
who needed them. Brooms and mops can still be ordered. Just contact a member of the Cisco Lions Club.

Emergency Ambulance Service To Be Discussed At Public Hearings

A group of concernea citizens and public officials have been meeting on a regular basis to discuss various options and alternatives which might be available to ensure a stable continuation of emergency medical ambulance services within Eastland County Precincts 1 and 4, which include the Cities of Eastland and Cisco. It has become increasingly apparent over the past few years that residents within both cities and precincts deserve a permanent commitment or

guarantee that an ambulance service can be provided on a stable basis. Last summer, articles ap-

peared in both the Cisco and Eastland newspapers describing a "crisis" situation in both communities regarding support of Patterson Ambulance Service and the continual drop of ambulance membership over the last few years. At that time, the newspaper articles indicated that Patterson Ambulance Service might be forced to leave Eastland

County due to declining memberships. And even after a substantial and lengthly effort on the part of a great many people, last year's membership drive fell considerably short of its goals. Last year's experience clearly reflected our vulnerability in finding ourselves without emergency ambulance service and demonstrated a definite need to find a permanent solution to our continuing ambulance "crisis."

In their meetings, the group of concerned citizens and public officials discussed various realistic options which might be acceptable and available to the residents within both precincts. After careful deliberation, the group has developed a proposal that can result in a permanent, stable ambulance service; and, the group will make recommendations regarding its proposals to the Eastland **County Commissioners** Court and the elected officials of the Cities of Eastland and Cisco.

Public hearings have been scheduled within each of the jurisdictions to present the proposal and allow interested individuals and the general public to comment on and make recommendations regarding a permanent solution to alleviating the annual ambulance service crisis. Contest rules specify that essays be 600 to 1,000 words. Dependents of AASHTO employees and other AASHTO officials, and relatives of contest judges, are not eligible.

"Our local high school students are invited to participate within their schools," said Wes Heald, district engineer in Brownwood. "We are coordinating with school officials to provide contest rules and guidelines."

Heald said essays will be judged on how well they communicate the importance of transportation in America. The deadline for selection of

winners from each high school is mid-May, he said. A district winner will be selected from the school winners by June 1 and then compete at the state level.

"We're excited about the opportunity this gives students to explore the role transportation has played in our nation," said Stotzer. "In everything from economic growth to recreation, transportation is a significant part of our daily lives."

14" Limit Helping States Bass Fisheries'

Largemouth bass population at Lake Palestine are a good indication of how the 14-inch minimum length and 5 fish limits established in 1985 have improved the Texas bass fisheries.

Biologist Richard Ott said the change from a 10-inch minimum length to 14, and daily bag limit changes from 10 to five, have had positive results at Lake Palestine.

"There have been significant increases in numbers of bass in the 10 to 14 inch size class in both electrofishing and cove rotenone surveys," said Ott. The fall electrofishing catch rate for bass in that size range increased from 7.2 per hour in 1986 to 15 per hour in 1988. Cove rotenone samples showed a parallel increase, from seven per acre in 1986 to 33 per acre in 1988.

"Lake Palestine was known as 'big bass' lake during the 1970s and early 1980s," said Ott. "This resulted in a great deal of fishing pressure and heavy harvest of bass in the intermediate size classes."

Freezing weather during the winter of 1983-84 also may have contributed to bass decline, as it eliminated much of the vegetative cover needed by largemouth Ott said.

"With the increase in medium-sized bass, and the increased interest in catch-andrelease bass fishing, Palestine should soon recapture some of its former status as a big bass fishing lake," Ott said

Anglers at Lake Leon are also seeing an increase in bass in the 2 pound range. This is encouraging news, but the bad news is Leon is lacking in 8 to 12 inch bass. These fish were once the predominate size class at Leon in the early 1980's. One possible solution or alternative to improve in the overall fisheries at Leon, would be a steady stocking program.
