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Voters Choose Two New Hospital Directors And Say No To Tax Increase At Saturday's Election

The tax referendum for the E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital was defeated by a close 29 votes in the city election held last Saturday. There were 372 persons voting against the referendum and 343 voting for the tax increase.

Two new hospital directors were elected in the election. Kitty McCracken received 426 votes and Robert Conner received 425 votes. Incumbents DeAlva Chambers received 290 votes and Vergil Patrick received 285 votes.

Cole said he and the new directors will be working

hard with the other board members to try to keep the hospital open. He said it's not finished yet, even with the defeat of the referendum.

In other elections, incumbents Bruce Stovall, Rick Roark and Allen McGinnis were re-elected to the Cisco Independent School District board of directors. Stovall was the only director who was opposed in the race. He beat Randy Taylor, 433 votes to 312 votes.

In the Cisco City Council election, incumbent Arlie Whitley defeated Janelle Schrader by a slim margin of 297 votes to 293 votes.

Incumbents, Mayor Joe Wheatley, and Cisco Councilmember Allen Masters ran unopposed. Wheatley received 554 votes and Masters received 538 votes.

Jeffrey and Stacey will be honored at the Rotary Club's annual Citizenship Awards Luncheon on Thursday, May 18, at 12 noon at Traditions Restaurant. Speaker for the occasion will be the Hon. Mary Scott Nabers, State Commissioner of the Texas Employment Commission.

Jeffrey is the son of Rick and Kay Roark of Cisco. He has been very active in Cisco High, participating in band, Student Council, basketball, golf, National Honor Society, tennis, track, football, senior play, and Physics Club. He served as a class officer three of his four years at CHS, and is listed in Who's Who in American High Schools. He has received Academic Awards in nine subjects, and qualified for

district, regional, and state academic meets. He qualified for district and regional meets in track, and was All-District First Team Defense in football.

Stacey is the daughter of Ray and Alice Saunders of Cisco. She has likewise participated extensively in the various academic and organizational areas of campus life at CHS. She has been in Key Club, Student Council, Spanish Club, FCA, basketball, band, tennis, French Club, National Honor Society, Trig Club, and Physics Club. She has served as president of her class and of the National Honor Society. Budget Work Begins For County Commissioners

With discussion of the Patterson Ambulance Service deferred until Monday afternoon, Eastland County Commissioners tackled a number of other agenda items last Monday morning.

Requests for salary raises threaded through discussions on the 1989-90 county budget. It was finally suggested that across-the-board raises would be in order, with an additional 30 cents per hour for all full-time employees, and a \$30 increase per pay period for all elected officials.

It was also suggested that additional increases be given to the Justices of the Peace in Pct. 2 and 4, raising their salary to the level of the J.P. in Pct. 1.

Pct. 2 Justice of the Peace Alford Bush was granted a request for a larger office. The Commissioners agreed to pay an additional \$75 per month to rent an office in Ranger which Lone Star is leaving. Bush will move into these quarters on June 1.

On other job-related matters, the Commissioners approved a request by County Tax Collector Nancy Trout to give full-time employees for 10 years or more three weeks of vacation. Employees now get two weeks off after they've worked a year.

Billy Bacon, Commis-

sioner of Pct. 4, said that 14 inmates were currently in the county jail, with about half of them scheduled to go to TDC. The County is presently allowed to take a small quota to the State Prisons each month.

Sheriff Dee Hogan requested permission to purchase a new 35 mm camera and special equipment at a cost of \$504.90. The Commissioners granted his request, but questioned why so much equipment was needed when they purchased such items before.

Pct. 1 Commissioner Richard Robinson said that two or three years ago the Sheriff (a previous administration) "had me take a pickup load of cameras, typewriters and other stuff to the city dump."

On other Law Enforcement matters, Judge Scott Bailey said he was personally concerned about some Legislation pending in Austin. If enacted, these measures would change the Criminal Justice System and alter the makeup of courts. More financial burdens would also be placed on the counties to provide alternate treatment and confinement centers.

"If they rock the boat a lot it will make the Court Systems more difficult and expensive for a County such as Eastland," the Judge said.

ECEDC Has Happy Trip

Twenty-eight members of the Eastland County Economic Development Council travelled to Austin for meetings with legislators Bob Glasgow and Jim Parker at breakfast Monday morning. Both promised enthusiastically to give 100 percent support to Eastland County in its efforts to obtain a state prison. Jim Parker stated that Eastland County was an ideal

site for a large prison due to its central location and having services of the I-20 freeway. Also the nearness to the DFW metroplex which furnishes about 25 percent of the Department of Texas Corrections inmates, is a distinct plus. Senator Glasgow commented favorably on funding for this biennium and that there would probably be adequate monies for all the jail cells the governor wishes to build.

Mr. Jack Wheeler, a Gorman native serving in Austin, hosted the breakfast and pointed out the productivity of both our legislators and also the end of the session kept them both extremely busy.

Following the breakfast the Eastland contingent visited the bi-monthly meeting of the Board of Corrections. Of immediate importance was the announcement that requests for proposals for prison construction would be issued on May 19th and that all proposals must be in to Huntsville by June 30th. Also approved was the appointment of two sitting committees one of which affects Eastland County. These committees will be visiting proposal sites in mid summer and finalists in the selection process would probably be notified by October 1, 1989.

Visiting legislators and government officials is always a tiring task. However, all travellers reported a good trip and were very pleased at the response of the legislators and the Board of Corrections.

room of his home last Tuesday, and saw a cloud of dust coming across the field toward them. He grabbed his

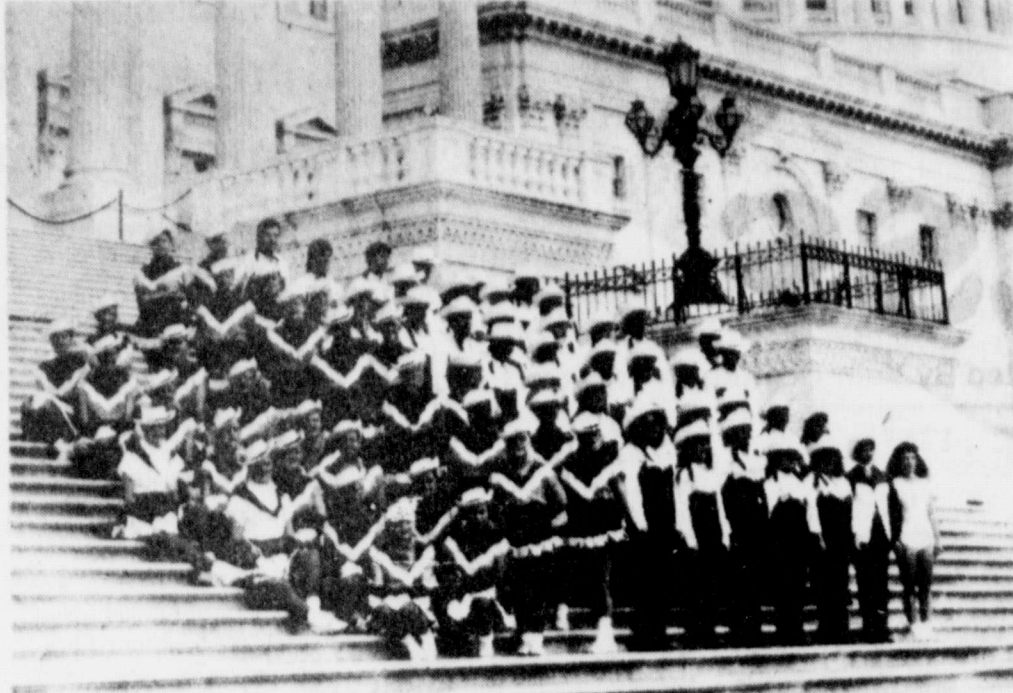

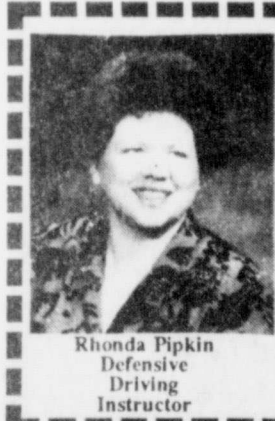

"Painting For Freedom" Now Off The Press

One of the highlights of the Texas Circuit Literary Festival in Cisco last weekend was the announcement of H.V. and Gaynell O'Brien's book "Painting For Freedom."

H.V. O'Brien spoke Friday evening to Editors, publishers and other journalists assembled at the Hilton Center. The O'Briens are publishers of the Eastland County Newspapers and the Callahan County Star.

The book of southwestern history tells the story of artists Anna Laurie Harle of Abilene, who sold her tapestry paintings to help free her Doctor son from a Mexican prison.

Accused of implication in a murder, Dr. Charles Harle was imprisoned in Vera Cruz during the early 1900's.

Texas, Mexican and American National 1 officials got to know Mrs. Harle well after that, and foreign revolutionaries felt her influence. Mexican General Pancho Villa proved to be the key in reuniting the artist and her son.

In the later part of the drama, Dr. Harle rode with Pancho Villa as his personal physician.

O'Brien told the crowd at the Hilton Center Friday that he and his wife Gaynell have worked for a number of years on "Painting For Freedom." The 160-page volume may read like fiction, he said, but it is actually a documentary account of International intrigue.

They first began to put pieces of the strange puzzle

together when Gaynell bought a large unsigned tapestry painting during the disposal of furnishings from a nearby home in Eastland. The book was the result of research determining the artist of the painting.

The trail led to the National Archives, crumbling newspaper files, fading memories, interview, letter writing and days of library and cemetery research. None of the informants knew the whole story. There were many surprises, including the driving purpose behind Mrs. Harle's work.

The O'Brien's found that a number of Mrs. Harle's beautiful pastoral oil-on-tapestry paintings were in homes and churches in the area. Classical figures and religious scenes appear to have been

Mrs. Harle's favorites, although she used other themes occasionally.

The book contains photographs of Anna Laurie Harle's work, along with pictures of some of the main characters of the story.

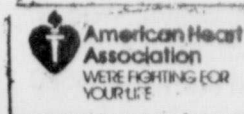

Sheriff Dee Hogan seems to favor anything that will change the Eastland County Jail's prisoners into productive law abiding citizens. But as a safeguard, since there are people who commit crimes and use illegal drugs and call it a religious ritual, only pastors and ministers from local churches who go through an orientation are allowed to regularly minister in the jail.

A group which has regularly been holding religious services in the County Jail for the prisoners is the Gideons, who are better known for distributing Bibles.

Most of the prisoners participate in the services between 1:30 and 3:30 on Sundays, and they seem to enjoy the music, singing and fellowship.

Bill and Bobbie Richardson and other Gideons are involved in the services along

with Roy Gevara, a minister, and Joe Herring, who provides the music.

Last week one of the prisoners accepted Jesus Christ as his savior and in what may have been a first for the jail, he was baptized while still a prisoner. A deputy escorted him to a special Saturday church serviced.

Charged with taking part in a robbery, Charles Payton denies that he was involved or that he has ever been at the location of the robbery. But he has a big smile on his face as he talks about accepting Jesus.

He had thought about needing salvation in the past, he said, and he finally took that first step. A burden was lifted from him, he testifies, and now he wants to talk to his wife and three sons in Dallas about Jesus. Meanwhile, there are other prisoners to talk to.

Sharp-Montford Organize Opposition To Federal Gas Tax Increase

AUSTIN-Texas Railroad Commissioner John Sharp and State Senator John Montford of Lubbock, have announced today the organization of a committee called Texans Against Discriminatory Taxation whose primary purpose is to focus Texas opposition to increased federal gasoline taxes which would place an undue and discriminatory burden on Texans as compared to other areas of the country. Joining Montford and Sharp at the news conference were John Watson, President of Texas Independent Producers and Royalty Owners, Robert Floyd, President of Texas Motor Transportation Association, Tom Johnson, Executive Vice President of Texas Association of General Contractors, Lawrence Olsen, Executive Vice President of Texas good Roads Association and Robert Looney,

President of Texas Mid-Continent Oil and Gas Association.

In a statement, Sharp listed several reasons why the tax will fall heaviest on Texans as opposed to residents of northern and eastern states who utilize mass transit systems instead of personal automobiles. "The proposed 25 cents or 50 cent increase in the gasoline tax being bantered about in Washington, D.C. is perhaps the worst thing that could happen in Texas in terms of slowing down our economic recovery. Aside from costing the Texas trucking and shipping industry hundreds of millions of dollars, it would cost average Texans, who use their cars much more than someone from New York or Chicago, a disproportionately larger share of their income", Sharp said. Sharp continued by saying that he "could not imagine any tax more discriminatory and unfair to Texans than this tax".

Sharp and Montford indicated that the tax would be discriminatory not only against the shipping industry

and individual families in Texas, but it would also be detrimental to the oil and gas industry in Texas which has already been hard hit.

They indicated that the purpose of the committee is to make sure that all Texans realize the negative impact that this proposed tax would have on Texas and to insure that the message of strong opposition to this tax from all Texans is conveyed in the strongest possible manner to Washington, D.C. Sharp and Montford said they soon will begin touring the State of Texas personally to develop intense opposition to such a tax.

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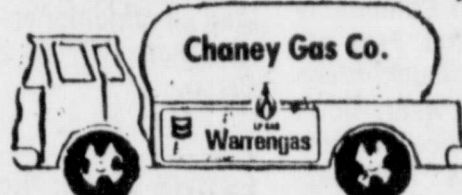
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12th Annual Breckenridge Air Show To Memorial Day Weekend

USDA Announces Support Level By Type, For 1989 - Crop Peanuts

WASHINGTON-The U.S. Department of Agriculture today announced support levels — by type, quality and location — for the 1989 peanut crop. Support is based on the previously announced national levels of \$615.87 per short ton for quota peanuts and \$149.75 per short ton for additional peanuts.

The quota support level by type, for an average grade ton of 1989-crop peanuts will be:

- \$610.89 for Virginia;
- \$621.06 for Runner;
- \$575.60 for Spanish;
- \$610.89 for Valencia - type from the Southwest area which are suitable for cleaning and roasting; and
- \$575.60 for other Valencia-type peanuts.

The method of computing the price support levels for 1989-crop peanuts, and the grades within the types is the

same as for the 1988-crop, except for Spanish-style peanuts.

The quantity of Spanish peanuts placed under loan in recent years and subsequently crushed into oil and meal has demonstrated that the price support value of Spanish peanuts have been overstated relative to other types of peanuts. Therefore, the 1989-crop differentials were developed by setting the sound mature Kernel (SMK) value for Spanish-type peanuts at the same SMK value as for Runner-type peanuts. Previously, the SMK value for Spanish-type peanuts was 0.5 per cent more than the SMK value for Runner-type peanuts.

A five-year statistical base, 1984-88, was used to project the expected quality of the 1989 crop.

The actual support level for an individual lot of peanuts will depend on the percent of the various sizes of Kernels in each ton and other factors.

For each percent of SMK's including sound split Kernels, the support level for the type of peanuts per ton is:

- Virginia-type, \$8,949;
- Runner-type, \$8,774;
- Spanish-type, \$8,774;
- Valencia-type in the Southwest area suitable for cleaning and roasting, \$9,129; and
- other Valencias, \$8,774.

The loan value for additional peanuts is 24.32 percent of the applicable quota rate. The factor represents the ratio of the \$149.75 per short ton national support level for additional peanuts to the \$615.87 per short ton national support level for quota peanuts.

Sheriff's Dept. News

A follow-up investigation of a number of burglary cases involving habitations and vehicles in the area led the Eastland County Sheriff's Dept. and the Ranger Police Dept. to the residence of a Ranger man.

On the afternoon of Friday, May 5, officers executed a search warrant at the Ranger residence, where officers recovered an assortment of furniture, power tools, a moped or motor scooter, and 175 plants growing in containers which the forensic lab in Ft. Worth identified as marijuana. Recovered property was identified as having been taken in two burglaries locally.

Officers in the Ranger

search included Ranger Chief Vernon Caughron and Asst. Chief Virginia Skaggs, deputies Don Griffith, Morris Hardin and Ben Sancillo, and Sheriff Dee Hogan. They arrested a Ranger man, who was charged with felony theft under a \$10,000 bond. The investigation is continuing.

Drugs and theft or burglary are so often related and crimes often result from the use of illegal drugs, says Sheriff Hogan. He explains that most young people in this area don't have the money for high priced illegal drugs, so drug dealers may accept stolen items as payment as they get the youths hooked on, or addicted, to drugs. The young people may steal to maintain

the habit. Prisoners held on burglary or theft charges in the local jail appear to be addicted to drugs or alcohol the majority of the time, reports Sheriff Hogan.

On May 6 or 7, about 40 locks were cut off of golf cart storage sheds at Lone Cedar Country Club by Lake Leon. Reported taken from one shed was: 1 and 2 S.W., a Miller bag, a MacGregor, a putter-Stotline, a glove, balls and tees, a rain suit, an umbrella, and eyeglasses. Deputies expect that items may also be reported missing from the other sheds.

The telephone at Stucky's Ranger Hill at I-20 and Hwy. 16 was destroyed with a cutting torch and about \$40 may have been removed. The time is uncertain but it may have happened between May 1 and 4.

Cisco police arrested a man on receiving stolen property and forgery charges from Alabama. He has agreed to extradition to Alabama. He is also wanted on stolen auto charges from Florida.

A woman arrested for D.W.I. refusal posted bond.

A man arrested on a Governor's warrant was ordered released by the Attorney General's office.

A woman held on Ranger traffic warrants was released by Judge Wheat.

A man held for DWI bonded out.

A man held for theft paid \$30 restitution.

A man held for theft received a book in/book out judgment.

A man held for cruelty to animals received a commitment judgment.

A man held for theft bonded out.

A man served his time for P.I. and class C assault.

A man paid \$82 in fines for expired registration and running a stop sign.

A woman bonded out on theft charges.

A man arrested in Granbury was transported to Eastland on forgery charges.

Deputies responded to alarms going off, to mail boxes being pushed over in the Mitchel Community, to drug paraphernalia being found south of Eastland, a request for extra patrols, and a burglary in progress call 4 miles west of Cisco. Cisco officers also responded to the burglary call. No entry to the residence was gained by burglars.

Some burglary cases were being cleared up, efforts were underway to dispose of some old tear gas, and an arrest warrant was issued for a Ranger man.

Sheriff Hogan plans to send a jailer to school to maintain

the jail doors. The training will cost about \$600 but one annual jail door maintenance visit runs \$900 or more. A jailer so trained can save the county a lot of money.

The average daily jail population has been 18.56 with 9.06 of them county prisoners and 7 T.D.C. prisoners. One has been an out of state prisoner, 2.36 probation prisoners and 1.23 held on blue warrants. Sheriff Hogan says that state people indicate that prisoners may be accepted from the jail by T.D.C. more quickly in the future, and that the county jail seems to be complete adequate for the county's foreseeable needs.

However more equipment is needed so that officers may use advanced scientific methods to quickly solve crimes and get convictions.

Sheriff Hogan is working on a new annual budget.

In April deputies served 36 civil papers and 85 criminal warrants. 81 prisoners were held, fines of \$1339 and fees of \$3235.67 were collected.

Pharmacy Topics

Protect your eyes from the sun without sunglasses? It's possible, with new eye drops that absorb 98 percent of ultraviolet rays. The "liquid sunglasses" were patented by an ophthalmic surgeon at the Westchester Eye Institute in White Plains, New York.

More on sunburn: Scientists in France compared facial skin of older people with that of hidden areas (such as the inner elbow) and found that wrinkles don't come from age, but are the result of sun damage. Study was reported in the International Journal of Dermatology.

Anti-herpes medication is safe to use full-time, researchers at the University of New Mexico School of Medicine found. The medication is usually taken during outbreaks, but, in a test, daily use kept the virus in check without any toxic effects.

Chewing gum containing xylitol, a sugar substitute, seems to protect the teeth from cavities, a Finnish study found. Even the back teeth -- at-risk second molars -- fared well.
