Cisco Area Receives Up To Four Inches Of Rain This Weekend

The Cisco area received heavy rains and damaging winds over the weekend when storms passed through the area early Saturday and Sunday mornings. The residents of Cisco were also without electricity when power lines were blown down during the storm. In some areas of Cisco, people were without electricity for about 2 hours.

The roof on the home of Ed and Sandra Stuart was ripped off when a thunderstorm passed through the Scranton area Sunday morning. Sandra said the family was all asleep but woke up when

high winds and hail started hitting the home. She said it sounded like a freight train and it was so loud that they could not even hear each other talking. The chimney fell through the living room roof and the west side of the roof was torn off and ended up in the back yard. She said the front porch was also torn off. They received four inches of rain, so the inside of their home was also damaged from the rain.

The roof on a barn at another Scranton residence, the home of Royce Harris, also received heavy damage when the storm passed through.

Trees were blown down at several places inside the city limits of Cisco during the storm, the heaviest storm was Sunday morning.

The Cisco Volunteer Fire Department weather watchers were called out from 12 midnight until 5 a.m., Sunday. One funnel cloud was spotted west of town at this time.

Rainfall measuring 3½ inches fell at Lake Cisco which brought the lake up 3 feet over the weekend. Three and four inches of rain were reported south of Cisco, 3.8 inches of rain in east Cisco and 3.3 inches of rain fell in west Cisco.

County Commissioners To Assist In Ambulance Purchases

Eastland County Commissioners Monday declared an Emergency in regard to Ambulance Service in Pcts. 1 and 4, and voted to assist the cities of Cisco and Eastland to purchase ambulances for services operated from E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital and Eastland Memorial Hospital.

Patterson Ambulance Service, which had operated in Cisco and Eastland for nine years, closed its business last Friday at 5 p.m. Lack of support was one of the reasons given for the closing.

Since then the ambulances from the Medevac Ambu-

lance Co. in Brown County have been filling in from the Hospitals until a new Hospital-City-County Service can be started.

Spokesman at the Commissioners Court indicated the interim service was less than satisfactory, apparently due to the condition of the ambulances. One was reportedly in no shape to carry a heart patient to Abilene Saturday, and one broke down carrying an accident victim from a wreck south of Eastland Monday morning.

County Precincts 1 and 4 will pick up half the cost of the ambulance purchases.

New ambulances may cost \$33,000 to \$37,000, with used ones a little less. Emergency equipment for the vehicles will probably add \$3,000 to each. Eventually two ambulances are expected to be stationed at each hospital.

The County Auditor's office was requested to help work out details for the Precinct's part of the Ambulance funding. The budgets will need to be amended, and contingency funds used.

"Since we got started we need to roll," said Billy Bacon, Commissioner of Pct. 4.

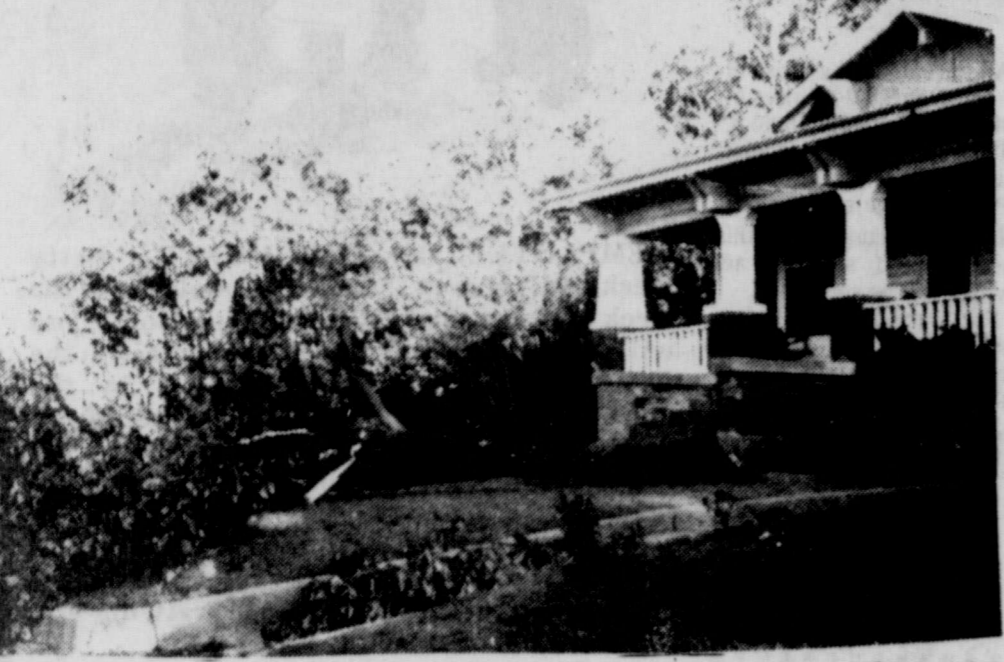
Youth directors Mike and Dorothy Rogers said the youth are working toward a trip to Six Flags this summer.

much to offer in a location. For one thing, it was near enough to the Dallas-Ft. Worth metroplex, which is the origin of 25% of state prison inmates. With a location only 85 miles away, prisoner's families could visit here at a minimal cost.

Eastland County also had the best of two worlds to offer workers who moved here, the Doctor said. It could offer the tranquility of a small town country lifestyle, but was near enough the culture/shopping of the cities.

There were a number of people already living here who would work in the prison, Barnes added and ample housing for another 5,000 who would eventually move to the county. There were ample schools for the children of workers.

Besides, he said, Eastland County people are enthusiastic about a prison here. There have been only a few dissenters during the meetings around the county.

Barnes stated that water for a prison would need to come from Lake Leon. He said the Eastland County District Water Board was "seriously considering" building enough new treatment facilities to supply a prison. They would "float bond" for about \$1.5 million to accomplish this.

Barnes said the City of Eastland was considering a \$1.5 million expenditure to equip the City to handle prison sewage if the site south of the town was chosen.

A gift of land to the state was needed before the Prison Board would seriously consider Eastland County as location, Barnes concluded. He urged Commissioners to give this a favorable consideration. After his presentation he was applauded by most spectators in the packed courtroom.

Judge Bailey said the prison site matter would be placed on the agenda for next Monday, June 12.

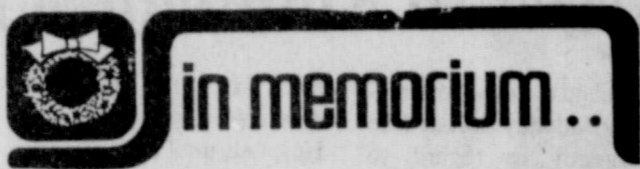

Farmers Have Deadline For USDA Programs January 1

Farmers who want to retain eligibility for USDA program benefits, including commodity price supports, loans and crops insurance, need to be aware of the "Conservation Compliance" provisions of the 1985 Food Security Act.

This relatively new provision requires farmers who have "highly erodible cropland" to have a conservation plan approved and to begin actively implementing that plan by January 1, 1990, said Gary A. Stanford, county agent.

The plan must be fully implemented by January 1, 1995. Each farmer should determine whether or not these provisions apply to his land.

These provisions are equally important to both the landowner and tenant, Stanford said.

In some counties, limited cost-share funds will be available to assist farmers in implementing their plans. Those funds available through the Agricultural Conservation Program, the Great Plains Conservation Program and other programs are limited and will be distributed in the usual manner. Therefore, individuals who have their plans in place and make appropriate application will be in a much better position to receive those funds than those who lag behind, Stanford said.

Developing the conservation plan is a relatively simple process, Stanford said. Once the soil type and land conditions are known, SCS conservationists will provide farmers with several options for "significantly reducing" erosion. In many cases, farmers are already meeting required erosion reductions. In those cases, the plan will consist of documentation of what farmers are already doing.

Farmers are encouraged to act as soon as possible to complete this necessary process to assure continuing compliance and eligibility for USDA programs, Stanford said.

Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board Accepting Applications

The Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board is accepting applications for more than \$2.5 million in grant funds to improve the quality of precollegiate (K-12) instruction in mathematics and science in Texas. Grants are awarded for 12 months.

The grant funds, available to Texas under the new Dwight D. Eisenhower Mathematics and Science Education Act must be used to improve the teaching skills of K-12 teachers and increase student access to mathematics and science courses. The Eisenhower Act reauthorized the predecessor statute, Title II of the Education for Economic Security Act (EESA). Applications must be submitted to the Coordinating Board by Aug. 1, 1989.

Thirty to forty (\$30 to \$40) grants ranging from \$25,000 to \$65,000 each will be awarded to support cooperative teacher training programs between higher education institutions, local school districts, and regional service centers, said Nan Broussard, Coordinating Board Title II program director.

Another four to five grant awards above \$100,000 will finance the development and/or implementation of demonstration models specifically designed to increase the access of the State's growing minority student population to mathematics and science education and careers.

The Coordinating Board will announce the grant awards at its October meeting. Projects funded

Fifty-One Young People Participate In Youth Experience Success

Fifty-one young people are participating in the Y.E.S. (Youth Experience Success) program at Cisco Junior College this summer. Participants come from throughout the Big Country area to attend the seven-week session. They arrived at the CJC campus on Sunday, June 4, 1989.

Pharmacy Topics

Shyness can be cured. For some people whose social phobia made them unable to function in ordinary situations, researchers at the National Institute of Mental Health offered drug and/or psychological therapy for 12 weeks. Most improved to lead normal social lives.

Doctors at the University of California/San Francisco report success in using hydralazine, an antihypertensive drug, to reverse heart enlargement caused by leaky aortic valves. Patients were able to delay or avoid surgery.

Scientists measuring the blood cholesterol levels of youngsters not only spotted those at risk for coronary problems, they also found that many of their patients had unrecognized coronary artery disease, the Southern Medical Journal reported.

New drug, Eminase, injected right after a heart attack, halved the number of deaths in the first 30 days following, British researchers reported. Drug manufacturers are awaiting FDA approval.

Phillips said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate is 4.5 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan," Phillips said. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance programs will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until January 19, 1990 but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," Phillips said.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.

The FmHA office in Eastland is open from 8:00 to noon and 1:00 to 5:00, Monday through Friday.

Marketed Gas Production Down In February

AUSTIN-Railroad Commission Chairman Kent Hance announced that Texas marketed gas production in February totaled 356,416,359 Mcf (thousand cubic feet) of gas, compared the January production total of 394,164,878 Mcf. The February marketed gas production reflected a decrease of five percent compared to the February 1988 production of 376,589,492 Mcf. Total Texas gas production in February was 437,962,274 Mcf.

Marketed gas production is the gas left after liquid hydrocarbons have been separated on the lease from the "wet" gas that is usually produced at the wellhead. It also does not include gas that is used to fuel production-related equipment on the lease site, or gas that is otherwise not marketed.

Exports of Texas-produced gas in February totaled 144,32,341 Mcf compared to 126,186,373 Mcf in January. The February exports of Texas produced gas reflected an 18 percent decrease when compared to the February 1988 exports total of 176,341,863 Mcf.

Recent Rains Refill Possum Kingdom Lake 15 Feet

Carson Hoge, General Manager of the Brazos River Authority, has announced that inflows from recent rains have refilled Possum Kingdom Lake to elevation 995 feet, the maximum allowed by Federal regulatory authorities. The lake, which has a normal full elevation of 1000 feet above sea level, was temporarily lowered to 987 feet in April 1987 as a safety measure while investigations of a foundation problem were conducted and corrective actions were taken. Lowering of the lake level to 987 feet was ordered by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission, which licenses the

hydroelectric generating facilities at the project. The corrective work had progressed far enough to allow the gates at the dam to be raised in April 1988 and the process of refilling the lake to elevation 995 to begin.

"Unfortunately, it has taken over a year for sufficient runoff to occur in the watershed upstream of Possum Kingdom to allow us to bring the lake level up to 995," said Hoge. Now that the lake level has reached its temporary maximum, an intensive monitoring program is underway to evaluate the effectiveness of the repair work accomplished since early 1987 to restore the integrity of the dam structure.

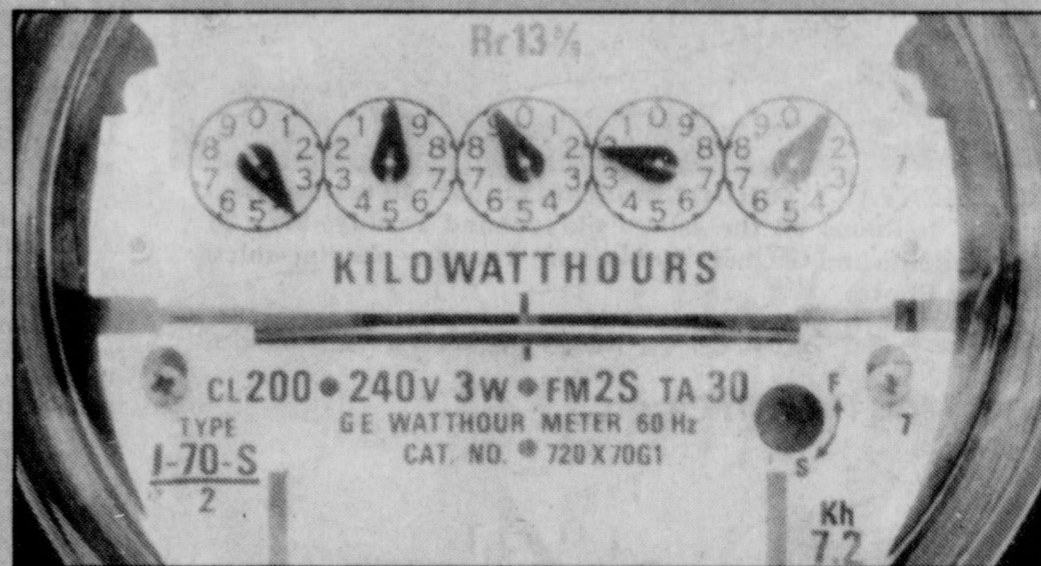

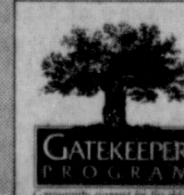
You can slow down the wheels on your Electric Meter and lower Summer Cooling Bills when you follow these helpful tips:
