HOOS-GOW Officials Start Politicing

Dr. Charles Barnes, Project HOOS-GOW co-ordinator, and Mr. Don Shepard, president of Eastland County Economical Development Committee are leading a group of Eastland County citizens to a legislative breakfast in Austin on Thursday

morning, April 6. The breakfast, sponsored by Texas Chamber of Commerce, permits citizens to meet with legislators to discuss significant issues now being considered in the current legislative session.

The Eastland County dele-

gation have invited Senator Bob Glassgow and Representative Jim Parker to be their guest at the early morning meeting. Glassgow and Parker represent Eastland County in 71st legislature. While both have indicated support for HOOS-GOW, the Eastland County effort to have a state prison located here, the planned meeting will explain progress by local committees and will hopefully result in introduction to other legislators who will be willing to give Eastland County their vote.

Another visit by a county delegation is planned on May 8, with our legislator have been asked to attend a bi-monthly meeting of Texas Board of Corrections who will ultimately make the decision of citing the new state prison.

Cisco Police Report

Case Managers Ease Adjustments For Chronically Ill, Injured Kids

One day four years ago, 13-year old Johnny (not his real name) went from the normal activity of a teenager, to sitting in a wheelchair, with only the use of his hands.

Struck by a careless driver, the boy became a quadriplegic. And even though he remained mentally bright, he and his family faced the confusion of his long, complicated medical care and rehabilitation.

Then a case manager from the Texas Department of Health (TDH) entered the scene. The manager was from the TDH Bureau of Chronically Ill and Disabled Children's Services (CIDC). The CIDC program assists children with certain severely handicapping medical problems.

The CIDC case manager assigned to help Johnny provided emotional support to the family and saw to it that their home was modified so Johnny could get around in it independently. In addition, through the CIDC program, the case manager arranged payment for an electric wheelchair and for most of Johnny's rehabilitation and medical expenses.

Today, Johnny transports himself from class to class at school in his electric wheelchair. He is doing well in his studies, and in outside activities. He even has a part-time job as a disc jockey at a local radio station.

Johnny's progress is largely credited to the help offered by the CIDC program, and by the program's case management plan. Under this plan, each client is assigned a specific case manager. The manager creates an overall health program for the clients, coordinating CIDC services and other needed medical, social, nutritional, and educational services.

By assigning an individual case manager to coordinate the care for each patient, CIDC spares patients much of the frustration often associated with ongoing medical care.

In 1988, the CIDC program served 16,000 clients. To be eligible for the program, a person must be younger than 21, be a resident of Texas, meet income guidelines, and have one of the special health needs covered by CIDC services.

The CIDC program pays the medical costs for many chronic illnesses, including birth defects; bone, muscle, and joint problems; heart conditions; neurological disorders; cleft palate; cystic fibrosis; cancer; hemophilia; certain eye and ear disorders; and severe burns.

Some of the expenses paid for through CIDC include fees for physical therapy, speech therapy, transportation for the patient, 60 days or less in a hospital, and

prescribed medicines, braces, and artificial limbs.

President Of T.D.A. Auxiliary Visits Bettye McGinness Here

Lenore Humburg, president of the Texas Dental Association Auxiliary, was in Cisco last week to visit with Ciscoan Bettye McGinness. Louise Hooper, Lenore's secretary and correspondent, who is travelling with her, was also in Cisco.

Lenore, nominated as Auxiliary president on May 7, 1988, visits with each of the 20 districts in the Auxiliary. She said Auxiliary members are made up of spouses of dentists in Texas. Lenore said the Auxiliary use to be all wives, but now 49 percent of the dentists are women.

The Auxiliary is supportive of the dentists, and as she said, they can beat the drums for the dentists, especially in the legislature.

The Auxiliary is responsible for a Memorial fund. Money in the fund is used for dentist's grants. She said they have given away four grants and there is a waiting list for two of the grants. Another use for the money is to discreetly help a dentist and his family who are going through terrible circumstances in their lives.

The Auxiliary has a Silver Lining fund where money that is donated can be used to set up dental school loans. She said they are now going into a graduate school loan program.

Another activity for the Auxiliary is helping to pro-

mote dental health education, at schools and other places. Bettye said her husband has quite a few pamphlets on the dangers of smokeless tobacco. Bettye said a dentist can detect a cancer in the month of someone who uses the smokeless tobacco by an examination.

They promote the Texas Smile Week, which is held the last week in June, and the Dental Health Week which is held in February.

Lenore's husband, Dr. Emmett Humburg, is a pediatric dentist in Houston, and he helps the elderly in nursing homes and donates time for the clinics that have a rate by pay method of payment.

Mrs. Hooper's husband, Dr. W.C. (Clyde) Hooper an endodontist in Houston, and Bettye's husband, Dr. Allen McGinness, a dentist in Cisco, also work with these programs. She said this is one way dentist feel as though they can give something back to society.

She said dentist members of the TDA fill in for each other in case of illness or accidents to help keep a practice going.

Dentists with the TDA can join at the local, state and national level. She said insurance can be bought a lower level with the TDA and they always have educational programs, since dentistry is changing constantly.

The TDA has 20 districts in Texas, Cisco is in district 17, and in the northwest division. There are four divisions. To be nominated as president, the local auxiliary has to put up a name for the president's job, and then a voting committee picks one name, and then, Lenora said, the work begins.

She said one of the benefits of being a president is all the friendships she has made. Bettye was president of the TDA Auxiliary in 1986-87.

Lake Brownwood Black Bass Record Broken, Again

April 2, 1989 will be a day for Charlie Smith of Early to remember. Not only did Charlie collect a hefty paycheck of over \$1,700.00 for winning the Brownwood Bass Club Open Bass Tournament but also for catching the fish of a lifetime, an eleven pound 4 ounce giant. This sets a new lake record for Lake Brownwood. Charlie's 3 fish string tipped the scales at 17 pounds even. The huge bass was a mere 24 inches long but measure 27 inches in girth.

One hundred and eighty four contestants were on hand for this year's event, down from last year by about 100. At the 4:00 p.m. weigh-in close to 75 anglers had weighed in 3 or less bass. The top ten finishers were:

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Congressman Stenholm Announces Support For New Initiatives In Rural Health Care

WASHINGTON, D.C.—Congressman Charles W. Stenholm has announced his support for major new initiatives in rural health care legislation. Stenholm is a founding member and the only Texan on the Steering Committee of the House Rural Health Care Coalition, a bipartisan group of over 100 Members of Congress which introduced the legislation.

Included in the package of bills were measures that would reduce the urban/rural "differential" in Medicare funding for hospitals and physicians. One crucial element to the hospital reim-

bursment bill is the proposed establishment of a "critical access facilities program." Small rural hospitals in isolated areas which are crucial to continued access to care would be designated to receive special subsidies from Medicare under this program.

An additional measure cosponsored by Stenholm would establish a \$45 million block grant program to states for emergency services in rural areas. This money could be used by small communities to recruit and train emergency medical personnel and to purchase emergency equipment. "Especially with so

many hospitals closing, meaning patients must travel greater distances for treatment, I felt it was imperative that we provide some money to upgrade, or in some cases begin from scratch, our emergency services," Stenholm explained.

To give rural areas another handle with which to attract physicians, the West Texas Democrat also is supporting legislation to restore the tax deduction for education loan interest for physicians, nurses and allied health professionals who agree to practice in medically underserved areas. Stenholm argued, "While this

along won't be sufficient to find all of the new professionals we need in rural areas, it's one of a number of other positives we can use when we're trying to recruit these professionals."

While Stenholm was involved in developing the entire legislative package, he was particularly active in reshaping a demonstration project program which encourages primary care physicians to take a portion of their residency training in a rural healthcare facility. The new proposal will expand this program from four to ten demonstrations and allow a single medical school or teaching hospital to form liaisons with multiple rural hospitals. The residents will be encouraged to spend one or two years of training in the

rural setting. Additionally, this proposal will encourage rural physicians in practice to return to the teaching hospital for intensive periods of continuing education in order to bring the most up-to-date procedures to their own practice setting.

Stenholm concluded, "We're far from being out of the woods in solving our rural care problems. Still, I can't help but be encouraged by the wide variety of solutions which the Coalition has proposed, as well as by the large number of Members who have become involved in the issue."

Senate Finance Committee Approves Increase In Standard Dollar Amount For Reimbursement Of Rural Hospitals

The Senate Finance Committee has approved a \$49 million increase in the minimum standard dollar amount for hospital reimbursement, raising the dollar amount rural hospitals may receive from the State, announced State Senator Bob Glasgow (D-Stephenville).

"This \$49 million will help in easing the rural health care crisis in Texas. The money will partially restore the 1986 cuts in reimbursements to

hospitals that serve rural Texas," Glasgow said.

"Hopefully, this increase will help keep rural hospitals from closing. A number of hospitals in my Senatorial District have been closing one after another and I was determined to halt this dangerous trend this Session," said Glasgow, who serves as Vice Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee.

"When someone needs urgent medical attention it is just as necessary regardless of where they live. Those who live in rural areas shouldn't have to travel long distances for medical care. Having the

nearest hospital 100 miles away is at best a great inconvenience, and at worst life threatening," Glasgow said.

The Senate Finance Committee also added \$28.5 million to increase the income caps for nursing home and community care clients. "This money will allow the State to reach 88 percent of the federal maximum limit of money that may be spent to help our older Texans," Glasgow said.



Two Tarleton State University Presidential Honors Students Participate In Study

WASHINGTON, D.C.—While most students took to the beaches or the slopes for Spring Break, two members of the Tarleton State University Presidential Honors Program took a different direction.

Becky Bullock, a Marketing major from Eastland, and Natalie Adcock, an English major from Stephenville, participated in the Center for the Study of the Presidency's 20th Annual Student Symposium held March 16-19 in Washington, D.C. The two TSU sophomores were joined on the trip by Dr. Mallory Young, Director of the Presidential Honors Program.

Nearly 600 college students from across the United States attended the meeting which focused on the theme of "The Presidency at Two Hundred Years". Prominent speakers included U.S. Senator Charles Robb of Virginia; David Eisenhower, historian and grandson of the late president, Robert Strauss, former Democratic National Committee Chairman; Counsel to the President C. Boyden Gary; and Helen Thomas, Dean of the White House Correspondents.

Perhaps equally inspiring was the chance to meet the other students, the future

Congress members, ambassadors, and correspondents. Becky plans to enter some phase of politics after graduation; and she and Natalie are both involved in an experimental internship this semester at the State Capitol in Austin.

Frequent afternoon "free periods" allowed the Symposium participants an opportunity to explore on their own. "We got to be experts at navigating the Metro, Washington's subway system," said Adcock.

Presidential Honors Scholars are selected from academically outstanding high school

seniors accepted for enrollment at the University each fall. The students participated in special honors seminars conducted by members of the Honors Faculty, are encouraged to do research in their major fields of interest and are given the opportunity to attend professional seminars and conferences in their particular areas of interest.

The Washington trip was sponsored by Tarleton President Dr. Barry B. Thompson and the Honors Program. "This is clearly a Spring Break these two students will never forget," said Dr. Young.

What absolute nonsense. Want to guess some more? How about "cts." Does this mean Cents? Counts? Cartons? Cats? Crates? How about "BR." Does this mean Branch? Bankruptcy? Bedroom? Bathroom? Brokerage? How about "MI." Does this mean Miles? Minutes? Michigan?

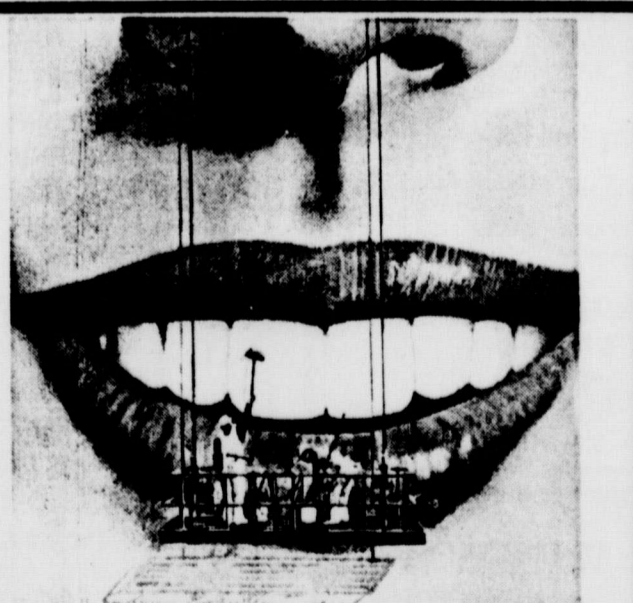

Americans May Owe Taxes On Their Retirement Funds Unless Action Is Taken

ST. LOUIS, MO.--More than 1.9 million Americans may soon owe taxes on their retirement funds if they don't take action by the 1988 tax deadline.

Due to a little-noticed provision in the 1986 tax law, individuals receiving annual distributions in excess of \$150,000 from pension plans, IRAs, profit-sharing plans or tax-sheltered annuities may be subject to an additional 15 percent tax on those distributions.

According to Edward D. Jones & Co., the effects of this new tax can be diminished by electing a special "grandfather rule". This rule is available to individuals who had balances in their retirement accounts of at

least \$552,000 by Aug. 1, 1986. The election of this rule enables certain retirement funds to be exempt from the tax penalty.

The election decision must be made by April 15 or, if you have been granted an extension, by your tax-filing deadline. This option will not be available after the 1988 tax year.

Completion of form 5329 is necessary to elect the exemption. This form, as well as all tax reporting documents, can be obtained from your local tax preparer or by calling 1-800-424-FORM.

"The new retirement-fund tax is complicated at best," Bob Steed said. "There are instances in which it benefits

eligible taxpayers to elect the exemption and instances in which the exemption decision could end up costing them more. Because the decision to exempt is irrevocable, taxpayers should contact their tax professionals for advice in this matter."

Pharmacy Topics

New drug therapy stops the bone loss of spinal osteoporosis and even restores some lost bone, say researchers at the University of Texas Southwestern Medical Center in Dallas. They note that the treatment is not effective against hip, wrist, or other osteoporosis.

A new study says Estrogen replacement therapy seems to protect against heart attacks in older women, and may cut the risk of stroke, too. The study was done by researchers at the University of Southern California.

Taking Omega 3 fatty acids after balloon angioplasty may help prevent the arteries from clogging up again, researchers at the Veterans Administration Medical Center in Dallas found.

Italian doctors report success treating migraine sufferers with a nasal spray containing a hormone derived from salmon. Previously, the hormone had only worked by injection.

Mrs. J. W. Booth has returned home after spending the winter with her children in Temple, Allen and San Antonio.

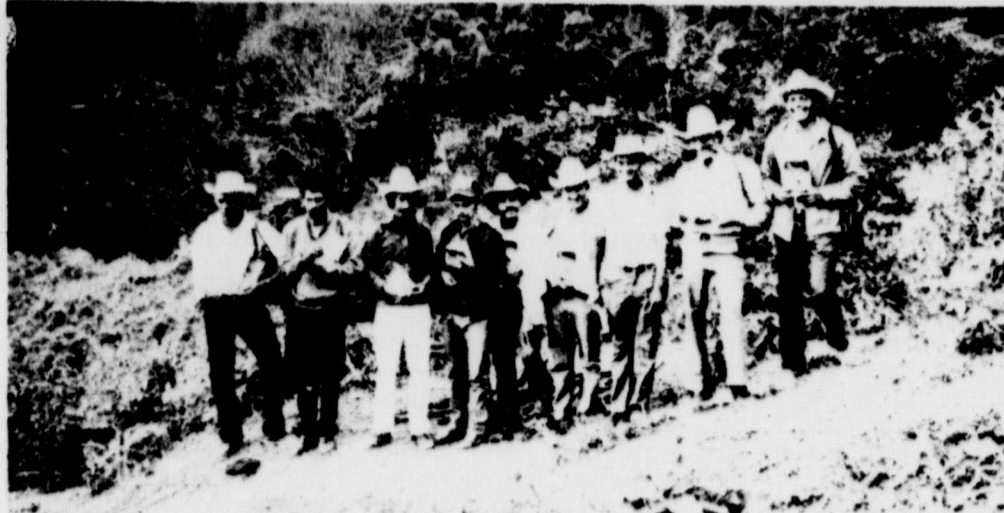
Moran and community were blessed with some much needed rain last Monday night. The amount varied from place to place,

These men in Honduras from Dr. Carlos Rocha's church are distributing Bibles to remote villages. They traveled down rural trails in a truck for one and a half hours, then rode on mules for another eight hours when the trail played out to get to this remote area.

Honduran Missionaries Visit Here

Dr. Carlos and Annette Rocha and their children, Hermara, Carly, and Anita, visited in Cisco and Eastland last week.

Staying in Dallas while on leave from the mission field, the Rochas have been missionaries in rural Honduras for years.

Spreading the gospel in an area where cattle, lumber, coffee, and bananas are produced in the mountainous terrain, the Rochas turned a once dangerous and almost lawless rural town, where cowboys rode horses and shot six-guns in the street, into a peaceful and friendly town where residents care about their neighbors.

Jesus Christ changed many of the rough and rowdy men

into good neighbors, and they now use their horses to ride to remote villages to tell others the gospel and to distribute Bibles to people who have never had one.

Dr. Rocha, a medical doctor, has been the only doctor available to treat the ills of many of the rural Honduran people in the area, and he has pastored the church organized in the town. In addition to being their doctor and pastor, he has also been their teacher, teaching them to building furniture and sanitary restrooms, to replant trees which are so important to the area, and how to raise the best hogs in the country, as well as teaching them the Bible.

The Rocha family, which could have been living in

wealth in the United States, chose rather to follow a missionary calling and to live in poverty in an underdeveloped country in order to minister to the people there. And the family members share in the missionary responsibilities.

Once having to walk for miles and to swim across the cold waters of flowing rivers to preach to the people, the Rochas now have a Bronco to drive. And they have earned the love and respect of the people.

Since the Rochas don't receive a salary but must depend on donations from churches and friends, money for food and for medicine for the sick always seems to be in short supply. And Dr. Rocha does not charge for his medical services. Most of the people wouldn't be able to pay anyway.

And Dr. Rocha says that at present it is even harder to raise funding for Bibles for the Honduran people, even though many of them are being saved.

All of the furniture and household items, and even the

house, which the Rochas used in Honduras have been sold, so these items must be replaced if they are to return to the mission field.

In Honduras the people are either Christians or non-Christians, but in the United States the Rochas are Baptists. Other denominations also denote to their work.

Some members of the Cisco Calvary Baptist Church have visited the Rochas in Honduras, and donations for them may be sent through that church.

Rising Star Vineyards Loan Application Going To Austin

In a called meeting Monday night a quorum of the Eastland County Commissioners approved the Texas Capital Fund application of Rising Star Vineyards Inc.

A loan of \$325,000 is being sought by this Company through the Texas Department of Commerce.

The first public meeting concerning this application was held on March 27, and was attended by Project owner Dr. Bill Lagle of Houston and Rising Star. Dr. Lagle has begun a 180 acre vineyard 8 miles north of Rising Star.

He hopes to grow table grapes, wine grapes for wineries, and grape cuttings, all for an extensive market.

At the second meeting Monday, Dr. Lagle was represented by Randy Mosely, CPA of Stephenville, who is the consultant on the loan aspect of the project.

Mosely brought along the loan application - an approx. 400 page book consisting of forms and papers involved with the application. This will be carried to the Texas Department of Commerce in Austin for review and possible approval.

Mosely told of some of the background of Dr. Lagle's project. Lagle works for McDonald Douglas in Houston, and also has a great interest in grape horticulture. He is the incoming President of the Texas Grape Growing Association.

In searching for the best soil for grape growing, Lagle used data from satellite readings. He analyzed the soil content, and minerals, then decided a certain area from wichita Falls down to San Saba had the right combination for vineyards. The sandy loam near Rising Star was his pick of the area.

Mosely said it would take about three years to bring the grape vines into production. Before that Lagle plans to sell grape stock (cuttings) to vineyards in a number of places. He is grafting a lot of his vines to native stock, which is disease resistant.

Within the next two years Lagle hopes to employ 25-30 people at Rising Star Vineyards, Mosely said.

Myrtle Wilks Art Club To Study Portraiture April 8

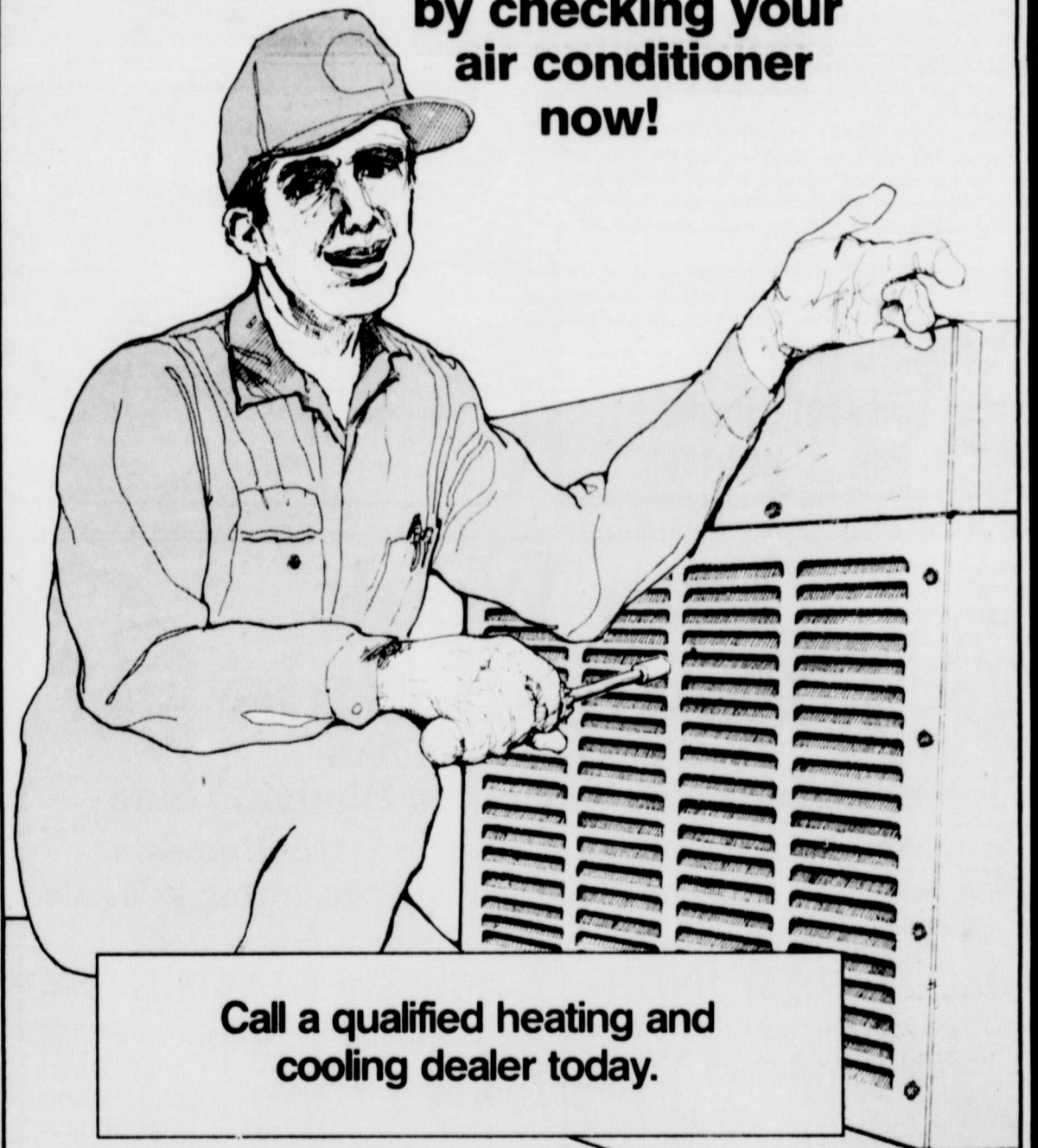
The exacting technique of capturing a facial likeness will be the focus of the April 8th meeting of the Myrtle Wilks Art Club.
