Police Report

The Cisco Police Department received a call from the Cisco Independent School District about the theft and vandalism of the Cisco Community Gym on May 23. Loss in the incident were a set of Maxon Brand solid black headsets with batter charger, valued at \$189.00; one unnamed set of brushed silver headsets with battery charger, valued at \$129.00; two yellow gold t-shirts that have the following emblems— 260 pound weight club and one that had 200 pound weight club club, both size large, valued at \$10.00. Total value of the theft is \$328, which is a second degree felony. There is also damage to several lockers and locks, and closets. There are suspects in the case.

Other calls made to the Cisco Police Department include:

May 16— Cisco Police Sergeant Larry Jernigan responded to a call from a 76-year old woman, of San Angelo, who had reported that someone had broken the glass on the window at her mother's home on Park Street in Cisco. Damage was estimated to be \$15.00.

May 19— Sergeant Jernigan answered a call from a 41-year old man who reported that someone had spray painted one of his vehicles. There was not an estimate of the damage at the time of the report. It was reported that there are some female juvenile female suspects in the case.

May 20— Cisco Police Officer Kenneth Preston answered a call from a Cisco man who had reported that a suspect had removed work clothes, speakers and a stereo, with a total value of \$135.00. There is a suspect in the case.

May 22— Officer Preston responded a call from Fina Mart on I-20, that a 1980

Fiesta had left the station without paying for the gas. The car was later reported as stolen from Ranger. Two Cisco police officers were returning from Abilene when the call came over about the car and were in Clyde when they spotted the vehicle. Charges for unlawful use of a vehicle were filed in Ranger and in Louisiana. The 17-year old male was taken to Eastland County Jail.

May 24— Chief of Police Billy Rains and officer Preston investigated a report of a theft of the car wash on I-20. A suspect had tried to remove the money from the car wash, but was unable to get to the money. This will be considered a Class A misdemeanor of the burglary of a coin operated machine. Chief Rains also investigated the report of a theft of gas at Guthrie Truck Harbor. A suspect had filled up with 229 gallons of diesel, valued at \$215.89, the police do have a suspect.

May 25— Officer Donald Wiley arrested a 17-year old white male and a 20-year old white male in the 200 block of West 14th, on charges of outstanding traffic warrants. They were taken to Eastland County Jail.

May 26— Sergeant Jernigan investigated a report from a woman in Cisco who had reported that her ex-husband had assaulted her. Charges were filed and he has an outstanding warrant of a class C assault.

May 29— A Rising Star man reported that a two-seated go-cart was taken from his residence. The total value is \$525.00. The police do have a suspect.

May 30— The Cigo gas station on West 8th was the victim of vandalism again when the front glass was broken and less than \$5.00 was taken. Estimated damage was valued at \$15.00.

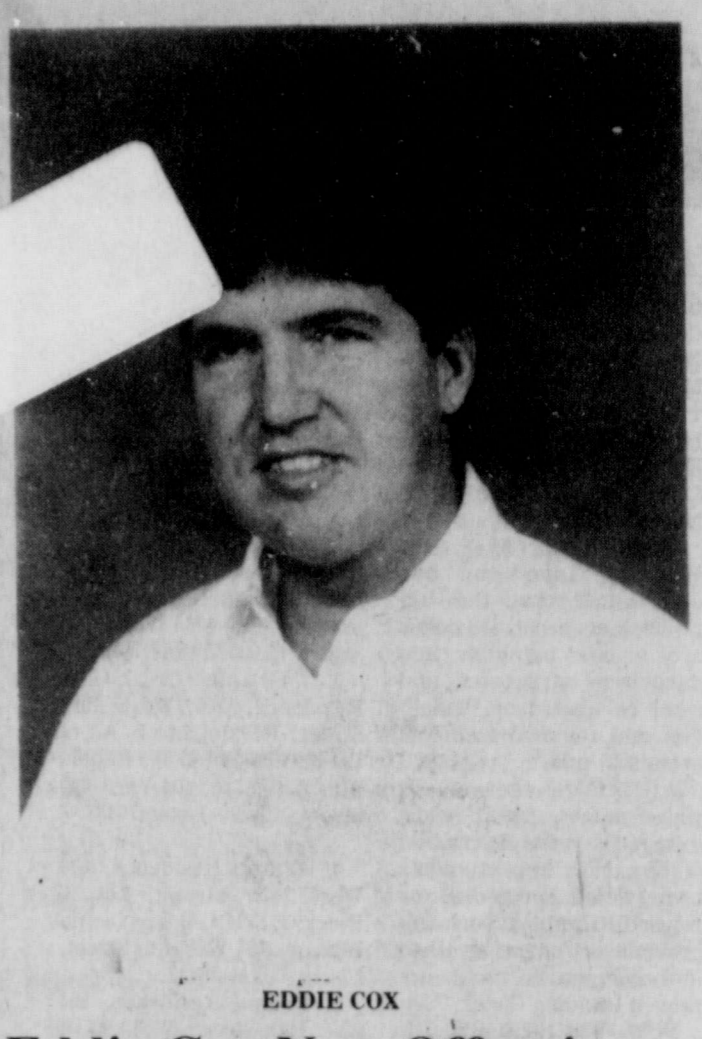

Eddie Cox New Offensive Coach For CJC Wranglers

The Cisco Junior College Board of Regents has announced the hiring of Eddie Cox, a native of Pembroke Pines, Fla., as offensive coordinator for the CJC Wranglers.

Cox has a master's degree in physical education from East Texas State University. He also earned his bachelor's degree in physical education from East Texas State University in 1978. He is a 1973 graduate of Pace High School in Miami, Fla.

Cox, 33, replaces Rick Hoffman, who recently resigned. Cox comes to CJC from Tinity Valley Community College where he was offensive coordinator. At TVCC, Cox coached offense on a team that was the Texas Junior College Football Conference Champs and was the winner of the 1988 Shrine Bowl game.

Among the coaching stops for Cox en route to CJC included a stint for the Texas Wranglers semi-pro football team in Mesquite. Cox was offensive coordinator on Coach Norman Jett's Wrangler coaching staff. Former Dallas Cowboy Mel Renfro was Wrangler general manager.

Cox has also served as defensive coordinator at Kansas Wesleyan University and offensive coordinator at Ranger Junior College.

Cox and his wife, Deona, a Dallas native, have three children: Ryan, Evan and Eric.

Patterson Terminates Ambulance Service

Patterson Ambulance Service ceased to operate in Eastland on June 2, and Owner/Manager Tommy Patterson has issued the following statement in that connection:

"To Whom This May Concern,

"Thru: The Editor, County Judge and Commissioners of Eastland County, City Managers and Commissioners of Eastland and Cisco, Hospital Administrators, Board of Directors, and Doctors of Eastland Memorial Hospital and E.L. Graham Hospital.

"Doors. They are passages for entrance, or barriers to prevent access. In the opening and shutting of doors we are, sometimes literally and sometimes figuratively, granted the privilege of "being on the inside" or "left on the outside".

"Recently, the County of Eastland issued financial assistance for county wide ambulance support - a very needed door was opened. This support along with City financial assistance to the hospitals will put an end to your "Ambulance Availability" fears, thus, granting the citizens of "being on the inside".

"City and County Commissioners have agreed they will not subsidize a Private Corporation for ambulance service thus, closing the doors of continued ambulance service

Medivac To Offer Services Until Co-Op System In Operation

As everyone is aware, Patterson Ambulance discontinued their operation in Eastland County, as of Friday, June 2. The City of Cisco and E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital, are working together to develop a stable ambulance service, but they thought they had until June 30, to have an alternate service in operation.

When it became known that Patterson would be leaving, June 2, the city and hospital met to see what could be done. Ed Freeman of Medevac Ambulance of Brown and Coleman Counties heard about the city's dilemma and graciously offered Cisco an emergency ambulance backup. This will provide an ambulance service for Cisco and Eastland.

The emergency ambulance service will be stationed out of E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital and will be there until such time as a permanent system has been set up.

Mayor of Cisco, Joe Wheatley, said, "We genuinely appreciate Mr. Freeman for his true generosity and humanity in stepping forward to offer this ambulance service during the transition period. We appreciate his effort."

Freeman was in Cisco last Friday, June 2, to begin emergency ambulance service. If anyone needs to call for the service of an ambulance, they may call E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital at 442-3951, or the Eastland County dispatch at 629-1728.

Cisco City Manager Mike Moore said, "We want Mr. Freeman of Medivac, to know that we appreciate his tremendous offer of bringing his equipment and set up an ambulance service here for us. This is a heck of a good deal for us."

He added that the county, hospitals and the cities here are working diligently to have a permanent ambulance service working here in 2-3 weeks.

County Commissioners To Hold Meeting Monday

Important called meetings will be the order of the day for the Eastland County Commissioners on Monday, June 5. Both sessions will be open to the public.

At 2 p.m. on Monday there will be a called meeting to consider Eastland County Economic Development Council's request for assistance in locating a jail (prison) facility in Eastland County. The Commissioners will also consider emergency ambulance service for Eastland County.

Budget requests will also be reviewed, and a pre-budget conference will be held.

At 7:30 p.m. Monday evening there will be another called meeting in the Commissioners Courtroom. This will be a Public Hearing to discuss Rising Star Vineyard Inc. and the Company's Capital Fund application.

Cisco Summer School To Begin June 6 For Jr.-Sr. High

Cisco Junior and Senior High School will offer summer school again this year, according to an announcement.

There will be no charge for students living in the Cisco school district. Non-residents will be charged a fee of \$100 per class. Classes are for remedial purpose only. To be eligible to enroll for a class, a student must have been enrolled in the class previous to summer enrollment.

Consumer Groups Storm Local Grocery Stores!

Stores point finger at newspaper

Today saw one of the largest consumer responses of the week to offers made by local grocery stores for discounted prices. Across the city, shoppers were redeeming coupons cut from the local paper in record numbers.

"We know any offer we make will be highlighted most by the newspaper," commented a grocery store spokesman. "Our goal is simply to inform the consumers that these discounts are available. We are confident they will respond if they see it in the paper." His statement was backed by recent Consumer Data Service reports that indicated grocery store ads triple volume on discounted items and double volume on regularly priced items. It also revealed grocery ads are read by well over 70% of newspaper readers.

Grocery store representatives unanimously agreed that newspaper advertising was the only way to get immediate consumer response. Sheriff's Department News

The solving of two cases this week finishes clearing up most of the theft and burglary that was taking place in Eastland County, according to Sheriff's Dept. officers.

At presstime, deputies were seeking warrants on 4 or 5 people for 7 burglaries in Ranger, and 1 suspect was already in jail. Officers say that all of the burglaries are done related.

Eastland County deputies have had an excellent working relationship with the Cattlemen's Association, says Sheriff Dee Hogan, and the two groups have been working together to solve the cattle thefts in the Carbon and Desdemona areas.

The Cattlemen's Association investigators have reportedly solved the case with the arrest of a suspect in

Jacksboro. Cattlemen's agents were to be in Eastland Friday with offense reports and the statement given by the suspect. Two people from Ft. Worth were also involved as spotters with cattle being stolen from three locations in Eastland County, it was reported. Deputies are yet to determine if some or all of the cattle may be found and recovered.

However, the burglaries at Lone Cedar Country Club by Lake Leon are still under investigation. Mostly golfing items and beer have been taken there.

A deputy investigated the report of an eight month old baby girl being abused by her father in Eastland. The case was referred to the Eastland Police Dept., which reportedly obtained a statement from the father, who was then

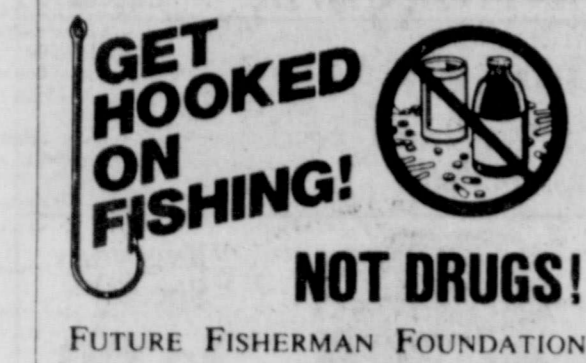

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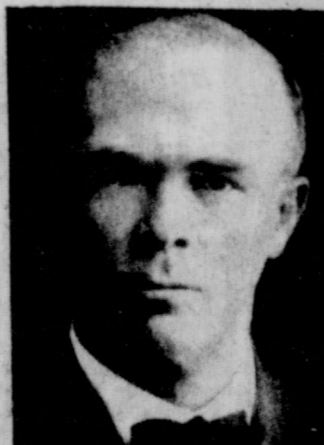

The strange and exciting story of an artist who sold her works all over the Southwest at the turn of the century to help free her doctor son from a Mexican prison, may very well have a local connection, because some of the paintings are believed to be privately owned here.

Her beautiful pastoral oil-on-tapestry paintings have brightened homes and churches throughout the Southwest and brought joy to their owners since the turn of the century.

Very few know of the despair that accompanied each painstaking stroke of her brush. Certainly, every painting had its message, but the strange, remarkable, untold story of Anna Laurie Harle and the calamity in her life that motivated her is a much greater picture. She painted with a purpose.

And before her story was finally played out over international borders, she would have become involved in the sphere of diplomatic relations, political lobbying and even into the arena of helping finance a

foreign revolution. Texas and American national officials up to and even including the President got to know her well, and foreign revolutionaries felt her influence. She was a mother praying, fighting and laboring for her son, Dr. Charles Harle, who she believed had been wronged.

Mexican legend Pancho Villa would prove to be the pivotal key in re-uniting the fragile artist and her physician son who had been a long-time prisoner in a Mexican dungeon.

Putting all the pieces of the strange puzzle together began with Gaynell O'Brien's determination to identify the painter of a tapestry she had acquired during the disposal of the furnishings from a large home nearby.

The trail took many turns: crumbling newspaper files, fading memories, interviews, letter writing, days of cemetery and library research and finally, the National Archives. None of the informants knew the whole

story. A piece was added here, a new name turned up there; many other paintings came to light and, little by little, the story of Anna Laurie Harle unfolded.

Truly, it was a classic example of international intrigue that was so much a part of Southwestern history in the early 1900s. The thoroughly documented account reads today like pure fiction, but its principals actually lived it in a very personal way.

There are believed to be hundreds of the paintings by Mrs. Harle throughout the Southwestern States; many hung in major churches, and were proud, prized possessions of those who had decorated stately homes. Since then, they have been passed from generation to generation. Now with the publication of this material, their value will be enhanced by knowledge of the story behind the paintings.

She was a highly trained Southwestern pioneer artist; her son, a pioneer doctor who first practiced in

Mexico, where their troubles began; and their combined story is the kind of pioneer experience that helped forge this great area. In the later stages of this epic, Dr. Harle rode with Villa as his personal physician. Historians, art-lovers and those who find strength and enjoyment from seeing real people solving real problems, will find the pages of this book intriguing.

The curious initial search for the artist of the old, unsigned tapestry painting turned quickly into a panorama of Texas-Mexico history as the mystery surrounding the artist unfolded.

Many of the artist's works are reproduced herein, and photographs of the principals round out the story. Readers who know of other paintings which they believe might be Harle's are encouraged to correspond with the authors through the publisher.

The complete story with reproductions of the paintings and photographs of the principals has just been released in a book named "Painting For Freedom" by H.V. and Gaynell O'Brien through Times Publishing Co., Box 29, Eastland, TX 76448, at \$12.95, plus 91¢ tax and \$3.99 shipping and handling.

Clergy and lay members of local United Methodist congregations will journey to Arlington, Texas, June 5-8, 1989, to participate in the 123rd annual session of the Central Texas Conference of the United Methodist Church.

Among those attending from Eastland County will be Pastor and Mrs. Ken Diehm and Lay Delegate Sherry Wright of the First United Methodist Church of Cisco and Pastor and Mrs. Wesley Howard Jr. and Lay Delegate C.W. Hoffmann Jr. from the First United Methodist Church of Eastland. Pastor and Mrs. Kerry Patton of the First Methodist Church in Rising Star will attend, with also a Lay Delegate from that Church. Other local Methodist pastors and wives who are expected to attend (with Lay Delegates) are Pastor and Mrs. Billy Reed of Ranger, and Pastor and Mrs. Norman Bruner of Gorman.

In addition to items of program and ministry, the conference will consider matters of policy, structure and finances. Deliberations and decisions of the conference will affect the way 133,120 members of the United Methodist Church live out their religious beliefs and faith in God in the Central Texas Conference area.

Conference members will hear a report that the Central Texas area has recorded a gain in membership in 1988. The 1988 figures continue a 16 year history of membership gain for the Conference while the United Methodist Church as a whole has been losing members over that same pe-

riod. A major item of consideration and one that may spark much discussion will be the conference budget to be proposed for 1990 which calls for a \$5,790,000 expenditure for Central Texas Conference ministry. It represents an 8.25% increase over the 1989 budget.

The increase is due largely to health insurance for ministers and staff of the conference which is rising yearly at devastating rates according to Rev. Sidney Roberts, executive director of the Conference Finance and Accounting office.

Funds for the operating budget are raised through apportionments to each local church of the Central Texas Conference. The proposed budget includes conference-wide items of mission, ministry and benevolent causes. It includes conference level salaries and office expense, funds for health insurance, and amounts apportioned to the conference from the general United Methodist Church. It does not include funds spent by each local church for buildings, staff, and minister's salary and support.

Participants in the conference will also hear a final report of the Capital Funding Campaign that set out in 1986 to raise a goal of \$10 million for three critical needs. The funds raised by the campaign were to provide improvements at Glen Lake Camp in Glen Rose, Texas and purchase new sites in the conference area upon which to build

new churches. The third critical need was to reduce an unfunded liability of the Conference minister's pension program.

To date, the Campaign has raised \$2,842,000 (Through April 1989) and has resulted in construction of three new lodges at Glen Lake Camp plus other improvements, purchase of 4 new church sites and a payment of \$929,764 toward the pension liability.

Highlight of the Annual Conference meeting will be a conference wide rally to celebrate the first meeting of the conference as a new Episcopal Area of the United Meth-

odist Church. It will take place on Monday evening, June 6, at the Arlington Convention Center. The rally will include a procession of district banners followed by lay and clergy leaders of the conference, congregational singing, special music and preaching. All congregations of the conference have been requested to participate in the rally.

The Central Texas Conference will ordain 11 persons as new Elders in full connection as clergy members of the United Methodist Church and four others as Deacon. It will recognize the ministerial orders of two clergy transfer-

ing from other denominations and will consecrate one person as a diaconal minister. The ordinations and consecration will take place on Wednesday, June 7, 7:00 p.m. at First United Methodist Church in Arlington.

Final action of the conference will be a reading of the ministerial appointments to the 350 church of the Central Texas Conference. Ministers are appointed by the bishop and his cabinet for a one year term. Reading of the ministerial appointments is a historic part of each annual conference and dates from the time of John Wesley.

Pharmacy Topics

Shyness can be cured. For some people whose social phobia made them unable to function in ordinary situations, researchers at the National Institute of Mental Health offered drug and/or psychological therapy for 12 weeks. Most improved to lead normal social lives.

Doctors at the University of California/San Francisco report success in using hydralzine, an antihypertensive drug, to reverse heart enlargement caused by leaky aortic valves. Patients were able to delay or avoid surgery.

Scientists measuring the blood cholesterol levels of youngsters not only spotted those at risk for coronary problems, they also found that many of their patients had unrecognized coronary artery disease, the Southern Medical Journal reported.

New drug, Eminase, injected right after a heart attack, halved the number of deaths in the first 30 days following, British researchers reported. Drug manufacturers are awaiting FDA approval.
