Properties Need To Be Cleaned Up To Help Fight Mosquitoes

As you know the "mosquito season" is upon us and the much needed rain Cisco received last week followed by the hot, sunny weather we are experiencing now has resulted in an infestation of mosquitoes.

There are several things that can be done to reduce the mosquito infestation. Some of the things that can be done around your home and community are keeping the high weeds and grass cut and properly disposing of all trash, litter and debris.

Everyone needs to look at their property and see how

they can clean it up to make a safe, clean and attractive community in which to live and work.

The City is now in the process of sending out letters to people with high grass, weeds, trash, junk and debris. If these conditions exist, thereby creating substantial health and safety hazards the City is asking the property owner/occupant to be responsible for cleaning it up. Those failing to comply will be cited to Municipal Court, which, upon conviction, could result in a fine of up to \$200 per day of violation.

Fishing Outdoors

By Terry Wilson

"The KEAN Caper"
"Where's the bucks", that's the cry echoed across a four state area. Many, if not all the entrants in this year's Big Bass Bonanza were left with blank looks on their faces and smaller winning in their pockets.

This years event saw only \$84,200.00 returned to the contestants. Based on one day's fishing at the early entry of \$50.00, only 1,684 people would have been needed to reach this amount. Vice President and General Manager Low Murray stated that entrants were down this year. But also gave us a figure over 3,000 for entry. At \$50.00 for one day only this figure is some where over \$150,000.00. Leaving some \$65,800.00 left unaccounted for. After interviewing over 50 contestants during and since this event all but one person agreed the lake was far more crowded on Saturday than last year. In the same interview 75% stated that the lake was less crowded on Sunday than last year.

I have heard from a number of persons who like myself were given a very large number for the total number of entrants prior to the start. These figures were given by persons associated with the KEAN radio group. Let me say that these persons were not spokesmen for KEAN, but persons known to the contestants I spoke with. The figures varied from 4,300

entrants one week prior to 5,200 the Friday before the tournament. Why would these people exaggerate the numbers, I along with many others don't feel they did. As far as really knowing just how many entrants there were, we many never know unless some government agency steps in.

During our conversation with Mr. Murray and other KEAN personnel, it was quite evident that robotics were in process. Each question was answered almost word for word by each person. The "Over 3,000" was the one that stuck out no one came away from this statement. Mr. Murray stated "The poor economics in our area played heavily in the reduced entries."

As a reporter I try to stay objective at all times, but I must confess with figures like \$150,000.00 plus take in and only \$84,200.00 pay out its hard.

A tournament of this size is no easy task to put on. I personally have never been directly involved with one of this size to know the exact expense. But the many I have worked with, donated to and helped organize do give me some insight. Especially to the items which are considered as an expense and which are taken off the top as such. All monies over expenses in open bass tournaments are required by law to be returned in prize monies.

Lets look at some of the possible expenses KEAN had: Electricity, fliers, polygraphs. The items are normally considered a tournament expense and paid for from entries by most tournament organizers. Now I'm sure there are more that can be applied, but should they. Here are a few I called to inquire about but was not granted another interview. Wages for radio personalities, (who paid them KEAN or the contestants), men to put up the tents, stage, parking; security personnel; the band which played.

Now here's one we were told by Mr. Murray that we the contestants do pay for that is way out of line. The hats and T-Shirts which are advertising KEAN Radio and the Big Bass Bonanza. Each paid contestants receives a hat and a small patch plus bumper sticker. But other hats and all shirts are sold at an obvious profit plus advertisement by KEAN. Why should contestants pay for these and then be offered these products to purchase.

Now let us consider that radio time cost money. But according to Mr. Murray these sports are paid for by tournament sponsors, thus no money from entries are used. I was informed that each sponsor paid \$2,000.00. I do not know the exact number of sponsors paying this amount, but I can name 5 off hand. This is a smooth \$10,000.00 and probably more for all sponsors.

I mentioned polygraph earlier. These are a must. Last year polys were given as far down as eleventh I know. This year the angler in seventh place did not receive one. So some money was saved here, but where did it go. Hats maybe.

Lets look at this years flier. It was stated that "over 22,000 fishing enthusiasts have entered." This figure is for 1989 to 1988, a 9 year span. "More than \$550,000.00 in cash awarded since 1979." Ok lets just say of the 22,000 entrants they all only fished one day at the early entry of \$50.00. Although untold numbers fish both days and many persons sign up late and pay \$75.00 per day. Anyway at 22,000 for one day at \$50.00 this comes to \$1,100,000.00 over a nine year period. Now lets look at the "more than \$550,000.00 in cash awarded since 1979." The way I figure

it that comes to a sum of "over" \$450,000.00 in 9 years missing. This figures out to "more than \$50,000.00 each year missing. And just think the first year drew less than 1,000 entrants. So its safe to say some years were well over this figure while when in its infancy the amount was less.

To sum up the dollar figures look at the following chart based on figures supplied by KEAN: 1989 over \$3,000 entries (based on one day at \$50.00) total of \$150,000.00

1989 money paid back only \$84,200.00

1989 unaccounted monies \$65,800.00

1979 to 1988 over 22,000 entries (based on one day at \$50.00) totaling \$1,100,000.00

1979 to 1988 over \$550,000.00 paid back 1979 to 1988 \$450,000.00 unaccounted for

For a ten year per year average of \$51,580.00

As I have stated each year the KEAN Big Bass Bonanza is a tournament in which all parties are equal. A one big fish format injects a lot of luck involved in winning. And anyone who feels their luck is running high should fish it. If you can live with the huge amounts of monies that are unaccounted for each year. Will I fish this event again? Probably one day, after all who can't use even \$60,000.00 extra. But I will tell you this I cannot condone the cloak and dagger tactics of this event. We the contestants feel the above figures are an injustice. If you feel the

same please contact Low Murray by writing KEAN 105 FM & 1280 AM Radio, 3911 South 1st St. Abilene, Tx 79605, or by phoning (915) 676-7711. And ask than the big one "Where's the bucks."

The above comments and opinions are solely those of myself and in no way reflect those of the Eastland County Newspapers.

Other than speculate and gripe there is little we the entrants can do. Except make sure everyone you know who is considering fishing next years event is aware of current practice. Who knows maybe if its boycotted we can

at least get a public explanation.

One other comment I failed to mention was made by Mr. Murray. The question was concerning my personal figuring of some \$90,000.00 plus I felt that was not accounted for in the 1988 event. Mr. Murray stated, "The public just can't imagine how much it cost to put this thing on." Well knock me over with a jitbug. I could have been making big bucks putting on tournaments. But let me see now there is a law which would prevent this, isn't there?

work, but for this kind of profit, it's only a matter of time till more restrictions are imposed. And these will hurt the small invitational which are put on for the anglers around the state. One bad apple can ruin the barrel.

Well I've gotten a little long winded, so till next week, don't forget keep only what you can use and release the rest.

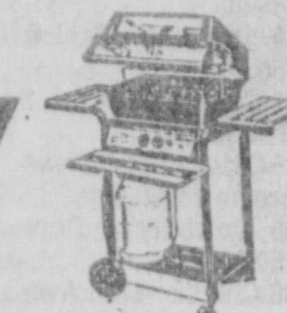

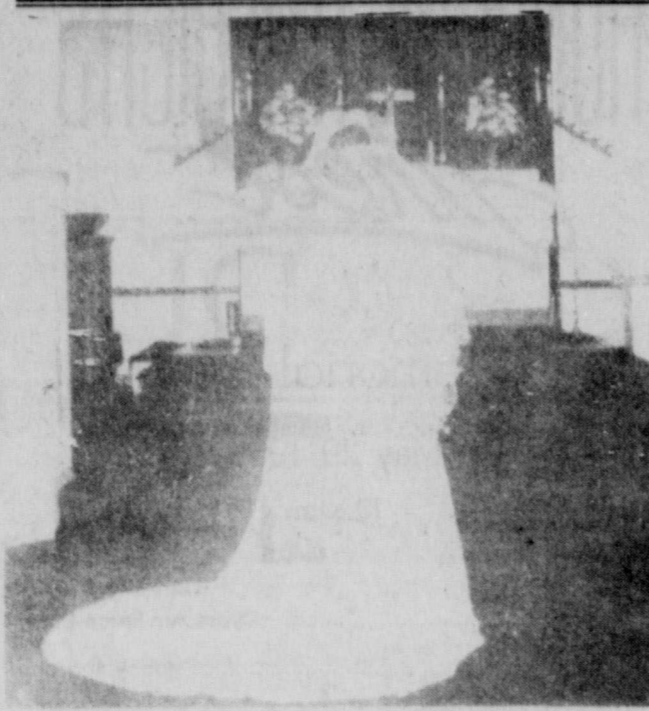

As workers approached,

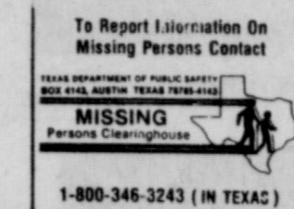
Marijuana, Occult Literature Seized On I-20

Homemaking Hints

From Janet Thomas, County Agent

THE MIDDLE YEARS - TIME TO COPE:

As one's parents age, a shift in the family power structure frequently occurs. Adult children, who themselves may be parents, are often forced into the role of "parenting" their own aging parents. This role reversal may be subtle, or, dramatic and sudden, depending upon a parent's health status and capacity of self-care. Because these adults are caught in the middle - between being parents to their own children as well as to their aging parents - they have been aptly called the "sandwich generation".

This "dual parenting" role can take a tremendous toll on the overall health of adult children who must try to balance their own children's needs with those of their aging parents. In addition to different sets of parenting problems, many of these "double duty" parents must simultaneously cope with the pressures of both career and marriage. Elderly parents may expect too much of their adult children, who, in turn, sometimes demand too much of themselves.

It is quite important that individual set limits on how much they can give of themselves because an overcommitment to parenting in the

middle years can eventually lead to anger, resentment, and frustration. Carol Hausman, gerontologist and faculty member at Georgetown University Medical School, recommends an emphasis on the positive when setting and clarifying limits to parents. For instance, instead of saying, "I'll only be able to visit you once a week," it would be better to emphasize the positive, saying "We'll be able to spend every Tuesday evening together".

A failure to set limits on expectations can lead to bitterness and resentment on the part of both the adult children and their aging parents. Sometimes middle-aged parents do not allow their parents to be self-sufficient; they may step in too soon or try to take over more than is really necessary. Hausman recommends that decisions regarding older parents should be "made with them instead of for them".

Emily Perkins - A Life Of Quality

On Thursday, May 25 Mrs. Joseph (Emily) Perkins will celebrate her 94th birthday. This will also be a joyful day for all who know her - and a time to reflect on what her life has meant to her family, the town, and the world in general.

Some people measure their life only in chronological years, but for Emily Gleason Perkins it has been measured in events, projects, and things she saw that needed doing.

The honors that have come her way have simply been the result of her 65 years of community service, much of it spent here in Eastland. Her work - most of it volunteer - has been for music, education, civic improvement, the preservation of history, Eastland Centennial Memorial Library, and service for the Red Cross.

The Eastland Music Club will have a birthday cake for

Mrs. Perkins on Tuesday, during a luncheon at The Crossin' Restaurant. She has been a member of the Music Club since shortly after moving to Eastland in 1925. Three times she served as the local Club President, in 1930, 1941-43, and 1963-64. Mrs. Perkins has also filled many other offices, and is currently Parliamentarian for the Club.

She has served as Texas State President, and Treasurer of the National Federation of Music Clubs. She is the only woman in Texas to have served as President of the State Music Clubs and also the president of the Federation of Women's Clubs.

During the Music Club Luncheon Mary Lou Frost will give a report on an honor given Mrs. Perkins during the National Music Club Convention in Fort Worth last month.

On April 28 Mrs. Perkins was recognized as a recipient of a National "Who's Who In Music" honor. She spoke to a large crowd assembled in the Hyatt-Regency at Fort Worth, and was given a standing ovation.

Mrs. Perkins was born Emily May Gleason in Gleasonville, Mass. in 1895. Her family owned a Woolen Mill in this historic community, and she early had a sense of

place and history. Her mother was a teacher, so education also had top priority in the Gleason household.

Emily studied at the New England Conservatory of Music and graduated from Boston University. In 1917 she married Joseph M. Perkins, a geological and mining engineer, and moved to Oklahoma. Son Bob and daughters Dorothy and Betty were born in that state. The family moved to Eastland in 1925, and bought the house at 1201 S. Seaman in 1926.

The home on South Seaman was a busy and happy place. The Perkins children were involved in school, Methodist Church and community activities, and Joseph made furniture, grew flowers, and restored antique clocks.

Sometimes Joseph Perkins was required to travel on geological explorations, and when possible Emily accompanied him. Her intense interest in education began to surface, and she had a "Little Red Schoolhouse" constructed near her home.

This was built to house the textbooks she reviewed while serving five years on the State Board of Education - the only woman member of that group. Music textbooks were adopted for Texas schools largely through her efforts.

As the years went by Mrs. Perkins served in a number of state and national offices in various organizations. She

was Vice President of the State Division, American Cancer Society, and a member of the National Service Committee. She held appointments from several governors in the fields of health, education and safety. During World War II she was Red Cross Chairman for Eastland County - a great responsibility.

Besides being State President of Women's Club her work reached out internationally from the National Federation Bulletin Editor, and conducted seminars in Greece, Australia and Germany.

Mrs. Perkins did not forget local organizations while serving at all these levels. Besides the local Music Club, she was active in the Thursday Afternoon Club, the Civic League, and various others. She spent much time in work for the Eastland Methodist Church, where she taught Sunday School Classes and sang in the Choir.

In 1974 the Thursday Afternoon Club began its work for a new Library Building in Eastland, and of course Emily Perkins was deeply involved in that. She still spends hours of volunteer work with the Library Archives and other projects.

She is also a Life Member of the Civic League, and delights the members with her vivid talks about life in Eastland years ago. Mrs.

Perkins never forgets that she and her family were once "newcomers" to Eastland, and she has a special place in her heart for people who have recently moved to the city. Last March the Civic League honored Mrs. Perkins with a "red Dress" meeting, recalling the "red Dress" parties she used to give in her home for newcomers to Eastland.

Time has brought some changes in the life of Mrs. Perkins.

In 1976 Joseph M. Perkins died, at the age of 96. But she still maintains the home on South Seaman, where family and friends enjoy visiting. The Perkins son, Bob, and his wife, Rebecca live in Eastland. Bob owns and operates Perkins Implement Company here. Daughter Dorothy Perkins, an educator and civic worker, lives in Midland. Another daughter, Betty, and her husband Charles Beyette live in Fort Worth. Mrs. Perkins has five grandchildren and ten great-grandchildren.

During the years Emily Perkins has kept close ties with Gleasonville, Mass. Each summer she returns to her old family home, and enjoys visiting friends and relatives. Her 91-year-old brother, Howard, lives in a Victorian home similar to the one she occupies.

Currently AIFS operates the first legal, nationwide Au Pair program which brings European men and women to American families through a carefully administered cultural exchange program. American Family Companions will work along side the European Au Pairs sharing the discovery of a new city and participating in activities and events together.

CRIME-STOPPERS? It's a program that originated in New Mexico which has been refined and developed across the nation, and particularly in Texas, where it is officially sanctioned and supported.

It's a cooperative effort between the citizens who want to help fight crime, the news media and the law enforcement agencies.

A unit has been chartered for Eastland County, and the organizational meeting will be Tuesday, May 30, at 10 a.m. at the Community Room of Eastland National Bank.

Every area in the county must be included for this to be effective, so representatives from every part of the county must attend, and get involved if this is to work.

Yes, there were and are other such organizations in the county; good ones. M.A.D.D. (Mothers Against Drunk Drivers); P.A.D.D. (People Against Dangerous Drugs); and in fact, a dormant Crime-Tips program, which has served faithfully in the past.

Why another one? Well, new life, new direction, new enthusiasm, new training and hopefully, brand new results. As any can tell you who has worked in these areas, one of the hardest things to keep generated is enthusiasm among the people. Apathy is rampant.

Another thing that's of-

ten difficult, is cooperation between the various law enforcement agencies — and without that basic premise, there's really not much reason for anybody to put out any effort.

As this new endeavor is entered into, there's going to have to be some basic assumptions made.

We'll assume that there are enough people who care about slowing crime in this county to work together to get some things done;

We'll assume that the law enforcement agencies will in fact work together and cooperate on every level in order to achieve the common good, without selfish self-interests. Each has its place, and the public has a right to expect and demand cooperation between the various groups.

We'll assume that there are people willing to stand up, sign up and join in the fight. It can't be done by a few; it must be a county-wide effort. It's worked and is working in other areas.

Sure our county is unique and that could be our strong point. We've got a number of incorporated cities, but we're all in the same ballgame as far as protecting life and property from the elements of crime. It's going to take every mother's son and daughter working together to accomplish anything.

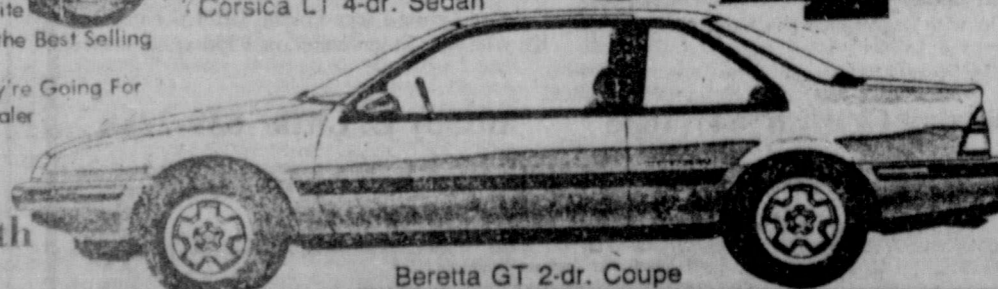

Letter To The Editor

NEEDED: FLOOD GAUGE AT 9th ST. AND AVENUE M Dear Editor:

Last week Cisco almost lost two lives from drowning in the flood waters on 9th Street and Ave. M. Had it not been for the skillful rescue work of the volunteer firemen and Cisco police, Terry Hanlon and her little three-year-old son might not be living today. Their car is still in repairs eight days after the accident.

Terry, a CJC cosmetologist student, was driving west with her little boy toward their home in Royal Oaks Apartment in a blinding rainstorm. Unfamiliar with the low place on Ave. M which sends raging waters sweeping across 9th St., the unsuspecting driver did not know that water at this place in the road was deeper than the one in which she was driving with her little boy in the fog and torrential downpour. Suddenly, her car began bobbing cork-like and she and the three-year-old were trapped inside. Minutes later, they were rescued but the anger still lurks there as it

has since Cisco's founding a bit more than a century ago.

When are we Ciscoans going to wake up and at least get a flood gauge on that normally dry creek bed? What about a gauge with a flashing red light that would signal the danger at night or the rains are blinding by day? We might even think of a bridge. Whatever, let's not wait until lives are lost.

The Hanlons are not the first to be rescued from this hazard. Many have had to be pulled out when their cars drowned at that spot. I distinctly remember Cisco High School graduation of 1946. The clouds were threatening when we went in for the commencement rites. A cloudburst came during the program. Unaware of how much it had rained, I started home alone after the ceremony. Blinded by rain, I also drove into swirling,

deep waters. My motor drowned. Water began creeping onto my floor board. I jumped out on the driver's side and the force of the water washed me against the car. I knew I could not wade out if I went beyond the length of the car. I was near panic when I saw the lights of a car approaching. Familiar voices of some of my high school boys began calling to me to stand still until they could reach me. They guided me ashore and then went back and pushed my car out of the swirling waters.
