Kindergarten Students & Teachers To Meet Friday

All Kindergarten students are asked to come to Cisco Elementary school on Friday, August 25, to meet their teacher and see their room. School supplies should be brought at this time. Students and parents are to come anytime between 8:30 a.m. and 11:30 a.m.

Kindergarten students who were registered in the Spring and needed immunizations need their records brought up to date before Monday. This can be done in the office any day this week. It must be done before Monday, August 28.

Students May Apply For Reduced And Free Meals

Parents and guardians who believe they qualify for the Cisco Independent School District's free and reduced lunch program may now apply. All information presented is confidential.

Full price lunches are \$1.00. Full price breakfasts are 50 cents. Households meeting federal income guidelines are eligible for free or reduced-price meals at 40 cents for lunch and 30 cents for breakfast.

Parents or guardians from households receiving food stamps or Aid to Families with Dependent Children must include the child's name, food stamps or AFDC case number and name and signature of the household adult.

Parents or guardians from households not receiving food stamps or AFDC must list:

.....The names and Social Security numbers of all household members age 21 or older. If an adult does not have a Social Security number, print "none."

.....Total household income and source of income received by each member, before deductions for taxes, Social Security, etc.

Signature of adult household member certifying the information provided is correct.

Parents or guardians dissatisfied with a ruling may discuss the decision with Shirley Darr, free/reduced coordinator, on an informal basis. Formal requests for appeal may be made to C.R. Saunders, Superintendent, 1100 Avenue I, or by calling 442-3056.

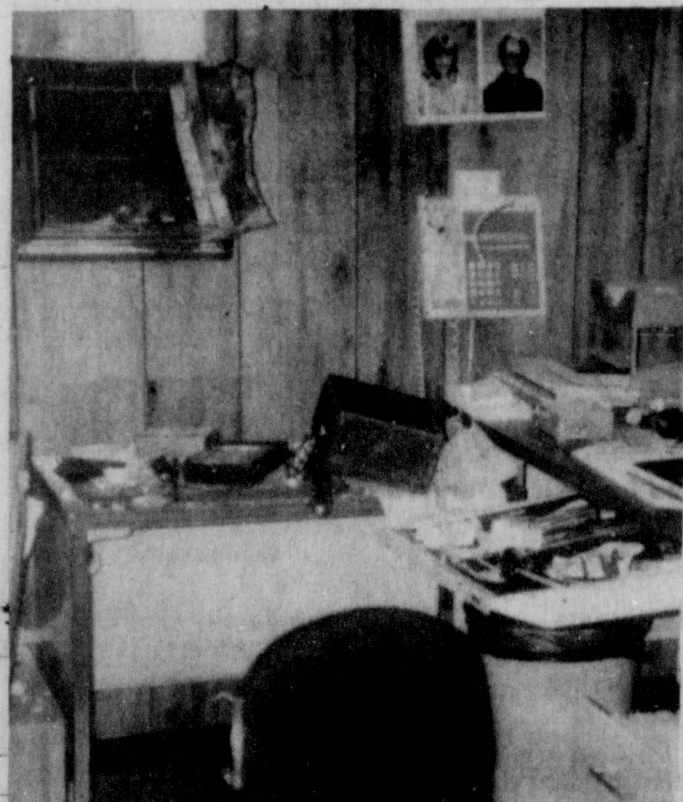

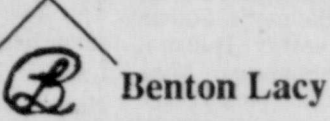

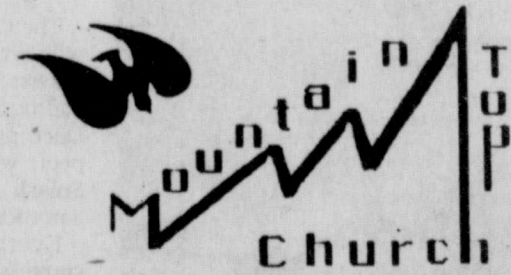

County Commissioners Authorize Ambulance Fund

Eastland County Commissioners Monday voted to take money for the Ambulance Assistance Fund out of the County's General Operating Fund after Oct. 1.

They authorized County Auditor Ray Pruitt to set up an account of \$96,000 to be used to subsidize ambulance service in the county during the next fiscal year.

"The way my money's counting up, that's the only way I can go," said Billy Bacon, Commissioner of Pct. 4. Bacon's Precinct (Cisco) and Precinct 1 (Eastland) have been involved in operating Ambulance Services out of the Cisco and Eastland Hospitals since Patterson Ambulance Service closed in May.

Money from these precincts has paid one-third of the cost of operating the ambulances. The other two-thirds has come from the hospitals and the cities of Cisco and Eastland.

After Oct. 1 money from the General Fund will be divided equally between the four precincts in the County. The Commissioners estimated this would be around \$2,000 per month each precinct.

Bacon said that to his knowledge the Cisco Hospital "hadn't collected a nickel yet" on the ambulance service based there.

County Judge Scott Bailey said the County had "never been provided a schedule or a rate card on the hospital-based

services, and "even Patterson did that."

The Commissioners said they would request rate schedules from the hospitals operating ambulances, and an itemized account of the costs.

On another matter, it was reported that the hospital insurance rate for county personnel is going up. Two plans were outlined, and the Commissioners decided on one with a \$200 deductible. Cost of the insurance will rise from \$208 monthly per individual to \$239 monthly.

Sheriff Dee Hogan reported that a lady working part time in his office as a statistician will take the position of Jailor after Oct. 1. The hiring of another jailer has been previously approved by the Court.

The Commissioners also agreed to a request for \$300 to buy specialized clothing used by the Sheriff's Department in drug raids.

Hogan reported that the jail population is down - only eleven prisoners were currently in the county jail.

On another item, Auditor Ray Pruitt asked for clarification on \$5,000 put up for matching Grant money in the District Clerk's office. The Commissioners stated that only \$910 of this could be spent on equipment if the Grant approval did not come through.

The Commissioners discussed whether to have the

car allowances for the Constables and J.P.'s in the County listed as salary for each office. They decided to give these individuals the option on whether or not to list these allowances as salary.

On taxation, County Judge Scott Bailey said he would like to remind the people of the county that the Homestead Exemptions for persons over 65 yrs. of age are being continued on county taxes. These exemptions are granted to the disabled as well as to persons over 65, the Judge said.

The Commissioners adjourned before noon. Their next regular meeting will be on Monday, Aug. 28.

Fishing Outdoors

Sept. 3, 1989 E.C.B.C. Club Tourney

Minnow dunking at Lake Leon for crappie is excellent right now. The early fall like weather has started a good run on these beauties. While the majority of anglers are reporting excellent numbers with around one third keeping size, I did here one report of only bragging size being caught. The one difference in this anglers strategy was not using red house minnows and keeping with the smallest he could buy. The areas seem to be from 7 to 15 feet around timber. Good catches are coming from all past producing spots.

And the yellowcats still seem to be inching towards an all out fall run. Jimmy Certh of Amarillo landed a near 20 pounder Friday. The bait used wasn't that different. In fact the angler hadn't even baited his line yet when the big cat took a liking to the bare hook.

I have spoken often over the years about the great fish catching of the spinner bait. Well one of the prime times of the year for this hawg caller are upon us.

A spinner has three pluses in its favor; it resembles a moving bait fish, produces flash, and puts out vibration.

A newer style of flash has come about in recent spinners with the introduction of Strike King's new Diamond Leaf. Even in murky water this new blade really shines.

Vibration is probably one of the most important fea-

tures of the spinner and Lonnie Stanley's Vibrashaft can give you the best, due to the tapered wire Lonnie uses in his lure.

Here are two baits which are the same, yet differ. To gain the best of both worlds remove the Strike King blades and place them on your Stanley Vibrashaft and hold on.

I see where Mr. Hank Parker of Hank Parker Outdoors T.V. fishing show has won the B.A.S.S. Classic. I will try to have a little more indepth look at Hank and the prestigious B.A.S.S. Classic at our next meeting here at Fishing Outdoors.

Dear Editor,
I am not opposed to the Eastland Hospital for those who want to use it; however it seems like a lot of tax money spent for so few people.

Our parents have used the Eastland Hospital thru the years. They have never received the service that they have in other hospitals. We have used hospitals in Fort Worth, Abilene, Weatherford and Midland; where you are asked if you would like to have something or something done before a nurse left her or his shift.

We have always went to doctors out of Eastland. They seem to be able to schedule their time better as we never wait 30 minutes to see doctor after our appointed time. Charges are no higher and they seem to be faring very well.

Times have changed. People are treated on the outpatient basis and are less likely to get a bug from another patient. Having a baby 35 yrs. ago meant a 5 to 7 day stay in the hospital, not now. Transportation and roads have improved which makes larger hospitals more accessible.

Wages have not kept pace with the medical expense of staying in the Eastland Hospital. When it was built it was \$8 per day now \$8 per hour or \$192.00 per day. Wage are not 24 times higher.

Ranger and Cisco have not helped their towns by having a large tax base not even their hospitals. People buy houses

in Eastland as it is hard to sell a house in Ranger or Cisco because of the high taxes. People in the Gorman Hospital District are still paying and no hospital and this could be us.

Since the government is now trying to change to help the smaller hospital; now is not time to tax.

Please Withhold My Name

To everyone concerned: What would ever make you think that a taxing structure would keep the Eastland Memorial Hospital in operation? Just because we may vote into existence a taxing agency does not mean that we will have anything other than a large debt to pay off in the near future. Of all the rural hospitals in Texas that have failed in the past three years over 70% of them had a tax structure and most of them was over 85% collections. Look in our own county at Gorman, Cisco and Ranger and see why we will do no better. Why would the county commissioners be for this when three out of four of them will be paying no taxes into this fund along with the county judge. Then why would they vote for anything like this.

I for one was a volunteer on the original Eastland hospital and was proud of it, although I lived in Olden at that time. Finally we built onto the structure with a new wing and when this was done the foundation for this wing was so put in the ground as to allow another story to be built on top. A few of the citizens decided that we needed a whole new hospital which was the beginning of our downfall. The other building would have been nice enough for many years to come.

I cannot agree with some people that the medicare

people are the bulk of the load at this hospital when our New ambulances are on the go to Abilene to their two hospital all the time. If we were to try to take care of that load with our doctors and not send them out of town would be better off. Seems as our medical people do not want to have a patient load here that will increase their insurance risks.

If for one will not vote for an additional taxing agency under any circumstances.

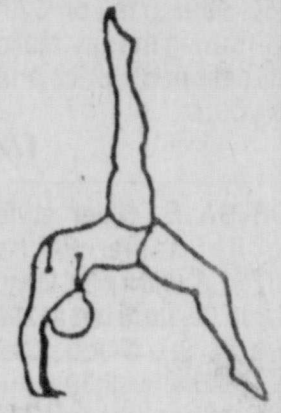

Stephenville Man Receives 25 Years For Robbery Case

EASTLAND-Daniel Perales, 29, of Stephenville received a maximum sentence in prison Wednesday after a jury found him guilty of robbery.

In an earlier trial, Perales' conviction of aggravated robbery for the same incident was overturned by an appeals court.

Testimony in that trial showed Perales and his brother, 25-year-old Robert Perales, smothered L.E. "Compound" Clark of Desdemona with a pillow and beat him on the chest.

Clark was in the De Leon Hospital six days. The incident occurred at Clark's home on Feb. 18, 1988.

The conviction in the first trial was reversed when the appellate court decided the state didn't substantiate the allegation of serious bodily injury, said District Attorney Emory Walton.

In the second trial, Perales was found guilty of robbing 89-year-old Clark of money and items.

According to testimony in 91st District Judge Jim Wright's courtroom, Perales

and Robert Perales robbed Clark of about \$125 cash.

They also took car keys, car titles and a record book from the house. One car title was in Robert Perales' possession when he was arrested, according to court testimony.

Clark had loaned Daniel Perales \$500 the week before the robbery, it was also revealed in testimony.

Robert Perales received a 10-year, probated sentence and a \$10,000 fine in an earlier trial. He is in the Eastland County Jail for revocation of probation.
