## Cisco Police To Have K-9 Drug Dog Before Summer Ends

Cisco Masonic Lodge AF & AM #556, gave a check for \$127.00 to be used for the Cisco Police K-9 Drug Dog fund, last week. Mr. Gene Childers, Worshipful Master for the coming year, presented the check to Cisco Mayor Joe Wheatley.

The money was made up of contributions given by the members of the Cisco Masonic Lodge. Mr. Childers said that he and the lodge are thrilled to do this for the city to help combat the drug problem that has plagued the city of Cisco.

Cisco Chief of Police, Billy Rains, said the drug dog will be in operation here in Cisco by the second week of August. He said they sent off

the first payment for the K-9. The dog, that will be used in Cisco, is already in training at the Sentry Place, Inc., an academy for dogs and people. The academy's specialty is in narcotics detection.

Owner of Sentry Place Inc., Nancy Bidwell, was in Cisco last April, with one of their dogs, "Luke." Training director of Sentry Place, Inc., Freddie Bouillion, took "Luke" through several steps of finding hidden stash.

Cisco police officers Donald Wiley and Larry Weikel, will go to Sentry Place during the last week of training, to show the correct way in handling a narcotics K-9 dog. And the animal will be working in Cisco streets

during the second week of August, according to Rains. He said there will still a balance of \$1,154.00, for the cost of the animal, but the C.I.S.D., will be helping with the cost of the animal so it can be used at the Cisco schools.

The dog will be a deterrent to the drug crime in Cisco, according to Chief Rains. If the animal reacts to the smell of narcotics, then this is cause for search, and when drugs are found, arrests will be made. Drug traffic will slow down, or even stop altogether with the help of the K-9 drug dog on patrol, he added.

## Jail Contracts To Be Reconsider

After lengthy discussions Monday Eastland County Commissioners voted 3-1 that jail contracts between the County and cities will become null and void July 24. Billy Bacon, Comm. of Pct. 4, made the motion, and Richard Robinson, Comm. of Pct. 1, gave the dissenting vote.

The vote came after a sometimes heated discussion between the Commissioners and Cisco, Eastland and Gorman representatives about when a city prisoner becomes a county prisoner.

Chief of Police Cecil Funderburg of Gorman stated: "We're not unhappy with our contract, but there has been some misunderstanding of the terms. The Sheriff (Hogan) is trying to set up a computer system, and it would probably be easier if everyone has the same contract." He noted that each city in the county had different wording in its agreement.

The city representatives said they had been meeting and had come up with a contract that was basically the same as the one with the City of Gorman.

Billy Bacon did not agree. He said their suggested contract put too much liability on the County. He pointed out that the contract with Rising Star was the best one for the whole county, and that the Texas State Jail Standards people approved it.

L.T. Owens, Comm. of Pct. 3 (Rising Star) offered to lend the City representatives a copy to study.

Mike Moore, Cisco City Manager, said the county's responsibility should begin when a prisoner is "booked" instead of when charges are

filed. Eastland Chief of Police Lyndall Underwood stated agreement on this matter.

"It has been a policy not to file charges until lab reports are here. Awaiting lab results can be 2-4 weeks on blood tests."

Moore said District Attorney Emory Walton won't prepare charges until lab results from drug and alcohol testing are known.

"Arresting officers would do a field test on the site, charges could be filed immediately," Walton replied. "Some officers are not qualified to do a field test or they don't want to do one."

"Bookings have been a sore spot with the cities for years," Comm. Robinson said. "I don't know why we can't resolve this."

"We can sit here and squabble until Christmas and still not agree," Billy Bacon said.

The Commissioners did agree that the county should have the same contract with each town. They also stated that medical and other liability problems of the prisoners needed to be clarified in the contracts.

The Court then recommended that a negotiating committee be set up to work on a standard contract for all the cities.

This Committee will consist of city representatives and lawmen, and the contract will be worded by District Attorney Emory Walton with possible assistance. Then the Commissioners can accept or reject the new standard contract.

L.T. Owen, Comm. of Pct. 3, made the motion that no

member of the court be on the negotiating committee. This motion carried unanimously.

In other matters, the Commissioners amended the Jail Budget in the amount of \$11,000 from the General Fund to continue operations through the fiscal year ending Oct. 1. This deficit was reported to be the result of an \$18,577 medical bill carried over from the previous year.

Billy Bacon reported 19 prisoners currently in the county jail, and that the facility was well-kept.

The Commissioners also heard a report from Sgt. Jerry Mathews on the new DPS Breatherizer equipment and its use in Eastland County.

The John William Butts Post of the American Legion will have a Flag raising ceremony at 9:45 a.m., Tuesday, July 4, at the City Park on Royal Lane. This will be the start of a day to celebrate America's birthday and will be a day of fun for everyone.

Wendy Wester will sing "America" during the ceremony.

Everyone is encouraged to attend the patriotic flag raising ceremony, to honor the symbol of the men and women who fought for freedom of the United States of America. It will be especially important to honor the flag in the shadow of the recent decision of the Supreme Court that declared that to deface the American Flag is considered a method of free speech.

## Fourth Of July Promises To Be Day Of Fun For Everyone

The 1989 Fourth of July celebration to be held Tuesday at City Park, Royal Lane, will be an entertaining program with everything from a beauty contest, carnival and possibly a big fireworks spectacular.

The flag raising ceremony, under the direction of the John William Butts Post of the American Legion, will open the day activities at 9:45 a.m. Assorted contests including swimming, horse shoe toss, and

dominoes, will be held from 10-11 a.m. at the park.

Lions Club's assorted carnival booths will open at 11 a.m., at the park, with the Coke ring, balloon darts, baseball throw and others. The Lions Club barbecue stand will operate most of the day offering some of the "world's finest cooking" to the public.

Afternoon games and contests with the egg toss, baseball throw, sack race, and three legged race will

begin at 2:00 p.m. The Y.E.S. kids from Cisco Junior College will be in charge of the games.

## Commissioners Call Meeting Friday To Deal With August 12 Referendum

Eastland County Commissioners decided Monday to have a called meeting Friday, June 30 to vote again on an election to decide whether to issue bonds for \$650,000 to purchase land for a proposed prison site. The Commissioners had voted on June 12 to call a referendum for this purpose on Aug. 12.

The action on a called meeting came after a discussion with Dr. Charles Barnes, project manager for a group of people attempting to have a state prison located in Eastland County.

Barnes first asked the Court to rescind the June 12 decision to have a public referendum, and then said the action probably wasn't legal anyway. The matter was not listed on the June 12 Court agenda,

he noted.

County Judge Scott Bailey said that District Attorney Emory Walton had advised that the action would be "voidable" if anyone questioned it. The Commissioners then decided to call a special meeting to deal with the election matter.

Barnes listed a number of objections to a public vote on the county underwriting the cost of a prison site. He said a proposal to hold an election was inappropriate for a number of reasons, including that other counties were being supported by their County Commissioners in a request for a prison without holding an election.

Eastland was about the only County he knew of which had voted to hold such an election, Barnes said.

"Our citizens are for the prison and the miniscule tax to finance the land," the retired Colonel declared. He stated that no opposition (he knew of) had appeared at any of the Commissioners Court meetings.

He did admit there were probably a few citizens "against a prison, against a tax, against anything that would make our county go forward."

"We believe we can win an election," he declared. "We will work hard to be absolutely certain that we will win."

But he thought that the time of the County Economic group would be better spent trying to convince the TDC to locate a prison in Eastland.

County, Barnes told the Commissioners.

Cisco Chamber of Commerce Manager Don Shepard also spoke to the Commissioners, indicating that he agreed with Dr. Barnes' statements against having an election. Shepard said a number of people had asked him: "What are they (the Commissioners) doing with a tax election?"

"That's the way they are coming to me," Shepard added. "These people want a prison, but don't want taxes."

"How can the County pay (the money back) without more taxes?" asked Norman Christian, Comm. of Pct. 2.

"If you have fund-raisers you can get it," Shepard said. He indicated there might be "some notes on the tail-end of the thing" that the county

the Commissioner said. He said he would like to let the matter stand as it was voted last time. A number of citizens in Pct. 4 had called him in support of a County vote on the prison matter, Bacon said.

Richard Robinson, Comm. of Pct. 1, also indicated that a number of people supported a public vote on prison site financing.

Both Don Shepard and Dr. Barnes indicated they would meet again with the Commissioners on Friday morning, would have to pay, but said that within three years the counties income would have increased tremendously.

Shepard indicated there were people who seemed anxious to give to the prison project. If the county held a vote, however, the attitude of the people who wanted to contribute might change, he said.

**New Bill To Help Rural Texans**

A comprehensive health care bill designed to address a desperate situation in the state's rural areas has won overwhelming approval from the Texas Senate.

House Bill 18, sponsored in the Senate by Sen. Chet Brooks and myself, contains a number of important measures stemming from a study by the Special Task Force on Rural Health Care Delivery that was created in June 1987. The study concluded that health care in Texas is in crisis and the situation is getting worse.

Senate Bill 1107, another rural health initiative was included under HB 18.

Inclusion of the SB 1107 provision means that physicians and hospitals can obtain enhanced Medicare and Medicaid reimbursement by taking advantage of the federal Rural Health Clinic Services Act passed by U.S. Sen. Lloyd Bentsen.

**Drug Abuse Has Increased In Rural Texas**

U.S. Senator Lloyd Bentsen has said that crack cocaine abuse has spread in recent months from the large population centers of Texas to smaller cities and rural areas.

Bentsen released internal memos from the Drug Enforcement Administration which were prepared for congressional committees but never utilized. He said they indicate the growing drug abuse problem in rural Texas is cause for serious concern.

Bentsen said the memos "showed that there was an enormous spread in the use of crack cocaine from the urban areas into the rural areas."

"It goes across the social strata. In some areas it will be centered in the black community; in other areas it will be among young professionals. They sell it in crack houses. They sell it on the curb. They sell it in the parks. They sell it near small colleges," Bentsen said.

"So far we haven't had an overall strategy by the Drug Enforcement Administration on trying to control it in these rural areas because it is somewhat diffused and somewhat scattered," Bentsen said.

"But you can see the intensity of it and it's increasing. It's not just in Texas, it's in rural areas across America," Bentsen said.

"This is an extremely serious drug and most addictive. We have to face up to this and have to take it head on," Bentsen said. "And I'm going to do that."

## Fishing Outdoors

### Lake Leon Tournament July 2, 1989

Area lakes are starting to calm down from our recent rains and the fishing is settling too.

Lake Cisco's black bass fishing has probably grabbed the lime light from others; with the sheer fact that anglers can now catch blacks from some green cover. Black jigs and black and white worms plus spinner baits seem to be the top baits. Some nice catches to 5 pounds have been reported.

Leon's black bass have slowed a little for most anglers who are still probing the new vegetation. The best catches I have heard of all coming on baits worked in 6-8 feet of water. Worms, spinners, and running baits in shad patterns and doing the best.

And just in time for the good catches at Leon, The Eastland County Bass Club will be sponsoring an Open Jackpot event at Lake Leon. Headquarters will be at the state ramp at Chock-O-Block. All contestants must be registered prior to 6:00 a.m. The date will be Sunday, July 2, 1989. For more information you may contact me at 629-3255. The paycheck will be based on the number of entries so tell all your friends and come fish the "Land of

### the Lunkers" Lake Leon.

July 6th will be the next E.C.B.C. Club meeting. Members of the board of directors are requested to arrive at 7:00 p.m. The regular meeting will begin at 7:30 p.m. All members are urged to attend for discussion concerning the September Invitational. And of course if you have a lake you want to fish in July you should contact your club director prior to this date. Also there should be some more excellent entertainment this month.

Summertime bassin for some reason has for years suggested to anglers that you have to fish deep water. Of course everyone has their own idea as to how deep is deep. Most consider anything past 10 feet deep water in our area.

One little trick I like to use during the summer is to find the murkiest water on the lake. This gives me a double edge. First the off colored water will minimize the amount of light penetration entering the water. Secondly the dingy water will probably have fish that are not as spooky. Both these reasons allow me to hunt for those lunkers in shallow water.

Another item I like to try in the summer is to fish anywhere the wind is blowing into shallow cover. This item,

even in clearer water gives us 3 advantages. The wind will draw the bait fish in to feed on zooplankton stirred by the wave action. Also the wave action will cut down light penetration thus allowing the fish a better comfort zone shallow. And the waves of course help raise the water's oxygen level. An item that is very important in the hot summertime.

Summers here it can get hot out there on the water, be sure to carry plenty of fluids along. And don't forget those fish will eat at dark also. Plus you can beat the heat a little. Till next week keep only what you can use and release the rest, they are the future.

## Should You Pay \$18 To Get Your Social Security Application Processed?

Second, you may actually lose money and delay the processing of your claim by sending your application to a private company. Social Security applications are not officially filed until they're actually received in a Social Security office.

The representatives in any Social Security office will provide free all of the service you need to file your claim for benefits, including:

## Texas Drivers Challenged To Keep Traffic Deaths Down Over 4th Of July

AUSTIN-The Director of the Department of Public Safety has challenged Texas drivers to show that the DPS traffic death estimate for the long July 4th period is far too high.

"The DPS Statistical Services bureau has indicated that as many as 52 persons could be killed on Texas roadways during these hours," Colonel Joe Milner said. "But the number will be lower if more drivers will slow down, avoid drinking alcohol and use a well-known safety precautions—seat belts."

Col. Milner mentioned that the July 4th period will include the weekend before Independence Day.

"The DPS Public Information Office will conduct the traffic fatality count for 102 hours, beginning at 6 p.m. Friday, June 30 and continuing until midnight on Tues-

day, July 4th," he said. "As before, we'll be keeping this count with the assistance of local enforcement agencies along with DPS troopers and communications personnel."

The final count for the 1988 July 4th period, which was 78 hours in length, totaled 32 fatalities.

Col. Milner said as part of his agency's "Operation

Holiday," additional troopers will be deployed to help minimize the risk of driving on all roadways in rural areas.

Traffic fatality totals for Texas will be tabulated and released three times daily from the DPS, at 10 a.m., 3 p.m. and 8 p.m. The first report will be made at 10 a.m. on Saturday, July 1.

## Gordon Spot

The 68th Annual Conference of the Texas Pecan Growers Association is scheduled for July 23-26, 1989, at the San Antonio Convention Center. Eastland County pecan growers will find several presentations of vital importance. A panel of pecan specialists from throughout the state will discuss how to increase profit potential in pecan production Monday. They will hear about the new Pecan Promotion and Research Act which is now before the United States Senate.

Tuesday and Wednesday will deal with a variety of topics. Water management and the potential for a new grading program to enhance pecans in the marketplace are

just two of the items scheduled. Registration begins on Sunday afternoon, July 23 at the San Antonio Convention Center. Anyone who would like more information on the conference should contact us at the County Extension Office.

Thanks to the abundant rainfall in May and June, Eastland County forage producers are baling a lot of hay. There will be good demand for high quality hay, but poor quality hay may not be worth the baling.

How often have you heard it inferred that hay is high quality because it was fertilized or because it is clean and green. Although these de-

scriptions may indicate good quality hay, they do not guarantee it. There are too many other factors involved in baling hay.

Plant maturity has a major influence on the quality of baled hay as long as leaf is retained with baling. There is a rather simple principle of plant growth involved. When forage plants are young and actively growing, they are primarily leaves with few stems. As the plants get bigger and older, the amount of stem increases while the amount of leaf remains relatively constant. Thus, the percentage of leaves decreases while the percentage of stems increases. Since stems are higher in fiber and lower in protein and energy than leaves, they are lower quality forage. As stem percentages increase, quality decreases in the resulting hay.

All grasses and legumes will be high in protein and digestibility until seedheads begin to form. At that point, the plant quits making new leaves and begins a fiber buildup which reduces both digestibility and percent of crude protein.

For example, studies have shown that coastal bermuda cut at a three-week interval produced 9.7 tons of hay per acre with 19 percent crude protein and 86 percent leaves. At the same time, coastal bermuda cut every 12 weeks yielded 11.6 tons per acre but crude protein dropped to 9.7 percent and leaf percentage declined to 51 percent.

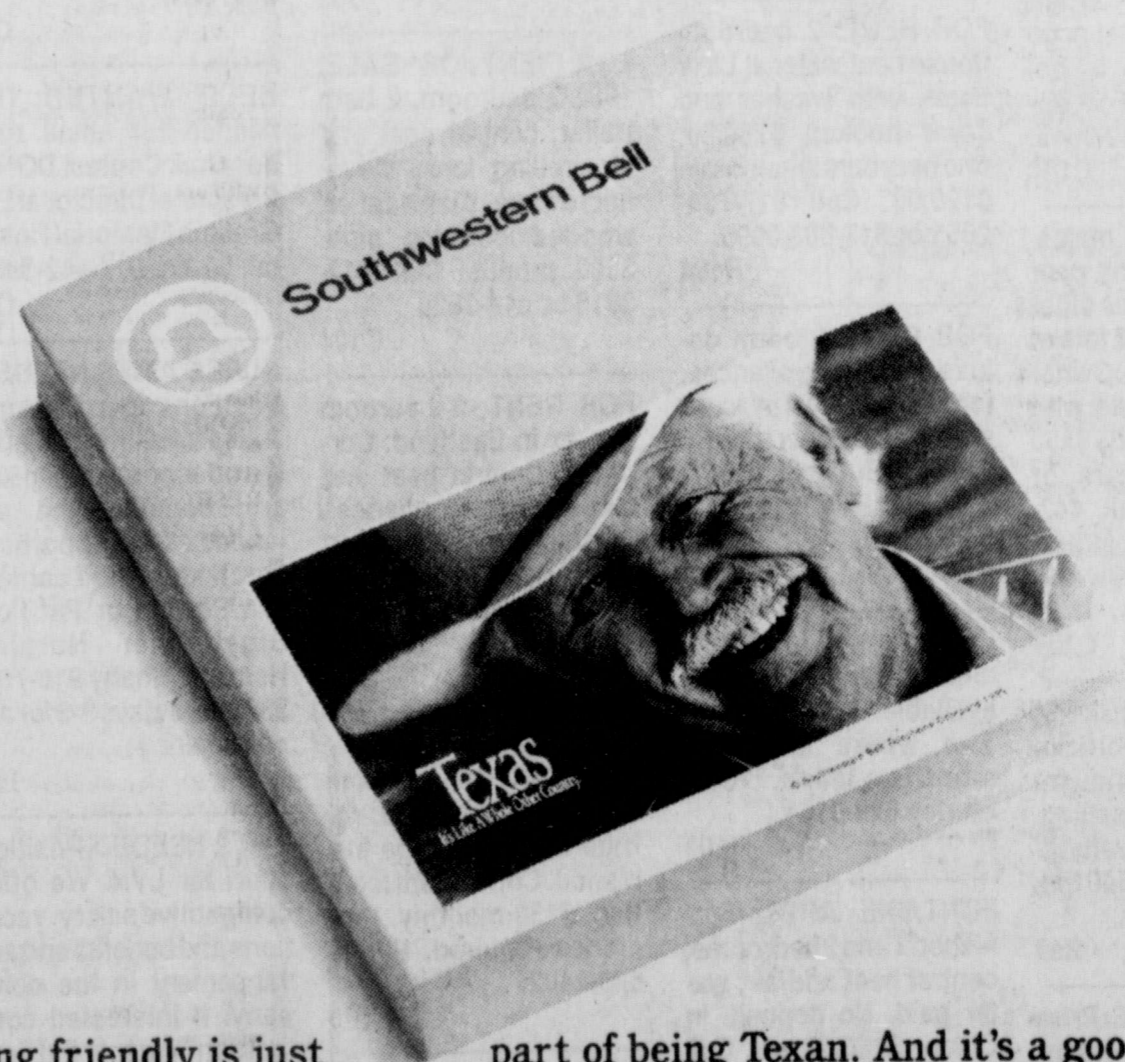

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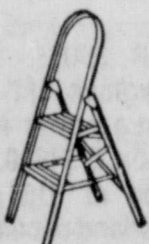

## Some Thoughts On The Hoos-Gow Project

An informed citizenry results in knowledgeable and responsible votes on issues which confront our society. To date, all information concerning the Hoos-gow project has been in the form of generalities rather than specifics. As tax burdened residents of Eastland County are prudently wary of buying "a pig in a poke," and justifiably so, perhaps more specific information might bring more support for this project.

1. What expenses does the projected sum of one million dollar cost to the tax-payers cover? Just the purchase of land for the project? Will the State then purchase this land from Eastland County, or will it lease the land? Or is this a tax-payer provided bonus to the State for locating a prison on said land?

2. Will the cost of providing utility lines, water and sewer lines to the area be borne by the State or by the Eastland County residents? If the latter, is this expense covered by the estimated one million dollar cost of obtaining the project?

3. Project advocates list increased employment possibilities for local residents if the State selects Eastland

County for a prison site. Will these job opportunities exist only during the construction of the prison? How many job opportunities will there be once the prison is completed and in operation? Some of the advocates assure us that the presence of a prison facility will increase the need for businesses. Specifically, what types of businesses would a prison unit utilize locally?

4. As there are so many towns competing for the location of a prison in their neighborhood, what happens if Eastland County is not selected? How much of this million dollar cost will be used in the efforts to obtain this prison site?

5. Essentially, what if the estimated amount of return on this investment, and how soon will investors (Eastland County tax-payers) benefit from these returns? Will the location of a prison in Eastland County benefit our financially strapped hospitals either by usage of same by employees and inmates of the prison or an increase in the county tax roll?

Efforts by the proponents of the Hoos-gow project to arouse enthusiasm among the voters are acceptable as long as the end justifies the means.

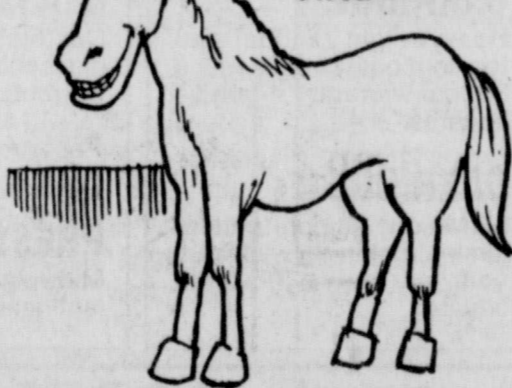

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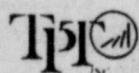
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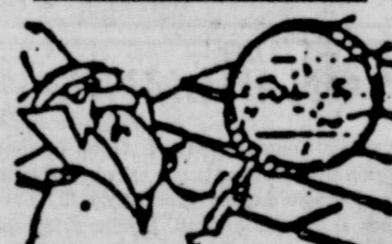

# Fireworks Are Dangerous

An average of 10,525 fireworks-related injuries per year were treated in hospital emergency rooms nationwide during the period 1985-1988, according to the United States Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC). The number of injuries reported in this manner has doubled since 1974, when 5,000 injuries occurred.

In 1988, almost 50 percent of the reported injuries happened to youngsters under 15 years of age. Half of the reported injuries consisted of burns, according to CPSC. These statistics do not include the number of injuries which were not treated or those which may have been

treated in doctors' offices. The careless use of fireworks results in a significant amount of fire damage each year as well.

For instance, in 1987, the fire departments in Texas reported 621 fireworks-related fires to the State Board of Insurance, State Fire Marshal's Office through the Texas Fire Incident Reporting System (TEXFIRS).

These fires resulted in about \$662,652 in property damage. Currently, about 321 fire departments protecting more than 70 percent of the state population submit data to the TEFIRS.

The State Fire Marshal's Office, a division of the State

Board of Insurance, is responsible for the licensing and regulation of the manufacturing, sale and storage of fireworks in Texas.

Paul T. Wrotenbery, Chairman of the State Board of Insurance, joins State Fire Marshal Ernest A. Emerson in offering the following major rules for a safer Fourth of July:

- Many towns and communities have ordinances that regulate the possession and use of fireworks. If you aren't certain about laws affecting fireworks in your area, contact your local fire protection or law enforcement authorities for information.

- Use only fireworks which are legal for sale or use. Federal law bans fireworks that contain more than 50 milligrams of explosive charge.

- Designate a responsible adult to ignite fireworks. Never give fireworks to children. Most fireworks injuries are caused by misuse, and mainly by children under 15.

- Read the instructions. If you don't understand the instructions, don't take a chance by lighting the fireworks.

- Never experiment with fireworks. Don't take fireworks apart or mix anything with the contents. Never make fireworks at home.

- Ignite outdoors. Light fireworks only in a clear area away from houses and flammable materials (dry brush, gasoline cans, etc.).

- Allow enough room for proper functioning. Never ignite fireworks in glass or other containers.

- Keep a safe distance away from the fireworks ignition area and be sure that other potentially dangerous objects are out of range before lighting fireworks.

- Never handle fireworks that have malfunctioned. Do not try to relight them or pick them up. Douse them with water instead.

It is vital that parents enforce these rules for the sake of the health and lives of youngsters, because it's the young people who are most often the victims of accidents involving fireworks.

# Beware Of Counterfeit Manufacturers' Coupons

On June 21, 1989, a Federal Grand Jury at Lubbock, handed down a twenty-four county indictment charging ten individuals with mail fraud and/or conspiracy to commit mail fraud. This multi-state conspiracy involved the counterfeiting of manufacturers' rebates and coupons in San Antonio, Tx, and the sale of same in the States of California, Michigan, Arkansas, Tennessee, Pennsylvania, Florida, and Texas. Those individual in-

The scheme was the handy work of David George Rackmill dba C&D, 281 Judge Ely Blvd., Suite 7000, Abilene, TX 79601. It involved 90 different coupons valued between \$1 and \$10.98 each, issued by 47 separate

manufacturers. Over 600,000 coupons were counterfeited, with a potential loss of over \$2,000,000.00. A spokesperson from the Coupon Information Center (an organization of the 13 largest companies using coupons) stated that this scheme impacts the public since manufacturers pass these additional costs on to the consumer via higher prices. David Rackmill was advertising the sale of these manufacturers' coupons in this monthly business flyers which he mailed to over 600 people nationwide. These coupons would then be sold, traded or redeemed for food, health, and household products. Assistant U.S. Attorney Steven Sucsy, Lubbock, TX, who is handling the case, stated that the scheme has been in effect since June, 1988.

On June 8, 1989, six search warrants, and two consent searches were executed by Postal Inspectors in the above-mentioned states, and evidence was seized relating to this nationwide scheme to



with almost no dissent, is expected to be signed by Gov. Bill Clements sometime this week. It will take effect Sept. 1.

The law, modeled on one passed last year by West Virginia, is simple. It states that 16 and 17-year-olds must stay in school or lose their driver's licenses.

The U.S. Department of Education ranks Texas low among states in keeping teenagers in the classroom. The department says 35 percent of Texas students quit school before graduation.

Cisco, like other school districts, has a major problem with dropouts.

Under the new law teenagers will have to show proof of school attendance when they apply for a driver's license at age 16 or 17. The law requires them to furnish a card from their school district showing they were in class at least 80 days the preceding semester.

A student will also be able

to meet the requirement by showing a high school diploma or documentation of enrollment in high school equivalency classes.

Licenses for those under 18 are good for only one year and must be renewed. So any student who drops out of school after getting a license will not be able to get it renewed unless he or she returns to school.

The law offers exemptions for cases of economic hardship.

These Wilson, the administrator who oversees West Virginia's dropout-reduction effort, said the law brought 1,800 dropouts back

into the state's public schools. She said it has reduced West Virginia's annual dropout level of about 5,000 students by 20 to 30 percent.

State Rep. Bill Hammond (R-Dallas), who sponsored the bill, said, "When you're 16 years old, being able to drive is one of the most important things in your life. This is not a foolproof solution but is a way of telling these kids that the place they belong is in school. I think we will see immediate results."

## Social Security Administration Conducts Most Interviews By Appointment Only

The Social Security Administration has been conducting most interview by appointment for over a year. Glyn Hammons, District Manager in Abilene, says the Abilene office policy has been to try to handle all drop in traffic along with the appointments. This is no longer possible. Beginning Monday, June 26, 1989, the Abilene Social Security office will operate by appointment only for seated interviews.

Applications for Social Security numbers, changes of address, general inquiries, and other items that can be handled at the front desk without a seated interview will still be done without an appointment. Provisions will also be made for a few special emergency

situations, but in every other case, an appointment will be required.

This should present no problem if everyone will telephone before coming to the office. In Abilene, you can call 698-1360. For other Big Country residents, you can call toll free by dialing 1-800-234-5772.

In most cases, your business can be handled entirely by telephone and mail without a visit to the office. If a trip to the Abilene office is needed, an appointment will be scheduled as soon as possible, usually within one to two weeks.

On Wednesday, June 21, they left for Lyon, traveling across central France and the lovely Burgundy coun-

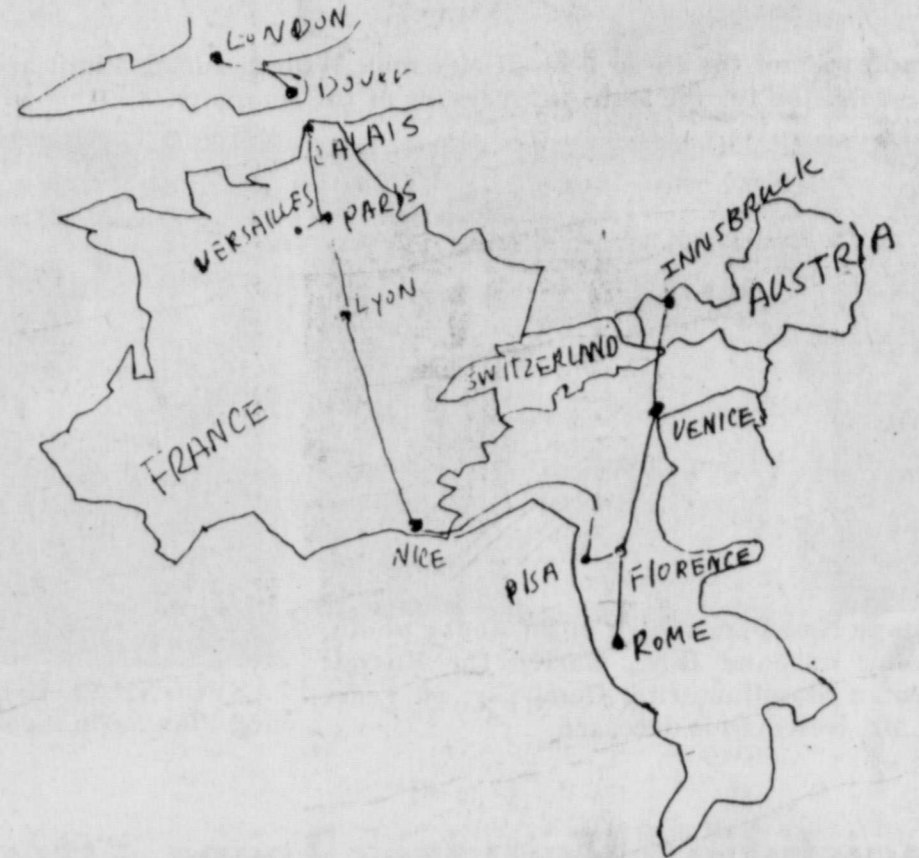

## Hunters Education Course To Be Offered In July

Any hunter whose birth date is on or after Sept. 2, 1971, must complete a hunter education course sponsored by Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. To be certified, a person must be 12 years old. Children may take the course at a younger age but cannot be certified until age 12.

Effective Sept. 1, 1989, hunters whose date of birth is during the period Sept. 2, 1971, through August 31, 1973, must have successfully completed this course to hunt in Texas.

The Parks and Wildlife Department is implementing this program through a five year period of time. Effective Sept. 1, 1993, all hunters who are at least 12 years of age and whose date of birth is on or after Sept. 2, 1971, must have successfully completed this course to hunt in Texas.

To hunt in the State of Texas, effective Sept. 1, 1989, hunters whose date of birth is during the period Sept. 2, 1971, through August 31, 1973, must have successfully completed the course.

This course will be offered the end of July. Dates have not been set. Anyone interested in the course should contact Gordon Strawn, 442-2010, or Tommie Lee, 442-1405.
