## Hospital Board To Discuss Tax Rate Increase Wed.

The Cisco Hospital Board of Directors will have their regular meeting on Wednesday, March 15, at 1:00 p.m., at E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital.

Two important items are on the agenda. One will be a discussion by board members concerning placing a proposal on the May 6, Cisco general election ballot, of a significant tax rate increase for the Cisco Hospital

District over the next three years.

Marvin Cole, hospital administrator, said Senator Lloyd Bentsen has a new bill that if passed, will supplement rural hospitals with the same amount as the larger hospitals. He said the bill has to be passed, and then the new program will go through a 4-year phase. He said at that time, the smaller rural hospitals will have a fighting

chance of staying open. Cole said that is what the hospital board of directors are looking at, when discussing a tax increase for Cisco.

The second item on the agenda is discussions on the emergency room coverage and the problems with the cost of the emergency room.

The meeting is open to the public.

## Council To Discuss Williamson Dam Study

The regular meeting of Cisco City Council will be at 6 p.m. Tuesday, March 14, in the council chambers at City Hall.

Old business to be discussed will be to consider a request of West Texas Disposal to reduce the monthly lease rate on property leased for salt water disposal facility,

and to report on the meeting with the Texas Water Commission representative regarding the requested study of Williamson Dam.

Item I of new business will be to consider approval of a resolution of the City of Cisco authorizing the city to submit a vendor direct deposit application and to enter into

an agreement with the State of Texas to participate in the pilot program for the direct deposit of payments from the State of Texas. Item II will be to consider designating the week of March 27-31 as Spring Clean-Up Week in Cisco.

A citizen-council discussion period will follow.

## County Commissioners To Have Full Agenda Mon.

The Eastland County Commissioners will hold a regular meeting on Monday, March 13, with a number of items under consideration. Among these are the Opening of Bids on Insurance Proposals for the County, consideration of the approval of County Depository Contract and Pledge Agreement, and the request for a pipeline in Pct. by Mobil Oil Corp.

Bengal Gas Corp. has placed a request on the agenda for approval of a pipeline in Pct. 4. On other road matters, the Commissioners will discuss damage to a county Rd. 126 in Pct. 4, reportedly by Enray Corp.

There will be budget adjustments and other matters, including a Jail Standards and Jail Inspection Report. This should fall in the department of "good news," with the Eastland County Jail coming

through the March 7 State Inspection with high marks.

Construction may start as soon as April.

The roadway is scheduled to be closed to thru-traffic for an estimated period of two

months. The construction will consist of removing the existing guard rail, regarding the vertical alignment, placing lime in the subgrade, and placing six inches of new flexible base material on the road.

## Bruce Stovall And Rick Roark File For CISD Board: Kitty McCracken Files For Hospital Board

In the school board election to be held May 6, in Cisco, incumbent Bruce Stovall re-filed as a candidate for School board Trustee Place II, last Thursday. Incumbent Rick Roark said he would re-file as a candidate for School board Trustee Place III, on Friday.

School positions up for election this year are Bruce Stovall's seat, Place II; Rick Roark's seat, Place III; and Place No. 1, occupied by Allen McGINNESS, who has not indicated whether he will file as a candidate for election or not.

Qualifications required for school board candidates include, be a registered voter

in the county of Eastland and file by March 22. Candidates may file at the CISD superintendent's office, at the Cisco Elementary School.

Kitty McCracken filed to be a candidate for one of the two seats available in the May 6 election of the Cisco Hospital Board of Directors last Friday morning. These two seats are presently held by DeAlva Chambers and Vergil Patrick. Neither one had indicated whether they will re-file as candidates.

Candidates may file for the election at the E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital. Forms must be filed by March 22.

Two persons have filed for the three places on the city ballot, incumbents Joe Wheatley and Allen Masters. Wheatley has re-filed for Cisco Mayor and Masters has filed for City of Cisco Council place No. 1.

City Council positions up for election this year are Wheatley's and Master's seats and Place No. II, presently occupied by Arlie Whitley. Mr. Whitley has not indicated if he will or will not seek re-election of the seat.

Candidates may file for the City Council places at City Hall, 116 West 7th.

The sign-up period for candidates will continue for each election until March 22.

## TDC Spokesman Shares Economic Development Ideas

The Annual Ranger Chamber of Commerce Banquet was held Thursday night at Lone Cedar Country Club.

Around 200 Eastland Counties attended the banquet and were served: Steak, green beans, baked potato, tea, and cake.

Ron Butler, Ranger Junior College Athletic Director, was Master of Ceremonies. He introduced Chamber delegates from Eastland, Cisco, Gorman, and Rising Stars.

Ron Butler introduced the main speaker; Mr. Jerry Hodge, Vice-Chairman of TDC.

Mr. Hodge began his speech by thanking Ranger and Eastland County for making his short stay so comfortable and "homey". He explained that he was not born in Amarillo but in a small community in Oklahoma, known as Goodybo. He spoke of growing up with certain values such as: prayer in school, the pledge of allegiance and singing the National Anthem. He regretfully feels that our kids are missing these values.

He spoke of Economic Hard Times; for the city of Amarillo has experienced the same loss of revenues as that of Eastland County. But he feels we are stepping in the right direction with our new found unity of the towns on the prison issue.

The need for more beds and space is an on going flaw in the prison system. There is a backlog of prisoners waiting to enter TDC, but because of Judge Justice's decree, the prison can only hold 95% of their capacity.

A Criminal Justice Task Force was formed and has met in Houston to discuss the building of new prisons. 11,000 new beds are needed. There are 60,000 inmates out

on parole and 400,000 on probation at this time. For every prisoner entered there must be one paroled.

On the economic side of the issue of a prison; construction costs alone will be 55 to 60 million in cost.

The completed building time is around 18 months and would bring in a yearly payroll of 1 1/2 million. 700 to 850 people would be needed to staff the prison. And, of

course, a prison is Recession Proof!

To attract a prison, he suggested that we do the following: Unite in our efforts, provide suitable land for both agricultural and industrial use by the prison.

To secure the site, it will take 5 affirmative votes from the board of 9 members. There are already

## March 17 Is Deadline For CofC Christmas In May Applications

The annual "Christmas in May" has officially begun for 1989 with applications now being accepted at the Chamber of Commerce office in Cisco.

The project is sponsored by the Cisco Chamber of Commerce and works with many of the churches in the area and much volunteer labor. The program calls for housing repair for the elderly and the handicapped. Money contributed to the project by citizens, organizations and businesses in Cisco is spent only for materials to make the repairs. The labor is strictly volunteer.

The procedure for selection begins with people who would like to have their houses considered for the project to obtain an application at the Chamber of Commerce and have it filled out and returned. To be qualified for consideration, applicants must be 60 years old or older or handicapped (if not elderly); must own the home (or in the process

of buying it); and have a low income (financially unable to afford repairs, receiving Social Security or Veteran Benefits).

Each application will be reviewed and each home will be visited by the selection committee. A survey will be made to determine what repairs are needed. If selected, the home will then be included for repair by the volunteer labor force in May.

Anyone interested in donating time or money to the project may call the Chamber of Commerce office in Cisco.

The "Christmas in May" has been recognized as an important program to improve the homes of those in the community who cannot do it themselves. If you can pledge time or money please call 442-2537 or come by the Chamber office in the Hilton Community Center.

The deadline for applications has been set as March 17.

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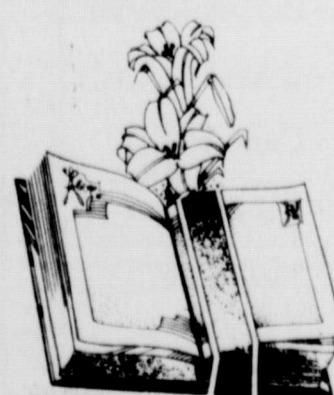

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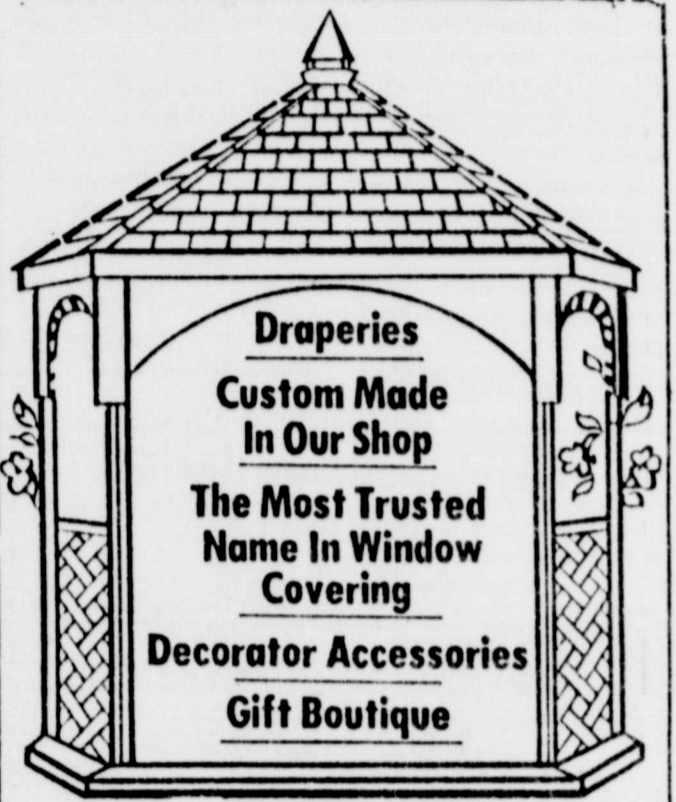

## Pharmacy Topics

Research at Memorial Sloan-Kettering Cancer Center in New York indicates that a synthetic blood-cell growth hormone helps cancer patients maintain a normal blood count in chemotherapy. Without it, a dangerously low blood count could force suspension of treatment.

Vitamin and mineral supplements seems to boost the IQ in youngsters, a British study found. Similar reports come from California State University.

Because diuretics may in some cases increase blood cholesterol and set off abnormal heart rhythms, some doctors order salt restriction for hypertensives, says the Journal of American Medical Association.

To avoid travelers' diarrhea, tourists of the future may take an "immunizing" tonic. Researchers at the University of Maryland School of Medicine are using pregnant cows to produce protective antibodies.

First-time mothers in their early 30s have babies as healthy as the firstborn of women in their 20s, according to the National Infant Mortality Survey. Risks are higher when new mothers are over 40.

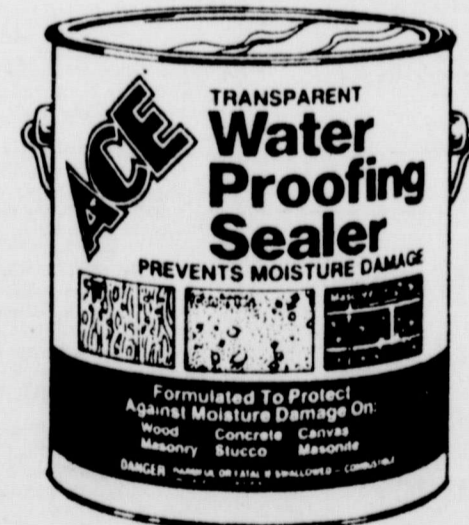

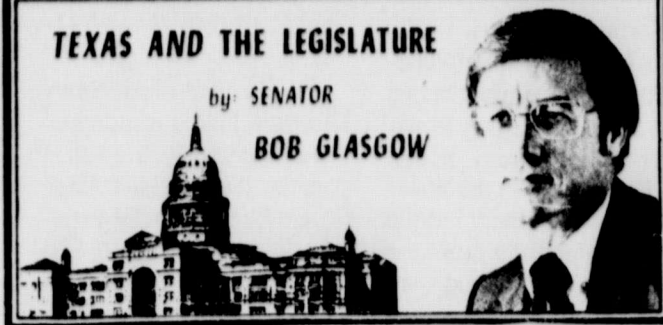

County jail overcrowding is one of the most serious problems facing the Texas Legislature this Session. Many county jails are bursting at the seams with prisoners who should be in Texas Department of Corrections (TDC) but are not, due to a lack of bed space in TDC facilities.

Until more prison space becomes available, overcrowding in county jails will continue to be a serious problem. In order to provide a degree of immediate relief to county jails, I have introduced and passed through the Senate legislation that could create 1,100 new beds as soon as April of this year.

These new beds are created by expanding and streamlining the Board of Pardons and Paroles (Board) pre-parole transfer program.

Currently, the program is managed jointly by TDC and the Board. Under the program the Board contracts with private sector companies to provide facilities for felons who are within 180 days of a parole date. TDC inmates can be transferred to one of these facilities so long as they are within six months of their parole date.

Senate Bill 192 would allow persons who are in county jails but have not been transferred to a TDC facility and are within 180 days of a parole date to be placed in a pre-parole facility. There are approximately 7,500 persons in county jails awaiting transfer to TDC. Of these 7,500, it is estimated that 1,100 would be eligible for transfer into a pre-parole facility if the pre-parole program is changed.

The effects of this legislation would be more available beds in TDC, and sentenced felons out of county jails. The Board estimates that it may be able to expand the pre-parole transfer program to achieve 5,000 placements per

year under the new bill. However, once the bill is passed into law 1,100 beds could open up immediately in county jails.

The bill also streamlines procedures for transferring pre-parolees from county jails by turning sole jurisdiction of the program over to the Board. Also, the bill allows the Board to award and forfeit "good

time" in the same manner as TDC, and clarifies the procedure for sending violators of the pre-parole transfer program back to prison.

This legislation is not a complete solution to jail and prison overcrowding. More will have to be done in the areas of new prison facilities and preventive measures in order to successfully solve this dire problem. However, this bill should supply a degree of immediate relief to county jails that are clogged with prisoners, and whose facilities, finances and personnel are being stretched to their extreme limits.

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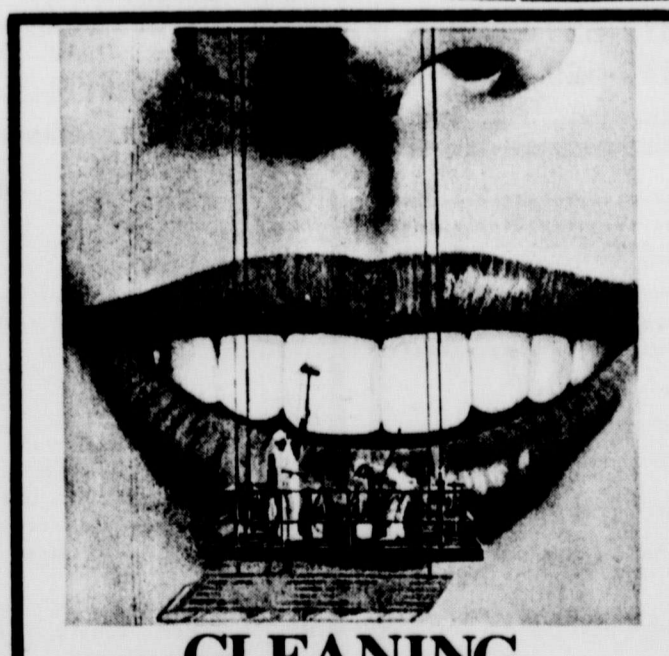

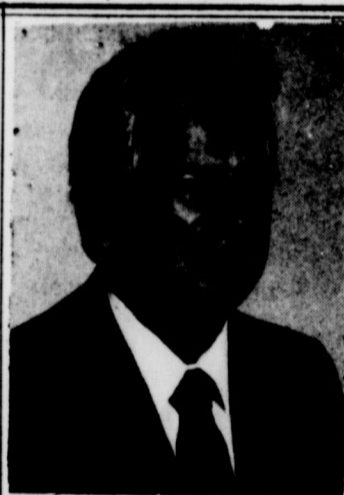

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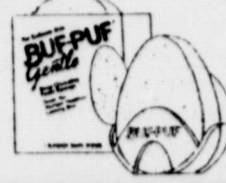
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### Texas Farm Bureau Voting Delegates To Meet Mon., March 20 In Waco

WACO--Texas Farm Bureau voting delegates will meet March 20 in Waco to decide whether to change their policy and work for an appointed or elected board rather than an elected commissioner to run the Texas Department of Agriculture.

The special called meeting will begin at 1 p.m. at the Waco Convention Center.

Resolutions coming in from county Farm Bureau special meetings call for an appointed or elected board to administer the agency, according to S.M. True, president of the 326,000-member organization.

The TDA is up for "sunset review" this year by the Legislature, and will not be up for review again for another 12 years.

Actions of TDA Commissioner Jim Hightower since the TFB convention in December have triggered a flurry of activity in the agricultural community to have him replaced.

Texas Farm Bureau policy calls for an elected commissioner of agriculture, a position that was reiterated at the organization's annual meeting in early December.

"Since our annual convention, Commissioner Hightower has taken a num-

ber of actions that has caused our members to question that policy," True said. "Some 150 county presidents, at a meeting in January, indicated overwhelmingly that they wanted TFB to hold a special delegate meeting to review the policy on the Texas Department of Agriculture. The TFB Board of Directors met and voted unanimously to call the special convention for March 20."

On Dec. 27, Hightower publicly sided with the European Economic Community in its ban of U.S. beef imports over use of hormone growth promotants.

True wrote him, asking him to resign immediately.

"Instead of an advocate, we had an adversary," True recalls. "Besides, the issue was about an unfair trade barrier, and both sides knew the hormone issue was a smokescreen."

Hightower's response was to announce, in two different news conferences, that he would lead the effort to sell hormone-free beef to Europe, a scheme scoffed at by U.S. Department of Agriculture food inspection officials and leaders in the U.S. beef industry.

Then Hightower an-

nounced that he would not run against Senator Phil Gramm in 1990. He said he would instead run for re-election as agriculture commissioner, indicating that he would continue using the TDA to build a populist movement.

"The work of TDA is evidence that an unconventional, populist approach can work in the real world," Hightower said at the time.

Hightower has a long list of activities opposing commercial agriculture, True said. These included, he said, developing stringent pesticide rules without letting growers have input, aiding a union boycott of California table grapes, and intimidating commodity groups in an effort to obtain funds for special "youth education" projects.

"Mr. Hightower has a right to any political belief," True said. "However, he should not continue to use the taxpayers' money to payroll a political-activist staff and to pay for a costly propaganda machine in furthering his own political ambitions. The real role of the Texas Department of Agriculture is to be an advocate for agriculture and regulate a number of areas to protect the consumer."

At issue, True said, is whether or not a little-known state office can remain elective and serve the best interests of the state.

"People can get to know the background of a candidate for Governor or other major offices," True said.

"But, if a smooth-talking demagogue or charlatan gets elected to a lesser-known office, it is almost impossible to vote them out once the begin using the resources of the state to build their own political career."

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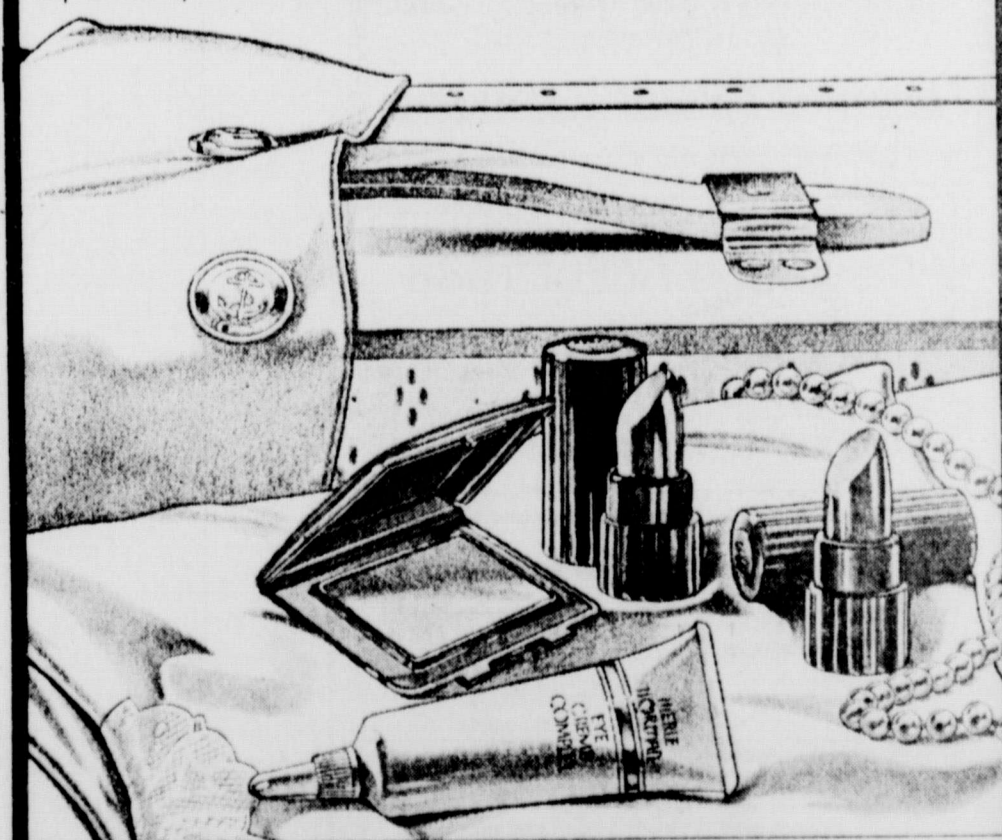

## Legal Notice

Section 33.06 of the State Property Tax Code requires the following information concerning the Deferral of Certain Property Taxes to be publicized.

Property taxes on the residence homestead property of those persons sixty-five (65) years of age or older may be deferred or abated if they satisfy the requirements of the State Property Tax Code.

The property owner must occupy the residence homestead on which the tax is being levied or on which a suit has been filed for collection of delinquent taxes.

To obtain a deferral, the individual must file with the Chief Appraiser for the Appraisal District in which the property is located an affidavit; stating that they are sixty-five (65) years of age or older and that they do own and reside in the house that the tax is being levied on.

If a suit has already been filed by a tax unit, the individual must file with the court in which the suit was filed the

same type of affidavit.

By filing the affidavit with the property authority, the payment of taxes or forced collections through suit is postponed until the person filing the affidavit no longer owns and occupies the property as a residence homestead.

Although the tax is deferred; it is not cancelled. A tax lien remains on the property and penalties and interest continue to accrue during the period that the collect of taxes is deferred.

James Laird, manager of Russell-Newman Manufacturing Company, spoke to the Cisco Rotary Club at their regular meeting held last Thursday, at Tradition's Restaurant.

Mr. Laird said there are presently 110 employees at Russell-Newman. He said 95 percent of the employees are female, but they have started hiring more men, in the bagging and shipping department.

Laird said Russell-Newman has been able to export a lot of their garments lately. They mainly import children's and ladies' undergarments from Mexico and Haiti.

From the Cisco plant they ship from 600-700 dozen garments per day. He said for the Cisco plant to be efficient, they need to ship out enough garments to make \$120,000 per week. The payroll is \$15,000-\$20,000 per week.

The plant is going into the piece rate system of payroll. He said an engineer is working with the Cisco operators and showing them how they can make up to \$1.00 per hour raise with the piece rate system.

Russell-Newman is made up of three names, Sammi Newman, Tessie and Cyprus-imported robes from Brazil.

The cutting room is located in the Denton plant. The material is cut there and then sent out to the proper location. Other plants work on the garments and then Cisco is the finishing department, where the garments are finished, inspected and bagged.

Laird said Russell-Newman's quote is "our quality is one step above." He said this gives the employees pride with their

3. The immunization requirements are:

Polio and DPT/TD- At least three doses of the vaccine are required, provided at least one dose has been received on or after the fourth birthday.

MMR- One dose, on or after first birthday.

PRE-KINDERGARTEN REGISTRATION: 9 to 11 a.m. and 1 to 2:30 p.m. To be eligible for enrollment in pre-kindergarten a child must be at least four years old and must be:

1. Unable to speak and comprehend the English language or

2. From a family whose income, according to standards set by the State Board of Education, is below subsistence level.

The elementary school is located on the corner of W. 11th St. and Ave. H, for those who do not already have a child in school.
