

Gerry Wing Dies In Fire In Missouri

Gerald W. (Gerry) Wing, 48, of Cisco, died in a house fire in Booneville, Missouri, early last Wednesday morning. His brother, Clark was seriously burned in the fire. He is in the Intensive Care Unit at University Hospital, in Columbia, Missouri, with first and second degree burns over 70 percent of his body

The brothers had travelled to Missouri to attend the funeral of their mother, Magorie Thornton. Mrs. Thornton had died on February 23, in the University Hospital in Columbia, Missouri. Her funeral was held on Tuesday

The fire started in the wee hours of the morning and had been smoldering for several hours. It was spotted at 6 a.m. Firemen said the fire was probably started from careless smoking. Gerry was sleeping on the coach in the living room, and firemen said this is where the fire started.

Clark was sleeping in the back bedroom and when he was awaken from smoke, he ran to the front of the house. and was able to escape through a side window. He was taken to the Booneville hospital and then later transferred to the University Hosptial.

In the burglary of a home 11 miles northwest of Cisco on Hwy. 6 between February 23 and February 27, three table lamps, two oriental wood carvings of men, about a foot tall with ivory teeth, an adjustable portable television antenna, and a storm door were taken. fiscal year. Moore said the city is doing better this year on the penalty and interest revenue from past due taxes. He said 41 percent of that amount or \$898.00 came in during January

Moore said the sales tax revenue for January was down from the budget estimate. He said the city received checks for \$7,399.75 last month which is only 27 percent. But all in all, Moore said the city of Cisco has received 47 percent of the total budgeted revenue.

Moore said the sanitation department had unexpected expenditures during the month of January. He said the city had to spend \$4,574.75 in equipment repairs and that hurt the budget. He said in February the city had to pay an additional \$18,000 in repairs. He told council members that he hopes this kind of expenditures only comes along once in every 5 years.





The 2,500 surface acre Gibbons Creek Reservoir is created by a one and one quarter mile long earthen dam. This body of water serves as a cooling pond for the lignite fired Gibbons Creek Steam Electric Station, which supplies electric power for the cities of Bryan, Denton, Garland and Greenville, Texas. Texas Municipal Power Agency has developed the following regulations for Gibbons Creek Reservoir Land and Water Areas to insure public safety and enjoyment without interfering with the safe and efficient operation of the power plant. These rules may be amended from time to time as conditions dictate. Access to the GCR Land and Water Area is permitted north of the intersection of FM 244 and Hwy. 30 in Carlos, Grimes County, Texas. The Gibbons Creek Reservoir Land and Water Areas will be open daily except for Wednesdays, Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Day, New Years Day and Easter, according to the following schedule 5:30 a.m. - 9:30 p.m. Entrance to the GCR facilities is available by permit only. A permit can be obtained only at the access point entrance station.

Gibbons Creek also has a special slot limit length restriction for largemouth black bass. All largemouths between 14 and 21 inches in length must be released. The daily bag limit for largemouth black bass is the three per person per day.

Research at Memorial Sloan-Kettering Cancer Center in New York indicates that a synthetic blood-cell growth hormone helps cancer patients maintain a normal blood count in chemotherapy. Without it, a dangerously low blood count could force suspension of treatment.

Vitamin and mineral supplements seems to boost the IQ in youngsters, a British study found. Similar reports come from California State University.

Because diuretics may in some cases increase blood cholesterol and set off abnormal heart rhythms, some doctors order salt restriction for hypertensives, says the Journal of American Medical Association.

To avoid travelers' diarrhea, tourists of the future may take an "immunizing" tonic. Researchers at the University of Maryland School of Medicine are using pregnant cows to produce protective antibodies.

First-time mothers in their early 30s have babies as healthy as the firstborn of women in their 20s, according to the National Infant Mortality Survey. Risks are higher when new mothers are over 40.
