Railroad Commission Chairman Kent Hance announced that Texas oil and gas wells produced 481,556,435 Mcf (thousand cubic feet) of gas in March, compared to the February gas production total of 437,962,274 Mcf. March production was down 0.88 percent compared to March 1988's production total of

485,848,390 Mcf. The state's top producing counties, rank ordered by preliminary March production were: Webb, 26,836,828 Mcf; Pecos, 26,365,098 Mcf; Zapata, 25,852,067 Mcf; Hidalgo, 14,993,265 Mcf; Crane, 13,928,223 Mcf; Panola, 12,229,537 Mcf; McMullen, 11,831,825 Mcf; Hemphill, 8,575,602 Mcf;

Winkler, 8,328,217 Mcf; and, Crockett, 8,307,396 Mcf.

Eastland County produced 1,285,813 Mcf (1,000 cubic feet) of gas in March, according to figures from the Texas Railroad Commission.

Texas gas production in March came from 190,600 oil wells and 46,532 gas wells.

### Farmers And Ranchers To Be Contacted On Acreage Estimates

AUSTIN-Beginning June 1, representatives from the Texas Agricultural Statistics Service will be contacting farmers and ranchers across the state to help set the 1989 planted acreage estimates and midyear livestock

"Information from these surveys will provide Texas producers with solid facts and figures they can use when making their production and marketing plans for 1989," state statistician Dennis Findley explained.

"The continued dry weather this spring and the changes in the national farm program may have altered producers' plans for 1989, and this survey will be the first accurate measure of midyear livestock inventories and acreage estimates," Findley added.

Individual reports will be combined with other reports to set state estimates. Results of the confidential interviews, conducted by telephone or in person by field enumerators, will be published later this summer. The 1989 acreage forecast will be published by July 12, and the midyear cattle inventory will be published July 28.

"Remember, these are Lori Ann sample surveys, so if you are provide the requested information, since your one report represents similar operations of the same size and type. Our estimates can be no better than the numbers producers provide," Findley added.
