## Marvin Cole, E.L. Graham Administrator, Takes Job At East Texas Hospital

Marvin Cole, E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital administrator, turned in his resignation last week to the hospital board of directors. Cole said he has taken a job as hospital administrator at a 38-bed hospital in Grosebeck, Texas, located about 40 miles east of Waco.

He said the hospital in Grosebeck is in a taxing district and has the strong support of the community. He said he was chosen over 41 other applications applying for the job, and he feels very good about that. He said there is a positive outlook in Grosebeck and they are excited about their future. They have a 15 member board of directors for the hospital. They have had problems in the past, the same as Cisco, but they have worked hard to overcome them. He said their taxes bring in \$650,000 annually for the hospital. He said Cisco brings in \$120,000 for their

hospital. Cole said he came to Cisco to fight and build a future here, but things did not work out. He said Cisco is a good town and a good place to live. He said Cisco is in a good location and they need a hospital as bad as anyone else does.

He said he is not bitter, just disappointed about the ways things have turned out. Cole said he came here to make the hospital successful and Cisco should always support E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital. Cole, who has worked with getting an ambulance in Cisco, said he is very happy about the final result. He said the way things worked out, even if the hospital does close, Cisco will have ambulance service.

He said the hospital board of directors are committed to the hospital and the City of Cisco should support them in their effort.

## Cisco Junior College Completes Phase I On B.B. Owen Demonstration Farm

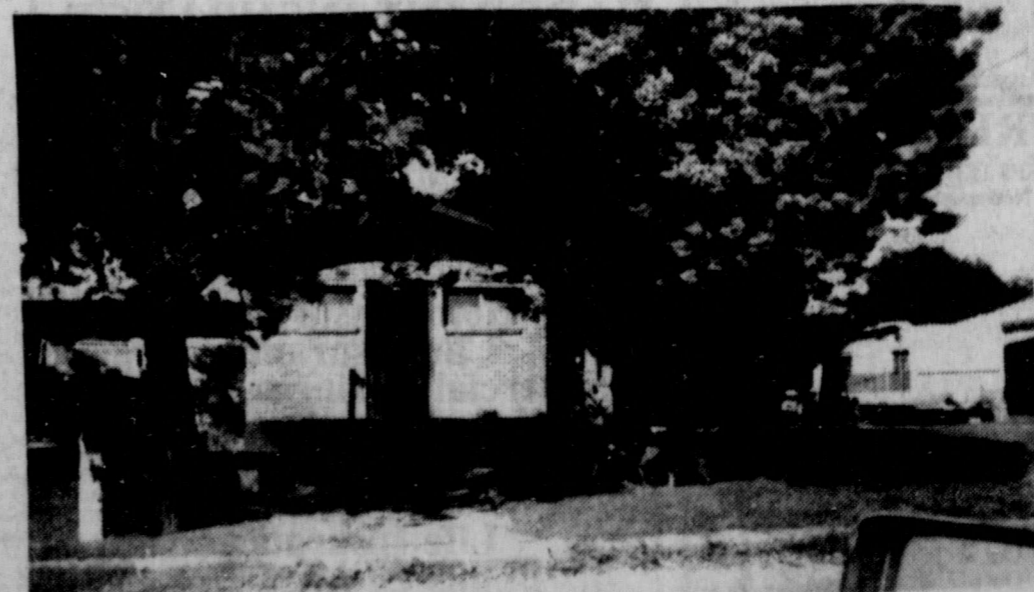
Work on the Cisco Junior College B.B. Owen Demonstration Farm is progressing very well, according to Gerald Bint, Ag teacher at the college. Mr. Bint spoke to the Cisco Lions Club at their regular meeting held last Wednesday at Tradition Restaurant.

Bint said Mr. B.B. Owen is originally from Cisco. He joined the service and after his tour of duty was over he moved to Ft. Worth. He made money as a franchise

Ford dealer in Fort Worth and then invested in land. When Mr. Owen died the money was set up in funds to help children. He had no children of his own, but he was always active in scouting and boys clubs.

The B.B. Owen estate donated two tracts of land, 160 acres each to Cisco Junior College to help with the youth's programs. Bint said the college has started developing the land located just east of Cisco.

Bint said that in the agriculture classes at CJC, only two students have actually farmed and only five had driven a tractor. He said there were 60 students in ag this year, and 63 last year. He said there is a turnaround in agriculture classes. Bint said at one time there were only 15 students in a class. He said there are more job openings in agriculture than there are graduates to fill (Continued On Next Page)

## City, County And Hospital To Share Cost Of Ambulance

The City of Cisco will enter into an agreement with the Commissioners Court of Eastland County and the Cisco Hospital District to assist funding that will provide an emergency ambulance service for the city of Cisco. The contract was approved by the Cisco City Council at their regular meeting held last Tuesday in the council chambers.

With the agreement, E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital will maintain and service the ambulance. The hospital will submit a statement of costs of operation of the ambulance each month. At that time the county will pay one third of the cost, the city will pay one third and the hospital will pay the other

third. If at any time the revenues from the ambulance is less than one third of the costs, then the city and county will split the difference and pay it. Mike Moore, city manager, said this is a no loss situation for the hospital.

If at any time the revenues for the ambulance are more than one third of the expenses, then the hospital shall retain twenty-five percent of that and the rest shall be credited to the county and the city to help offset the expenses of the cost of operations.

But there were a lot of other things too.

The Eastland County Courthouse will have a new elevator soon - if a tax lawsuit is settled favorably for the

county. Among other items, the County Commissioners approved the purchase of a new elevator - contingent upon a favorable court settlement concerning taxes from a Gas Gathering Company.

From Page One... sioner of the Precinct, stated that a settlement on this roadway had been reached with the Starr family heirs.

An old road will be moved two or three hundred yards east and go due north to Rd. 144, eliminating the need to cross inside any of the property.

District Attorney Emory Walton said that a deed would need to be presented to the county for the new roadway. The County Commissioners approved this plan.

On another item, Clydelle Lewis of Pct. 2 told the Commissioners that a gas line with "no easement, no permit" had been laid near a roadway in the vicinity of his property. "Gas is going through the lines, and bulldozers going down there," he

said. Lewis and Pct. 2 Commissioner Norman Christian discussed whether this was a County road or private road. The county extended a road in that vicinity last year.

Concerning another pipeline, the Commissioners approved the request of D&A Petroleum Co. (represented by Arthur Green) to cross County Rd. 409 in Pct. 3 with a pipeline. This crossing will be six miles south of Carbon.

Law enforcement matters occupied part of the day. Steve Foster and Sgt. Jerry Mathews of the Department of Public Safety asked the Commissioners to consider re-opening the Breath Test Program in Eastland County.

They requested an updating of the system, which would involve putting in computer lines with phone lines tapped in. This equipment would be located in the office of Sgt. Mathews. Monthly charge for the phone lines would be \$27.50.

The Commissioners approved the plan, saying that this year's budget should be amended to take care of the cost.

During one session Sheriff Dee Hogan requested that the Commissioners consider temporary clerical help for his Department.

"(In Austin) There is no criminal history on drug people arrested here during the last 10 years," Hogan explained. "We'd like to do those files and do them correctly. We'd like to pass from the criminal histories into the current arrests."

In the discussion which followed the Commissioners noted that Hogan was saving a lot on jail food and management, but that other costs of law enforcement appeared to be up.

District Attorney Emory Walton said: "If some of the measures in Austin pass, we haven't seen ANYTHING yet!"

Judge Scott Bailey said that what we were seeing was a

drastic shifting of responsibility for law enforcement from state to county.

"Drastic is a mild word," replied Walton.

On the current Eastland County Jail report, Pct. 4 Commissioner Billy Bacon said that 11 inmates were in jail; 4 for the TDC, with 2 on State and 1 Blue warrant.

The Commissioners approved a request from County Clerk Joann Johnson to take bids on microfilm. The bids will be opened July 10.

County Treasurer Ruth Hart asked for clarification on the extra vacation time for 10-yr county employees. The County Commissioners recently voted to give these long-time employees three weeks of vacation time each year instead of two weeks.

She was told that the extra vacation time will begin on Jan. 1, 1990. Mrs. Hart said there wouldn't be over eight or ten people to qualify for the extra time next year.

them. He said they have completed Phase I of the B.B. Owens Farm. They have root plowed, raked, burned and plowed 80 acres of the farm, established an orchard and vineyard, and have completed an irrigation well and drip irrigation system. He said as soon as the money is available they will begin Phase II.

Phase II will be to build a fence on the west and south boundaries, fence around the orchard and demonstration plots, root plow, rake, burn and seed 80 acres, and build a 10,000 yard lake.

Phase III will be to build livestock and demonstration buildings and working facilities. Phase IV will be to build a greenhouse and

equipment.

Bint said the public will be able to see the work on the farm as it is done. It is located on Highway 80 east, just past the hill. He said when the indoor pavillion is built they will have rodeos, horse shows, and dog shows. Bint said in Abilene recently at a 3-day horse show, \$750,000 was made there. He said that won't Cisco at all. He said there are 40 fruit trees now planted and they have 300 cuttings of grape vines from the Munston farm (which is famous for their grapes).

reasonable. They will be set by the hospital.

In a report on the water works situation, City Manger Moore said with the blessings of the recent rains, there will be no mandatory water rationing for Cisco. He said at one time it was thought that was going to happen. But, he said, voluntary water rationing is still in effect. He said the pumps at Battle Creek are still pumping and the lake has risen 12-13 feet. He said the water is muddy, and it will take about a week for the mud to settle down.

Council members approved a jail service contract with Eastland Council Tuesday. This contract will help decide at what time a prisoner is the responsibility of Eastland County and when the City of Cisco is responsible. Moore said if someone is picked up on a

Class C Misdemeanor charge then they are the city's responsibility. He said at the present time until a prisoner is formally charged, he is the city's responsibility even though he is in Eastland County Jail. The new contract will state that the prisoner is the responsibility of the county at the time they are booked.

The City also approved Joe Cooper as the City Auditor, and approved a contract with Eastland County Appraisal District for assessment services for 1988-89.

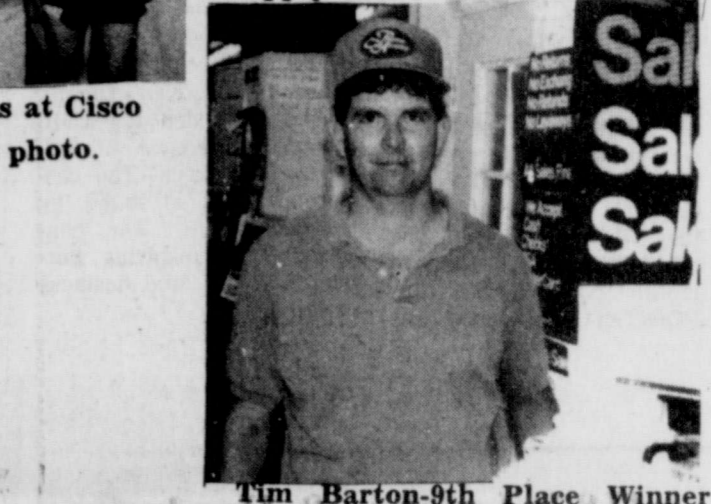

I'm F.L. Spurlen and I am a native of this county and a 1944 graduate of E.H.S. and a Navy veteran of WW 2. I have owned and operated Eastland Machine and Welding since 1954.

Also my wife, Faye and I have another rather unique distinction. We were married on the Ramsey Prison Farm #1 at Atey, Texas, where her father was Dog Sargent. The men who was in charge of the dogs that are the major thing that helps keep the prisoners in line and tracks them down if possible when they escape.

I will not call them blood hounds because they are not. Their great, great, great grandparents might have been scared by a blood hound.

Bloodhounds are good at a cold trail and friendly when they find the end of the trail. Most escapes are missed in a matter of hours and the dogs turned loose. The Dog Sargent, Dog boys (trustees) and other personnel will begin the chase. Fences will be cut for the men on horseback and they will be repaired by the state maybe a week later, if livestock gets out or into the wrong pasture that's the bad part.

I have heard Mr. Mason my late father-in-law tell the things that escapees will do to

steal clothes, a car, pickup, or even a farm tractor to get away.

Knowing what I do about those dogs I would hate to have my wife, children, or grandchildren even close to where they might be close to a trail left by an escapee. Those dogs will attack, that's why the Dog Sargent and dog boys carry those whips to keep them under control.

Also when those dogs are trailing they are not on a leash. They might be 1/2 mile ahead of the men on horses.

## Lewis And Stewart Participate In National Cowboy Symposium

Two persons from Cisco participated in the National Cowboy Symposium and celebration at Texas Tech University in Lubbock on June 2-4.

Dale Stewart, sculptor, exhibited a bronze piece called "Ninety Days and Ninety Dollars" in the Art Division. This piece shows three cowboys riding into town to celebrate after a three month trail drive. It is detailed but free-spirited, a noteworthy piece.

Dr. Monte Lewis, Cisco Junior College History Pro-

fessor, presented a paper called "Dee Bussey; Black Cowboy on the Circle-Bar." This scholarly article is based on the oral history of a black man from Wichita Falls who worked on a big north-Texas ranch from 1938-42.

The Symposium dealt with many aspects of the culture of the American Cowboy. Ranch people and others interested in western ranch life, art and lore came from all across the country. The western parts of the United States was especially well represented.

There were literary sessions, and exhibits and activities dealing with arts and crafts, music, cowboy gear and trappings, and the daily work on a ranch. The speakers addressed topics ranging from cowboy lawmen and black cowboys to cowboy museums and cowboy poetry and musical history.

The performers included rodeo cowboys such as Toots Mansfield and Jim Shoulders, musicians Red Steagall and Don Edwards, cartoonist Ace Reid and western writers Elmer Kelton, John Erickson and Marguerite Noble.

Also present was Barry Tubb, who played the part of the young cowboy "Jasper" in the miniseries "Lonesome Dove." Tubb was born in Snyder and grew up there.

Barry Corbin, who played "Roscoe" in "Lonesome Dove," also attended the Symposium. Corbin is another native west Texan.

Dale Stewart says that he really enjoyed the Symposium - that it was a well-planned event.

"It was great to see the ranch people who were there. I had known some of them since

my days in Coleman County, and had met others at western art workshops and exhibits. I was really glad to have a part in the Lubbock Celebration."

Dr. Monte Lewis also says that the Lubbock event was "really good - the largest Cowboy Symposium I've attended." He remarks that it was interesting to the differences in cowboys from various parts of the country.

When asked about the paper he presented, Lewis explains why Dee Bussey worked as a cowboy only four years.

"Bussey didn't qualify as a full-time cowboy, so he was drafted into the Army in '42," Lewis says.

The ranch where he worked was a new outfit. It had many miles of new fences and 10 buildings in the headquarters at Fulda Camp. But it had some of the same old radical ideas that had been around a long time.

Lewis says that his Mother was a cook at the ranch headquarters, and that's where he first met Dee Bussey. The black cowboy had to eat in the kitchen instead of at the table with other ranch workers.

Reports are that Lewis's manuscript was well received at the Symposium. The Texas Tech Press has accepted it for publication, and it will be out soon.

## Larger Cities Have No Monopoly On Development Needs, Senator Says

LUBBOCK—Big cities aren't the only places needing an infusion of new businesses, industries and services; small town and rural counties deserve their share of government efforts to improve their economic condition, said U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm (R-Texas).

"Economic development isn't just a program for urban areas," Gramm told some 400 community leaders and staff members of U.S. Department of Agriculture agencies from across the state.

Gramm spoke at a recent two-day rural economic development conference conducted here by the Texas Food and Agriculture Council (FAC), a consortium of all USDA agencies which serve the state.

"I don't think we need a new government program for rural economic development," the senator said. "All I want is a fair share of the

economic development expenditures of the federal government to go to rural areas."

Gramm said he wants the federal development program refocused "to promote growth in big cities, medium cities, small towns and rural areas."

He said one of the pressing needs in many rural areas is quality health care. "When you don't have access to modern medical care, you face a problem trying to at-

tract businesses," he said.

The senator said in most small towns, the hospital is second only to the school system as the major employer.

"Texas has led the nation three years in a row in the number of rural hospital closings," Gramm said.

He said the federal government must eliminate the differential in payment of costs for medical care in small towns and big cities. He also said there should be limits on

hospital liability payments except in cases of clear negligence.

Other areas vital to economic development in small communities are rural airports and quality educational systems, he said.

"We're not just competing with each other, we're literally competing with every other place in the world for business," Gramm said.

"A lot of little companies in our small towns are selling all over the world. We've got to be certain that these small companies have an opportunity to get on the playing field," he said.

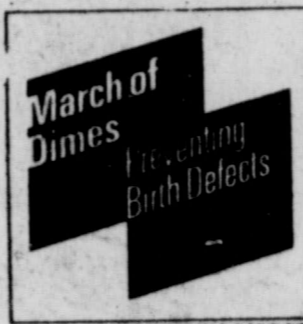

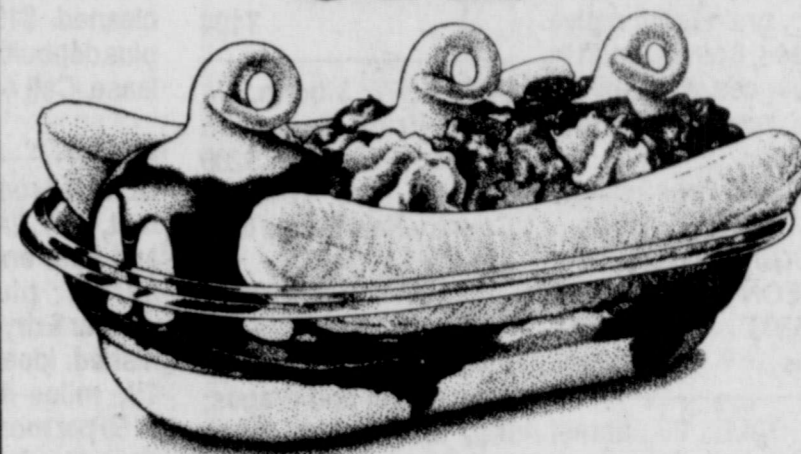

## Pharmacy Topics

Taking painkillers before exercise seems to prevent soreness and improve range of motion, according to a study at the University of Alabama in Birmingham. They tested aspirin, acetaminophen and ibuprofen vs. a placebo.

New antibiotic, astreonom, seems to be effective against urinary tract infections, according to a report in the journal Urology.

Combination drug chemotherapy, plus the hormone tamoxifen, seems to be effective against melanoma that cannot be removed surgically. Experiments are being done at Jefferson Medical College, Philadelphia.

Sticky gel eases the pain of fever blisters and canker sores, stays on even inside the mouth, says researchers at the University of Alabama School of Dentistry. Zilactin is available over the counter.

How's your diet? Even a mild deficiency of magnesium in the diet of expectant mothers may have serious consequences, Swiss researchers found. Mothers who got magnesium supplements were less likely to hemorrhage, or to have cervical problems or bloating, and their babies were born healthier.

## AN EDITORIAL

### LET VOTERS DECIDE

Voters in Eastland County will in August, perhaps more directly than ever before, help decide the future complexion of this county.

In that balloting, they will be registering their vote "for" or "against" the issuance of bonds to finance the purchase of land for the establishment of a major prison in the county, "if" the area is selected by the T.D.C.

And their vote will also register their approval or disapproval of whether they want a penitentiary next door.

Some are seeing the calling of the election as a side-stepping by the County Commissioners Court to endorsement for the prison, and others hold that any time a matter is taken to the public for a vote, it's good. (The Court in Stephens County endorsed the effort there to secure a prison, without an election.)

An Eastland County Economic Development Council spokesman indicated displeasure with the Eastland Court for its failure to endorse, and says that they have heard no opposition, while county commissioners and others report that they do hear opposition.

(At this newspaper office, we hear both endorsement and opposition to a T.D.C. unit in this county.)

The E.C.E.D. spokesman said that some 38 public meetings had been held to explain the economic advantages of the prison, and that no opposition had been registered.

From what is understood, if the election carries and if this county is selected, the county would issue bonds to buy the land and the banks in the county would buy the bonds, which would be repaid by the county through tax revenue, which would require a tax increase.

Apparently no one questions the economic impact such a major facility would have, and no one doubts but that the county needs the additional payroll, but many apparently are privately measuring advantages and disadvantages.

Some have indicated privately that they are not comfortable with the manner in which the efforts are being put forth.

Hundreds and hundreds of locations throughout the state are seeking T.D.C. facilities, so it's going to be a dog-eat-dog fight to see who gets picked.

A divided county could be worse possible result of the well-intended efforts.

A quiet, well-restrained composure prior to the Aug. 12 election might be in order, with the results of the election to determine the wishes of the citizens. If a majority favor, then there should be a united front shown; if not, then the matter should be dropped in favor of a more-acceptable economic stimulant.

The election will permit every registered voter to express their opinion privately. Judging from what we're hearing, some are hesitant to speak out, for various reasons. And that is understandable.

There's no doubt but that we all want our county's economy to be growing, with jobs available for all, and resulting good

times for all — but obviously many wonder if there might not be some prices too high to pay.

More than a few citizens have indicated to the newspaper that they don't want to be identified with their opinions because they were afraid of possible consequences.

Certainly the Eastland County Economic Development Council is to be complimented for its work, for its cooperation and it must be encouraged to continue to work for the economical benefit of the county, regardless of the results of this effort.

We'd encourage a continued, harmonious approach that will present us to the world in a favorable light. -H.V. O'Brien



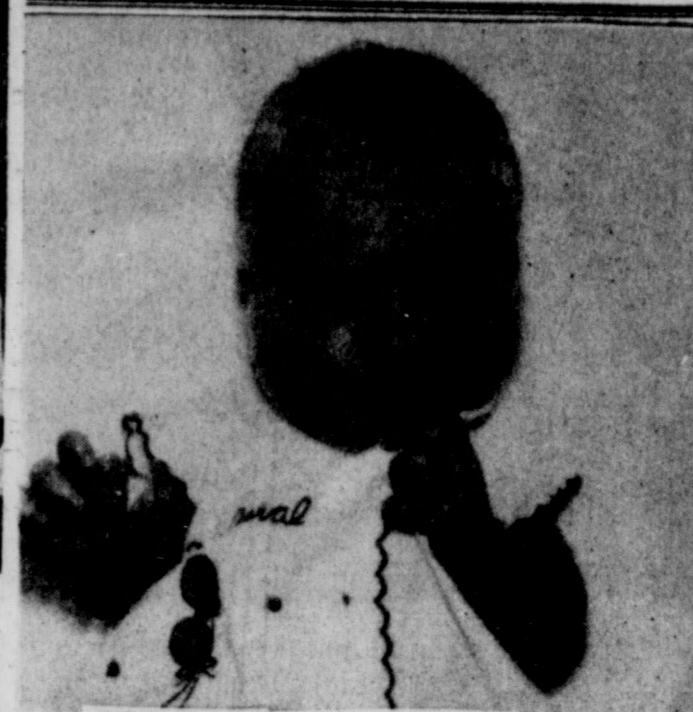

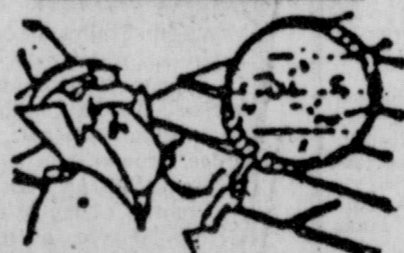

# Homemaking Hints

## From Janet Thomas, County Agent

Saturated fat is out, unsaturated fat is in. That's the news from several major national food manufacturers and fast food chains. And it's good news for health-conscious American concerned about reducing their risk of heart disease and stroke because artery-clogging saturated fat is a major contributor to these health problems.

The switch from saturated to unsaturated fat is an important step in the fight against heart disease. Remember, though, that total fat in most altered products remains virtually the same. Thus, consuming them may not help reduce cancer risk since cancer has been linked to both saturated and unsaturated fat intake.

Some companies have recently switched from beef fat, coconut oil, palm oil, palm kernel oil or lard to less saturated vegetable oils for some or all of their products:

- Frito Lay, Lance, Specialty Bakers and McKee Baking snack food companies
- Archway cookies
- Stouffer's (several frozen foods)
- Sunshine Biscuits (several cookie and crackers products)

- Eden Foods (health foods)
- Roman Meal (refrigerated biscuits)
- Pepperidge Farm (bread products)

Be sure to read the ingredients when shopping for these foods. Many companies have changed the type of fat used in some, but not all, of their products. Look for unsaturated vegetable oils such as corn and soybean oil. Avoid saturated fats like lard, beef fat and tropical oils such as coconut and palm oil.

Many fast food manufacturers also have switched from saturated fats. Hardee's has completely eliminated saturated fats for frying. McDonald's and Burger King have stopped using saturated fats for frying all food except potatoes. Taco Bell no longer fries tacos in coconut oil.

To cut down fat consumption to 30% of calories — as recommended in the American Institute for Cancer Research's Dietary Guidelines to Lower Cancer Risk — you still need to keep a sharp eye on snack and fast foods. However, no one is immune to temptation, so if you do indulge occasionally, consider those foods made with unsaturated fats.

# Senator Gramm To Visit Eastland County June 28

Drugs and Crime are a big problem in our nation and they also are a big problem right here in Eastland County. Even with vigorous law enforcement by local officers, the problem remains a large scale one and it could get worse.

Since the first of the year, there have been charges filed by arresting officers against individuals for seventy-eight drug offenses, and thirty-six driving while intoxicated arrests have been made. And that is just right here in Eastland County.

Due to the complexity of law enforcement in present day Texas, the number of arrests made for crime is sometimes quite a bit fewer than the number of crimes that officers are aware of. The paperwork that goes with making an arrest may take more time and work than the solving of a crime by investigators and making the arrests.

And just who uses and sells drugs here in Eastland County? According to arrest reports it is both men and women with ages ranging from their teens to over fifty years of age. And their economic background seems to range from poor to wealthy. And yes, officers say that drugs are sometimes even sold to students in some of

our local schools.

But the big question that Sheriff Dee Hogan and your local law enforcement officers want to know is, do you really care? Do you care enough to help your law enforcement officers defeat the drug problem in your community?

Sheriff Hogan is trying to do something about this problem and he has concluded that Eastland County people will have to "clean our own house." The Interregional Crime Task Force which Eastland County has supported is trying, but it is too undermanned and underfunded to be of any substantial help in solving the local problem. They just have to cover too many counties and large cities.

United States Senator Phil Gramm has also indicated an interest in Eastland County and in helping to solve the drug problem here. And Senator Gramm, probably the only U.S. Senator to make a public visit to Eastland County in modern times, has scheduled a third visit to the county on Wednesday, June 28.

District Judge Jim Wright has made the District Courtroom in the Courthouse in Eastland available for a public meeting that is being or-

ganized by Sheriff Hogan. The time, which is subject to change, has been set at 2:30 p.m.

The purpose of the meeting is to find a better way to attack the local drug problem. There will be a discussion with opportunities for questions to be asked and for suggestions and ideas to be presented. Both Senator Gramm and Crime Task Force Commander Frank Cleveland are scheduled for time on the program. And some local people may also have a part.

The best method of attack may be a local drug task force, but training and salaries for officers as well as expenses are problem if the force is to be adequate to be able to discourage big city drug opera-

tions from moving into the county.

Senator Gramm might be able to help us acquire some federal matching funds to help with the financial problems, but help will only be possible if you the citizens, voters, and taxpayers of Eastland County, show that you really care.

Sheriff Hogan says that about eight percent of the crime in the county is drug related. It seems that most of the burglaries, and most of the theft, is to acquire money to buy drugs and to maintain a drug habit. Sheriff Hogan says that weekly drug sales in the county are in the tens of thousands of dollars.

Are you satisfied with the present situation where your child or grandchild, or brother

or sister, may become a drug addict, and where burglary of your home and car may become routine. Some people in the county are making thousands of dollars, or more, from the drug trade and they can afford to spend part of their large incomes to make

Eastland County safer for criminals. And wealthy addicts may fight to keep their supply of drugs coming.

Are you willing to take a stand against illegal drugs in Eastland County? Will you come to the meeting at the Courthouse and let Senator Gramm know that you care?
