County Commissioners indicated their interest in the proposals brought by Dr. Barnes, but said they needed more information about the legality of the commitment.

District Attorney Emory Walton said that he did not know of anything authorizing the County Commissioners to do this. He stated he had placed a call with the Attorney General's office in Austin, and was supposed to get a reply Monday afternoon as the legality of the proposal.

"The cities can do anything they want to, but counties can't do anything unless authorized," Walton said.

"It is on an emergency basis," Barnes said. "Onethird of the population of Eastland County is in great jeopardy ... (Due to the economy.) . . . we have a slow demise of population."

Barnes asked how much money was in County reserve funds. "If there's money in the bank it should be spent if there's a good reason to spend it," he added.

He was told that much of the County money was in dedicated funds, including Road and Bridge and other Departments. Around \$861,000 was reported currently in the General Fund.

County Judge Scott Bailey, presiding over the meeting, said that he was not certain that pledging the County's credit on a project was legal without the vote of the people.

Dr. Barnes said that he felt certain the Economic Development Council could raise some of the land-purchase funds without using County money for all the cost. But they would have only 45 days to do this after the State made a decision on the land, and that was probably not long enough. They needed a definite resolution to present in the proposal for location of the prison here.

During the meeting Barnes went into details about economic benefits of a prison in Eastland County. The 2250 bed prison would bring an annual payroll of \$19.2 million, he stated, with the smaller facility approx. \$5.5 million.

Farmers Have Deadline For USDA Programs January 1

Farmers who want to retain These provisions are equally eligibility for USDA program benefits, including commodity price supports, loans and crops insurance, need to be aware of the "Conservation Compliance" provisions of the 1985 Food Security Act.

This relatively new provision requires farmers who have "highly erodible cropland" to have a conservation plan approved and to begin actively implementing that plan by January 1, 1990, said Gary A. Stanford, county

The plan must be fully implemented by January 1, 1995. Each farmer should determine whether or not these provisions apply to his land.

important to both the landowner and tenant, Stanford In some counties, limited

cost-share funds will be available to assist farmers in implementing their plans. Those funds available through the Agricultural Conservation Program, the Great Plains Conservation Program and other programs are limited and will be distributed in the usual manner. Therefore, individuals who have their plans in place and make appropriate application will be in a much better position to receive those funds than those who lag behind, Stanford said.

Developing the conserva-

tion plan is a relatively simple process, Stanford said. Once the soil type and land conditions are known, SCS conservationists will provide farmers with several options for "significantly reducing" erosion. In many cases, farmers are already meeting required erosion reductions. In those cases, the plan will consist of documentation of what farmers are already doing.

Farmers are encouraged to act as soon as possible to complete this necessary process to assure continuing compliance and eligibility for USDA programs, Stanford

Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board Accepting Applications

The Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board is accepting applications for more than \$2.5 million in grant funds to improve the quality of precoilege (K-12) instruction in mathematics and science in Texas. Grants are awarded for 12 months.

The grant funds, available to Texas under the new Dwight D. Eisenhower Mathematics and Science Education Act must be used to improve the teaching skills of K-12 teachers and increase student access to mathematics and science courses. The Eisenhower Act reauthorized the predecessor statute, Title II of the Education for Economic Security Act (EESA). Applications must be submitted to the Coordinating Board by Aug. 1,

Thirty to forty (30 to 40) grants ranging from \$25,000 to \$65,000 each will be awarded to support cooperative teacher training programs between higher education institutions, local school districts, and regional service centers, said Nan Broussard, Coodinating Board Title II program director.

Another four to five grant awards above \$100,000 will finance the development and/or implementation of demonstration models specifically designed to increase the access of the State's growing minority student population to mathematics and science education and careers.


The federally funded program is designed to motivate the youths to finish high school, be productive, realize they can go to college and be a success.



Shyness can be cured. For some people whose social phobia made them unable to function in ordinary situations, researchers at the National Institute of Mental Health offered drug and/or psychological therapy for 12 weeks. Most improved to lead normal social lives.

Doctors at the University of California/San Francisco report success in using hydralzine, an antihypertensive drug, to reverse heart enlargement caused by leaky aortic valves. Patients were able to delay or avoid surgery.

Scientists measuring the blood cholestero levels of youngsters not only spotted those at risk for coronary problems, they also found that many of their patients had unrecognized coronary artery disease, the Southern Medical Journal reported.

New drug, Eminase, injected right after a heart attack, halved the number of deaths in the first 30 days following, British researchers reported. Drug manufacturers are awaiting FDA approval.



Phillips said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate is 4.5 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan," Phillips said. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Cro , Insurance programs will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until January 19, 1990 but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," Phillips said.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a

majority interest. The FmHA office in Eastland is open from 8:00 to noon and 1:00 to 5:00, Monday through Friday.

Marketed Gas Production Down In February

AUSTIN-Railroad Commission Chairman Kent Hance announced that Texas marketed gas production in February totaled 356,416,359 Mcf (thousand cubic feet) of gas, compared the January production total of 394,164,878 Mcf. The February marketed gas production reflected a decrease of five percent compared to the February 1988 production of 376,589,492 Mcf. Total Texas gas production in February was 437,962,274 Mcf.

Marketed gas production is the gas left after liquid hydrocarbons have been separated on the lease from the "wet" gas that is usually produced at the wellhead. It also does not include gas that is used to fuel production-related equipment on the lease site, or gas

that is otherwise not mar-

Exports of Texas-produced gas in February totaled 144,32,341 Mcf compared to 126,186,373 Mcf in January. The February exports of Texas produced gas reflected an 18 percent decrease when compared to the February 1988 exports total of 176,341,863 Mcf.

The lake, which has a normal full elevation of 1000 feet above sea level, was temporarily lowered to 987 feet in April 1987 as a safety measure while investigations of a foundation problem were conducted and corrective actions were taken. hydroelectric generating facilities at the project. The corrective work had progressed far enough to allow the gates at the dam to be raised in April 1988 and the process of refilling the lake to elevation 995 to begin.

'Unfortunately, it has taken over a year for sufficient runoff to occur in the watershed upstream of Possum Kingdom to allow us to bring the lake level up to 995," said Hoge. Now that the lake level has reached its temporary maximum, an intensive monitoring program is underway to evaluate the effectiveness of the repair work accomplished since early 1987 to restore the integrity of the dam structure.



As this school year comes to a close I would like to take this time to express my graditude to the teachers and children of Cisco Elementary School for the care and love they show my

A couple of years back we moved to a bigger city feeling Chad would get more quality care and education in a larger community. We found instead that Chad became one of many handicapped children in a school where he had no other children to copy or pattern after. This is our first year back in Cisco and earlier in the year we got a sample of small town warmth and belonging. Chad became ill and had an unscheduled 18 day stay in the Texas Scottish Rite Hospital in Dallas. One day an extremely thick envelope arrived with so many pictures of cows, chickens, cats, horses and dogs colored in every imaginable way with wishes of good health and words of encouragement that even now my eyes tear as I think of them. Spring Rains Increase Pest Problems

Spring generally means thunderstorms, and where there is rain, there is usually an increase in waterbreeding insects. Such may be the case for many areas of Texas where heavy rains and flooding have occurred.

'In heavy rain areas I think we'll find a fairly good increase in mosquito populations," said Dr. Nick Wilson, an entomologist and assistant director of Texas Christian University's ranch management program. This is ideal weather for mosquitoes to breed in puddles or in blocked rain gutters on houses where water

is standing. The best action for the home owner is to empty containers with standing water and to clean out gutters, said Wilson. In addition, dead organic matter found around the yard should be disposed of since it also could serve as a breeding ground for un-

wanted insects. Humans are not the only ones who may be affected by an increase in insect populations. The additional pests lead to epidemics could among cattle herds if action is not taken to clean up

debris, Wilson warned. "With the type of flooding we've had, there's always a potential for some kind of epidemic, and that's why it's so important for everyone to be involved in the clean up,' he said. "Ranchers will want to consider the use of some type of control, either with the use of spray, dust bags or back rubs.



Texas Academic Skills Program (TASP) is a state-wide instructional program mandated by Texas law to ensure that students enrolled in Texas public colleges and universities have the basic academic skills needed to be successful in college-level work. All new part-time and fulltime students who enter college in the Fall, 1989, and thereafter must take the TASP Test after they are accepted by a school and before they have more than 9 credit hours of general education courses.

Does everyone have to take the TASP test?

All full-time or part-time students who enroll in a public college or university who have not earned at least 3 semester credit hours of college-level work prior to the Fall of 1989 must take the TASP test by the time they earn 9 semester credit hours or the equivalent.

If I passed TEAMS, why do I have to take the TASP

TEAMS measures the minimum skills necessary to receive a high school diploma. TASP measures the minimum skills needed to be successful in college. These college-level skills are at a higher el then those on TEAMS

Can I study for the TASP

test? is there a test prep guide like the SAT and **ACT Preparation Guides?** One of the best ways to prepare for the TASP test is by studying the Official TASP Test Study Guide.

This study guide is available at most college bookstores or can be ordered when you register for the TASP test. is this required of students

in every college and university in Texas? TASP is a requirement for students in all public institutions of higher education and for students in all colleges and universities who wish to

become teachers. I'm in the 10th grade. Can I take 3 hours of college credit this summer and be exempt from taking the

test? Any 3 hour college-level course taken before the Fall of 1989 will exempt a student from the TASP require except for those students who wish to become teachers.

I'm a vocational student in auto mechanics. Am I exempt?

If a vocational program requires 9 or more semester credit hours of general education courses, the TASP test must be taken

How many times can I try? Students may take the TASP test as often as they wish. It would be wise, however, to complete an academic skill development program before repeating the test.

What If I fall?

A student who fails one or more sections of the TASP test must participate in some type of developmental program. A student can not receive a degree or certificate, or enroll in upper-division courses beyond 60 semester credit hours until passing all sections of

Texas Starts New Quest For 'One Deathless Day

Every day for the past 12 years, somebody has died in a Texas traffic accident.

George R. Gustafson, a spokesperson for the Texas Coalition for Safety Belts and president of Texas Safety Association, wants to break that record in the summer of 1989

"May 27, the Saturday before Memorial Day. marked the beginning of the 101 Driving Days of Summer,' Gustafson said. "We want to see at least one day without a traffic death before the summer ends on Labor Day,

Sept. 4." January 5, 1977, was the last time Texas made it through a day without a single traffic fatality, according to Department of Public Safety records.

"We tried to break that losing streak last summer with our 1988 'One Breathless Day' campaign," said Gustafson. "We didn't make it, so we're trying again.

Part of the challenge of 'One Breathless Day" in Texas is the sheer size of the territory. Residents and visitors travel over 150 billion highway miles each year. 'We're a high-traffic state, which puts us at high risk. But we still are not doing everything we can to minimize that risk," Gustaf-

son said. "Last summer, we had three days with only three deaths apiece. That was as close as we got to a deathless day," he said. "We had a total of 982 fatalities for the entire 101 days - an everage of 9.7 deaths per day!"

"Faced with these figures, it's hard to imagine why 40 percent of our drivers still don't wear safety belts, almost half of our infants and toddlers ride unprotected, and people still drive under the influence of alcohol and drugs," said Gustafson. "However, reports from Texas Transportation Institute and the DPS indicate this is the

case." The coalition spokesperson noted that these are areas where individual Texans can make a difference, simply by changing their own habits or talking to their

families and friends. "The Texas coalition is part of the '70 by 90 Accord,' a group of organizations striving to achieve 70 percent corrent use of safety belts and child seats by 1990," he said. "We have only seven months to go. If we can reach our 70 percent usage goal during the 101 days of summer, we may well see that deathless day.






