and hundreds of outdoor articles, met with Eastland County resident John C. Jones, pastor of Mountain Top Church of Cisco, also Master Guide, and president, for the Amazon Fly Fishing Lodge located in the Amazon Jungle and discussed doing one of the famous Capstick videos and also a book working out of the Amazon Fly Fishing Lodge, with Rev. Jones as Master Guide for him.

The meeting took place at the Dallas Safari Club Convention recently held in Dallas. Rev. Jones has been doing missions work in the Amazon Jungle for six years now. He has also been pastoring the growing and progressive Mountain Top church that has recently relocated from 10 miles out in the country, to the three acres, in Cisco, which contain the previous Spot restaurant. 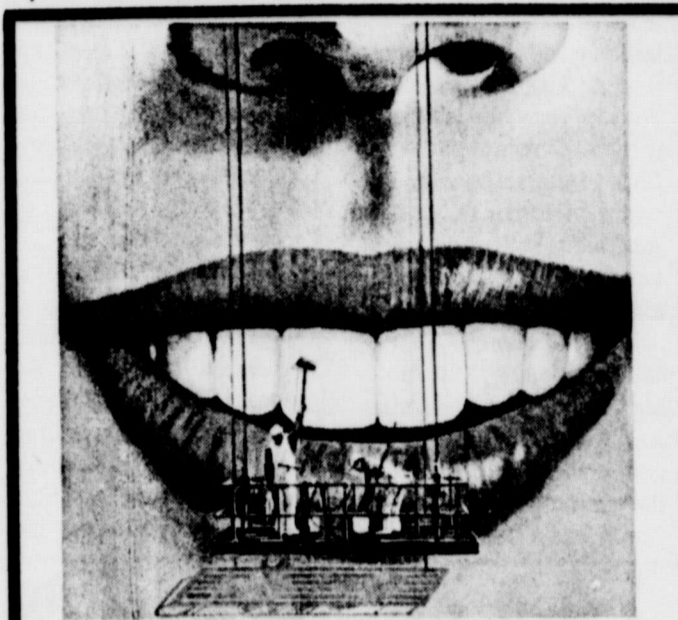

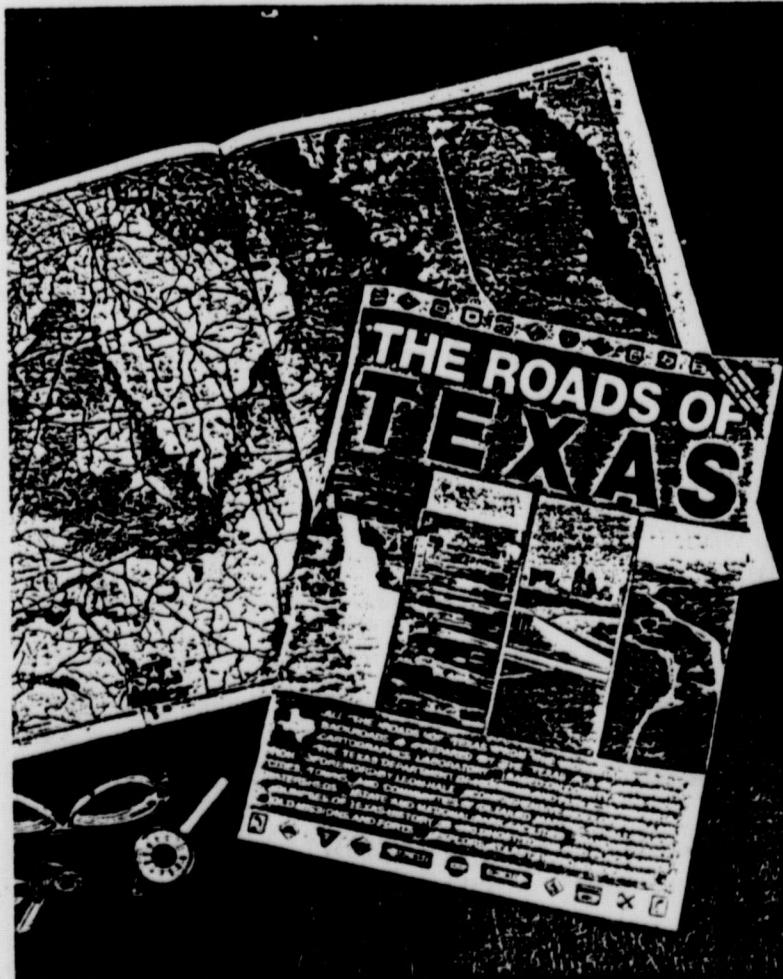

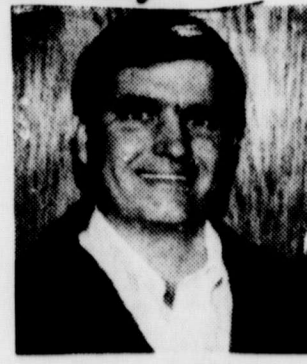

### Pharmacy Topics

By Bob Mueller

Research at Memorial Sloan-Kettering Cancer Center in New York indicates that a synthetic blood-cell growth hormone helps cancer patients maintain a normal blood count in chemotherapy. Without it, a dangerously low blood count could force suspension of treatment.

Vitamin and mineral supplements seems to boost the IQ in youngsters, a British study found. Similar reports come from California State University.

Because diuretics may in some cases increase blood cholesterol and set off abnormal heart rhythms, some doctors order salt restriction for hypertensives, says the Journal of American Medical Association.

To avoid travelers' diarrhea, tourists of the future may take an "immunizing" tonic. Researchers at the University of Maryland School of Medicine are using pregnant cows to produce protective antibodies.

First-time mothers in their early 30s have babies as healthy as the firstborn of women in their 20s, according to the National Infant Mortality Survey. Risks are higher when new mothers are over 40.




