Democrat Jerri Simmons-Amussen wants to work for the farmer in Congress

Jerri Simmons-Amussen is running as a Democrate to replace Larry Combest in the 19th Congressional

District. Combest has resigned and his seat will be filled in a special election on May 3.

According to a Simmons-Amussen press release, she was born in O'Donnell, Texas and grew up on Simmons-Amussen

Her platform is, according to published information "providing relief for farmers and the agricultural industry, becoming less dependent on foreign oil and increasing drilling oil and gas in the United States." Simmons-Amussen also wants to provide the "best possible healthcare at the least possible cost" and "improve our public schools."

She also stated in her press packet, "One of my highest priorities will be to obtain a seat on the Agriculture Committee in the House as soon as possible."

There will not be a school board election on May 3. The school board passed a resolution canceling the election after no one filed for Precinct 1 or precinct 4 besides Thurman Myers in 1 and Curtis Shelburne in 4.

Texas allows the board to declare the candidates elected if there is no opposition.

Myers and Shelburne will be sworn into office at the regular board meeting on May 12.

While other communities across America were celebrating the release of the seven POWs Sunday, the people of Muleshoe gathered to say a final goodbye to Pfc. Chad Eric Bales.

A memorial service was planned by the community in Benny Douglass Stadium to pay tribute to the 20-year-old Marine killed on April 3 in Iraq. Hundreds came and were touched and saddened during the part civilian and part military service.

The Marines turned out in force, complete with a Color Guard and Honor Guard of seven riflemen to fire a twentyone gun salute to honor one of their own.

Bob Gacke, a 25 year member of the Masonic Lodge, rode into Muleshoe last Friday on his horse, Bud, with two mules, Rooster and Miss Maddie, trailing behind. Gacke left Port LaVaca, Texas on March 1, headed for the Montana/Canadian border which he hopes to reach by the end of August.

Gacke told the Journal in an interview, "there are three purposes for my trip — to raise a half million dollars for the Shriner's Hospital, to raise awareness for Masonic Lodges, and to show that we still live in the best country on the planet with the best people."

Gacke is depending on people to help him along the way since he travels alone. He said that the trip has exceeded his expectations because "American people are incredible . . . remarkable" in their willingness to


help a stranger traveling through their communities. According to Gacke, he's been so well fed he thinks he will have to go on a diet when he gets home.

Phil Garrett of Muleshoe is putting up the team while Gacke is in town. Garrett is a Master Mason, but the two men had never met before last Friday when Gacke arrived.

Gacke has a website www.whereisbob.com where he posts a daily diary and photos from his trip. Donation information for the Shriner's Hospital can also be found on the website.

The Shriner's Hospital provides absolutely free medical care for children 18 and under who have a need for care. The hospitals do not determine the need of the children based on the family's income, just on the medical necessity. They are not supported by government funds, so they

The Bailey County Commissioners Court agreed to send letters to the governor, speaker of the Texas house, the lt. governor and area legislators including Sen. Teel Bivins and

Rep. Warren Chisum during their monthly meeting Monday. The letter is in response to the "drastic" cuts that have passed the Texas house and senate in probation, healthcare, education and other programs.

The legislators are trying to

make up a 9.5 billion dollar shortfall projected in state revenues without raising taxes.

Their letter reads:

We as a Commissioners Court are urging you to reconsider the decision to cut all programs and pass the cost to local governments.

County government is by far the most frugal level of government. We have no place to cut our budgets. Bailey County did not give raises to any employee

Suspect caught in theft

Gibson, 67, was released from the Bailey County Jail and walked to First Bank to try out a gray Lincoln, supposedly to consider purchasing it. Gibson told the bank he would drive out to the airport and back.

According to Department of Public Safety Officer Lacie Kirk, the bank employees realized Gibson had not returned in a timely manner and called the sheriff. The sheriff's office put out an all points bulletin.

Kirk spotted the car headed

west near Progress. When he stopped the car, he checked Gibson out on the computer. In the mean time, Gibson had given Kirk an expired driver's license.

When the report came back, Kirk found out Gibson had traffic warrants out in Yoakum County and was wanted for theft in Fort Worth.

The order to release Gibson from Bailey County Jail for theft by check stated "due to insufficient evidence, a chronic medical condition of the defendent and in the interest of justice." The order had been signed by the district attorney and was awaiting Judge Green's signa-

The board also extended the contract to First Bank of Muleshoe for a depository contract on McNeill's recommendation.



Council hears financial support request

The City Council again heard a request for financial support for the new Oneita Wagnon Senior Citizen Center Tuesday morning.

Nelda Merriott representing the Center, asked the Council to consider paying the utility bills on the building on South Main for the first year of operation.

Merriott told the Council that other communities support senior citizen centers from \$2,400 in Levelland to \$40,000 in Denver City a year. She said that she realized the

senior citizens are asking for taxpayer's money, but she reminded the council that seniors had been paying taxes for years.

Merriott also told the Council there are 900 senior citizens in Muleshoe and when the rest of Bailey County's population is added there is about 1,000.

Merriott said she would come back one more time with the full board from the Center.

In other business, the council agreed to purchase a used John Deere loader for the landfill. City Manager David Brunson told the

Council the present loader is being used at the landfill and on other projects in the city. He said there was a need for a loader full-time at the landfill.

The Council agreed to purchase the loader for \$65,895 under an emergency order which would not require advertising for bids. The loader has 8,000 hours on it. Brunson said it should be good for another 8,000 hours.

Brunson also informed the Council that Classic Cable had notified the city there would be a \$1.80 or a 9 percent cable rate increase.

Students to State Bowl compete in



Volunteer program to help children

Texans can boast about remarkable growth in this past decade as we became the second most populated state in the country. As such we also carry the dubious distinction of being one of the highest child abuse/child neglect populations in the country.

Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA) is a program that can help. In 1971, a remarkable community action initiative called CASA was developed to help communities respond on a personal level to abused children.

A community-wide information/organizational meeting for the CASA program will be held on May 1, 2003 at 7 p.m. at the Muleshoe Civic Center. Any adult who wishes to volunteer should attend.

In fiscal year 2002, based on the latest statistical report from the Texas Department of Protective & Regulatory. Services, 184,924 abuse and neglect allegations were

made in Texas on behalf of our children; 47,409 children were confirmed victims based on those allegations; and 30,167 children spent some time in the foster care system.

Children hurt by those they trust are marked for life. They carry this burden into their adult lives and deal with the memory on a recurring basis.

All too often they rely on those same negative parenting skills and pass on the harsh lessons of their childhood to yet another generation. These children all too often move from unstable childhood into troubled adolescence, have a higher risk of becoming juvenile offenders and may eventually populate our nation's prisons.

One trained person with a heart and a willingness to serve a child can be a beginning to an end to child abuse in a chird's life. That positive contact by a caring adult may help break the

cycle.

In Texas, there are currently 59 CASA programs, located in approximately 155 counties, who are supporting the work of more than 3,400 volunteer advocates serving more than 13,000 children.

It is important to understand that helping these children is partly an enterprise of self-interest for each of us, because by helping them, we help our communities become those safe havens we all long to dwell in. We secure our neighborhoods for our families by helping other families heal.

The selection was made by a National Board that is chaired by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and consists of representatives from the Salvation Army; American Red Cross; United Jewish Communities; Catholic Charities, USA; National Council of Churches of Christ in the USA; and United Way of America. The local Board was charged to distribute funds appropriated by Congress to help expand the capacity of food and shelter programs in high-need areas around the country.

A local board made up of area representatives will determine how the funds awarded to Bailey County are to be distributed among the emergency food and shelter programs run by local service agencies in the area. The local board is responsible for recommending agencies to receive these funds and any additional funds available under this phase of the program.

Under the terms of the grant from the National board, local agencies chosen to receive funds must: 1) be private voluntary non-profits or units of government, 2) have an accounting system, 3) practice non-discrimination, 4) have demonstrated the capability to deliver food and/or shelter programs, and 5) if they are a private volunhave a voluntary board. Qualifying agencies are urged to apply.

Public or private voluntary agencies interested in applying for Emergency Food and Shelter Program funds must contact Gary Sirkel at 272-4710 for an application. The deadline for applications is May 31, 2003.

A dog that I have had for six years suffered a painful death due to an unjust decision. I had trained this dog for years so he would become the hunting dog any man would want by his side. Anyway, I was cutting some limbs off a tree by my house when one fell on the fence in the backyard. Not knowing the real damage caused (by the falling limb), the dogs got out of the yard. death. The dog catcher saw the

two dogs and attempted to catch them. When he realized he needed some help to catch them because they would not come to him, he called for another City employee to come and help him. Well, instead of waiting for that help, he decided to shoot the dogs with a tranquilizer dart.

He made a good shot on Jake, the second dog, but Tucker was hit at a forward angle in front of the leg that left a hole the size of a quarter. We were told that because the dart went in so far, it was thought that it punctured one of his organs (pos-

When my wife returned to the house, she noticed the dog catcher a few houses down and confronted him to see if he had picked up the dogs. He told her that the dart went into Tucker further than it should have, and that some dogs don't react well with the tranquilizing medicine. In my opinion, this means I shouldn't shoot a dog with one if there is a possibility of ending in

The truth be told, he knew he made a bad shot and hit the dog in the wrong area. Instead of telling us we should take him to the vet and have him checked out, he told us he should "come to" in about three hours to cover up his mis-He did come by and

check on him a few hours later. At the time, he was still alive, but the whole time our dog was suffering. He was having a hard time breathing and started throwing up. Later that night he really started having a hard time breathing and he started convulsing for about 10 minutes. He died seconds later in my arms. This is one of the worst ways for any animal to die.

The next day, I took Tucker's lifeless body and showed him to the City Manager to show him the mistake his employee had made. He informed me that he would look into it, but there is nothing to look into because my dog was laying lifeless in the back of my truck because of a misplaced dart from an unprofessional, lazy coward.

We really need to ask ourselves if this is the kind of person we need working for the Muleshoe community. As for my family and I, we think not. Anyway, we wanted to publish this story so that something like this might be prevented in the future. I also feel that the city should be held responsible for their employees' actions. Thanks.


Shonnah Black received superior ratings on her solos "Do Not Go My Love," by Richard Hageman and "When I Have Sung My Songs," by Ernest Charles.



He was born in Toledo, Ohio on April 15, 1963. He attended Muleshoe High School, graduating as a member of the National Honor Society in May 1981.





him and wants him to know they are so proud of him and what he's doing right now. I talked with Helen Cook

last week and convinced her to share an email or two from her grandson, Russell Treider. These are dated March 29,

2003:

Hey!

Yes, I'm doing fine. Sorry it's taken me so long to write back. I really don't have much time for email lately except for Kristen every now and then.

I think I've had 8 hours of sleep if you add the past 3 nights together. And the work and schedule has been grueling to say the least. Things are very busy.

I can't tell you where I'm at, but the best thing I can say (and you to say) is that I'm in the Middle East. We don't stay in one place for very long. But we are regularly floating in places called the Gulf of Aden (where the Cole was hit), the Red Sea (but only on very rare occasions), and all around the "Horn of Africa." I can say that we are fully taking part in things but as my ship's job is a command communications ship, we're basically a floating satellite for what all is going on. But as you already know, we have a unit of Marine Infantry with us to drop as needed for small things, and staff of all branches since it's a total cooperation with joint forces. It's neat to regularly talk to Army, Marines and Air Force every day. We also have many other country's staff.


Well, my job has changed quite dramatically. On top of my regular work and classes, I stand watch on a .50 caliber machine gun mount for about 8 hours a day. I love it, though.

It's exciting. Things are happening out there. We spot and track surface contacts and monitor them. I wish I could tell you some of the things that have happened. I guess I shouldn't say it's exciting, but I guess it's human. Lot's of "unfriendly" people in these waters right now.

Anyway, I'm out in the 100+ degree sun, standing on a steel deck that radiates the heat all over and just bakes me. That part is miserable, but bearable. I look like I'm Mexican now. I've never been this tan. I will tell you though, I've been wearing sunscreen from the start and it doesn't work. Try to imagine all that heat, along with the ocean's humidity. We literally are drenched in sweat, so the lotion just drips off all over everything. I don't mean sweaty, like sticky. I mean sweaty like it looks like someone has sprayed you with a garden

I'm a gun captain now. I guess I showed the Senior Chief I could hold my own with the gun and I'm in charge of the mount now. I really enjoy being on it. If feels good to be doing a little bit more as far as protection for my shipmates and my country's property. Don't worry about me, I'm as safe as I can be, and I'm very careful. I'm watching my back and everyone elses. Anything outside the ship is good, so I'm enjoying it. I'm thinking of you, Logan and Landon

wearing those bracelets and it makes me smile Thank you very much. I appreciate the support.

some personal stuff right here, Russell continues:


Thank you for your prayers for all of this stuff upcoming (remember folks, this was sent on March 29) and the stuff that's going on right now. If there is anything I would ask you to do, it is support my Commander in Chief, and all of us over here. And anybody you could tell about you supporting us is good. You don't have to talk about me, just about your supporting of us. I get emails every day about people calling us terrorists and stuff like that, but I realized something: I give them that right to say those things every day. And I'm proud that they are able to say that. Maybe one day, they'll appreciate that — being able to bite the hand that feeds them. Sorry, I didn't mean to go off like that.

Well, I better go now, I've gotta get some sleep. Think about me in the next couple of days. We'll be in a certain area for only 2-3 days, a known "hot-spot," so I'll be on my gun more than usual probably.

The writer, Thomas Waynick, isn't local, but his message is I was in the reserves during the Gulf War and was not activated. I have, however, been to Bosnia and seen what war does. It is a terrible thing and a result of our fallen human-

Our young soldiers are like those of the generations before. They are prepared, well trained and dealing with their anxieties. They worry about their families back home, how they will do in the face of combat and what it will be like. Many have prepared themselves by going to the throne of God's grace, making confessions and facing the realization of their own mortality. Soldiers know the meaning of the Biblical call to die to self.

I have spoken with many soldiers in the past few weeks. They have wanted me to encourage them in their walk, to share God's timeless Word, and to call upon the name of the Lord with them. They have wanted a pastor to draw near to them and help them draw near to God.

I have not heard of anyone concerned about terrorist retribution back home. However, they are concerned about terrorists here. Our soldiers know that that is the reason they are here — to fight the ons of mass destruction (WMDs), but we are far better prepared for it than any army in the world. We will meet that challenge. Most soldiers aren't close to any phone. Both the phone and internet often go down. While they bring our loved ones close, they also bring their problems near at a time when we can be of little help. So, it is a mixed blessing.

Every war has had its detractors and rightfully so. War should never be undertaken without serious debate and soul searching. We in the American military know that protest is a part of being free - our job is to defend that right.

I received a note from a mentor who fought in WWII. He reminded me that back in 1939 there were many in our nation and throughout the world who wanted to appease another dictator. We know that our elected leaders have made a decision and that we may be the instrument that brings freedom to the people of Iraq. No one wants peace more than soldiers. No one is affected by war more than the military. We have all fervently prayed with the Pope and others that war might be diverted.

Soldiers live by army values - loyalty, duty, respect, selfless service, honor, integrity and personal courage. In doing so, they fall into a long line of our forefathers who have died to themselves to be able to do the nation's business on the battlefield. Our young soldiers, our sons and daughters are human. They are afraid, but they are willing and able to do what their country asks of them.

Morale is good. The soldiers have been more somber, more prayerful these last few days. They are getting ready personally for battle. They are doing what those before them have done. They are talking to their God, making ready to do their duty for the American people.

It is my honor and privilege to be here with them.




