## Four Inches Of Rain Fell In Cisco Tuesday

Cisco received over four inches of rain last Tuesday afternoon and evening when a front passed through this area bringing with it threats of severe weather and a torrential downpour. Weather watchers were called out all across Eastland County. Four and two-tenths inches of rain was measured in West Cisco and three and nine-tenths inches of rain fell south of town. A total of 4 1/2 inches of rain was recorded in east Cisco beginning Friday and ending Tuesday evening.

City Manager Mike Moore said the pumps were running at Battle Creek Thursday. He expected them to run on through Thursday evening. He said water from Lake Bernie was running into Lake Cisco. He said Lake Cisco had come up about a foot by Thursday afternoon from the rain water. The rain was just right to help Lake Cisco, Moore said.

Excitement ran high Thursday, when a car ended up being submerged to the top of the hood when the driver drove through the intersection of West 7th and Ave. J. The road had turned into a raging creek from the heavy downpour.

Terry Hanlon, a student of Cisco Junior College, was driving West on 7th Street, but when she drove across the intersection the water was rushing so fast across the road that it forced her car to turn around and face northward.

Terry and her 3-year old son Cole, were helped from the car by Larry Pence. Her 1988 Chevrolet Baretta had to be pulled from the water by Ted and Rex's Wrecker Service. Elvin and Wes Hogue waded through the water to hook the car up to a chain for the wrecker.

Mrs. Hanlon and her son were shaken up in the incident, but there were no injuries.

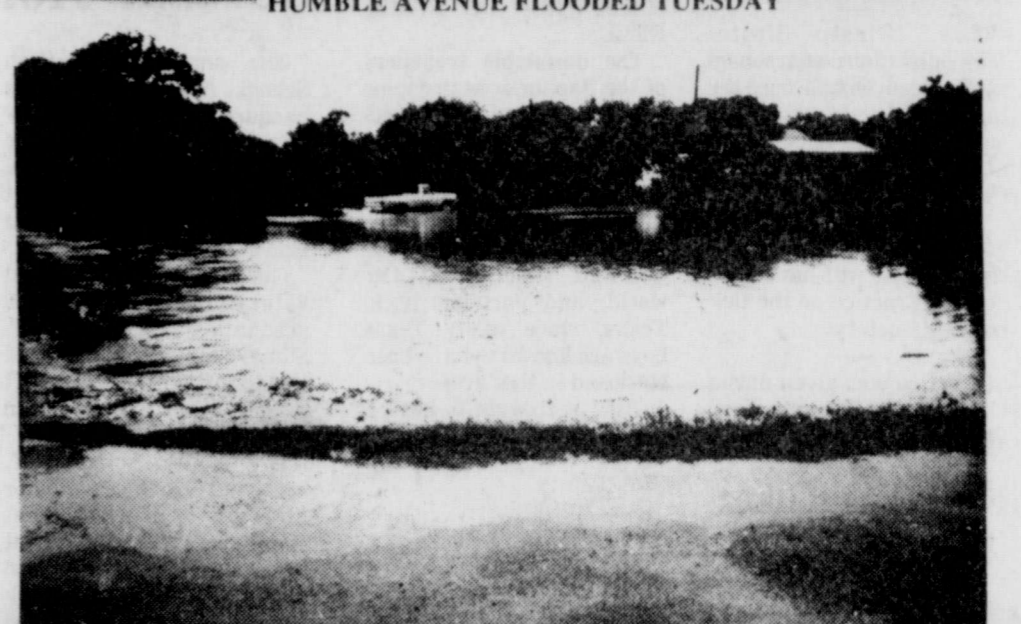

## Oryx Energy Announces Gas Discovery Near Houston

DALLAS—Oryx Energy Company, the largest independent oil and gas producer in North America, today announced a gas discovery near Houston that flowed more than 8 million cubic feet (MMcf) of gas and 300 barrels of condensate per day.

The Arco Stone #1, located in the Jose Delgado Survey

A-177 in Liberty County, flowed 8.3 MMcf and 333 barrels of condensate per day from perforations between 10,480 and 10,495 feet in the Yegua Ey Formation. The well was tested through an 11/64-inch choke at a flowing tubing pressure of 6,814 pounds per square inch. The discovery well was drilled to

a total depth of 10,800 feet. One offset well is currently planned. The Arco Stone #1 is one mile south of Oryx's Hathaway field.

Oryx Energy has a 50-percent working interest in the discovery; Arco Oil and Gas Company, the operator, has the remaining 50-percent working interest.

The Dallas-based Oryx Energy, formerly known as Sun Exploration and Production Company, has assets of \$4 billion and net proved reserves of nearly one billion equivalent barrels. Oryx Energy is traded on the New York Stock Exchange under the trading symbol "ORX".

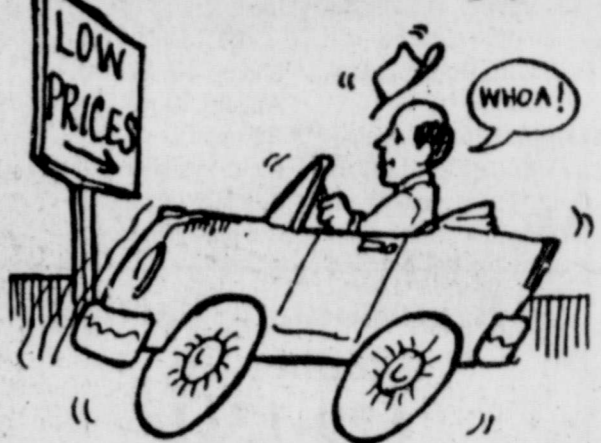
## Pecan Tree Spray Time

Many homeowners have begun asking about controlling the pecan nut casebearer. The casebearer is a moth that deposits eggs on the tips of the pecan nutlet clusters. These eggs hatch within 2-3 days and the larvae begin eating their way into the pecans.

According to Dr. Jesse Cocks, Texas Agricultural Extension Service Entomolo-

gist, the projected hatch date for the Stephenville area is May 26th. However, with the cool weather we have been experiencing the egg lay and hatch date could be delayed for several days. Pecan producers and homeowners should begin checking their trees closely for the small white eggs which are deposited on the black tip of the

**Results Of Texas Educational Assessment Of Minimum Skills Tests Released**

AUSTIN—Statewide results of the Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills tests released today showed continued improvement in test scores and percentages of students mastering the reading, writing and mathematics examinations at grades 3, 5, 7 and 9.

More than 900,000 students in the four grades were tested in February on the statewide basic skills test.

Seventy-two percent of third graders mastered all tests taken in 1989, compared to 69 percent in 1988 and 63 percent in 1987. Grade 5 passing percentages increased to 74 percent in 1989, compared to 72 percent in 1988 and 60 percent in 1987. At grade 7, passing percentages remained stable, with 72 percent passing all tests taken, compared to 73 percent in 1988 and 65 percent in 1987.

The highest level improvement was shown in grade 9, where 62 percent of students taking the TEAMS test passed, compared to 58 percent in 1988 and 1987.

"We are pleased that Texas

students are continuing to show improvement in TEAMS performance," said Commissioner of Education W.N. Kirby, "but we realize that room for improvement still exists. Reform does not occur overnight. Texas must continue to demonstrate a commitment to educational excellence to provide the best possible education for our children." More than 275,000 students failed one or more sections of the test and will need remediation.

The scores of minority students on the TEAMS test have continued to rise. The scores of Blacks and Hispanic students increased on most sections of the test from 1988 to 1989.

At grade 3, 92 percent of students passed the mathematics section of the test, 86 percent passed the reading test and 79 percent demonstrated mastery on the writing portion.

At grade 5, 89 percent of students passed the mathematics part of the test, 85 percent passed the reading part and 84 percent passed the writing section.

Ninety-one percent of seventh-graders mastered the mathematics portion of the seventh-grade TEAMS test, while 86 percent passed the reading part and 79 percent demonstrated mastery of minimum skills in writing.

Eighty-three percent of students taking the ninth-grade TEAMS passed the mathematics part of the test, 83 percent mastered the reading portion and 69 percent mastered the writing test.

Results of the first-grade test administered in April will be available later this summer.

Eleventh graders were tested on the exit-level TEAMS exam in October 1988 and results released last December showed 75 percent passed all tests taken, compared to 72 percent the previous year. The exit-level exam was administered again in May 1989. Results will be available later this summer.

### Pharmacy Topics

A new synthetic hormone seems to temporarily stop the body's production of the hormone that creates the excess endometrial cells of endometriosis. The nasal-spray drug has fewer side effects than other treatments. It's not commercially available yet.

Inflatable cuff that puts pressure on the legs seems to protect bed-ridden patients from developing blood clots, studies at Duke University Medical Center indicate. Pump squeezes legs once a minute.

In some cases, blocked fallopian tubes can be cleared with a tiny balloon in a procedure similar to angioplasty. Early tests were successful at Mt. Sinai Hospital Medical Center in Chicago.

Digitalis may be the cause of depression in some heart patients, researchers at Mt. Sinai School of Medicine in New York discovered. Switching drugs seems to help.

Some allergy sufferers get relief with aspirin, doctors found at Louisiana State School of Medicine. More studies are planned.

## New Mexico Man Convicted Of Manslaughter

A 38-year-old former science teacher from Artesia, N.M., was found guilty Wednesday of involuntary manslaughter in the May 27, 1988, death of a 52-year-old Alamogordo, N.M., man on Interstate 20 at Ranger Hill.

Robert Harold Truitt was assessed a 10-year probated sentence and a \$5,000 fine by a 91st District jury in Eastland for last year's death of Charles W. Hensley.

On Feb. 15 of this year, Truitt received an identical sentence when he was found guilty of involuntary manslaughter in the death of Hensley's wife, Shirley. Since the first conviction was being appealed, however, Truitt was eligible for probation.

The Hensley's small Ford pickup was struck in the rear by Truitt's vehicle last year, causing the truck to leave the roadway and flip several times. Mrs. Hensley was ejected from the vehicle and died at the scene. Her husband died shortly after arriving at Ranger General Hospital.

Greg Foy, a truck driver from Indiana, testified that Truitt's car forced his 18-wheeler off the roadway shortly before striking the pickup.

"My truck jackknifed but I saved it," Foy said. He said Truitt's car was traveling at a high rate of speed and that Truitt "acted like a zombie" at the accident scene.

"He was more than just drunk," Foy said. "He was wasted."

Two DPS troopers testified they also believe he was drunk. Truitt's blood-alcohol level was 0.19 an hour and half after the wreck.

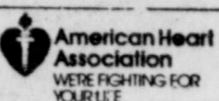
Truitt's attorney, Lynn Ingalsbe of Abilene, told the jury the crash site was a dangerous stretch of Interstate 20. He also said nighttime darkness, an unfamiliar highway and heavy Memorial Day traffic were contributing factors.

However, District Attorney Emory Walton told the jury to "call it like you see it. Truitt was drunk and running down the road. He almost took down an 18-wheeler."

During the punishment phase, Truitt took the stand. "I am deeply sorry," he said. Looking at the dead couple's relatives he said, "I wish I could do something."

Truitt testified he entered a substance abuse center in Garland after he was indicted in June of 1988. He said he attends Alcoholics Anonymous meetings regularly and hasn't touched alcohol since that night.

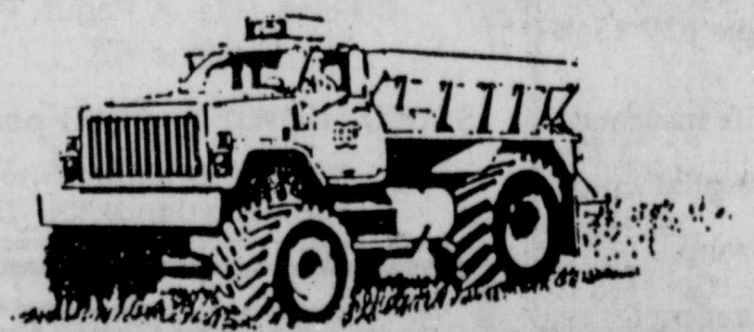

## Jeff Roark and Stacey Saunders Honored At Rotary Club Citizenship Awards Banquet Last Thursday

Cisco High School Seniors Stacey Saunders and Jeffrey Roark, were honored Thursday at the Cisco Rotary Club Citizenship Awards Banquet held at Tradition's Restaurant, last Thursday.

The two students were chosen by teachers at Cisco High School who showed meritorious conduct in cleanliness, thriftiness, courtesy, loyalty, honesty, respect for authority, service, dependability, scholarship, sportsmanship, auto driving habits and leadership.

The Citizenship Awards program began in 1966, when Eris Ritchie was president of the Cisco Rotary Club. Since then 46 students have been honored. Their names are placed on a plaque that is displayed in the trophy case at Cisco High School.

The guest speaker at the

award dinner was Mary Scott Nabors, with the Texas Employment Commission in Austin. At one time she was a twirling teacher in Brownwood. She was appointed by then Governor Mark White to be the first woman appointed for a full 6-year term on the TEC, in 1984.

Nabors speech at the dinner was about success. She said everyone wants to be successful. She said it takes an extra ordinary commitment to a cause to succeed and it is rare to see this. She said the biggest drawback is the fear of failure, and there is no guarantee in the road to success.

She gave examples of track star Roger Bannister, who broke the 4-mile record. She said people always said the human body could not run the four mile relay any

faster than what the record was. But he did not listen to them and he broke the record. Since he proved that the human body could run faster than what the record was, then 37 people beat his record the next year and then 300 broke the record the year after that.

She gave another example of Wilma Rudolph, who won three gold medals in the 1960 Olympics. She was told as a child that she could not walk without her braces she had to wear because of polio, but she proved that she could and became a hero because of it.

Nabors said she tried out to be a drum major for her high school band when she was in the seventh grade. The other students were much older, but she had to prove to herself that she could do it. At the try-outs

she marched to the front of the band, and was supposed to say "Forward March" in a loud voice. But, she said it came out "Moward Farch." She did make drum major when she was a sophomore.

She said a life unlived is the greatest tragedy of all. She said, "We are living in uncommon times and I want to salute these two students for their uncommon valor and for being a role model to other students."

Stacey is the daughter of Ray and Alice Saunders. She has received several academic and sport honors during her high school years. She qualified for district, regional and state meets in debate, twirling, and district and regional levels in writing, spelling, band, one act play, and accounting and has won several other awards.

Jeff is the son of Kay and Rick Roark. He has received academic awards in nine subjects and was named all district basketball and football player. He was the trig club president and qualified for district, regional and state academic meets. He also qualified for district and regional meets in track and several other awards.

## Highway Construction Progresses, More Planned
