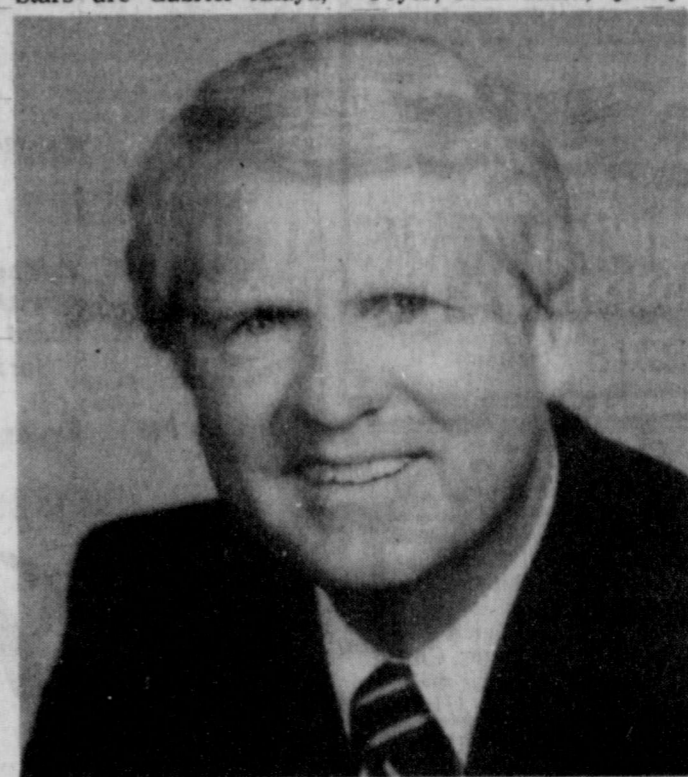

Full Agenda For County Commissioners Monday

With fourteen items on the agenda for Monday, it appears that the Eastland County Commissioners have a long session ahead of them. The meeting will begin at 10 a.m. in the Commissioners Courtroom, and will be open to the public.

One of the first orders of business will be to appoint Election Officials for general and special elections in 1989-90. The Commissioners will also confirm the appointment of a replacement member of the Eastland County Child

Protective Services.

Another item on the agenda will be consideration of a Rabies Control Act. There will also be a request for inspection and authorization for payment for the clearing of the Lasater property north of the Jail.

The Commissioners will consider extended coverage on Liability Insurance for public officials. In another matter, authority will be requested to dispose of property deemed to be unusable or with little or no market value.

There will be a report by Eastland City Manager Paul Catoe concerning expiration of the Rural Firefighting Contract with the County. There will be an invitation for members of the Commissioners Court to attend an Eastland County Commissioner meeting at 7 p.m. August 21 at Eastland City Hall.

Eastland City Mayor C.W. Hoffmann will discuss the status of the Jail Contract between the County and the Cities.

The agenda also includes a report on the current number of inmates in the Jail, the compliance with Texas Jail Standards, etc. Budgetary matters, bills, claims and accounts will occupy part of the meeting.

Local Hospital To Sponsor Breast Cancer Detection Unit July 31

According to the American Cancer Society, one of every ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime during her lifetime. Every year over 37,000 women die as a result of breast cancer.

According to a spokesman from the Regional Breast Care Center at Women's & Children's Hospital in Odessa, "The death rate from breast cancer would be drastically reduced if women would have mammograms done before a problem exists."

By using modern state of the art x-ray equipment breast cancers can be found when they are about the size of a grain of rice and well before the cancer can be felt.

A women who is diagnosed with breast cancer at this early stage as a 90 to 97 percent survival rate. However, a woman who is not diagnosed until a lump can be felt has approximately a 50 percent survival rate in five years.

In an effort to find cancers at the earliest possible stage and prevent unnecessary deaths, a mobile breast cancer detection unit will be made available to local women.

On Monday, July 31, the mobile unit will be parked at E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital. Appointments may be made by calling 442-3951.

One Arrest Made In Eastland Crime Spree

Antonio Vargas was arrested for a crime spree near and in south Eastland after a five hour manhunt this past week.

The Eastland County Sheriff's Dept. has been investigating the burglary of three buildings near the intersection of Hwy. 6 and I-20 south of Eastland, and the Eastland Police Dept., has been investigating the burglary of a southside Eastland home and a case of aggravated assault which took place during that

burglary.

Sheriff Dee Hogan praised the work of Eastland Police Detective Don Walls and the other officers which helped with the case. All of the Sheriff's Deputies, available D.P.S. officers, Eastland Police officers, and Cisco Police Chief Billy Raines helped with the case.

Sheriff Hogan said that Vargas gave officers a statement, admitting to the early Tuesday morning crime spree. He also stated that witnesses positively identified the suspect in a police line-up, and that crime scene fingerprints matched his.

Officers said that according to the story which he gave them, he came to the United States from Mexico with his mother when he was twelve. And that his mother and father were divorced. He lived in Oklahoma first, then in Lingleville and in Ft. Worth before going to work for a dairy near Dublin, he continued. His mother died about five months back, he is nineteen years old, and he speaks Spanish, officers say he says. He also has a brother in Dublin.

Officers say he said that he was not under the influence of anything, but was looking for a place to sleep.

The order of sighting by witnesses, fingerprints, a shirt and food stamps in his possession and a pipe left at a crime scene all linked him to the four burglaries and the assault, Sheriff Hogan reported. But damage to a car at a scene wasn't proven.

According to officers, he

entered Ramona's Cafe, Gaeta's Gulf Station, and J & W quick Stop by breaking out windows or cutting a screen. An ice pick, a barrel lid, and a pipe were reportedly used, and he was bleeding when he was first spotted in Eastland.

Cigars, sunglasses, food stamps, money, and a tank top with a message both in English and Spanish were taken at the Quick Stop.

With officers looking for him only two blocks away, he reportedly entered a home through a second story window after falling to enter through a roof vent.

Officers say that he said he went to sleep in the home for about thirty minutes while officers were searching outside. After deciding to leave, he passed by the bed of a sleeping woman. The woman was choked with a metal pipe and assaulted. The suspect then walked east to I-20 and surrendered to officers after he was spotted and buzzed a couple of times by an airplane and sgt. Jerry Matthews accompanied him.

The suspect says that he has never been to school, but he was arrested once in Comanche according to officers, who say that they have received detailed testimony from witnesses, and that they say that the suspect used some English.

One or two attorneys will probably be appointed by the county to defend him.

Sheriff's Dept. News

Much of the activity at the Sheriff's Department the last few days has centered around the five hour manhunt which resulted in the arrest of Antonio Vargas and the following investigation which has linked him to a local crime spree. He is being charged with four burglaries and an aggravated assault.

A report was also received of harassment from a husband toward the wife from which he is separated.

A lady from the department of Human Services requested assistance on a case south of Eastland due to a large dog at a residence.

Deputy Frank Saylor has been handling the legal details for several upcoming Sheriff's sales. Many of the sales are to collect for years of unpaid taxes.

Among the lots, sometimes with houses, which are to be sold unless taxes are paid are at least four lots or tracts north of the north fork of the Leon in Eastland. They are about the 500 block of North Lamar and on N. Seaman. A lot in the 300 block of Bassett at Patterson is also included.

Some lots north of the tracks in Cisco are also to be sold. Included are lots on Bedford Street, some in the 300 block and four lots at Ash and Ramsey Streets. Also property in the 400 block of East 8th, in the 1200 block of East 14th, in the 1100 block of East 15th, and the 1500 block of Park Drive in Cisco are up for auction unless taxes are paid soon.

Officers have been hav-

ing a hard time lately trying to decide where the Eastland City limits are in order to determine if cases should be handled by city officers or county officers. The line wanders in and out among different businesses and homes in many places.

Officers from the Sheriff's Department are conducting some crimestopper programs for the Lion's Clubs, and donations to support this new program are already coming in.

Deputies have served several subpoenas and warrants also.

Texas Drinking Water Already Meets New EPA Requirements

When the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) announces new rules to protect the public, it often means expensive changes at the local level. And such is the case in some U.S. cities after EPA's June announcement that by December, 1991, all municipal water systems will remove disease-causing viruses, bacteria, and protozoa drawn from reservoirs, rivers and other open sources.

Some of the nation's largest cities, including New York, Boston, San Francisco, Seattle and others, face paying large shares of the estimated \$3 billion in-

itial nationwide cost for adding the filtration systems. They also will pay portions of about \$500 million in annual operation costs for the new systems.

But according to the Texas Department of Health (TDH), cities in this state will be spared the new expense, because Texas has required surface water filtration since 1945.

James Pope, director of the TDH Division of Water Hygiene, said that the state's 44-year old water filtration statutes have been one reason why Texas has long had a reputation for the quality of its drinking water. "For years we have been ahead of many other parts of the country in protecting consumers from unsafe municipal drinking water," he said. "But a bonus is that, by requiring filtration systems when we did, cities were able to install their systems at a fraction of today's cost for new systems."

Pope said that the new EPA rules also require drinking water chlorination after filtration. "Again, Texas is ahead of other parts of the country. Chlorination became mandatory in this state in 1970."

The EPA rules further state that cities must regularly submit drinking water samples for bacteriological tests, another long-standing requirement in Texas.

Pope said the new rules do not apply to cities using wells as water sources.

AARP News Health Issues

QUESTION: Mr. Cartee, why did the federal government bother the Medicare program. We were getting along OK with it.

ANSWER: The Medicare act of 1965 (passed under the Johnson administration) had really served its function. During the past 23 years our health problems became more complex. We have better means for diagnosis, the cost for health-care has jumped 200 percent during the years. The program had broken down due to so many repairs.

The Reagan administration, the senate and the House of Representatives decided to "fix" the problem. The program was enlarged and now includes:

1. You pay only one deductible each year toward hospitalization.
2. You have unlimited days in the hospital-yet it still is based on a need diagnosis.
3. 150 days in a skilled nursing facility per year after the payment of \$20.50 for the first 8 days.
4. You still have a deductible of \$75 for physician ser-

vices. However, January 1, 1990, your deductible will be \$1350 for each calendar year.

5. January 1, 1991 prescriptions drugs will be paid on a 50-50 basis after you have met a \$600 deductible. (We will discuss the prescription drug problem in the future.)

6. The Home Health care was broadened.

7. In January, 1989, the Hospice care benefits became available.

8. On January 1, 1990, periodic mammography screenings will go into effect.

9. The spousal empowerment provisions will go into effect, September 30, 1989.

Many, many changes in the Medicaid benefits go into effect 1989 through 1993.

Now all of this results in greater costs. The basic costs of Medicare were increased. Charges for the catastrophic benefits were added. For each \$150 you owed the Internal Revenue you must add \$22.50.

Eastland Memorial Hospital To Sponsor Breast Cancer Detection Unit

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of every ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime during her lifetime. Every year over 37,000 women die as a result of breast cancer.

According to a spokesman from the Regional Breast Care Center at Women's & Children's Hospital in Odessa, "The death rate from breast cancer could be drastically reduced if women would have mammograms done before a problem exists." By using modern state of the art x-ray equipment breast cancers can be found when they are about the size of a grain of rice and well before the cancer can be felt. A woman who is diagnosed with breast can-

Guest Slot

THIS WEEK most of us remembered the excitement of 20 years ago when man first walked on the moon, and when we visited the Kennedy Space Center on Florida's east coast recently, preparations were being made for the anniversary.

Our visit called to mind our first look at rocketry some 29 years ago when we were guests of the Air Force at Vandenberg A.F.B. in California where the old Atlas missile was being test-fired onto the Pacific range, as a defensive weapon. Things have sure changed and space missions now, thank goodness, are more directed toward exploration of space and the good that can come, rather than from hurling death-bombs around the world.

From the mid-Florida, Disney-Orlando area you go east on a toll highway to Spaceport USA at the Kennedy Space Center.

The tourist-oriented attraction is owned by NASA, but operated by a professional company on contract. And if like us, you're never confused by names, maybe this'll help: there's still Cape Canaveral, a spit of land right on the Atlantic, and across the Banana River, on Merritt Island from the new-named Kennedy Space Center, on another spit of land, which is across the Indian River from the mainland.

And the Spaceport does a really good job of making the space exploration information available to the public. It's generally free with but a few ticket charges for special events; and you can really appreciate the thrill and wonder, when you see the little people enjoying it. An outdoor rocket garden offers up-close looks at all the major vehicles that have flown and are still flying for America. There are exhibits, static displays and educational programs which help explain the complicated space program, with moon rocks, and other valuable pieces from this country's space history.

One ticketed treat is the 37-minute IMAX film "The Dream is Alive" shown on a 5 1/2 story screen, narrated by Walter Cronkite describing astronaut training to the thundering power of a launch to the incredible vastness of space. Most of the footage was taken from space by the astronauts

Respectful, but not overdone, is the manner in which mention is made of the Challenger tragedy. The film shows three of the persons killed in that accident, and is dedicated to the lost crew. On the bus tour, another ticketed treat, visitors are taken by the vehicle by an assembly building (where the big birds are put together and the flag-bedecked building we generally see on television) and to launch pads 39 A and B, site of which there is a sign reading "The Dream is Alive". Complex 39 was Apollo and Skylab sites and shuttle flight sites today.

We were told that the three shuttles were at the center the day we were there, and learned the next day that the Columbia had been moved to the assembly building and later taken on the giant transporter (which moves a mile an hour) to the launch sites where preparations are underway now for the late July launch of a secret satellite configuration.

Apparently there are two bus tours available. The one we got on a Sunday was of the current mission work, and the other appears to be of a historical nature where the early space program is on view.

And you could know, that it's one of our hopes to one day view in person a space launch. It must be a thrill. Having been a military writer during the early days of the Mercury program, it sure would make for interesting copy today.

In the years following World War II, America's rockets began to outgrow the range available in the western desert, so the War

Department selected Cape Canaveral as the testing area for long-range guided missiles. Formal approval of the site was given on July 8, 1947 and the Atlantic Missile Range came into existence. Cape Canaveral Air Force Station is Station One of a test range that extends over 10,000 miles into the Indian Ocean.

On October 1, 1958 the National Aeronautics and Space Administration was established to carry out the peaceful exploration and use of space.

The early Focus of NASA's launch operations centered on Cape Canaveral where the manned launches of project Mercury and Gemini took place. Weather and communications satellites are still being launched from the Cape. Automated spacecraft to explore our Solar System have also been launched.

In late 1964 the NASA Kennedy Space Center was relocated to adjacent Merritt Island. This site had been selected in 1961 as the launch facility for Apollo-the Moon Mission.

Beginning in 1976 these facilities were modified and new ones built to accommodate the launch and landings of the Space Shuttle. In the coming years the Spaceport will be busier than ever as the reusable Space Shuttle is sent into earth orbit over and over again. This revolutionary and reusable space transportation system will enable us to sail the ocean of space as routinely as ships now sail the oceans of water and airlines the ocean of our atmosphere.

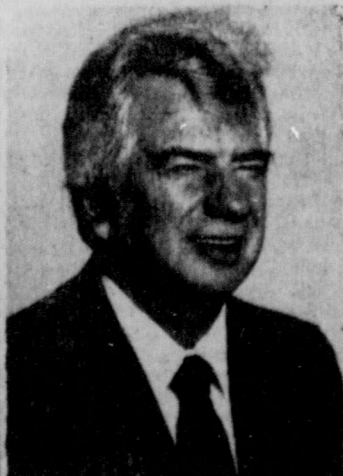

Nominations Sought For Top Rural Minister

The rural minister might be considered an "unsung hero" by many Texans, and where that's the case, they have an opportunity to bring some special recognition to that individual.

The search has begun for Texas' most outstanding rural minister for 1989.

The award is presented each year by the Progressive Farmer magazine at the annual Town and Country Conference at Texas A&M University. This year's conference will be Oct. 2 through 3.

The conference is an educational program for rural and small town ministers and lay leaders and is conducted by

the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Rural ministers have a high calling and must deal with a wide range of challenges," said Dr. David Ruesink, a sociologist with the Extension Service and church conference coordinator. "Many of these ministers must deal with a variety of cultures and certain issues and concerns unique to small communities.

"For example, much of rural Texas has been hard hit by the farm recession the past few years," Ruesink said. "Rural ministers have played a key role in helping families in these communities learn to cope and to survive."

County Extension Service offices have details on how to submit nominations for the Rural Minister of the Year Award, Ruesink said. Nominations must include a record book that tells the story of what the minister has done for his congregation as well as the entire community.

"It's important to focus on the impact that the minister has had within his congregation and the community as a whole," Ruesink said. "How has he made a difference? How have the people benefited from his efforts? How has he molded the people together to fulfill their religious as well as their community needs?"

To be eligible for the award, a minister must serve a con-

gregation in a rural community or town of less than 10,000 population, and he must have served that congregation at least two years.

Nominations must be sub-

mitted by Aug. 15 to the Texas Rural Minister of the Year Committee, Dept. of Rural Sociology, Texas A&M University, College Station, Texas 77843-2125.

Gordon Spot

The poisoning of the famous Treaty Oak Tree in Austin has gotten a lot of news coverage. We are all hoping that the historical and beautiful tree recovers.

We see that same things happening to large, beautiful trees in Eastland County every year. In fact, I've seen some this year. These trees are not poisoned intentionally as the Treaty Oak was, but by well meaning people who do not read the labels on herbicides or do not realize how far a tree's root system extends. We have seen many large trees killed on school campuses in cemeteries, and in home lawns by herbicides that were used to kill grass and weeds in a given area. Applicators did not realize that roots from trees 50 to 75 yards away had roots growing in the same area.

The most common symptom of herbicide poisoned trees is dying around margins of leaves with the dead area progressing into the leaf and causing desiccation of leaf tissue between veins toward the midrib. Areas one-fourth to one-half inch wide along veins are the last to become desiccated. Symptoms of herbicide damage on some trees are simply yellow leaves. The leaves usually die and fall followed by growth of new leaves. These new leaves soon show the same symptoms before they fall.

Herbicides may be applied in a dry year such as last year and the chemical will pretty well stay put and control the vegetation within a few feet. During times of heavy rain-

fall, even three of four years later, the herbicide tends to move with the soil moisture and will be absorbed by tree roots. Many of these herbicides such as Hyvar-x which contains Bromacil, as well as some of the Primator containing herbicides are persistent in the soil from one to two on up to seven or eight years. They cause yellowing symptom, as well as, the leaf burning symptoms that have been previously discussed. There are many other herbicide chemicals that are less toxic, but will still damage or kill trees.

There are herbicides on the market that will control vegetation, but will not persist in the soil and damage tree roots. One good example is glyphosate.

The important precaution is to read the label and observe the surrounding plants.

The tree roots do not respect property boundaries. One may apply a herbicide on his own property and kill a neighbor's tree across the street or a block away.

a tree's roots may reach out three times the height of the tree.

There are other problems that will cause similar symptoms on trees such as drought injury or salt injury. In the case of drought injury, the tree will respond to a good watering. If herbicides caused the injury it may or may not recover with adequate water.

With either injury the best thing you can do is supply adequate water. By adequate water we do not mean wetting the top three or four inches of the soil. To be adequately watered, a tree needs 12 to 24 hours of water application at a slow rate. This will allow the soil to become wet for several feet into the root zone. Short duration watering may keep the grass green under the tree, but it will starve the tree for water.

Artificial bone that can "grow" can spare children with bone cancer from amputation. Device, developed at Mount Sinai Hospital in New York, is implanted in place of the cancerous bone and later adjusted to a longer size through a small incision in the limb.

New prescription drug to dissolve small-to-medium cholesterol gallstones has been approved by the FDA. Ursodiol (Actigall by Ciba-Geigy) is derived from naturally occurring bile acids. It can be taken for up to two years, perhaps avoiding the need for surgery.

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Fishing Outdoors

Our good friends to the south, the Brownwood Bass Club has scheduled their second annual Summer Open Tournament. Sunday July 30, 1989 will be the tournament date. Of course Lake Brownwood will be tournament waters with headquarters at Flat Rock Park.

This year's entry fee will be \$25.00 with an optional \$5.00 Big Bass Pot. And new for this year is a free Junior division for youths 13 or under. There will be no entry fee for this division if fishing with a paid adult. A guaranteed payback will be in tact for the junior division. 1st-\$150, 2nd-\$100, 3rd-\$75, 4th-\$50, and 5th-\$25.

The open division payback will be based on 200 entries with the following breakdown: 1st \$1000, 2nd \$640, 3rd \$440, 4th \$320, and 5th \$200, 6th through 10th \$100 each, 11th through 15th \$80, 16th through 20th \$60 each, 21st through 25th \$40 each.

Remember earlier this year the tournament locally that had the rule "if you have been disqualified from a tournament for failing the polygraph test, you are ineligible to participate in the tournament." Well my prediction that this ruling would be adopted by many more invitational bass events is mounting up. This event at Lake Brownwood has the same

rule. I guess the "death sentence" is to become the rule of thumb. And as I have stated it has good and bad points. But I've beat that bush, so enough said.

I do recommend that everyone make plans to attend the July 30, 1989 Summer Open at Lake Brownwood. Fishing has been very slow and can only improve between now and the tournament date. See you all in weigh-in line.

Rod selection has become as complex as what lure to use to catch fish on a given day. That selection for a quality rod can be a little simpler by following a few basic steps: Shake the rod and see if it is comfortable. Does the handle fit your hands. Is it designed for comfort. Does the handle fit your hands. Is it designed for comfort. One item that really helps is to either bring a reel from home or ask the sales clerk to use a store reel, and place it on the rod. Of course you would want to use the same weight and design reel as your own plan to place on your own new purchase.

Next look at the rod and check the straightness of the blank, is there a "hook" at the end or a snake in the tip. Are the guides straight?

Look closely at the guides, do the wrappings have sloppy thread coatings? Is it sloped up the foot of the guides? Check for air bubbles and blemishes.

Most rods blanks are sanded. Check to see that the sanding was completed and not left ruff. Check the blank coating for chips and nicks.

A bad reel slot can be a real problem when fighting that lunker. Make sure the reel locks firmly into the seat.

A little more about rod guides. "Take a Q-tip along, and run it around the inside of your rod guides. Make sure it

doesn't snag. If it does more than likely your fishing monofilament will fry.

Ferrule rock, when you can feel the tip section rattle this is "Ferrule rock". And that's not good. So next time you're in the market for a rod, look it over as carefully as if it were a major investment. Who knows a bad rod could cost

you that first place money in your next tournament.

August 3, 1989 will be the next meeting of the Eastland County Bass Club. Once again this will take place at 7:30 p.m. at the Eastland National Bank Building. All current and prospective members are urged to attend.

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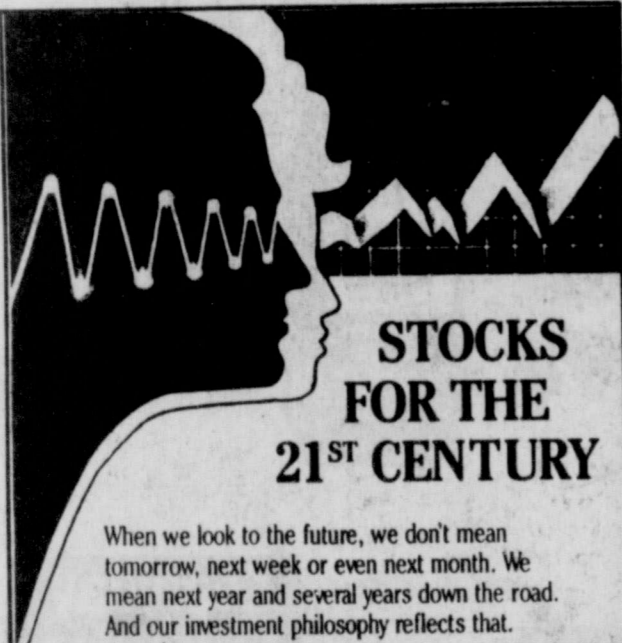
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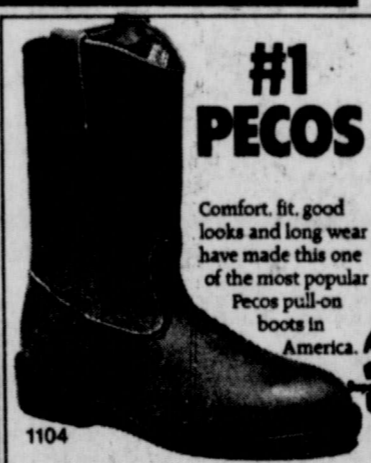
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Letter To The Editor
