The American Lung Association of Texas said the law that raises the age to buy tobacco products is the most significant to date that protects young people from the health dangers associated with smoking.

The new law, which became effective Sept. 1, prohibits the sale of tobacco products such as cigarettes and chewing tobacco, to persons under the age of 18. It changes a law that for 90 years allowed the purchase of tobacco by customers as young as 16 years of age. It also compliments a law in effect for two years that bans student tobacco use of any kind on all Texas public school campuses and at school sanctioned functions.

City Hall Moves To 116 W. 6th Street

Cisco City Hall Receives Extensive Smoke Damage

Cisco City Council met in special session at 8:30 a.m. Tuesday to approve moving City Hall offices to temporary quarters after a fire Sunday caused extensive smoke damage to City Hall.

The temporary City Hall will be located at 116 West 6th Street (the old Austin Petroleum Building), according to an announcement by Michael Moore, city manager.

City employees were moving furniture and records to the new location Tuesday. Mr. Moore said city hall would be functioning at that location at 8 a.m. Wednesday. Telephone service was expected to be completed by Wednesday afternoon, Mr. Moore added.

Smoke was seen coming from city hall about 7:20 p.m. Sunday by Fireman David Gill and city employee Bill Laird.

The blaze was extinguished about 8:15 p.m. by some 15 volunteer firemen.

City Manager Moore reported that there was relatively minor damage caused by the fire itself, but there was extensive smoke damage throughout city hall.

The fire started in a small room where a copy machine was located. The room and copy machine were destroyed. The room also housed the water meter books.

All water meter books were lost, but the city had permanent records and city employees were expected to begin making up new meter books immediately.

All city hall telephone lines were burned, and the only telephone lines operable were the ones to the fire department.

Mr. Moore asked that residents either use the night depository at the old city hall or mail in their water bills until the new city hall is operating. There will be no interruption in water bills, he said.

"We looked at several buildings and the old Austin Petroleum Building seemed to fit our needs," according to Mayor Joe Wheatley. He said it is hoped that city employees will be able to

move back into city hall in about 45 days.

Any consideration of a permanent move will come

after the insurance adjuster give his final report, Mr. Moore said. Mr. Moore added that

anyone with emergencies should call the fire station at 442-3078. The police department has set up its offices at

the fire station. Police can be notified of any emergencies by calling the Eastland County dispatch at 629-1728.

Drug Investigation Results In Arrest

Some Eastland County citizens were questioning why

there were no arrests when three drug labs were seized near Ranger earlier in the year. The answer was that the local people involved were already facing charges, for which they are yet to be tried, and the officers wanted to bring about the arrest and conviction of the "syndicate" people outside of Eastland County who were financing and setting up the labs.

A man described as the "drug cook" or "the drug boss' second in command" was arrested near the motels and restaurants in Eastland by Sheriff's Dept. officers as a result of an ongoing investigation.

The armed man, who reported had served time in a federal prison and had threatened to shoot it out to keep from being arrested again, offered no resistance to be arrested by Sheriff Dee Hogan

and several of his deputies, who were also armed with shotguns.

A bag in the motel room rented by the suspect contained illegal drug paraphernalia, papers belonging to the suspect, and what was believed to be illegal drugs, according to deputies.

The suspect, who reportedly uses different names, was identified as a man wanted by federal authorities on two felony warrants.

In order to spare Eastland County the expense of an expensive trial, Sheriff Hogan planned to release the prisoner to federal authorities in Fort Worth for trial there in federal court. A federal judge has already ordered that he be held without bond.

If the federal court fails to get a conviction, charges could then be filed in Eastland County.

Local officers say that the F.B.I., which has more resources than the local department, should eventually arrest other people involved in the illegal drug operation.

The suspect was reportedly from the Lewisville and Mesquite area.

Dear Editor:

In regard to the hospital issue here in Cisco it is amazing the negative viewpoint that comes from people who have certainly never spent anytime in a big city hospital or even in this one here in Cisco. We have had experience with both and will take this one anytime (unless there is a major illness requiring a specialist and added hospital equipment).

We moved here from Midland nearly four years ago and one of the reasons was because of the fine hospital and doctors in Cisco. We owned a cabin at Lake Cisco for nine years and had several occasions to require treatment while at the lake. Once my father-in-law broke his wrist and had it x-rayed, set and put in a cast here on a Saturday morning. Six weeks later a specialist in Midland removed the cast, took another x-ray and said it was as good or better job than he could have done and promptly charged us more than we paid here to have the wrist tended in the first place.

Three weeks ago my husband took me to the emergency room at 1 a.m. on Sunday morning. Dr. Cermin was on call and came down within a little while. The capable nurses had already started to make me more comfortable as soon as we came in to the hospital. I was in the hospital five days and have only received as good care once before and that was two years ago in the

same hospital and same doctor. A nurse answers a call within minutes here but in a large hospital it takes from fifteen to forty-five minutes. I have had experience with both hospitals in Abilene and the large COUNTY hospital in Midland.

It is a shame how the hospital and doctors are "run down" here in Cisco. We have already lost one fine doctor and better appreciate Dr. Cermin and do whatever is necessary to help the hospital administrator find the other two doctors he desires.

An old saying is "you never miss the water until the well runs dry" and is true in this case because by the time the people of Cisco wake up the hospital will be closed and it will be too late. The help needed for two years will be a lot less than the taxes for the county hospital at Eastland will be. By the end of two years surely our government will see the benefit of the small hospital and will help not hinder them. Until you start paying into a COUNTY HOSPITAL you don't know what taxes are.

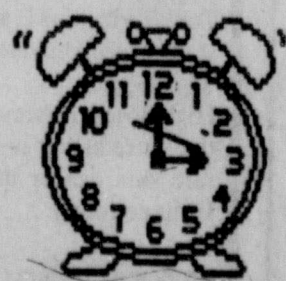

Antonio Vargas Goes To Trial October 2

A trial date of Oct. 2 has been set for 19-year-old Antonio Vargas, who is accused of various crimes in the south

part of Eastland in the early hours of July 18.

Judge Jim Wright will preside over the trial, which will be held in the 91st District Court. Jury selection will begin at 9 a.m. on the trial date.

Vargas was allegedly working at a dairy near Dublin before the incidents took place. He is accused of breaking into two businesses at Highway 6 and I-20 south of Eastland, and stealing money, a T-shirt and other things.

He is charged with attempting to break into a home near the burglarized stores and another near the end of South Daugherty St.

Vargas is also accused of breaking into a home on South Seaman, raping an Eastland woman, robbing her and holding her hostage. He was arrested not long after this incident.

A bond of \$600,000 was set on Vargas on July 18. He has been held in the Eastland County Jail since that time.

State Treasurer Ann W. Richards Friday turned over \$40 million in unclaimed money to state agencies to pay for schools, highways and other general state government services.

Richards said, "it has grown from virtually nothing in 1982 to \$40 million this year and each new dollar we collect is a dollar that we don't have to collect from our taxpayers."

Lifestyle Change In Fire Ant Colonies Makes A Tough Job

Fire ants are increasingly difficult to eliminate because of a change in the life histories of fire ant colonies. They are appearing with multiple queens instead of single queens, according to a study conducted by the University of Florida's Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences and the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture.

multiple-queen nests, fire ant workers have no loyalty to a single queen. This makes eliminating the colonies even more difficult.

These new colonies house as many as 200 queens per mound compared to single-queen mounds. When the queen in a single-queen nest dies, the entire nest dies; but when of the multiple queens die, the workers scatter. In

The study, which found 30 to 40 fire ant mounds per acre back in the days of single queens, now reports that there are up to 5,000 mounds per acre. Entomologists are still trying to determine whether the multiple-queen ants are a hybrid or a different species altogether from single-queen ants. They hope that with more research, they'll be better able to understand — and control — fire ants.

owners of \$30 million in lost property during the last year. "We have found more lost property for the citizens of Texas this year than the total found for all previous years prior to 1983, the first year I was in office," Richards said.

"So far this year we have written checks returning lost property to more than 16,000 Texans and we are finding more each day."

The Richards Administration has collected \$273.5 million in unclaimed property in the past six years, or 86 percent of all unclaimed property collected since the unclaimed property law was passed in 1962.

Of the \$114 million returned to owners during the past 27 years, the Richards Administration returned \$110 million or 96 percent.

In order to find owners of lost property, state law requires the Treasury to publish a statewide listing of those persons with \$50 or more of unclaimed property each March.

This year, the Treasury published a list of 110,000 names of persons with more than \$60 million in lost money.

The state can use any money that remains unclaimed for general state expenses and for education. This year \$20 million went to the General Revenue Fund and \$20 million to the Foundation School Fund.

While the state may use money while it remains unclaimed, the owners or the owners' heirs may claim their property at any time in the future.



As if an answer to our prayers.



I wonder if the ones who are in opposition to this tax would be willing to form a car pool to transport these older people who need treatment to Abilene or other areas?

I am on a fixed income, as many other people in our area, but I am for whatever it takes for our city to retain this Hospital.

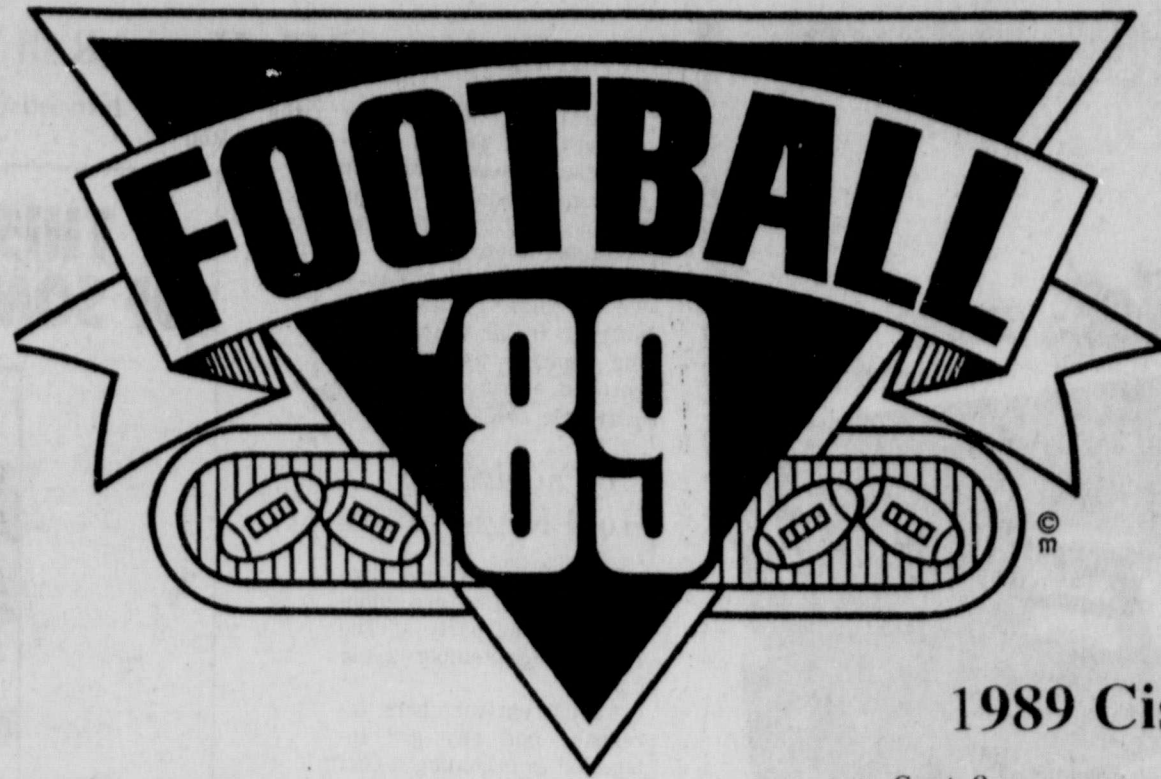
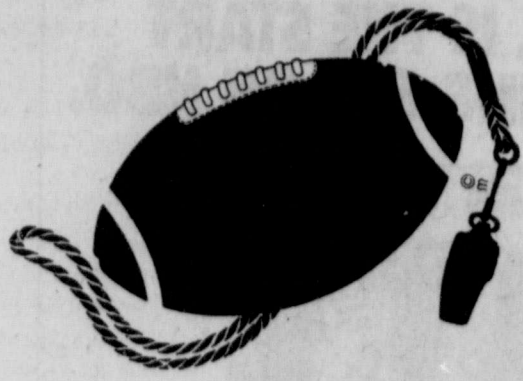

Worley Named To Honor Roll

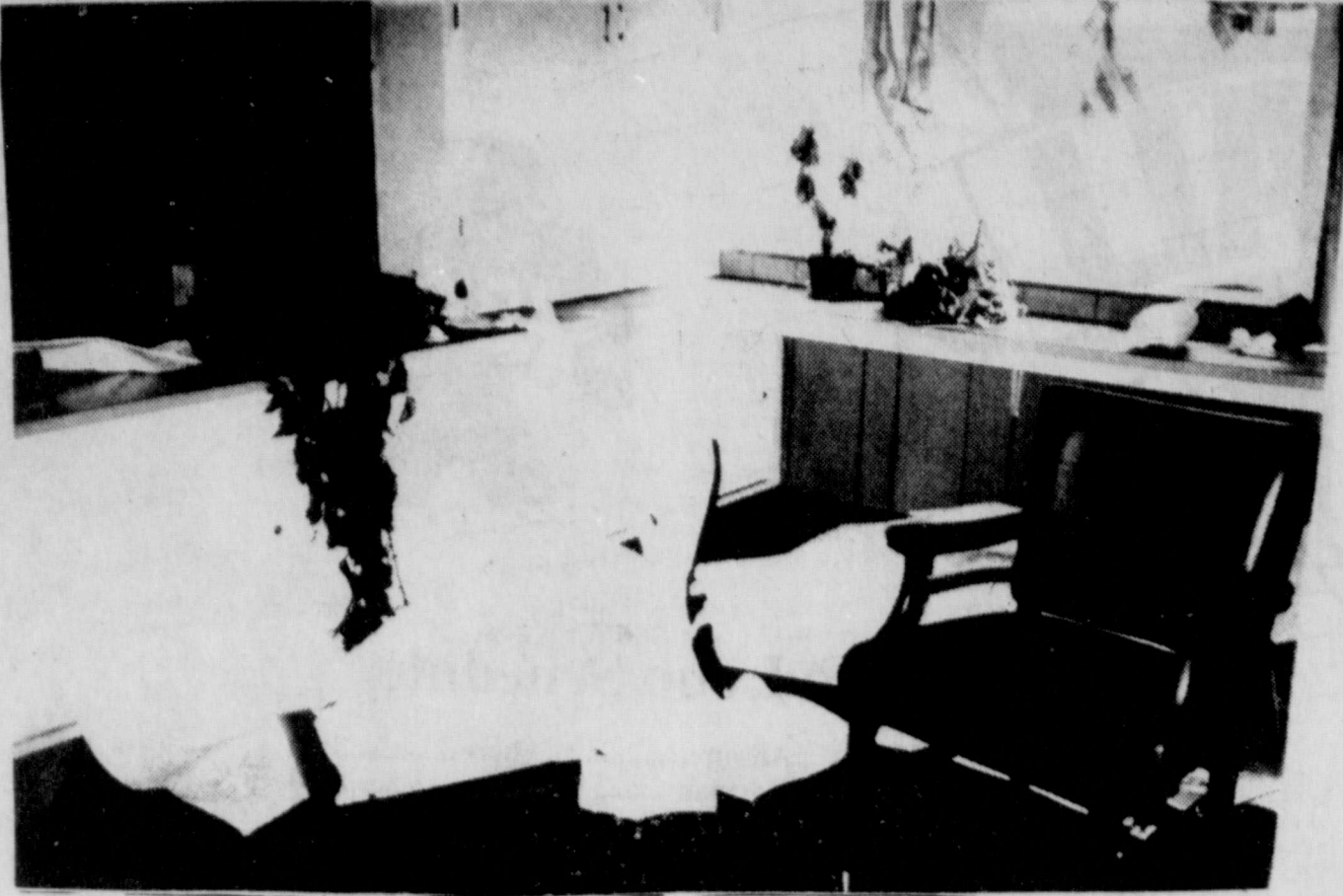

Sunday, Sept. 10, 1989, Rev. Dewey Lamb will be preaching at the Bethel Baptist Church in view of a call as pastor.

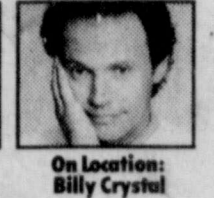
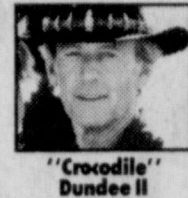

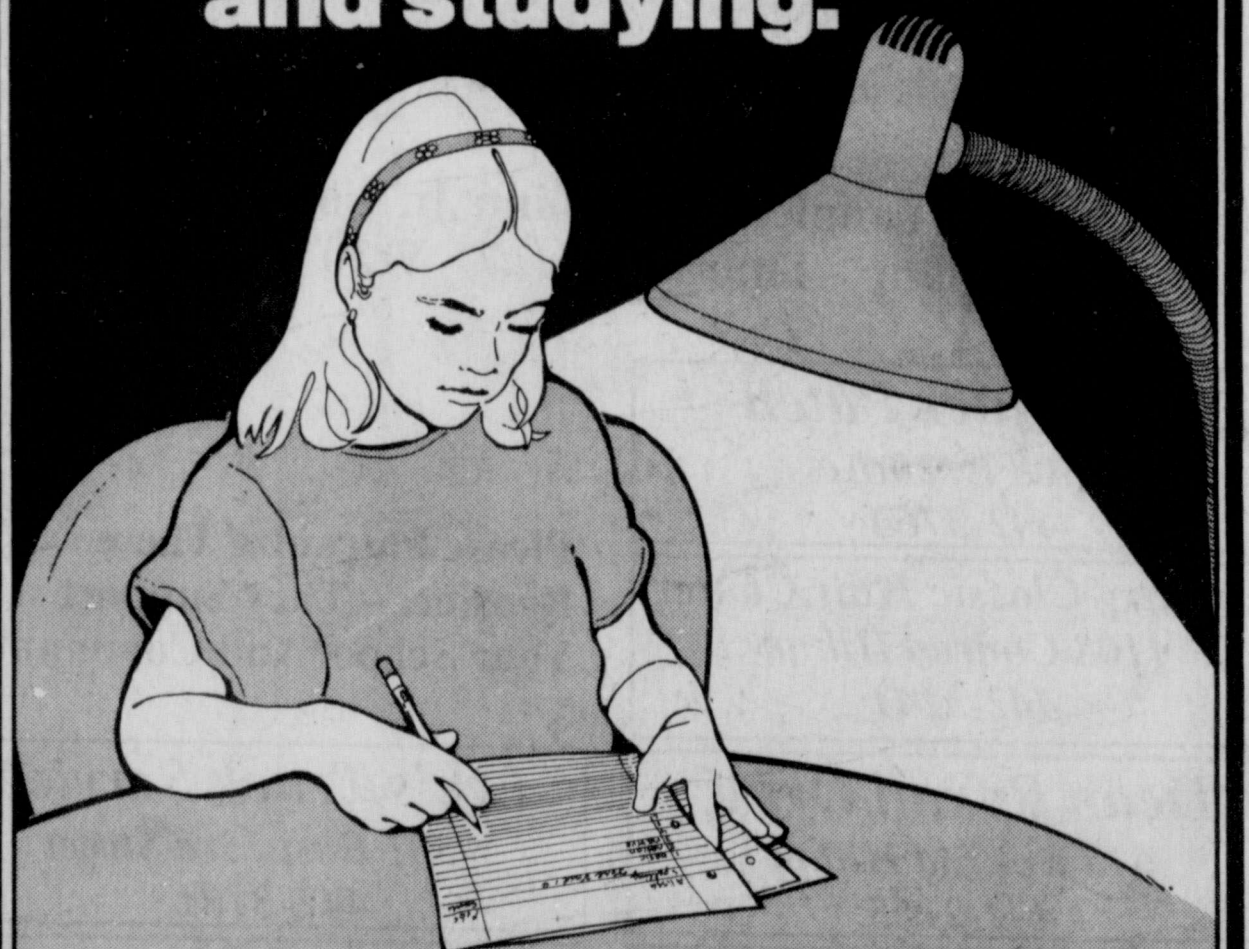
