Cisco Police Report

A trailride breakfast at 7:00 a.m., followed by a ride to town, and a downtown street parade at 10 a.m., will kick off a big weekend of activities that will constitute

the 16th Annual Folklife Festival for the Cisco area. The street parade will have Mr. and Mrs. E.L. Jackson, both active Cisco civic leaders, as the grand

marshals.

Forming at the Conrad Hilton Community Center, between 3rd and 4th streets, on Hilton Avenue, the parade will move south to the Thrift-Mart parking lot, according to Chairman, Olin Odom.

Parade participants include the Cisco Junior College Band and Belles, the Cisco High School Band, members of the Eastland County Antique Car Club, Cisco Junior College Ag Club, and many others.

The Callahan County Riding Club and the Roaring Ranger Riding Club have indicated they will participate in the parade. Several individual bicycle entries have signed up for the parade. The Cisco Fire Department

will have four of their units in the parade.

The Annual Ranch Day at Cisco Junior College was scheduled for Wednesday, April 19, to kickoff the week's celebration. Plans called for students to attend scheduled classes until noon. A chili cookoff, was set for 8:30 with judging at 11:30 a.m. A barbecue lunch was planned at noon with assorted contests after lunch. The afternoon program called for a number of competitive events, and a western dance at 7:30 p.m., Wednesday was the day's concluding event.

The Folklife Festival and the Hilton Quilt Show, will start at 10:30 after the parade, Saturday and will

continue through Sunday afternoon. Assorted booths for display of arts and crafts will be located in the old Rockwell Bros. Lumber yard, on East 5th Street. There will be entertainment on both days throughout, until closing time. The Hilton Quilt Show will be held in the Mobley-Hilton Community Center.

Entertainment all day long Saturday at the Festival, will include a style show, gymnastics, trained dog show, birds of prey show and the famous Fowl Flying Contest to be held at 5:00 p.m.

A greased pig contest will be held every 1½ hours for youngsters, and demonstrations of corn husk dolls mak-

ing, spinning, weaving, tating, leathercraft, candle-dipping, hoe cake making, will be held all day Saturday.

Several Cisco High School Class reunions have been planned for the weekend to coincide with the Folklife Festival. Classes of 1937, 1939 and 1959, have made definite plans to meet on Friday and Saturday. The class of 1959 will ride in a float in the parade Saturday.

A dance on Saturday, played by Roy Strange and the Texas Thrillers, will begin at 8:00 p.m., on East 5th. There is a \$3 cover charge, and you must 13-years old or older to attend.

Polo Match To Benefit Programs At M.D. Anderson Cancer Center

HOUSTON—When most people think about polo, they envision an event on a rolling green countryside with spectators dressed in suits and dresses, but The University of Texas M.D. Anderson Cancer Center's Board of Visitors has put a new twist on the game.

On Saturday, April 22, some 1,000 Texans are expected to don Western gear and head for the prairies of West Texas for a polo match and a barbecue to benefit several research programs at M.D. Anderson.

"We're going to have men on horses, but this is no rodeo; this will be a true blue polo match," said Mary Anne McCloud, a member of M.D. Anderson's Board of Visitors, who is chairing the event along with her son-in-law, Henry Musselman, a Midland oilman. The Board of Visitors is a group of 140 community leaders who assist M.D.

Anderson with private fund raising and efforts through community awareness events.

The third "Polo on the Prairie" match begins at 4 p.m. at the Musselman Brothers' Lazy 3 Ranch, located 12 miles east of Albany. The match will be followed by a barbecue supper at 6 p.m. and a country-western dance.

"The efforts by our Board of Visitors to maintain M.D.

Anderson's reputation as a world-class cancer center have been tireless," said Dr. Charles A. LeMaistre, president of M.D. Anderson. "The success of previous events speaks to their commitment to M.D. Anderson's program in cancer prevention, research and education."

"Polo on the Prairie was a tremendous success last year, with more than \$40,000 raised," McCloud said.

Funds generated by this year's Polo on the Prairie will support a variety of programs at the comprehensive cancer center. Five areas selected to receive funding including the Anderson Network, a statewide group of former patients who provide support and encouragement for new patients, and the beauty and barber shop, whose volunteers provide wigs and education on proper hair and scalp care for patients during cancer treatment.

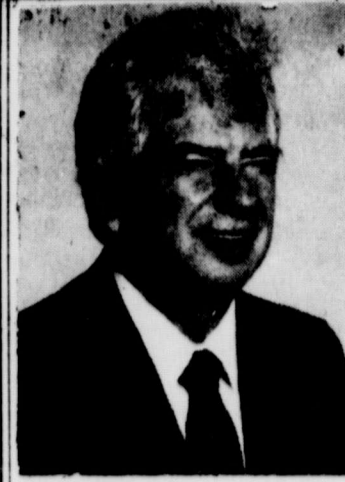

The following is an extraction from Robert Fulghum's best seller, **All I Really Need to Know I Learned in Kindergarten.**)

All I Really Need to Know I Learned in Kindergarten

By Robert Fulghum
Each Spring, for many years, I have set myself the task of writing a personal statement of belief: a Credo. When I was younger, the statement ran for many pages, trying to cover every base, with no loose ends. It sounded like a Supreme Court brief, as if words could resolve all conflicts about the meaning of existence.

The Credo has grown shorter in recent years - sometimes cynical, sometimes comical, sometimes bland - but I keep working at it. Recently I set out to get the statement of personal belief down to one page in simple terms, fully understanding the naive idealism that implied.

The inspiration for brevity came to me at a gasoline station. I managed to fill an

old car's tank with super-deluxe high-octane go-juice. My old hoopy couldn't handle it and got the willies - kept sputtering out at intersections and belching going downhill. I understood. My mind and my spirit get like that from time to time. Too much high-content information, and get the existential willies - keep sputtering out at intersections where life choices must be made and I either know too much or not enough. The examined life is no picnic.

I realized then what I already know most of what's necessary to live a meaningful life - that it isn't all that complicated. I know it.

And have known it for a long, long time. Living it - well, that's another matter, yes? Here's my Credo:

ALL I REALLY NEED TO KNOW about how to live and what to do and how to be I learned in kindergarten. Wisdom was not at the top of the graduate-school mountain, but there in the sandpile at Sunday School. These are the things I learned:

- Share everything.
- Play fair.
- Don't hit people.
- Put things back where you found them.
- Clean up your own mess.
- Don't take things that

aren't yours.
Say you're sorry when you hurt somebody.

Wash your hands before you eat.

Flush.
Warm cookies and milk are good for you.

Live a balanced life - learn some and think some and draw and paint and sing and dance and play and work every day some.

Take a nap every afternoon.

When you go out into the world, watch out for traffic, hold hands, and stick together.

Be aware of wonder.
Remember the little seed in the Styrofoam cup: The roots go down and the plant goes up and nobody really knows how or why, but we are all like that.

Goldfish and hamsters and white mice and even the little seed in the Styrofoam cup - they all die. So do we.

And then remember the Dick-and-Jane books and the first word you learned - the biggest word of all - LOOK.

Everything you need to know is in there somewhere - The Golden Rule and love and basic sanitation...Ecology and politics and equality and sane living.

Take any one of those items and extrapolate it into sophisticated adult terms and apply it to your family life or your work or your government or your world and it holds true and clear and firm. Think what a better world it would be if

we all - the whole world had cookies and milk about three o'clock every afternoon and then lay down with our blankets for a nap. Or if all governments had as a basic policy to always put things back where they found them and to clean up their own mess.

And it is still true, no matter how old you are when you go out into the world, it is best to hold hands and stick together.

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
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
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
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


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
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News Briefs

Letter To The Editor

Dear Editor:
I would like to add my comments on the current hospital situation, not only in Cisco, but every where in general.

Ultimately, the lack of money is causing the failures of our hospital. But there are many reasons for the lack of money. When I was a kid and being raised mostly by our grandparents at Richland Springs, we had no local hospital or doctor to go to. In the late 1950s we drove the 28 miles to Brady to see the doctor. I remember that their offices were located at a place you would never find them today, in the hospital itself. When we got sick we went to the hospital to see our doctor. Now every doctor seems to have his own little "hospital" away from the community hospital. We have no reason to go to the hospital now, there are no doctors there. This is not meant as criticism of the doctors, it is just the way it is. In my opinion this migration away from the hospitals started the decline.

Another thing that added to the decline is the automobile. Whenever we went to the doctor and he did not have the equipment available at the hospital, he would send us to the bigger towns and their hospitals. Well, as our situation improved and we became a more mobile people we decided to by-pass our small town doctors and go straight to the "bigger and better" doctors and their clinics and hospitals. The small town hospitals slowly have been relegated to places we only go in an emergency. Our local hospitals are really now just overly expensive and over built "emergency medical clinics."

We can not restore the local hospitals back to what they were as the cost would be too high. We would have to convince, if not coerce, the doctors into giving up their clinics and moving their offices back into the hospitals. This would restore the idea for the people to come to the hospital when they are sick. Second, zoning in town would have to be that pharmacies would have to be located around the hospital; this would reinforce the perception of going to the hospital. Third, if the county is required to pay for some people's hospital cost, they should require that the treatment be performed in our county by local doctors unless the illness calls for their going out of county. If a person goes out of county on their own then the county should refuse to pay their bills. Fourth, a class action lawsuit should be brought against the federal government charging discrimination against local citizens for not paying as much for their medical care as they pay for people in the bigger cities. As I say, these things are a price people won't like.

We might as well face the fact that local hospitals are becoming a thing of the past. We are going to have small regional hospitals in each county seat; the doctors in each out-lying town are going to have to equip their clinics to be emergency medical centers.

That is my opinion, and as such, I do not see any reason to pay higher taxes to try and keep our local hospital open, unless the people, the doctors and the county are willing to do what it takes to pay the price of keeping it open.

As I write this letter, I have before me a full page ad from The Cisco Press of October 16, 1969, listing some 700 businesses, organizations, and individuals who contributed from \$1.00 to \$5,000.00 each to the E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital Fund. In May of 1969, I was one of the volunteer workers in a house-to-house canvass to raise matching funds for a HUD grant to build a new hospital in Cisco. We made a second canvass in October, 1969. Every single person whom I contacted wanted that hospital, and even those with the most meager incomes made their modest contributions.

I believe that Cisco people still want that hospital! For twenty years the attractive, modern facility has served the Cisco area admirably. Cisco has been and continues to be blessed with fine, self-sacrificing doctors, caring nurses, and dedicated staff members which make the care of patients second to none. The hospital is a God-send to the elderly who no longer drive in urban traffic or who have no transportation of their own. It has saved thousands of dollars in transportation and lodging costs and countless hours of precious time for those who have had family members hospitalized here rather than in area towns. With some 63 residents at Canterbury Villa Nursing Home, 900 public school students, and 700 enrollees on campus at CJC, 250 of whom are dormitory students dependent on local medical care, the hospital is a vital necessity in time of emergency or epidemic. I am humbly grateful that the hospital has been there for the Bailey family in past years, and more recently through five hospitalizations and four trips to the emergency room. Nor will I ever forget that lives of dear friends have been spared when immediate medical attention was crucial!

As citizens, we can be crotchety old penny-pinching Scrooges and let the hospital, the security it provides, the payroll it generates, and its twenty-five employees go down the drain. OR we can arouse from the lethargy and negativism which exists and assure a better future for our home town. Raising the hospital tax from 12 cents to 28 cents for three years would cost no more than the average person would spend on cold drinks and much less than a smoker would invest in tobacco. Moreover, the 28 cents rate is well within line with the rate of nearby hospital districts, and Cisco has the advantage of already being organized as a hospital district.

What do you suppose would happen if the near 5,000 people who claim Cisco as their home town would

1) Patronize local

businesses by shopping Cisco first?

2) Actively support the water study and the Hoese-Gow project?

3) Lend stronger support to law enforcement officers?

4) Boost our fine public school system and our excellent junior college and laud their many accomplishments and honors?

5) Eat out in Cisco.

6) Use the local hospital, doctors, and pharmacists?

7) Actively support the referendum to raise the hospital tax for three years?

A concerned effort on the part of Cisco people can save the town from stagnation, thus stabilizing property values and assuring that the quality of life in Cisco would not deteriorate! Cisco people have a tremendous investment in E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital! It is no more than sound business practice to safe-guard our investment and keep it working for us! On the dedicatory plaque in the foyer of the hospital is this inscription: **THIS HOSPITAL—**

The symbol of the results of a united effort by concerned people of Cisco 1970

I have every confidence that the people of Cisco are still concerned — concerned enough to go to the polls on May 6 and vote to keep their hospital — for the sake of their own health and security and for the future of their home town!

1976-1989: Thirteen Years And 1000 Arthroscopic Sugeries Later

A.E. Pino, M.D., Orthopedic surgeon in the area since 1970, performed his 1000th arthroscopic surgery at the De Leon Hospital on April 6, 1989. Dr. Pino pioneered arthroscopic surgery in Central Texas performing his first arthroscopy at the Blackwell Hospital in Gorman, Texas, on April 6, 1976. At that time, this was an unknown operation by the majority of the bone specialists, but 13 years later has become one of the most common operations performed by orthopedic surgeons in injuries of the knee.

The operation is performed on an out-patient basis which produces significant hospital savings, decreases infection rate and other complications, and shortens the time it takes to return to work and sport activities. All procedures are done using a telescope like instrument that is inserted inside the joint through a small stab wound with other small tools. The telescope is attached to a miniature television camera, a video tape recorder, and a monitor. Taping the operation allows better documentation, patient education, understanding and teaching. All major joints like shoulder, elbow, wrist, hip, knee and ankle can be approached by arthroscopic surgery for diagnosis and treatment of diseases like rheumatoid arthritis, arthritis, gout and traumas, and sport-related injuries including cartilage tear and ligament tears. Some fractures can also be satisfactorily treated with the aide of arthroscopy.

Dr. Pino has written numerous papers in the field of arthroscopy including: "Abrasion Arthroplasty," "Arthroscopy: Our Experience in 500 Cases," "Arthroscopy in Diagnosis and Treatment of Fractures about the Knee," "Arthroscopy seminar (chairman, Chihuahua, Mexico, 1987)," "Arthroscopy in Diagnosis and Treatment of Fractures about the Wrist" (to be read at the 51st Annual Meeting and Scientific Session of the American Fracture Association in San Antonio, Texas, April 23-26, 1989; he is also chairman of this meeting).
