State Comptroller Bob Bullock said last Friday that local sales tax allocations to cities, counties, and transit authorities across the state increased 14.2 percent during the first half of 1989, compared to the first half of 1988. He said the Texas economy continues to strengthen and expand, and the local sales tax rebates reflect that growth.

Eastland County has not fared that well though. The total tax rebate check for Cisco this period was \$7,892.29. This is a 11.73% less than the same time last year. Eastland is 9.61% less than last year, Abilene is down 3.47%, and Ft. Worth is down 6.96%. Where is

We were certainly not before the differences between the sexes was discovered, but we were surely before the sex change; we made do with what we had. And were the last generation that was so dumb as to think you needed a husband to have a baby!

No wonder we are so confused and there is such a generation gap today!

But we survived! What better reason to celebrate! We were born before radar, credit cards, split atoms, laser beams and ball-point pens; before panty hose, dishwashers, clothes dryers, electric blankets, air conditioners, drip-dry clothes— and before man walked on the moon.

We got married first and then lived together. How quaint can you be?

## RAIN! RAIN!! RAIN!!!

The 1989 Steddum Family Reunion, which was held at the Point at Lake Cisco last weekend, will always be remembered as the year that Lake Cisco decided to swallow their 8ft tent, and a pup tent. The tent was on dry land Saturday afternoon. During the night a thunderstorm came through and on Sunday morning the Lake had risen so much that only the top of the tent could be seen in the water. No one was injured in the incident.

There was no one in the tent, everyone had either camped out or had rented one of the A-frame homes by the Point. The tent was about six feet from the water on

Saturday, but fell during the thunderstorm when the weight of the water became too heavy.

Children at the reunion had been jumping off a dock on Saturday, but on Sunday morning the dock was quite a bit into the lake, so the children were not allowed to swim out to it. But all, in all, everyone had a good time.

It was reported Tuesday morning that Lake Cisco had risen eight feet in depth and had risen 15ft area wide in less than a week when recent thunderstorms dumped up to five inches of much needed rain in this area. Pumps at Battle Creek are running full time, and local

creeks are full and are pouring into Lake Cisco.

A Lake Cisco resident said that the roaring of water from a creek could be heard as it rushed into the Lake early Tuesday morning.

Cisco has received daily thunderstorms since Friday. Reports of measured rainfall at the Lake was three inches on Saturday, one inch Sunday and two inches early Tuesday morning. Measured rainfall in east Cisco was half an inch on Wednesday, 9/10" on Friday, 2-3/10" on Saturday, 1-9/10" thru Tuesday morning. South of Cisco, rainfall was measured at 3 1/2" on Saturday, 8/10" on Sunday, and one inch of rain

early Tuesday morning.

Cisco has received 8" of rain during the month of June this year. Last year, the total rainfall from January to June was nine inches in Cisco.

With the recent thunderstorms there has not been any damage of wind or lightning reported. Heavy damage from winds were reported the weekend before from heavy thunderstorms. Weathermen had predicted that the rains would stop for the rest of the week, but were expected to begin again by the weekend.



### Cisco To Have Two Ambulances Ambulance Contacts Approved With Cities

Eastland County Commissioners gave final approval to Emergency Medical Services contracts with the cities of Eastland and Cisco during a meeting Monday night.

The last meeting was a continuation of sessions which lasted throughout the day. Eastland Mayor C.W. Hoffmann Jr., City Manager Paul Catoe, Attorney Mike Siebert and Cisco City Man-

ager Mike Moore discussed the contracts with the Commissioners.

Mike Moore and Paul Catoe reports that their respective cities had purchased ambulances, one new and one used for each town. The Ambulance Service will be operated from E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital in Cisco and Eastland Memorial Hospital.

During the morning the Commissioners were advised by District Attorney Emory Walton that the proposed contracts were basically sound, but that certain parts needed changing or clarification.

This was so that the County would not be liable for the actions of (Hospital) employees over whom they had no control, the District Attorney said, he also stated he would like to discuss all the ramifications of the contracts with the Commissioners— especially concerning lawsuits the county might face on its part of the operation.

Walton said these contracts for Pct. 1 (Eastland) and Pct. 4 (Cisco) should be that the

Ambulances offer primary services to these Precincts, with runs outside on an emergency basis only.

He said that the contracts should also specify who would get the Ambulance equipment if the hospitals should cease operations.

One Commissioner said he was tired of every little thing in these contracts being picked on, and motions were made to accept them, one from each city. There was a tie vote, with Bacon (Pct. 4) voting for the contracts, Robinson (Pct. 1) also voting for them, and L.T. Owen (Pct. 3) and Norman Christian (Pct. 2) voting against.

Judge Bailey declared that the motions had failed.

During the evening session the City Officials returned to the courtroom. Clauses had been changed in the contracts to satisfy the formal obligations of the District Attorney.

The Commissioners voted 4-0 to approve the Contracts. Plans are to begin the new city-county hospital service as soon as possible.

### Bond Election Ordered To Decide Financing Of Prison Site

Eastland County Commissioners approved a Resolution Monday evening supporting the submission of a prison site proposal to the Texas Department of Corrections, and pledging its purchase if selected.

The Court ordered an election on Aug. 12 for the public to approve or disapprove bonds to finance the project.

The Eastland County Economic Development Council, which is promoting the location of a state prison here, will offer two sites to the State.

One is a 1,000 acre tract near Carbon, which would have a facility housing 2,500 prisoners. The cost of this land would be \$650,000. An alternate site is a 300 acre tract near Ranger, and the facility located there would house 1,000 inmates. This land would cost \$360,000.

The state will be presented with a choice of these sites, with selection expected by mid-September or Oct. 1 at the latest, according to Project Manager Dr. Charles Barnes. If selected the land will be given to the state.

## Preliminary Budget Shows Big Deficit

Eastland County Commissioners held lengthy meetings Monday, with budget proposals for 1989-90 being one of the items under consideration.

Discussed but deferred until evening were final decisions on Emergency Medical Service contracts with the cities of Eastland and Cisco, and a vote on the Eastland County Economic Development Council's request for a Resolution on purchasing land for a prison site.

At 11 a.m. the Court held a Public Hearing on the proposed County Budget for 1989-90. This fiscal year will begin Oct. 1. County Judge Scott Bailey read requests for the various Departments.

Projected expenditures in the General Fund were higher than last year, although there were savings in the Office of the County Clerk, County Treasurer, and a few other areas. Pay raises were figured in most of the requests for the new year.

Raw figures on the proposed General Fund expenditures were \$2,035,835. With a projected income of \$1,891,638, this made a deficit of \$144,197.

A larger deficit was projected for the Road and Bridge

Fund. Income from all Precincts was anticipated at 4488,701, with requests of \$723,701. This made a deficit of \$235,000.

The county has been operating for the past three years on a budget of approx. \$2.8 million. County Auditor told the Commissioners Monday that a \$25-30 million valuation loss was contributing to the loss of revenue. The loss of all Revenue Sharing money was also being felt. This had totaled around \$100,000 annually.

Richard Robinson, Commissioner of Pct. 1, told the Court that "We are looking at a \$500,000 operating deficit (on this projected budget) counting the new ambulance services."

The City-County-Hospital Ambulance service was projected to cost the county from \$96,000 - \$120,000 for the first year, including the County's part in purchasing ambulances.

After that it was expected to run about \$96,000 per year, with each of the four Precincts getting \$2,000 per month to use on Emergency Medical Services.

The Commissioners said it appeared they would have to go back and re-figure the budget. County Judge Scott Bailey suggested that they adopt a budget freeze, and then figure any emergency increases from that. No action was taken on this matter.

Billy Bacon, Commissioner of Pct. 4, said that something would have to be done. "The only place I see where we can get any more money is from the taxpayer and they're already taxed to death."

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## Older Texans Are Being Offered Legal Hotline

Often, the people who need a lawyer the most can least afford one. A new service, the Legal Hotline for Older Texans, is now being offered to any Texan 60 years of age or older.

"We want this to be a first resort for older Texans when they have problems or questions about legal matters," said Randall Chapman, director of Texas Legal Services Center. "Our primary aim is to provide older Texans, especially those on a low, fixed-income, with free or low-cost legal services."

Hotline attorneys determine if callers have a legal problem, give free legal information and advice over the phone, and provide brief services such as calling a third party or writing a letter to resolve a legal problem. Problems that cannot be resolved by the Hotline will be referred to legal aid organizations for low-income clients, or local attorneys in private practice who agree to charge reduced fees.

Hotline services are free. People requiring follow-up services may be referred to a local attorney.

"Licensed attorneys will help resolve such caller's problems with Social Security, health care, consumer problems and elder abuse," Chapman said. "Our service will place a lot of emphasis on public benefits and health care. I believe our primary

clients, elderly on low, fixed-incomes, are in dire need of these particular services."

O.P. (Bob) Bobbitt, executive director of the Texas Department on Aging, believes the Hotline will enhance the efforts of his department in providing legal services to the elderly. "This hotline will be a very useful resource to the elderly, especially the homebound and those who may be institutionalized. We are presently enhancing our efforts in the area of benefits counseling and legal services are certainly an integral part of it," he said.

The Legal Hotline for Older Texans is primarily supported by a grant from the American Association of Retired Persons, with additional in-kind support from the State Bar of Texas and the Texas Department on Aging.

The Legal Hotline for Older Texans toll-free statewide number is 1-800-444-9114. The hours of operation are 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.

## Texas Wines, Doin' Fine In "Natural" Grape-Climate

Texas, commonly known for livestock production, is gaining notoriety in another area, the grape and wine industry.

"Grapes grow naturally in Texas, so the onslaught of the wine industry was imminent," said Dr. George Ray McEachern, horticulturist with the Texas Agriculture Extension Service. "Thirteen of the twenty-six species which grow around the world are native to Texas."

Texas boasts about 7,000 acres of grapes, and 30 wineries are producing more than half a million gallons of wine a year. That's up from 6,300 gallons in 1975.

Texas grape and wine production started to boom prior to the prohibition period, the

horticulturist said. After that, the industry lay dormant until the national wine revolution of the late 1960's.

"Increasing interest in grape production during the 1970's prompted the Extension Service to gather and provide educational information on the subject," McEachern said.

The Texas Grape Growers Association was formed in 1977 and holds educational meetings each year.

Commercial grape production has spread to most areas of the state, with the South Plains and Lubbock area leading the charts in acreage, McEachern said.

Production also has been

successful in the far west, north and central areas of Texas and in the hill country. New varieties also are giving east and south Texas potential for growing grapes.

"The state's grape producing industry continues to expand," McEachern said. "And the future for expanding the number of Texas wineries is excellent. However, the most positive situation is the top quality of many Texas wines."

## Canker Are Sores Problems For All

Are you under stress? Do you go out in the sun, eat sweets, drink fruit juices, go out in the cold or just get tired?

Most people do at one time or another, which may account for the prevalence of cold and canker sores in the population. Doctors estimate that roughly half of all Americans are affected by cold or canker sores each year. Cold sores are caused by the herpes simplex 1 virus and are brought on by fatigue, stress, fever or exposure to sunlight or cold. The cause of canker sores, which occurs inside the mouth, is unknown, but doctors believe they may be triggered by eating sweets, biting the inside of the gum, stress or fatigue.

## Milk With No Cholesterol

Researchers at Cornell University say they have discovered a way to remove up to 90 percent of the cholesterol in milk. Soon, low-cholesterol milk will appear on grocery shelves, followed by ice cream, cheese and butter. Whole milk contains about three percent cholesterol.

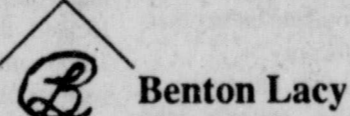
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## Texas Department Of Health Intensifies Health Fraud Raids

In recent months, the Texas Department of Health (TDH) has intensified its efforts to combat the rising incidence of health fraud in Texas.

According to TDH in-

### Hydrogen Peroxide Concentrate Is Extremely Dangerous

The Texas Department of Health (TDH) has warned that a highly concentrated solution of hydrogen peroxide, illegally sold as a treatment for numerous ailments, including AIDS and cancer, can be extremely dangerous, even lethal, to the user.

TDH stopped sale of the solution in February, after learning that at least one death and several injuries were linked to the product.

Sold in health food stores and through direct mail in Texas, the solution often has been labeled, "35 Percent Food Grade Hydrogen Peroxide," "Biowater," or "H202," although TDH officials said some retailers may be substituting other labels. Similar products have been found for sale in other states.

Ken Davis, chief investigator for the TDH Food and Drug Division, said, "The products we embargoed were repackaged in Brownsville from larger quantities brought in from Mexico. The company, called 'LIGHTEHOUSE' was distributing the solution in gallons, quarts, pints - down to four-ounce bottles with medicine droppers."

According to the literature the manufacturers included with the product, the solution is useful against more than 60 illness and disorders. "But the truth about this concentration of hydrogen peroxide is that it is about as caustic as lye. No one should consider ingesting this solution any more than they should drink drain cleaner," Davis said.

Davis said that although there are no warnings on the label about the dangers even of handling the product, "One of our people had serious burns on his hand after handling a leaky sample of H202."

Davis advised anyone who has purchased hydrogen peroxide in a higher concentration than the common 3 percent solution recommended as a disinfectant should return the product to the store where it was sold.

"I would even recommend that people who have this 35 percent concentration in their homes should handle the stuff only with rubber gloves, and seal it in a strong plastic bag before transporting it," he added.

investigators, the sale of bogus "health aids," unapproved drugs and gadgets, is a thriving industry in the state. While some of the products are merely useless, posing only monetary loss to the victim, others can be dangerous, even deadly.

Dennis Baker, director of the Division of Food and Drugs, said "Many of the products openly sold as health aids are illegal, if only because of their labels or accompanying literature mislead consumers about their effectiveness. Other, more dangerous products fail to disclose their potential hazards or side effects, as required by federal law."

Baker said, "In the three months ending in a raid on a San Antonio company May 8, our investigators carried out 35 separate actions against distributors and retailers of illegal drugs, devices, or food products. While the action we took in San Antonio was important because of the size of the company's operation, the illegal inventory we found was typical."

In the raid, the authorities joined to stop sale of Michael's Health Products at the company's headquarters in San Antonio.

The action involved investigators from the TDH Division of Food and Drugs, the San Antonio police department and district attorney's office, the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission, and the federal Food and Drug Administra-

tion (FDA), following a 6-month TDH investigation.

The authorities embargoed the entire inventory of the company's headquarters and packaging plant.

Michael's markets about 100 so-called health aids, primarily through health food stores nationwide, with estimated profits in excess of \$1 million.

Among the company's most popular sellers are: "Manpower," alleged to restore virility; "Arthro Tabs," sold as a treatment of arthritis; "Curcu Tabs," said to remove toxic metals from the blood; and "Diab Tabs," purported to provide natural insulin for diabetics.

Ken Davis, chief investigator for TDH, said, "Such drugs as 'Diab Tabs' are extremely dangerous to consumers. Not only are the contents of them unknown without further testing, but people with real health problems such as diabetes might choose to substitute these pills for the prescribed medications."

Also included in the embargoed inventory were bulk quantities of vodka, which the company used to mix "tinctures" for mouthwashes, gargles, and sinus sprays. The company has no permit to use the alcohol in its products.

Davis said that several state and federal charges against the company owner, Michael Schwartz, are pending.

"Nevertheless, much is still to be done to eliminate the hazard to our employees and other citizens who might be bitten."

Garcia said that all dogs are territorial by nature, and even the most gentle pet will bite if it feels its domain is threatened by the presence of a carrier of other person.

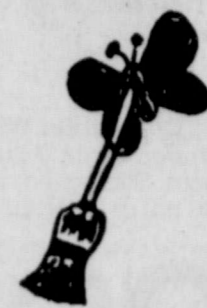
"With a little care, a pet owner can not only protect our carriers, but his or her pet and pocketbook, too," he said.

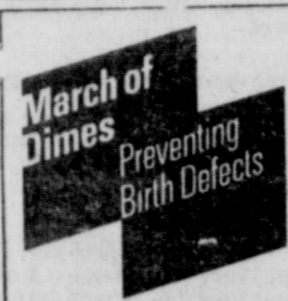


## Pleasant Hill Extension Club Met In Dora Schaefer Home

SEVERE WEATHER AWARENESS WEEK

To North Texas Broadcasters, Editors, and Emergency Management Officials:

The week of February 27th through March 3rd will be designated Texas Severe Weather Awareness Week by Governor Clements. The National Weather Service and Texas Division of Emergency Management are again asking for your help in spreading information to the public about the threat of severe weather and life-saving measures to be taken when severe weather occurs.

Severe weather warnings are ineffective if the public does not receive the warning or is not knowledgeable on the safety procedures to follow. The purpose of Texas Severe Weather Awareness Week is to provide people with the knowledge necessary to protect their lives when severe weather threatens.

A tornado drill is scheduled for North Texas on Wednesday, March 1st. At 10:00 AM that day, there will be a special test of the North Texas NOAA Weather Radio alarm system. The drill will give those in homes, schools, hospitals and businesses the opportunity to see if they can receive a warning in a timely manner and then take the same precautionary actions which would be taken during an actual tornado event. In some areas, emergency management officials will test local sirens when the practice tornado warning is issued. Should the weather be threatening at that time, the drill will be postponed until the following day (Thursday, March 2nd) at 10:00 AM.

Enclosed are materials which hopefully will be useful to you during the Severe Weather Awareness Week campaign. You are also invited to call the National Weather Service Fort Worth Forecast Office for interviews, information or answers to your questions.

We thank you for your past cooperation and hope that we can continue to work together to protect the residents of Texas from severe weather. If we can be of assistance, please contact us at 817-429-2631 or 817-334-2631 (unlisted).

**TORNADO!**

Tornadoes occur in the central United States more often than anywhere else on earth. The so-called "tornado alley" extends roughly from Texas northward into the eastern Dakotas. This dubious distinction for the area is due to its unique geographical features.

"Tornado alley" is on the lee side of the north-south oriented Rocky Mountains, which is a preferred area for the development of low pressure systems as westerly upper level winds blow across the mountain range. The Rocky Mountains also wring out much of the moisture from the upper level westerly winds. The counter-clockwise motion of air around the low pressure systems pulls warm, moist air at the surface northward from the nearby Gulf of Mexico. Cool air to the north can move southward with no geographical restrictions, creating strong temperature contrasts with the warm air to the south. These factors all create a favorable environment for severe thunderstorms to develop.

Strong to violent tornadoes usually occur with what are called supercell thunderstorms. Tornadoes in supercell storms are commonly associated with a wall cloud, a lowering of the cloud base usually found on the southwest side of a supercell.

Recent data from Doppler radars indicates that these tornadoes often develop aloft in the storm, about 15,000 to 30,000 feet above the ground. The tornado then develops both downward and upward.

Most researchers agree that the absolute maximum wind speed in tornadoes is about 300 miles per hour. Most tornado damage can be explained with wind speeds of 100 to 150 miles per hour. To understand this, keep in mind that a 100 mile per hour wind has four times the energy of a 50 mile per hour wind, and a 150 mile per hour wind has nine times the energy of a 50 mile per hour wind.

LIGHTNING SAFETY RULES



- ❑ When a thunderstorm threatens, move inside a substantial building or a vehicle.
- ❑ Inside a building, avoid using the telephone or electrical appliances. Lightning can strike near a building and travel through telephone or electrical lines into the building.
- ❑ Get out of and away from open water.
- ❑ If outside with no time to reach a safe building or vehicle, follow these rules:
  - Do not stand underneath natural lightning rods such as tall, isolated trees in open areas.
  - Avoid projecting above the surrounding landscape as you would do if you were standing on a hilltop, in an open field, on the beach, or fishing from a small boat.
- ❑ If you are isolated in a level, open field and you begin to feel your hair stand on end, indicating that lightning may be about to strike, drop to your knees and bend forward putting your hands on your knees. Make as low and as small a target of yourself as possible, but do not lie flat on the ground.



FLASH FLOOD SAFETY RULES

- ❑ Know where high ground is and how to get there quickly.
- ❑ Watch for rising water levels.
- ❑ Do not try to drive through flooded areas.
- ❑ Abandon your vehicle if water begins rising over the road and head for high ground immediately.
- ❑ Be cautious at night. It is harder to recognize the danger of flash flooding then.



TORNADO SAFETY RULES

A TORNADO WATCH means that tornado development is possible. Keep a watchful eye on the sky for threatening weather, and stay tuned to radio, television, or NOAA Weather Radio for the latest weather information.

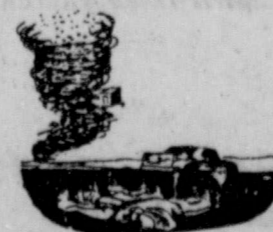
A TORNADO WARNING means a tornado has been sighted or indicated by weather radar. Persons in the path of the storm should seek shelter immediately, preferably on the lowest floor of a substantial building.

**IN HOMES:** A basement offers the greatest safety. In homes without a basement, take cover in the center part of the house, on the lowest floor, and in a small room such as a closet or bathroom, or under sturdy furniture. Stay away from windows. Do not attempt to open windows.

**IN SCHOOLS, HOSPITALS, AND SHOPPING CENTERS:** Move to predesignated shelter areas. Interior hallways on the lowest floor are best. If the building is not of reinforced construction, go to a nearby one that is. Stay out of auditoriums, gyms, and other structures with long, wide free-span roofs.

**IN YOUR CAR:** Do not try to outrun a tornado. If available, leave your car and get into the nearest ditch or depression until the tornado passes. Cover your head with your hands.

**IN MOBILE HOMES:** Mobile homes and trailers are particularly vulnerable to overturning during strong winds and should be evacuated when strong winds or tornadoes are possible. Mobile home communities and trailer parks should have a community storm shelter. If there is no shelter nearby, leave the trailer and take cover in a ditch or depression.



Did You Know?  
TORNADO FACTS

- ❑ The average number of tornadoes in Texas each year is 119 with an average of 11 Texans killed each year.
- ❑ Tornadoes can occur anytime during the year, but are most frequent in Texas during the months of April, May and June.
- ❑ Tornadoes can occur at anytime of the day, but are most frequent in Texas between 3 PM and 6 PM CST.
- ❑ Sometimes tornado outbreaks occur where tornadoes cause widespread damage over an extensive area. During the afternoon and evening of April 3rd and the early morning of April 4th, 1974, a "super outbreak" of 148 tornadoes across 13 states killed more than 300 people, injured more than 6,000, and caused \$600 million in damage.
- ❑ On March 18, 1925, the "Tri-State" tornado traveled some 219 miles across Missouri, Illinois, and Indiana. It lasted for over 3 1/2 hours and killed 689 people.
- ❑ Codell, Kansas was hit by tornadoes in 1916, 1917, and 1918. They all occurred on the same day - May 20th.
- ❑ Most tornadoes (about 7 out of every 10) are weak with wind speeds no greater than about 110 mph, and a path length which averages 3 miles.
- ❑ Nearly 3 out of every 10 tornadoes are strong, with wind speeds between 110 and 200 mph, and a path length which averages 9 miles.
- ❑ Less than 2 percent of all tornadoes are violent with wind speeds over 200 mph and a path length which averages 26 miles.
- ❑ Since 1950, there have been more than 4700 tornadoes in Texas.
- ❑ Since 1916, 1103 people have been killed by tornadoes in Texas.
- ❑ It has been rumored that rivers, hills, and valleys protect an area from tornadoes. This is not true. Tornadoes have been observed to cross rivers and valleys and to climb over mountains with little change in intensity.



## Sheriff's Department News

Last Thursday an Eastland County Drug Task Force raided a residence at 200 South Oak Street in Ranger.

According to Sheriff Dee Hogan, Deputy Morris Hardin broke open the bolted door which the resident refused to unlock when officers served a search warrant. Hardin grabbed the resident who ran into the bathroom and was attempting to flush a substance, described by officers as methamphetamines, down the commode. Deputy Don Griffith retrieved at least a portion of the substance for evidence. And the resident, a 41 year old Ranger man, was jailed, facing charges of possession of a controlled substance.

Drug paraphernalia, a chemical formula for making the drugs, and price and division lists were also seized.

On the night of June 1 or the morning of June 2, the wire fencing around a Sudan patch on the Don Massingill farm 2 miles north of Morton Valley was cut, allowing cattle to enter the patch and destroy the Sudan crop. Also a furnished 30 ft. by 30 ft. house 4 miles west of Cisco, belonging to Don Massingill, was burned. The house was located across the county road from the gate to the pasture where stolen property from the Sneed burglary was located earlier.

Four or five signs were stolen from La Mancha Ranch at Lake Leon. Some of the signs have been recovered and there is a suspect.

The door was damaged and forced open as a radio repeater station north of Cisco near Moran was burglarized between June 2 and 4. A Regency model WR10 radio repeater (A01332) valued \$1,150 was taken, but another unit necessary for its operation was not stolen.

When an auto ran out of gas on I-20 one half mile west of Ranger on June 4, the driver went for gas. Upon returning about 45 minutes later, the stereo and speakers were found to be missing.

Continuing cattle thefts between last November and this March at the Ledbetter farm west of Scranton, better known as the Clinton farm, were reported. Four black or mixed Brangus newborn calves were reported taken just after they were born, along with a 3 year old black baldie cow which was taken about January 15. The cow had a 4 and L brand on her left hip.

A window was broken in a criminal mischief case southeast of Cisco. The suspect offered to pay for the window.

Four of Eastland County Precinct 4's orange traffic cones were stolen from a tractor on county road 107 on May 31 or June 1.

Between May 10 and 19, the Spencer home on Haig Street in Ranger was burglarized. An Emerson VCR, a 20 in. RCA portable color TV, a Technique compact disk player, ten compact disks, two VCR tapes, an electric razor, and a 30-30 Savage pump rifle with a silver pin in the rear sight were taken. There is a suspect.

A home on Melvin Street in Ranger was also burglarized.

Complaints have been made in a dispute between children of two Olden families.

A home on Route 3, Eastland, was burglarized between May 20 and 29. The residents returned after being gone for two weeks to find that someone had entered and left the home in disarray. Two window air conditioners; a tiller; a pair of candle holders; a white and a blue jewelry box, with gold swirls; and clothes, including shorts and dresses, were gone. There are suspects.

Officers questioned both parties involved in a trespassing complaint near FM 3101 3 miles north of Hwy. 80.

Between May 16 and 28, the locked back door of the Woody residence on Brewster Street in Rising Star was forced open and the house was searched. Someone may have been looking for dope. A Winchester model 12 pump, a Labelle .38 cal. with a hectogen barrel, a jewelry box with a wedding ring, Masonic pins and jewelry, a cast iron pot with some blue paint on it, and a Gibson Lawter Strings package were taken.

The door of a house in Olden belonging to Dublin Realty was pryed open. Taken were a McCulloch 16 in. chain saw, a pair of 7x35 Tesco binoculars, an Emerson clock radio colored lavender, and a bottle of Pamolive dishwashing soap.

A deputy was also looking for two runaway boys thought to be headed for Abilene. One is 17 and has been in trouble in the past.
