## Oryx Energy To Operate New Gas Processing Plant

DALLAS—Oryx Energy Company, the largest independent oil and gas producer in North America, is the operator of three new natural gas plants with a total processing capacity of 33 million cubic feet per day (MMcf/D). The plants are located in Texas, Michigan and Louisiana.

The Eastland County Gas Plant, in Eastland County, TX, has a design capacity of 22 MMcf/D.

Natural gas is processed at -155 degree F to recover 125,000 gallons per day of an ethane/propane/butane/gasoline-mix product.

The processed liquids are pipelined to Gulf Coast markets, while the natural gas remaining after processing is delivered to pipelines in the Eastland County area.

The natural gas comes from various fields in a four-county area of central Texas.

Oryx Energy has a 100-percent interest in the new plant, which features a cryogenic processing system.

The Eastland County Gas Plant was designed and constructed by Pro-Quip of Tulsa, OK, and is scheduled for start-up in June.

The Oryx Plant is located about five miles north of Desdemona, north and east from the Howard Cemetery. Reports are that some distillate products are expected to be hauled by truck north to State Highway 16. Another Gas Plant - the Christie Plant - is located about three miles south of the Oryx Plant.

County Judge Scott Bailey says that the new Oryx Plant will definitely assist the County Tax base, it will also provide more jobs, and almost guarantee a ready market this year round for natural gas produced here.

On other Oryx plants, the Akron Gas Plant in Tuscola County, MI, is designed to produce 12,000 gallons a day of propane and heavier-mix product from 10 MMcf/D at 20 degree F. The natural gas comes from the Akron field. The processed liquids are trucked to local markets and the remaining natural gas is (Continued On Next Page)

### Read Planner To Get Weather Information

Billy Rains, Cisco Chief of Police, and a member of the Cisco Volunteer Fire Department, said that if a tornado had hit Cisco last Friday night, there could have been multiple deaths in Cisco. Rains said these deaths would have been from people who were in their cars, out riding around during the storm, thinking they could outrun a tornado.

The thunderstorm registered as "Level 6" with the National Weather Service, which is the highest level of a dangerous storm there is. Rains said the National Weather Service said there were several funnel clouds in the storm, but luckily there was not one to touch down around here. One tornado was spotted dipping down out of the clouds northwest of Cisco.

The chief said there are no public emergency shelters in Cisco, so if citizens do not have access to a storm cellar, or basement at their home, then they need to find out what to do in case of an emergency.

He said the City of Cisco has prepared an "Citizen's Emergency Planner." The planner gives instructions as to what to do in case of a tornado. One of the main rules listed in the planner is that if a tornado is spotted, and you are in a "mobile home" or a "vehicle", leave them immediately and go to a substantial structure or if there is not one around, lie flat in the nearest ditch, ravine or culvert with your hands shielding your head.

In the Wichita Falls tornado that struck in 1981, most of the deaths occurred when the people tried to escape the tornado in their cars. When the tornadoes hit, the cars were twisted beyond description and the people inside died.

People cannot outrun a tornado in a car. The storm may be moving 30 miles per hour, but the twister can move up to 170 miles per hour after it is on the ground. And even though the tornadoes do move to the Northeast, a funnel cloud will not go in a straight line at all times.

Rains said when a severe thunderstorm is in this area, everyone is urged to keep in touch with it's development by listening to the television, radio or a police scanner. Rains said KEAS radio in Eastland has a live radar and the weather watchers keep in touch with them at all times. He said with a scanner, the conversations of the weather watchers can be heard.

Chief Rains said a DPS officer was on Highway 183, (Breckenridge Highway) about 7 miles out of Cisco, when the area was hit with tennis ball size hail. He said the hail put dents in the bumper of his patrol car and knocked out a car window. Rains said can you imagine what this kind of hail could do a person?

He said a man was killed in Santo by lightning when this same thunderstorm cell passed through there. He said eight helicopters and an apartment complex were destroyed when it passed through in an area south of Mineral Wells. Cisco was lucky to have not received much damage.

But Rains said he wants to stress the fact that getting into a car and driving around is more dangerous and can create more problems than anything else.

The first priority to the Weather Watchers in this area is the lives of the citizens here. But, Rains added, the citizens who get into their car and drive around

during a dangerous storm can themselves create a serious problem. He said Cisco has been extremely lucky about tornadoes not touching down when storms pass through this area. Except for the incident where the McCurry's home was hit earlier this month, and when the Hightower's place was hit last year, Cisco has escaped damage. But, he

said, the weather is acting a little crazy lately and the odds could turn against Cisco. Hopefully, we won't have one he said, but the citizens need to be prepared in case it happens.

The safety of the public comes first, and since there are not public shelters, then the citizens need to use the advice of the planners. Tornadoes are unpredictable and it is up to all of Cisco citizens to be prepared.

The boat docks were twisted around like toys and it was reported that some very expensive boats were destroyed in the storm. There was some boats submerged in the lake. You could see the front of one of the boats and the other one was half in the water.

Trailer homes were overturned and some massive oak trees were pulled up by the roots. Several roofs were torn off, but most of the buildings were left standing. It is a good idea to get the planner and learn what can be done if a tornado should touch down in this area. The planners are free to the public.

delivered to Southeastern Michigan Gas Company. Oryx Energy has a 58-percent interest in the Akron Gas Plant; other interest owners are Marathon Oil Company (21.4 percent) and Dart Oil & Gas Corporation (20.6 percent). Oryx Energy modified an existing lean oil process to a straight refrigeration process after acquiring the facility from Dart last fall.

The Beaver Dam Creek Plant in St. Helena Parish, La., can produce up to 3,000 gallons per day of propane and heavier-mix product from 1 MMcf/D at 0 degree F. The natural gas is produced from the Beaver Dam Creek field; treating and processing were

required to meet pipeline specifications. The liquid product is trucked to local markets and the remaining natural gas is delivered to Transco. Oryx Energy owns 52.4 percent of the plant, while six other owners have interests ranging from 3 to 15 percent. Oryx Energy constructed the plant, which opened earlier this year.

The Dallas-based Oryx Energy Company, formerly known as Sun Exploration and Production Company, has assets in excess of \$4 billion and net proved reserves on nearly one billion equivalent barrels. Oryx Energy is traded on the New York Stock Exchange under the ticker symbol "ORX".

In participating at the State Meet, students qualify for Texas Interscholastic League Foundation scholarships. During 1988-89, the UIL awarded more than \$437,000 in scholarship grants to 336 college students who competed at the UIL State Academic Meet. In 1989-90, the UIL expects to award an estimated 350 new and renewed grants, valued at approximately \$460,000. The UIL funds are made possible through grants from foundations, individuals and families. The UIL has over \$1,800,000 in endowed funds.

## Ground Breaking At The Texas Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fair Park Held

The Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund of Texas has raised sufficient funds to begin construction on a state wide Memorial honoring fellow Texans who served and died in the Vietnam War. On Monday, April 24, ground was broken, signaling the culmination of several years of effort to erect a memorial dedicated to those Texans who served in the Vietnam War.

The Memorial will occupy 12,000 square feet of a two acre site at the original entrance of State Fair Park in Dallas. Focal point of the Memorial is four granite tablets listing the names of 3,271 Texans who were killed in action. A fifth tablet lists the 156 names of Texans who are missing in action.

Robert S. Williams Construction Co., Inc. has been awarded the contract to build the Memorial. "I understand the significance of this very important project; to all veterans, to the city, and the state," said Bob Williams, President of Robert S. Williams Construction. "Our commitment is to build the best memorial possible." Williams, a Vietnam Veteran, anticipates completing the project by late September or early October. Dedication is scheduled for Veteran's Day, November 11, 1989.

Members of the Memorial Fund Board voted unanimously to approve the final design presented by Martratt/Garmon Architects. Richard Martratt, partner in the firm and a Vietnam Veteran, says the Memorial's design is an appropriate tribute to those Texans who fought and died in the war.

Arthur Ruff, Chairman of the Board of the Bradford Companies, expressed the difficulty the organization had in raising funds. "We're eager to begin construction Monday," said Ruff, also a Vietnam Veteran. "What has happened to the state economy has made raising money very difficult. Fortunately, a lot of committed people worked hard enough to make the Memorial a reality. I believe the effort will be well rewarded by the positive effect the Memorial will have on everyone."

## City Of Cisco Citizens' Emergency Planner A Guide For Emergency Preparation

Taking the necessary steps to prepare for natural and man-made disasters is important to the well-being of this community. To help prepare to react quickly and correctly in the event of a disaster, the City of Cisco offers this Citizens' Emergency Planner for the home and business as a public service.

This Planner explains how the city will operate in the event of an emergency, how you will be warned, and what measures you should take to protect yourself and your family. It is recommended that you keep this publication in the back of your telephone book so that it will be readily available if needed. This information will help you make advance plans so you will be better prepared for certain types of emergencies. Review the information with all family members.

While the city attempts to advise citizens on measures to protect their lives and property, the primary responsibility rests with the individual. Please take time to make adequate preparations to deal with natural and man-made disasters.

### WEATHER WARNINGS

The National Weather Service (NWS) forecasts the weather and announces the "watches" and "warnings" for severe weather. When a "watch" is announced there is no need for immediate alarm, but you should continue to observe weather conditions and listen for additional weather announcements on your radio or television. A broadcast of possible hail, high wind, heavy rain, tornadoes, or other severe weather watches are intended to give you time to prepare for the possibility.

If a tornado or other violent weather is imminent, a "warning" to seek shelter will be given. A "warning" means the danger is real and you need to take appropriate action immediately.

In Cisco, citizens are warned of impending dangerous weather by two primary sources:

1. Emergency announcements broadcast over radio and television stations in Eastland and Abilene, and through the local cablevision service.
2. Outdoor warning sirens. The outdoor warning sirens are located in three sites in the city and will be sounded in all situations when danger is imminent, especially when time is critical in warning those people who are outside of their homes or businesses.

WHEN THE OUTDOOR WARNING SIRENS ARE SOUNDED DURING TIMES OF BAD OR POTENTIALLY SEVERE WEATHER, DANGER IS IMMINENT AND ALL CITIZENS ARE STRONGLY ADVISED TO SEEK SHELTER AND TAKE COVER IMMEDIATELY.

### "Basic Planning Information"

In tornadoes, the strongest winds blow toward the area located 45 degrees left of the tornado's direction of travel (i.e. a tornado moving from the direction of the southwest means that the south side of the structure will receive the maximum force of the wind). Tornadoes can come from any direction. In Cisco, tornadoes can be expected from severe thunderstorm clouds that may move in mostly from the northwest, west or southwest. One of the most effective life saving measures for your family at this time is to be sure that each member can recognize the signs of tornadic weather.

### "Areas To Avoid"

In the event of a tornado or other violent weather, stay away from the following:

- a. Windows.
- b. Long span rooms with high ceilings.
- c. Unprotected corridors facing the oncoming winds.
- d. Windowed slide walls. (Windows break and blow into rooms resulting in increased pressure which aids in lifting the roof. Masonry exterior walls higher than 10 feet are hazardous.)
- e. Load bearing walls, especially along the south and west sides, as they are the most dangerous.
- f. You should avoid spaces opposite doorways or openings into rooms that have windows, interior locations that contain display cases, swinging doors, and tall objects, such as a chimney, that may fall on you.

### "Safest Areas"

The safest areas to be are underground, the lowest floor, interior spaces, a closet without load bearing walls, bathtubs, framed construction, or an inside room with walls close together, and no windows.

### "Preparing Your Safe Place"

Severe weather may occur frequently, and you may choose to spend more time in your "safe place" than just an occasional few minutes. Make your place comfortable so you do not avoid going there because of the discomfort. Be sure that hanging objects, or those stored on a shelf will not be dangerous to you. Some suggested items to be stored in your "safe place" or taken there before you must take cover include a battery operated radio with an electric extension cord so the radio can be run on house current as long as possible, water in an unbreakable jug, and keep telephone as close as possible so you will not have to leave your shelter should it ring.

### "Tornado Signs And Action You Should Take"

In case there is no time for an official "take cover" warning by the city or NWS, each citizen should know what severe weather signs to look for and what to do if threatened. Weather forecasts predict thunderstorms usually 8 to 16 hours in advance and are given in percent of probability (20 to 100%). When severe weather is predicted, review your Citizens' Emergency Planner and check your "safe place" to ensure that it is properly equipped. If and when the NWS declares a severe weather watch, you should be prepared to take appropriate action as necessary. If you did not take preparatory action during the earliest notice, definitely do it now! It is possible that at some point you may decide it is time to take cover even though you have not been warned to do so. The NWS attempts to keep you informed, but you are the best judge of your personal situation and should rely on your own judgement.

What warning signs should you use to help you make the decision of when to take cover? You should take cover if you see any of the following:

- a. A violent looking thunderstorm cloud.
- b. A projection from a thunderstorm cloud with distinct rotation about the vertical axis of the protruberance (counter-clockwise).
- c. A rotating cloud of dust or debris near the ground.
- d. The tornado itself.

If a tornado appears to be standing still, it is moving directly toward you. In a tornado situation, you may also hear the roar of the tornado, which is described as sounding like a train, or jet aircraft. The roar increases when the tornado is on the ground and moving toward you.

When you take cover, please follow these instructions --

1. Stay away from windows, doors, and outside walls.
2. In schools, nursing homes, hospitals, factories, and shopping centers, go to designated shelter areas. If there are none or they are not known, interior hallways are usually best.
3. In high-rise buildings, go to interior small rooms or hallways.
4. If you are in a mobile home or structure, leave immediately and go to a substantial structure. If there is no shelter nearby, lie flat in the nearest ditch, ravine or culvert with your hands shielding your head.

## Study Shows Massive Waste In Texas State Government \$6 Billion In Cuts Possible

Despite an image of being tight fisted, the Texas state government is laced with pork barrel programs that waste at least \$6 billion a year, according to a study released today by the Dallas-based National Center for Policy Analysis.

"Texas wastes millions of dollars on higher education, funding marginal colleges and paying the salaries of an excessive number of non-teaching employees," said Morgan Reynolds, a Texas A&M economist who authored the study. According to the study:

- Some universities are operating small cities: Texas A&M owns its own airport, its own golf course and its own television station.
- If Texas colleges cut the number of non-teaching employees to the average for colleges around the country, the state could save \$600 million every two years.

- The state spends \$8,500 per student each year at Texas A&M at Galveston and \$5,243 at the University of Texas at Permian Basin. Yet, spending is only \$2,000 per student at UT-Austin and Texas A&M-College Station—two schools with much better academic credentials.

- "State employees travel in style using a fleet of 40 airplanes and 21,000 automobiles," says Reynolds. "Duplication of efforts by various state agencies and a failure to privatize services also costs taxpayers big money. Despite easy access to private printers, the state operates 75 separate printing shops with more than \$23 million dollars worth of equipment. Selling the shops would save \$30 million," he says.

The study calls for the elimination of almost \$6 billion in wasteful government spending and warns that unless costs are curbed Texas will face paying a state income tax.

The study is being published by the National Center for Policy Analysis, a public policy research institute that specializes in private sector alternatives to government programs. The study is sponsored by the Landrum Society, a newly-formed group of private Texas citizens concerned about taxes and waste in government.

**OTHER HIGHLIGHTS**

- **Waste in Lower Education:** Between 1976 and 1985 the number of students in Texas public schools increased by only 13 percent, yet the number of teachers increased by 20 percent and administrators and staff increased by 30 percent.
- **Waste in Welfare:** Although payments to welfare

mothers in Texas are among the lowest in the nation, the Texas state government employs more welfare workers than any other state.

- **Luxury in Transportation:** The state of Texas owns 40 airplanes and 21,000 automobiles.

- **Wasteful Regulations:** The state tells farmers they may not sell a tomato with a diameter less than 1.875 inches; it tells barbers they must have a red, white and blue barber pole.

- **Waste in Higher Education:** For every instructor in Texas colleges there are 2.7 non-instructors, although the ratio for colleges outside the state is 1 to 2. Texas A&M, with a ratio of 1 to 4, employs three pilots, two co-pilots and

19 people to run the university's golf course.

- **Waste in Medical Education:** Although the average biennial subsidy for medical students is about \$52,000, Texas spends \$195,750 per student at Texas Tech and \$410,417 at Texas A&M.

- **More Waste in Higher Education:** Although the state sends \$2,000 per student each year to UT-Austin and Texas A&M-College Station, the subsidy is \$5,243 at UT-Permian Basin and \$8,500 at Texas A&M-Galveston.

- **Unnecessary Agencies:** The Texas Indian Commission spends \$900,000 each biennium, even though its only two Indian reservations are being transferred to the federal government.

- **Waste in the Bureaucracy:** In an era of privatization and desktop publishing the state owns 75 print shops.

## Pharmacy Topics

Laughter not only helps sick people get well, it may even prevent sickness, according to a study at Western New England College in Springfield, Massachusetts. Volunteers who watched humor films had higher levels of salivary immunoglobulin A than those who viewed an educational film.

At New York University School of Medicine, high-risk patients who've had melanoma once are being given an experimental vaccine to prevent recurrence. It works on rats; early results on humans are good.

Fertility specialist in Massachusetts has patented a saliva test that shows when a woman is ovulating. It's said to be more accurate than body temperature, easier than testing other body fluids.

Radiation synovectomy can take the place of surgery in cases of rheumatoid arthritis, say doctors at the Hospital for Joint Diseases in New York. Radioactive drug is injected into joint to destroy inflamed lining, which the body replace. Procedure can be repeated.



## Sheriff's Dept. News

Monday evening officers of the Eastland Police Dept., Cisco Police Dept., and Eastland County Sheriff's Dept., forming local crime task force, raided a southwest Eastland residence and made three arrests.

Continuing illegal drug investigations pinpointed the Eastland residence as a local source of illegal drugs, and officers surrounded the home and executed a search warrant.

The search turned up quantities of what was believed to be marijuana, amphetamines, and other illegal drugs (pending lab tests), and some guns and tools which are believed to be stolen or to have been used in burglaries.

The couple residing at the home were charged with possession of drugs and released on \$25,000 bond each. A visitor at the residence was charged with possession of less than one ounce and released on \$750 bond.

Also on Monday a Carbon woman reported receiving harassing telephone calls, a man of foreign nationality from Little Rock, Ark., was jailed for carrying an unlawful weapon, and evading arrest, and Deputy Frank Saylor was called upon to capture and remove a bull snake which was loose in the west end of the Courthouse (a case of illegal entry?).

Cattle on roadways continues to be a problem and some were on a roadway at Scranton Sunday.

Also Sunday, a deceased

person reported at a Route 4, Cisco, residence was ruled to have died of natural causes. And at Route 2, Cisco, someone drove through the pasture fence, knocking down about 100 feet of fence, and into the pasture before leaving.



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**Wildlife Resource Development Initiative For Eastland County**

The Wildlife and Natural Resource Committee for Eastland County, in cooperation with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, is taking steps to determine the extent of the wildlife resources for the county.

Initially, the project will survey across-section of landowners and producers to obtain information about the county's wildlife resources, the extent of management and the potential for marketing.

County Extension Agents, Crystal A. Wilbanks and De Gordon, with the assistance of the Texas Agricultural Extension Specialists and members of the Wildlife and Natural Resources Committee, have developed a survey instrument requesting information from producers and landowners. Individuals who receive this survey are strongly urged to take the time to respond.

The needs for information on game management and potential marketing programs and how applicable they are to Eastland County is great. The Wildlife and Natural Resource Committee and the Extension Service are conducting this research, in hopes to identify producer goals and develop programs designed to meet these emerging needs.

The potential is great for the development of game management reserves for neighboring landowners to manage and maintain these wildlife resources unique to Central Texas. In addition, the potential for economic development is substantial, if producers want to develop a master plan on marketing lease land to the interested hunting enthusiast.

and fill it out. This is their opportunity to have input on the educational programs and economic events that will affect every producer in Eastland County.

**Eastland County**

Shooting Preserve licenses issued by Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (required for every landowner leasing access for hunting) indicate that Eastland county has 50,155 acres leased for hunting of an estimated 457,567 acres of deer range in the county. With only 11% of the deer range leased there appear to be opportunities to expand deer hunting leases in the county.

Deer population estimates by Texas Parks and Wildlife Department indicate a herd of 13,712 head (1983-87 avg.). Since a healthy herd can sustain a 30% harvest each year this would indicate a potential harvest of about 4,100 head.

Information from annual hunter surveys conducted by TPWD shows an average harvest of 1,075 deer (1983-87) or 18% of the herd, indicating some room for expansion. Hunter numbers in the county since 1983 have fluctuated around 4,000.

A closer examination of the harvest and population estimates show that the herd composition average is 14% bucks, 55% does and 31% fawns but the harvest is 2.5 bucks per doe taken. This

imbalance of harvest indicates that increase in harvest must be provided by both does and bucks, not predominately bucks.

The intensive kill of bucks has resulted in a large percentage of bucks being young animals and the bulk of the deer herd being compromised of does and fawns. Leasing hunting on 1/10th the deer range did not produce the current sex and age structure. Significant hunting by local hunters, friends and relatives, as well as absentee owners must exist.

Needs for information on game management and the applicability of programs will depend upon the goals of individual land managers. For example, if increased antler size is a goal, deer management needs over the next several years will be to shift some of the hunting pressure from bucks to does and increase the average age of bucks.

To accomplish this, cooperative deer management will probably be needed in communities with small land ownerships. However, since 9/10ths of the land is not leased for hunting it would imply that the wildlife is managed for personal satisfaction, or that perceived economic benefits do not outweigh perceived costs. Knowing why landowners do not choose to lease is important to the biological management since only hunters can harvest the deer.

Your survey should help identify landowner groups, their motivations and informational needs.

### Wilson Wins at Lake Proctor

The KEAN Big Bass Bonanza will be taking place this weekend May 20 and 21, 1989. Contestants who are now entering will be paying \$75.00 per day to enter. As of Friday of last week it was estimated that over 3,000 anglers had already entered this years event. Last years first place money was \$80,200.00 awarded to Delton Womack of Lubbock, Texas. The talk among area anglers is to expect over \$100,000.00 for this years single largest fish weighed. Once again big bass of each hour will be awarded \$200.00. Also the money will be split down to 50th place over the two day event. Fifteenth place will pay a minimum of \$200.00.

At press time today Hubbard Creek was receiving some run off, but the exact rise in the lake level wasn't available. Fishing has been good at Hubbard with the largest fish reported last week being 6 pounds 6 ounces. This fish fell to a black and blue jig in 2 feet of water. Large numbers of 2 pound fish are being taken on crankbaits and Rat-L-Traps.

Each year I along with everyone else begin speculating on how large a fish it will take to win the event. This year I feel baring any severe weather, that the winning fish will be a heavy 6 pound fish. For a precise guess I would have to go with 6 pounds 11 ounces. And hopefully the winner will be you, or maybe me. Good luck and be sure to watch out for the other guy, at this one folks. That many boats makes navigation a problem.

And speaking of bad weather; 8 members of the Eastland County Bass Club were met with 5 wind direction changes, some severe, rain and lightning Saturday at Lake Proctor. But the changes in weather overall really seemed to spark the black bass into biting a little better than expected. The winner reported white crankbaits, purple and white worms, and blue and green worms to be the tickets to their catches.

At the 4:00 p.m. weigh-in the final results were as follows: 1st Terry Wilson 5 fish 13.20 pounds; 2nd Jerry King 3 fish 8.47 pounds; 3rd and big bass of the day Jimmy Johnson 1 fish 3.98 pounds; 4th Butch Willingham 2 fish 3.47 pounds; and 5th Tommy Maynard 1 fish 1.88 pounds.

The following day the Brownwood Bass Club also fished Lake Proctor with about the same results. 1st place was won by Robert Brown with a limit of 3 fish 9 pounds 12 ounces. Big bass for this event was Andy Campbell with a 4 pound 3 ounce fish.

The overall fishing at Proctor was well below the normal. Low water levels combined with weather changes and the fact that the bass seemed to be in a pre summer staging pattern, contributes to the low weights. But without a doubt the overall fishing pressure has seemed to affect Proctor's fishery over the past 3 years. Most weekends see 1 to as many as 4 or 5 tournaments. After a while even bass wise up a little and get bait shy. That's why many anglers are trying new colors and methods with some excellent success at Lake Proctor.

Proctors crappie fishing is getting better by the day. Some nice barn door crappie are being taken on the Leon side up near the standing timber. Jigs in green and black

tube variety seem to be the best. The minnow dunkers are catching more fish but these are quite smaller.

E.C.B.C. officials want to remind all members that to qualify for the 1989 mini classic in October, you must finish in the top 16 in total pounds. The mini classic will be a draw event to be held at one of our finest area lakes to be named at a later date. Currently all anglers who have weighed in over 7.57 pounds are in the top 16. Gary Crew is holding this spot. If you are unsure of your standing you may contact Chuck Burgess in Olden.

Watch here next week to see the top 50 winners in the KEAN (cast for cash) Big Bass Bonanza and I would like to take this chance to say thanks to the fine folks at "The Crossin" restaurant, the best eatin in town, for their support in this years event.

Till next cast keep only what you can use and release the rest.

In this instance, Maria Rainer Von Trapp wrote an account of her life entitled "The Von Trapp Family Singers" which was published shortly after World War II when the Von Trapps arrived safely in the United States. Russell Crouse and Howard Lindsey, creators of storylines for Rodgers and Hammerstein, discovered the story and felt its message worth sharing.

The popularity of the stage version of THE SOUND OF MUSIC over ran even the most optimistic predictions and soon Hollywood was on the scent of a winner. In 1963, Julie Andrews and Christopher Plummer brought the story to the big screen but the transition changed the story slightly. It was more a story about Julie Andrews than about the entire Von Trapp family and their plight. Some of the music sung by the Captain and the Captain's friend and fiancée was eliminated for the

movie due to the fact that those three characters either did not sing well or at all.

Cisco Junior College brings the original version (with some minor changes) to the stage when its production opens June 10. Says musical director, Donna DeLuca, who also plays Maria, "The beautiful Latin music Rodgers and Hammerstein wrote for the nuns to sing will all be used. It sets the tone of contrast between Maria's religious life and the life she meets in the outside world perfectly."

Additionally, more focus will be given to the pressure the Nazis put on Captain Von Trapp to comply with their wishes than normal productions usually give. "I felt the story rushed to the finish line once Maria and the Captain got married even though there was still much to tell," commented director Carol Brown. As a result, the Von Trapp's departure from the

festival has a special twist.



## Safety Belts Essential For Summer Fun

When you're getting ready for a vacation, there's one little thing you can't afford to leave undone. It's the safety belt in your car.

Reminding Texans to keep that belt buckled as summer fun begins, the Texas Coalition for Safety Belts is sponsoring Texas Buckle Up Week May 22-29. George R. Gustafson, president of Texas Safety Association and a spokesperson for the coalition, said the message is more important this year than ever.

"Texas traffic deaths increased 4 percent in 1988, according to figures from the Department of Public Safety. It was our first increase in four years," said Gustafson. "Surveys show that almost 40 percent of our drivers still don't wear their safety belts. If Texas is going to help achieve the national goal of 70 percent belt use by 1990, we have a long way to go."

In observing this special Texas Section of IEEE, he has been a member of a number of electric utility industry groups primarily in areas of research, planning and industry relations.

King has been active in leadership roles in numerous civic organizations in Abilene.

Texans again joins national groups in promoting Buckle Up America! week. The theme for this year's week is "The Winning Combination." National and local programs are promoting the advantages of the buckle-up habit when combined with new technology, such as air bags and automatic safety belts.

"Many people don't realize that they still need to buckle up, even if their car has an air bag," Gustafson said. "The inflatable restraint will work only in frontal crashes. A safety belt protects all kinds of crashes. It will also hold a motorist in place, so that he or she gets the best possible benefit from the air bag."

Gustafson acknowledged that traffic safety has come a long way in Texas since the safety belt law took effect in September 1985.

"Even with the increase, our 1988 fatalities were down 13 percent from what they were in 1984, the last full year before the law was enacted," he said. "Our mileage death rate hit a record low in 1987 and 1988 - 2.2 deaths per 100 million miles traveled. And the use of safety belts has quadrupled. Before we had the belt use law, only 15 percent of drivers buckled up."


