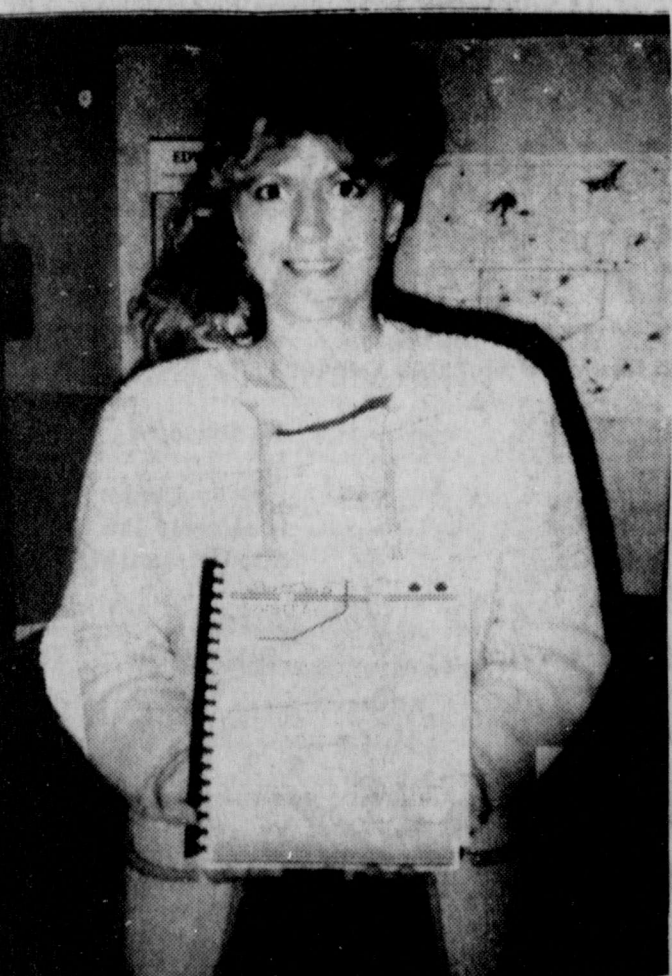

Several counties who already have a prison are also trying to obtain another prison for their county. These counties are Liberty, Falls, Scurry (Snyder) Childress and Karnes counties. Most of the counties are in east Texas and every county that already has a prison has applied again which should say that the benefits of a prison located in a county are substantial. The Pecos area and Medina county (San Antonio) in far southwest Texas are the only ones in that area who are applying for a prison.

The Eastland County proposal has detail descriptions of health care, education facilities, housing, playground, minerals and descriptions of the proposed prison site. There are maps and photos of the county in the copy of the Eastland County, Gateway To West Texas.

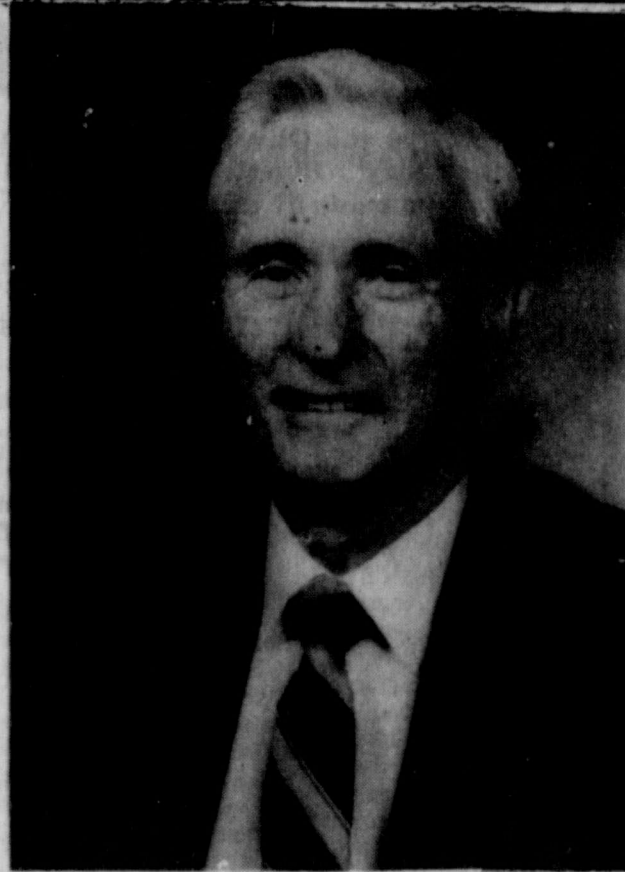

## Jack Kennedy Retires From West Texas Utilities: Gary L. Wilson Is New Manager At Cisco Office

Gary L. Wilson has been named to replace Jack Kennedy as local manager of the West Texas Utilities Company office in Cisco. The announcement was made recently by WTU district manager Cleve Evans in Abilene. The change became effective August 1.

Wilson has been with WTU for five years and has been serving as a management assistant in San Angelo. Kennedy is retiring after serving as Cisco local manager since 1977.

Wilson began working for the company as a collector in San Angelo. He was made a management trainee in 1985, and was named management assistant in April, 1987.

He was born in San Angelo and graduated from San Angelo Central High School.

He received a bachelor of science degree in agriculture from Angelo State University in 1980. He served in the U.S. Army from 1970-72.

Wilson, a Presbyterian, is a member of the Cisco Lions Club. He and his wife, Ruby, a registered nurse, are the parents of two children: Randall, 7, and Scott, 4.

Kennedy is a 42-year veteran of WTU, having begun his career in 1947 as a groundman on a line crew at Stamford. His first job as local manager was at Spur in 1966. From there he transferred to Wellington and served

for four years until he took the Cisco position.

He is a native of West Texas, having been born at Haskell. He attended the Haskell Public Schools. He joined the U.S. Navy and served from 1943-46 as a coxswain in the Pacific during World War II.

Kennedy is a member of the Masonic Lodge at Stamford, and has also been a member of the Lions Club at Spur and at Cisco.

He and his wife, Nora, have six children and stepchildren, and several grandchildren.

The Ranger Police Dept. arrested a juvenile for burglary.

## C.I.S.D. Dress Code Released For Students

The district's dress code is established to teach hygiene, instill discipline, prevent disruption, avoid safety hazards, and assert authority. Students are expected to come to school looking clean and neat, and dressed in a manner which is accepted as being in good taste, according to an announcement by Phil Warren, high school principal.

The dress code is listed as follows:

1. No shorts other than walking shorts are acceptable. (AT THE KNEE)

2. Shoes shall be part of regular attire.

3. Fishnet shirts, bare midriffs, backless outfits, halter-tops, cut-offs, see-through clothing, shirts split up the side, shirts with unhemmed sleeves, or muscle shirts are prohibited.

4. Clothing with vulgar, indecent slogans or pictures shall not be permitted.

5. Clothing which advertises or promotes merchandise which is not allowed on the campus is prohibited.

6. Warm-ups will not be permitted.

7. Skirts should be of an appropriate length.

The student and parent may determine the student's personal dress and grooming standards, provided that the student's dress and grooming:

1. Shall not lead school officials to believe that such dress or grooming will disrupt, interfere with, disturb, or detract from school activities.

2. Shall not create a health or other hazard to the students safety or to the safety of others.

# Letters To The Editor

Editor,  
Isn't Eastland County part of Texas? That was the first question to come to mind as I began hearing of the efforts made to have the state save us by GIVING us a new prison. I was wondering if the Rahrah enthusiasm was a sign of the times, not the economic situation, but the let's not help ourselves if someone else can do it for us. I wasn't too overwhelmed back then about having a prison here and really am not now, but I felt that my thoughts and experience might be helpful to those who aren't sure where they stand on this issue.

After months of airing a promotional message on the cable tv advertisement channel that was pointless and did not address the prison issue,

there was an article in the newspaper telling of a bus trip to the Palestine facility. This poor attempt at journalism detailed the meal at McDonald's and the bus ride in greater detail than the prison and the surrounding area. (I'm sorry if I offended the author, but it didn't sell the prison if that was its intent.) Now we are invited to again view the "instructional film" on having a prison by Dr. Barnes. I don't really know what qualifies him to be in charge of bringing a prison here. I am sure that he is a good person and has the best interests at heart. His answers were so general that you could easily read anything that you would like into them. For example the promise of 800 or 500 new jobs is made in such a way that you hope that it is meant for Eastland County residents, but how practical is it to believe that our population has the persons skilled in the specialized areas required? I could find more examples as there were many. I have seen in two recent editorials by Mittie Bledsoe that reasonable people have given this issue some thoughtful consideration.

I can understand how the business people of this county would like to see the people afford to patronize at their establishments and understand how parents would like to see their children and grandchildren remain nearby. With all the hopes and desires for these things, has anyone thought of what will be traded for this new prosperity? I left Texas and worked in

New Orleans as a police officer with nine years on the street before retiring and returning. I also attended college and got my degrees in Criminal Justice and Applied Behavioral Sciences. So what I am about to write has its basis in fact and actual experiences.

A prison is NOT the answer to Eastland's economic revival. The increased tax burden and the lowered quality of life would cost more than any number of new jobs. People in prison aren't there for forgetting to wash their car. The Texas Department of Corrections statistics states that 80% of the Texas state prison population is made of minorities. That in itself may not appear to be a possible problem, but let's just look at this one item.

I remember a white back reading an editorial written by someone who was professing his pride in being a bigot. The first time he or some other bigot sees a welfare momma and her tribe of anklebiters getting out of their welfare Cadillac the stage will be set. Maybe those same persons find that a car trip from Dallas, Houston, where ever is too far to travel to visit her man in the prison, so she might have to move here to

be closer to him. If the man gets a weekend pass, he will be here in the county to be with her. Prisoners are also made trustees and allowed to work outside the prison. Now she has to get her welfare benefits and food stamps. When her children get hurt, they go to the hospital and she doesn't pay as she expects the government to do it for her. Her children go to school, are different, and become disruptive. Trouble begins to follow her and the children. The children having nothing to do, get into more trouble out of school. If a bigot or group of zealots decided that enough is enough and tries running her out of the county, you will have some bleeding heart liberal lawyer come down and file all kinds of civil rights charges against her county for not protecting her rights.

That was only one of many possible scenarios. This would be a cause of an increase in unemployed people in the county requiring an increase in social (welfare) services which means hiring more police and case workers. Well there are more jobs, but also a higher tax rate paid by the working people of the county and its home owners. There may even be a need for

public transportation. Living in the bigger cities teach many members of minority groups to rely solely on the police or other government agency to support them and their lifestyle. An example of one of the most ridiculous misuse of a police officer's time is when an elderly black man called about a domestic problem. The police were dispatched to settle an argument of who had the right to decide which television channel should be watched. It was a common practice to call the police every time a welfare momma went into labor and count on being brought to the hospital. We really didn't have the time to extend these social services as we were averaging a murder a night during the week days and three a night during the weekend. I am not speaking of the city, only the district in which I was assigned which was less than one-ninth of the city. The crime encouraged me to return to Texas. I sure don't want to see the county invite that here.

There was only passing mention of attracting some company to invest in Eastland County a vague excuse that company restructuring could cause us to lose it as quickly as it arrives. That's what has been bothering me about the whole prison situation. The unspoken demands that imply to work for it or don't bother living in Eastland County. Why doesn't the Chamber of Commerce or a few individuals take the initiative form a company and produce something locally. I would think that there is still enough oil money in this area to put up the capital for a business venture or why not look into starting a corporation, selling shares and open it? There are many possible business areas in which we have a natural advantage. Hasn't any one tried to get a peanut butter manufacturing plant or at least attracted one of the peanut butter companies to this area? Why doesn't someone try a Texas Barbecue Meats mail order company? I'm sure that there are other businesses, besides the aforementioned.

Whenever you turn to someone else to solve your problem, you turn over more than just the problem. Do we really want to turn over Eastland County?

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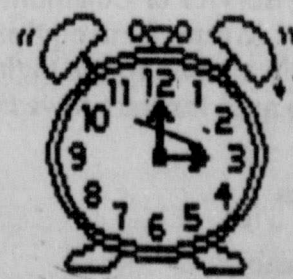

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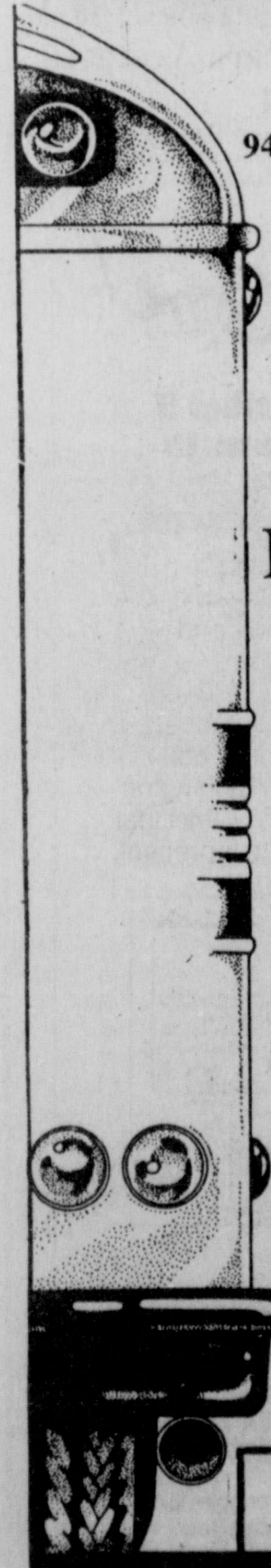

Today, it's Florida, California or Tokyo for W.D.'s Magic Kingdom, the first, the biggest and the original theme park against which the hundreds of operating today are judged. Most of us have had a pretty good introduction, thanks to the multiply-tie-in connections between television, movies and publications about the basic park. Exactly what do you find? We can but guess about the

Japanese version, but the two domestic parks are cut from the same cloth, at least on the surface. We understand that the newer Florida park has a total, separate underground support system, for employees. Visitors above ground are advised to be in reasonable good health and wear comfortable shoes. (Provisions for the handicapped above however.) After parking (at \$3), free tramming to entrance (either to ticket booths or through turnstiles, you're immediately into Main St.

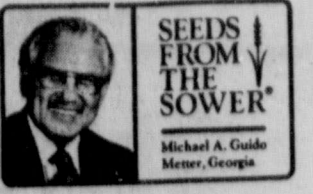
U.S.A. near depot for the park-encircling steam train. There's food, shops and services and the main boulevard which leads to the center piece Cinderella's Castle, preceded by a junction from which you can shoot off to the various lands: clockwise—Adventure, Frontier, Liberty, Fantasy, Mickey's Birthday and Tomorrow. We did it years ago with small children and of course they are the ones who enjoy it most and naturally they pretty much want to do each and every thing, so it makes for a mighty long day. This trip, adults did a lot of picking and choosing; re-doing some that are treasured in memory and skipping a lot. (The Disney guidebooks you're given are excellent, with clear, color-coded

graphics which make finding things easy. It would be disaster without them.) Each "land" has attractions, restaurants and snacks and shops, themed. For Adventure, there's the Swiss Family Treehouse, Jungle Cruise, tropical, Serenade and Pirates of the Caribbean. In Frontierland, there's the Big Thunder Mountain Railroad Ride, Tom Sawyer Island, Country Bear Jamboree, a shootin' arcade as well as the Diamond Horseshoe Jamboree (a "saloon-type" musical, comedy floor show.) In Liberty Square, there's a riverboat (full size), and keelboat rides, the Haunted Mansion, and the Hall of Presidents, in which full size statues of all the presidents "come to life" by computer.

A real moving experience. Fantasyland (where the little kids shine) has the Mad Tea Party Ride, 20,000 League Under the Sea (we re-enjoyed this simulated under-water ride), Mr. Toad's Wild Ride, Snow White's Adventures and Magic Journeys (a 3-D movie motion picture experience), Dumbo, the Flying Elephant, Cinderella's Golden Carousel and everybody's favorite, It's a Small World Ride, Peter Pan's Flight, a band stand and skyway ride. Tomorrowland offers Mission to Mars, American Journeys, If You Could Fly, PeopleMover, Star-Jets, Carousel of Progress, Space Mountain, Grand Prix Raceway and a Tomorrowland Theatre.

Florida's not a bad place to visit, but who'd want to live there? In Texas, there's Six Flags, Astro-World, Sea-World, Rangers and Cowboys, Oilers and Astros, and Opry-Land is on

its way. Not to forget, the Alamo and Old Rip. There might not be room for Disney here. '89 Memories worth keeping: caught out in a rain without an umbrella; stumbling and dumping two soft drinks down the back of a fellow tourist, and having her turn, laugh and say, "Hey, these things happen. Forget it"; missing the tram and hot-footing it wearily many miles to the parked car; and among many others, the joy of that sign that finally reads: "Welcome to Texas."

## Alternative Fuel For State Owned 'Automobiles'

An alternative fuel bill that requires use of clean burning fuels such as compressed natural gas (CNG) in thousands of state vehicles, school buses and mass transit coaches has been approved by the legislature.

The bill is the second piece of a two-part legislative package proposed by Mauro that will both improve air quality and give the Texas economy a boost by encouraging the increased use of natural gas. Both bills await the governor's signature.

"This legislation gives Texas the strongest alternative fuels program in the United States and makes our Clean Air Act second only to California's," Mauro said. "I am pleased that the legislature has taken this firm stand for improved air quality."

The alternative fuels bill requires use of CNG or other alternative fuels in state-owned or operated fleets with more than 15 vehicles, school districts with more than 50 buses and local transit authorities. A phased-in conversion begins in 1991 and would run through 1998.

The bill anticipates private financing for the conversions and provides for a waiver if reasonable financing is unavailable.

Burning CNG cuts carbon monoxide emissions by half, emissions of nitrogen oxide by 30 percent and hydrocarbon emissions by 40 percent. Emissions of particulates and exhaust hydrocarbons are virtually eliminated. In addition, increased sales of natural gas will be a boon to the economy. Texas boasts 26 percent of the

known natural gas reserves in the lower 48 states. Studies by Southern Methodist University and the state comptroller's office show that increased use of 1 trillion cubic feet of natural gas over a five-year period will create 50,000 to 100,000 jobs in Texas.

"Three reports in the last six months have cited Texas as the worst polluter of air in the nation. The Texas legislature has begun the effort to turn that reputation around. Now, we are in the forefront of the environmental movement to clean up the air," Mauro said.

The bill also levies a surcharge for burning fuel oil in industrial and utility boilers between April 15 and October 15 in the non-attainment counties. Those are the peak months for ozone pollution. Private fleets of more than 25 vehicles and local government fleets of 15 or more vehicles would have to convert to CNG or other alternative fuel starting in 1996 if the Texas Control Board finds emissions are being notably reduced by earlier conversions.

A Thought For The Day...

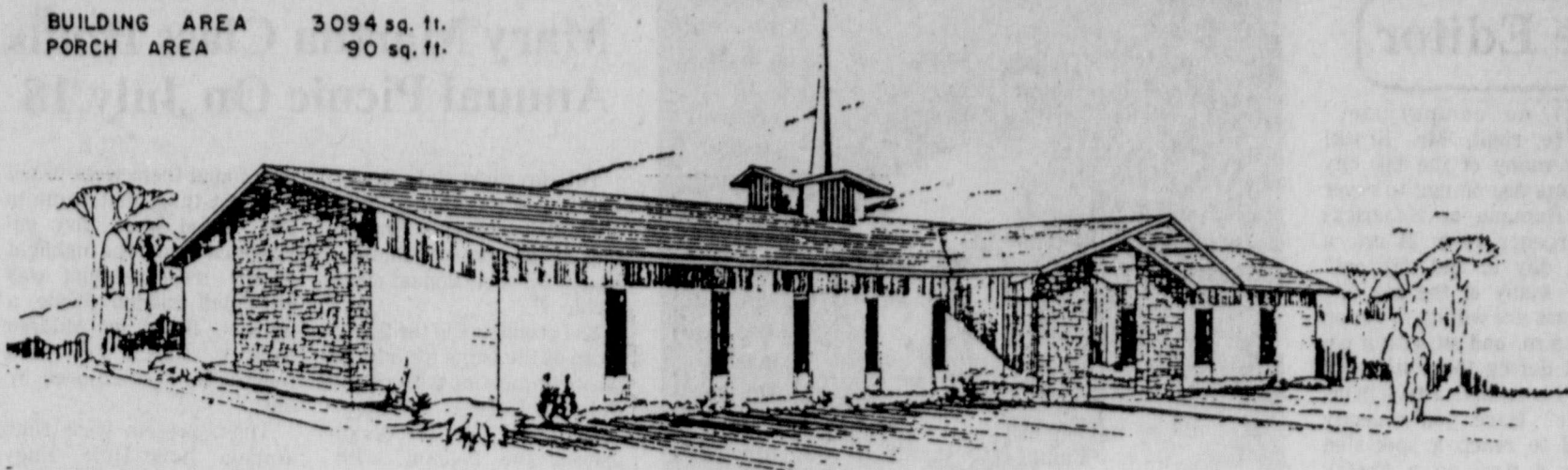

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## New Spanish Church Building Is Planned

A meeting was held Monday night at the Cisco Baptist Associational office in Cisco to plan and launch efforts to build a new Spanish-speaking church building in Eastland County.

Associational churches in Albany, Cisco, Eastland, Ranger and Gorman have been helping to support Primera Iglesia Bautista, the Spanish-speaking First Baptist Church at Eastland, and the missions which the church operates in the towns of the supporting churches.

There are a number of Spanish speaking people in the area who don't understand English very well. The Spanish-speaking church and missions have been a very successful outreach to these people, and had been used as an example for Texas Baptists.

A need has arisen for a new building for the fast-growing Spanish church, and two acres

of land west of Eastland on Hwy. 80 have been provided.

Primera Iglesia Bautista has a building fund, and two loans from Southern Baptist agencies have been approved. This church is the first church to receive approval for one of the loans, which is interest-free.

A 34 ft. by 90 ft. wood-frame building on a concrete slab is being planned for the church. The 3,094 square foot building will seat nearly 150 people for worship services. Seven classrooms and restrooms will be included.

A construction foreman is to be selected, and volunteer labor will be used to construct the church building. Some volunteer help from Cisco Association Baptist Churches is expected.

A completion date has not been projected, but hopefully the building will be "in the dry" by winter.

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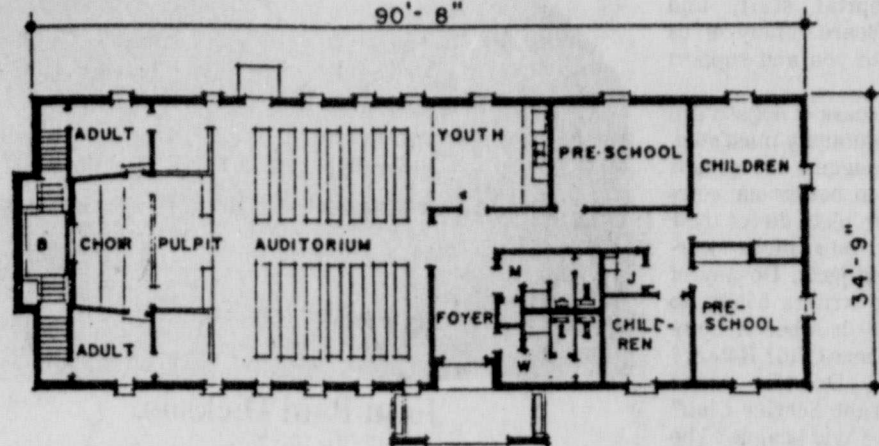
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## Deathless Day A Bright Spot In Texas Summer

Thirteen isn't always an unlucky number. According to early reports, June 13, 1989, was the first day without a Texas traffic death in more than a decade.

"It appears that Texas may have finally achieved a deathless day, and we're delighted to see it," announced George R. Gustafson, president of Texas Safety Association and a spokesperson for the Texas Coalition for Safety Belts. "Before June 13, the most recent day without a traffic death in Texas was January 5, 1977. I'd say we were long overdue."

However, Gustafson said the safety belt coalition would wait until the end of summer before declaring its "ONE DEATHLESS DAY" campaign an unqualified success.

"There is the possibility of late fatality reports being received," said David Wells, information officer at the Department of Public Safety.

According to DPS statistical procedures, anyone who dies of traffic-related injuries within 30 days after a wreck is counted as a fatality on the day the wreck occurred. The 30-day waiting period for June 13 has already passed, but wells said there could be follow-up reports that the DPS hasn't received yet.

"In any case," said Gustafson, "we hope that we have reversed a trend this summer. Texas traffic deaths increased in calendar year 1988, the first such increase since 1984. We want those numbers to go down again in 1989."

To that end, the coalition

spokesperson urged all motorists to continue driving carefully and to buckle up. "We still have a month remaining, and another holiday weekend, in the vacation season," he said.

The summer's deadliest day so far was June 3, with 21 fatalities reported. However, Gustafson noted that Texas had only 34 traffic deaths over the Independence Day weekend. Five additional holiday fatalities have been reported since the weekend concluded, for a preliminary total of 39. "This is far fewer than the 52 originally predicted by the DPS," Gustafson said.

Fourteen major Texas cities reported a fatality-free Independence Day weekend in the coalition-sponsored "Give Death A Holiday" promotion. They were Abilene, Amarillo, Austin, Beaumont, Brownsville, Bryan/College Station, Corpus Christi, Fort Worth, Laredo, Lubbock, Midland, Tyler, Waco, and Wichita Falls.

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## Letters To The Editor

Dear Editor,

It is very discouraging to have read several letters in recent issues of THE CISCO PRESS which have been so negative, and contained a lot of misguided information.

For instance, Mr. Herman Eakers implied that he had paid \$300 in hospital taxes in 1988. Upon checking with the Eastland County Tax Appraisal District, which records are public, it was found that Mr. Eakers paid a total of \$153.63 hospital taxes. This was for 6 pieces of property, including personal property. Hospital taxes on his home, which I assume is listed as the Belmont holding, were \$32.32. (Thirty-two dollars and thirty-two cents.)

The story that I heard about the man with the brain tumor was quite different than that printed in Mr. Eaker's letter. As I understand it, the patient fainted while buying gasoline, and was taken by ambulance to the Cisco Hospital because of new ambulance guidelines. He did not want to go to the Cisco Hospital, and his usual family physician was Dr. Treadwell of Eastland. Upon contacting Dr. Treadwell, arrangements were made for continuing care with him. The patient was not denied treatment at Cisco.

The innuendos and slurs against the elected Hospital Board members (that's right, the member who has abstained from signing the recent questionnaire is not an elected Board member), the First National Bank, and Cisco doctors is deplorable. The Board members are working hard at a thankless job to try to keep the hospital open for those many people who DO want a community hospital, and those who do not have the means or ability to travel out of town for care. Thank you, Mr. Conner, Mrs. Donovan, Mrs. McCracken, and Mr. Morgan. Some of us do appreciate you and your efforts.

Also, thank you First National Bank for being civic-minded enough to permit the Board to include their questionnaire in your routine mailings, just as you have included many other public interest mailings. Many of us do appreciate you, your Board, and your employee's efforts. May you be strong enough to endure the many brickbats continually slung at you.

To touch on the subject of the Cisco Hospital and doctors. How can a rural hospital hope to have as good facilities and staffing as a large city hospital, when they are forced to operate at a loss? I believe Mr. Brock's letter stated, "The facilities are for (sic) much better than we have in the rural hospital. And as for as to (sic) the doctors, there are

(sic) no comparison." You're right, Mr. Brock! How many of the big city doctors are on call to cover the Humana or Hendricks emergency room 24 hrs. a day, day in and day out? How many of the big city doctors are willing to get up at 2 a.m. and sit with a patient during the crisis of a heart or asthma attack in his home? Have you recently tried to reach a specialist after 4 p.m. on a Friday afternoon? Or on a holiday? Thank you, Cisco doctors, and hospital staff, and elected Board. Many of us appreciate you and support you.

This disease of negativism in our community must stop. I would suggest the groups meeting to better our community projects direct their energies into more worthwhile projects. Do any of the letter writers belong to the Cisco Chamber of Commerce? Lions Club? Rotary? Kiwanis? Do the wives belong to the Service Club? The Cisco Civic League? The Hospital Auxiliary? Have any of the people who are so loud in their criticisms ever served on the United Fund Board? We haven't had a United Fund drive in this city in 2-3 years. Why? Mainly because previous years' workers are worn out. There are so many worthwhile projects in town that the community-minded people working on them simply can't do them all. Those residents who are struggling to make the community more prosperous, and a better place to live don't have time to sit, criticize, and plot on how to destroy community betterment projects.

The hospital letter which was distributed was an attempt to reach as many people as possible, without spending a large amount of money. As I understand it, it is just an opinion poll. The letter clearly states that NO response is a NEGATIVE vote. If there is not an overwhelming positive response, the hospital will be closed. It is important that all voters know that the increase in taxes is only for two years until legislation is passed by our national Congress and will take effect to allow smaller hospitals to operate above the break-even mark. Sadly, I must close with the thought, regardless of which faction wins the hospital battle, pro or con, what will be the price of victory?

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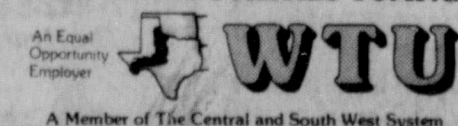
