Cisco Public Schools To Begin Monday

Preparations are complete for the opening of the 1989-90 school year for students of the Cisco Public School system on Monday, August 28, according to an announcement Thursday.

A total of 867 students, in elementary, junior high and senior high levels of school had registered by Thursday, but school officials were expecting more enrollment by the end of the first day of school. Student enrollment is expected to continue until after Labor Day, according to a report. The total as of Thursday was 240 students in high school, 147 in junior high and 480 students in elementary school.

Students of Cisco Junior High will gather in the auditorium at 8:00 a.m. Monday for announcements concerning the schedule and activities. The high school students will meet in their first period class at 8:05 a.m.

School buses will make their initial run early Monday, in time to transport the students to their respective schools.

Students will attend school the first week Monday thru Friday, and then will have a three day weekend since Monday, September 4, Labor Day, will be the first holiday for the Cisco school system.

Cisco Elementary students will meet in their assigned rooms by 8:00 a.m. Monday. Students will be

dismissed at the elementary school as follows: Kindergarten through first grade, 2:15 p.m.; second and third grade, 2:30 p.m.; and fourth, fifth and sixth grade, 3:20 p.m.

City Tax Rate Discussed During Budget Session

The city tax rate will stay the same for Cisco citizens, this year, according to a preliminary budget prepared by the Cisco City Council and city manager Mike Moore during a budget work session held August 8.

This item was discussed along with the resignation of Council member Arlie Whitley, Place II, during the regular meeting of the City Council on Tuesday, August 22, at 6 p.m., in the council chambers.

In the new budget, there will be not tax increase and the present tax rate will be maintained. A bonus for city employees will be a 3 percent cost of living payroll increase.

At the present time the tax rate is \$5878 on each and every \$100.00 valuation of the assessed market value of the property.

On the payroll increase, it was voted that employees making \$5.50 per hour or more will receive a 2 percent increase and a 3 percent payroll increase will be given for employees making \$5.50 per hour or more.

Council members agreed to cost cutting measures on the budget. One cut that was discussed was residential

trash collection reduced to once a week collecting instead of the present two-a-week collection. This will begin October 1st.

City Manager Moore told council members during the financial report Tuesday night that 83 percent of the fiscal year is complete. He said that 82 percent of the projected revenues have come in. He said the city has only spent 77 percent of the projected expenditures for the fiscal year.

Moore said one problem with the revenues is that the oil and gas royalties are down and so are the state sales tax checks. He said the franchise tax checks are up, and the city has collected more on personal delinquent taxes than what was budgeted. He said the penalty and interest on these taxes is also more than what was budgeted.

The city had to spend more on Workers' Compensation coverage than what they had expected over the fiscal year. The water sales in July were down due to the stronger effort of the citizens for water conservation and the heavy rains in June.

Mayor Joe Wheatley said he speaks for the rest of the

council members that the resignation of Arlie Whitley is regretfully accepted. He said he hates to lose him for he was a good council member. Mr. Whitley resigned due to job interference with his duties as a councilman.

Council members approved a motion to call for an election by January 20, 1990, to fill the seat and finish Whitley's term. He was scheduled to serve until May, 1992.

During the city manager report Moore told council members that there has been a slight delay in the drug dog program. He said it is taking a little bit longer to train a dog, but a Labrador Retriever, to be used by the Cisco Police Department, should be ready by September 21.

City manager Moore said that a local citizen had sug-

gested that council meetings should be made accessible to the handicap. Moore said he has had other requests from the elderly about having a meeting where there are no stairs.

After discussing the issue, council members and Mayor Wheatley agreed that if an item appears on the agenda and a large crowd attends the meeting then the issue can be tabled and the city can hold the next meeting at a suitable place. It was decided that the city did not have the funds available to refurbish another meeting place for the city council.

City Manager Mike Moore told council members that Lake Cisco is still in good shape. He said the August, 1989, pumping levels were less than what they were last year. He said that on August 6, the city pumped over one million gallons of water to the city.

Sharp And Warren Are Speakers At Cisco Lions Club Wednesday

Cisco High School head coach, Buddy Sharp, and high school principal Phil Warren, spoke to the Cisco Lions Club at their regular meeting held last Wednesday at Traditions Restaurant.

Sharp said the Loboes were scheduled to play Baird in a scrimmage game on Friday, August 25. He said the first game of the season will be held on Friday, September 8, in Anson. He said there will only be four home games for the Loboes this year. He said he is looking for changes in the district next year.

Coach Sharp said this year there were 40 players who came out to play for the Cisco Lobo football team. He said this year the team is bigger than in the two previous years he has taught. He said they are going to play every game to win. Matt Goosen will be the quarterback and will be good at it. The coach said that Goosen can both run and throw the ball.

Sharp said that David Zell, Darryl Morrison, Joe Campbell and Harvey Perkins will also help the Loboes have a winning season. He said that the Loboes have bigger linemen this year including Manuel Anayla.

Sharp said future plans for the C.I.S.D. board of directors is to build a new football stadium and field house where the track field is located at now. He said attitude plays a good part in a game. Sharp encouraged the Lions Club to attend the games and support the football teams. He said it means a lot to the kids to look up and see the stands full of fans.

Principal Warren said

they are going to work on the attitude of the students. He said they will let the students know they are the best school around. He said the new dress code is that he expects them to dress as if they are going to work. He said if he wouldn't hire them, then they won't go to school. He said he will keep at the students until they change their attitude.

Warren said he believes in the saying that "what you ask for is what you get." He said they have a lot to offer in a school, and they can be as good as they want to be.

The principal said they will build on the strengths they already have. They will find a place for every child to be successful. One of the strengths they will be working on is to keep the school looking good. They have a school to be proud of, he said, and this will be a big impact on the students.

Lions Club Secretary Jerry McBeth said they still have tickets to sell for the Benefit Bowl Football game, when rival teams, Cisco Junior College and Ranger Junior College play September 16, in Breckenridge. He said the Cisco Lions Club members will run the Dr. Pepper stand during the second half of the game. He said he still has some Cisco Lions Club baseball caps for sale for club members. The cost is \$5.00 each.

CHS Offensive football coach Delbert Kelm was a guest at the meeting. Norman Whitstone led the roar, Doug Bromley led the singing and the Pledge of Allegiance, and gave the invocation. Ricky Whatley was in charge of the program and introduced Coach Sharp.

I attended the Board Meeting at the hospital last Wednesday. I want to say "thank you" to the board members for their time and service, and for doing their best to serve the people well in spite of the heckling and opposition they received. And also, I feel that the Chairman of the Board handled things wisely.

Also, I want to let the people of Cisco know that I support the Board in their plan to try to save the hospital.

WE NEED THE HOSPITAL. It is really the most important thing we have in town. Even more important than the grocery store. We will always have time to go out of town to buy groceries, and no one will die because we couldn't get there quick enough. But people may, and probably will die from having to travel ten miles to get medical help in an emergency.

When the hospital was new I settled my parents here in Cisco, because it was a small town, just about their speed. And, because it had a hospital within less than 5 minutes of their home. They used the hospital quite a lot before they passed away. Now, I've been living here for the past eight years. I could not have considered moving my parents here, nor would I have moved here myself if there had not been a hospital. It would be totally unreasonable to even consider living in a town or community where there are no emergency medical facilities. But if we lose the hospital many of us will be

stuck here because we can't sell our homes and get out.

I do not like tax raises, but this one I would welcome. I feel it would not be an actual raise in property taxes, but rather, an Insurance policy. A policy guaranteeing me that medical help is at hand and ready to do their best for me at any time I might need them. The proposed raise in taxes is small. People can stretch, if they have to, and meet it and really, they will never miss the money once the tax is paid. It is a very small sacrifice to make for the benefits we will get in return.

Sheriff's Dept. News

The Lone Star Gas Co. building in northwest Eastland was burglarized. Burglars gained access through a west door and ransacked the interior of the building. The way the wall safe was wrecked indicated amateurs. Fifty dollars and various items including office machines were taken. A Lone Star pickup was also taken and used to haul the items away to a pasture near Eastland where they were transferred to another vehicle. The items taken in addition to the pickup, which has been recovered, were valued by Lone Star officials at \$11,000.

The items included a Hewlett Packard Laserjet series II printer with 92295A toner cartridge (A2826J, 69453) and an additional cartridge, a legal size paper tray (92295C), a Dell PC limited system 200 personal computer consisting of Intel 80286 micro processor 640 KB of Ram, 5 1/4, 1.2 floppy diskette drive 40MB-40MS hard disk drive, VCA color plus monitor (039500) and a 40MB internal tape drive (340-2003).

Also a PC DOS 3.30 software (420-1000), a dust cover for HP Laser series II printer (92259G), a PC A/T two cover set (53-11909), a Xerox memory writer (C80-382809), a BM selectric III 1985 (5241609), a BM wheelwriter IV (PN-1342139), a Brothers EM 611 (A-81198971), a 19 in. color television, Panasonic C7-9022,

(A1-2229), a Panasonic VCR PV 1510 (VKVS0068), a stand with glass doors, three 16 Lasko desk fans, an Emerson AM/FM tape deck/radio, a Honda generator model EM 3500 SXA (EA6-1007209) sp. gas hookup and timer, a Radio Shack pocket calculator, and a Telrad telephone were taken.

There are suspects and Sheriff Dee Hogan says that there is enough evidence to place the culprits at the scene of the crime once they are apprehended. It is just a matter of time, he says.

A wench truck and other items stolen from a farm near Rising Star have been located or recovered by deputies with the help of an Abilene man who reported that he purchased some of the items from a man matching the suspects description.

A man was scheduled to come from Colleyville to identify property reportedly stolen from his farm this month.

Deputies were notified of the death of Bessie Bennett, which was due to natural causes.

An individual about which the Welfare Dept. was concerned was contacted.

A family disturbance was being investigated.

Suspicious activity was reported at the Sunshine Valley Trailer park and south of Cisco. Both areas are being patrolled by deputies.

Deputies helped with an eviction in Eastland.

A TV and VCR stolen last week in Rising Star were recovered.

Officers received a report that a man got out of his pickup on a road and laid down.

Deputies decided that the roof of an Olden home was likely damaged by hail and wind and not by vandalism. An insurance company may have been trying to avoid paying a claim.

A warrant was issued for a Rising Star man for theft.

A woman sentenced in Lubbock was being brought back to Eastland to clear her case from the docket here. She is Lola Raylene Smith. Such cases usually don't add to the prison time they must serve, but they are a substantial expense to Eastland County and the Sheriff's Dept., according to Sheriff Hogan.

Sheriff Hogan was appointed to the Education and Training Committee of the Sheriff's Association of Texas.

Earlier in the year a couple from New York was stopped on I-20 for a traffic offense and officers reportedly found forty-four pounds of marijuana in their car. They were arrested on drug charges, but the officers reportedly failed to ticket the driver for the traffic offense.

The woman in the car, Emma Montes, was taken to court, but the charges against her were dropped due to the technicality. The man in the car who was arrested as Gustavo Izquierdo, but was identified by his fingerprints as Gustavo Ledesma, has yet to come before the 91st District Court.

If the officers fail to issue a ticket for the traffic offense, the court may decide that the officers were conducting an illegal search and seizure when they observed and seized the 44 pounds of marijuana.

The Sheriff's Dept. received a criminal history on the man from the state of New York. The reported appearance

of a stolen pickup led deputies to search, but it was not found. It might have been in Stephen's County.

A broken TV was taken from outside a storage building in the Pogue Industrial Park. The owner says that he doesn't want it.

A submergeable 34 HP Red Jacket pump was taken from Lake Cisco's Northshore Drive lot 140 between July 20 and August 19. A man reportedly made threats to a Baird couple at Eastland Auction. All were asked to leave the auction property by its operator.

A man who had been receiving workman's compensation checks, which were being sent to his mailbox, complained that a former employer had gotten one of the checks without his permission and had apparently opened it to see the amount, and that he had been unable to get the check from him.

Juanita and Halley enjoy the Senior Center and are members of AARP and the I-20 Church of Christ.

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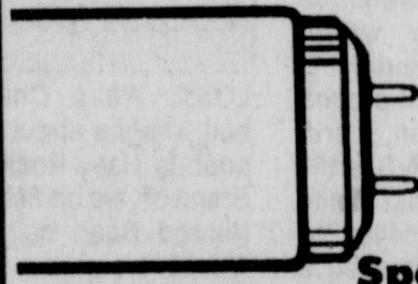
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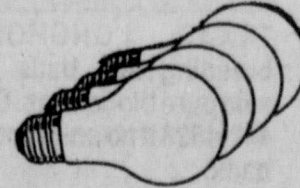

Speaking of Sam Rayburn, fisherman interviews conducted by the Texas parks and Wildlife Department indicate anglers at Sam Rayburn and Toledo Bend Reservoirs are catching good numbers of largemouth bass this summer, with many fishing being released.

Biologist Paul Seidensticker of Jasper said creel data from Rabyrn showed that 63 percent of the parties interviewed retained at least one bass and the average was 3.75 bass per boat. The average weight of bass harvested was 1.95 pounds.

At Toledo Bend, 53 percent of parties interviewed retained at least one bass and the average was 4.25 bass per boat average weight of bass retained was 1.95 pounds.

The recent catch of a 11.25 pound largemouth bass by Rick Sharp of Hallsville has set a new lake record for Brandy Branch Reservoir. The power plant lake located 10 miles southwest of Marshall was stocked with Florida largemouth in 1983 and appears to be developing a quality bass fishery.

Due to a shortage of time I was unable to gather to enough information to give a proper report and history on the 1989 B.A.S.S. Classic winner Hank Parker or the event itself.

Cisco Hospital Board To Hold Public Hearing September 5

The Cisco Hospital Board will have a Public Hearing on a proposal to increase tax revenues at 1:00 p.m., on Tuesday, September 5, at the Hilton Community Center. The subject of recent surveys concerning the tax rate hike will also be discussed.

Surveys were sent out asking Ciscoans how they felt about the tax rate hike. The deadline for the survey was August 14. When the board met August 16, they opened up the surveys turned in to the hospital, and the count was 274 for the tax rate hike and 78 against.

A group of opponents of the proposed tax rate hike brought in 311 surveys that they had collected that were against the hike. These were given to the E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital Board of Directors after the deadline. This is why the board is still unsure how the people feel. It was reported in an

earlier story that one person who was in opposition of the tax rate hike was only given 5 minutes to speak. A hospital board meeting is open to the public, but the meeting is held to conduct hospital business. It is not a public meeting. The person who wanted to speak was not on the agenda and did not have, according to state laws, the right to speak for a long period of time.

Concerning the accusation in the story that the secret voting ballots were checked to see how individuals voted, the Attorney General was notified of an irregularity of ballots. This was sent to the District Attorney, Texas Ranger Gene Kea, Chief of Police Billy Rains, and election judge brought the ballots to the hospital in a cardboard box, the way that they have handled for several years. Rains and Kea came in to the hospital and talked to Marvin Cole, and were satisfied with the

talk and went to the grand jury where it was dismissed. Two weeks later Gene Kea brought the ballots over to the secretary of the hospital board and they are now under key at the hospital.

Kea also went to talk to the election judge and could find no irregularities. The state law says that the election ballots should be given to the board under lock and key, but ballots have been

brought to the board in a cardboard box for years, with no problems.

The Cisco Hospital Board realizes that there is a large percentage of voters over 65 that might anticipate financial hardship from the increased tax due to their fixed income. Voters over 65 are entitled to a property tax exemption of \$12,000. The average home value in 1989 would be \$18,368 minus \$12,000 which equals \$6,368. The tax for a voter 65 or over would be \$18.08 and last year the tax was \$8.09 for a total increase of \$9.99.

ORDINANCE NO. 0-89-2
AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF CISCO ESTABLISHING THE TAX LEVY FOR THE 1989-1990 BUDGET YEAR OF CISCO, TEXAS; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CISCO, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. That for the budget year 1989-1990 there is hereby levied on all of the property located in the City of Cisco, Texas, on the first day of January, 1989, and not exempted from taxation by the Constitution and statutes of the State of Texas, an ad valorem tax of \$.5878 on each and every \$100.00 valuation of 100% of the assessed market value of such property for the purposes listed below, such tax to be apportioned as follows:

\$.5878 on each and every \$100.00 valuation of 100% of the assessed market value of such property is hereby levied and assessed to provide revenue for carrying on the City government and the current expenses thereof.

SECTION 2. That this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication as required by law.

SECTION 3. The City Council, in order to provide adequate time to prepare tax

statements for 1989-90, declares an emergency and that the provision of the Charter of the City of Cisco calling for two readings of an ordinance be dispensed with, and that this ordinance take effect as an emergency measure immediately upon its passage and approval.

and bus loads of tourists, most of them Japanese, ironically. At the far end of the Punchbowl, opposite the entrance gate, is a large marble memorial honoring the families of those who have died in our country's wars. Included is a quote from President Abraham Lincoln, who said to the grieving mother of a fallen Union soldier, "How great must be your pride to have laid no noble a sacrifice at the altar of freedom."

Flanking this memorial is a series of marble courtyards inscribed with the

names of our honored dead who were buried at sea, or whose bodies have never been recovered. The inscriptions exceed 28,000 names, most of them sailors lost during the Pacific Campaign of World War II.

Walking among the graves, one notices a number of headstones with the inscription "442nd Regiment" after the name. The 442nd Regiment was composed primarily of Nisei, or Americans of Japanese ancestry. The 442nd fought in Italy in WWII, often alongside the Texas National Guard Thirty-Sixth Division.

While reflecting on the courage and tenacity in battle of the 442nd, and the ultimate price paid by many of its men, it brings an uncomfortable pang of conscience recalling the internment of so many Orientals on the America West Coast during those war years. Among those who served with distinction in the 442nd Regiment was the current senior senator from Hawaii, Daniel Inouye, who lost an arm in Italy. He was awarded a Silver Star for valor, but

it doesn't seem like a fair swap.

Continuing one sees the grave of Ernie Pyle, the well known World War II journalist and author who shared the foxholes, hardships, and miseries of American fighting men in North Africa, Europe and the Pacific. Sadly, he shared the fate of many of them as he was killed by a Jap sniper's bullet on a little island near Okinawa shortly before the

war ended.

A little further along is a headstone marked simply, "Unknown-Dec. 7, 1941." In another section of the cemetery is row after row of markers, numbering several hundred graves altogether, with the chilling inscription, "U.S. Unknown-Korea." Reminders of a forgotten war.

There are of course many markers from the last great American tragedy, Vietnam. Included among those is a

Walking through this great monument dedicated to American Servicemen and women, one is almost overcome by the feelings of awe, reverence, and quiet pride. Tears are hard to contain. The Punchbowl is truly a beautiful memorial, and it is just about filled to capacity. Let's all hope there will never be a need to open another one.

Under this proposal taxes on the average home would increase by \$28.07 or 123 percent compared with last year's taxes.

Comparing tax rates without adjusting for changes in property value, the tax rate would increase by \$.15276 per \$100 of taxable value or 120 percent compared to last year's tax rate. These tax rate figures are not adjusted for changes in the table value of property.

I-20 Accidents Results In Two Deaths

Some hazardous situations are being created along I-20 as it crosses Eastland County. Construction has resulted in some lanes being cut down, causing the pavement to be uneven. This can be dangerous if vehicles attempt to change lanes or turn onto exit ramps at speeds near the speed

limits. And in construction areas one lane is often blocked off and under construction.

There are signs warning motorists to slow down, but they are not always needed.

Thursday afternoon or evening, there were two accidents on I-20 in the area which resulted in deaths. First, Larry

Wayne Kellum, 24, an employee of Safety Lights Co. of Houston was killed while riding in a pickup towing a trailer with a sign indicating that one lane of traffic was closed. Both the sign and the pickup had flashing lights. But a tractor-trailer rig hit the pickup and trailer and all trav-

eled more than 500 feet and had to be pulled apart. Thomas Jarrott of Warren, driver of the truck, and Arturo Flores of Pasadena, driver of the pickup, were treated and released at the Palo Pinto Hospital. The cause of the accident near Gordon hadn't been determined.

Later Thursday just south of Eastland, a 44 year old California woman was killed when her automobile struck the heavily loaded trailer of a tractor-trailer rig.

Two passengers in the car, Collin David May, 13, and Lee McLean, 14, were treated and stabilized at the Eastland Memorial Hospital. One was in critical condition with head injuries and the other was in serious condition. They were both transferred to Abilene. R.L. Duncan of Oklahoma, the driver of the truck was not injured.

Reportedly, a witness saw the auto hit a curb at an exit ramp and, losing control, cross the median and hit the truck's trailer.

AARP News By Roy Cartee Health Issues And Views

QUESTION: Mr. Cartee, I don't think it is fair to pay \$75 deductible for everything I use under Part B of Medicare.

ANSWER: The beneficiary is required to meet \$75 deductible only once in any year. A combination of different services can be applied toward the deductible. For instance you may use two doctors. You would only pay the deductible once. There is a restriction if you pay more than the approved charge. Say the doctor bill is \$100 but the approved charge is \$80. Medicare only pays 80% of the approved or \$64. Your deductible would be only \$16 not the balance between \$100 and \$80. Another restriction is a beneficiary cannot apply expenses from an earlier year to the deductible for a later year. The moral of this story is keep filing those Medicare claims on a timely basis.

QUESTION: Mr. Cartee, I

am sure there are plenty of restrictions on the Home Health Care coverage. Please discuss.

ANSWER: Part B covers Home Health Care Services from a Home Health Agency providing all of the following conditions are met: 1. Care needed is part time skilled nursing care, physical therapy or speech therapy. 2. Beneficiary requiring care is confined to the home. 3. Physician determines the beneficiary needs home health care and sets up a plan for the home health care. 4. The Home Health Care Agency participates in Medicare.

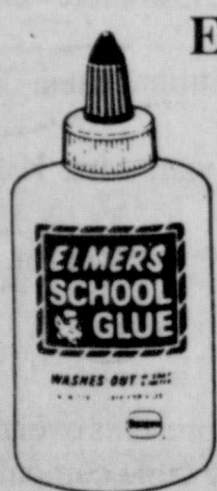

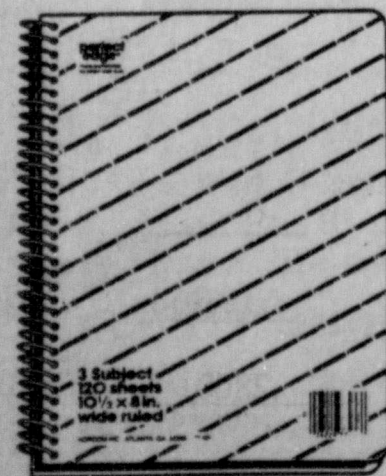

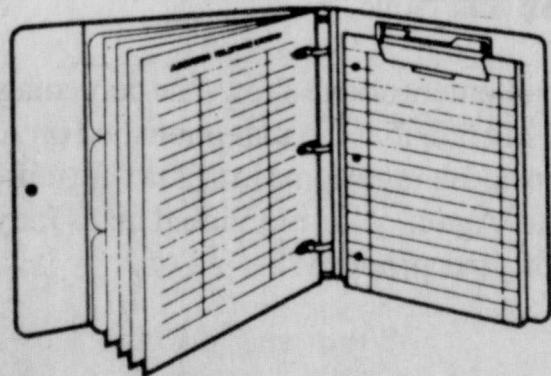
