In the past few weeks there has been a growing public controversy over the potential harmful effects of a chemical called Alar, which is used by apple growers to retain the crispness of their fruit as it goes to market. It is used primarily in the growing of Delicious, Stayman, and McIntosh apples.

The Press has received several news releases concerning these issues and all have said that the federal government believes that it is safe for Americans to eat apples, and the responsible federal agencies are working together to reassure the public of this fact. Available data show overwhelmingly that apples carry very small amounts of Alar.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) is encouraging schools

throughout the country to resume use of apples and apple products in their school lunchrooms.

Reports say that responsible agencies will continue to monitor the situation. At this time, however, there is no responsible reason to eliminate apples from the diet.

Ed Posey brought in a story of "Cisco 55 or 60 Years Ago." After seeing a picture in The Press, on November 16, 1986, of looking north on Conrad Hilton in 1920, Mr. Posey wrote the story in January, 1987. Mr. Posey's father was the first hired hand at Cisco Lumber and Supply Co. in 1924. Jack Hamilton was the second hired there and is still on the job. The first few train loads of lumber were used to build lumber sheds.

Mr. Posey's story is 22 typewritten pages of interesting stories about the past of this great city of Cisco.

He talked about riding his bicycle over the old wooden overpass before the concrete one was built in 1935.

In 1940, an eighty-four pound catfish was displayed in a large container of water at Lake Cisco where it was caught. The Schlapper boys caught him.

In the 1920's Cisco would play Breckenridge in a football game on Thanksgiving Day. Mr. Posey said he remembers his coach telling the team, to give it all you got, you have from now until next season to heal if you are injured. Honk Irving who is in the Hall of Fame and All State Fullback for the Lobos, who later played for the Chicago Bears was an official in many games that Cisco played. He never leaned toward Cisco.

Mr. Posey has another copy of the story if anyone would be interested in stopping by his work, Posey's Gulf, I-20 and Hwy. 183, to read the story. Guess you would get a good idea while you're there too.

March 30 Is Proclaimed As Mary Bob Snoddy Leveridge Day

Thursday, March 30, 1989, has been proclaimed Mary Bob Snoddy Leveridge Day for the City of Cisco.

Mary Bob Snoddy Leveridge, veteran of 32 years of teaching in Eastland County Schools, comes from a long line of teachers and ministers. Her father, John Robert Snoddy, himself a certified teacher, came from Kentucky to the Scranton community in the 1890's where he became a prosperous cotton and grain farmer and cattleman. His brother, Josh, was one of the earliest teachers in the Scranton Community School. Four other brothers were teachers, and another, the Reverend Buford Allen Snoddy, preached in the Northwest Methodist Conference for many years.

Mary Bob's mother was Flora May Bradshaw. She came with her family from Tennessee to Scranton before 1900 and in 1901 was married to John Robert Snoddy. From the Bradshaw family came two

Presbyterian ministers, the Reverend Ernest Neal Bradshaw and the distinguished Presbyterian clergyman, Dr. Hugh Elmer Bradshaw, who rose to the highest echelons in the Presbyterian Church. There were also a number of teachers in the family, and their calling has been perpetuated in Mary Bob, her sister Louise, and in Mary Bob's children.

Her son, Dr. Robert Leveridge, is a professor of Social Science in Oscar Rose College in Oklahoma City. Her daughter, Lenna, is Dean of Foreign Students at South Plains College in Levelland, Texas. Leanna is married to Gene Darr, who is a sales promotion officer with Southwest Public Service Electric Company in Levelland. Mary Bob's youngest daughter, Laz, is married to patrol officer McCoy in Clyde and is a Director of Transcription of Medical Records at Hendrick Hospital, Abilene.

ed high school there. She began her teaching career at Gorman, Texas, leaving that position to marry John Leveridge of Scranton in 1940. John was a successful rancher and farmer, but there was teething blood in the Leveridge family also, and though he is now deceased, he lived to see his children established in their positions.

Mary Bob devoted the first years of her marriage to rearing three children. Resuming her teaching career, she served her alma mater, Scranton, as class room teacher for a time, after coming into the Cisco Public School system where she enjoyed a long and successful tenure before retirement.

Still active and anxious to serve her community, she agreed to become librarian for the Cisco Public Library. With her vast experience in the field of language arts and literature, she has done a superb job of directing the library. The collection has been updated and enhanced and other learning resources have been added. The reading and story telling programs she has conducted have attracted many Cisco and area youngsters to become regular readers, and the overall management of the library has made it a source of pride for the Twentieth Century Club who sponsors the library and for the City of Cisco who adds support.

Mary Bob continues to live in the pretty home her husband built for his bride at the time of their marriage. Situated on Farm to Market Road 569, it is the favorite gathering place for her children, and grandchildren who come regularly to fish and hunt on the family farm.

Darrell Holt Conservation Education Fund Set Up

Darrell Holt, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department Education Specialist, and former Hunter Education Coordinator, passed away on February 28, 1989, after a long battle with chronic lymphocytic leukemia. He was the son of Lois Holt of Cisco. Those who worked and shared with Darrell over the past years knew he was always there to give his support and encouragement for a program that he dearly loved and believed in. His dedication and sincere interest in teaching young people about the tradition of hunting and saving lives, and to help insure that hunting would be a viable outdoor activity and game management tool for future generations to enjoy, was one of his primary goals in life.

Coming from a strong Christian family, his belief and faith in God helped him direct his life from the time he was very young. To quote Romans Chapter 12, verses 7 and 8, "If it is to serve, we must serve. It is to teach, we must teach. If it is to encourage others, we must do so." This was highlighted in Darrell's New Testament which he always had close by, so one can see that he practiced what he believed.

After being diagnosed as having leukemia 19 years ago, Darrell wrote, "Facing one's own mortality is probably one of the most difficult times in one's life. I can only imagine one worse - losing one's child. I have tried, failing miserably at times, to increase my knowledge, skills, and attitude to further the causes of God, Jesus and Christianity." He recently said, "The church and my belief in God has been my main pillar of strength, and I feel God still has a use for me, or I would

have been gone already."

Darrell outlived his expectancy by nine years, thus proving that God did still have a lot for him to share. At this point, one can only believe that Darrell is now resting peacefully in his well-earned and deserved "Eternal Happy Hunting Ground."

The wisdom and insight he possessed and imparted on others will help to maintain the efforts so necessary in carrying on the Hunter Education Program, a program he helped build in Texas.

He is now gone ... but will never be forgotten. He will be deeply and sincerely missed by all who knew and loved him. His memory will live on and remind us that he has attained what we struggle for.

One of the last things he told his wife was, "It's time for the butterfly to shed its cocoon"....

City Council To Meet Tues.

The Cisco City Council will meet Tuesday, March 28, at 6:00 p.m., for their regular meeting, in the council chambers, 116 West 7th.

Items on the agenda are: Council members will consider the approval of a resolution to show that the City of Cisco is urging the Texas Legislature to raise the cap on street use charges for electric and gas companies; and council members will review the Farmers Home Administration bond refinancing program.

City Manager Mike Moore will give the February financial report to the council. He will also give the city manager's report to the council.

Commissioners To Hold Public Hearing Monday Night

There will be a Public Hearing in the Eastland County Commissioners Courtroom at 7 p.m. Monday, March 27.

The public will have an opportunity to hear a grape nursery project discussed by a Dr. Lagle, who will have information on a Texas Capital Fund Enterprise loan.

This loan would be obtained from the Texas Department of Commerce, and used to grow grape vineyards for cuttings.

Dr. Lagle, who works for NASA, has purchased land eight miles north of Rising Star. It is believed that the deep sand in this area is suitable for the commercial growing of grape vines.

Commissioners To Have Full Agenda Monday

There are 12 items on the agenda of the Eastland County Commissioners Monday. Two are repeat items from the last Court meeting - the progress report by Mobil Pipeline on a road crossing in Pct. 2, and the progress report by Enray Corp. concerning repair of some road damage in Pct. 4. There are also some other pipeline crossings to be considered.

One item will be brought by Paul Catoe, Eastland City Manager. He will discuss the billing for keeping City prisoners in the County Jail.

Graydon Baze, Gorman Mayor, will also have an item on the agenda to discuss jail contracts between the cities and Eastland County.

Another item will concern the City of Gorman and back payments for fire fighting. Also on the agenda will be the consideration of an investment policy for county funds.

Jail standards, a jail inspection report, and the clearing of the Lasater property north of the jail will appear on the agenda. Bills, claims and accounts will also occupy the Commissioners.

There will be a reminder of a called Public meeting on Monday, 7 p.m. Included will be a presentation by Dr. Lagle to review an application for an Economic Enterprise Grant and Loan. This would be for the growing of grape nursery stock.

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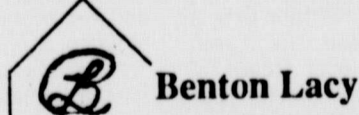

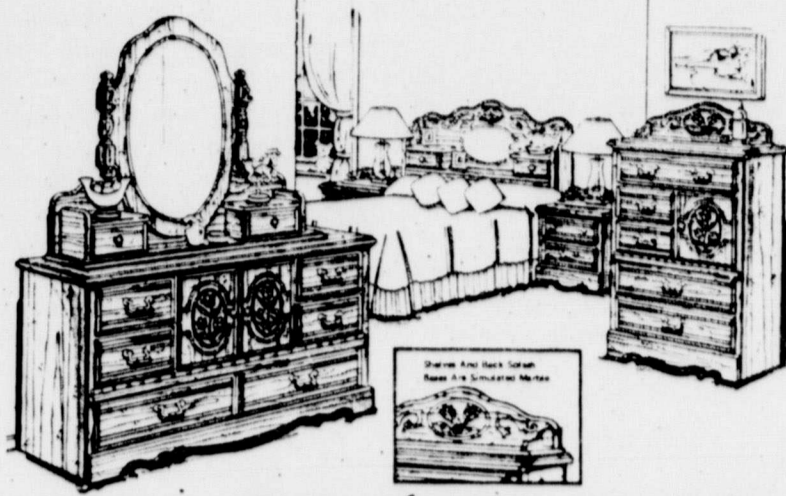

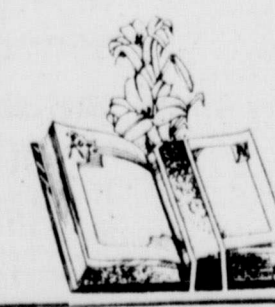

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Homemaking Hints

From Janet Thomas, County Agent

With the completion of another successful County Livestock Show, I would like to personally congratulate all the youth who participated. You did a great job. Animal projects are not only fun, but lots of hard work, and responsibility. Many things you learn from this kind of activity goes on through life such as leadership, financial management records, good sportsmanship, etc. I would like to express my appreciation to all the adults who make it possible. The 4-H parents worked hard and we completed a successful 4 day concessions, which will be used to further 4-H activities and awards in 1989.

STARTING THE YEAR STRESSED

The first half of every year brings flu and colds, taxes and after-Christmas bills. Everyday families have many of the same everyday stresses. Ordinary stresses usually provoke similar responses—refusal to talk or listen, more month than money, and children's behavior and misbehavior.

The healthier the family, the more likely it is to handle everyday pressures in a competent and confident manner. Oftentimes, the same stressors will disrupt a less competent family. Family researchers contend that healthy families recognize that stresses are a means of identifying family strengths.

When a family experiences a stress, it is tested as a unit and learns to use its resources and strengths.

A strong family doesn't try to avoid normal stress. Instead, it concentrates on developing ways of dealing with stress. The reward comes from the realization that family stresses can actually lead to family strengths. For instance, when bad report cards or speeding tickets come in, a healthy family will respond with creative techniques, flexible rules and mutual support. All of these strengthen existing resources and tell the family that is capable of handling an even greater stress.

A vulnerable family is one who cannot dredge up enough resources to cope with a stress. As a result, stress may strain or even fragment the family. It doesn't take a catastrophic stressor to create a devastating situation. A pileup of little things can do it, with each stressor further weakening an already faltering family unit. And there are some families who cope with major stressful events and topple from the petty ones.

The ten top family stresses, according to researchers, are money, children's behavior and discipline, insufficient couple time, lack of shared responsibility in the family, communicating with children, insufficient "me" time, guilt over not accomplishing more, spousal relationship (communication, friendship,

sex), insufficient family time and an overscheduled family calendar. Most families are thinking, "Somebody wrote our list!"

Is this kind of family stress inevitable and insurmountable in today's society? Inevitable, yes. Insurmountable, no.

RECIPE FOR THE WEEK:
Strawberries are simply beautiful in the stores. You can substitute a baked pastry shell instead of the coconut crust.

FROZEN FLUFFY STRAWBERRY PIE
2 1/2 cups flaked coconut, toasted

1/2 cup margarine or butter, melted
1 (3 ounce) package cream cheese, softened

1 14 ounce can Sweetened Condensed Milk (not evaporated milk)

2 1/2 cups fresh or frozen unsweetened strawberries, thawed, mashed or pureed (about 1 1/2 cups)

3 tablespoons of lemon juice concentrate

1 cup (1/2 pint) whipping cream, whipped
Additional fresh strawberries, optional

Combine coconut and margarine; press firmly on bottom and up side to rim of 9-inch pie plate. In large mixer bowl, beat cheese until fluffy; gradually beat in sweetened condensed milk. Stir in pureed strawberries and lemon juice. Fold in whipped cream. Pour into prepared crust (mixture should mound slightly). Freeze 4 hours or until firm. Before serving, garnish with fresh strawberries if desired. Return leftovers to freezer.

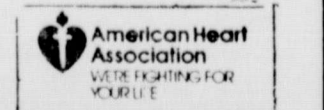

A new TDC program will allow Eastland County to send four prisoners to TDC each month up to a maximum of 52 per year, and with a lot less hassle. With this schedule, 1.9 percent of the population can be kept in TDC, and that could keep local crime under control, says Hogan.

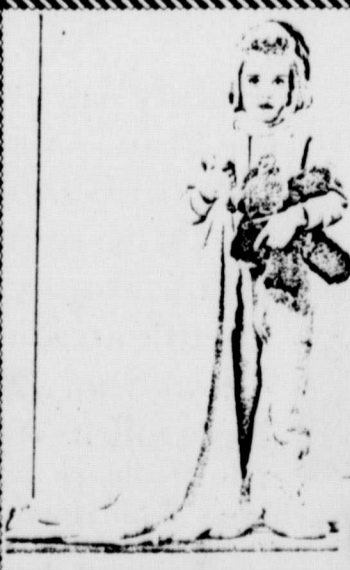

Research at Memorial Sloan-Kettering Cancer Center in New York indicates that a synthetic blood-cell growth hormone helps cancer patients maintain a normal blood count in chemotherapy. Without it, a dangerously low blood count could force suspension of treatment.

Vitamin and mineral supplements seems to boost the IQ in youngsters, a British study found. Similar reports come from California State University.

Because diuretics may in some cases increase blood cholesterol and set off abnormal heart rhythms, some doctors order salt restriction for hypertensives, says the Journal of American Medical Association.

To avoid travelers' diarrhea, tourists of the future may take an "immunizing" tonic. Researchers at the University of Maryland School of Medicine are using pregnant cows to produce protective antibodies.

First-time mothers in their early 30s have babies as healthy as the firstborn of women in their 20s, according to the National Infant Mortality Survey. Risks are higher when new mothers are over 40.

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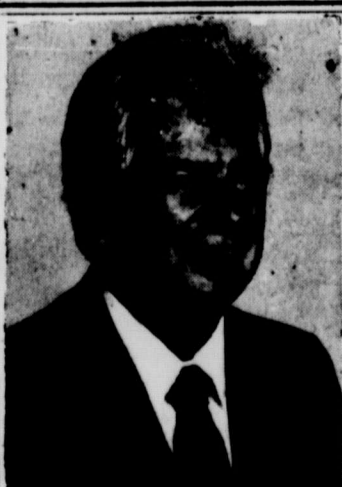

Red, orange, white, these three colors should be big on any lake you choose to fish right now. The red hues will probably be your best bet in conjunction with another color base. With a white base and some orange or red being next.

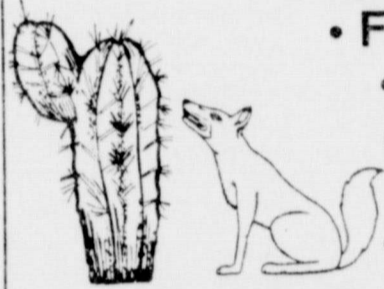
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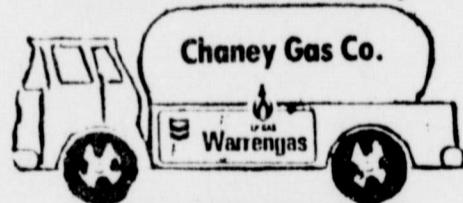

David Bell Speaks To Rotary Club Thurs. On Regional Water Study

David Bell, with the West Central Texas Water District, spoke to the Cisco Rotary Club at their regular meeting held last Thursday, at Tradition's Restaurant.

Mr. Bell talked about the regional water study that the City of Cisco is participating in. He said he is interested in and excited with the water study.

Bell said it is going to be a legal and legislative battle for Cisco to get a water supply. He said the WCTWD board will give the best water plan possible for Cisco. But, he said the solution's cost will be up to Cisco. He said Cisco might cooperate with another city on the water study. He said it takes a long time to complete a water supply solution for any area.

He said one major project

of the WCTWD board was the Lake Hubbard Dam. He said now they are working on Stacy Dam, which is 50 percent complete.

Bell asked if anyone could get by with using only half as much water as they use now. He said they might have to go to that. He said the WCTWD water study is based on population and water usage.

Mr. Bell said co-operation with citizens and the city governments is essential for the water study. The WCTWD was recently given a \$125,000 grant from the State of Texas. The 10 counties who are participating in the water study will match funds with them. The study should be finished in October, 1989.

Cisco Rotary Club president Otto Urban gave the invocation and led the Pledge of Allegiance. He introduced William F. Thomas, Ed.D., Rotarian youth exchange officer, of District 579, (Cisco is in this district). Mr. Thomas had stopped in Cisco, with 16 foreign exchange students from Japan. Other guests at the meeting were Rotarians Wes Howard and Bob Wood from Eastland. The club assembly will be held next week, Bill Philpott will be in charge of the April 6, meeting.

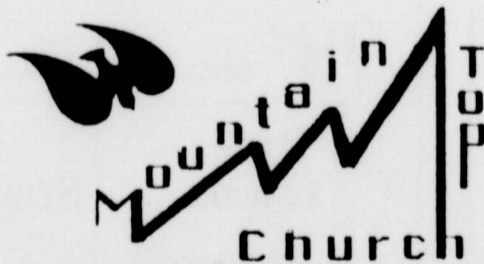

County Has \$100,000 Livestock Show

The Eastland County Livestock Show held March 15 through 18 was deemed a big success. Almost \$100,000 changed hands as prize money, auction purchase money and bonuses were awarded to 359 students who showed animals as 4-H or FFA projects.

Around 600 animals, including 63 breeding hogs, 184 market hogs, 39 breeding sheep, 151 market lambs, 61 breeding rabbits, 40 market rabbits, and 10 broiler chickens were exhibited. And a large number of the animals were exhibited by girls, as they join the boys in raising livestock.

People from every city and community in Eastland County were working together, often for long hours, to make the show a success and to support the young people of the county in their worthwhile endeavors. And there was also lots of cooperation in the market animal auction which followed the sale.

The individual cities in the county, Ranger, Gorman, Carbon, Rising Star, Cisco, and Eastland have always taken a lot of pride in supporting their young people, and it was especially evident this year.

But the communities of Eastland County are coming closer together as the people cooperate and work together to improve "their" county. Eastland County people

and businesses not only paid premium prices for the show animals, but they also dished out thousands of dollars in bonuses to young people for their hard work with their animals.

With 157 animals selling and 42 groups or individuals buying at the auction, on an average, each buyer was awarding 7 bonuses.

Businesses weren't just awarding money to students in the town where the businesses was located, but money was spread around in an effort to insure a reward for each deserving boy or girl.

Support for the young people showing animals has resulted in some very successful fund raising efforts in the towns for money to buy animals at the auction.

One new fund raiser effort which was quite successful in its first year was conducted by Eastland Ag Boosters. Tickets were sold for a barbecue which was held on auction day. Not only Eastland people, but people from the other county towns, and people as far away as the Houston area, Jayton, and Big Spring bought tickets. And all of the auto dealers and a tractor dealer in the county had a part as a door prize of a

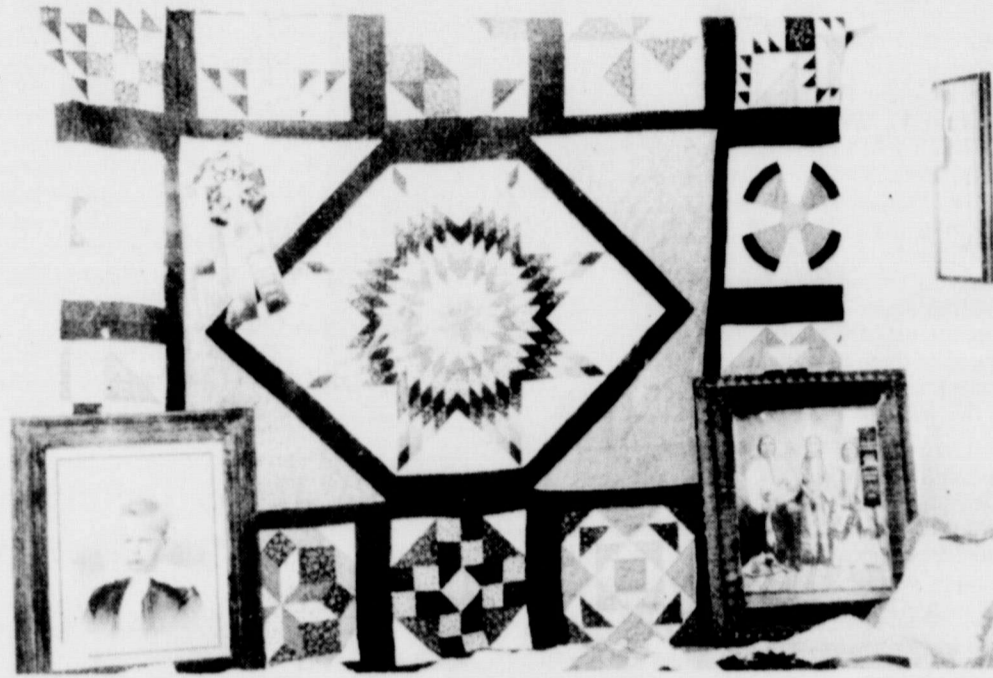
new pickup or car or tractor was awarded to a lucky donor following a drawing. The support paid for the pickup awarded, along with some other fund raisers, provided thousands of dollars which were paid to students from different parts of the county for their animals, and as bonuses.

Other efforts were equally successful, but this effort probably had more county wide cooperation. Yes, countywide effort and cooperation is what is making the Eastland County Livestock Show and Auction a big success.

And Eddie Rabb of Cisco won the new pickup awarded by the Eastland Ag Boosters.

The use of a computer by the sponsoring Eastland County Livestock Raisers Association is also saving man hours in keeping track of the animals, exhibitors, and results, as we enter the electronic age.

Officers extend a big "Thanks" to those who helped with time or money, as they start thinking about next year and the hundreds of young people who will be working with their projects, rather than getting in trouble or wasting their lives.

The three arrests were made from investigative reports of Callahan, Fisher, Jones, Shackelford, Stephens and Throckmorton county law enforcement officers.

Texas Ranger Cox, said 27 motors have been stolen over the last year and a half

from several counties in the Big Country. The motors are worth an average of about \$3,000 each.

HOW CAN A "MEMORY BOOK" HELP MY CHILD?

When a child's father or mother dies, talking about the child's concerns and relieving his anxieties about the loss are important in working-through the grief experience. The "Memory Book" is an effective device for this.

It is a scrapbook-and-keepsake in which the children may write down their memories of their parent or, if the children are too young to write, have the parent write as the children "talk it out."

The "Memory Book" helps because, in it, the children openly relate their shared experiences, feelings and remembrances. The remembering and talking about the deceased parent offers the proper outlet for grieving... and understanding and accepting the fact of the loss.

Photos of the parent may be put in the book, especially if the pictures include the children, thus aiding recall and discussion. The activity, itself, is important. It puts everything out in the open and into family talk. It will assist in providing good and stable remembrances of the deceased parent as the children grow up.
