## Three Cisco Men Injured In Flash Fire Wednesday

Three Cisco men were injured, one seriously, Wednesday afternoon as the result of a flash fire at the United Energex Inc. plant west of Cisco on Farm Road 2945.

Jerry Douglas, 52, was welding a "belly line" on a tanker truck when he apparently hit a pocket of trapped gas, causing the flash fire which lasted about 10 seconds. Douglas was taken to E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital and then transferred to Hendrick Medical Center in Abilene.

Also injured were Larry

Pence and Charles "Chuck" Cannistraci, both of Cisco, who were treated and released from E.L. Graham Hospital, according to a hospital spokeswoman.

Irvin Robinson, district manager of United Energex, said the explosion blew the trailer in half and broke office windows near the truck.

Douglas was listed in stable condition suffering from cuts and bruises on his back and arms.

Members of the Cisco Volunteer Fire Department were on the scene to assist the injured.

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## Cisco JV Defeats Anson JV 20-To-8 Thursday

Cisco Lobo Junior Varsity began their season with an impressive 20-to-8 victory over the Anson Tigers JV in action at Chesley Field Thursday night.

Anson scored first after recovering a Cisco fumble on the 30 yard line, and the first quarter ended with the Tigers ahead 8-to-0.

In the second quarter, Cisco's Jay Nixon took the ball in from the eight yard line. Johnny Morrison ran in the two point conversion, and the score was tied at 8-to-8. Cisco had a touchdown called back, and the half ended in a tie.

With six minutes to go in the third quarter, Morrison dove in from three yards out, and the score was 14-to-8. The point after failed.

Late in the fourth quarter, Cisco's defense rose to the

occasion and recovered an Anson fumble on the one-yard line, preventing the Tigers from scoring. With 2:14 left in the fourth quarter, Jay Nixon galloped 62 yards for a touchdown. The conversion attempt failed, and the game ended 20-to-8.

Coach Charles Parnell praised the entire team. On defense, Brent Shepard intercepted an Anson pass late in the fourth quarter, and Linebacker Jr. Stroebel and Nose Guard Bradlee Rains had outstanding plays. The defense held Anson on fourth down several times during the game, Coach Parnell added.

The junior varsity will travel to Breckenridge next Thursday, Sept. 14, for a 6:30 p.m. game against the Buckaroos JV.

## New Books At The Library

By Louise Allison "Talking God" by Tony Hillerman is one of the new books at the Library. Despite its deceptive title, it is the ninth of Hillerman's series of mystery novels. Also author of the best seller, "A Thief of Time", Hillerman, for 25 years, has resided in Albuquerque, New Mexico, and as a boy, in Oklahoma, and makes use of his knowledge of Indians and familiarity with the "Land of Enchantment."

In large print are some new novels of intrigue, romance and adventure: "Till We Meet Again", Volumes 1 and 2, by Judith Krantz; "Sands of Time" by Sidney Sheldon; "Mortal Games" by Pierre Salinger and Leonard Gross; and "To Dance With Kings" by Rosalind Wiseman.

For the children, there is something special: two sets of five books about the White Horses of Hardin-Simmons University. The books were written by Dr. William O. Beazley, Vice President Emeritus of Hardin-Simmons. He has been associated with the University for more than 30 years, and his distinguished career here and elsewhere, his offices, degrees, affiliations (religious, academic and civic), awards and attainments would fill, by list only, two pages, at least....not to mention years back while earning his bachelor's degree at Bridgewater College in Virginia, he earned 14 athletic letters in football, basketball, baseball, track and decathlon.

Each horse, "Cotton", "Ragweed", "Swede", "Chuck" and "Trouble" tells his or her own story for each is different: the nosy horse, the one who lost her cool, the one who didn't forget, the one who cares, and the one who is different. And, of course, the sixth horse has yet to write her (or his) biography. Each book bears a tiny hoof-print, and the autograph of Dr. Beazley and the inscription, "For the Young Readers of the Cisco Public Library."

## Police Continue Investigation In Attempted Abduction

The Cisco Police Department was investigating the attempted abduction of a 7-year-old girl, according to Chief of Police Billy Rains.

The attempted kidnapping happened Tuesday, Sept. 5, sometime between 2:30 and 3 p.m. as the child was walking home from school. It happened in the 600 block of West 11th Street next to the intersection of Avenue J, Chief Rains said.

The subject jumped out of some bushes and grabbed the little girl from behind with one arm around her mid-section and the other hand around her throat, according to Rains. She started struggling and she swung her back pack, full of school books, at the man and he released her. She "hit the ground running" and ran the four blocks to her home. She reported the incident to her mother who in turn called the police. Chief Rains said they received the call at 3:15 p.m.

The suspect is described as having dark complexion,

short black hair, between 20 and 30 years of age, approximately six feet tall, and heavy set. He was wearing light blue shorts, no shirt and no shoes. He was clean shaven, and had some type of possible scars across his mid-section, according to Chief Rains.

The little girl, a second grade student at Cisco Elementary School, received a scratch under her chin on her neck, and scratches on her left rib cage, Rains said.

The police believe a vehicle may have been involved. The police department does not believe this incident is related to similar incidents recently in Knox City, Stamford and Baird.

Rains said the police department has tentatively cleared five people and are still checking possible suspects. He said the local police department has been in contact with the Texas Rangers in Abilene and Eastland.

Rains reminded people to

watch their children and be aware of who is around. Most people know when strangers are in the area. He asked that if anyone saw something unusual Tuesday or if they know any facts

about the attempted abduction, to please contact the police department. He said "We don't want calls about gossip, but we do want to hear from anyone who can help us with this case."

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# Cisco Hospital Closing Could Doom Prison

Cisco residents expressed opinions Tuesday on a Tax Increase Proposal submitted by the E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital Board. The increase would raise Hospital taxes in Pct. 4 from 12.7 to 28-cents per \$100 valuation.

Around 180 concerned citizens attended the Public Hearing at the Hilton Community Center, and discussed various aspects of the proposal.

At stake was the future of E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital, a 30-bed institution built in 1969 by citizens of the Precinct.

Few people at the meeting said they wanted to see the Cisco Hospital close, but some questioned the increased tax cost and the manner in which the Hospital was run.

Others spoke up in favor of the funding, saying the Hospital saved lives and was a valuable asset to the town.

The Board reported that the Hospital District has paid the initial cost of the building down to a \$435,000 bond indebtedness, but has struggled with an operating deficit in recent years.

Bob Conner, President of the Hospital Board, explained

the Tax Proposal. Equal time was given to individuals wishing to speak for or against the increase.

A.C. "Pete" Larkin opened the discussion by saying he had asked recently to see the records of the Hospital, and "saw some and didn't see some."

He stated his opposition to a tax raise, adding that "I never said I wanted the Hospital closed, but I thought it was a good idea."

Larkin said he didn't feel the Hospital Board was responsive to the will of the people.

He apparently referred to a non-binding tax referendum held in May, which failed by small margin of votes.

Larkin indicated that if the Hospital Board raises the tax rate there will be a petition circulated for a rollback election.

Lawrence Ingram, an owner of rental properties, said that tax valuation on property was too high.

"If we vote 28¢ the value should be on what the property is selling for today, instead of what it is appraised at. I think we're going to have to do something - no body in their right mind can pay these

kind of taxes." James Gardner said there were over "1,000 old folks in Cisco, and many can't pay any tax increase." Gardner also said that only a few people used the Hospital.

Travis Lenard said: "I thought we had done voted this (tax raise) down." He said he had hauled four individuals first to the local Hospital and then to Abilene, because they couldn't get what they needed done in Cisco. "What kind of a deal was that?" He asked.

Others mentioned the lack of Doctors in Cisco. Dr. Ayres Cermin is the only full-time resident physician, and the Hospital lacks a Certified Registered Nurse Anesthetist for the operating room.

Various people spoke in support of the Hospital, saying they were willing to pay higher taxes to keep it open.

Bill Philpott reminded the crowd that the 12¢ tax rate would go on, no matter what happened. "The Hospital is a bargain at a 28-cent tax rate," he said. "My total cost would be 36 cents a day or \$131 per year. He glanced back at the audience. "The life of Billy Joe Reynolds was saved in the Hospital recently. What

is that worth?"

Jerry Morgan, Board Member, replied that "Yes, if the Cisco Hospital closes, we still pay the 12-cent rate. Would there also be a county-wide taxing District?"

He said that 30-37-cents will be the taxing rate at the Eastland Hospital, if a tax district proposal passes, he stated that it would be cheaper for Cisco to keep its own Hospital.

There's no free ride," he said.

Cisco Mayor Joe Wheatley

thanked the Hospital Board and new Administrator Don Henry for their work. He extended apologies for the "abuse they have been receiving and will probably continue to receive."

He said that the Hospital, like most businesses, has been losing money for the last 3-4 years, through no fault of their own.

He stated that individuals in the City have been working and hoping and to entice a State Prison to the County, and are on the verge of doing

so.

But one thing is very urgent, he added - "E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital is the only Hospital in the County with the type of Certification the TDC will accept." (E.L. Graham Hospital is accredited by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Health Care Organizations. This is a mark of excellence.)

"For this and other reasons I am in favor of continuing the operation of the Hospital," Wheatley said.

Janelle Schrader, President

of the Hospital Auxiliary, said that students at Cisco Junior College need a Hospital. She noted that some injured football players were treated there last week," Cisco needs the College, too" she said.

Dr. John Muller, a Dean at the College, also urged the Board to continue operation of the Hospital.

"These have been hard times for business and real estate," he said. "We have problems and we need solutions. But we need to leave our options open for Health Care - this is no time to close down services.

"Things can change around - but this can't happen if we go negative. If there is a rollback - so be it. But at least you will have tried."

Board members discussed future plans for the Hospital, contingent on funds to con-

tinue operation. One of the top priorities was to recruit two new Doctors for Cisco, and encourage specialists to assist at the Hospital.

"We can't get another Doctor until we vote enough taxes to keep our Hospital open," said Lela Latch Lloyd, retired teacher. Never have I received such good care and attention as I have in this Hospital."

She encouraged all Cisco people to come together with prayers and a spirit of cooperation in order to save the Hospital.

When asked about current plans, a member of the Hospital Board said a public hearing on the proposed Hospital Budget will be conducted on Sept. 19. At that time the Board will vote on the proposed tax raise.

## A County Hospital

During the Hospital Tax Hearing in Cisco Tuesday someone in the audience asked the Board Members: "Why not have a County Hospital in Eastland?"

Cisco Board Member Kitty McCracken replied: "The idea of a County Hospital has been circulating. But in that case our taxes would be even higher than now.

"We would have to retire the E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital bonds of \$435,000,

while paying whatever additional taxes were placed on us. Why not keep you. Hospital and pay your own taxes?"

Board Member Jerry Morgan talked more about the ratio of indebtedness.

"On Aug. 8 the Abilene

Reporter-News printed a story saying that Eastland Memorial Hospital had over \$800,000 indebtedness, and was losing \$20-\$40 thousand each month.

"The last I heard, Ranger General Hospital was bankrupt and had around \$1.2 million indebtedness. Add these up and see what your tax rate would be.

"I can't imagine us wanting to join a group (County Hospital) this much worse off than we are," he said.

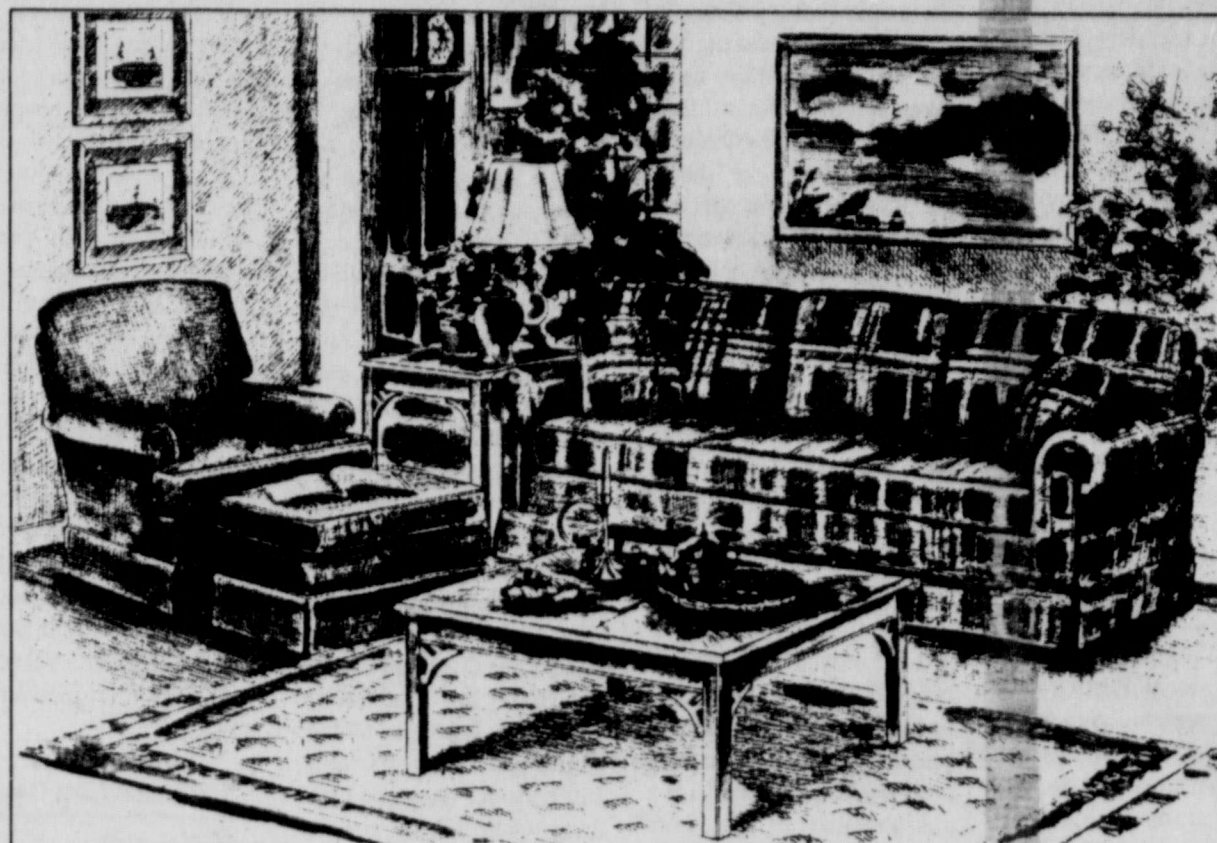

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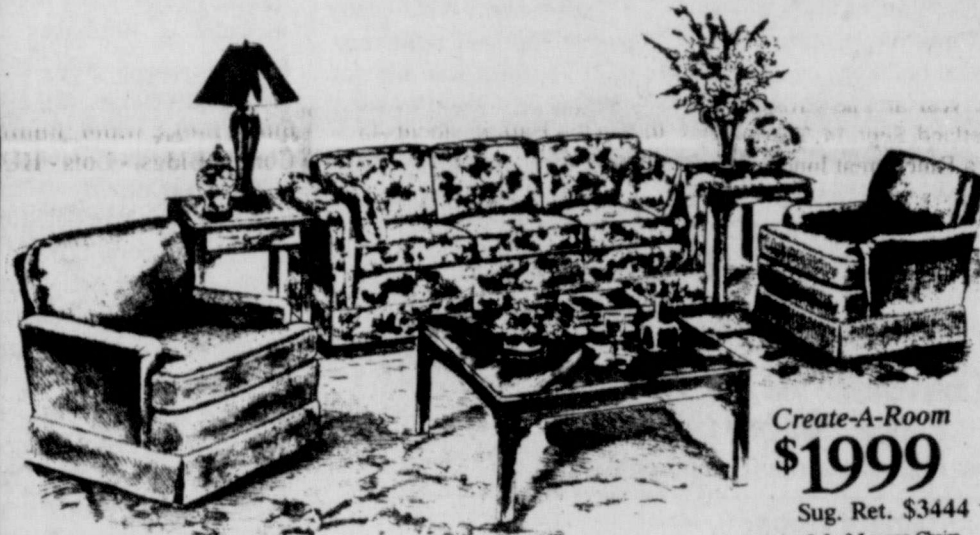
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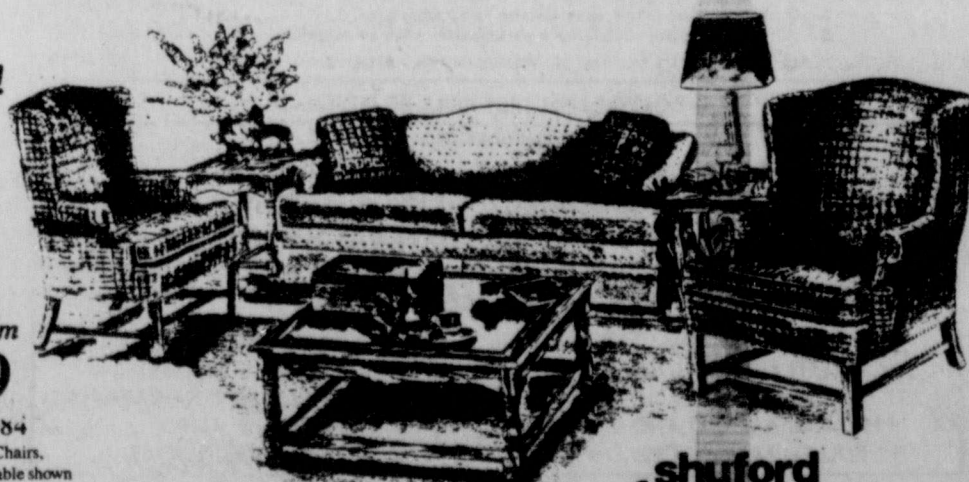

Dear Eastland Citizens,

We're writing this letter to all of you in hopes that we may be able to help prevent a terrible mistake from happening in Eastland.

The election to decide whether or not to have a hospital district is coming up soon. From friends in Eastland, we've heard a lot of comments regarding the proposed district. Some people don't want a district because they don't want to get into the same shape as Gorman (being taxed but without a hospital).

The proposed bill was written to prevent that from happening. The district could not

borrow money (sell bonds) so there will be no debt to pay if the hospital closes.

Some have been upset because they feel that the stockholders have taken too much money for themselves and that this is the cause for the hospital being in financial difficulties. The fact is that the stockholders have never taken any money at all from the hospital as dividends or any other way (board members receive no salaries).

There are two other rumors that we just heard about tonight which prompted us to write this letter:

1. We moved from Eastland because we didn't want a hospital district. Lesa and I have both argued FOR a hospital district since about one year after moved to Eastland. We still own property there and PLAN TO VOTE FOR the hospital district.

2. We moved from Eastland because we could get no cooperation from the hospital board. The fact is that we both worked very hard for a consolidation of the three town's medical facilities but got no cooperation from Ranger or Cisco.

Three years ago (almost to the month), we held a meeting in our home which was attended by the Ranger physician, both Cisco physicians, and all of the Eastland physicians to discuss what we all saw as the inevitable outcome of all the hospitals if something were not done.

The solution that we came up with (actually proposed by Dr. Gohlke) to give Eastland County a CHANCE to continue to have a hospital was to consolidate the hospitals. We even discussed what to do with the other two hospital buildings and jobs, i.e. convert one into a drug/alcohol rehabilitation center and the other into a nursing home and physical therapy center.

Within a few months of moving to Eastland, I asked why consolidation was not done since we could already see what the ultimate outcome of the hospitals was to be. The answer I got (from one of the leading citizens of Eastland) was "Ranger would rather see no hospital in the county than to 'lose out' to Eastland"—it took me four years to realize that he was telling the truth. So as for rumor number 2, we found no lack of cooperation from our own hospital board at all, but found a frustration in the "Friday night football mentality" that would lead to the ultimate loss of all hospital-level care in the entire county.

Rumors or what could or should have been done differently really don't matter now. The main consideration now is whether or not you want a hospital? I know several people that would not be alive today if we had not had a hospital. Travel to Abilene would have taken too long. But consider the more usual thing: where will you go when your child cuts his head open on the coffee table or your baby wakes up at 2:00 a.m. with 103 fever? It would take 3 to 4 hours to get to and from Abilene. Ok, so you call your doctor at home (assuming he/she stays after the hospital closes) and your child has an ear ache. You still have to wait until morning to get a prescription filled since you can't get it at the emergency room. What about the elderly with heart conditions or emphysema who suddenly get worse during the night? Abilene is a long way away (sometimes too long).

The economy is still pretty bad in Eastland right now. Lose your hospital and you will lose all hopes of industry moving to Eastland.

We all tend to take what we have for granted until we lose

it. What you have in Eastland is a good hospital which is on the verge of being lost, probably forever unless you act to save it. Just consider a few of the examples I have given and the alternative to having a hospital at home before deciding for yourselves. How many of you have used the hospital or known someone who has used the hospital in the last year or so? Hopefully, it was for something minor like an earache or small cut on the head but think of how major it would seem if you had to travel to Abilene and wait in a busy emergency room for an hour or more before being seen by the doctor.

Lesla and I have very strong feelings for Eastland and hope that you don't lose something that you will never regain again. We are both voting for the hospital district because we know how important it is to have hospital level of care available closer than an hour away.

I've never written a letter to the editor, but I feel that I

must write this one. I've been reading articles and Letters to the Editor concerning Eastland Memorial Hospital... Some letters for and some against trying to keep it open.

I came to Eastland in 1945 as a young bride and have lived here since. I remember the years when we did not have a hospital. I remember a time in 1948 when we drove to Gorman because of shortage of doctors and a hospital here. I remember what a hard drive it was, and what a strain it put on my husband, J.W. Turner, and our disappointment at losing an infant son prematurely. I don't know if we could have saved him had there been a hospital here, but we could have gotten help sooner, avoided other complications, and my husband would not have had to make that long, hard drive.

I also remember two years later the drive to Ranger when our daughter was born. A hospital in Eastland would have been much quicker. I do not want to live those days again without a hospital here and I don't want others to have to experience what we experienced.

We must do all we can to save our hospital - whether by establishing a tax district, adding to the sales tax, or by some other means. We must all work together to save our hospital. The people of Eastland worked together by contributing money and labor to build this hospital and we must all work together to save it. If we lose our hospital we may also lose our doctors and our ambulance service. Then what will we do? Not everyone can drive to Abilene or some other hospital for help, especially in an emergency. We have wonderful doctors and nurses here and I want to keep them.

I did not know Mrs. Bessie Wimberly Scarborough who died in the Eastland hospital, but I could have written the letter of thanks that her family had printed in the September 3rd edition. J.W. was hospitalized several times last year before he passed away last November. He was in the hospitals in Abilene twice and in Eastland Memorial Hospital four times during the year.

The care he got in the Eastland Hospital would compare with the care he got in Abilene. The doctors and nurses here were very profes-

sional and dedicated to what they were doing.

All of them did everything they could to make J.W. comfortable. They all showed that they cared very much about the welfare of their patient. I can never forget Dr. Treadwell, my pastor, and the two nurses who stood with me as J.W. was dying. It was the caring, the personal touch, that meant so much to me, and still does. We can't afford to lose our hospital and such dedicated, caring people.

We must do all we can to save Eastland Memorial Hospital.

## Pharmacy Topics

High-tech surgery: doctors at the Boston University School of Medicine are combining lasers with magnetic resonance imaging. The targeting ability of the imager aims the laser beam perfectly.

Dermatologists at Yale University are studying the skin's immune system activators. When skin is injured, these cytokines signal for repair; when overactive, they may cause eczema or psoriasis.

New method of birth control is being studied by French and Israeli scientists. They use antagonists to the hormone-like platelet activating factor to block ovulation or implantation in the womb.

Screening test for bladder cancer is being developed at the National Cancer Institute. It spots the presence in the urine of the protein cytokine, known as a cancer marker.

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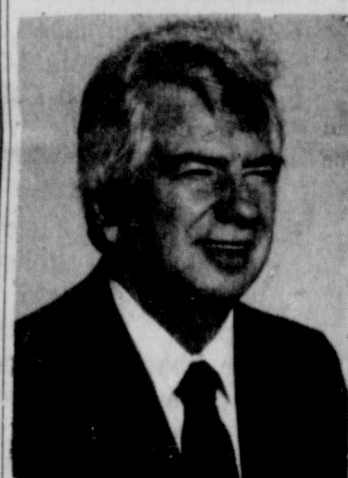

### Health Issues And Views

**By Roy V. Cartee**  
QUESTION: Mr. Cartee, my sister's son is a retarded case, in a nursing home, and about to be removed because of a new law. Can you explain it?

ANSWER: I wish I could give all the answers to the law. It has a fancy name: 1987 Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act. There is considerable confusion in implementing the law. We are afraid in some instances a person may be denied admission for conditions not previously restrict access to a nursing home. Each case is carefully "weighed" by its own merits and problems. I would suggest you patiently work with the nursing home administrator.

QUESTION: Mr. Cartee, I understand there are more hospitals that will be closing in the next 10 years. Why is this?

ANSWER: The Federal forecast states more than 800 hospitals will be closed by the year 2000. That is just 11 years! The causes are many and our space will not allow detailed information. Many of the causes deal with the movement of the population toward urban areas. Another cause is specialization by the physicians. Still another cause is the shift of the age median in the 40-50 year olds are demanding more adequate equipment for diagnosis of the ailments. There is an interesting thing about these closings, however, it is affecting more the rural and urban hospitals.

QUESTION: Mr. Cartee, I take generic prescription drugs and I keep reading of problems with these drugs. Are they safe?

ANSWER: The answer is yes. The FDA found some cause for alarm when there was "cheating" being done in the testing procedures of these drugs. However, the FDA feels this an isolated case and still recommends generic prescription drugs. Our access to quality health care is becoming more and more difficult. Phillips said. "We will be putting emphasis on the Debt and Loan Restructuring (DALRS) computer program that was developed just for this purpose."

Phillips said DALRS does many mathematical calculations quickly and in a number of combinations in helping in the analysis of farm financial plans.

"If a restructuring plan exists that will keep the borrower on the farm, DALRS will find that plan, and that plan will minimize the cost of debt restructuring," he said.

DALRS was developed as a tool to help debt restructuring authorized by the Agricultural Credit Act of 1987. FmHA farm borrowers who are behind in their payments should, by all means, try to attend this meeting, Phillips said.

# Homemaking Hints

From Janet Thomas, County Extension Agent

## SAVE ENERGY & MONEY

Many consumers buy large quantities of foods on sale and freeze them for later use in order to save money. However, the money saved by freezing fresh foods can easily be eaten up by energy costs if you don't make proper use of your home freezer.

A frost-free freezer cost about \$15 per month for electricity, depending upon its size and your local electric rates. You can keep your freezer from using more electricity than necessary by making sure it operates efficiently, says Bonnie Piernot, a consumer economics specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

One way to use less electricity is by locating it inside the house.

"A freezer inside the home requires less energy than one kept in the garage because it doesn't have to work as hard to maintain its low temperature," Piernot says.

When the garage is the only space available, put the freezer against an inside wall if possible, since it will be cooler there. If your garage has no ventilation, consider adding a roof vent for air circulation and lowering temperature.

Remember also that a full freezer runs more efficiently than one that is half empty. If you don't use your freezer much, consider unplugging it. Instead buy only the food you need and store it in the refrigerator.

Additionally, check your freezer for leaks. Older freezers often use extra energy because the rubber gaskets inside the freezer door become loose and allow cold air to escape.

"You can test the rubber gasket by placing a piece of paper in the door and closing it. If you can pull the paper out without tearing it, the gasket needs to be replaced."

Piernot says.

Depending upon the size of the freezer, replacing a rubber gasket is about a \$15 to \$25 do-it-yourself job.

To get the most out of the food you have frozen, it is important to check the freezer's temperature and to securely wrap all items. For best quality, make sure the temperature of the freezer is 0 degree F or less.

## RECIPE FOR THE WEEK

### APPLE SPICE CAKE

- 1 2 layer pkg. spice cake mix without pudding
- 3 eggs
- 1 21 oz. can apple pie filling, coarsely chopped
- 1/2 cup chopped pecans
- 1/2 cup butter
- 1/2 cup each sugar, flour
- 1/2 tsp. cinnamon
- 1/2 cup chopped pecans

Combine—cake mix, eggs and 3 tablespoons water in mixer bowl.

Beat — at medium speed for 2 minutes.

Stir — in pie filling and 1/2 cup pecans.

Pour — into greased and floured 9 x 13 inch baking pan.

Mix — remaining ingredients in bowl until crumbly.

Sprinkle — over batter. Bake — at 350 degrees for 40 to 45 minutes or until cake tests done. Cut cooled cake into squares to serve.

Yields — 12 servings.

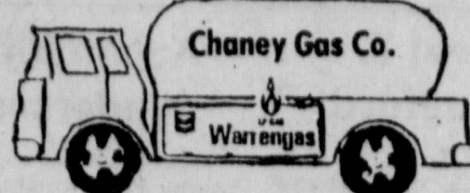

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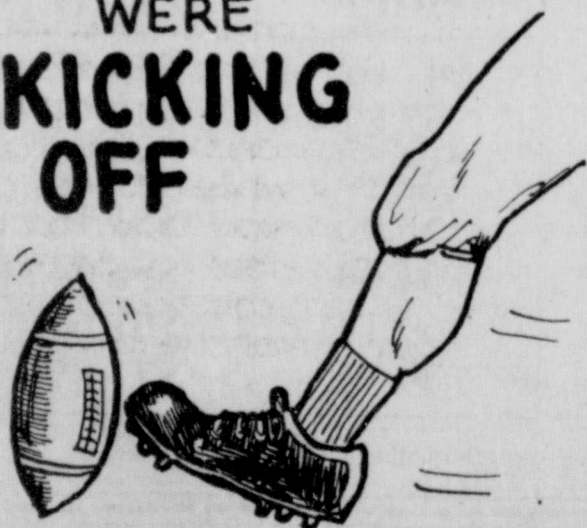
