The following letter from Margaret M. Lowen of Santa Barbara, California, was received by Lela Lloyd last Saturday. Mrs. Lloyd thought because of its reference to Cisco of the '20s that some people might be interested in reading it.

It is reprinted as follows: Dear Mrs. Lloyd:

By now you have probably heard from your sister, Mary Carey, and of our strange and interesting meeting in her shop near Talkeetna.

Seeing your book, "Cisco, Cradle of Hilton's Empire," prompted me to ask: "Why would you have a book about Cisco, Texas, on your shelves?"

When she replied you were her sister and she had grown up in Cisco, I replied that I had lived there at one time, also.

The more we compared notes the more excited we became as we realized we have both moved to Cisco about the same time.

Although she is younger than I, I am 81, we seemed to have a lot in common. My sister, Ella Bald, sold tickets at the old theater in the early '20's. I used to go down before dark, watch the show and then "walk her home." Mary told me she did the same with you. Later, Ella worked as a long distance operator with the telephone company, then married Melton Bills.

I only lived in Cisco for two years, but had revisited the town last January. Many memories came flooding back as I toured the Mobley and saw the Methodist Church, of which we were members during Rev. Stuckey's time.

I remember Miss Fanny Stevens as one of my teachers at school. I think she was a "legend."

How strange that I, now living in California, should meet your sister in the middle of Alaska and both of us have memories of a small town in Texas. As has been said so many times: "it is a small world."

I enjoyed talking with your sister, appreciated her warm hospitality as she served us tea and coffee, and will continue to marvel at this unusual encounter.

Reading your book has been an interesting experience although I was really not old enough to remember much of the historical information.

Thank you for being a part of this unusual incident.

A law effective Oct. 1, 1989, will limit the time for cashing Federal Government checks to one year. Currently, Government checks have no time limit in which to cash them.

The law will require that Government checks dated October 1 and later be cashed within one year of their issue. The checks will carry a notation, "Void After One Year."

The law also provides that all Government checks issued any time before October 1, 1989, will have to be cashed not later than September 30, 1990.

The new law allows a one-year period during which a claim concerning a lost or stolen check may be filed. In addition, the Department of the Treasury will have 18 months to begin recovery of funds from a financial institution if a check has been negotiated over a forged or unauthorized endorsement.

While the new law sets a time limit on cashing a check, it will not affect an individual's entitlement to payment. A bona fide holder of an expired check, however, will have to contact the Government agency which authorized the check and the agency can arrange for a replacement check to be issued.

The Federal Government issued approximately 550 million checks annually with a value exceeding \$600 billion.

Cisco Junior College Wranglers routed Midwestern State University's junior varsity 39-to-0 Thursday night at Chesley Field.

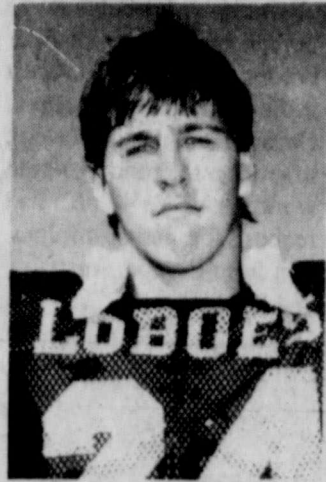
The game started at 9:55 p.m. because it was played following Cisco's junior high and junior varsity games.

## Lobo Defense Shines In Loss; Homecoming Game Friday

The Cisco Lobos, smitten by injuries to three key players, turned in a defensive masterpiece, on Friday night, only to come out on the short end of a 13-0 ledger.

Coleman, which celebrated their annual homecoming festivities during the half, learned early that moving the ball, the length of the field, against Harvey Perkins and Lobo defense was to be no easy chore. Perkins, who had seen Coleman's first possession end in a punt, picked off a Jeff Hammonds pass on Cisco's own 24 yard line to put a hastily end to the Bluecats' first drive into Lobo territory.

The Bluecats, improving their record to 1-2, finally managed to post the only points of the first half when tailback Keary Jefferson ground out a four-yard touchdown. Hammonds extra point kick lifted the Bluecats to a wobbly 7-0 lead.

Coleman threatened again late in the half, but the Cisco defense, which has given up only 22 points in the Lobos' two losses, demonstrated their defensive fortitude on a cru-

On July 20, 1969, Astronauts Buzz Aldrin and Neil Armstrong moved down the ladder from the Lunar Module, "The Eagle," and stepped onto the surface of the moon. "One Small Step for Man—One Giant Step for Mankind."

Men From Earth is a tremendous book written by Buzz Aldrin in collaboration with Malcolm McConnell, author, journalist and roving editor for Reader's Digest. It covers not only this momentous occasion, but also accounts of prior research, trials, failures, and successes, and recognition of the many companies and individuals whose knowledge and work culminated in the success of Apollo 11. Of special appeal is Aldrin's sharing of his personal emotions and reflections as he and fellow-explorer Arm-

We Can In Peace for All Mankind."

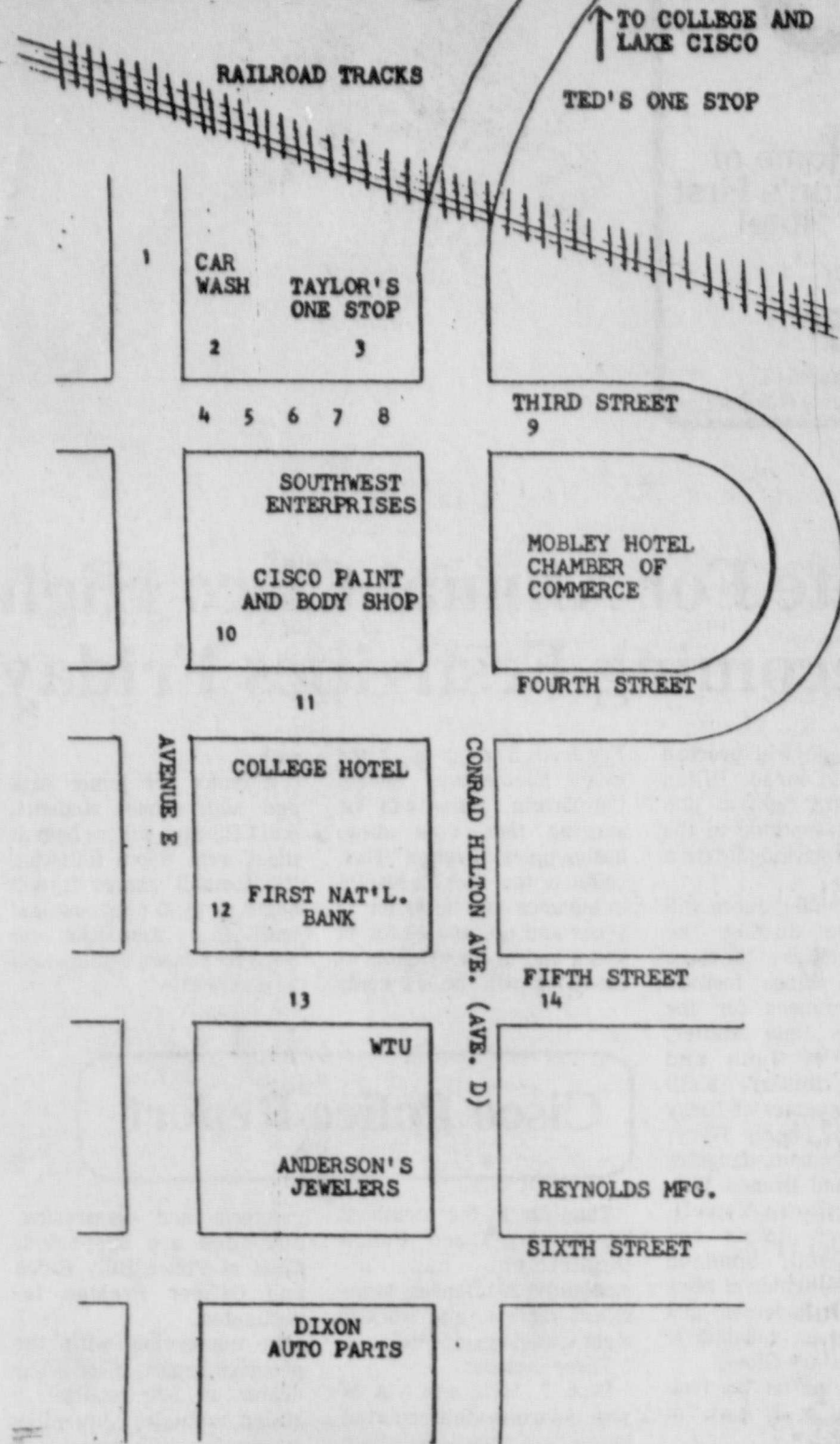

# Texas Tracks The Growth Of An Idea

The latest craze to sweep the nation is doing just that—sweeping America clean. The Adopt-a-Highway program, which originated in the Texas highway department, is being adopted nationwide.

"It's a plan we're proud to see the rest of the nation copy," said J. Don Clark, director of the department's Travel and Information Division.

A recent survey by the department discovered that 40 of the 50 states—80 percent—have or want to have Adopt-a-Highway programs.

From sea to sea and sometimes beneath it, Americans are cleaning up. Volunteers in 24 states regularly don orange safety vests and give their state's highways the spic-and-span treatment.

A dozen of these states have had up to three years of experience with concerned citizens volunteering to clean adopted stretches of highway.

The survey reveals that two-thirds of the states with established programs are in the South—Alabama, Arkansas, Louisiana, Mississippi, North Carolina, Oklahoma, and Virginia, as well as Texas, Arizona, Colorado, Missouri, and Utah, are the other four Adopt-a-Highway veterans.

The other 12 states with active programs launched them in the first six months of this year. Sixteen more states are developing plans for a program. Several will activate programs this fall, while other states plan to initiate their versions in the next two years.

Under Adopt-a-Highway programs, organizations volunteer to keep a segment of highway clean for a set time period. States vary in the number of required cleanups

and the length of the adoptions, the survey found.

Most plans stipulate two miles of highway for two years with at least four scheduled pickups each year. Other states use the more flexible "clean as necessary" policy. In exchange, highway departments supply safety vests and trash bags and collect the filled bags.

Signs crediting the organization responsible for the highway cleaning are posted on each end of the segment in most states. The white-on-blue signs usually read "Adopt-a-Highway Next 2 miles cleaned by (Such-n-Such Group)."

North Carolina reports the most volunteers. "We've very pleased to have reached the 10 percent (of highway miles adopted) mark," said John Roghrock, Adopt-a-Highway coordinator. He said the litter-conscious state has 3,578 groups committed to keeping almost 8,000 miles of roadways clean.

But Texas' pioneering program continues to grow. Today, 3,320 volunteer groups work to keep 6,858 miles of Texas highways free of litter.

South Carolina is also seeing a rapid spread of the concept within its borders. In one year, 650 groups adopted 1,615 miles of roadway, proving the truth of the state's antilitter slogan: "It adds up."

The program in Virginia and West Virginia generate high interest as well. Between them, more than 4,000 miles are cared for by almost 1,600 groups. West Virginia, actively recruiting volunteers since January, has more than 2,300 miles adopted. The state says "Dare to Care about Virginia" has 1,750 miles committed to volunteer cleanups.

Missouri reports an almost 1,000 percent increase in volunteers. Established in 1987, the Show Me state had only 26 groups starting the spring cleanup season. The program mushroomed to 2,370 groups as of July 1.

Louisiana, Mississippi, and Oklahoma are three other states with more than 1,000 miles adopted. While they love the popularity of the idea, they find it hard to keep up with the public's demand for more stretches of roadway to adopt.

New twists have improved the Adopt-a-Highway concept for some states. "We encourage individuals, businesses, and garden clubs to submit their beautification project ideas to us for approval," said Barbara Petrarca of the Rhode Island Department of Transportation's landscape section. The volunteers supply the dollars as well as the labor for the improvements, she explained.

For those who don't want to make long-term commitments, Minnesota promotes a one-day, one-shot deal—the "Pick-a-Highway."

Michigan has yet another angle on the program, with emphasis on law enforcement. Litter watchdogs call 1-800-44-TRASH to report violations. The system is trunked through police lines in Detroit and Kalamazoo, and eventually it will operate statewide. A deposit on bottles makes it profitable for Michigan residents to hang on to glass beverage containers. Milk cartons are also being recycled; they are melted and used to build retaining walls and benches in state parks.

While the Adopt-a-Highway program is proving to be a popular way to keep highways beautiful and litter-free, the concept is not immediately adaptable in some states. Safety requirements, union dissent, and other obstacles must be overcome before

programs can be implemented.

But where there are Adopt-a-Highway programs, there are also reduced litter figures. Texas leads the country with a reported 64 percent reduction in total roadside litter statewide since 1985.

"It seems to appeal to everyone," said Clark. "Not only is there an Adopt-a-Highway plan being established in practically every state from coast to coast and border to border, but even beyond our borders there is real interest in the program. Just next door, Canada is taking a closer look to see how the concept would work there. We've also had requests for start-up information from Europe, Australia, and Brazil."

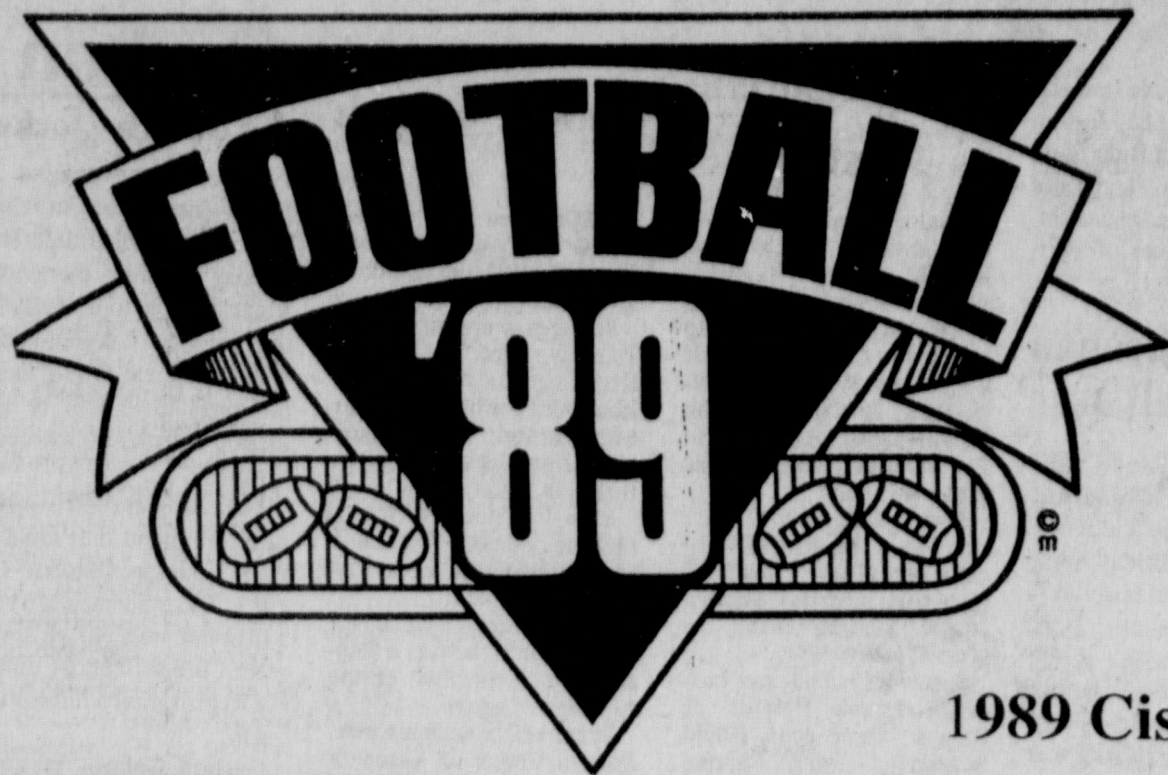
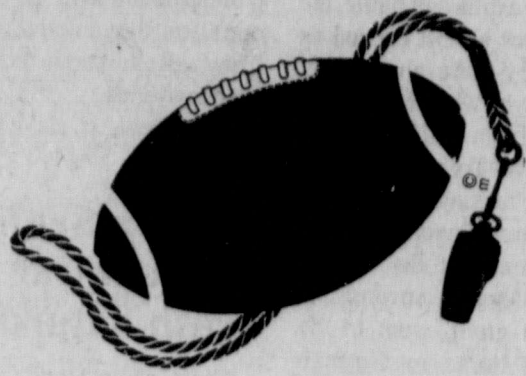

New gynecological guidelines say that woman can deliver a child naturally, barring specific medical reasons, even if she's had two cesarean sections before.

Researchers at the University of Louisville are fooling decay-causing bacteria with a substance that looks and acts like glucans, the part of plaque that attracts and holds sticky stuff. Germs bind to the fake plaque and can be flushed out of the mouth.

From Japan comes news of the use of CDP-choline a form of a B vitamin, for victims of moderate to severe stroke. Researchers believe the vitamin helps repair cell membranes and reduces fatalities, too.

Calcium intake may protect against colon cancer, say scientists at the University of Utah School of Medicine. Researchers suggest calcium works by binding with fat and bile acids that might cause tumors.

Possible substitute for fish oil: Department of Agriculture scientists say that the human body can convert soybean oil to the fatty acids we need.

## Commissioners Amend Prison Resolution To Meet Again Monday, Oct. 2nd

Eastland County Commissioners Monday voted to amend the Resolution they passed June 12 pleading financial support on the purchase of a prison site in the county.

That portion of the original Resolution read: "That, upon selection of a site by TDC as presented in the submitted proposal, the County of Eastland expresses its intent to issue necessary certificates of obligation or other instruments of financing, whichever proves most advantageous to the county, to fund the purchase of land for the facility, and

"That, whatever legal arrangements necessary are to be completed making the land available at no cost to the Texas Department of Corrections."

The portion omitted Monday is: "or other instruments of financing, whichever proves most advantageous to the county."

This leaves the only method of financing (open to the county) the issuance of bonds of obligation. It also leaves open the possibility of a county-wide election as to whether to issue the bonds or not.

County Judge Scott Bailey stated that if the County decides to issue bonds to pay for the land, it will take a petition with 5% of the registered voters to ask for a recall election. Opponents of the prison land purchase will have 14 days to get this petition signed and presented.

On Monday, Oct. 2 at 1 p.m. the Commissioners will hold a special meeting to decide on details of possible financing. The request for this meeting was brought last Monday by Dr. Charles Barnes,

speaking for the Eastland County Economic Development Council. With Dr. Barnes was Eastland Banker Grover Hallmark, Cisco banker L.D. Wooley, John Berry, and Don Shepherd, President of the Economic Council.

Also in the courtroom were a large group of citizens opposed to the construction of a prison in Eastland County. The main thrust of their discussions included the land purchase by the county, and the request for a legal way to have a vote in the matter.

The discussion from the floor and sometimes between two sides in the Courtroom also ranged over a wide variety of topics, including county resources, taxation, lifestyle, the cost of a prison to the county, money and jobs. The exchange was frank, sometimes it was heated, but flashes of wit helped liven the morning.

Dr. Barnes stated that he was the Volunteer Coordinator of the Eastland County Development Council, and

that on July 31 he and other Council members had carried a proposal to the State for a new maximum 2500-bed prison to be built in Eastland County.

He said that a site the County group had selected near Carbon was visited by TDC representatives in late August, and another visit is expected in October from the Texas Board of Criminal Justice. At that time it will be determined whether Eastland County is still in the running, Barnes said.

He added that all the banks in Eastland County stood ready to assist the Commissioners in financing arrangements.

He said this was an urgent matter, and requested that the Court hold a meeting Monday, Oct. 2 to work out procedures.

The Commissioners agreed to meet, but Richard Robinson (Pct. 1) and L.T. Owen (Pct. 3) said they "were having some trouble with the legality of the thing."

Robinson mentioned a possible lawsuit to the County

if the Commissioners went forward before the actual land selection by the TDC. District Attorney Emory Walton stated that he didn't see how preliminary steps on acquiring the land would be in conflict with regulations.

Barnes urged the Commissioners to get the papers prepared and ready to be signed. He said the land site near Carbon was only 931.168 acres instead of 1,000 acres as previously mentioned. When road right-of-ways were purchased, however, the cost would still be around \$650,000.

Billy Bacon, Comm. of Pct. 4, asked why this site N.E. of Carbon had to be the location. He said he knew of 900-plus acres S. of I-20 between Eastland and Cisco that was available.

Barnes replied that this was a little late - the Carbon site was the one submitted. Detailed surveys had already been done on the Carbon place, he added.

At this time County Judge Scott Bailey recognized Carol Bullock, who had five agenda

items she wanted to present to the Court. In the first, she requested that the Commissioner's Court rescind its resolution supporting submission of a prison site proposal to the TDC, obligating the County to fund the purchase of land.

"I would like you to reconsider the County authority to purchase land," Mrs. Bullock said. "On June 12 you committed county money and credit, and no notice was given us, the people."

Mrs. Bullock added that the Commissioners were first told that private funds would be raised, then at the meeting Sept. 11 were told that no money had been pledged, and it might take several years to get the money in.

"They have not lived up to this commitment, so why should this Resolution be allowed to stand?" she asked.

She also addressed the matter of site selection, saying that if county funds were to be used the Commissioners should be involved in the site selection.

Jimmy Hughes then spoke, saying that the right to vote on this was very important to him.

When the Commissioners made no move to drop their Resolution, Mrs. Bullock

appealed to them at least limit their options, so the public "may petition you with a vote."

Richard Robinson made the motion to amend the Resolution, and the motion passed.

Carol Bullock and several others thanked the Court, saying "If we had been allowed to vote on this in August it would have been settled right now."

The discussion - sometimes from the audience - turned to why the land near Carbon was chosen.

"Why is that land worth so much more than similar land in the county?" One individual asked. "It was sold to the present owner this year at \$440-\$470 per acre. Why has the land jumped up \$200?"

Don Shepherd of Cisco took the floor and attempted to answer questions. He explained that the land in question met site requirements from the TDC for level land so forth, he said that the availability of this land was a big factor - that selection of other land could have caused us to "lose \$60-\$70,000 up front money."

Shepherd said there was nothing bad about having a prison in a community. "I wanted to put it over there a mile and a half from my

house," He said. (In the Nimrod Community.)

The discussion turned to the cost of a prison in the County, in regard to sewer lines, water, roads, addition to the county jail and so forth. Shepherd said the "back up water" for the prison would be ground water, in case the Lake became low. This remark, like several others, was not well received by peanut

farmers in the audience.

Shepherd said that if any of the other school districts wouldn't take the extra children brought by prison workers, the Superintendent of Schools in Cisco had said he would take all of the estimated 400 of them.

He discussed fringe benefits from the location of a prison here. Someone answered that "All we're going

to get is a tax burden - a few of the special interest groups will benefit."

Several farmers said they resented the county subsidizing these benefits.

Shepherd asked the farmers: "How much of your income comes from price support? Fifty percent of your money comes from taxes."

After this sidetrack of the prison discussion other comments resumed. Earl Bullock, President of EBAA Iron said: "It makes me mad as all get-out to hear some of you folks call this prison an 'Industry'. Why spend all this money for something you can't even be proud of?"

"I think you ought to put it to a vote. Why don't the folks that want it done do that?"

The discussion continued long past noon. As it concluded, Comm. Richard Robinson also mentioned votes. "What we've done here this morning is to bring this thing to a vote."

Next Monday's meeting should add another chapter to this on-going story.

Legislation affecting our natural resources was included in the work accomplished by the 71st Legislature. Legislation making changes in the Water Code, the Parks and Wildlife Code and the Natural Resources Code will have an impact on those who live in the 22nd Senatorial District.

Touching on the highlights of this legislation, House Bill 1588, known as the Groundwater Protection Bill, will help ensure that our drinking water is protected from contamination from leaking petroleum tanks. This bill establishes a comprehensive State policy to protect groundwater and surface water from pollution from aboveground and belowground storage tanks.

Under the bill, a fee on the delivery of certain petroleum products, including gasoline, will go into the petroleum storage tank remediation fund. This fund will be used to clean up contamination due to leaking storage tanks, and establishes owner/operator

responsibilities and liabilities. In addition, HB 1588 provides for stronger regulation of all storage tanks. Also provided for is the registration of aboveground tanks, and for corrective action to be taken by the Texas Water Commission.

Other legislation affecting our natural resources passed by the 71st Legislature includes SB 2, the Colonias Water Bill, which will provide water and sewer facilities to economically depressed areas in South Texas. This bill also requires the Texas Water Development Board to develop model rules which described minimum water and sewer facilities, which must be followed by the political subdivision ap-

plying for assistance. Portions of this bill are subject to approval of a proposed Constitutional Amendment.

SB 61 authorizes the Texas Water Development Board to issue an additional \$500 million water development bonds, subject to passage of a proposed Constitutional Amendment.

SB 609 prohibits fishing with certain devices, primarily those used to shock or electrocute fish.

SB 631 removes river authorities from Sunset review. SB 698 allows retail service stations located in an unincorporated area or in a municipality with a population under 5,000 to store up to 2,000 gallons of fuel in an aboveground storage tank.

SB 769 requires the Texas Air Control Board to adopt rules requiring the use of natural gas and other alternative fuels in autos and boilers located in metropolitan areas. SB 1117 provides that the Texas Water Development Board may issue bonds to establish an agricultural water conservation fund, making available conservation loans to certain districts.

SB 1212 is comprehensive legislation providing for the creation and administration of underground water conservation districts.

SB 1507 transfers regulation of fish farming, except for exotic fish, to the Department of Agriculture; requires licensure of cultured-fish processing plants and provides that certain fish, shellfish or aquatic plants may not be introduced into public waters of this State without a permit.

SB 1519 requires the Texas

Department of Health to develop a statewide plan for the disposal of solid waste.

SB 1611 prohibits the operation of water vessels within 50 feet of a marked area where there is scuba diving or snorkeling.

HB 183 requires the installers of underground storage tanks to be licensed and established the Underground Storage Tank Advisory Committee.

HB 464 provides that the first Saturday in June of each year is a free sportfishing day, and that no license is required to fish on that day.

HB 504 requires service station operators to post notice if their fuel contain ethanol or methanol and creates penalties for failure to comply.

HB 953 requires that no person under 13 may operate a motorboat unless accompanied by some 16 or older.

HB 995 includes service stations that sell petroleum to self-propelled marine craft to be included in the regulation of storage, handling and use of flammable liquids.

HB 1189, HB 1190 and HB 1191 provide that the Texas Water Commission must approve a proposal to issue bonds, and determine that the project is feasible.

HB 1229 defines an "electricity-producing device" and changes the penalty provisions.

HB 1318 allows the Texas Railroad Commission to sell abandoned well site equipment.

HB 1333 prohibits water control and improvement districts or municipal utility districts from imposing a standby fee on undeveloped property in addition to taxes levied on that property.

HB 1922 sets forth what is sufficient liability insurance for those who wish to construct an injection well, and under what conditions liability insurance may be used as security.

HB 2262 provides that those who have served 20 years of active or reserve military service or who have completed initial active duty training for the Texas National Guard may participate in the Texas Veterans Land Program.

HB 2306 provides that a board of a municipal utility district may hold a hearing on the exclusion of land from a

district for the purpose of authorizing bonds if the district has not issued bonds and a petition representing the consent of a majority of landowners in the district has been presented to the secretary of the board.

HB 2468 requires the Texas Air Control Board to adopt rules governing the emission of air contaminants from a commercial infectious waste incinerator.

HB 3060 allows a water district to acquire the water, sewer or drainage facilities of a member-owned, consumer-owned water supply corporation.

HB 3078 prohibits the hunting or killing of wildlife from an airplane and allows the game warden or other authorized employee to confiscate a plane or gun used in the hunting.

HB 3085 expands regulations relating to private bird hunting areas, requiring that records be kept, and allowing for the issuance of field trial permits.

## Mobile Cancer Detection Unit To Be In Eastland October 2

The Mobile Breast Cancer Detection Unit of Odessa, which services Eastland, Texas, today received the certification of the American College of Radiology Mammography Accreditation Program.

Mammography is an x-ray examination of the breast, which the American Cancer Society and other medical experts see as the best means for the early detection of breast cancer.

The program is voluntary and is designed to insure that women receive optimum quality mammographic examinations. The process is done through a peer review evaluation of the facility's

staff qualifications, equipment, quality control and quality assurance programs, image quality, and breast dose. The accreditation must be renewed every three years.

The accreditation program was instituted because of the concerns of radiologists, other national medical organizations, and the public that qualified personnel perform and interpret mammograms and that dedicated mammographic equipment be used. The American College of Radiology received an American Cancer Society Control Grant which was used to pilot test the Accreditation Program.

Breast cancer will strike

one in 10 American women. The American Cancer Society predicts that about 41,000 women will die of breast cancer this year. As there is no way to prevent the disease, early detection and treatment offer the greatest hope for survival.

The American Cancer Society recommends that women do monthly breast self-exams and have regular physical breast exams by a doctor. It further recommends mammography on the following schedule:

A baseline mammogram (for reference) between age 35 and 39.

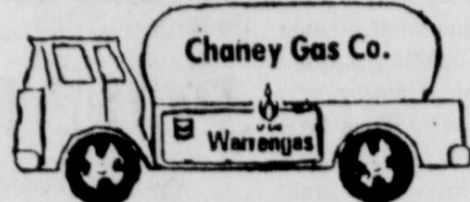
A mammogram every one or two years between age 40 and 49.

An annual mammogram from age 50.

## Number To Report Traffic Accidents Available Oct. 1

AUSTIN—Beginning October 1, motorists in Texas will be able to use a toll-free telephone number to report traffic accidents, suspected driving while intoxicated cases, criminal activities and other emergencies.

The new number is 1-800-525-5555. It will be answered on a 24-hour basis by communications personnel at the Department of Public Safety Headquarters in Austin. Calls will be routed to the appropriate law enforcement agency on a priority basis.

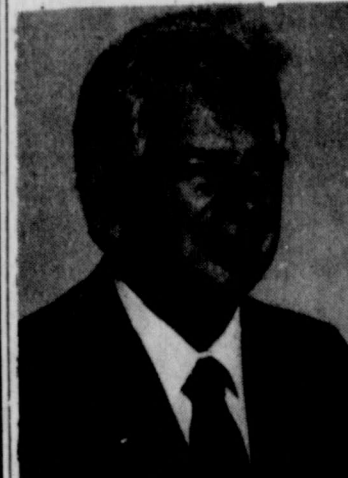
"This number does not replace the 9-1-1 service you may have in your area," stressed DPS Assistant Director James Wilson. "The new 800 number is intended to be used in cases where no 9-1-1 service is available, or in instances where the person needing assistance does not know another emergency number to call. It should not be used to seek routine information or service."

The new emergency service being offered by the DPS was provided for in House Bill 1633 by State Rep. Betty Denton of Waco. Gov. William P. Clements signed it into law on June 16, 1989.

"We expect the 800 number will be the most useful to motorists on rural highways, many of whom are travelers not familiar with the phone number they should call in case of emergency," Wilson said. "Those who live in areas served by a 9-1-1 system, or those who know the police, sheriff's department or DPS number in their area, should continue to use that local number."

Texas is now only the 14th state to adopt 1-800-525-5555, which has been designed as the universal telephone number for state law enforcement agencies.

Always the corner stone event of the Roaring Ranger Day Celebration, this year's contest should be better than ever since it will feature many of the all-time swamp surfing greats as well as several new young challengers.
