## Council Votes On Dangerous Buildings At Meeting Tuesday

The City of Cisco approved a motion to delete two of the nine listings of structures that have been declared as dangerous and considered public nuisances. Two home owners, who had received a notice of the ordinance, attended the regular meeting of the Cisco City Council held last Tuesday at City Hall.

The two structures that were removed from the resolution were, a frame two story home owned by Bobbie Ann Wickham, and a brick commercial building owned by Jerry Jeffcoat. In January, 1990, the council will review another list of homes, and if the two buildings have not been repaired they will be placed on a new resolution.

One property owner attended the meeting wanting some information from the council as to what was going to be done to their home, that is on the list. Home owners will have 90 days from the

publishing of the resolution to either repair the structure, or to clear the property off. If the city has to clear the property off, then the home owner will be billed for the cost and if payment is not made, then the city will place a lien on the property.

In other matters, according to the May, 1989, financial report, the City of Cisco is ahead of the projected budget of collected delinquent taxes, according to Mike Moore, city manager.

Moore said 83 percent of the delinquent taxes have been collected. He said 96 percent of the tax attorney fees have also been collected.

Moore said there was a substantial drop in the sales tax rebate for Cisco. As of May, 66 percent of the fiscal year was completed. The city has received only 58 percent of the budgeted amount of sales tax rebate in May.

The total amount of revenue for the City of Cisco was 70 percent of the fiscal year total. Only 62 percent of the budgeted expenditures had been spent, as of May, Moore said.

A discussion was held by Moore and council members concerning two proposals from Bio-Med Disposal out of Abilene, on collection of waste. Moore said one proposal was for the city to collect the waste and have it ready for a transfer to a location near Abilene. The other proposal was for Bio-Med Disposal to collect the waste and transfer it out to their landfill.

Moore said the city will need to find a suitable method of refuse collection. He said as of August 31, 1989, there will not be any brush burning allowed at city landfills. He said as of October 1, 1990, every landfill will be required to have a 30-year contract, with yearly drilling to make sure the landfill is in compliance with state regulations.

Moore said the cost of Bio-Med Disposal will be \$120,000 to \$140,000 a year. At the present time the city pays \$116,000 a year, working the landfill and collecting waste. Moore said the city will have (Continued On Next Page)

The Cisco City Hall will be closed on Tuesday, July 4, 1989, for the observance of Independence Day. The landfill will be open on Tuesday, but there will be no trash pick-up. Tuesdays trash will be picked up on Wednesday, July 5, 1989. Everyone have a safe holiday.

## City Pool To Have July 4th Contests

The Cisco Swimming Pool will have their annual swimming, diving and splash contests on Tuesday, July 4, according to Shirley Darr, pool manager. The contests will begin at 10:00 a.m.

There will be age groups in each division of the contests. Winners will be awarded ribbons. The pool will be open from 1-6 p.m., on July 4, for splash day. Admission will be free for everyone.

## No Bond Election On August 12

There will be no bond election on August 12.

At presstime Friday Eastland County Commissioners voted to rescind a previously called election to allow the public to vote on the issuance of bonds for \$650,000 to purchase land for a prison facility.

They let stand a Resolution to support the location of a prison in the County. Among other things, The Resolution states: "Upon selection of a site by the TDC...the County of Eastland expresses

its intent to issue necessary certificates of obligation or other instruments of financing, whichever proves most advantageous to the county fund the purchase of land for the facility."

Another motion offered Friday by Comm. Billy Bacon was defeated. It called for a referendum election in July to determine whether people in the county supported the location of a prison here. The vote on this was Bacon yes, L.T. Owen and Norman Christian no, and

Richard Robinson abstaining.

About 100 citizens attended the 2-hr. meeting, including Dr. Charles Barnes, other County Economic Development people and other supporters of a prison location here. Several people did speak against it, however. Most members of the County Economic Development group appeared to object strongly to any type of County vote on the prison issue, saying there was not time now and the election was not necessary.

## Tom, Mary And Scott Enjoy CJC's 'Barefoot In The Park'

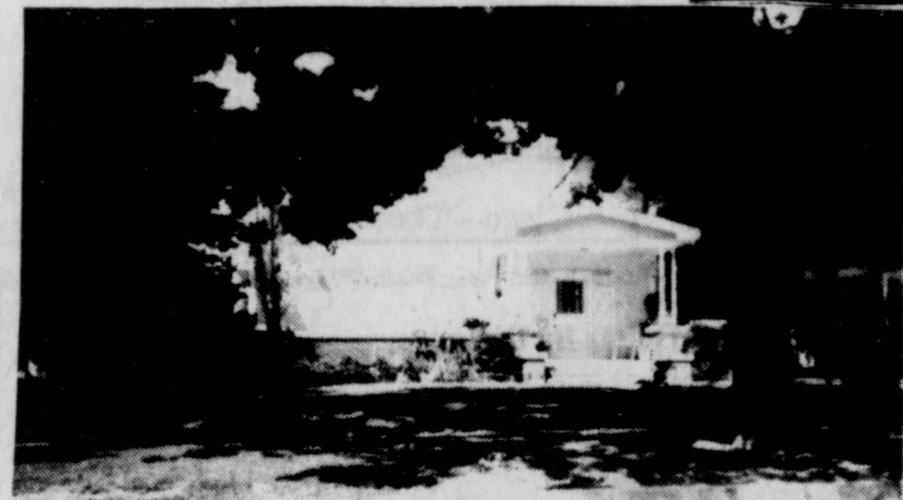

# Now Is the Time For Young People To "Plan" Finances

Summer signals a time of new jobs for many new graduates. It's a time when young adults enter the work force.

For the first time; there are bills to be paid, financial information to be deciphered, credit to contend with, bank accounts to open, savings to think about and purchases to be made—all with your own paycheck. Creating order from chaos is a challenge for many young adults, says Martha Alice Spraberry, Jones County Extension Agent.

The first rude awakening comes with the realization that your paycheck is smaller than you expected it to be. Why? Perhaps you forgot about the various deductions (taxes, insurance, retirement, or other payroll deductions). If you

based your financial plans on the whole picture instead of just your take-home pay, go back to the drawing board. Avoid becoming over-extended. Base your budget on your take-home pay.

Drawing-up a written budget is a good idea. Try to estimate how much your expenses will be.

First, make a list of all the main categories you'll be spending money for: rent, car payment, insurance, groceries, clothes, gasoline and utilities. Don't forget things like savings and loan payments, adds Spraberry.

If your outgo paper looks like it is going to exceed your take-home income, then you'll have to do some belt-tightening. Try reducing the amounts

to buy more land in the next few years for another landfill and this will be a substantial cost.

Moore said the company does not handle brush. He suggested that maybe the city could buy a chipper and run the branches and limbs through it to make mulch. He said there is always brush brought to the landfill.

Council members decided to table the matter until a later date. The city is also checking with another disposal company, B.F.Y.

City council members approved the nomination of

Cecil Brewer as alternate municipal court judge. Moore said Judge Doug Fry personally knows Mr. Brewer and is glad to be working with him. Mr. Brewer said he will be willing to come in to court during late night hours if necessary.

During the city manager's report, Moore told council members that at the present time, the city work crews are having to concentrate on mowing and drainage. He said there is a long list of weed and yard growth violators and the city is having trouble with mosquitoes. Moore said with the present

problems, the street seal coating will have to wait until a later date.

Moore told council members that both ambulances are here and ready to go. He said that one has to be certified in Abilene, and there just not been enough time to do that. Moore made the comment that the main problem now is the resignation of Marvin Cole, as administrator of E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital. He said that Cole had assured him that before he leaves the city will be given a budget for the ambulance service.

Moore said he received a letter from the West Central Texas Water District informing the city of Cisco that the method of monitoring the dam was acceptable. Moore said the monitoring will begin in August.

Moore told council members that reports have been called in that vandals have been on the dam. He said if anyone is found on the bridge of the dam, they will be fined. He said someone could get hurt so the city has to do something to prevent this.

Many areas of Sea World, including the Entrance Plaza

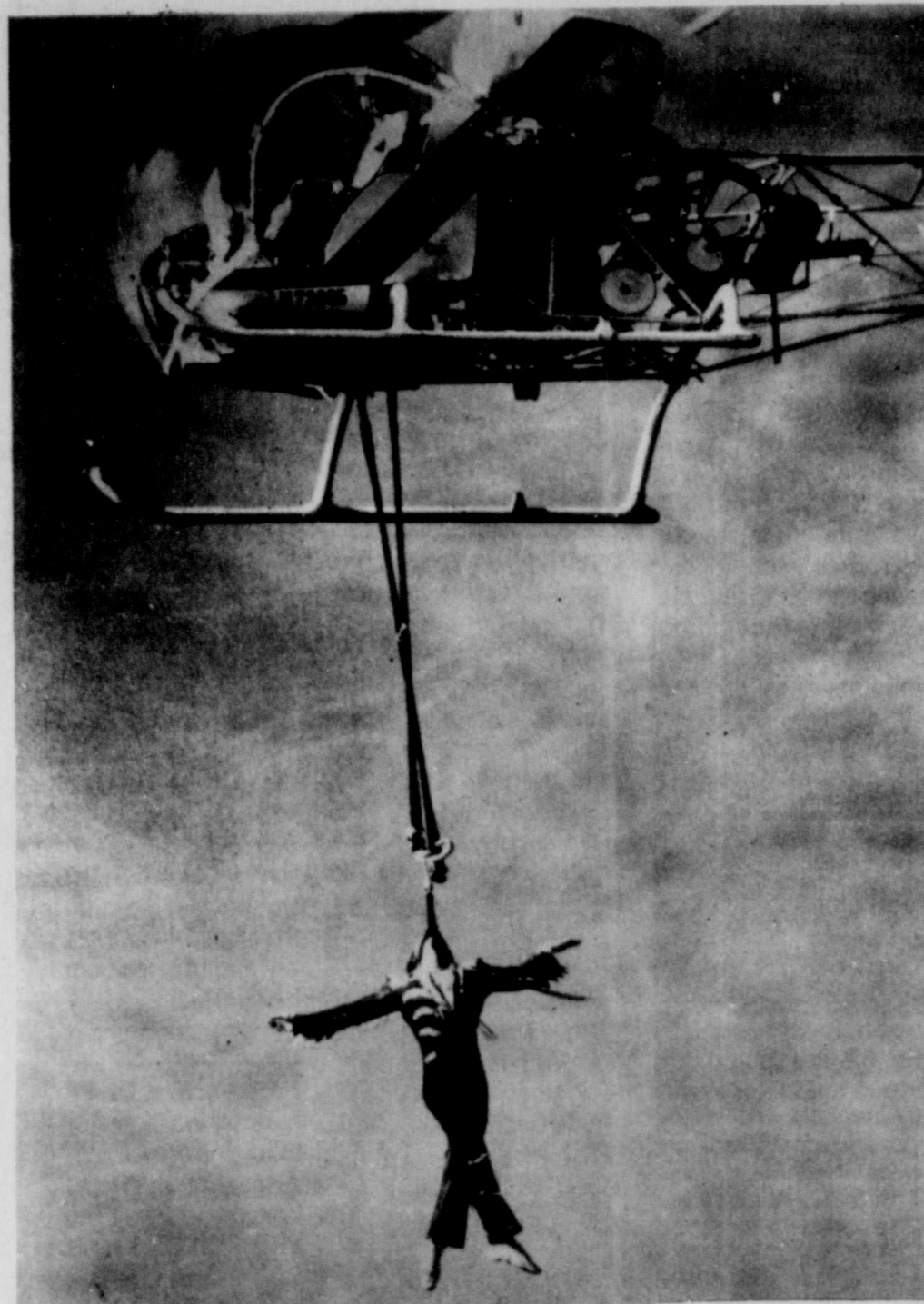
and parade route, will be decked out in red, white and blue decorations, and the strains of patriotic music will be heard throughout the park during the entire weekend.

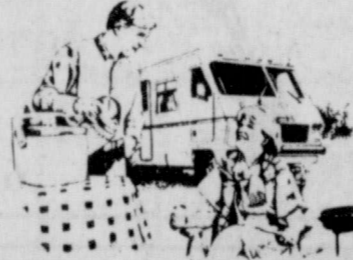

## Fishing Outdoors

By Terry L. Wilson

### State Hunting and Fishing Limits Changed

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department has adopted several changes in fishing regulations for 1989-90, including new bag limits on striped bass in Lake Texoma, length limits on billfish and a five-per day limit on sharks in salt water. All changes will go into effect Sept. 1.

The new bag limit for striped bass at Lake Texoma will allow anglers to retain only one striper over 20 inches in length per day as part of the 15-per-day limit for striped bass. Currently anglers may retain 20-inch plus stripers.

Also for 1989-90 hunters the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission, in a public meeting in Austin last week, reduced the white-tailed deer bag limit in some counties and authorized a longer spring turkey season for 1990.

The general white-tailed deer season was set for Nov. 4, 1989 through Jan. 7, 1990, in most of Texas.

The commission voted to reduce the deer bag limit in 26 counties to three deer (one buck and no more than two antlerless). These counties are Anderson, Brazoria, Brazos, Callahan, Chambers, Eastland, Erath, Fort Bend, Freestone, Grayson (only on the Hagerman National Wild-

life Refuge), Grimes, Harris, Hood, Houston (except on the Davy Crockett National Forest), Jefferson, Leon, Limestone, Madison, Morris, Orange Palo Pinto, Robertson, Shackelford, Somervell, Stephens, and Throckmorton. These counties will remain under the either-sex system of bag limits, with no landowner-issued antlerless permits required.

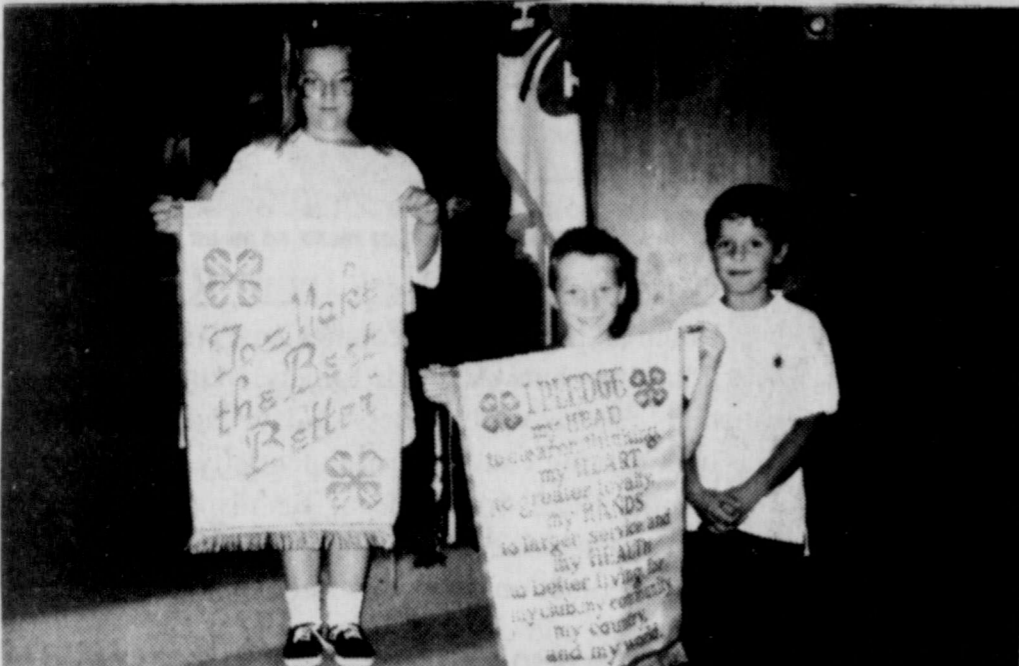

**RESOLUTION NO. R-1989-6-27**

**ARESDOLUTION OF THE CITY OF CISCO, TEXAS DECLARING CERTAIN IMPROVEMENTS DESCRIBED HEREIN AS DANGEROUS AND AS PUBLIC NUISANCES, AND REQUIRING THEIR DEMOLITION AND REMOVAL.**

WHEREAS, the City Building Inspector has determined that the improvements described below are unsafe and dangerous structures and should be abated through demolition and clearance from the premises; and

WHEREAS, the owners of the property whose names appear below in regards to the description of the various improvements have failed, neglected or refused to remove the improvements by demolition or to bring them into compliance with approved Building Codes;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CISCO, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. That the improvements and structures described below are hereby declared a public nuisance, dangerous, and a definite hazard to the health and safety of the general public; and they are hereby condemned for removal by demolition in compliance with local code requirements and under the direction of the City Building Inspector.

SECTION 2. That the property owners indicated below shall have ninety (90) days from the date of notification to remove such condemned improvements. After such period of time, if the improvements are not cleared, the City shall have the right to enter

onto such property and remove said condemned improvements either by City labor or by private contract. The owner shall be responsible for all actual demolition and administrative costs and shall be billed appropriately upon completion of demolition. Failure to remit for such costs shall result in a lien being placed on the property.

SECTION 3. That a copy of this condemnation resolution shall be mailed to all property owners indicated below no later than ten (10) days after approval; and the resolution shall be published at least one (1) time in a newspaper of general circulation in the City of Cisco, Texas.
