Tornados Are Spotted South Of Cisco Tuesday

Weather watchers were out Monday and Tuesday nights while thunderstorms spawning tornados passed through the Cisco area. Seven to eight funnel clouds were reported to have dipped from the clouds Tuesday evening, but none touched the ground.

The Cisco Fire Department called the weather service in Fort Worth to report the tornados and a warning was given out on television and radio stations.

The Cisco Fire Department has an Emergency Alert System system and if a tornado is spotted on the ground heading toward Cisco, all sound on cable TV will be extinguished and a direct vocal warning from the dispatcher at the Cisco Fire Department can be given to viewers about the location of the tornado. At the same time, the city sirens will be activated, so people will know to take cover.

According to reports the funnel clouds that were spotted on Tuesday, were dipping down out of the clouds and receding back up. The basic rule for sounding the sirens is that with these type of tornados it doesn't necessarily mean they are a threat to the life and property of Cisco. If one is on the ground headed toward Cisco, then the warnings will be activated.

The Cisco Fire Department has been busy fighting grass fires in the last two weeks. This is the time of year when farmers begin their controlled burning, but with the high winds, they can easily get out of control.

On March 14, Cisco firemen were called out to help extinguish such a fire, on Texas Highway 6, north, on the Jim Webb place. On March 17, Cisco firemen were called out to extinguish a trash fire on the B.D. Green place on East 16th.

Cisco firemen were asked by the Rising Star Fire Department for mutual aid to help extinguish a grass fire near Long Branch on March 19. The firemen also extinguished a car fire at 1402 Front Street later that same day.

On March 22, the Cisco Fire Department helped to put out a grass fire on the Tommy Bacon property on Highway 183. On March 26, Cisco firemen were called out twice to extinguish grass fires. They were first called out to the G.O. Scott place on Lake Bernie road. Later that morning they extinguished a grass fire on the Isenhower place near Scranton.

The firemen had to fight a grass fire off market road 2731, which was the result of a controlled burn. Fire men extinguished a trash fire that had gotten out of control at 104 West 6th on March 30.

Cisco Hospital Compared To Other Hospitals In Area

The recent referendum being placed before the voters of the district requires careful analysis of the financial facts that cause the Board of Directors to consider such a tax hike.

E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital is not significantly different than the surrounding hospitals. This can be verified in looking at other hospitals financial bases.

There are four hospitals currently that have made requests or are making requests for the creation of hospital districts. They are Ballinger, Eastland, Seymour and Sweetwater. The Ballinger Hospital is seeking a tax rate of \$.25 per \$100.00 of property value. Estimates are not available from the other three hospitals. However, it is expected that they will be in the low \$.20's should their districts vote for the creation of a hospital district.

There are two county hospitals in the area, among them Stephens Memorial Hospital in Breckenridge. The county budget is \$260,000.00 for this year. Throckmorton County Memorial Hospital has received in excess of \$320,000.00 in county funds this past year.

The following hospitals are hospital districts with their tax rates and estimated revenue available to the hospital.

Each of these hospitals was created to serve their specific communities, but because the medicare reimbursement system changed in 1983, each hospital has sought other revenues in order to continue serving their communities. In truth, no hospital, since the creation of medicare in 1965 has stood entirely on revenues generated from services provided. Medicare simply has paid the cost of services without the financial con-

straints that are currently being applied. While the current system was phased in, the massive changes in the financial structure of medicare payments created unpredictable problems which resulted in the closing of many rural hospitals. Only now is the federal government recognizing the importance of the rural hospital to the overall stability of the

Troop--Thinking Day Events



Seventeen Hospitals Apply For Funds Under New Rural Health Transition Grant Program

WASHINGTON, D.C.—Congressman Charles Stenholm announced today that 17 hospitals from the 17th District of Texas presented 8 separate applications for funds under the new Rural Health Transition Grant Program. These applications were initially sent to the Texas Department of Health, and next will be forwarded to the Health Care Financing Administration (HCFA) headquarters in Baltimore, Maryland for final review.

"I couldn't be prouder of our hospitals for their overwhelming response to this grant program," Stenholm boasted. "I wouldn't be surprised if the 17th District produced more applications than any other District in the County. I believe this testifies not just to the serious state of survival for many of our hospitals, but even more so to the determination of our administrators and hospital board members to keep our hospitals alive."

The grants are primarily "seed money," with the maximum funding set at \$50,000 for each of two years. It was anticipated that as many as 800 applications from across the Country would be reviewed by HCFA. Approximately 100 awards will be

announced on September 1, 1989. Congress first authorized the Rural Health Transition Grant Program in 1987, but announcement of the program was not made by HCFA until January of this year. The grant program has as its goal the presentation of incentives to rural hospitals to think creatively about how they might change into the entities that will better meet their communities' needs. Hospitals were encouraged to consider the creation of consortia with other hospitals, the development of outpatient plans, the establishment of innovative methods for attracting and retaining health personnel, and the evolution away from basic primary care settings to larger-concept community health centers.

"I was particularly impressed by the creativity shown by some of the hospital applications," Stenholm reported. One of those ideas was the development of customized computer software for use at the bedside by nurses. This would enable a nurse to make direct entry into a patient's chart, reduce paperwork, and allow greater time for direct patient care.

Another application proposes a "Service Center" concept in which six hospitals would combine resources and avoid duplicative administrative costs. The savings of such a service Center would allow more operating funds for direct services and personnel. Other grant ideas include nurse recruitment and education support, outpatient cardiac rehabilitation services, and development of a physical therapy unit.

Hospitals from the 17th Congressional District which submitted applications included E.L. Graham Memorial (Cisco) and Eastland Memorial.

Stenholm individually notified each of the hospitals within the 17th District when the grant was originally announced and made follow-up contacts with all hospitals which advised him of their intent to file an application for the grant. His office, along with the Texas Department of Agriculture, provided technical assistance, guidance and support to hospital administrators completing applications.

Texas Farm Bureau Voting Delegates Support Change In Leadership

WACO—Texas Farm Bureau voting delegates overwhelmingly voted to support a change in the leadership of the Texas Department of Agriculture, and said they prefer that the elected Commissioner of Agriculture be replaced by an agricultural commissioner.

This reflects a change from former TFB policy which called for an elected Commissioner of Agriculture.

The policy change, adopted by 790 voting delegates representing 142 Texas counties at a special called meeting here March 20, reads as follows: "We support a change in the leadership of the Texas Department of Agriculture. We prefer that the elected Commissioner of Agriculture be replaced by an agricultural commissioner."

According to Warren Newberry, executive director of the TFB, the issue was the role and future of the Texas Department of Agriculture.

"How is it to be administered?" he asked. "Is it to be fair? Is it to waste taxpayers' money, creating and running a political movement? Or is it

to serve as a regulatory agency to carry out laws fairly for all citizens of the state and to serve as an advocate within state government for farmers and ranchers?"

The delegates took a little over an hour to resolve the issue. Although there was discussion on whether a commission should be appointed or elected, there was no movement made to hold onto the policy of an elected commissioner.

"I feel like this has been a significant day not only in the history of Texas Farm Bureau but for Texas agriculture and possibly for the state of Texas," TFB President S.M. True said. "I think we have a problem and we're working towards solving that problem."

True said TFB will work with other agricultural organizations, Texas Governor Bill Clements' staff and the Texas Legislature to effect this change of policy.

Baylor University Baseball Staff To Operate Summer Camp

Baylor University head baseball coach Mickey Sullivan has announced that he has reached an agreement with the Texas State Little League concerning the operation of their summer baseball camp. Hereafter, the camp will be known as the Mickey Sullivan Little League Baseball Camp.

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

Tournament Bass Show High Survival!

April 23, 1989 the Eastland County Bass Club will be hosting an Open Jackpot Bass Tournament at Lake Leon. Headquarters will be at the public state ramp located at Chock-O-Block. This will be a three fish maximum stringer with a minimum length of 14". Fishing hours have been set at 6:30 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. You must register prior to fishing and all contestants must be in line with their fish prior to 3:00 p.m.

The payback for this event will be based on the number of entrants. 80% of all entry fees will be returned in the following pays: 1st 50%, 2nd 30% and 3rd 20%. 100% of the optional Big Bass Pot will be paid back as follows 1st 60%, 2nd 40%.

Entry fee for this event will be \$15.00 per contestant with the optional \$5.00 big bass pot.

And don't forget folks this will be the last weekend to fish prior to the Eastland Volunteer Fire Departments big Invitational April 30, 1989. Official off limits for this event will be 12:01 a.m. 4-6-89 until 4-30-89. So tell all your friends about both these Lake Leon events.

A recently published study by fishery biologists at Auburn University found that largemouth bass caught by tournament anglers and later released have a high rate of survival.

Researchers with Auburn's Department of Fisheries and allied aquacultures and the Alabama Agricultural Experiment Station designed the

experiment to closely duplicate fishing tournament conditions.

The study's purpose was to determine the survival of bass released immediately after capture as compared to bass held in livewells for several hours before release. The effects of a chemical water-conditioning additive of a type commonly used by tournament anglers was evaluated.

Nick Carter, chief of Inland Fisheries for TPWD, said the study results should be interesting to Texas anglers, since more bass tournaments are held here than in any other state. "The Auburn study was an excellent one, because it duplicated the stress factors that affect tournament caught fish at various times of the year," Carter said.

Overall, bass released immediately experienced the highest survival at 1989 percent. There was 96.5 percent survival of the group held in conditioned water and 90.6 percent survival of those held in unconditioned water.

Researchers said that although there were slight differences in the survival of bass either held in livewells or released immediately, the study pointed out that large-mouths have greater chances of survival after release if they are handled properly.

I'm sure by now most of you have heard about the 15 1/2 pound lunger from Amistad Lake. This fish is the largest recorded largemouth landed in the western half of Texas.

And will rank among the top 10 largest bass ever caught in the state. Jay Hiler landed the fish in the Cassie Canyon area on a jig and pork combination. The fish measured 27 inches long and 23 1/2 inches in girth.

APPLE PRODUCTS SAFE

Apple products are safe to eat, despite some misleading information that is making the national rounds according to two experts with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Dr. Alfred B. Wagner, Extension food technologist, and Dr. Calvin Lyons, Extension horticulturist, agreed that apple products are safe to eat. Unnecessary fears have been triggered by recent reports that were sensational in nature, but not necessarily founded on fact.

A study concentrating on fruits and vegetables by the National Resources Defense Council (NRDC) first indicated high intakes of pesticide residues by infants. Later, a network television program was aired on the same subject.

The reports have caused unnecessary public fears, yet present data indicate the product targeted by the study, daminozide (trade name Alar) is not a carcinogen, the specialist said.

Wagner said the so-called one-in-4,000 risk is misleading and would not result from exposure to a single residue, but rather would require a combination of all pesticides at maximum levels that could be legally applied to apples. Wagner said growers simply could not manage an uneconomic practice of this type, nor would they want to do so.

Lyons said he believes that no Texas apple growers use the specific product targeted by the study. Nationally, only about 4 percent of the apple crop is treated with the compound.

Lyons said the compound helps the apples maintain a firmness or crispness in stor-

age, but is in very limited use now. He believes that no health risk exist from use of apple products.

While we encourage our people to consume Texas-grown products when available, I feel that those apples from major producing states also are entirely safe, state Lyons.

Everyone in agriculture is concerned about the safety of items in the food chain.

Nevertheless, no product can be made 100 percent safe because every naturally-occurring food product poses potential health risks to some people, in the form of food allergies or other problems, Lyons stated. This occurs without the use of any compounds.

WEEK OF YOUNG CHILD

April is a time to focus on

young children. April 2-8 is designated as "The Week of the Young Child". Also April is significant because of its designation as "Child Abuse Prevention Month" by the National Committee for the Prevention of Child Abuse. The common factor in both major events is a concern for young children. The confirmed cases of child abuse and neglect in Texas has quadrupled during the last 10 years and involves more than 50,000 children.

RECIPE FOR THE WEEK:

STREUSEL-TOPPED APPLE CUSTARD PIE

1 (9 inch) unbaked pastry shell
4 large all-purpose apples, pared and sliced (about 4 cups)
2 eggs
1 (14 ounce) can Sweetened Condensed Milk (NOT evaporated milk)
1/4 cup margarine or butter, melted
1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon

Dash ground nutmeg
1/2 cup firmly packed light brown sugar
1/2 cup unsifted flour
1/4 cup cold margarine or butter

1/4 cup chopped nuts
Preheat oven to 425 degrees. Arrange apples in prepared pastry shell. In medium mixing bowl, beat eggs. Add sweetened condensed milk, margarine, cinnamon, and nutmeg; mix well. Pour over apples. In medium mixing bowl, combine sugar and flour; cut in margarine until crumbly. Stir in nuts. Sprinkle over pie. Place in bottom rack of oven and bake for 10 minutes. Reduce oven temperature to 375 degrees; continue baking 35 to 40 minutes or until golden brown. Cool. Refrigerate leftovers.

PEACH VARIATION: Omit apples. Substitute 1 (29-ounce) can sliced peaches, well drained, for apples. Proceed as above.


Dr. Ronald Rathbun To Hold Solo Piano Recital Thursday

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
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Charles Crawford Chapter Of NSDAR Held Final Meeting Mon., March 27



New drug therapy stops the bone loss of spinal osteoporosis and even restores some lost bone, say researchers at the University of Texas Southwestern Medical Center in Dallas. They note that the treatment is not effective against hip, wrist, or other osteoporosis.

A new study says Estrogen replacement therapy seems to protect against heart attacks in older women, and may cut the risk of stroke, too. The study was done by researchers at the University of Southern California.

Taking Omega 3 fatty acids after balloon angioplasty may help prevent the arteries from clogging up again, researchers at the Veterans Administration Medical Center in Dallas found.

Italian doctors report success treating migraine sufferers with a nasal spray containing a hormone derived from salmon. Previously, the hormone had only worked by injection.

New extended-wear contact lenses have a Teflon-like coating to discourage protein deposits from sticking to them.

Gordon Spot

Individual plant treatment as a method of brush control on small acreage and as maintenance of brush management on large acreage is a subject of interest to landowners. This was evident by the large group who attended the tri-county brush control program in Rising Star March 28. A total of 116 people attended the program which began at 9:30 a.m. and ended with a field day in the afternoon.

Dr. Tommy Welch, Extension Brush and Weed Control Specialist, and Dr. Barron Rector, Extension Range Specialist gave an excellent program on brush control and range management. A very good barbecue dinner was served by Oscar's of Cisco. Sponsors of the dinner were Sandoz Crop Protection, DuPont Chemical, Elanco and Dow Chemical Companies. The Upper Leon Soil and

Water Conservation District provided cookies, coffee, and soft drinks. We would also like to thank the First Baptist Church of Rising Star for providing the excellent meeting place.

Pond management is another topic of interest to landowners. Certain misconception about pond management can make the role of a pond owner more difficult.

Here are a number of "untruths:" Domestic ducks will eliminate aquatic vegetation in farm ponds. Ducks will eat some plants, but they usually create more problems than they solve. Large numbers of ducks can ruin a pond for fishing with their droppings. These make the pond overly fertile, increasing algae problems and reducing water quality. Often dissolved oxy-

gen is reduced in the pond and a fish die-off occurs. Also, if the ducks eat all the shoreline vegetation, bank erosion will increase and the pond will become muddy.

Grass carp will remove all weed problems. First, it is illegal to stock grass carp in Texas ponds. In addition, they will eat only certain weeds and leave the others, especially algae. Grass carp are no cure-all for weed problems in a pond. Turtles are often a blame for poor fishing. Although turtles will eat an occasional fish, they feed most on dead animals, vegetation and whatever else is too slow to escape. Therefore, turtles generally are good for a pond. They will not attack swimmers.

Fish die whenever a pond freezes over in the winter. Generally, ice on Texas ponds lasts only a short time and presents no problems for the fish population. If ice remains on a pond for more than three weeks and there is more than 2 inches of snow on top of the ice, then a fish die-off may occur in fertile ponds.

More information on pond management is available from the county Extension office. Ask for the bulletin, "Improve Your Farm Fish Pond."

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated

that over 37,000 women die each year as a result of breast cancer. Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate. City Council Held Meet Tuesday

The Cisco City Council met for their regular meeting held last Tuesday at City Hall. City Manager Mike Moore told council members that a meeting will be set up in the near future with Cisco, Eastland, Breckenridge, Albany and Anson, concerning the idea of the cities going together with Browning Ferris Industries out of Fort Worth, with refuse collection. Moore said the company has said they have located a landfill north of Abilene to use.

Mr. Moore said BFI had talked about having once-a-week pickup in Cisco. Moore said he stressed the fact that there will have to be a transfer system in Cisco. Moore said he thought that BFI will be checking with Winters, Ballinger, Tye, Merkel and Stamford to see if they might be interested in working with them.

In the financial report, Moore said that as of the end of February, 42 percent of the fiscal year had passed for the City of Cisco, but with extra expenditures, the city has already spent 65 percent of the budget appropriations in the sanitation department.

Moore said that no matter how hard they try, expenditures come up that are not expected. During February the city had to spend extra for the repair on machinery. During the March financial report, Moore said the major water leak will be tallied on it.

He said there is another water leak on Conrad Hilton, and the city crews are expected to work on it Tuesday.

In other matters, council members approved a resolution of the City of Cisco urging the Texas Legislature to raise the cap on street use charges for electric and gas companies. This will be done by HB 2155 or SB 1040.

Moore said WTU is paying 1941 rates, and this will be one way the city of Cisco could increase their revenue instead of raising taxes. He said WTU is paying the city

of Cisco 3% franchise tax. Moore said they have a policy of paying 2% in other cities.

This fee, (Texas Tax Code), is a charge to the gas and electric companies for the use of city streets, alleys or public ways by a public utility.

In the city manager's report, Moore said Sergeant Larry Jernigan with the Cisco Police Department is back on duty after having open heart surgery. He is due to go back to the doctor in about five weeks, and is anticipating the doctor to release him so he can go back to full time.

Moore said Morris Hardin

resigned from the Cisco police force to go to the work for the sheriff's department. Moore said he did a great job and if he is not happy there he will certainly be eligible for rehiring.

Mayor Joe Wheatley said the Cisco Police Department does a tremendous job with lots of hindrances. They are a fantastic force and Cisco is very fortunate to have a police force such as this one.

Council member John Muller said Chief of Police Billy Rains and the entire police force all work very well with the other law departments in the county.

All the council members were in attendance.

AARP Offers Tax Assistance

The 1988 income tax deadline of April 15th is fast approaching. Do you need help with your return? Do you have any questions about how to complete your return? The AARP Tax-Aide program has trained counselors available to assist you and their services are free of any charges.

If you're an older American, be sure you are not missing out on some important tax benefits, says the American Association of Retired Persons.

As an older American, you may not have to file a return. The Internal Revenue Service says that you may be entitled to take a standard deduction amount on your tax return that is higher than the amount allowed other taxpayers. You may not have to itemize your deduction, for example, if you would ordinarily file a joint return and both you and your spouse are over 65 years of age, your standard deduction is \$6200 and if your gross income is less than \$10,000 you need not file a return.

A single person, aged 65 or older, generally does not need to file a return unless your gross total income is in excess of \$5,700.

Are you thinking of selling your home? A taxpayer who is over 55 years of age may take advantage of up to \$125,000 once-in-a-lifetime exclusion on the gain from the sale.

Free income tax assistance is available to low and moderate income persons through AARP's Tax-Aide program. Tax-Aide volunteers are trained, in cooperation with the IRS, and will provide assistance through April 16, 1989.

decide your willingness to ensure the continued availability of hospital and emergency room service in Cisco. Unfortunately, this means that it must be paid for with your tax monies. The tax payers of the Cisco

Hospital District will decide if the tax rate is raised or not. The Board of Directors will only comply with the wishes of the voters.

It should be acknowledged that voters over the age of 65 receive a \$12,000.00 exemption on their homestead. In this way it is hoped that some consideration is given to the fixed incomes of our senior citizens. It is my understanding that most counties have only a \$5,000.00 exemption.

National statistics indicate that 81 percent of the population over age 75 only seek health care in the community in which they live. E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital's net revenues are normally 85 to 90 percent medicare monies.

3. What will the increased monies be used for? In recent meetings we have discussed the need to replace and upgrade equipment, in the areas of laboratory, respiratory therapy, telephone, and fax equipment.

It is evident that we need another physician who provides specialty services such as surgery. This takes money for salary guarantees, while the physician establishes a practice. We have been recently negotiating with a general surgeon, who seriously considered moving to Cisco, but with the uncertainty of the May 6th referendum he did not feel he could risk coming to Cisco until the hospital was capable of meeting the guarantees. He chose to take an opportunity in Arkansas. We will continue to search for additional specialty physicians.

Rural Health Care Transition Grants Work Completed

A consortium of six local hospitals recently completed work on a grant designed to find methods to assist rural hospitals adjust to the current financial payment system and survive by recreating economies of scale through cooperatively bidding contracts, joint use of services, and developing a service center to assist with reduction of fixed and variable overhead costs.

The grant entitled: The Redevelopment of Economies of Scale in Rural Hospitals Through the Development of a Centralized Service Center: The Development of a Health Care Delivery System, was jointly submitted by E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital of Cisco, Eastland Memorial Hospital of Eastland, Stephens Memorial Hospital of Breckenridge, De Leon Hospital of De Leon, North Runnels Hospital of Winters, and Ballinger Memorial Hospital of Ballinger.

The grant was part of a nationwide program funded by the federal government that is being administered by the health care financing administration to provide funds for rural hospitals to provide high quality care to their rural communities. Funding will be provided to support the planning and implementation of projects whose goal is to permit the hospital to better adjust to the changes in clinical practice patterns: service populations, the declining demand for acute care inpatient hospital capacity, declining ability to provide appropriate staffing for inpatient hospital services, increasing demand for ambulatory and emergency services, increasing demand for appropriate integration of community health service, or the need for adequate access to emergency care that inpatient care in areas in which a significant number of underutilized hospital beds are being eliminated.

According to the grant information, 80-to-90 hospitals will receive a grant. These will be chosen from applications submitted to HCFA and will be awarded in September 1989. Texas submitted 54 grant applications representing 91 hospitals according to the Texas Department of Health. This by far was the largest number of grant applications submitted by any state. Of those grants 10 were submitted by hospitals in Charles Stenholm's congressional district, representing 18 different hospitals.

The grant submitted by the local six hospitals has as its central purpose to plan and implement a system

that enhances efficiency, reduces duplications, and builds economies of scale by providing services to participating hospitals through a coordinated program. The service center would be a coordinating body for all services which are contracted or otherwise purchased. These services would include but not be limited to: consultants, including dietary, pharmacy, and registered record administrators/accredited record technicians, in house services such as laboratory, dietary, purchasing, utilization review, quality assurance, and hospital based home health agency, administrative functions such as medical records, accounts payable, accounts receivable, medicare cost reports and computer functions, personnel functions such as management of insurance programs, payroll, and benefits programs, and physician recruitment and ambulance services.

Under the grant proposal each hospital could maintain their own autonomy, and sense of independence while contracting for services which enhance the operational economies of scale of each hospital, by creating specialists who enhance and broaden the base of available services through a cooperative network of health care providers. The result is that fewer dollars are spent while accomplishing the same amount of work.

The grant represents a lot of hard work and brings together six hospitals who plan to work together to ensure that they retain quality health care in their communities.

Bill Pending To Dissolve Hospital District

State Representative Jim Parker of Comanche has introduced a bill in the Texas legislature to call for the dissolution of the South Eastland County Hospital District.

Titled House Bill 1841, this measure will - if enacted - dissolve the District by certain procedures. All the assets and liabilities of the District, mainly including the bankrupt Blackwell Memorial Hospital, would be transferred to Eastland County. The County would also be responsible for indigent Health Care in the District.

According to a staff member at Parker's office in Austin the bill was introduced to the Legislature on March 6. It was referred to a County Affairs Committee on March 16, and is still with the Committee. Reportedly Parker is hoping for a quick hearing on the bill, but no date has been set.

One provision in the bill says that it is an imperative public necessity that the Constitutional rule requiring

ills to be read on three several days in each house be suspended. If this suspension of rules is followed, the bill could possibly be passed with one reading.

A hospital had operated in Gorman for years, and a new building was constructed about 13 years ago. The Blackwell Memorial Hospital closed in September 1986, and declared bankruptcy in Jan., 1988. At that time of bankruptcy the District debt was estimated as around \$600,000. Exact current figures were not available for the newspaper but the debt is reported to be \$400,000 or more. Some creditors have not yet made claims on their bills.

The Court has ordered the Hospital Board to auction off the 38-bed building and the three acres it is located on by June. This will be applied to indebtedness.

If HB 1841 passes, the act will take effect Sept. 1, 1989. An election can be called in the South Eastland County

Hospital District to dissolve it. Then only persons registered in that District could vote on the proposition.

The bill states: "If a majority of the votes in the election favor dissolution and transfer of the district's remaining assets and debts and obligations, the Board shall on or before Dec. 31, 1990, transfer to Eastland County all remaining assets that then belong to the district. At the

time of the transfer, Eastland County shall assume all debts and bond obligations at the district which remain unsatisfied or not discharged in bankruptcy, and any duty to furnish indigent health care."

Eastland County citizens who are interested in this bill should contact the office of Rep. Jim Parker and others who may vote on the measure. For HB 1841 could have a far-reaching effect on the whole county.



Camera Scam Uncovered

On March 16, 1989, a False Representation Order (FRO) was issued against Camera Hut, 1505 Wallace Drive, Carrollton, Tx. 75006-6639, with respect to engaging in a false, misleading and deceptive business practice.

Since about October, 1987, Camera Hut sent direct mail postcards (sometimes up to one million at a time) to potential customers in all 50 states. The postcard was called a "Register Receipt Notice" and lead the recipient to believe it is a notice for a camera that was already ordered/purchased. The camera is described as a 35MM Quick-Shot Camera, 50MM lens, case, straps, built-in focus, adapter and instructions. Customers required the amount of \$12.85, believing they were paying for insurance and/or shipping and handling costs. They received a plastic camera not worth the money customers had paid. Recipients of the postcards also got the impression that it was an official USPS notice.

The Camera Hut location in Carrollton is a business address and was receiving 400-600 pieces of mail a day. This FRO allows the USPS to return all the mail to sender; therein, keeping the violator from receiving any further proceeds. The investigation is continuing.

Featherlite Stops Production In Ranger

Due to a recession in the construction industry in the Southwestern United States, the market for construction materials has become very competitive and even bleak. Featherlite Building Products of Ranger has been producing materials for Featherlite owned building block plants and for other construction uses.

This building recession has yet to show any sign of improvement, and Featherlite inventory of building materials has continued to stack up as sales decline.

Featherlite Building Products President H.V. Moss said Friday that it was probably the saddest day of his life as he announced that twenty-three employees in Ranger would be laid off indefinitely, noting the impact on Ranger.

The kilns, or burning operation, are being shut down with about half of the company's Ranger workforce finding themselves out of work. The remainder of the employees are being retained to load, crush, and ship materials

from the company's large inventory.

High interest rates, less available financing, and overbuilding in the past have depressed the market, but if conditions should improve in the distant future, the plant could be brought back into production.
