Cisco Water Wins First Place In Regional Contest

Cisco won first place for best tasting water in the Big Country Drinking Water Contest held last week in Abilene. The contest, sponsored by the Central West Texas Regional Water Utilities Association was held as part of Water Awareness Week activities. Cisco won first place in cities of less than 10,000 population. Abilene won first place in cities of more than 10,000 population.

The water is judged on how it tastes, smells and looks. Water Department Superintendent, Leon Boles, said Cisco lost the Best of Show contest by just one point. But Cisco won the other contests easily, he said.

Boles said the contest was held in conjunction with the Water Association 21st annual short school. The school promotes the aesthetic quality of drinking water by en-

couraging water utilities to treat raw water in such a way that no taste and odors occur in their finished water. City employees with the water and sewer utilities, who attend the school are given a certificate. There were 210 people who attended the school, but Boles said he wasn't sure how many cities entered the contest.

A minimum of four trained panelists judged the contest. To center the contest a sample of the city's tap water had to be placed in a one liter glass bottle. Flavor profile analysis method was used in the taste and odor determinations.

Judges smelled the water to see if its odor was slight or strong and if it had an odor, was it chalky, sweet, septic, chlorine, fishy, fruity, grassy, woody, musty, earthy or medicinal. After tasting the water it was then decided if the water had a

weak or strong taste or if it was sweet, bitter, salty, sour metallic or plastic.

Cisco and Abilene will now go to the state tasting contest to be held next March. The state contest is sponsored by the Texas Water Utilities Association in College Station.

City manager Mike Moore said he would like to thank everyone who has been instrumental in helping Cisco, have the best tasting water in the region. He said former mayor Eris Ritchie and the city council members worked hard to get the new water treatment plant in operation. Moore said about 7-10 years ago that Cisco citizens would receive a notice in the mail notifying them that the water was below state level, and now it is the best in this region and has a chance to be judged the best in the state.

Cisco Hosts Texas Circuit Literary Festival

When writers and Editors get together there are certain to be a lot of ideas exchanged. This is exactly what happened during the Texas Circuit Literary Festival at the Hilton Center in Cisco on May 5-6.

This event, sponsored by Cisco Junior College and the Cisco Writers Club, drew a number of visitors from Eastland, Albany, Austin and San Angelo. The first arrivals were welcomed at 1:30 p.m. Friday by Cisco Mayor Joe Wheatley, CJC President Dr. Roger Schustersit and Dr. Monte Lewis of CJC.

Dr. Lewis is one of the Resident Editors of "Cross Timbers Review," hosts of the event. The CJC Literary magazine has won wide recognition, and last year helped draw the first Texas Circuit Festival held in Cisco.

C.A. Wiles of Austin, Chairman of the Texas Circuit Literary group, told how glad he was to be back for another meeting.

"I believe there are more writers per capita in Cisco and Eastland than anywhere else in the state," The Editor and Publisher said. He also told about interesting new books on his display tables, and of his needs for publication.

Cisco Cemetery Association Is Debt Free

The Cisco Cemetery Association held their 13th annual board of directors meeting on May 4. President Anton White, presided over the meeting. Also attending the meeting were vice president Steve Clary, secretary/treasurer Trixie Whitley, treasurer Louise Cooper and trustees, DeAlva Chambers, Velma Joyner, Brad Kimbrough, J.H. Penn, Burnice Gorr, James W. Johnston, J.T. Richardson and Jim Bob McCanlies.

Trixie Whitley gave a financial report for the association. She said the association had a total income of \$17,592 with \$4,324 of that coming from donations.

Mr. White reported that the association was formed April 1, 1976, and started with nothing. Since that time there has been 943 burials, and 6,000 scoops of dirt brought in. Several of the older graves had been curbed and were never filled in

and the association had them filled up. He said the association now has a trust fund balance of \$149,639.45.

State Employment Commissioner Nabors To Speak For Rotary Citizenship Awards Luncheon

Commissioner Mary Scott Nabors of the Texas Employment Commission in Austin will be guest speaker for the Cisco Rotary Club's Annual Citizenship Awards Luncheon on Thursday of this week, May 18, according to an announcement by the Rotary Club.

The luncheon will honor Cisco High School Seniors Jeffrey Roark and Stacey Saunders for outstanding citizenship during their four years of high school.

Mrs. Nabors is currently the representative for employers on the Texas Employment Commission. She was appointed in 1984 by the Governor of Texas, and was the first woman ever appointed to a full six year term on the Commission.

Commissioner Nabors is one of the more prominent women in Texas government today. She has an extensive background in business. She managed two radio stations and a weekly newspaper and hosted a daily public affairs talk show for many years. Since her appointment to the Commission, she has instigated numerous innovative programs, including the Ex-Offender Employment Program. She also writes a weekly column for Texas Business Today magazine, which runs in 210 Texas newspapers. Additionally, she produces a weekly radio program that airs throughout the state and she publishes a monthly newsletter dealing with business and employment issues.

Among the honors and achievements for which Commissioner Nabors has been cited are: Elected to Leadership Texas in 1987, Woman of the Year, listed in Who's Who in Texas Today, Spirit of Texas Award in 1987, Outstanding Young Women of America, and Who's Who in the Southwest. She currently serves on several state-wide boards and is past president of the Texas Legislative Ladies Association.

Fitness Center To Be Built On CJC Campus

The Board of Regents of Cisco Junior College voted unanimously to proceed with plans to build a Fitness Center housing three racquetball courts and a weight/exercise area.

Bobby Smith, CJC Dean of Fiscal Services, explained that money for the new building will come from accumulated surpluses. "We should not need to raise taxes or sell bonds to build this needed facility," said Smith.

James H. Wheeler Architects of Abilene will be asked to continue with more detailed plans. "We will be asking our architect to offer bidders certain alternatives in construction in order to get the best building for the best price," said Roger Schusterei, CJC president. "We hope the cost will be around \$300,000," he added.

In other business, the Board renewed the food service contract with ARA Services and substituted a registration fee for the existing parking fee. The Board also adopted a new salary schedule concept for faculty.

The Board also heard several reports and handled several personnel matters, including a new counselor/coordinator position at the Clyde campus.

The next regular meeting of the CJC Board of Regents will be June 12.

Martin said movement monuments could be placed on the bridge and inside the dam and if there is movement it will show up. He said the monuments will be checked periodically, maybe once a month at first. He said if there is no problem then it can be checked quarterly or checked 3-4 times a year, then yearly.

Mr. Martin said the City of Cisco also received a letter from the state about the water treatment plant. He said one new requirement will be to have a plant operator on duty at all times. Or the city could get an automatic dialer that will call city hall or the home of the water plant supervisor if trouble erupts.

It was stated that the trouble with a dialer is that there is not enough phone cable to supply it. He said the phone company will need to lay the correct type of cable for this service. Or the city could put dialers at College Hill.

Manager Mike Moore said the state does not have any trouble with the quality of water in Cisco. He said this is a new ruling with the state.

Moore said Cisco's water is cleaner than most cities.

In other matters, council members approved a resolution that authorized the city to enter into an interlocal contract agreement with the Texas Department of Parks and Wildlife for the extension of the City's boat ramp. Moore said the state will pay for the extension of a boat ramp that will be 28' X 60'.

He said this length is not long enough to reach deep water and the money the city receives from the state cannot be used on a new boat ramp. It can only be used to build onto a ramp that is already in existence. Moore said at the present, time boats can be launched at the ramp on the south side of the point. He said he will check with state officials about a contract agreement to build a new boat ramp.

Antony White and Jim Bob McCannies attended the council meeting and Mr. White gave a brief report on the Cisco Cemetery Association. Mr. White said the association feels as though the cemetery is in excellent condition. He said the operating expense for the cemetery was \$25,743.53 for last year. He said he feels as though the expense will be about this amount each year from now on. He said the association received \$4,324, in donations last year, and \$13,268.55 from interest bearing accounts.

The city subsidizes the Association each year for

their service. Manager Moore said the cemetery is not privately owned, it is a public cemetery.

Mayor Wheatley thanked Mr. White and said the Cisco Cemetery Association is doing a wonderful job and they are to be commended.

Also attending the meeting was Melvin Bailey, election judge for Saturday's election. Mayor Wheatley thanked him for the outstanding work that he does each year for the Cisco elections. All council members attended the meeting.

asked about some of his favorite poetry. Rattan listed the King James version of the Bible and poems of Robert Frost as being some of his all-time favorites.

Another speaker was Lela Latch Lloyd, President of the Cisco Writer's Club. Mrs. Lloyd recounted some history of the Hilton-Mobley Hotel, and read the first chapter of her book: "Cisco: Cradle of Hilton's Empire."

Other members of the Cisco Writer's Club read manuscripts on various topics. Wesley Valeck, CJC History professor, joined them to read some outstanding poetry. There was also time out to browse through the attractive book displays, which included a wide range of material. Cora Pugmire of Fort Concho Museum had some interesting copies of Concho River Review and other publications.

The Cisco Writer's Club had a book table full of material by local and area writers. Around a dozen authors were represented there.

At 6 p.m. on Friday the talk changed from literary creations to Oscar Week's Barbeque Dinner. People lined up for this famous food, then

settled down for after-dinner speakers.

H.V. and Gaynell O'Brien presented their new book "Painting For Freedom." H.V. O'Brien told of some of the joys and perils of self-publication, drawing the audience into his story.

The O'Briens began working on the historical material in their book about fifteen years ago, after Mrs. O'Brien purchased an oil-on-tapestry painting by an unknown artist. The search for the identity of the painter, Anna Laurie Harle, uncovered a story of international intrigue. All who heard the story seemed very impressed with the book.

Another guest speaker was Dr. Jim Linebarger, English professor and "Poet In Residence" at the University of North Texas. He was introduced by former pupil, Dr. Cleatus Rattan.

Rattan said Dr. Linebarger has won recognition as a popular teacher and fine poet. Linebarger has written a number of articles about poetry, and has had several volumes of his own published.

Dr. Linebarger discussed his ideas about poetry, and interposed comments with the reading of his work. He brought several poems from a volume called "Texas Blues," and these were mainly on southwestern themes. One told of hunting coyotes with his Dad.

When the Friday meetings closed a number of visitors remained in Cisco for the program next day. The meeting resumed early in the morning, and the crowd grew larger as the day went by. Groups of students joined the Editors and journalists.

Special speakers were featuring during the morning, including Austin members of The Texas Circuit. Philip

Stephens, Editor of the award-winning "Backyard Press", read some of his own poetry. He used background music for some of this material.

Stephens said he was only interested in poets with unique delivery techniques. At this time he has a backlog of material, he reported.

AKwari Evans, Editor of a weekly Austin journal called "Nokoa," brought some of his poetry. He also shared his ideas on the craft. Evans, an Austin native, leads out in anti-apartheid movement.

Terence Dalrymple, Editor of the Concho River Review, explained what sort of material he wants for this magazine. The journal is now in its third year of publication, and specializes in quality fiction, history, poetry and general articles about the Southwest. Dalrymple has published a number of things by Eastland County writers, with an article by Dr. Monte Lewis pending.

After a good lunch from Cisco Junior College cafeteria the Open Readings began. There were a number of special guests, including Dr. Chris Willerton from Abilene Christian University. Dr. Joe Stamey, professor of Philosophy at McMurry College, read poetry on Saturday. Dr. Stamey is at home in Cisco, for he grew up here.

As the Festival began to wind down C.A. Wiles indicated that the Texas Circuit group would like to return to Cisco again next year.

All agreed that it would be something to look forward to - a plus for the College, town and area.

Fishing Outdoors

By Terry L. Wilson

The anglers choice team circuit for our area hosted its May event at Lake Brownwood. Area anglers placing well were Joe Bob Moore and Bud Wood in third, Bobby and Tommy Maynard seventh. Winning, this event was Doug Hill and Morris Stevens of Abilene with over 11 pounds. Hubbard Creek will be the site for the June event.

A fisherman from Hurst came within a couple of pounds of setting a new state record for stripped bass 2 weeks ago below Lake Texoma's Denison Dam.

Biologist Bruce Hysmith of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department said Doug Norvine was fishing from the banks with a surf spinning outfit and half-ounce jig April 23 when he landed a 40-pound, 14 ounce striper.

The fish sets a Red River record, beating a 36-pounder caught from the same area in 1982. The current state record striper is a 43-pound 8 ounce fish caught below the Mansfield (Lake Travis) Dam near Austin in March 1986 by Wayne Savoie of Round Rock.

Mirrolure a long respected bait line just keeps on producing. In 1988 two anglers proved this with two new state records. November was a

special month for Bill Brown of Shirley, Arkansas landed a state record 20 lb. 11 oz. Hybrid striper on a mirrolure 5m modified to the action of the 95m Darter-Walker.

Twelve days later Ron Gardner, a guide at Lake Whitney, Texas hooked into a Texas state record 7 lb. 11 oz. smallmouth. The fish took a candy apple red mirrolure 33 MR Rattler.

And carrying on in the long line of excellent lures is the LeMaster's Diver. The ultimate in crank baits with its center line balance and tightly controlled wiggle has the ability to deliver depth, speed and action. Moreover, it has the famous mirrolure flash and unique sound chamber. This lure can be retrieved or trolled to depths from the surface to 10 feet plus.

A couple of quick tips on catching bass. One of the most important factors in catching bass is learning to work "structure." Structure being anything from a simple rock pile to ledges anything on the bottom of the lake that is different than the surround area that may draw and hold fish. The simplest way of doing this is to learn to read topo maps. And learning to use a depth finder is a must once you are on the water looking for the structure you located

from your topo map.

A few lures mastered to an art in working for bass can help your angling alot. Throwing everything in the box and none of them properly doesn't produce very well. If you pick lures in different colors and sizes that will cover all depths, your only problem is to find the fish.

May 27, 1989 the Coleman Chamber of Commerce will be hosting the Miller Lite Open Bass Tournament. This event will take place at Lake Coleman. Fishing hours will be 6:30 a.m. till 5:00 p.m. Entry fee for this one will be \$20.00 with an optional \$5.00 big bass pot.

Keep an eye out for our Texas weather changes if in doubt pull your boat out. Good fishing and safe boating on your next trip "Fishing Outdoors."

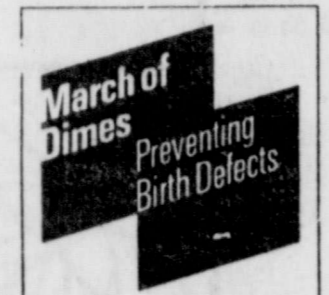

Gordon Spot

Farmers who want to retain eligibility for USDA program benefits, including commodity price supports, loans and crop insurance, need to be aware of the "Conservation Compliance" provisions of the 1985 Food Security Act.

This relatively new provision requires farmers who have "highly erodible cropland" to have a conservation plan approved and to begin actively implementing that plan by January 1, 1990.

The plan must be fully implemented by January 1, 1995. Each farmer should determine whether or not these provisions apply to his land. These provisions are equally important to both the landowner and tenant.

In some counties, limited cost-share funds will be available to assist farmers in implementing their plans. Those funds available through the Agricultural Conservation Program (ACP), the Great Plains Conservation Program (GPAC), and other programs are limited and will be distributed in the usual manner.

Therefore, individuals who have their plans in place and make appropriate application will be in a much better position to receive those funds than those who lag behind.

Farmers who have questions about Conservation Compliance or whether or not their land meets the highly erodible lands definition should check in county offices of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service and the Soil Conservation Service.

Developing the conservation plan is a relatively simple process. Once the soil type and land conditions are known, SCS conservationists will provide farmers with several options for "significantly reducing" erosion. In many cases, farmers are already meeting required erosion reductions. In those cases, the plan will consist of documentation of what farmers are already doing.

If further reduction in erosion are needed, a farmer can select from various alternatives to complete the conservation plan. The farmer has the option to develop a plan

covering only the highly erodible fields or to prepare a plan for the entire farm. SCS conservationists make a record of the decisions, and the local Soil and Water Conservation District is then asked to approve the plan. Once a plan is approved, it can be revised as needed.

Farmers are encouraged to act as soon as possible to complete this necessary process to assure continuing compliance and eligibility for USDA programs.

A Mother's Day Story

UNUSUAL PAINTINGS BELIEVED TO BE IN EASTLAND COUNTY PANCHO VILLA RESCUED SON OF ARTIST FROM DUNGEON

The strange and exciting story of an artist who sold her works all over the Southwest at the turn of the century to help free her doctor son from a Mexican prison, may very well have an Eastland County connection, because some of the paintings are believed to be privately owned here.

Her beautiful pastoral oil-on-tapestry paintings have brightened homes and churches and brought joy to their owners throughout the Southwest since the turn of the century.

Very few know of the despair that accompanied every painstaking stroke of her brush. Certainly every painting had its message, but the strange, remarkable, untold story of the artist and the calamity in her life that motivated her for years is a much greater picture. She painted with a purpose.

And before her story was finally played out over international borders, she would have become involved in the sphere of diplomatic relations, political lobbying and even into the areas of helping finance a foreign revolution.

Texas and American national officials up to and even including the President got to know her well, and foreign revolutionaries felt her influence. She was a mother praying, fighting and laboring for one of her children who she believed had been wronged.

Mexican legend Pancho Villa would prove to be the pivotal key in re-uniting the fragile artist and her physician son who had been a long-time prisoner in a Mexican dungeon.

Putting all the pieces of the strange puzzle together began with a modern

woman's determination to identify the artist of a large painting she had bought during the disposal of furnishings from a large nearby home.

The trail took many turns, including the National Archives, crumbling newspaper files, fading memories, interview, letter writing and days of library and cemetery research. None of the informants knew the whole story. A piece was added here; a new name turned up there; many other paintings came to light and, little by little, the story of Anna Laurie Harle unfolded.

Truly, it was a classic example of international intrigue that was so much a part of the Southwestern History in the early 1900's. The thoroughly documented account reads today like pure fiction, but its principals actually lived it.

There are believed to be hundreds of the paintings by Mrs. Harle throughout the Southwestern States, many hung in major churches, and were proud, prized possessions of those who had decorated stately homes. Since then, they have been passed from generation to generation. Now with the publication of this material, their value will be enhanced by knowledge of the story behind the paintings.

She was a Southwestern pioneer artist; her son, a pioneer doctor who first practiced in Mexico, where their troubles began; their combined story is the kind of pioneer experience that helped forge this great area. In the later stages of this epic, Dr. Harle rode with Villa as his personal physician.

Historians, art-lovers, those who

find strength and enjoyment from knowing real people solving real problems, will find the pages of this book intriguing.

The curious initial search for the artist of the old, unsigned tapestry painting turned quickly into a panorama of Texas-Mexico history as the mystery surrounding the artist unfolded.

Readers who know of other paintings which they believe might be Harles are encouraged to correspond with the authors through the publisher.

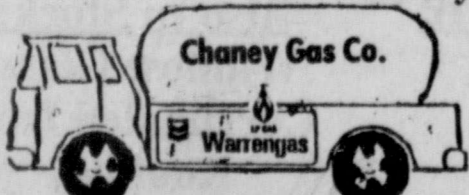

(1) "Blessing (Matagorda)

Johnathan Edwards Pierce was so elated over the arrival of the Southern Pacific Railroad as a boon to ranchers that he wanted to name the town *Thank God*. The railroad refused such a name, and *Blessing* was settled upon as a less enthusiastic statement of appreciation for the rail service. The earliest post office operated as *Deming's Bridge*, named for E.A. Deming, the postmaster. PO June 22, 1858 (*Deming's Bridge*): Nov. 5, 1866; Feb. 28 1872 - Mar. 3, 1899 (*Harley*) - Aug. 17, 1903 (*Blessing*) - Pop. 571.

(2) Three Acres Oil Field (Callahan)

The crew of the oil company was playing poker in the "doghouse," the small room at the entrance to the oil rig, when the first well came in. Everyone threw in his cards and ran to bring the well in. One of the players tried to get the men to finish the game because, after losing all night, he had just gotten a hand of three aces when they quit. Hence, the oil company named the field "Three Aces."

Enjoyable reading and can serve as an aid in giving a location of some of those places you've heard grandpa and grandma talk about in their family stories, the places you just knew were "never" in the State of Texas.
