City Council Names Airport Advisory Board

An airport advisory board was named at the regular meeting of Cisco City Council last Tuesday night. Members of the board are Chairman Ronnie Ledbetter, Brad Kimbrough, James Cotton, Gerald Winnett, and Don Shepard. The city manager will be an ex-officio member of the board and will serve as the board's recording secretary.

The purpose of the board will be to provide advice and direction to the city council regarding the overall development and operations of Cisco Municipal Airport.

Rylander, Clay and Opitz of Fort Worth was named independent auditor for the City of Cisco for fiscal year 1988-89. Joe Cooper is the local representative.

The council adopted the budget for the fiscal year October 1, 1989 through September 30, 1990.

M.L. Bailey was appointed election judge and Margaret Torres alternate election judge for the January 20, 1990, city general election and for the absentee ballot board.

The council approved a resolution authorizing the city to enter into an interagency agreement with Taylor County and a cooperative working agreement with

West Central Texas Interlocal Crime Task Force. This allows Cisco Police Investigator Adrian Huddleston to work with WCTICF while remaining an employee of the City of Cisco and maintaining his law enforcement commission. The city will be reimbursed for his salary cost and there will be no additional expense to the city.

Approval was made of a resolution supporting Proposition 8 on the November general ballot for funding for construction of new correctional facilities.

In other action, the council presented an Award Certificate of Retirement to Frank Young, who has retired after 15 years as a city employee. Mayor Joe Wheatley proclaimed Wednesday, Sept. 27, 1989, as "Frank Young Day" in Cisco.

City Manager Michael Moore reminded everyone that the new trash pickup policy will become effective Monday, Oct. 2. Residential pickup will now be once a week. The Monday and Thursday routes will be picked up on Mondays, and the Tuesday and Friday routes will be picked up on Tuesdays.

Cisco Junior Varsity Defeated By Bangs Thursday Night

Cisco's junior varsity fought a hard defensive battle against the Bangs Dragons Thursday night but were defeated 6-to-0. The game was played in Bangs.

This was the JV's first loss of the season and their record now stands at 3-1.

The only score of the game came with 8:12 left in the first half when Bangs scored. The PAT failed and the score was 6-to-0.

Cisco had several oppor-

tunities to score, according to Coach Charles Parnell, but the Lobos were unable to break a run for a touchdown.

"Bangs was bigger than we anticipated," Coach Parnell said. "Our boys played very hard, and I believe this loss will help them become a better team."

Lobo Johnny Morrison ended the game with 106 yards rushing and Terrance

Fletcher had 38 yards. The entire offensive line played outstanding, the coach said. Brian Callarman caught a 12-yard pass for the only pass completion for Cisco.

Defensively, Coach Parnell praised the front line—Bradlee Rains, Robi Speegle, Michael Gosnell and Johnny Morrison, and linebacker Jr. Stroebel, who had 18 tackles. Terrance Fletcher had one pass interception to stop a Bangs

scoring threat.

The junior varsity will play Albany here next Thursday night, Oct. 5. Their game will follow the 7th and 8th grade games.

County Commissioners Discuss Prison Site Financing At Meet

Eastland County Commissioners Court on Sept. 25 produced enough news for more than one article. Quite a bit of time was spent on the discussion of prison site financing and related matters - with more of the same scheduled for Monday, Oct. 2 at 1 p.m.

A number of other agenda matters were also covered during the day-long meeting on Monday.

The morning session began with a visit from Bob Viterna, formerly with the Texas Jail Standards Commission. Viterna was previously involved with inspections and rulings on the

Eastland County Jail. He is now with International Systems Inc., a manufacturer of modular concrete jails.

"Two years ago you were having problems," Viterna reminded the Commissioners. "You looked at property behind the existing jail and had preliminary plans made."

He said he could increase the County Jail by 24 beds for an estimated cost of \$750,000 - give or take nine percent.

The units would include lights, locks, beds, plumbing, fixtures - everything but mattresses. "And the Sheriff will have to furnish the prison."

and I do appreciate your thoughtfulness. I will convey your message to Shirley Green too!



Editor,

I read with interest the article published in some of the newspapers regarding the ratings of Legislators by Lynn Oates, who identified himself as chairman of something called Texans for Financial Responsibility.

The most interesting part of the article was Mr. Oates giving myself and Senators Krier, Brown, Carriker, Ratliff and Sims a grade of F on financial responsibility. Everyone who is familiar with the Legislature got a big laugh out of this. Senators Krier, Brown, Ratliff and Sims are the most conservative members of the Texas Senate. Everyone obviously knew Mr. Oates did not know what he was talking about, but they did not know how he developed his grading system. On further review, I discovered the following:

Mr. Oates used only three issues among the approximately 3,250 votes cast in the Senate. He used the unpassed House bill on workers' compensation, the unpassed ban on State income taxes, and the bill passed to propose a constitutional amendment to raise legislative salaries.

Even using these issues, Mr. Oates did not know what he was doing. He gave all the Senators that voted against the workers' compensation bill in the Senate an F. He thought that the bill that passed the Senate was the House version of the workers' compensation bill. He did not understand that the bill that passed the Senate was the trial lawyer - labor version of workers' compensation reform that was substituted for HB 1. Those of us

that are for true workers' compensation reform could not vote for the Senate version of the bill. This was not a vote on HB 1.

I certainly do not advocate that a person does not have the right to make any critical statement he or she wants to make about the Legislature. I do not advocate that a person does not have the right to grade the work of the Legislature. What is a bit disturbing is for a person to grade the legislature when he absolutely does not know what he is doing. Mr. Oates gave the traditional liberal members of the Senate grades of A, and the conservative members of the Senate grades of F, and the people who know the legislative process are laughing at Mr. Oates.



Eastland County Hay Show Scheduled For October 26

The Eastland County Hay Show has been scheduled for Thursday, October 26th. All Eastland county producers are encouraged to pull a sample of their hay for the show according to DeMarquis Gordon, Eastland County Extension Agent. A show sample consist of one fourth (1/4) of a conventional bale or five pound box of hay pulled from a large bale.

The hay show samples must be left at a local feed or fertilizer store, the County Extension agent's office or with a member of the Livestock and Forage Committee on or before October 12. Producers should include their name, address, and kind of hay. A producer may enter one

sample in each of seven classes. The classes include:

1. Alfalfa and other Legumes
2. Coastal Bermudagrass
3. Other Bermudagrasses
4. Forage Sorghums - sudan and hybrids
5. Other Perennial grasses
6. Oats and other annual grasses
7. Peanut Hay

Protein analysis will be made on each entry at no cost to the producers. Gordon says, the hay show judge will classify each entry based on the protein score and the physical score. Physical score is determined by the stage of maturity, texture, leafiness, foreign material, and color. Ribbons and plaques will be

awarded to the winners.

Hay shows are designed to be educational and provide producers an opportunity to see the difference in hay quality. It is important that producers know all the key elements that go into top quality hays, says the agent.

As the decision-time draws near for those areas which are to be selected for major state penal facilities, it is a time for our citizens to stand shoulder-to-shoulder in one accord in a resolve to welcome and work for the achievable entity that can bring new economic life to our area.

All are convinced that geography, circumstances and the climate of the day make Eastland County a really top contender for selection as one of the sites.

And no one should lose sight of the fact that that means jobs, payrolls and long-time, solid investment in our county.

But now is the time for those who see the possibilities, believe in the need and endorse the efforts to stand up, sound off and be heard, so that the county can be recognized as united in the majority. Too often, we are all guilty of assuming too much, and herein causes are lost, simply because good people didn't let their opinions be heard.

Voices in favor of the prison in letters to the editor, statements of support among friends and associates and even contacts up to and including asking, "What can we do to help make it happen?"

These are the things that can make it happen. Previously we've conceded that it won't be easy, but that it would provide the kind of growing pains that few forward-thinking people object to. For the most part, we're going to have to make most of the developments for water, sewerage treatment and other facilities anyway at some given time, and that it sure would be better to be helped by other tax-paying citizens to help accomplish these things.

tries here were too high. We now know that those were good investments. Because these transplants to our midst are now good citizens here helping us now. Too high is a relative term: to Hous, my long-gone Daddy, the some \$12,000.00 we pay for each truckload of newsprint would have been unimaginable high for him.

Safety? This has been touched so many times. Most agree that safety would actually be increased with a prison here.

Image? The prisons we've seen don't look like the stereotyped movie images most of us have. For the most part, if you didn't know what they were, you'd guess that they might be a factory of some sort.

Damaging to our "quaint-little-town" image? Hardly.

There was a time when this county had a reputation for being a "uranium-sitting" center. This was back when there was a rage for the healing powers of sitting in or on sand which supposedly contained that then newly discovered element.

If that didn't wreck us, image-wise, what could? A state penitentiary is a clean, permanent industry with a gigantic payroll that would do nothing but enhance the quality of life for all in Eastland County.

Why would so many other towns have asked for the privilege if it were not so? Those here who have worked so hard, and who are still willing to carry the load deserve our thanks and appreciation, and they also deserve for the rest of us to stand up beside them, join them in their effort and all work for the common good of this county.

The planting of a hay or grazing crop on highly erodible land without first obtaining a conservation plan would make the producer ineligible for peanut price support. If you don't have a conservation plan for highly erodible cropland, check with the Soil Conservation Serv-



this includes annual paid vacation, sick leave benefits, and a job for a career of 20 or more years. At that time the employee may enroll full retirement benefits.

Other than the post office and a few Soil Conservation and ASCS jobs, these job benefits are unique.

The good thing about the proposed facility is that approximately 826 permanent employees are required and there is equal opportunity employment.

This does not mean that they must be local citizens but undoubtedly they will ultimately move to towns near the prison site. Local Chambers of Commerce are expecting a boom in increased business.

During the 2 year construction phase for the prison, practically any able-bodied worker can be employed.

The buildings will be concrete, steel, and brick with an abundance of electronics.

Construction will be by contract with a major prime contractor such as Brown and Root, who will then hire local sub contractors to assist.

Glasgow Appointed To Interim Legislative Subcommittee

AUSTIN—State Senator Bob Glasgow (D-Stephenville) has been appointed to an interim legislative subcommittee charged with drafting a bill reforming State campaign and financial disclosure laws.

At a September 22 meeting of the Senate State Affairs Committee, Senator Glasgow presented an ethics and finance reform plan authored by Bob Bullock, Texas Comptroller of Public Accounts. "This plan addresses everything that is wrong with the current ethics laws and campaign finance laws. This proposition is based on understandable and enforceable standards of conduct and accountability that should make clear what is permissible and what is not for officeholders, staff, lobbyists and contributors," Glasgow said.

One key element of the Bullock plan, as introduced by Senator Glasgow, requires more detailed financial reporting by lobbyists and their employers or clients. The plan calls for more extensive, detailed and regular disclosure of lobby-related spending, including any official who benefits from a lobby expenditure or gift. The plan also bans gifts to officials of items worth more than \$50, gifts of cash or unsecured loans and

prohibits the acceptance from lobbyists non-cash gifts to \$250 per year.

The ethics reform package also calls for an overhaul of the State Ethics Advisory Commission into the Texas Elections and Ethics Commission. The Commission would have the power to conduct investigations and audits based on evidence of wrongdoing, conduct randomly-selected enforcement audits and file criminal complaints. In addition, the Commission would issue rules and guidelines detailing which financial activities are legal and which are not.

In addition, the plan makes major structural changes in the laws which govern political funds. Under the Bullock plan, officeholders could not use campaign funds for household expenses in Austin, unless the Ethics Commission establishes set guidelines and limits for that purpose. Also, the bill would limit the amount of money that may be accepted by candidate from Political Action Committees (PACs) and requires more detailed disclosure of the individuals, groups and organizations that establish PACs.

The plan would also prohibit the making of political contributions within any public building or office, including the State Capitol Building in Austin.

The Subcommittee, chaired by Senator Bob McFarland, is to have its work completed by October 30, 1989. The proposal is to be presented to the entire State Affairs Committee on November 3, 1989, 11 days before the start of the Second Called Session of the Legislature.

AARP Health News

QUESTION: Mr. Cartee, can you tell me what I get for a Part A of my Medicare after I pay my premium?

ANSWER: You do not pay a premium for Part A (which is the hospital portion). You are responsible for a deductible of \$560 and co-insurance charges. You will be responsible for any private charges like TV, telephone, bed for the sitter, etc.

QUESTION: Mr. Cartee, now what do I get for my \$31.90 premium in Part B of Medicare?

ANSWER: Part B was designed to cover physician services, out-patient care or lab services. As with Part A, you have a deductible and 20 percent of the approved medical bill if the provider accepts an assignment. You should always ask the doctor and other providers if they accept assignments (in other words Medicare and your insurance.)

QUESTION: Mr. Cartee, could you tell me what Medicare does not pay?

ANSWER: The list is long. Items that have been determined not reasonable or necessary. Long term nursing home care. Custodial care in a nursing home. Private duty nurses. Homemaker services. Routine dental services. Routine physicals. Preven-

tative care. Out patient prescriptions. (In 1991, this will change). Eye examinations and glasses. Hearing aids and tests. Routine foot care. Any medical charge by a doctor who charges more than Medicare approves.

QUESTION: Mr. Cartee, will Medicare help pay for cataract surgery?

ANSWER: Yes. However, the cost is so high you should talk to the doctor about accepting an assignment. In other words he/she would

accept Medicare and your supplemental insurance policy. A typical cataract surgery could exceed \$1800 per eye. I encourage you to talk with your doctors about assignment pay before service is performed.

New gynecological guidelines say that woman can deliver a child naturally, barring specific medical reasons, even if she's had two cesarean sections before.

Researchers at the University of Louisville are fooling decay-causing bacteria with a substance that looks and acts like glucans, the part of plaque that attracts and holds sticky stuff. Germs bind to the fake plaque and can be flushed out of the mouth.

From Japan comes news of the use of CDP-choline a form of a B vitamin, for victims of moderate to severe stroke. Researchers believe the vitamin helps repair cell membranes and reduces fatalities, too.

Calcium intake may protect against colon cancer, say scientists at the University of Utah School of Medicine. Researchers suggest calcium works by binding with fat and bile acids that might cause tumors.

Possible substitute for fish oil: Department of Agriculture scientists say that the human body can convert soybean oil to the fatty acids we need.



assistance of specific advisory committees of representatives from national health care organizations. The purpose of these committees is to provide professional and technical advice on the development of standards and survey procedures.

Commissioner of Pct. 4, told Viterna that jail enlargement was "on Hold" now, for overcrowding was no longer a problem. The jail population was currently 8, the Commissioner said.

"The general population of the county is down - the oil play is gone and it doesn't look like it will come back," Bacon also said. "But if we get the State Prison site we'll have to build on to the jail without a doubt."

When asked by several people in the courtroom to explain his statement, Bacon said that he knew it was a fact - more general population and some of the visitors to the prison would create more crime.

After listening to the rest of Viterna's proposal the Commissioners turned to other agenda items. They heard a budget amendment request from Sheriff Dee Hogan, who asked for a revision in the salaries of his Deputies.

His original request was

apparently passed by after it was submitted for the Commissioners approval.

Hogan said he had thought his new budget was approved, but became aware of the difference when salary figures came out last week from the auditor's office.

As many hours as his Deputies were putting in they were only working for \$3 or \$4 per hour, Hogan remarked.

Comm. Norman Christian, Pct. 2 said: "Those people knew what the salary was when they hired out."

Billy Bacon stated: "If we lose these good men we'll slide right back where we were before."

The Commissioners agreed that they had seen the Sheriff's requests, but that the money was never budgeted. All county employees were given a raise of 30¢ per hour however, and this will go into effect Oct. 1.

County Judge Scott Bailey said that amending a budget before it becomes effective can be difficult. He and County Auditor Ray Pruitt stated that an emergency must be declared before a budget amendment can be enacted.

The Commissioners tabled the Sheriff's request for further study.

On other matters, the Commissioners gave quick approval to the request for an appropriation for a Rural Transportation Program in Eastland County. The County's share of the van purchase will be \$3700. This vehicle will be used to carry anyone needing transportation for medical purpose, grocery buying and other necessary errands.

The Court also approved \$2,000 for the Eastland County Child protective services fund.

As previously reported, discussions on the possible location of a State Prison in Eastland County brought out conflicting opinions between the County Economic Development group and persons opposing the facility. A proposal for the County to assume responsibility for the cost of the prison site was especially disputed.

L.D. Wooley, Cisco Banker, Don Shepherd, President of the ECED, and Charles Barnes Manager for Project HOOSGOW, spoke of the

economic benefits they saw for the county from such a project.

Other people had different ideas. Earl Bradley, President of EBAA Iron Corp., said it made him mad as all get-out to hear the prison referred to as an "industry."

"It's not an industry - it's a prison," Bradley said. "Why spend all this money for a thing you can't even be proud of?"

Don Shepherd asked some of the assembled group if they would support any type of new industry for Eastland

County? He received a rousing reply that they sure would - anything but what he had in mind! Suggestions were thrown out - including one

for a peanut butter factory. This conversation will probably resume in the future.

Notice is herewith provided to all residential sanitation/garbage customers of the City of Cisco that effective Monday, October 2, 1989, residential garbage will be picked up only one time per week.
