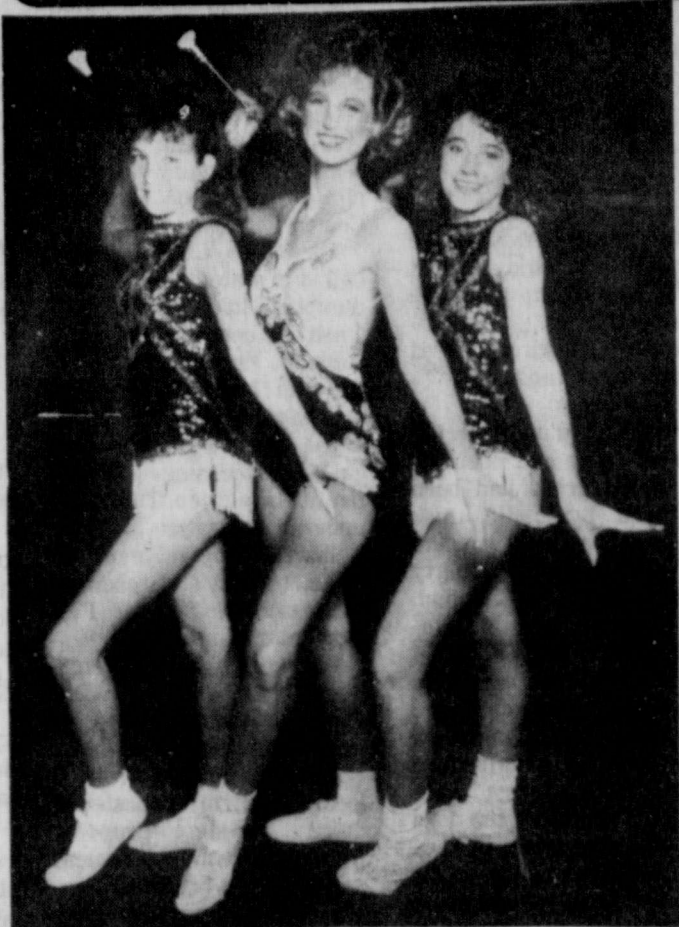

A lengthy agenda is in store for the Eastland County Commissioners on Monday, June 12. The meeting will begin at 10 a.m. in the Commissioner's Courtroom, with a Public Hearing on the County Operating Budget for the 1989-90 scheduled for 11 a.m.

A number of other important items will be discussed and probably decided on during the day. The Commissioners will reconsider Eastland County Economic

Development Council's request for assistance in locating a prison facility in Eastland County, and consider the County's authority to purchase land for the prison site.

Ambulance contracts for Emergency Ambulance Service will also be considered.

The Commissioners will discuss re-opening the Breath Test Program in Eastland County - an item brought by DPS Trooper Steve Foster and

## Sheriff's Department News

### June 6th Daily Activity Report

Deputy Sancillo was advised that equipment was being moved and run at night across the caller's property. Deputy Sancillo was unable to locate or hear anything.

An attempt to serve a citation to a male subject in Ranger at 7:40 a.m. was unsuccessful due to subject not being at residence.

Sancillo accompanied an inmate to District Court at 9:00 a.m., at which time inmate received 3 years at TDC.

Deputy Griffith was advised at 8:45 a.m. through a telephone call, that a man was walking on FM 6 at Carbon with a chain around his neck. This person has used this act around the Eastland area for publicity.

Deputy Griffith investigated a report that trash was being dumped on a County Rd. in Precinct 4.

A Cisco lady called and reported that a male subject was on her property and had broken a window and done damage to her vehicle. The incident was reported to Cisco PD.

A Cisco resident reported trash dumping on county roads. Commissioner for Precinct 4 and the Sheriff's Department have issued a warning of 24 hour clean-up to subject or charges will be filed.

Deputy Sancillo dispatched a weather watch for 2 1/2 hours between Ranger and Lone Cedar Country Club.

Deputy Hardin was advised by dispatch that people who were not guests at LaMancha Lake Ranch would not leave. A petition for a County Road in Pct. 4 will be considered. There will be requests for pipeline road crossings in Pcts. 2 and 3. Bids will be

opened for purchase of used Road and Bridge maintenance equipment in Pct. 2, and items will be considered for sale.

On jail matters, temporary clerical help will be considered for the Sheriff's Department, and report on the jail will be given.

Bills, claims and accounts will also be considered.

At 7:30 p.m. Monday the Commissioners will meet again to discuss the Texas Capital Fund loan for Rising Star Vineyard, Inc.

All of the meetings Monday will be open to the public. Obviously the decisions made will affect the whole county.

## Spider Mites Are "Big" Problems

Spider mites are tiny, but they can cause big problems in home gardens.

These pests prefer tomatoes, beans and peas but will attack many other crops. They do most of their damage, in hot, dry weather, said Gary A. Stanford, county agent.

Spider mites, also called red spiders, are only 1/60 inch in length and vary in color from white to green to red.

The tiny pests can build up quickly and completely engulf plants, Stanford said. Eggs laid on the underside of leaves hatch in four to five days. A complete life cycle takes three weeks, and as many as 20 overlapping generations can occur in a single week.

Mites spin a thin web which often can be seen on heavily infested plants. They feed by inserting their mouth parts into plant tissue and sucking juices. While feeding, they inject toxic substances into the plant, Stanford said.

Infestations of spider mites can be identified by tiny white spots on plant leaves. Heavy infestations cause bleaching or

yellowing, first along the main leaf veins and then throughout the plant. Heavy infestations cause plants to shed buds and small fruit. Spider mites can completely defoliate a plant if not controlled, said Stanford.

Control of spider mites is often difficult and requires two to four applications of insecticide at five to seven-day intervals. Check plants frequently for spider mites since the pests can build up rapidly.

Insecticides registered for controlling spider mites in gardens are diazinon, kelthane, malathion and sulfur. However, do not use sulfur on cucurbits (cucumbers, squash and melons), as severe plant change could occur.

As always, read and follow label directions on all insecticides, said Stanford.

## Census To Begin Soon In State

The Census Bureau will soon be sending 31,000 temporary workers into neighborhoods across the country to complete collection, checking and rechecking of housing unit addresses in preparation for the 1990 census.

Census Day is April 1, 1990. About 100 million questionnaires will be delivered to housing units nationwide by late March 1990. Accurate

address lists are vital for prompt delivery and to monitor the return of completed census forms through and beyond Census Day.

In mid-May census employees begin working in selected large cities to verify residential address information and the number of housing units at each address. This operation will end in late June.

## Percentage Of Natural Gas Drilling At Record High

A report done by Texas Railroad Commissioner John Sharp's office and released shows that natural gas is making a dramatic rebound in the U.S., bearing out Sharp's predictions that natural gas would become the "fuel for the future" for America. The Sharp report listed several significant findings:

The report notes that the percentage of drilling rigs for gas is now at an all time high of 46%. This represents the highest percentage of natural gas drilling rigs ever recorded since rigs have been tracked separately for oil and gas. Last year at this time only 33% of the drilling rigs were drill for gas.

Industrial demand for natural gas in Texas for 1988 rose to 1.9 trillion cubic feet, which is the highest level of industrial consumption in 15 years. Further, Sharp projected that the volume of natural gas used to generate U.S. electricity will double in the next ten years to 6.3 trillion cubic feet. This figure is also very close to projections by the federal Department of Energy of 6.2 trillion cubic feet.

In 1988, total Texas gas well production rose more than 170 billion cubic feet and reached the highest levels since 1984, Sharp said this

gas. Sharp earlier led Texas producers to gas conferences he sponsored in New England and Houston. On July 13-14, Sharp and California Speaker Willie Brown will hold a similar gas marketing conference in Los Angeles. "Texas will be back in the saddle again, and our new horse will be natural gas," Sharp said. "These new figures in my report show that the new future in natural gas that I have been talking about is already beginning."

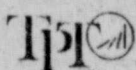

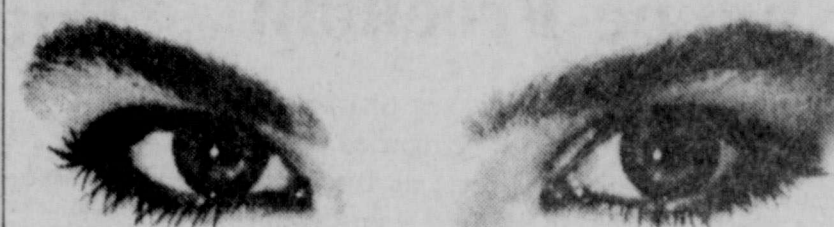

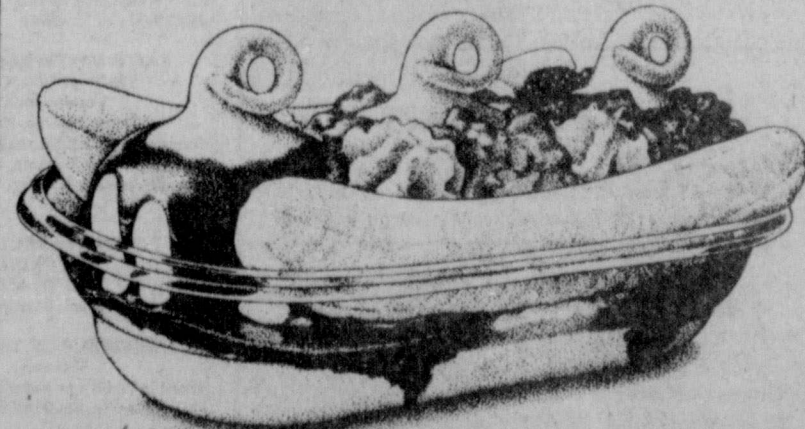

# New Horizons In Indian Country

Art has a way of opening many doors - some leading to new friendships and the understanding of other cultures. Bronze artist Dale Stewart was reminded of this recently, during a ten-day trip through the Hopi, Navajo and Apache Indian Reservations in Arizona.

What made this trip so special for the Cisco sculptor was that he traveled with a group of Indians - or Native Americans, as they are correctly called.

Director of the tour was Garrison Tahmahkera, a professor and counselor in charge of Indians Affairs at Mesa Community College, Mesa Arizona. This is located just east of Phoenix.

The purpose of the tour was to film a Video Documentary to encourage young people of the various tribes to continue their education in High School and College. This was to be done by filming educated young Indians who would talk about their work and how knowledge had enriched their lives.

Dale Stewart's friendship with Monroe Tahmahkera of Fort Worth, a brother of Prof. Garrison, led to an invitation for Stewart to go along on the trek.

Besides the Tahmahkeras, who are Comanche, others on the journey were students at Mesa College. Gary Gonzales, a Spanish-American, was in charge of the Video filming.

Dale and Monroe met the main group in Mesa on Sunday, May 21. As they loaded tents and camping gear into the Stewart van and two others the temperature was 110 degree in the Salt River Valley. Later, in the high elevations, they would drag out blankets every night.

A drive through the spectacular intermountain country to Flagstaff, Arizona occupied most of the first day of the trip. Colorful rimrocks bordered the ever-changing views of timbered mountains and deep canyons.

Toward evening the 12,000 ft. San Francisco Peaks materialized in the north. One of these mountains is the highest in Arizona.

Next morning travelers

drove from Flagstaff east to the Navajo Reservation, a huge chunk of land in north-eastern Arizona. The first major stop was actually in the Hopi Reservation, which is a

smaller block of land enclosed in the Navajo territory. Stewart learned that the Navajo and Hopi were ancient enemies, but had tried to resolve their differences over land rights.

He was also told that the huge timbers in a Spanish Mission at the Hopi Community of Old Oraibi were carried by Indians many miles across the rough hills and valleys to the site. The Spanish soldiers would not let the Hopis rest during the journey.

While on the Reservation Stewart and the College group watched the kachina Harvest Festival. This celebration is usually not performed for outsiders. Dale was also invited to come back and see a snake dance, a ritual in which live rattlesnakes are handled.

In the Hopi Nation, as well as in the Navajo and Apache, Stewart saw some good cattle and sheep. People were living in most valleys with any source of water. Generally the homes were a southwestern ranch type made of lumber. The Hopis also had some very

old Pueblos however and the Navajos some round hogans.

Gary Gonzales was busy filming young people and talking to them. Three full films would later be condensed into one, with the sound dubbed in.

A few days later the College group reached the spectacular Navajo area around Kayenta and Monument Valley. They decided to visit some remote old ruins of the Anasazi, who are presumed to be ancestors of the Navajo people. These extensive cliff dwellings are not generally open to the public.

While near a burial ground an Indian student picked up a small piece of bone. At that moment he felt an evil spirit come upon him, he told Garrison Tahmahkera.

Garrison then asked Dale if this student would come to his tent for a special ceremony to get rid of the evil spirit. Dale stayed in the tent during the procedure. Cedar was burned in the tent, creating a purifying smoke. Incantations and eagle feathers were also used in the cleansing ceremony.

As the trip continued the students camped near such colorful places as El Capital Wash, Chilchenbito Canyon and the ever-present sandstone formations. There were also stops at farms, ranches, and small towns. There was constant talk of customs and history, with some comments

in the strange and beautiful Navajo language.

The group took time to look around Canyon De Chelly, one of the most beautiful places on the tour. The stream of water and cottonwoods and willows along the canyon floor made a striking contrast to the cliffs and arches above it. This was the location of "Spider rock", a sandstone monolith used in photography and advertising.

On Thursday night in Canyon De Chelly about 40 Indians met the College group at a campground. It was a time for visiting, laughter, music (mostly flutes and drums) hospitality and plenty of good, home-cooked food.

Friday morning, May 25 at the destination was Gallup, New Mexico. Back to the sounds and smells of an urban center, where the Navajo intermingles with the Anglo world. There were shops full of Indian goods for sale - silver and turquoise, blankets and rugs, paintings and other art work.

On Saturday the group went south to the Zuni Pueblo, then turned west to the Apache Reservation. A lot of the day was spent in St. John's Arizona in a high green mountain area.

There they met Jo Jolola, a geologist who is married to a niece of the Tahmahkeras.

Jolola told them that he sometimes guides elk hunters in the mountains. He showed a picture of he and Country Singer George Strait on one of these hunts. Dale found out what the cost of such a hunt would be - around \$7,000.

After a swing into the Apache Reservation, Dale and Monroe parted with the others and headed back to Texas.

On the 20-hr. drive back to Fort Worth pictures kept flashing through Dale Stewart's mind. He remembered the hospitality of the Indian people, their willingness to share with each other. The striking beauty of the country harmony of life with nature, the symbolism of the art work, the reverence of natural things.

He felt like he had been on a significant journey. No, he didn't have a video to show of his trip. But some of it would surely be reflected in his sculpture and paintings.

In West Texas, ranchers are apt to be more concerned about "drought" than "brucellosis." In these parts there's more dry, hot weather than brucellosis, or "bang's," an incurable bacterial disease that can cause cows to abort, deliver weak calves, or produce less milk. What may come as a surprise, however, is the link between "drought" and "bangs" in this arid section of the state.

"Drought plays a key role in brucellosis infection in West Texas," said veterinarian Thurman Fancher of the Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC), the state agency charged with eradicating the disease.

Fancher, director of TAHC's Area 6; James Dickson, the supervising inspector; and the staff of 12 animal health inspectors work with ranchers and livestock markets in 48 West Texas counties, including Eastland. They have found two basic drought-related factors that contribute to brucellosis infection.

Fancher explained that during a drought, ranchers typically sell off cattle they can't feed or water. When the weather eases, producers have to buy "replacement" breeding stock. These heifers or cows may come from other states or areas of Texas where brucellosis infection is more common. "Producers mix new animals into their herd, and then get the nasty surprise of finding these new cows and heifers were infected - and spread the disease," he said.

Another factor, Fancher said, was that some ranchers ship their cattle to greener pastures during a drought, often transporting them across or out of state. "In 1983, a West Texas producer hauled animals to the Houston area, and the herd became infected by a herd nearby," he said. Fancher cautioned producers to carefully consider where they ship or pasture animals after droughts.

"We've been spared the higher rates of infection found to the east," Fancher said. "But this is no time to become complacent about protecting herds, if West Texas is to remain 'clean'." Fancher said six herds are under quarantine because of brucellosis in TAHC's Area 6, which stretches from Coryell County in the east, to El Paso County in the west, includes the Big Bend country, and encompasses Eastland, Andrews and Mitchell Counties in the northernmost border. The rest of the state has 833 herds quarantined for the disease.

The largest infected herd in Area 6, with nearly 3,000 cattle, is owned by 52 producers. These cattle are considered one herd, because the animals mix together and freely roam the Fort Hood Military Reservation in Coryell County.

Fancher explained that an infected herd is usually detected when a cow aborts, or when cows are blood-tested for the disease prior to private sale, or at a livestock market. To stop disease from spreading, infected cattle are slaughtered (the meat is safe to eat), while the animals remaining in the herd are quarantined until they undergo a series of blood tests to determine there is no more infection.

Fancher said brucellosis is usually spread among a herd when cattle lick infected cows, or nuzzle the bacteria-covered calves or aborted fetuses of infected cows. Bacteria can also be spread if an aborted fetus from an infected cow is dragged to another pasture by dogs or other animals. Infected cows can also transmit brucellosis to their calves; these calves may not test positive for the disease until they are grown and ready to calve.

"Brucellosis infection can be prevented, particularly in West Texas, where infection rates are already low," Fancher said. "Taking a few

precautions can provide added protection for a herd."

Fancher recommended producers purchase heifers and cows only from herds certified by the TAHC to be brucellosis-free. In Texas, 2,113 producers have earned this certification by having their herds tested annually with no indication of infection. Fancher also suggested ranchers buy heifers that were vaccinated against brucellosis when they were between the ages of four and eight months.

"Make sure that any cattle purchased have been tested within 30 days prior to their sale."

"Keeping fences mended protects herds," Fancher remarked. "Cattle that wander into nearby pastures could contract brucellosis and other disease from infected animals."

Fancher advised ranchers to manage breeding in herds so that calving is completed in a three- to four-month period. "That way, if an abortion occurs, it's more likely to be noticed. If infection does exist in the herd, there's also less chance the disease will be spread year 'round, since the bacteria is

most often transmitted during calving," he said. "Also, all the cows can be gathered

and tested after the calving period to ensure the herd remains free of disease."

## Farmers Union Is Thrilled With Legislation For TDA

The Texas Farmers Union, the leader of agricultural organizations supporting continuation of the Texas Department of Agriculture in the Sunset process, announced its support for the agreement that has been reached to continue the state agency with an elected official as its head.

## Bees On Slower Journey To U.S.

USDA honey bee reacher Dr. Bill Rubink told a touring group that the Africanized honey bee is not advancing toward the U.S. border as quickly as expected. It was earlier thought that it would arrive at the border late this year, but the arrival could be delayed until 1990. He said the drought conditions in Mexico may have slowed the movement of the insect, which had been migrating an average of 300 miles annually.

The agreement announced by Governor Bill Clements calls for the Agriculture Commissioner to remain as an elected statewide official and to serve as the Chairman of the new Agriculture Resources Protection Authority which will coordinate future pesticide rules and regulations. The resolution is a defeat for the smaller number of farm organizations who were calling for an appointed Agriculture Commissioner or even, in some cases, the outright abolition of the TDA.

We are very pleased that Governor Clements agrees with us and four of every five Texans who want to retain our Agriculture Commissioner as an elected official.

The TFU President said, "Our coalition of agricultural and rural groups was working in the best interests of both producers and consumers. The Texas Farm Bureau and those who opposed us not only failed in their efforts but also demonstrated that they are out of touch with mainstream agriculture and the overwhelming majority of Texans."

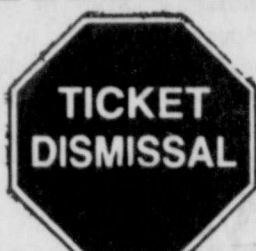

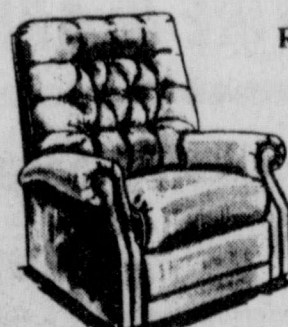

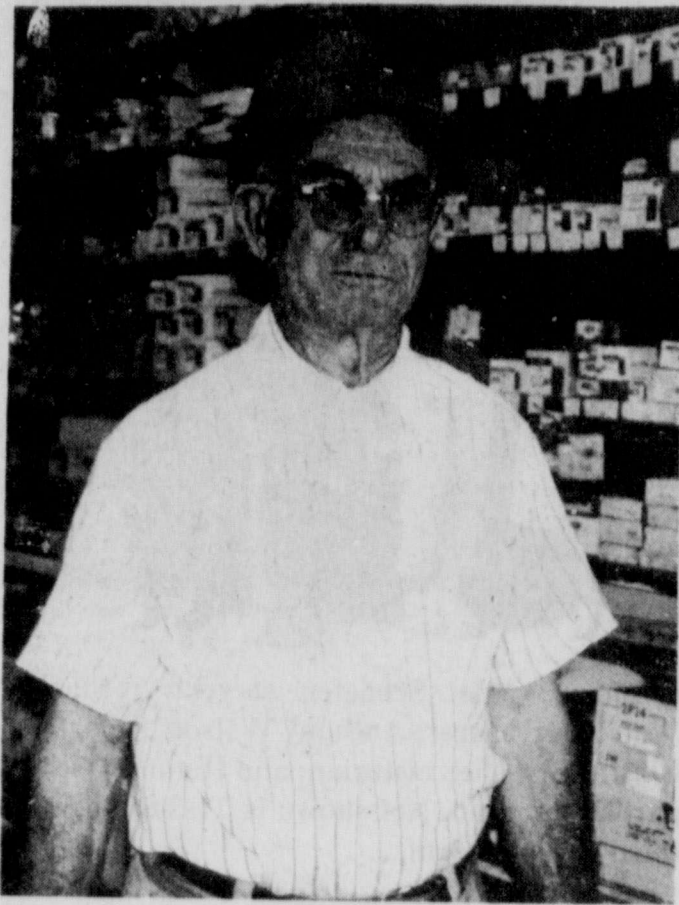
Wilson said he played foot-

For a uniform clean, wipe windows and mirrors in careful up and down motions.

For best results, don't clean during peak sunlight hours. Glare can make it especially difficult to see dusty film.

Clean stove tops with an extra strength cleaner to avoid sticky build-up.

Periodically empty refrigerators and clean with an ammonia-based cleaner for a fresh clean.

A chrome finish is thin and

especially prone to finger prints and smudges. Frequent wiping with an extra strength glass cleaner will help keep it looking shiny.

Laminated plastic work surfaces are quite soft and should be cleaned frequently to avoid soil build-up. Never clean these surfaces with an abrasive powder. Try a glass cleaner for a beautiful streak-free clean.

It is important to keep the inside of a microwave oven clean to avoid unpleasant odors. Wipe up spills and remove stains promptly with a damp sponge. Keep the door sealed and surrounding areas clean with a heavy duty glass cleaner.

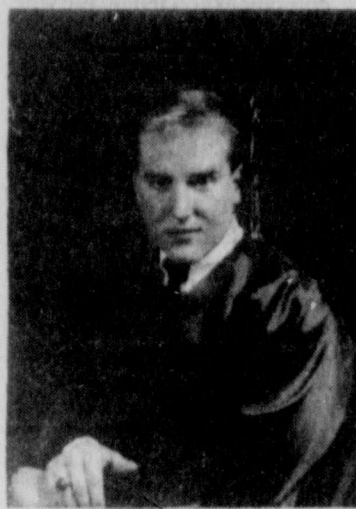

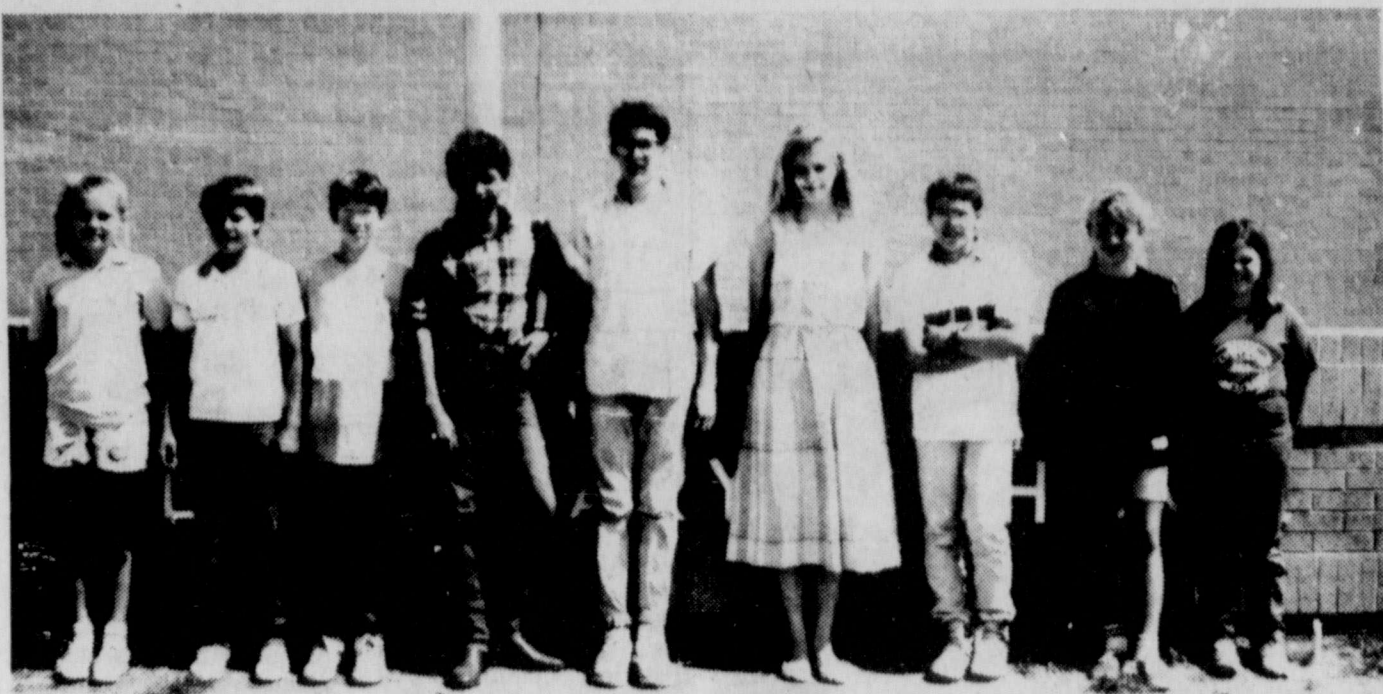

## Letter To The Editor

On May 6, 1989 the tax payers voted not to raise taxes to keep the Graham Memorial Hospital open by a 41 vote margin. This 41 vote margin in spite of the fact that people outside the voting precinct voted in the election illegally.

Shortly thereafter two board members stated "The voters didn't give a clear indication to us what they want done and we don't have a clear mandate to close the Hospital down." (Abilene Reporter News).

The administrator said just before the May 6th vote "If the taxpayers vote not to raise taxes the Hospital will close by July."

According to the Hospital Administrator the average monthly income from patients is \$57,000.00 and the average operating expense is \$75,000. Friends that is an \$18,000 month loss or \$600.00 per day.

One of the new board members says: "The patient load is as low as one a day."

Cisco is a retirement town with most on a fixed income that is not paying for their groceries and medicine.

If this hospital board has a moral obligation to keep the hospital open regardless of the fact that the majority voted to close it then the board is morally obligated to pay the monthly loss plus any tax raise they insist on putting on the elderly widows of this community.

Hendrick Memorial Hospital operated this hospital 5 years and lost \$500,000.

Question: Were the hospital board morally responsible for the tax money they required the tax payer to pay, putting it on interest, or were they morally responsible to pay it on the \$450,000.00 note we owe?

At any rate about \$200,000.00 of the tax money has been spent since Hendrick turned it back and we still have the \$450,000.00 debt plus \$3,000.00 per month for 6 or 7 months to the management corporation and as I understand it we still have the management corp. hired to help us lose money.

The management has said

"it will be harder to pay the debt off with the hospital closed than with it open". But will it?

A dead horse quits eating feed at death and the hospital would stop losing \$18,000.00 a month or \$216,000.00 a year if the electricity and water were turned off and the doors were locked forever.

A prime example is the clinic building due north of the hospital.

When Hendricks gave up the hospital they closed and locked the almost new clinic.

The facts are: We have operated a clinic for years and are still operating a clinic as a hospital and with all the expenses of a hospital and that has proven an impossibility.

I seriously doubt that any person in Eastland Co. would attempt to operate a business as this business is being operated. In fact the lending agencies would see to it he didn't and that's what the taxpayer intended to do on May 6, 1989.

Please hospital board if you have no qualms about putting us into a further debt at the rate of \$600.00 plus per day, I beg you to have mercy upon the senior citizens of Cisco that will suffer too much to pay the \$450,000.00 debt we must pay.
