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Don Henry Named New Hospital Administrator

Don Henry began his duties as the new hospital administrator at E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital last week. Mr. Henry, who came here from Arkansas, said he is looking forward to working in the Cisco hospital.

Mr. Henry was born in Shreveport, but was raised in Kansas City, after his family moved there. He has been in hospital administration since 1969 where he majored at the University of Missouri.

Don and his wife, Marilyn, have one grown son, Lyndon. He said he had plans to look for a new home in Cisco as soon as possible.

Mr. Henry said the number one priority for the hospital is to recruit new physicians for Cisco. He said as of next week, there will only be one physician in Cisco. He said they will lay

and use the facilities. He said that the hospital has day to day expenses, but they will also have to renovate their equipment and facilities as time goes by. He said with doctors using the facility this will help bring in the revenue.

Henry said the basic medical need is for a family surgeon, or an obstetrician, they have to pay \$200,000 a year for insurance, and if they have to pay \$300,000 a year for their equipment and building expenses, then they would need to make over \$500,000 a year to clear their first dollar.

Don Henry said for the next three years he is going to work hard for the hospital and work hard for the community. He said a hospital is

needed in a rural community. A hospital will not bring in industries, but an industry will shy away from a community without a hospital because of their workman's comp.

He said the impact of losing the emergency room for the elderly is terrifying. He said for a younger person driving the extra miles is not so bad, but to someone with heart trouble it will make a difference. He said there are several things that have not been considered when talking about the future of a hospital.

He said the future of the hospital does look dismal, but he, along with E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital board of directors, the staff, and the entire community can survive this crisis.

C.I.S.D. Dress Code Released For Students

The district's dress code is established to teach hygiene, instill discipline, prevent disruption, avoid safety hazards, and assert authority. Students are expected to come to school looking clean and neat, and dressed in a manner which is accepted as being in good taste, according to an announcement by Phil Warren, high school principal.

The dress code is listed as follows:
1. No shorts other than walking shorts are acceptable. (AT THE KNEE)
2. Shoes shall be part of regular attire.
3. Fishnet shirts, bare midriffs, backless outfits,

halter-tops, cut-offs, see-through clothing, shirts split up the side, shirts with unhemmed sleeves, or muscle shirts are prohibited.

4. Clothing with vulgar, indecent slogans or pictures shall not be permitted.
5. Clothing which advertises or promotes merchandise which is not allowed on the campus is prohibited.
6. Warm-ups will not be permitted.

7. Skirts should be of an appropriate length. The student and parent may determine the student's personal dress and grooming standards, provided that the student's dress and grooming:

1. Shall not lead school officials to believe that such dress or grooming will disrupt, interfere with, disturb, or detract from school activities.
2. Shall not create a health or other hazard to the students safety or to the safety of others.

But earlier this week The Cisco Press received a letter that was sent in the mail, with just a name, and no address or phone number. We will not be able to accept it. All letters that are mailed in must have an address and phone number, so they can be verified.

In Letters To The Editor, there are certain slanderous remarks that may not be acceptable. This will be up to the decision of the Editor or publisher. This might save legal difficulties for the writer of the Letter to the Editor.

The Cisco Press realizes that there are several citizens who are against any new taxes for the E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital, but The Cisco Press is also a believer that the City of Cisco does need a hospital. And it will be worth fighting for. The Press also hopes that the community will begin to work together for the good of the city.

House Bill 65 To Help Drug War

State Representative Dan Morales (D-San Antonio) has applauded House Bill 65 as the "most powerful anti-drug legislation ever passed by the Texas Legislature," as it was signed into law Wednesday.

"House Bill 65, the Asset Forfeiture Bill, grants the state broad new authority to seize assets and property used in criminal activity, with the objective of forcing criminals to begin paying a significant portion of law enforcement costs. This new

statute will give the state the power to directly take the profit out of criminal activity," Morales added.

The bill, which Morales authored, could provide up to \$200 million in funds to local law enforcement agencies in its first year alone.

"This new measure will make sure drug king-pins cannot hide behind 'legitimate' businesses," Morales said. "It basically says if you choose to make money selling drugs, you will pay with not only time in

Why Should Women Have Mammogram?

One out of ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her life. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as a result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50% five year survival rate. Conversely, a woman diagnosed as having breast cancer before a lump can be felt has a 97% 5 year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate.

A mammogram can detect a cancer the size of a grain of rice even before it can be felt.

Who Should Have A Screening Mammogram?

The American Cancer Society has established guidelines for mammography. Those guidelines have been adopted by the American Academy of Family Physicians, American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, and The American College of Radiology. The guidelines for mammography are as follows:

I. 35-40 year old asymptomatic women should have a baseline mammogram.

II. 40-50 year old asymptomatic women should have a mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor until age 50.

III. Asymptomatic women over 50 years of age should have annual physical examination and annual mammogram.

IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. Risk factors listed below are an

example.

a. Previous breast cancer - yearly examination.

b. Family history of breast cancer in mother, sister, or daughter baseline examination should be done at age 30 with follow-up as recommended in Section II above.

V. Symptomatic women at any age.

a. Breast mass, palpable by physician or patient.

b. Nipple discharge.

c. Skin changes.

d. Unexplained breast pain.

VI. Symptomatic women will not be seen at the Screening Clinic. A woman with any of the above symptoms should call her physician or make an appointment for a complete breast study at the Regional Breast Center in Odessa.

What Is A Screening Mammogram?

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast on women who have no symptoms of disease, (asymptomatic).

A screening mammogram utilizes extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers in unsuspecting women.

How Can A Woman Get A Screening Mammogram?

The Regional Breast Care Center of Women's & Children's Hospital and Odessa Radiology Group are co-sponsoring a Mobile Breast Screening program.

The Mobile Breast Screening Unit will be in most towns in West Texas.

The Mobile Breast Screening Unit will work by appointment as well as non-appointment. You may make your appointment by calling your local hospital or the Regional Breast Care Center at (915) 334-8888.

What Happens After A Woman Has Made An Appointment?

When the Mobile Breast Screening Unit is in your city please report approximately 5 minutes prior to your appointment time for registration.

The charge for the screening mammogram is between \$45 and \$75 depending on location and payment must be made at the time of service. The clinic accepts cash, check, Visa, MasterCard and American Express.

Typically, the exam takes less than 15 minutes. Wear separates (skirt and blouse, slacks and blouse) to allow easy disrobing from the waist up. Also, avoid overuse of deodorant.

A female technologist will perform the examination and teach you how to do breast self-examination.

In some cities the local Radiologist will interpret the films and forward the results to your physician. If the local Radiologist does not interpret the films, the films are returned to the Regional Breast Care Center at Women's & Children's Hospital. There they are interpreted by a Radiologist from Odessa Radiology Group. The results are then forwarded to your physician.

You will be instructed when to call or see your physician for the results of your study. If you have no physician, we will provide you with names of local physicians who have agreed to take new patients.

You and/or your physician will be mailed a reminder when it is time for further check-ups.

What If My Screening Mammogram Is Positive?

As stated earlier, a screening mammogram is designed to find very early cancers. If your mammogram shows ANY suspicious signs you will be asked to have further evaluations done.

These evaluations may be performed by your physician or by a complete diagnostic breast center such as the Regional Breast Care Center at Women's & Children's Hospital.

Should you be asked to have further studies done, DO NOT PANIC. This does not mean you have cancer, it simply means there is an area which needs further study.

If a mammogram shows a definite cancer, you will be advised of such.

If you require further evaluations and receive these evaluations at the Regional Breast Care Center at Women's & Children's Hospital, the fee which you paid for the screening mammogram will be discounted from the Complete Study charge.

Breast Self-Examination
During your visit to the Breast Screening Unit you will be taught how to perform breast self-examination. (BSE). Breast self-examination is a very important tool to every woman. Any changes which may occur in your breasts will be first noticed by yourself. These changes should be reported to your physician immediately.

Three Steps Which May Save Your Life

1. Regular check-ups by a physician.
2. Monthly breast self-examination.
3. Mammography according to the American Cancer Society Guidelines.

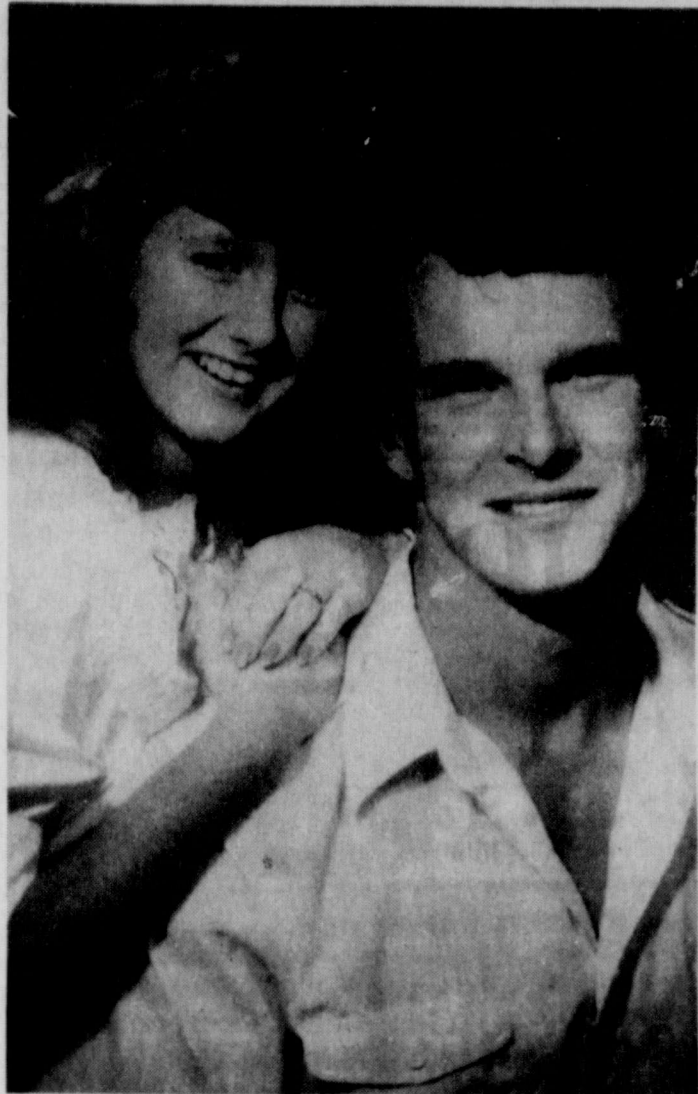

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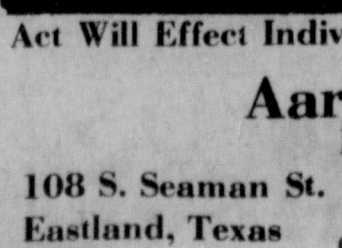

Health Issues And Views

By ROY CARTEE

QUESTION: Mr. Cartee, you have said Part B of Medicare covers the doctor. Will you advise what kind of doctors?

ANSWER: Part B of Medicare helps pay for services received from doctors in the office or hospital. It also pays when you are in a skilled nursing home, or in the home under certain conditions. The term doctor includes licensed physicians M.D. or D.O. Limited services for dental surgeons, chiropractors, optometrists and podiatrists.

QUESTION: What types of services are not covered?

ANSWER: You will find routine examinations and tests are not covered. Routine foot care is not covered. Eye or hearing examinations are not covered but surgery is covered. Cosmetic surgery is not covered. Dental, except for surgery of the jaw or setting of fractures, are not covered. Acupuncture is not covered.

QUESTION: Mr. Cartee, if I am immunized will Medicare pay?

ANSWER: If required because of an injury or immediate risk of infection or for administration of pneumococcal or hepatitis-B vaccines.

QUESTION: Mr. Cartee, will Medicare pay for ambulance service?

ANSWER: Yes, but the conditions are limited. You actually should contact the ambulance service. The ambulance equipment and its personnel must meet Medicare requirements. If you are transported by any other vehicle it could possibly endanger the beneficiary's health. Generally Part B covers ambulance service only to the closest treatment facility.

NOTE: We are finding many people could be eligible for SSI if they would apply. Perhaps you would want to write Roy V. Cartee, Associate State Health Coordinator - AARP, 900 Avenue H, Cisco, Texas 76437.

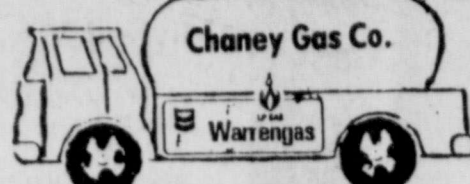

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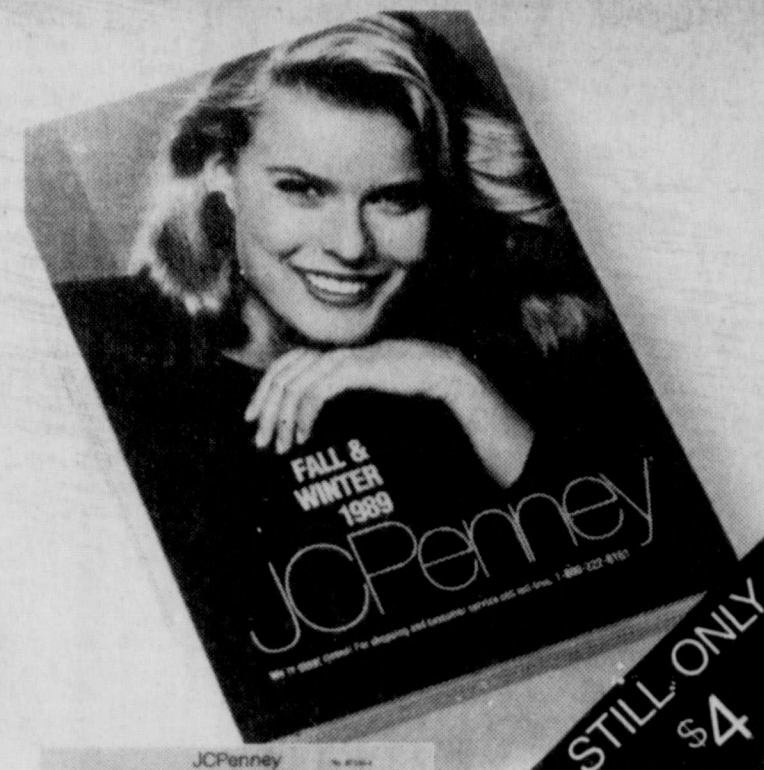
Taxes On Mixed Drinks

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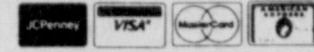

IN ONE short day we certainly didn't do it justice, but generally we were disappointed in the Disney-MGM Studios Theme Park at Disney World in Florida. (Can't remember or sure the Disney-MGM connection: did Disney buy the name and props and Ted Turner the films?)

And it was raining. Standing in a cosmopolitan line (mob) for an hour amid umbrellas and plastic parkas waiting for a two-hour "Backstage Studio Tour" doesn't really give you a positive zing.

Once aboard, it's a typical Disney experience. Your

host on the tram welcomes you aboard and introduces you to the driver, who's on her first day back since "the accident." That frightens you if you hadn't heard the previous tour guide greet her charges with the same scripted words. This tour is half ride-half walk.

The ride part takes you before windows of the costume department, the prop department, and you see a vast multitude of vehicles, boats, etc., which presumably have been used in various movies. Non reach out and grab you however.

The drive takes you through a "neighborhood"

of homes, each different and each fake, and adaptable for use as anybody's home, anywhere. Ditto, city streets, including a panorama of the New York skyscraper skyline which you later learn is a "forced perspective" flat painted prop, used to give the Big Apple impression.

One prop building was of particular interest: one side was a typical small-town church; another side was what appeared to be the front of a large-city edifice.

Disney's studio tour spectacular unfolds as the tram goes into well-marked "do not enter" area, where filming is supposedly underway of a rain storm in on an oilfield location.

The tram goes near the sheet of falling rain; a high-line pole begins to fall with

wires hitting a loaded gasoline tanker which catches on fire, and in the ensuing mud-slide, begins to fall toward the loaded tram, which itself is apparently sliding in the rain-soaked mud. Quite an event—until it all goes back together and you're taken behind the scenes to see all the equipment necessary to pull off the computerized and safe stunt for tram after tram.

Remainder of the tour is a walk through water effects area, special effects, and soundstages (none in use at the time), editing and finally a theater with sneak peeks of new (Disney) movies.

An entertainment, but maybe not quite as slick yet as Universal's studio tour in California. Universal is already big in Florida for production and has an-

nounced the 1990 opening of a studio tour there in the heart of the tourist industry. The local papers in Orlando carry stories about which studio is shooting what, and there appears to be great competition for television series and theater movies.

We didn't look, but Disney has just opened Pleasure Island, a themed, entertainment center with nightclubs for dining and live entertainment at (\$14.95 cover charge); and Typhoon Lagoon, a spectacular water park, \$17.50 adult, \$11.50 child.

Would that we could "do the Disney-thinking" in exploiting the Horned Frog Rip. He did it with a mouse.

Nutrition Program

During the years that we have had the Senior Centers opened we have been involved in several cases of Alzheimer's disease. This is one of the most difficult cases to handle. It wears out the patients and the caregiver. The diagnosis can only be made after death, thus the patient is not eligible for medicare. If you know of someone who has Alzheimer's disease, let the caregiver know that you are willing to assist them. Because they need relief from the anxiety of constant care to the patient. If you need guidance in the area of Alzheimer's disease call 442-2263.

Sheriff's Dept. News

A new deputy will be added to the Sheriff's Dept. by mid-August. David Franklin of the Houston Sheriff's Office, a former Eastland resident, will be returning to Eastland to fill the vacancy left when Morris Hardin moved to far west Texas.

James Holbrook, a certified officer who has been working as a part time jailer, will become the full time night jailer to replace one who is

getting substantially more money as a local ambulance driver. Holbrook will be a jailer, but he may also be used to transport prisoners.

The Eastland County pay scale is increasingly becoming a problem for Sheriff Dee Hogan as his deputies are offered more money elsewhere.

A domestic disturbance over children with their father not being return to their

mother's custody was reported. The subject was not at home and the case was referred to Constable Gene Hicks.

A missing bull was located and returned to its owner.

An arrest was made and charges were filed in California against a woman attempting to pass the missing checks of a Cisco couple.

A Cisco woman reported that a broken window had not

been paid for as agreed. Deputies are investigating.

All of the Sheriff's Dept. officers are scheduled to receive more narcotics training.

An investigation of the forging and passing of checks in Rising Star is underway. Arrests are expected to have been made by presstime.

A former Austin woman now residing in Ranger was transported to the Austin State Hospital.

Mental cases, which are becoming an increasing problem and expense for Eastland County, usually surface and demand immediate action

around midnight, according to Sheriff Hogan. An effort is now being made to set up a method whereby such cases can be safely and legally held in a local hospital room under the supervision of the city health officer until morning. In the past the legal process involving the District Attorney and the County Judge as well as officers was undertaken even in the middle of the night with the person immediately being transported to Austin.

are not able to afford professional help. Tax-Aide is sponsored by the AARP in cooperation with the Internal Revenue Service through its taxpayer educational program. The IRS provides the training, instructions and all material to support volunteers with their income tax counseling.

The AARP Tax-Aide program is now beginning to campaign to recruit volunteers to serve as income tax counselors for the elderly. The primary responsibilities of a Tax-Aide Counselor centers on helping older persons with their tax forms. This is accomplished by explaining special tax benefits that are available to them and preparing or advising of the tax forms. The counselor completes the forms but does not sign or mail them for the taxpayer.

Persons volunteering to serve as income tax counselors should have a sincere interest in serving older adults and have some knowledge of tax prepara-

tion. They should also be willing to participate in an Internal Revenue Training course and agree to devote at least four hours a week to provide counseling. Volunteers need not be retired nor do they need to be a member of AARP. Persons of any age are welcome. Volunteers provide assistance without charge and are not legally liable for the information which they provide.

The training for becoming a Tax-Aide/TCE counselor is provided by IRS tax trainers or by certified Tax-Aide Volunteer Instructors and is provided free of charge. Training sessions will be held in January and usually completed within a five day period. All material will be furnished by the IRS.

Tax-Aide Counselors are reimbursed, after completing the training and serving season, for any expenses incurred in carrying out their program relating activities. Counselors may itemize their daily expenses, such as, travel, meals, and telephone charges, that are connected with their work or training.

Glasgow is also a member of the Legislative Budget Board and the Texas Legislative Council.

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Fishing Outdoors

by Terry L. Wilson

Length and bag limits established for crappie in Lake Meredith in 1985 apparently have improved the crappie fishery, according to Texas Parks and Wildlife Department biologist Joe Kraai.

Kraai said creel surveys indicate the harvest has increased in each of the last three years. During 1986, fishermen harvested 9,350 crappie during the period April 1, through June 30. During the same period in 1987 they caught 21,000 fish. The harvest increased to 27,570 in 1988.

"Creel surveys through May this year indicate harvest rates have doubled since 1988, and fishing pressure also is up," said Kraai. He added that full analyses are not complete, but this year's crappie harvest may be an all-time record for the Panhandle reservoir.

Kraai said the average weight of crappie caught this year has been from 3/4 pound to one pound, but numerous fish in the 1 1/2 pound to two-pound range have been caught. He added that routine fish collections indicate large numbers of small crappie are present, leading biologists to believe fishing will be good in coming years.

Gordon Spot

By DeMarquis Gordon, County Agent—

The rain this last Wednesday was very much appreciated. Everyone in Eastland County had some rain, but not all had the same amount. The heaviest rain was in the Desdemona area. There was one report of, as much as, 8 inches in that area. Gorman had 3 to 4 inches. Lake Leon and Olden had 3 inches and the Ranger area had 3 to 5 inches. Eastland and Carbon received from .7 to 1 inch. The Western part of the county had less rain. From Pioneer to Cisco the reports range from .2 to .4 inch.

This rain came at a time

when we were beginning to show drought symptoms. This last general rain on June 13. Since that time the showers have been small and very local. A lot of the county had not had any rain since mid June.

Still, the peanut crop looked very good even before last Wednesday's rain. This good rain will be very beneficial since most of the peanuts are beginning to peg at this time. Peanut growers have to feel much better now.

This is also a very critical time for pecans as the nuts are beginning to make rapid growth and fill with water. The water requirements of pecans is great at this stage of development.

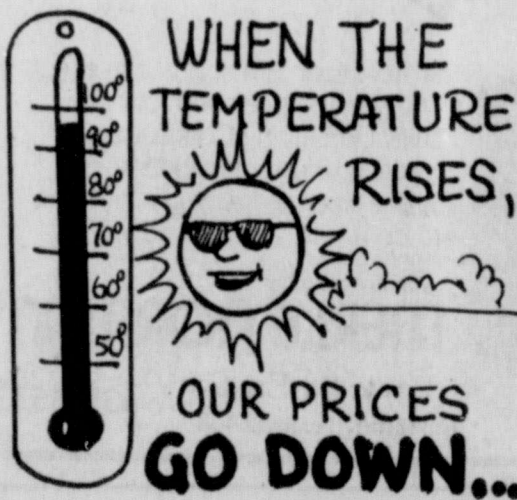
The rain will also assure a good supply of grazing for livestock. An abundant hay crop has already been made. The grass and forage crops still provided, grazing before the rain, but most forages were maturing, drying and losing quality. The rain should promote new growth.

Just as the rain was beneficial to crops it was equally beneficial to the growth of plant diseases. Now, we should keep a very close watch for leaf spot fungus on peanuts. The conditions are ideal for leaf spot, especially on Spanish peanuts.

Early detection of leaf spot requires close observation. Fungicide applications should begin at the first signs of leaf spot and be continued at suggested intervals. Several good fungicides are available. Uncontrolled leaf spot can reduce yields and lead to greater Southern Blight damages.

Leaf spot was showing up on mulberry trees even before the rain. This problem can only be worse now. Benomyl fungicide applied to 10 to 14 day intervals should give control of this disease on mulberry trees.

Pecan scab is another disease problem that usually occurs when we have high humidity and high temperature. Several fungicides are available to control this disease.

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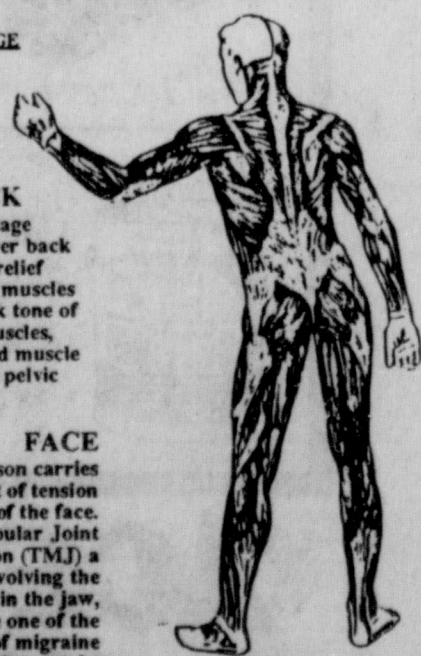

Wesley Valek Speaks At Cisco Rotary Club Last Thursday

Wesley Valek, history professor at Cisco Junior College, spoke at the regular meeting of the Cisco Rotary Club last Thursday. Mr. Valek told stories of early century bootleggers in Eastland County.

Mr. Valek started the study of Prohibition in Eastland County two years ago. He said prior to 1917 there were plenty of bootleggers in the county. He said it took about one week to build a good 100 gallon still.

There were several stills in the county. During one big raid south of Cisco, it was reported that the courthouse yard looked like a junk yard with all the confiscated stills.

In 1920 the Ranger Daily Times newspapers reported that a 10 ton steam tractor was built into a still. In the Cisco Daily News, there was a story about a 800 gallon still found at Cisco.

At times the whiskey was bad, and doctors had to treat several people with "Jake" after drinking it. Whiskey that was not treated is called white lightning.

It was very inexpensive to make. \$1.50 worth of supplies could make six gallons of whiskey that sold for \$3.00 a gallon. Supplies were bought from this area. The surrounding towns were given nicknames for their bootleg supplies. Scranton was known as Sugar City, and Nimrod was known as Copper City for their stills.

Mr. Valek had interviewed several local citizens who remembered what it was like during prohibition. One story was that one bootlegger's security system, was that when the revenuers came around, his children were to have a parade and beat on pots and pans. A bootlegger's insurance was to give away free whiskey to

local neighbors.

Valek said most of the law officers did not take bribes, but they were always thirsty. He said during raids there usually was no violence, but occasionally it did flare up. He told of a story about a man who was shot down on the main street in Cisco, because he horned in on another bootlegger's territory. He said there were lots of killings in the Ranger area. It was mean around that part of the county.

Valek said the major source of income for Texas was cotton until the price dropped in 1920, and the oil boom was the money maker. In 1925 an oil boom bust hit this area so man went to whiskey to support his family. In 1933 a Texas law was passed so that 2 percent beer could be sold. After that the Feds came in and made raids, not for the stills, but because of taxes. In 1942 the rationing of sugar was the downfall of the bootlegger.

Accidental Discovery May End Obesity

WASHINGTON - Obesity may be controlled naturally with a new type of pill, discovered by accident, a research scientist confirmed recently. In studies, scientists noted an unusual side effect. Patients receiving an ingredient in what is now being called FS-1 all lost weight, while body weight in control groups remained constant.

Scientists say the mechanism behind the weight reduction is not clear, but suggest it is partially due to a decrease in the intestinal absorption of calorie-rich dietary fats. Although scientists for some time have known of substances with the capability of producing this effect, the dramatic impact on weight reduction was not known until recently.

The director of research and development at National Dietary Research, an organization committed to the investigation and research of nutritional solutions to world-wide health problems, stated, "The mechanism by which FS-1 works to decrease body weight is actually a more complex and sophisticated process called nutri-bonding. When chewed and swallowed immediately before meals, FS-1 releases nutrients with low calorie content into the body, while high-calorie fats are eliminated, thus providing optimum nutrition and a minimum number of calories."
