All of these "firsts, mosts and bests" boil down to the assets, profits and dividends of American corporations. Those corporations are the legal property of more than 25 million American shareholders, the optimistic men and women who dare to see opportunity.

As Holloway says, "Why would anyone not want to invest in such an economy?"

In other matters, according to the May, 1989, financial report, the City of Cisco is ahead of the projected budget of collected delinquent taxes, according to Mike Moore, city manager. Moore said 83 percent of

the delinquent taxes have been collected. He said 96 percent of the tax attorney fees have also been collected. Moore said there was a substantial drop in the sales

tax rebate for Cisco. As of May, 66 percent of the fiscal year was completed. The city has received only 58 percent of the budgeted amount of sales tax rebate in May. The total amount of revenue for the City of Cisco

was 70 percent of the fiscal year total. Only 62 percent of

the budgeted expenditures had been spent, as of May Moore said. A discussion was held by Moore and council members concerning two proposals from Bio-Med Disposal out of Abilene, on collection of

waste. Moore said one proposal was for the city to collect the waste and have it ready for a transfer to a location near Abilene. The other proposal was for Bio-Med Disposal to collect the waste and transfer it out to their landfill Moore said the city will need to find a suitable method of refuse collection.

He said as of August 31, 1989, there will not be any brush burning allowed at city landfills. He said as of October 1, 1990, every landfill will be required to have a 30-year contract, with yearly drilling to make sure the landfill is in compliance with state regulations.

Moore said the cost of Bio-Med Disposal will be \$120,000 to \$140,000 a year. At the present time the city pays \$116,000 a year, working the landfill and collecting waste. Moore said the city will have (Continued On Next Page)

No Bond Election On August 12

There will be no bond election on August 12.

At presstime Friday Eastland County Commissioners voted to rescind a previously called election to allow the public to vote on the issuance of bonds for \$650,000 to purchase land for a prison facility.

They let stand a Resolution to support the location of a prison in the County. Among other things, The Resolution states: that: "Upon selection of a site by the TDC...the County of Eastland expresses

its intent to issue necessary certificates of obligation or other instruments of financing, whichever proves most adventageous to the county fund the purchase of land for the facility."

Another motion offered Friday by Comm. Billy Bacon was defeated. It called for a referendum election in July to determine whether people in the county supported the location of a prison here. The vote on this was Bacon yes, L.T. Owen and Norman Christian no, and

Richard Robinson abstaining. About 100 citizens attended the 2-hr. meeting, including Dr. Charles Barnes, other County Economic Development people and other supporters of a prison

location here. Several people did speak against it, however. Most members of the County Economic Development group appeard to object strongly to any type of County vote on the prison issue, saying there was not time now and the election was not nec-



Gordon Spot

By DeMarquis Gordon, County Agent—

This is the time of year when all plants come under all kinds of pressures from insects and diseases. The large number of telephone calls we receive each day is evident that there are lots of problems caused by both insects and disease. The warm, humid weather is ideal for plant disease development and insects are always a problem in the summer.

If you plant squash, you can be sure you will have bugs. Squash bugs are large bugs that suck juices from the leaves and stems of squash, pumpkins, melons, and related plants. Their feeding causes wilting, and in severe infestations leaves will turn brown and fall off. They are very difficult to control especially if control measures begin when the insects reach a mature stage. For control to be satisfactory, apply insecticides such as Sevin or Thiodan early while the insects are small. This should be repeated every week and if infestation is heavy, every five

ough with complete coverage. When utilizing these insecticides, the materials must come in contact with the insects to be effective. Apply the chemicals to the base of the plant, underneath the foliage and in some cases underneath the stems of the plants for satisfactory control. If you use Sevin dust, use the 10% rather than the 5% dust. Some people tell me they get better results using the sprays. You can mix Sevin spray by adding nine teaspoons of 50% wettable powder per gallon of water or six teaspoons of 25% liquid per gallon of water. The 24% liquid Thiodan may be mixed at the rate of nine teaspoons per gallon of water. Be sure to read and follow label directions on any insecticides used.

Look Before You Leap When Diving, Warn **Texas Head Injury Experts**

Use your feet instead of your head while swimming and diving this summer.

Strange as it sounds, that's the advice of experts with the New Medico Head Injury System in Texas, who hope to lessen the number of serious injuries that occur every year as the result of diving accidents.

According to the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission's latest data, each year some 2,924 people suffer serious injuries from diving accidents. Ninety-five percent of these accidents took place in five feet of water or less. The injuries occurred when people struck their heads on something while diving, or jumped headfirst into water that was

Everyone watching the Olympics remembers when gold medalist Greg Louganis smacked his head against the diving board during the summer games," said Dr. Arthur Robarge, Clinical Director of the New Medico Rehabilitation Center in Lindale, Texas. "Fortunately, he wasn't seriously injured, but injuries like this can result in a host of lifetime difficulties.

The New Medico facility at Lindale specializes in the care and treatment of headinjured adults.

The 'old swimming hole' can be lots of fun," said Robarge, "but it can also be full of underwater hazards. Before diving into any body of water, whether it's a pool, lake, or river, first make sure it is deep enough. Then

explore it - actually swim around in it - to make absolutely certain that no rocks or tree stumps are in the vicinity. If they are, either mark them clearly or find a safer place to swim."

Keep in mind, said Robarge, that swimmers also need about 25 feet of clear water in front of them while diving. "If you're not sure what's beneath or in front of you, don't dive," he said.

Swimming pools, if they

are kept in good repair, are generally safer than the old swimming hole since swimmers don't have to worry about dangerous currents or unknown hazards beneath the surface of the water. But in-the-ground pools are safe for diving only if they have a separate, deeper diving area that is clearly marked. And people should never dive or slide headfirst into aboveground pools, because most of them have water depths of three to five feet, which is not deep enough for diving.

How deep should water be? "The diving area of swimming pools is usually 10 feet, which is deep enough for low diving, and that should be the minimum depth of any other places you dive," said Robarge. "Obviously, if kids are jumping from high places - such as out of a tree into a lake the water should be even deeper.'

Besides using caution around shallow water, New Medico also recommends that divers periodically check the condition of diving boards, ladders, slides and

Best means of control is to maintain a uniform supply of moisture through irrigation and use of soil mulches.

Another problem of tomatoes is being caused by Early Blight and Late Blight. These diseases cause dark brown spots of lower leaves. The spotted leaves will turn yellow and die prematurely. The fruit will soon begin to rot on the vines.

To treat tomato plants for these diseases, apply a spray of any one of the following fungicides: Kocide 101, Champion, Bravo, Daconil 2787, Captan, Benomyl or Dyrene. These sprays will not cure leaves already infected, but will protect healthy leaves from becoming infected. Therefore, the earlier you start, when symptoms appear, the better the control.





State Hunting and Fishing Limits Changed

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department has adopted several changes in fishing regulations for 1989-90, including new bag limits on striped bass in Lake Texoma, length limits on billfish and a five-per day limit on sharks in salt water. All changes will go into effect Sept. 1

The new bag limit for striped bass at Lake Texoma will allow anglers to retain only one striper over 20 inches in length per day as part of the 15-per-day limit for striped bass. Currently anglers may retain 20-inch plus stripers.

Also for 1989-90 hunters the Texas Parks and Wildlife commission, in a public meeting in Austin last week, reduced the white-tailed deer bag limit in some counties and authorized a longer spring turkey season for 1990.

The general white-tailed deer season was set for Nov. 4, 1989 through Jan. 7, 1990, in most of Texas.

The commission voted to reduce the deer bag limit in 26 counties to three deer (one buck and no more than two anterless). These counties are Anderson, Brazoria, Brazos, Callahan, Chambers, Eastland, Erath, Fort Bend, Freestone, Grayson (only on the Hagerman National Wild-

life Refuge), Grimes, Harris, Hood, Houston (except on the Davy Crockett National Forest), Jefferson, Leon, Limestone, Madison, Morris, Orange Palo Pinto, Robertson, Shackelford, Somervell, Stephens, and Throckmorton. These counties will remain under the either-sex system of bag limits, with no landowner-issued anterless permits required.




