Crimestoppers Kick Off Soon

Donations are coming in to fund the Eastland County Crimestoppers program. The 629-TIPS phone number is in operation and plans are to advertise a crime of the month in the near future.

V.F.W. Post 4082 life members have donated \$500, the First National Bank of Cisco has donated \$100, a ten dollar donation came from Big Spring, and the local Crimestoppers are still waiting for a grant which has been approved. Donations may be mailed to Eastland County Crimestoppers, Inc., P.O. Box 900, Cisco 76437.

Once the program is underway, the Crimestoppers Board will decide how much reward money will be paid for each tip which results in an arrest and conviction of a

felony offender. The identity of the person giving a phone tip will remain unknown and that person will be given a code number. A system will then be worked out for a person giving a tip which solves a case to tell that number to a person in a business, possibly through a screen so that the person cannot be recognized, in exchange for the reward money. The payoff person will be a Crimestopper member, not an officer.

The Crimestopper program has received great cooperation from people all across Eastland County; reports one Crimestopper worker, and the next meeting will be at the Gorman Bank on August 8.

County Commissioners Appoint Election Judges And Discuss Disposal Of Unusable Property

The meeting was called to order with all commissioners and County Judge Scott Bailey present. Commissioner Bacon gave the jail report and stated that the sewer problems could stem from the discovery of three 90 degree pipes in the system. He told the sheriff to get the problem fixed and report back to the commissioners. There are currently 15 prisoners in the county jail.

The next order of business was the approval of election judges for general and special elections. They are as follows:

The commissioners confirmed the appointment of Mr. Jimmy Hughes to replace Rev. Blaine Clower on the Child Protection Service Agency.

Judge Bailey reported to the commissioners that according to the 1981 Rabies Control Act, the county shall appoint one person from each precinct to control animals. It was decided that the Constables from each precinct will be in charge of animal control.

Mr. Clinton Eaton appeared before the commissioners with his final bill on the clearing of the Lassater Property. Two commissioners reported that the job had been done satisfactorily and they voted to pay the bill.

A motion was made by Bacon and seconded by

Owen to extend the coverage of liability on county employees.

A letter was read by Judge Bailey from Ann Richards, state treasurer to the effect that a check for the county road fund would be mailed by October 13th. The money is to be used to improve or build county roads.

Judge Bailey asked for permission to dispose of unusable property that had collected in his office over several months. He also reported that several pillows and blankets, from the days when juries stayed overnight, needed to be disposed of. Local organizations will be notified of these items.

The next order of business was a report from Paul Catoe, city manager of Eastland. He stated that the Rural Fire Contract had expired and invited commissioners to attend the next meeting on August 21, to discuss this matter. It was decided that Commissioner Robinson and Judge Bailey would attend the meeting and report back to commissioners.

Adjustments and amendments to the sheriff's department were discussed and bills were okayed for payment.

A request was made by Mayor Hoffman to recommend to the Texas Highway Department some sort of traffic control on Highway 6 and I-20 and Highway 6 and Seaman. Both intersections have reported accidents with the Hwy 6 and I-20 having fatalities. Bacon made a motion and Owens seconded that the commissioners join with Eastland and request some traffic control.

Mrs. Livingston, from Rising Star, requested some assistance with traffic control at a cross roads by her property. Several accidents had occurred here. Commissioner Owens stated that he would find out who leased or owned the property and request that he be allowed to clear brush away, where intersection would be safe.

Mayor Hoffman wrote a letter to the commissioners requesting information as to when the jail contracts were rescinded and minutes to that meeting. Commissioner Bacon asked why Eastland was having trouble signing the contract and Commis-

sioner Robinson stated that the town was upset that the contract kept changing. Bacon reiterated that Ranger had signed and Cisco Police Chief Raines reported that he should have a signed copy for the next meeting. After a short discussion, the commissioners decided to let Eastland continue under their old contract.

Bills, budgets and claims were discussed and handled accordingly.

The meeting was adjourned.

Sheriff's Dept. News

A chain was cut and several items were removed from a boat near residence 2 miles north of Desdemona between July 2 and 9. A Minn-Kota model 65M trolling motor (which was locked to the boat), a Voyager deep cycle marine battery, a Western Auto deep cycle marine battery, a Zebco Sportcaster combination rod and reel, a tackle box of equipment, and a transducer for a LaRantz W.P. portable depth finder were taken.

There was a burglary between July 18 and 21 reported at the Rocking "S" Ranch on Tudor Road four miles south of I-20. Some cattle were missing but they were found. However, several items were taken. They included an air compressor, a Miller 2 cycle gasoline welder, a Murphy self propelled lawn mower, 3 saddles (1 a Circle Y), 3 tool boxes with hand tools, a Sears electric cement mixer, a Homelite chain saw, a Snap-on torque wrench, a Skill saw, a disk sander, Victor freon gauges, a heavy duty deep sea fishing rod and reel, 3 full fishing tackle boxes, 2 Zebco 202 reels, 1 Zebco Classic 33 reel, 1 Zebco 404 reel, and 2 Mitchell 300 reels. Hydraulic oil was also spilled.

Between June 6 and July 10, a mobile home north of Olden was burglarized while the owner was out of town. A Unistat 2000 TV satellite control box, a white deep

SOME EFFECTS THAT THE CLOSING OF A HOSPITAL HAS ON A COMMUNITY:

1. Property values can decrease.
2. There is decreased possibility of attracting industry, new residents, or even keeping old residents.
3. The Threat of loss of life is greater. (People needing immediate care include asthmatics/acute respiratory crisis patients, heart attack victims, and accident victims with severe injuries).
4. There will be no emergency facility available 24 hours/day, 365 days a year. Local doctors will have no obligation to treat any patients other than regular, established patients.
5. Needed revenue for the community is lost. (Will the loss of the hospital payroll have an economic impact on the community?) Have persons who are urging to close the hospital compared the cost of a temporary tax increase to the money and time lost to take, or be with,

a loved one in an out of town hospital? ... A round-trip to Eastland from Cisco is approximately 22 mi. at \$20/mi which equals \$4.40; Cisco-Abilene 104 mi. at \$20/mi which is \$20.80. A limited meal out would be a minimum of \$3.50. Add the appropriate figures, multiply by number of days and persons involved. Consider the value of lost time, the convenience of a local hospital, and compare the total with the tax previously proposed.

CURRENT PROBLEMS WITH CISCO'S HOSPITAL:

1. Staffing: It is impossible to attract and keep qualified registered nursing and technical personnel with the limited available funds. Larger area hospitals are offering \$20-25/hr. for registered nurses' salaries; Cisco cannot hope to compete at the much lesser rate now offered, and the lack of a benefits package.
2. The physical plant is in need of much-needed maintenance work; to operate a safe and functional facility, some equipment must be repaired or replaced.
3. Current indebtedness must be paid, if

the hospital is operating or not. 4. Indigent health care will have to be paid for by the Cisco Hospital Tax District, no matter where it is provided. 5. The majority of the patients seen and treated at the hospital are Medicare-aged, or unable or unwilling to pay for services. If Medicare-aged, the cost of treatment usually exceeds the amount of payment from Medicare.

The average value of all residences in Cisco is \$18,368. Taxpayers over 65 receive a \$12,000 exemption. The following estimated property tax figures were supplied by the Eastland County Tax Appraisal District:

Taxpayers Over 65
1989: \$18,368-\$12,000 equals \$6,368 x \$.14 equals \$8.92 tax.
Est 'Mt.: \$18,368-\$12,000 equals \$6,368 x \$.28 equals \$17.83 tax.

Taxpayers Under 65
1989: \$18,368 x \$.14 equals \$25.71
\$18,368 x \$.28 equals \$51.43
\$50,000 x \$.28 equals \$140.00
The tax increase to \$0.28 for two years would provide funds to keep our hospital

Luke Phippen Recalls World War I

(Editor's Note: The following is the first part of an interesting part of history in the life of Mr. Luke Phippen. The second part of the story will be printed in an issue of The Cisco Press in the first part of August.)

Mr. Luke Phippen, Cisco resident, (born at Dothan) and a veteran of World War I, said pneumonia and then a bout with the mumps, kept him from being sent to the Philippines when he first joined the Navy. Mr. Phippen spent his tour of duty in Europe.

He said when he first joined the Navy, he was sent to San Francisco. He said their department had a billy goat head nailed to the wall, and they called themselves, "Last Of The Herd."

Luke came down with pneumonia at training and they shipped him 30 miles away to a Marine base hospital. He came back after 30 days and then came down with the mumps. He said he argued with the commanders because he didn't want to miss going overseas with the men he trained with. He said he was put in with the mump cases and had to stay another 30 days and his company was sent on to the Philippines. Mr. Phippen missed the tug.

He spent 90 days or more

in the hospital. All his friends had been sent off so he had no friends around. He talked to the drill sergeant and was put with some other men in an expert department. When the department had 400 men they were sent on to Europe as relief.

They boarded a train in San Francisco, with all their belongings and were sent to Philadelphia. After an inspection they found out he had the measles and was put in quarantine for 30 days behind a barbed wire fence.

When he was released the men were sent to New York where they boarded the USS United States. After 14 days at sea, they landed in Liverpool, England. They were taken to the Ares Channel by train. The men then had to board a small ship where they ran a blockade after midnight.

The next day in Ireland they went to Queensboro by passenger train. They went on the mother supply ship, the USS Melvil, where they were given a delayed thanksgiving dinner. Luke said they piled the plates high. The men were told they had better eat as much as they could hold. This was going to be the last big meal for a long time.

Luke became a gunner on the USS Benham #49. When

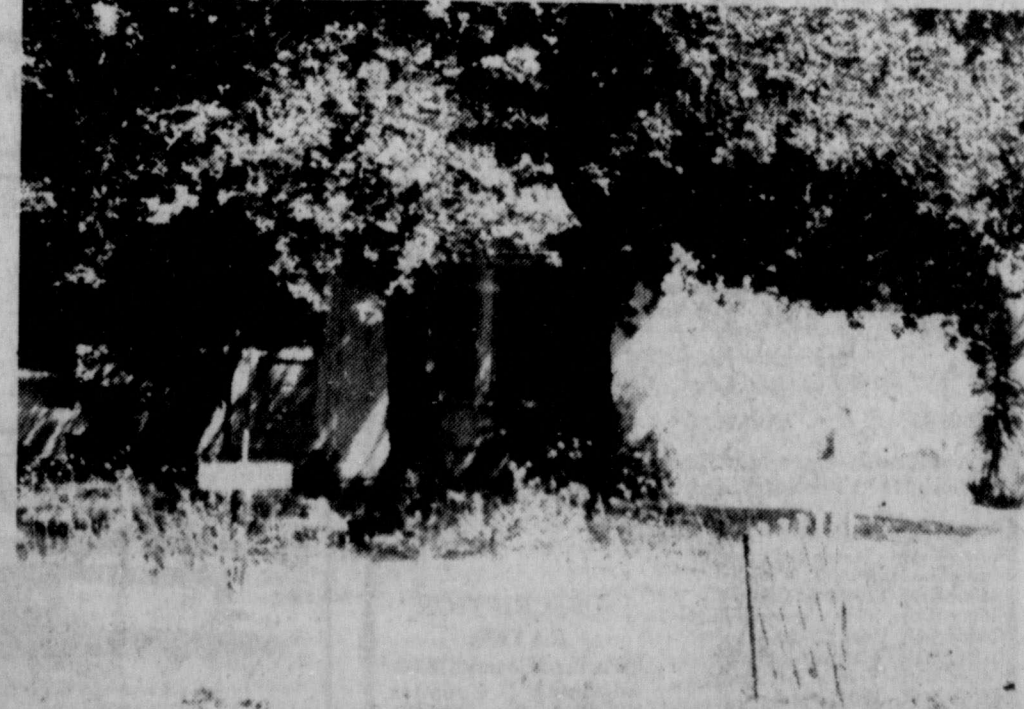
he first went on board he was told that he would not be in the actual battle but had to watch the raft during a fight. The ship went out after a couple of days and in the first battle there were plenty of torpedos shooting at them, he said.

He said while watching the raft his hair kept pushing his hat up and couldn't keep his hat on. Mr. Phippen still has a full head of thick hair, and it is easy to imagine how much hair he had back then. He said there was no way to protect himself except to run from side to side.

Luke said it wasn't long before they were in another battle that lasted two hours. He said the troop was under secret orders and when they got on the sea, the 'yellow envelope' was opened. He said the only one who knew where they were going was the commanding officer. He said they had to zig zag across the sea to their destination. He said there were in the sixth fleet with 36 destroyers.

He said the trip usually took 25 days. In this time they could not take a bath, shave or change clothes. They slept in their boots, and clothes and kept their life

Local Hospital To Sponsor Breast Cancer Detection Unit July 31

According to the American Cancer Society, one of every ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime during her lifetime. Every year over 37,000 women die as a result of breast cancer.

According to a spokesman from the Regional Breast Care Center at Women's & Children's Hospital in Odessa, "The death rate from breast cancer would be drastically reduced if women would have mammograms done before a problem exists."

By using modern state of the art x-ray equipment breast cancers can be found when they are about the size of a grain of rice and well before the cancer can be felt.

A woman who is diagnosed with breast cancer at this early stage as a 90 to 97 percent survival rate. However, a woman who is not diagnosed until a lump can be felt has approximately a 50 percent survival rate in five years.

In an effort to find cancers at the earliest possible stage and prevent unnecessary deaths, a mobile breast cancer detection unit will be made available to local women.

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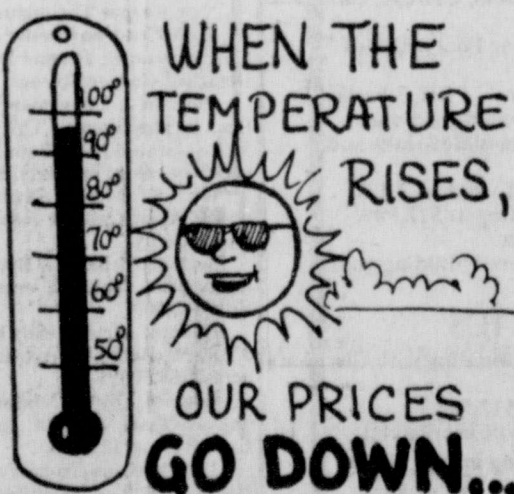

Water Development Board Reports Decline In Ground Water Level

AUSTIN--The Texas Water Development Board maintains a ground water level monitoring network of over 5,400 wells that are measured annually for the assessment of the amount of ground water available in the state. Several key indicator wells are equipped with recording devices to provide continuous monitoring of water levels in various aquifers around the state.

Despite the heavy rains in parts of Texas, five of seven recorders showed slight declines in water levels from the past month, and six of the seven showed declines from the previous year. Two wells showing a rise in the past month were both in areas that received substantial rainfall. A well in Dallas County monitoring the Twin Mountains (Trinity) Formation rose 0.31 of a foot above the May measurement, but was still 5.68 feet below the June 1988 measurement. A Lissie Willis Sand aquifer well in Harris County rose 0.45 of a foot above the May measurement, yet was 1.21 feet below the previous June measurement. The only recorder well showing a rise in water levels from last year was a Carrizo aquifer well in Dimmit County that was 0.54 of a foot above the June 1988 measurement. Unfortunately, little rain

fell on the recharge zone for the southern portion of the Edwards aquifer which supplies ground water for the City of San Antonio. San Antonio, the only major Texas city that still relies solely on ground water for their municipal supply, is already facing the prospects of possible water rationing.

In June of this year, the Edwards aquifer was 16.50 feet below the level in June 1988 and has dropped over twenty feet since April. As of July 7, 1989, the aquifer water level was at 632.5 feet above sea level. The record low for the aquifer is 612 feet above sea level at which

mandatory water rationing begins by the City of San Antonio. At this level, Comal Springs in New Braunfels will cease to flow.

According to personnel from the National Heritage Program, Texas Parks and Wildlife, this will adversely affect three endangered species found in and around Comal Springs. If the aquifer continues to drop to the level of 535 feet above sea level, San Marcos Springs in San Marcos would cease to flow. Eight endangered species would then be threatened, with the extinction of one or more a distinct possibility.

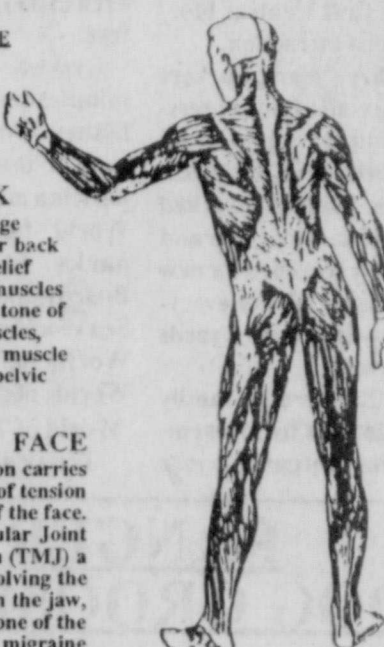

Water Development Board Reports Decline In Ground Water Level

AUSTIN--The Texas Water Development Board maintains a ground water level monitoring network of over 5,400 wells that are measured annually for the assessment of the amount of ground water available in the state. Several key indicator wells are equipped with recording devices to provide continuous monitoring of water levels in various aquifers around the state. Despite the heavy rains in parts of Texas, five of seven recorders showed slight declines in water levels from the past month, and six of the seven showed declines from the previous year. Two wells showing a rise in the past month were both in areas that received substantial rainfall. A well in Dallas County monitoring the Twin Mountains (Trinity) Formation rose 0.31 of a foot above the May measurement, but was still 5.68 feet below the June 1988 measurement. A Lissie Willis Sand aquifer well in Harris County rose 0.45 of a foot above the May measurement, yet was 1.21 feet below the previous June measurement. The only recorder well showing a rise in water levels from last year was a Carrizo aquifer well in Dimmit County that was 0.54 of a foot above the June 1988 measurement. Unfortunately, little rain

fell on the recharge zone for the southern portion of the Edwards aquifer which supplies ground water for the City of San Antonio, San Antonio, the only major Texas city that still relies solely on ground water for their municipal supply, is already facing the prospects of possible water rationing. In June of this year, the Edwards aquifer was 16.50 feet below the level in June 1988 and has dropped over twenty feet since April. As of July 7, 1989, the aquifer water level was at 632.5 feet above sea level. The record low for the aquifer is 612 feet above sea level at which

mandatory water rationing begins by the City of San Antonio. At this level, Comal Springs in New Braunfels will cease to flow.

According to personnel from the National Heritage Program, Texas Parks and Wildlife, this will adversely affect three endangered species found in and around Comal Springs. If the aquifer continues to drop to the level of 535 feet above sea level, San Marcos Springs in San Marcos would cease to flow. Eight endangered species would then be threatened, with the extinction of one or more a distinct possibility.

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
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

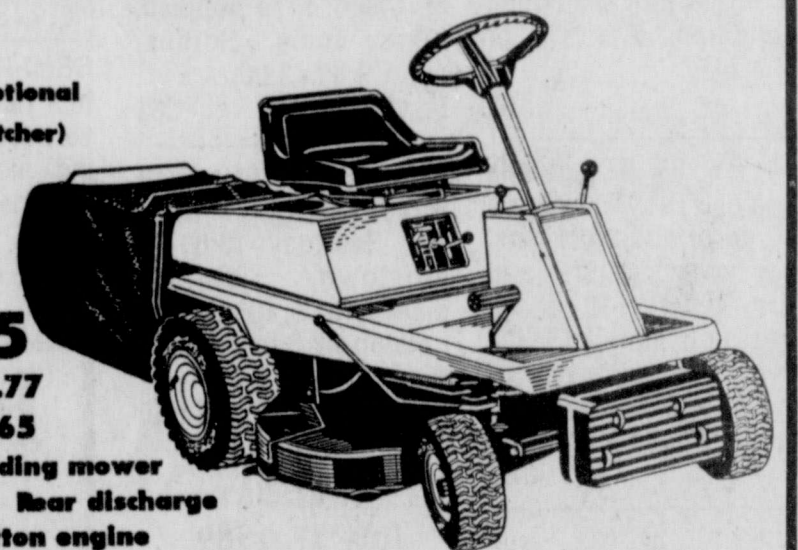

With the increased popularity of sport fishing today, anglers are faced with increasingly long lines at boat ramps. And then even after launching may run for miles to fish shallow water they spotted from their tow truck. And we all know the great expense involved in operating, purchasing, and keeping up these high powered boats.

Well your "Big Boat Blues" have been answered. Thanks to the folks at Quitaque Plastics Inc. in Quitaque, Texas. "The Fish N Pal", the new one man fishing boat is here. Made of moldable polyethylene this fishing rig weighs in at under 25 pounds. But don't let this light weight fool you. Thanks to modern construction processes the Fish N Pal has a maximum weight rating

of 275 lbs. And all this weight is available in a 40 inch wide by 70" long by 12" high fish catching machine.

Fitted with an aluminum carry bar this lightweight rig can be easily loaded and unloaded by one person. The Fish N Pal can be maneuvered with a set of swim fins or has an optional factory bolt on motor mount rated for a 1.5 H.P. gas motor or a electric trolling motor.

Many of you may remember a small styrofoam one man boat called the Water Wagon. The Fish N Pal takes this principal into the future of one man boat fishing. One feature I feel for was the molded in storage compartment, with snap on lids to avoid spillage. And this deletes the need for that bulky tackle box that

always seems to end up in the dip net.

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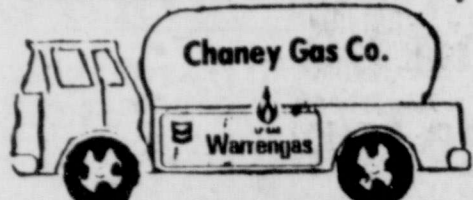

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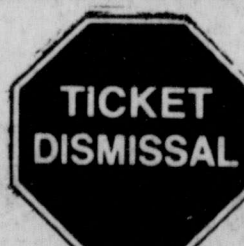

preserver on. Every third night they got 8 hours sleep if nothing happened.

He said sometimes their food got pretty low on the trips. They had supplies but their bread got wet and

mildewed and they had to throw it overboard. They had to eat a lot of hard tack, weiners and saurkraut and dried beans. He said they began with fresh food, but with no refrigeration and no ice they couldn't carry it very long. He said several times they would have to hold their nose when they passed the meat rack, it stunk so bad because it was so old, but they still ate it. He said if they went through a storm he took care of the food. Mr. Pippin had to get fresh supplies when they got to port.

They had several submarine battles. He said the subs would wait in wolf packs, maybe 8-10 in each pack. He said the pack would wait for them and when they were found there would be a good battle.

The closer they got to the front line, they could hear the big guns shooting. They would go in and get the convoys and bring them in and take more men to the front. They had to fight their way back just like they had to fight their way there.

Luke said one time the destroyer was hit with a depth charger and they lost 48-49 men. He said it blew the tail end of the ship off. One night they were rammed by another ship. They were hit about 10 feet from where he was sleeping, but it sure woke him up in a hurry. But the battle was not the only way men lost their lives.

Mr. Pippin said during World War I, the flu was at it's worst and there were men who died everyday from it. He said several died everyday on the ship and they would bury them at sea once a day. Sometimes it took over an hour. There would be 15, 20, 25 or even 100 men to bury everyday.

At first they buried the men at 12 noon, but they had to change the time to midnight so the Germans could not see them.

He became the helmsman on ship. He said they didn't have dog tags so if they were captured they could not tell anything. His secret code name was "Jellie".

He said the men were lonely and they had to be careful when they met a girl on shore. They might be the enemy. The USO, the Salvation Army and the Red Cross

got their heads together and said the men needed girlfriends, when the fleet came in. He said five passenger trains came in with women. They put numbers on the men and numbers on the women and when the ladies got off they looked for the matching numbers.

Most VA Money Goes Directly To Veterans

Texas veterans directly received more than half of the \$2,047,430,102 U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) expenditures in Texas during fiscal year 1988, according to Waco VA Regional Office Director Dr. Stephen L. Lemons.

"Texas veterans received \$1,091,366,207 as compensation for disabling injuries or diseases incurred while in the armed forces, or as pensions for wartime veterans with limited incomes," Lemons said. "They also received \$90,064,083 for education and vocational rehabilitation benefits."

He added that \$101,214,233 for insurance and indemnity payments, \$96,367,576 for facility construction, and \$698,417,903 for medical services and administrative costs were expended in Texas.

"Veterans of Texas have earned these benefits through their military service to our country, and my first priority is to serve them," said Lemons, whose office administers benefit programs for 233,833 veterans in northern Texas.

Estimated VA expenditures for Eastland County veterans totalled \$2,520,900. This includes \$2,333,964 for compensation rehabilitation, and \$130,970 for insurance and indemnities.
