

**TDH Reminds Texas Pet Owners That Animals** 

McCasland explained that, of the three basic strains of rabies most common in Texas, the canine strain is potentially the most dangerous to humans, since people are more likely to be exposed by a dog than by most other animals.

Although another strain of rabies occurs most frequently in Texas, is it usually found among skunks in the wild. 'Any strain of rabies is dangerous to humans and other animals, but some animals are more susceptible to particular strains,' Dr. McCasland said.

McCasland said that an unusual feature of the canine rabies outbreak in South Texas is that the link between many of the infected dogs appears to be the infected coyotes. Coyotes are not notorious carriers of the strain, although almost any wild mammal can be infected.

Dr. McCasland expressly warns against adopting a wild animal as a pet. There is no approved rabies vaccine for wild species.

'People should be especially careful not to handle wild animals showing abnormal

behavior, such as not being afraid of people. Such behavior is not natural, and is a good clue that the animal could be sick, possibly with rabies,' he said.

If a person is bitten by a wild animal, it is important that the animal be tested at a TDH lab for rabies.

In 1988, TDH laboratories in Austin, Houston, San Antonio, and El Paso diagnosed 434 cases of rabies among the 10,498 specimens they examined. of those 434 infected animals, there were: 266 skinks, 57 bats, 30 cats, 21 dogs, 20 foxes, 14 cattle, nine horse, six coyotes, four raccoons, three goats, a deer, a ringtail, a bobcat and a

'Any animal bite should be taken seriously,' Dr. Mc-Casland said. If the animal is a dog or cat, it should be isolated and observed for ten days. Dogs and cats cannot transmit rabies for more than ten days before they show symptoms of the disease. All bites should be reported to the local health authority, which will assist with animals. The wound should be cleaned with soap and water, and a physician should be contacted about treatment

### West Texans **Believe In Local Public Schools**

People living in West Texas believe their local public schools are doing a good job educating students, but they have even more confidence in the ability of the local teachers who staff these schools.

These are the findings of a recent Texas Poll conducted July 23-Aug. 8, 1989 for the Texas State Teacher's Association by Harte-Hanks Communications and Texas A&M University.

Over a thousand residents were randomly polled statewide, including 106 in West Texas. The poll has a margin of error of plus or minus three percentage points.


West Texans say local teachers are doing a very good job in the schools in spite of the fact that they believe them to be 'under-paid' and 'overstressed.' These same residents give overall good marks to the local public school systems and believe that the quality of education is directly linked to their level of fund-

Seventy-one percent of the residents give schools a 'passing grade' while the plurality believe the schools are underfunded.

TSTA President Ollie Besteiro said it is extremely heartening to the teachers that 81 percent believe local teachers care about students; 85 percent say teachers are hard working; and 79 percent believe teachers are well-informed on their subject mat-

Seventy-six percent of the respondents said that teachers deserve a pay increase this

'That makes it all the more ironic that many school districts in this area failed to even pass on to the teachers the mere \$1,800 raise that the

Texas Legislature granted this past session,' Besteiro said.

'Top performance should be rewarded with top salaries,' the TSTA President added, 'Instead, our top Texas teachers are among the lowest paid in the nation—the average Texas teacher salary ranks 31st among the 50 states. It is obvious that legislators and school boards do not have their fingers on the public pulse in setting teacher salaries.'

Besteiro noted the irony in that 83 percent of the residents in West Texas believe that teachers should have a say in the educational decisions that are made in local school districts. Only 12 percent said those decisions should be left exclusively to the school boards and administrators.

'During this past legislative session, TSTA introduced a bill that would have provided a process for teachers to have a voice in local policy decisions,' Besteiro noted. 'It was the school board and administrator associations that lobbied hard to

defeat the bill. 'We're glad to know that the public agrees with TSTA in believing that teacher input can make a real difference in educational quality.'

Seventy-three percent said that the amount of money spent per student in a school district affects the quality of education offered in that district. In the area of school reforms, 43 percent believe they have improved the quality of education and another 34 percent believe they had no impact. A majority said the reforms have not affected teacher pay or teacher qual-

Residents are split in their opinions on the fairness of funding public education in Texas. Thirty-nine percent believe it's fair; another 30 percent said it's not fair; and the remainder are unsure. An overwhelming 80 percent believe that it is the state's responsibility to come up with an equitable funding system. 'On behalf of the thousands

of TSTA members in this area, we thank West Texans for their support and confidence,' Besteiro added. 'During this year we will be asking the public's support to help TSTA to bring about the changes that both teachers and the majority of all Texans want in order to upgrade our public schools and the teaching profession, in general.'

# **Death Count For Labor Day Weekend** Could Go As High As 34 Persons

AUSTIN-The traffic death count for the Labor Day weekend could go as high as 34 persons, the Department of Public Safety has esti-

'This may scare you, but you need to know that as many as 34 people could die in traffic accidents in Texas this Labor Day weekend,' DPS Director Col. Joe Milner said.

In 1988, 30 persons died in traffic accidents during the 78-hour Labor Day period. Two critically-injured persons died later, for a total of 32 fatalities. This year's Labor Day period also is 78 hours, beginning at 6 p.m. Friday, Sept. 1, and continuing through midnight, Monday, Sept. 4.

The Department of Public Safety will be doing everything it can to esnure you have a safe holiday, but we need your help,' Col. Milner said. 'Please, don't drink and drive, stay within the speed limit, and wear your safety belt.'

Last year, 21 persons died in DWI or speed-related accidents during the Labor Day period. That amounts to 66 percent of all the deaths. Also

# Gordon Spot

Now is the time to begin spraying pecan trees to control the pecan weevil according to County Extension Agent, De Gordon. The weevils emerge from the groundin late August and early September if soil moisture is available. The emerge most commonly following a good rain (1 to 2 inches) or where irrigation water is applied. Therefore, they may be emerging in yards where trees have been watered but not in dryland orchards where the soil is very dry. The agent said, he has observed weevils in yard trees during the past week.

The pecan weevil can be

one of the most devastating pests of pecans in some areas where chemical control is

neglected. Adult weevils emerge from the soil underneath the trees. The adult weevil is 3/8 inch long and is dark to medium brown in color. It has a snout as long as its body. The Cisco Hospital Board will hold a Public Hearing on a Tax Revenue Proposal at 1 p.m., Tuesday, Sept. 5 at the Hilton Community Center. The subject of recent surveys concerning the tax rate hike will also be discussed. 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



# **Pharmacy Topics**

New drug to treat prostate cancer -- flutamide -- has received FDA approval. It blocks the sex hormone, testosterone, from boosting the growth of cancer cells.

Up to now, only the cornea and the sclera have been used in eye transplants. Now scientists at Columbia Presbyterian have transplanted retinal tissue in mice, and think it will work soon in humans, too.

If parents have elevated cholesterol levels, youngsters over age two should be tested, too, the American Academy of Pediatrics says. The children's risk is high, and diet should be watched early.

Healthful snacks -- made with sugar substitutes so they're less likely to cause cavities -- earn special labeling in Switzerland. The American Academy of Pediatric Dentistry is considering a seal here.

Even marginal deficiencies in zinc slowed the growth of rhesus monkeys in a University of California/Davis study. Both immunity and learning ability were affected, too.

# Rural Health: "The Bad News And The Good News"

The saying always goes. "There's good new and there's bad news," and the funny thing is that sometimes the same news can be both. Such, I believe, is the case with rural health today.

I don't have to remind you about the bad news. You read in the big city papers, or hear on the national news, stories which tell you that since 1980, about 175 rural community hospitals have had to close their doors, while another 600 face closure within five years. In your own local community you see the expenses which must be met if the Hospital is

Take our small communities for example. Good lead ership has led to many great and creative ideas for improving health care in the most cost effective manner. Your own hospital administrator recently joined other area hospital administrators and tackled the formidable task of writing a lengthy grant application for a "rural transition grant" to bring additional federal dollars to your hospital. Citizens of many rural towns are joining together to sponsor bake sales; entertainment shows, car washes, and other fund raisers, all for the good of the local hospital. With such

Likewise, when I look around me here in Washington, I feel a sense of encouragement which makes me believe things are going to get better. Three years ago, there were a handful of Members of Congress who started talking about the problems facing rural hospitals and doctors. We were generally on parochial, special interest Now, the House Rural

signs, its hard to stay too dis-

couraged.

Health Care Coalition includes more than 100 Members-about one-quarter of the House of Representatives-who have joined together to work towards relief for rural health care providers. At last, I believe we have gotten across the point that rural health care is not a parochial problem. It should not be regarded as an urban-rural confrontation; it is a National problem. As a recent report from our state asserted, the Dallasite who is critically injured in an automobile accident in Comanche and the child from Houston bitten by

a rattlesnake in Sweetwater

must have access to timely and quality medical care.

For those who live in the rural areas, the problem is, of course, a more daily and central concern. And it is for you who live with a daily fear of losing your hospital that I fight my best fight to preserve your way of life-the way of life in which I was raised and which will always be my home and heart.

No issue over the past several years has had more importance to me than rural health. I have committed a large portion of my own time. as well as the time of my staff, to helping resolve the rural health problems. I have "preached" to my urban colleagues about unfair Medicare reimbursement policies and the need to remedy those inequities. I have brought federal government officials into the District to see firsthand what West Texas rural health care is all about. My staff and I have worked with hospitals such as your own Eastland memorial Hospital to develop grant proposals. I have intervened with the Texas Department of Health when hospital closures seemed imminent. I have complained to the Health Care Financing Administration about unfair policies. I have fought successfully to include Peer Review provisions, and other legislative initiatives, in new law.

But the farmer in me won't let me believe that the "bad news" will get the last word in this story. I have too strong a belief in rural Americans across the Country, and I am too unwilling to give up the fight here in Washington to become a pessimist now. How about you?

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

Instead, be researching graveyard customs of the varied cultures which have endured throughout the years, the author leads the reader through the cemeteries of Texas, their pasts and presents.

The book is broken into six chapters in which Mr. Jordan delves into the many different ways Texas has laid their dead to rest. In the chapter on the Southern Folk Cemetery in Texas, the custom of "scraping" is explained and also the use of shells to decorate the graves

of loved ones. The chapter on Traditional Southern Grave Markers walks the reader through many of the quiet burial grounds in search of both common and unique grave markers. Mr. Jordan explores the mystic of the Hispanic culture influence as well as the German attention to detail in the chapters on The Mexican Graveyard in Texas and The Texas German Graveyard.

Even though there are no hard and fast facts offered to the genealogiost which would lead to an ancestor, the book is a pleasant stroll through many quaint and forgotten customs which are evident to anyone who has spent a quiet Sunday afternoon wandering the paths of any of Texas' graveyards. 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# **Fishing Outdoors**

A New Lake On The Land "Joe Pool"

If any of you folks went boating over the weekend and were lonely, you didn't go to the new Joe Pool reservoir. Located in the metroplex (Grand Prairie) this mid sized impoundment has drawn more attention than even the now famous Lake Fork.

Joe Pool was builtas a flood control project for the Trinity River Authority of Texas and filled the bill during our floods this year. The lake prior to the august 18, 1989 opening date had risen to a teen foot above normal pool level due to the excessive water down stream.

During my visit this past weekend the lake was reported to still be two feet above normal pool and falling. For those of you who have visited the new Ballinger lake, think of this on the scale of Brownwood and then you have Joe Pool. Lots of flooded small timber black Jack, mesquite, oak cedar etc. Water color ranged from off colored (1 foot less visibility) to clear (6 feet or less).

Due to the expected pressure due to the large populas, Texas Parks and Wildlife Officials placed a three fish 18 inch minimum on the black

Fishing for the blacks during my visit was fair, with a number of small fish coming on cranks and Rat-L-Traps. But the (18 inch) keepers and near keepers (15-17 inches) were taken on spinners and jigs. Most of these fish were taken in 12 to 15 feet of water near the dam area.

This impoundment can and I feel will live up to its poten-

tial once the new wears oft and lake levels stabilize. Opening weekend attendance was reported to be over 2,000 persons. And this past weekend's running total since the opening was near 5,500 persons according to a Trin-

ity River employee.

The lake is serviced by two pay parks, Lynn Creek and Loyd Park. There is also one park which has no charge. The entry fee for Lynn and Loyd are \$2.00 per person per day, over 65 \$1.00, \$2.00 per day per vehicles and \$2.00 per day per boat.

Facility Fees: Campsites with utilities \$8.00 per day; campsites primitive \$3.00 per day; Group Picnic shelter \$25.00 per day; Group Campground \$100.00 per day; and Group Pavillion \$35.00 per day. All fees paid by park guests are used only for repayment of debts and for park operation and maintenance cost. The Parks were constructed with federal funds which these fees will repay.

At present the large black bass that was reported to us since the opening was 8 pounds 11 ounces. Current catfish and crappie seem to be biting better than the bass, but I'm sure after the rush dies down with close management this impoundment will become a true trophy lake

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# **Immunizations Required By School And Day Care**

As the new school year approaches, the Texas Department of Health (TDH) stresses that parents should check their children's immunization records to see

that they are up-to-date. State law requires that children entering Texas schools or day care must show proof of immunizations for six communicable di-ases--polio, tetanus, measles, rubella (German measles), mumps, and diphtheria. Whooping cough (pertussis) vaccine is required for all children younger than five entering day care or public school, although TDH recommends that children through age six also receive the vaccine.

READ THE CLASSIFIED the largest in recent history. "About 3,000 cases, including nine deaths, have been reported since the epidemic began last Thanksgiving in Houston." The state had not experienced so many cases since an even larger epidemic struck in 1971, when 9,585 cases were reported.

He said that recent whooping cough outbreaks in Tarrant, Travis and Bexar counties also have been cause for serious concern. More than 80 cases of the highly contagious disease have been reported. "With children returning to school, those infected may spread pertussis unimmunized among classmates. We want parents to be doubly sure that their children are protected, or we may have an escalation of the present out-

breaks."

If parents have any doubts about their children's immunizations, they should

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check with their family physician or local health department. "One overlooked vaccination or booster can mean a sick child, able to infect others who may also be susceptible," Hodgson added

Other vaccine-preventable diseases reported in Texas last year included mumps (327 cases), rubella (30), and tetanus (6). There were no cases of polio or diphtheria reported.
