Eastland voters will decide on September 16, if they want to have an Eastland hospital district, with a tax increase of 30 cents per \$100 valuation. The Cisco hospital asked for a tax increase of 28 cents per \$100 valuation.

Some of the local citizens believe that if the E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital does close down then the projected higher tax will be a thing of the past. But if E.L. Graham does close down, and with the financial problems that Ranger Hospital is having it is believed that the Eastland Hospital will probably become a county hospital and the Cisco area will go into the Eastland hospital district. The citizens of Cisco will then have to pay their tax rate, which is more than what the Cisco hospital is asking for. Plus they will also have to pay for the bonds on the Cisco hospital building.

I hope that the people of Cisco will begin to take care of what is in their town, and support their hospital, and not have to end up paying for the Eastland hospital and pay for an empty building that was once the Cisco hospital.

There are a lot of people who did not realize this, and who think that if the Cisco hospital closes down, this will take care of all the problems, but it won't. Please remember this and support our local hospital.

There are rumors going around about how easy it will be to get to the Eastland Hospital in case of an emergency if the Cisco hospital does close down. But when my mother was alive and we had to take her to the hospital in an emergency with her heart, we were very happy that she did not have to be taken the extra miles to be treated. When she was brought in to E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital, the nurses on duty began treatment immediately and was in touch with her doctor, who came down to the hospital in short time.

I have heard other stories from other families who faced the same situation and were glad that there was a hospital here in Cisco.

The doctors said that ear piercing is fine in the lower soft lobe, but any cartilage area, whether in the ear or nose is highly susceptible to infection from bacteria because blood does not circulate through the cartilage areas.

The doctor said if the slightest pain or inflammation is noticed in the pierced cartilage area, the person should be seen by a physician immediately so that treatment with intravenous antibiotics can begin.

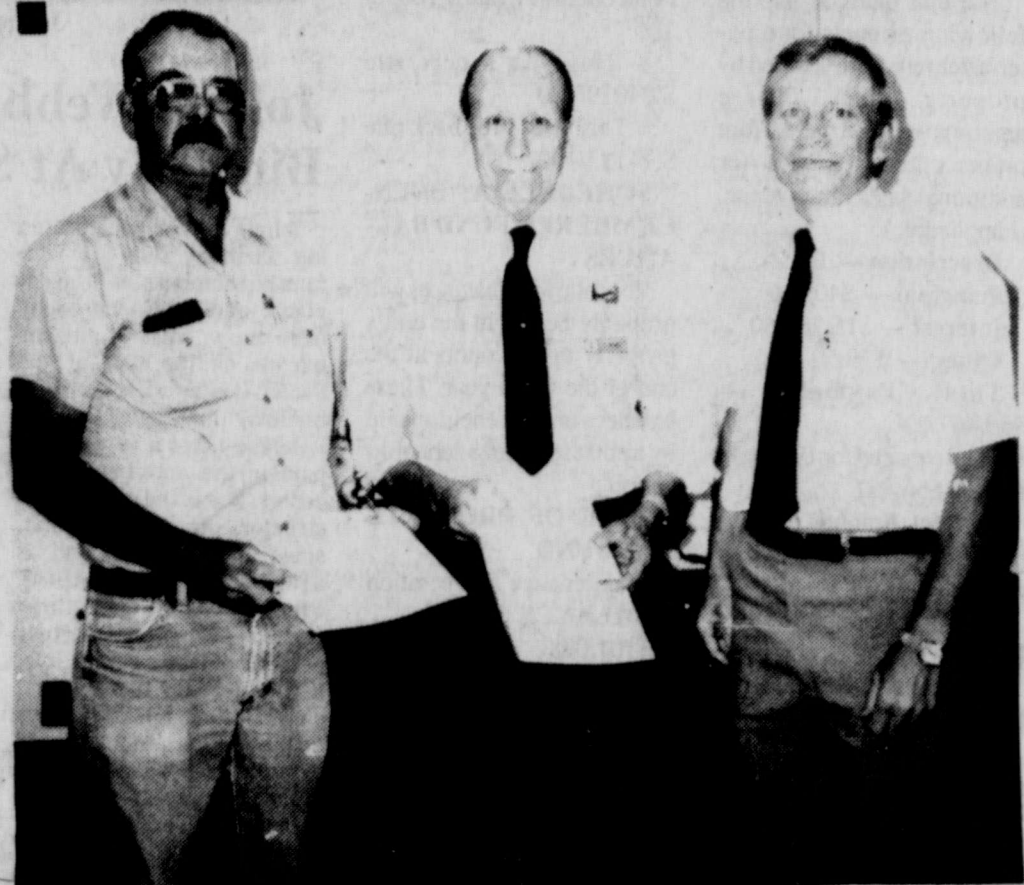

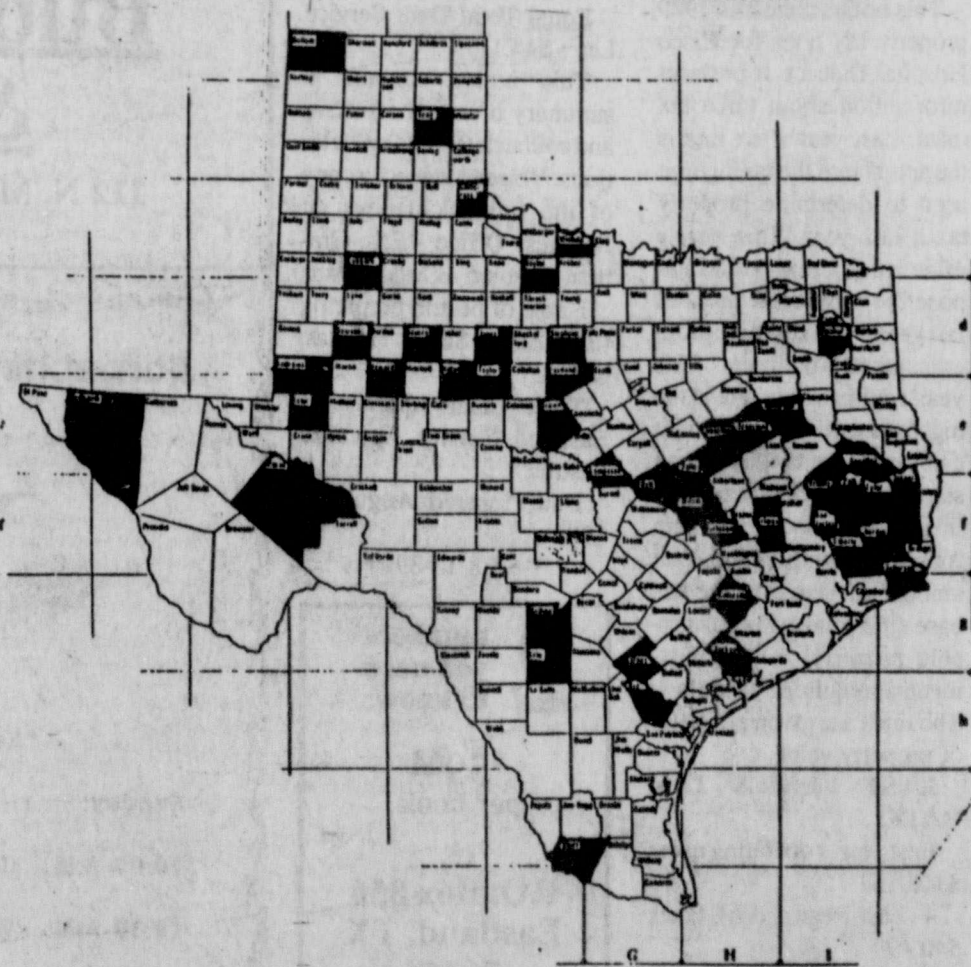
Two men received letters of recognition and pins for their accumulated hours. Ed Wende, distribution and window clerk received a pin for having over 2,500 hours of sick leave. Mr. Wende has worked for the post office for 28 years. James Wood,

rural carrier for Route 4, received a pin for having over 2,000 hours of sick leave. Mr. Wood has worked for the post office for 26 years.

profit corporation and public charity whose members are primarily those of the various Chambers of Commerce within Eastland County. Its members and volunteers have worked very hard for the past eight months to get a state prison for this area. This effort involved gathering a multitude of detailed information about the county, looking for an appropriate prison site, arranging for financing the purchase of the land, supplying the utilities and presenting a written proposal to the Texas Department of Corrections (TDC) indicating

the desirability of this region as a location for the state facility. The whole effort was completed in mid August and hand-carried to Huntsville for review by Prison officials.

Forty-six other counties have submitted similar proposals and the competition for locations is fierce. Actual siting of the prison will depend on several factors but will primarily be that of cost to the state. This is determined by transportation costs in distributing supplies from TDC Central Warehouses, costs of local (Continued On Next Page)

City Council Approves Eastland County Jail Contract Tuesday

The Cisco City Council met for their regular meeting last Tuesday. Council members approved a contract with Eastland County for Jail Services. The contract explains in detail as to when a prisoner becomes the responsibility of Eastland County and not the City of Cisco.

The City of Cisco will be responsible for any processing of city prisoners through its identification procedures and after the prisoner is booked into the Eastland County Jail. The city will furnish and reimburse the county for costs of all necessary medical treatment, hospitalization and ambulance charges for all city prisoners who are or become injured or sick before or after being booked in the Eastland County Jail.

According to the contract the City of Cisco will pay \$30 per day to the county for each city prisoner booked into the Eastland County Jail.

In other matters on the agenda, council members voted for city manager Mike Moore to solicit two auditing companies to service the city. Joe Cooper, CPA, present city auditor, sent a letter to the city manager stating that he will not be able to be an independent auditor for the city, due to new auditing

restrictions. Moore will bring the results of the soliciting before the council members at the August 22, meeting.

Council members tabled the fire fighting contract that was on the agenda until the next meeting.

Council members accepted the termination of the FBO agreement with the city of Cisco and Martin G. Lutz, who managed the city airport. City manager Moore said they will look at other proposals for the management of the air port.

Council members approved a motion to temporarily close the 100 block of East 5th street, on Saturday, August 26, from 5 p.m. till midnight, so that the Cisco High School Senior Class can have a street dance.

Councilman John Muller said there will not be any problems with the students having the dance. The dance will be properly chaperoned and the students always clean up after the dance.

Council members attending the meeting were John Muller, Bural Chamber, Vernetta Pierce and Olin Odom, III. Also attending the meeting were city secretary Ginger Johnson, city manager Mike Moore and Cisco Mayor Joe Wheatley.

City Holds Public Hearing To Explain About Grant

Four citizens attended a Public Hearing held by the City of Cisco last Tuesday in the council chambers. City Manager Mike Moore spoke to the group.

Moore said the City of Cisco will apply for a grant from the State of Texas for housing rehabilitation. He said if the grant is approved, then the city will not have to match funds with the grant.

He said if the grant is approved the money will be spent to revitalize at least 25 homes in Cisco. He said an average amount of \$6,000 in grant money will be spent per home. Moore said the homes must be owned by low-to-moderate low income families.

Moore said if the City of Cisco is awarded the grant then the people who are needing these repairs can come in and apply for the grant. He said the money

will be used to add installation, fix roofs, replace new windows and general weatherization of local homes.

Moore stressed that this will be of no cost to home owners. He said the only inconvenience to the home owner will be having their home worked on by contractors.

Moore said the application has to be submitted by September 1, and the grant will be awarded to the chosen city after January, 1990. He said a total of \$1,300,858 will be awarded out to five cities for these grants.

The city will have another public hearing at 5:30 p.m., on Tuesday, August 22, concerning this grant. All interested citizens are encouraged to attend the meeting.

utilities, costs of the building site, construction costs at a particular location, nearness to primary residence of prisoners who will be encouraged to receive visiting parents and loved ones on a regular basis. It is believed that our rather large proposal adequately describes the assets of Eastland County for purpose of supporting a state prison.

We now enter a period of waiting for all of the various proposals to receive an evaluation by TDC. We were told that there will possibly be a site visit to our county by prison experts as early as late August. The purpose of this visit would be to verify the ability of Eastland County to provide all of the elements described in the proposal. Following this verification, our report will be compared with other proposals by members of the Board of Criminal Justice. This Board is the organization established this year by the legislature to supervise all prison activities. Certain

all final site locations are concurred in by the legislators involved and perhaps by the Governor. Announcements of prison siting should come in two phases. First announcement of two new prisons should be made this fall. Their construction was funded in a previous legislative session. The location of the balance of 6-8 prisons will be made about February assuming that the taxpayers vote in November to fund additional prisons as established by the current legislative budget.

What are our chances of getting one of these new prisons? If one looks at it statistically there are at least 8 more prisons to be built utilizing proposals from 46 counties. This is a 17 percent possibility for any one county to get a prison. This includes Eastland County. We believe because we are ideally located for a prison and we have a superior proposal that our chances are far better than this!!

Bullock Supports Less Regulations

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said recently, that less regulation and increasing consumer demand will result in higher natural gas tax revenue for the state.

Bullock has raised his 1989-91 natural gas tax revenue estimate by \$92.9 million for a total of \$1.7 billion over the three year period.

"This is good news for Texas. It means more revenue for the state and more jobs for Texans," Bullock said.

The natural gas industry hit a slump in the early 1980s, due largely to federal regulations, excess gas supplies and competition from other energy sources.

But one reason demand for natural gas has increased is that it is considered a cleaner fuel, and more environmentally sound, than some other energy sources.

Increased demand can only be good for Texas, which produces and consumes more natural gas than any other state. The Lone Star State produced one-third of all natural gas in

the nation in 1988, and used one-fifth of the nation's production that same year.

Fishing Outdoors

By Terry Wilson

FISHING OUTDOORS

Area catfishermen are having a high old time on the trotlines. Some excellent channel cats in the 2 to 4 pound range are being taken around the 12 foot range near the creek channels. And the preferred bait has been 'minnows.' Simply thread the minnows on the hook just like you would a worm.

A few nice yellow cats have been reported. And if the trend runs as did last year the yellow cats will only improve over the next month. Live perch and cut shad are both producing.

Texas hunting and fishing licenses are now available at Texas Parks and Wildlife Department offices and retail license outlets across the state.

Current hunting and fishing licenses and stamps expire August 31 and the new licenses take effect Sept. 1.

New hunting and fishing regulation guides also should be available from most outlets this week, officials said. The free guides contain information on license and stamp requirements, season bag limits and other useful information.

And the name I have come to look for is 'Storm Manufacturing of Norman, Okla.'

Storm has placed its mark on the tackle industry with lures such as the 'Texas Shad.' Normally retrieved at high rates of speed to maximize the distintively different 'Whirring' sound chamber. But over the years I have come to rely on a somewhat different application for this proven fish catcher. Bridge pilings and rocks are always holding some excellent fish. Lowering your 'Texas Shad' down on or near bottom, tip your rod tip upward and then allow the bait to fall again. Watch your line as it descends and hang on. Repeat this process all the way to the surface. The rocks and pilings will act as echo chambers and call them hawks in.

Another of my favorite 'Storm' producers is the 'Mangum Wiggle Wart.' A big lipped double deep crank bait, this hawg hustler can rake the bottom with its own unique 'fishing calling rattle system.'

The mag wart is loaded for the big ones with two lead rattles strategically positioned and restricted in its movement for balance and stability. You say two rattles don't rattle you cage. Well the folks at Storm also placed 10 free-floating copper caolted BB's in the Mangum Wart to produce that fine tuned 'Chattering' that really aggravates the big ones.

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Number Of Services Available At Central Texas Opportunities Inc. Centers

Central Texas Opportunities, Inc. is a private, non-profit organization that provides social services to the needy in the Central Texas area. Counties currently under its sponsorship are: Coleman, Comanche, Brown, Runnels, Callahan, Stephens, McCulloch and Eastland. The main office is located in Coleman. Each County has one or more Multi-Purpose Centers and Head Start Centers, with Eastland County Head Start Center located in Cisco and the Multi-Purpose Center located in Eastland.

Each County has a Center Director who is available to assist anyone in need. Some of the services provided by the Centers include assistance in application preparation of forms for: AFDC, Food Stamps, Weatherization, medical claims and energy assistance; information and referrals to other helping agencies; commodity distribution; food pantry; clothing room and other programs listed below.

The Medical Transportation Program provides transportation for Medicaid recipients to and from doctors, dentists, hospitals, clinics, or the pharmacy.

Another program provided by CTO is the Weatherization Program. It provides weatherization assistance to eligible clients by caulking windows, weather stripping and etc. to stop air infiltration into homes.

Other programs include the Energy Crises Intervention Program, Head Start Program, Emergency Food Assistance Program, and the Emergency Homeless Program. Applying For Social Security Benefits

If you plan to retire before reaching 65, you should apply for Social Security benefits no later than the least day of the month you want the benefits to begin. The reason is that benefits payable for the months before you reach 65 can start no earlier than the month in which you apply. However, a widow or widower who is under 65 can apply during the month after the worker's death and still receive a benefit for the month of death.

A person who applies for Social Security retirement or survivors benefits after 65 can receive back payments for up to 6 months before the month the application is filed, but not before 65. The best way to assure that payments will

be received on time is to apply 3 months before you want the benefit payments to begin.

The application for benefits can be expedited if you bring to the office your Social Security number card; proof of age; a marriage certificate if the application is for spouse's, widow's, or widower's benefits; children's birth certificates; and W-2 form for the past year.

A person applying for disability benefits should have the names, addresses, and telephone numbers of doctors, hospitals, or clinics at which he or she was treated.

A person applying for benefits as a dependent parent should bring proof that he or she was being supported by the worker.

Study To Determine Regional Water Needs

The West Central Texas Municipal Water District has selected a team of three engineering firms to conduct a regional water supply study of 10 counties in West Central Texas.

Freese and Nichols, Inc., Jacob and Martin, Inc. and Todd Engineering, Inc. will identify needs and potential sources of water supply for the 10-county study area for a 30-year period. The firms will also evaluate the potential for regional development of water resources and treatment facilities.

Sixteen area water suppliers will participate in the

study, including Abilene, Albany, Anson, Breckenridge, Baird, Cisco, Cross Plains, Hamlin, Hawley, Water Supply Corp., Moran, Shackelford Co. Water Supply Corp., Stamford, Sweetwater, Tuscola-Taylor Co. FWD No. 1, Tye and Woodson.

The West Central Texas Council of Government, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and the local Soil and Water Conservation District will participate in the study as a technical advisory committee.

The project will be partially financed by a grant from the

Texas Water Development Board.

Lt. Gov. Hobby also reappointed Sen. Glasgow to the Legislative Council. The

council will oversee preparations for redistricting during the interim as well as studies conducted by council staff.

"Because redistricting will occur in 1991, it is crucial that decisions be made timely and correctly," Hobby said. "I am pleased that Glasgow has agreed to serve on this important project."

During legislative sessions, the council serves the legislature by drafting bills, resolutions, amendments and reports upon request.

Sen. Glasgow, who resides in Erath County, has represented the 22nd Senatorial District since 1980. Prior to his election to the Texas Senate he served as district attorney for the 29th Judicial District which included at that time Erath, Hood and Palo Pinto counties.

An expanding business is always good news. Computer Patch, located at 308 E. 20th in Cisco, has added a number of features to meet requests. Doris Cozart, The Computer Patch owner, says she is trying to provide all the types of services the public needs. The Computers are set up with software and letter quality printers that are located in a quiet atmosphere. Daisy wheels, dot matrix and laser printers are in use.

Other services include computerized typing and record keeping, a 24 hr. FAX line, phone answering, mail handling, bill paying and account managing. If you wish, the operators can scan both text and graphics into computer files.

A simple-to-run Legal program is also available at the Computer Patch. This program allows the individual to complete simple legal documents privately and at a low cost. Typewriters and copy machines at hand if needed.

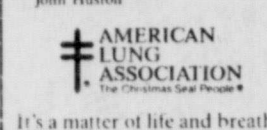

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Letters To The Editor

Editor,

It seems very clear that the people of Eastland County have been misinformed about the advantages of locating a prison in our county.

I am referring to the letter in the July 29, 1989 Eastland Telegram from Mittie Bledsoe of Carbon. She has clearly stated the enormous cost we will encounter if this thing comes to pass. Eastland, alone, must pay 2.8 million dollars for a new sewage system. Eastland and Ranger, alone, will have to pay 1.7 to 1.8 million dollars for improvements to our water treatment and delivery system for the prison.

All of Eastland county must pay 650,000 dollars for the purchase of the land and

another 400,000 to 500,000 dollars for roads to service to facility.

Eastland ISD taxpayers would have to pay approximately 5 million dollars just to provide for the increase in our school population, not to mention the year in, year out cost of education for these students who would be living on state owned - TAX EXEMPT - land.

My last statement brings up a good question for the Eastland County Economic Development Council. If this prison was to provide jobs for Eastland County people, why is there so much talk about the tremendous increase in our school population?

We have also been led to believe that the increased tax

burden would be applied equally to all of these new comers, now we find there is a real possibility that these people will live on state owned land will pay NO property taxes at all. The only cost to them would be the increase in sewage rates and water rates.

My concern in this matter is simple. If the majority of the 800 jobs to be created by this new prison are to be filled by people outside Eastland County, how will Eastland County as a whole benefit from the project? It would seem to me we would be worse off then before. Our own people would still be in the same work situation they are in now, and paying higher taxes, and sewage rates, and water rates. Granted there may be a few more service and retail jobs open, but these are traditionally low paying jobs

and generally held by students and people wanting to work part time.

I expect taxes, water rates, and sewage rates to go up to provide improvements in existing services and I am more than willing to pay my fair share. But I would hope these improvements would be made to attract income producing business to our county. They would help pay for those improvements because they would not be tax exempt. The families employed by them would live in taxable housing, just like the rest of us. The facilities would not be located on tax exempt property.

Those of you out there who think they will never locate a

prison in Eastland county because we don't have this or we don't have that, could be very wrong. This year they will approve 2 sites, in future years they will select approximately 20 more sites. We could very well become one of those future sites because they could run out of more attractive locations.

I think it is time we were told the facts about this project and what we can reasonably expect to happen based on the experiences of other prison towns.

I also think it is time the people of Eastland county were allowed to stand up and be counted in this major decision that will certainly affect all of us one way or another.

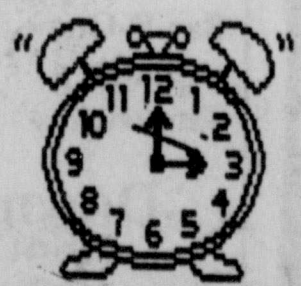

Gordon Spot

The Comanche County Field Crops Committee has planned a clinic for peanut producers next Tuesday, August 15th. They have invited Eastland County peanut producers to the clinic which will be at the pavilion in the De Leon City Park on Highway 6.

From 9:00 a.m. until 10:00 a.m. growers are invited to bring any questions or problems they may have about their peanut crop. Extension specialists, Drs. Chip Lee, George Alston, Jesse Cooke, Ed Colburn, and Leon New will be on hand to discuss questions on peanut diseases, fertilization, other production practices, one-on-one with producers.

At 10:00 a.m. there will be a panel discussion featuring the Extension specialists. Additional questions will also be taken at that time.

All kinds of peanut combines and digger-inverters will be displayed all morning. The equipment representatives will discuss their equipment beginning at 11:00 a.m. They will also be available all morning to visit with producers.

At 12:00 noon a free fish fry will be sponsored by the equipment companies.

On July 28th, the Texas Department of Agriculture issued crisis labels for two peanut fungicides. The temporary use of "Botran" for Sclerotinia Blight and "Tilt" for Southern Blight is now permitted in Texas.

The crisis exemption on Tilt is only available to those growers of irrigated peanuts that do not have access to granular application equipment and are, therefore, unable to make use of alternative EPA-registered products for the control of southern blight in peanuts. Tilt can be applied only through overhead sprinkler including center pivot, solid set or portable (wheel move) irrigation systems. The overhead sprinkler irrigation system must contain safety valves or other devices to prevent back-siphoning of product into the source or irrigation water.

Tilt can only be applied at a rate not to exceed eight (8)

fluid ounces per acre per application. It may be applied no more than two times during the growing season.

Botran may be applied to control sclerotinia blight in peanuts. Applications will be made at the rate of 2 to 4 lbs. of product per acre. A maximum of 2 applications are authorized. Applications may not be made within 30 days or harvest.

The Tri-County Cow-Calf Clinic is just around the corner. It will be held at the Cowboy Sports Arena, five miles south of Mineral Wells on Highway 281, Monday, August 21. Eastland, Palo Pinto, and Stephens Counties are the three counties involved. This should be a very interested clinic. The program will be centered around the winter stocker calf operation. That will be a 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. program with a free noon meal.

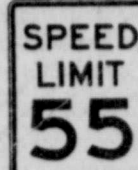

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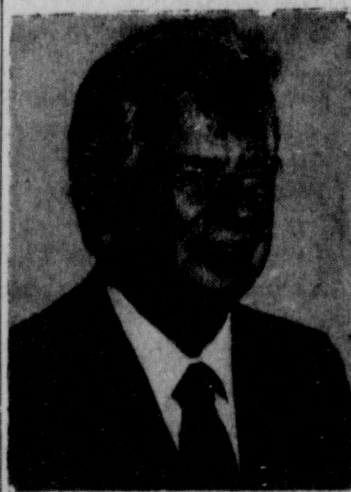

AARP News By Roy Cartee Health Issues And Views

QUESTION: Mr. Cartee, who is eligible for part b Medicare?

ANSWER: There are 3 categories of eligibility: (A) Nearly everyone age 65 and over, (B) Some disabled individuals; and (C) Persons with end-stage renal (Kiney) disease. The eligibility is determined by the Social Security administration.

QUESTION: Mr. Cartee, how do we know if a doctor will accept Medicare?

ANSWER: Your question is very broad. Most doctors will accept Medicare. The question is -- it is accepted on a nonassigned or assigned claim basis.

If a physician (or medical supplies) does not agree to accept Medicare approved charges it is called a non assigned claim. Let us give this example. Say you had a doctor bill of \$100. When you file your Medicare they will only allow \$50. So now you take 80 percent of 50 which equals \$40 which Medicare will pay. Now remember -- the bill is \$100, so you take 40 from 100 and you end up owing \$60. You may have a supplementary policy. It will pay 20 percent of the

allowable -- or in this case \$10. So now you take the 10 from the 60 (the amount you owe) and you will find you owe \$50.

Now, if the doctor (or medical provider) accepts the Medicare allowable it is called an assigned claim. Let us use the same example as above. Medicare says the allowable charge is \$50. So the health care provider will accept the \$50 plus your supplemental insurance which in this case is \$10. If you do not have a supplemental insurance policy you add the \$50 plus the \$10 and the provider gets \$60 for the service. You end up paying nothing for the bill.

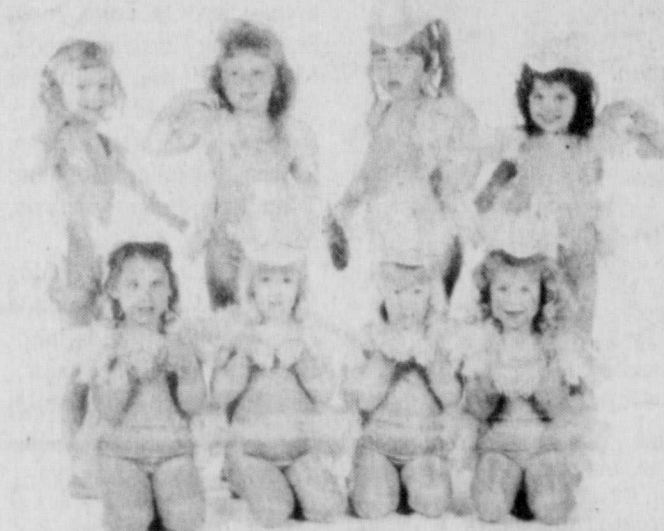
One more thing ... all of the above is true providing you have met the deductible which is \$75. (Next year the deductible will be \$1370.00.)

No wonder you must have help in filing your Medicare claims. Many people give up and do not file because they simply do not understand the process ... be sure and seek help!

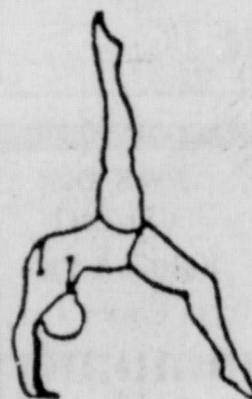

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Ticks causing serious disease are moving west across U.S.

A TICK research team has received the weapons-dollars to do battle with the most frequently reported tick-transmitted disease in the country.

The Oklahoma Council for the Advancement of Science and Technology (OCASST) has granted funds to Oklahoma State University to support a three-year study on Lyme disease.

Lyme disease, first diagnosed in the U.S. in Lyme, CT in 1975, is now being reported in 43 states.

Some health experts are saying that if not for AIDS, Lyme disease would be the most prominent new disease in this country.

"It is being reported more often than Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever," says Alan Kocan, OSU professor of veterinary parasitology and project leader for the study.

"Lyme disease has increased ten times over the last six years. About 13,000 cases have been reported and there are probably four times as many cases not reported or diagnosed."

THE DISEASE is carried primarily by very tiny (look for a moving freckle) ticks believed to be spread by migrating birds. The problem is, ticks causing the disease in other parts of the country don't exist in Oklahoma, so researchers here must identify which ones are carriers and what host animals they prey upon.

The researchers say they will look at rodents, dogs, horses and deer initially to see if they are reservoir animals for the disease.

"Outdoor dogs will get the disease more often," Kocan said. "We should be able to find the disease as dogs are brought here from all over the state for various reasons to our Animal Disease Diagnostic Laboratory."

Lyme disease has shown up on a north-south line in central to eastern parts of Oklahoma and seems to be spreading east. Eight counties have reported diagnosed cases thus far.

We plan to divide the state into quadrants," said Bob Barker, OSU entomologist.

"We will trap ticks throughout Oklahoma, but we will focus on state park and wildlife areas."

While the disease isn't regarded as fatal, it does cause acute discomfort and can lead to crippling arthritis and other conditions. Many people suffering from Lyme disease, especially children, were diagnosed as having rheumatoid arthritis before the condition was understood.

It is still hard to diagnose and treat. The bacteria carried by the tick is a corkscrew-like spirochete, related to similar bacteria which causes syphilis.

LYME DISEASE progresses in three definite stages.

Stage one is a small lesion which develops four to 20 days after the bite. The body is not covered with a rash in large areas as occurs with Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever.

Redness spreads out from around the bite, then a lighter-colored redness spreads beyond that, causing a "bullseye" effect. This occurs in only about 70% of the victims. Stage one also produces flu-like symptoms such as fever, headache, body aches and fatigue.

Stage two is a spreading stage, causing symptoms similar to that found in syphilis: neurological disorders such as facial palsy,

encephalitis and cardiac abnormalities. Multiple skin lesions can develop. These problems can persist for more than a year, with Lyme disease tests showing negative results, confusing the diagnosis. In the third stage, steady or occasional arthritis may develop in the joints, especially in the knees. This often accompanied by pain, swelling and stiffness.

"Early treatment is imperative in heading off this serious disease," Kocan says.

BARKER SAYS it is a good idea to mark the date of any tick bite on a calendar and watch closely for symptoms. If possible, bring or send the tick live to an entomologist department near you. If that isn't feasible, then save it in rubbing alcohol for identification. Check with your Cooperative Extension office or State Department of Health for help in sending ticks to the right place for examination.

Sending a live tick through the mail can be tricky. Gene Eskew, state veterinarian with Oklahoma Animal Industry Division recommends this procedure:

"Use a small plastic vial with a screw top. This can be placed in a cardboard cylindrical container specifically made for mailing serum samples and other items for examination. They are available at most veterinarian offices."

It is also good advice to confer with your local post office personnel prior to mailing ticks.

"Be very careful about how you remove ticks," Baker warns.

"Pulling them with your fingers can make a tiny syringe of them by squeezing their body fluids into the bite wound. Also, tick

body fluids contacting tiny cuts on fingers can induce Lyme Disease."

The entomologist recommends the use of forceps to grasp the tick's head and to pull slowly outward, giving the tick time to break loose. Remember, ticks don't want their heads pulled off either, and given time, they will release their hold.

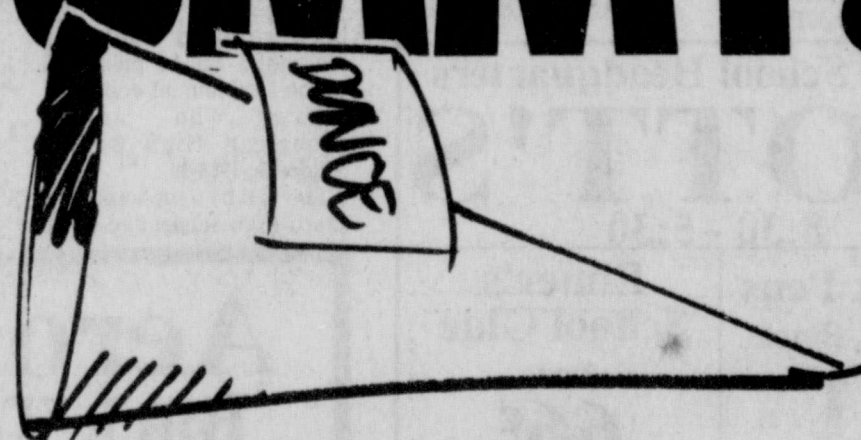

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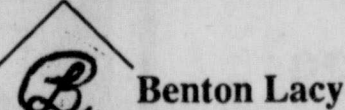

In response to a letter I received regarding the Cisco Hospital closing or its continued operation for the people in Cisco and surrounding area; may I state first I am very much opposed to some of the taxes we are burdened with most of which are levied by the State and Federal Governments some in the county.

When the oil industry collapsed in 1985 and 700,000 people were without jobs we tax payers had to adjust our budget to pay our bills not so with our representatives in Austin who are supposed to help the tax payer not hurt them.

Our representatives in Austin did not try to adjust their budget to meet the economic crisis they just added 13,500,000,000.00 (Thirteen and a half billion dollars) in taxes to the tax payers most of who couldn't pay the taxes they were already burdened with. I will sign a bank draft for the amount we have agreed to donate monthly to the hospital and keep open for two years at which time we are supposed to have a change in our support by our federal government receiving an equal support as is now being given to the larger hospitals.
